



## US Supreme Court Upholds Wisconsin's Hate Crimes Law

Law Could Become Model For Other States

In what Gay leaders are calling a "great victory," the United States Supreme Court on June 11 upheld by unanimous vote Wisconsin's hate crimes law.

The law provides additional penalties for those found quilty of a criminal offense in which the victim was "intentionally selected" because of his or her "race, religion, color, disability, sexual orientation, national origin or ancestry."

Ayearago, Wisconsin's Supreme Court struck down the law, saying it was an abridgment of First Amendment rights to freedom of speech and expression. State Attorney General Jim Doyle appealed, and defended the hate crimes statute before the high court in April.

Chief Justice William Rehnquist. who wrote the court's decision, rejected First Amendment concerns, asserting that conduct, not thought or speech, was being targeted by the statute. He said the Wisconsin legislature acted within its authority to mandate greater penalties for crimes motivated by hatred.

"This conduct is thought to inflict greater individual and societal harm." he wrote. "For example, according to the state...bias-motivated crimes are more likely to provoke retaliatory crimes, inflict distinct emotional harms on their victims. and incite community unrest."

Rehnquist quoted the 18th century legal scholar Sir William Blackstone, whose work influenced American law: "It is but reasonable that among crimes of different natures those should be most severely punished which are the most destructive of the public safety and happiness."

Rehnquist also noted that judges have always had wide discretion in weighing various factors, especially motivation, in determining criminal

penalties.

The court's decision involved the case of a black man, Todd Mitchell, who was found guilty of aggravated battery for attacking a white teenager in Kenosha in 1989. Before the attack, Mitchell yelled, "There goes a white boy, go get him!" Because of that bias aspect, Mitchell's two year sentence was increased to four years.

State Sen. Lynn Adelman, a strong believer in First Amendment rights who argued against the law before the high court, was disappointed by the decision.

"I continue to believe that this law is aimed at bias," he told the Milwaukee Journal, "It is punishment not for conduct, but the motive for the conduct. I feel very strongly that this law punishes thought."

But former State Rep. David Clarenbach, who wrote the legislation, said: "The ability of the state to apply the force of law is the first and most important step - it is a prerequisite - toward eliminating hate crimes and racism, bigotry and homophobia."

#### WISCONSIN LAW **ENHANCES CONVICTION PENALTIES**

The court's unanimous decision was a surprise to many, because last year it had struck down a hate crimes ordinance in St. Paul, Minnesota, But that law differed considerably from Wisconsin's statute.

Broader in scope, the St. Paul ordinance defined as a crime the simple display of any symbol, like a swastika or burning cross, that could cause "anger or alarm" in a person because of their race, religion or sex. It was voided because it punished mere expressions of certain points of view unrelated to criminal conduct.

Indeed, the strength of Wisconsin's law seems to lie in the fact that despite its common name — hate crimes law - it does not actually create any new crime. It merely enhances the penalties for crimes already on the books which are found to be motivated by hate.



called the high court's decision "terribly exciting." She said now that Wisconsin's statute had been sustained by a unanimous ruling of the Supreme Court, it was likely to become a model for hate crimes legislation in other states.

A spokesman for the Anti-Defamation League of B'Nai B'rith said 27 other states have similar legislation. The wording and provisions of these measures vary, so it's possible that other challenges may be made in court. But if states revise their current laws or adopt the Wisconsin model they should be on firm constitutional ground.

#### LOCAL REACTIONS

Rep. Baldwin was pleased that Wisconsin's pioneering status as the "Gay Rights State," (for adopting the very first Gay right law) was again evident in the victory for its hate crimes law.

Baldwin told In Step the hate crimes law would "give teeth" to the earlier measure, which prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation in housing, employment and public accommodations. "After all," she said, "if the streets and public accommodations are not safe for you because of the threat of violence, what good are those other quarantees?"

Jane Vanderbosch, Executive Director of The United in Madison, was surprised by the unanimous decision of the court. She theorized: "Two very different legal views may have dovetailed on this issue, and we are the benefactors."

Vanderbosch thinks the liberal members of the court may have been motivated primarily by the desire to curb hatred and discrimination, while the conservative members may have been motivated by the belief in states' rights and/or a more punitive attitude toward the rights of criminal defendants.

Scott Gunkel of Milwaukee's Lambda Rights Network called the Supreme Court's decision "a great victory," but said that the real challenge in Milwaukee was getting District Attorney E. Michael McCann to enforce the hate crimes provision. Gunkel has monitored several cases of Gay bashings, and says the District Attorney's Office has never invoked the hate crimes law.

"E. Michael McCann has never preferred or prosecuted hate crimes charges. He says they're 'unenforceable' because they require proving motive. Not only is that not true, he's negating the law by not enforcing it."

Gunkel said the Milwaukee Police
Department also needed to improve its
procedures. "Hate crimes are only as good
as the forms the police file. The police have
to be sensitized to bias crimes and know
how to detail and write them up properly."

"Now we really have our work cut out for us." he said.

## AIDS Symptomatic Syndrome "Not AIDS"

Rare infection not HIV/AIDS related

The syndrome known as idiopathic CD4+T lymphocytopenia (ICL) is rare and most likely has many causes—but is not related to the AIDS virus—according to two National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) presentations at the IXth International Conference on AIDS, June 7 to 11 in Regulin

The NIAID studies further verify previous findings that ICL is not caused by HIV-1 or HIV-2 or human T lymphotropic virus (HTLV)-1 or II nor by any retrovirus, the family to which these viruses belong. Moreover, the studies conclude that ICL affects diverse groups of people who often have clinical symptoms that differ from those of patients infected with HIV.

ICL first came to public attention during the VIIIth International Conference on AIDS in Amsterdam in July 1992. On July 30, 1992, NIAID announced that it would make its network of research resources immediately available for clinical and laboratory investigations of ICL.

Several studies have since been conducted, four of which were reported in the Feb. 11 issue of The New England Journal of Medicine. Writing in an editorial in that issue, Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., director of NIAID, noted that while cases of ICL have been identified since 1983, patients who have had suppressed immune systems without known causes have been reported for decades and some of these almost certainly would have fit the current definition of ICL.

## Haitians With HIV Finally Released

But Congress Codifies Ban on Immigrants

New York, NY — The Clinton administration has finally agreed to release 158 Haitian refugees from a prison camp in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba after a federal judge said their treatment by the US government had been "callous and reprehensible."

Thousands of Haitians arrived on America's shores almost two years ago, fleeing the repressive conditions in their homeland. They were deemed legitimate political refugees by immigration authorities

Extra! Extra! Colin Powell Knew His Bodyguard Was Gay

San Francisco, CA — US Army Captain Michael McManus has revealed that Gen. Colin Powell, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, knew that he was Gay while McManus was serving as his bodyguard and interpreter in Frankfurt, Germany in 1986.

According to McManus, Gen. Powell, who at that time was commander of the US Army Fifth Corps, replied: "What do you want me to do about it? As long as you are doing your job well, that does not matter to me."

McManus came out on May 29 at a Memorial weekend tribute to unknown Gay and Lesbian soldiers. Currently serving in the US Army Reserves as part of the Special Operations Command, Capt. McManus reports directly to the Pentagon and holds a top security clearance.

Gen. Powell also faced an embarrassing incident when he gave the address at Harvard's commencement June 10. Hundreds of graduates carried balloons and signs with the message "Lift the Ban," and some students stood silently or turned their backs in protest.

Powell said the military would survive the current controversy about Gays, and whatever decision was made would be "faithfully executed to the best of our ability."

but while being detained for questioning in Cuba, some were tested and found to be HIV-positive.

For almost 20 months those with HIV have been imprisoned behind barbed wire, guarded by armed US soldiers. Human rights groups have described their living conditions as inhumane. While the Bush administration was responsible for setting up the prison, President Clinton reneged on a campaign promise to close it down. The Rev. Jesse Jackson and AIDS activists have put increasing pressure on Clinton to change the policy while appeals were made through the courts.

In his strongly worded ruling ordering the US to allow the Haitians entry, US District Judge Sterling Johnson said: "Although the defendants euphemistically refer to its Guantanamo operation as a 'humanitarian camp,' the facts disclose that it is nothing more than an HIV prison camp presenting potential health risks to the Haitians held there."


"The Haitians' plight is a tragedy of immense proportion," said Judge Johnson, "and their continued detainment is totally unacceptable to this court."

The imprisoned Haitians include 143 HIV-positive adults, 2 HIV- negative adult relatives, and 13 children who have not been tested. Within days of the court order, human rights groups were helping to place the refugees with US relatives or church groups which had offered to house and assist them.

#### IMMIGRANTS WITH HIV BANNED

While the Haitians were finally allowed into the US, Congress passed legislation by an overwhelming margin which codifies the current policy banning visitors and immigrants with HIV or AIDS from entering the country. President Clinton promptly signed the legislation, which was part of a larger funding re-authorization bill for the National Institutes of Health.

During debate in Congress, Rep. Thomas Bliley, Jr. (R-VA) said: "Because HIV is always fatal, the public health consequences of allowing HIV individuals to immigrate is of the highest order. We have never before permitted immigration of those who were infected in the middle of an epidemic. We should not start now."

But Rep. Henry Waxman (D-CA) stated: "These provisions do not treat people with HIV in a fair manner. If it were a question of costs, the public charge provisions would have been used. If it were a question of public health, the public health provisions could have been used. It was neither of these, It was a question of discrimination."

"We spent months trying to get Congress to do the right thing," said Aimee Berenson of the AIDS Action Council. "It became clear during our extensive lobbying efforts, however, that Congressional support for the ban was overwhelming."

"We will continue to press Congress to reform our health care system and increase funding for AIDS care, research and prevention," Berenson said. "Some cling to spurious arguments that the inability of this country to guarantee health care to all people with HIV is a basis for barring HIV-infected immigrants from coming here. No one should be able to use these excuses for discrimination."

## AIDS Survival Time Nearly Doubles Since 1984

Report Released at Berlin AIDS Conference

Individuals diagnosed with AIDS in 1991 have nearly twice the survival time of those diagnosed in 1984 because of improved therapies and health care, according to results from an ongoing study by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID). The study results were presented at the IX International Conference of AIDS in Berlin.

"In addition to the positive impact of anti-HIV drugs, the progress in increasing survival after diagnosis has been helped by the recent advances in the prevention and treatment of opportunistic infections affecting people with AIDS," says Lisa P. Jacobson, Sc. M., MACS Data Coordinating Center at The Johns Hopkins School of Public Health in Baltimore, Md.

The findings come from the NIAID-supported Multicenter AIDS Cohort Study (MACS), which has followed more than 5,000 Gay and Bisexual men with HIV or at risk infection since 1984. The men live in the metropolitan areas of Baltimore, Chicago, Los Angeles and Pittsburgh.

"While a good proportion of the MACS men diagnosed with AIDS in 1990 or 1991 survived for nearly two years after their diagnosis, this improvement in survival was not uniform for all of AIDS-defining illnesses seen in MACS," says Lewis K. Schrager, M.D., chief of the epidemiology section of the Vaccine Trials and Epidemiology Branch of NIAID's Division of AIDS and project officer for MACS. "However, it will be important to see if the apparent slowing of the increase seen since 1988 continues into the future."

For men diagnosed with AIDS in

1984 to 1985, 50 percent had survival times of less than 11.6 months. At any given time, MACS participants diagnosed with AIDS since 1988 have half the risk of dying compared to those earlier cases, demonstrating that AIDS survival time has significantly improved since 1984, Ms. Jacobson says.

The greatest gain in survival time occurred among the MACS participants whose AIDS-defining illness was Pneumocystis carinii pneumonia (PCP), which is the most common opportunistic infection (OI) among AIDS patients in general, says Ms. Jacobson.

Survival time after an AIDS diagnosis among MACS participants developing PCP increased from a median of 12.8 months in 1984 to 1985 to a median of 26.3 months in 1990 to 1991.

In comparison, the likelihood of dying among MACS men with fewer than 100 CD4+ T cells per cubic millimeter of blood who develop Kaposi's sarcoma (KS), and AIDS-related cancer, decreased by almost two-thirds from 1984 to 1989. However, MACS men who had more than 100 CD4+ T cells when diagnosed with KS did not have significant changes in their survival times.

HIV targets and kills CD4+ T cells, which are crucial to the immune system. A healthy adult has 800 to 1,200 such cells.

Survival times after developing other Ols for those whose immune systems were not greatly suppressed at the time of diagnosis consistently improved, but the improvement may reflect the use of effective OI therapies, but further strides need to be made, explains Ms. Jacobson.

## Fauci Outlines HIV Disease Progression

Addresses IX Intl. AIDS Confab.

The multiple phases of HIV disease and the many complex events that contribute to the deterioration of an HIV infected person's immune system must all be addressed in the design of treatment strategies, says Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) and chief of the NIAID Laboratory of Immunoregulation.

Dr. Fauci discussed the immunologic events that occur at each stage of HIV infection and the challenges they pose for finding effective therapies in a state-of-the-science lecture, The Immunopathogenic Mechanisms of HIV Infection, at the IXth International Conference on AIDS in Berlin on June 7.

"HIV disease is multiphasic and multifactorial, with phases that overlap during its prolonged course," says Dr. Fauci. "Therapeutic strategies for HIV disease cannot be one-dimensional. Rather, they must take into account all the virologic and immunopathogenic processes that lead to the profound immunosuppression seen in patients with AIDS. A comprehensive approach is essential if we are to develop a truly effective treatment strategy."

Scientists now know that HIV replicates from the very early, or primary, phase of infection through the advanced phase of HIV disease when a patient's immune system is severely compromised. As reported in the March 25, 1993, Nature, Dr. Fauci and his colleagues have demonstrated that HIV is continuously present and replicating in the lymphoid tissue during HIV disease, even early in infection when a patient feels well and has

no symptoms.

"A true state of microbiologic latency probably does not exist at any time during the course of HIV infection," says Dr. Fauci. "We need to continue our search for combinations of safe and effective antiretrovirals that can be administered for a prolonged period of time. Although we do not yet have such drugs, the scientific rationale now exists for antiretroviral therapy throughout the course of HIV

disease.

Throughout HIV infection, CD4+ T cells are progressively depleted, probably by both direct and indirect mechanisms. A healthy, uninfected person usually has 800 to 1,200 of these cells per cubic millimeter of blood. When a person's CD4+ T cell count falls below 200, he or she becomes particularly vulnerable to opportunistic infections and cancers.

During the primary phase of infection, shortly after HIV enters the body, the virus replicates rapidly and disseminates. Large numbers of viral particles spread throughout the body, seeding themselves in various organs.

A week to a month later, the patient's immune system fights back with a vigorous response. Paradoxically, viral replication is enhanced during this period of immune activation. Large amounts of virus are produced and become trapped in specialized cells of the immune system, especially those found in the lymph nodes.

Within weeks, the immune system usually curtails the replication and spread of HIV in the bloodstream and a prolonged period of "clinical latency" ensues. In the lymph nodes, however, CD4+T cells continue to become infected, and viral particles accumulate there.

Dr. Fauci and his colleagues have demonstrated that several naturally occurring immune proteins — cytokines — can stimulate laboratory cultures of cells latently infected with HIV to produce new virus. HIV may prompt production of high levels of certain cytokines, normally used by the immune system for cell-to-cell communication, contributing to the active viral replication seen in the lymph nodes during he asymptomatic period, the researchers speculate.

In the advanced stage of disease, networks of specialized cells in crucial immune organs such as the thymus and lymph nodes break down and apparently lose the ability to regenerate themselves, further compounding the suppression of the immune system caused by the decline in CD4+ T cells.

"We now know that HIV disease is characterized by phases of both immune activation and immune suppression," says Dr. Fauci. "We must further dissect the

Community activists mixed with politicians, social workers, students and university officials in an evening filled with pride, nostalgia and lots of lighthearted banter about the less than substantial entree, a vegetarian teriyaki stir fry notable for its excess of chow mein noodles.

The evening was ably co-chaired by State Rep. Tammy Baldwin and Dane County Supervisor Dick Wagner, two of Wisconsin's openly Gay elected officials who have been longtime activists in the Madison community.

#### TAMMY BALDWIN'S KEYNOTE

In a keynote address, Rep. Baldwin paid tribute to The United and supplied some context for the evening's celebration.

various phases of HIV disease to determine the feasibility of using agents that might block certain aspects of activation without compounding immunosuppression. We may also need to boost the immune response during the period of immunosuppression with agents that do not promote the replication and spread of HIV infection by putting the cells of the immune system into a state of total activation."

activation."
"Moreover, we must consider, when we do develop safe and effective antiretrovirals, how to reconstitute an immune system that may have lost part, or all, of its ability to regenerate itself," he adds. "The design of the next generation of drugs and vaccines to fight HIV depend on our actively and aggressively pursuing studies aimed at a further delineation of the immunopathogenic mechanisms of HIV disease."

She explained that The United was founded in 1978 "to uphold and give meaning to Madison's Gay and Lesbian rights ordinance when it came under vicious attack right after it was enacted."

"The United has gone on to serve thousands in our community and beyond with a rich variety of programs and services...The United has been a prominent and visible force in our community which has truly served to bring us together."

In her speech, Baldwin talked about education and political organizing as "the two major paths on our journey to full civil rights and acceptance."

"We must concern ourselves far more than we already do with education," she said, noting that the fallure of the public schools to teach Gay history "results in a complete lack of healthy and competent role models for Gay and Lesbian youth."



She asserted that "our visibility still remains the most powerful tool we possess...I have no doubt that if every Gay man, every Lesbian, every bisexual and every straight person who stands in solidarity with us came out of the closet tomorrow, the effect would be so powerful that the world as we know it would change very quickly."

She pointed to the huge increase in openly Gay elected officials in the past 5 years and praised the recent Hawaiian

Supreme Court decision which may lay the groundwork for same sex marriages. But she said much more needed to be done in the political arena.

"Each of us...has to see ourselves as a key part, a key link in committing to these political battles. We have to commit to writing letters, to speaking out, to working on campaigns...to donating our time and money to secure our own freedom."

#### AND THE WINNERS ARE...

The Madison AIDS Support Network was presented with the Organization of the Year Award for its continuing commitment to provide services to people with HIV/AIDS and for its extensive public education efforts. MASN was also cited for working to break the barriers of racism, sexism and homophobia in the delivery of client services and among the public at large.

Former State Rep. David Clarenbach received the Ally of the Year Award for "historic legislative



achievements." In 1982, he authored Wisconsin's Gay rights law, the first in the nation. He authored the bill which repealed the state's sodomy statute and later, authored and helped pass the hate crimes law and the bill of rights for people with AIDS.

Clarenbach said he was proud the legislative gains in Wisconsin "are making it easier and safer for Gays and Lesbians all across this state to live and to work and to come out." He said said that while his years of public service had come to a close, "I look forward to walking down that long road with the Gay and Lesbian community until we accomplish the goal of human rights for all citizens."

John Neess received the Volunteer Man of the Year Award. Neess came out at age 50 and has been a



tireless volunteer ever since as a phone line volunteer, a speaker and Board member of The United. He served on the New Harvest Foundation Board and helped develop a Gay Studies course at the University of Wisconsin. Neess was also elected to the Shorewood Hills Board of Trustees where he succeeded in getting the village to recognize domestic partners.

Neess accepted the award on behalf of all the volunteers for The United. He said his age enabled him to offer this advice to the younger crowd who might think the movement for Gay rights was losing momentum. "I've lived through a fantastic period of historical change, so I can say it's not necessary to become discouraged. We have made enormous progress up 'til now, and, no doubt, that momentum will continue. It's only necessary to expand one's perspective a little bit."

Sharon Hayes, the founder of Single Moms by Choice and the Lesbian Parents Network, was presented with the Volunteer Woman of the Year Award. The Network has grown to more than 180 families in the past four years. Hayes writes

grant proposals, coordinates meetings and gives support and advocacy to Lesbian moms and their kids.

Hayes said there "could be many, many lesbian women and their partners and their step-parent partners and their co-parent partners standing up here with me tonight. The LPN only operates on volunteer power." She encouraged people to continue contributing to Wisconsin Community Fund and the New Harvest Foundation, which have supported LPN.

The Susan Green Awards for Man and Woman of the Year went to John Quinlan and Lois Stauber. Susan Green was a civil rights activist who coordinated The United before her early death from cancer in 1986.

John Quinlan has been active in Madison on Gay and Lesbian issues for ten years. He is a past co-chair of GALVAnize and is Madison bureau chief for Wisconsin Light. He worked in the Clinton-Gore and Tammy Baldwin State Assembly Campaigns. He is past President of the Fair Housing Council and helped secure early funding and childcare for the Lesbian Parents Network.

Quinlan acknowledged the "two families that are especially important in my life." His mother and father from Wichita. Kansas were present, and he thanked them for their "unconditional and unquestioning love and support." He also touted his "other, very special family" — Sunshine, Joanne and their daughter, a Lesbian family he has lived with and been inspired by.



He also praised Susan Green, Tammy Baldwin and UW Dean of Students Mary Rouse and got a big laugh by saying: "What self- respecting Gay man wouldn't mention the women in his life?"

Finally, artist Lois Stauber, the founder of Apple Island, Madison's popular meeting and performance space for women, was given the Woman of the Year Award. Stauber thanked all the women who helped make Apple Island a reality and who keep it running.

## NATIONAL NEWS BRIEFS

### Gay-Themed Plays Sweep Tony Awards

New York, NY — As expected, two Gay-themed plays, the Pulitzer Prize winning Angels in America: Millennium Approaches and the new musical version of Manuel Puig's Kiss of the Spider Woman, took the lion's share of Broadway's Tony Awards in ceremonies televised from the George Gershwin Theatre June 6.

There may have been more Gay men on stage that night than in any previous awards ceremony. Stephen Spinella, named Best Featured Actor in a Play for Angels, thanked "my lover, Peter Elliott, the husband of my heart." And Tony Kushner, author of Angels, thanked "Gays and Lesbians around the country" as the orchestra drowned his speech out.

For the record, Angels won four Tonys, as Best Play, and for Best Director (Gary C. Wolfe, another Gay man), Best Leading Actor (Ron Leibman) and Featured Actor (Spinella).

Kiss of the Spider Woman won seven Tonys in the musical category, including Best Musical, Best Musical Score and Best Musical Book (John Kander and Fred Ebb), Leading Actress in a Musical (Gay icon Chita Rivera), Leading Actor in a Musical (Brent Carver), Featured Actor in a Musical (Milwaukee stage veteran Anthony Crivello) and Best Costume Design (Florence Klotz).

### Killer Stalked Schindler Before Striking

Washington, DC — Just hours after a military court in Japan sentenced Terry Helvey to life in prison for the murder of fellow sailor Allen Schindler, the Navy released documents indicating that Helvey had stalked Schindler and made anti-Gay comments.

The documents provided more information about what actually happened the night of the murder and what might have motivated Helvey, details that had remained obscure during the trial.

Helvey grew hostile toward Schindler after they had shared a work detail and Helvey felt Schindler had "bossed" him around. He grew more hostile after learning of Schindler's homosexuality. Last October 27, after seeing a movie and becoming drunk, Helvey and three other sailors saw Schindler walking alone toward a park. They followed him into a restroom where Helvey, unprovoked, beat Schindler to the floor. He then choked him and, along with one other sailor, kicked him repeatedly in the head, chest and sides. The pathologist said it was the worst beating he had ever seen.

The documents detail how Helvey tried to evade capture, stealing clothes to replace his blood-spattered uniform and fighting off the shore patrol. Upon his arrest, he declared, "The bastard deserved it," and said he thought homosexuality was "disgusting, sick and scary." Helvey said the murder could have been avoided "had homosexuals not been allowed in the military."

### Oregon Group Launches New Anti-Gay Effort

Salem, OR — The Oregon Citizen's Alliance, which unsuccessfully tried to pass an anti-Gay referendum last November, has launched a new statewide anti-Gay initiative.

In May, the group filed papers with the Oregon secretary of state to begin a new effort which, if approved by the electorate, would deny minority status under the law to Gays and Lesbians. Its language is less harsh than last year's initiative, which would have declared homosexuality "immoral" and "perverse." It is modeled after Colorado's referendum (now under appeal), which prohibits the state or any county or municipal body from including sexual orientation in anti-discrimination laws.

"The pejorative language is gone," Ellen Lowe told Associated Press. "But the intent is still there to take away human rights rather than protecting them."

The petition drive requires 89,000 signatures in order for the referendum to be placed on the ballot for the November 1994 election. The OCA is also pushing similar initiatives in over 20 localities. In May, the town of Cornelius voted to prohibit the passage of any ordinance protecting Gays from discrimination.

## New AIDS Prevention Ads Target Gay Men

San Francisco, CA - Two new AIDS prevention campaigns, specifically targeting Gay men, have been initiated on the west coast

The San Francisco AIDS Foundation has funded dozens of posters placed in bus shelters and aimed at young street hustlers involved in survival sex for pay. The large posters show a leather-clad young man holding a condom and standing near a car in which a man is seated. The phrase "Street Smarts" appears on the poster with the tag line "No Condom, No Date!" The message for sex workers and their clients is that safe sex means survival.

In San Francisco and Los Angeles, TV and cable stations have been the first in the country to run public service ads featuring Liza Minelli, John Goodman, Natalie Cole and Leanza Cornett, 1993 Miss America, each saying: "I have an important message for Gay and bisexual men: keep up the good work. Stay informed. Stay healthy. Stay safe. Every time." The 15 second spots were produced by AIDS Project Los Angeles and are the first television ads in the 12 year history of the epidemic to specifically target Gay and bisexual men.

### Massachusetts Schools to Help Gay Youth

Boston, MA - The Massachusetts Board of Education has adopted a series of recommendations intended to end discrimination against Gay and Lesbian students and to provide greater support services for Gay youth.

The recommendations were initially drawn up earlier this year by Republican Gov. William Weld's Commission on Gay and Lesbian Youth. According to a spokesman, the state board cannot require local school boards to adopt the proposals but will do everything it its power to encourage discussion and implementation.

The proposals include: developing policies to protect Gay students from harassment and discrimination; sensitizing school personnel to Gay issues and training them in violence and suicide prevention techniques; establishing school-based support groups where all

students can come together and talk about Gay-related issues; and offering counseling to the family members of Gay and Lesbian students.

### Writers Group Fights Censorship of Gay Works

New York, NY — PEN American Center, the US chapter of the prestigious international writers' group, has formed a committee to oppose increasing efforts to censor Gay and Lesbian writing. The committee will work to "expose and oppose" threats to the First Amendment by those who want to censor Gay writing and ban books from school libraries.

The New York Times reported that the committee's first task was to "challenge the way textbooks are putting Gay and Lesbian writers back in the closet." They cited examples from Texas textbooks which discuss the race and gender of writers like Walt Whitman, James Baldwin and Truman Capote, but fail to mention their sexual orientation.

New York, NY — Tennis pro Martina Navratilova has joined the Host Committee for Gay Games IV scheduled next year in New York City. She has agreed to host a fundraising event and to sign her name to letters in a direct mail campaign seeking support for Games. Gay Games officials are pleased to have the prestige of her personality behind their event, and Navratilova's publicist says her client may take on additional roles in support of the sporting event.

Los Angeles, CA — James Bridges, the writer and director of such popular films as The China Syndrome and Urban Cowboy, died June 6 of kidney failure brought on by cancer. He was 57. His scripts for The China Syndrome and The Påper Chase were nominated for Academy Awards. Bridges is survived by his companion of 35 years, Jack Larson.

Austin, TX — Eleven protesters were arrested at the Texas State Capitol May 31 after unfurling a banner in the House Chamber which called for repeal of the state's sodomy law. Although several Texas courts have found the law

Madison Gets New Chancellor, Police Chief

Madison - David Ward has been approved by the Board of Regents as the new Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin and Richard Williams has been appointed the new Police Chief for the city of Madison.

Ward had been serving as Interim Chancellor since Donna Shalala was appointed Secretary of Health and Human Services by President Clinton. Ward joined the faculty of the UW in 1966 in the Geography Department. He is a specialist in urban geography. In 1989, he became Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs.

UW spokeswoman Susan Trebach told In Step Ward is a "strong supporter of diversity" on campus and is expected to continue many of Shalala's initiatives regarding minority studies and recruitment, with some "fine tuning" to make them more effective. She could not give Ward's specific position on benefits for the domestic partners of university

employees, but In Step will follow up.

Meanwhile, Madison has hired Richard Williams of the Montgomery County, Maryland Sheriff's Department, as its new police chief. Williams, a 26 year veteran who has worked his way up from street cop, is an African-American. He will begin the job later this summer.

Madison Police Detective Alix Olson said she and other Gay and Lesbian officers sent letters to the Police and Fire! Commission at the time of their search asking that they choose as chief someone who would be sensitive to all minority issues, including those of the Gay and Lesbian community.

### Ben-Shalom Resigns as GLBVA President

Milwaukee — Miriam Ben-Shalom, a founder of the Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Veterans of America (GLBVA) three years ago, has resigned as President of the national organization.

In a letter to GLBVA Board members and regional chapters, Ben-Shalom cited several reasons. "I am tired of dealing with people who offer lots of critique and little help," she wrote in the letter. She wrote that she found "unfair and downright dastardly" that people "have held me to standards they, themselves, cannot or will not keep."

Ben-Shalom fought her own 14 year court battle against the military. While she was reinstated by a federal judge at one point, the Army Reserves then refused to allow her to re-enlist. Ultimately, the US Supreme Court refused to hear her case.

Ben-Shalom helped build the nationwide network of GLBVA chapters. She has been active this year lobbying in Washington against the Pentagon ban and touring nationwide on the "Tour of Duty" bus. She plans to continue her commitment to Gay yets.

### Joe Longo's Death Ruled a Suicide

Caledonia — Police officials in Caledonia have determined that the death of Joe Longo, a teacher for the Racine Unified School District, was a suicide. Longo, 47, was found dead in his home May 7. Police said he had hung himself. Longo's brother suspected foul play.

Longo had been suspended by the Racine school system May 3 pending the outcome of an investigation of alleged sexual misconduct with students. No charges had been filed.

Co-workers told In Step Longo was a dedicated teacher who was devoted to his job and students. They confirmed that Longo was openly Gay. He was a teacher for more than 25 years and worked with emotionally disturbed students. The Racine Jaycees once named him "Outstanding Young Educator," and he had

been nominated as Wisconsin's Teacher of the Year.

### Milwaukee Priests Urge Shelter for PWAs

Milwaukee — The Milwaukee Archdiocesan Council of Priests has passed a resolution encouraging parishes to open up vacant rectories and convents as shelters for people with AIDS.

Archbishop Rembert Weakland gave his okay to the proposal, and the church's Office for Social Concerns will now contact all parishes and religious institutions in the city to see where appropriate housing may be set up.

Cheryl Hass-Vaughan of the Milwaukee AIDS Project was elated with the news. She told the Milwaukee Sentinel about the success of a shelter for PWAs at the former Holy Redeemer convent on the north side: "The entire parish, the surrounding community, have all been supportive of this convent from day one...If this was a model for housing in this city, it would be an exceptional model."

### State Methodists Reject Pro-Gay Resolution

Stevens Point — At its annual meeting, the Wisconsin Conference of the United Methodist Church voted against two pro-Gay resolutions. One would have urged national church leaders to go on record in support of equal rights for Gays and Lesbians and urge an end to the Pentagon ban, the other would have endorsed the boycott of Colorado because of that state's anti-Gay referendum. The church is scheduled to hold its quadrennial General Conference in Denver in 1996.

The United Methodist Church last year defeated a resolution opposing the Pentagon ban, and church policy prohibits openly Gay or Lesbian people from becoming ordained as ministers.

About 1,500 attended the state conference at UW-Stevens Point.

## PrideFest '93 a "Stunning Success"

Nearly 12,000 — Biggest Crowd Ever

Milwaukee — Organizers of Milwaukee's 6th annual Gay/Lesbian Pride celebration, PrideFest '93, are calling the event a "stunning success."

"The whole committee is walking on air — those of us who can still walk," joked PrideFest chairman Bill Meunier the morning after the June 12-13 weekend events.

Mother nature cooperated too. Saturday night was clear and cool, and Sunday's hazy morning skies gave way to bright sunshine in the afternoon.

Milwaukee police estimated that 11,000 people crowded the streets of East Town and Juneau Park for Sunday's parade and festival. With more than a thousand attending the Saturday evening "Sing Out With Pride" concert, total participation may have reached 12,000, up from last year's total of 7,000.

Meunier said that despite a few glitches, like having to move fast to replenish the beer supply in mid-afternoon, the festival ran fairly smoothly Contrary to many rumors, only one arrest was made of an anti-Gay skinhead who allegedly took a swing at some festivalgoers.

"Our security was tight," said Meunier, "so we were able to provide a safe time for everyone."

Several thousand people remained in the park at 8:45 when Milwaukee police asked organizers to disperse the crowd. BJ Daniels, performing in her drag revue, quelled the "Boos!" and disappointment of many in the audience and suggested the party move into the Gay bars.

Meunier told In Step that PrideFest's park permit expired at 8:30, but he said he would be communicating with police about their somewhat pushy tactics.

Festivalgoers were treated to a wide variety of musical talent both days. Chicago's Smart Answer sang Gay song parodies like "Gee, I Wish I Was Back in the Army," and Madison's Womonsong

sang Lesbian-friendly songs like "Where the Girls Are." Garrett James lived up to his billing as "the best voice in Milwaukee" with powerful vocal deliveries.

David Robinson and Road Damage provided great reggae music, the Carnival Strippers played high decibel rock, and the Shoreline Dancers and the Iberian Dancers displayed their precision and artistry in very different dance modes.

Wisconsin's first openly Lesblan elected official, Rep. Tammy Baldwin, was on hand for the rally. She touted recent Gay rights victories, especially the Supreme Court's unanimous ruling in favor of Wisconsin's hate crimes law, but encouraged festivalgoers to stay politically active.

The Pride Committee's Community Service Award went this year to Madison's Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual service organization, The United, which is celebrating its 15th anniversary this year.

The Alyn Hess Award for a non-Gay ally went to Brookfield homemaker Gisele Klemp, who challenged the Elmbrook school system for sponsoring a fundraiser for the Boy Scouts, which intentionally discriminates against Gays. The emcee joked that Klemp should be named an "honorary" Lesbian.

In parade competition, Za's won the Committee's Choice award for its float. Milwaukee's Your Place won for Best Presentation by a Business, and the Travlur Lounge in Rockford won for Most Creative Presentation.

The award for Most Creative Presentation by and Organization went to ACT UP/Milwaukee, and the Lesbian Alliance of metro Milwaukee won for Best Presentation by an Organization.

In Step went to press the day after PrideFest. We'll provide more extensive coverage and lots of photos in the next issue.

In May 1991, two Milwaukee cops, who have since been fired, ignored the pleas of Sandra Smith and Nicole Childress who witnessed Jeffrey Dahmer brutalizing young Konerak Sinthasomphone outside Dahmer's apartment building. Dahmer killed Konerak after police left. Glenda Cleveland, Smith's mother, called police to reinforce her daughter's concerns, but she too was dismissed by one of the officers.

Cleveland said she was surprised how long it took for the awards to be forthcoming, but said it made her "more comfortable" with the Milwaukee Police Department.

## New MAP Home Opens

33 person capacity

Milwaukee — Residents have moved into the Milwaukee AIDs Project's new, independent living environment on Milwaukee's northwest side. The facility, which once served as a convent, will provide safe, comfortable housing for 33 men and women living with HIV disease and AIDS.

The facility features private bedrooms, a recreation room, living room, large kitchen, and support group meeting rooms. The community setting strives to address residents' physical, recreational, and emotional needs, but does not provide medical services. Except for two rooms designated as smoking areas, the facility is smoke, drug and alcohol free.

Two resident managers and a housing coordinator are available to address the daily needs of residents, including coordination of meals, maintenance requests, emotional support, security and transportation.

To qualify, residents must be HIV symptomatic or have an AIDS diagnosis, be in need of housing due to financial difficulties, be a permanent Milwaukee county resident, and be able to live independently. Resident fees are based on each individual's financial situation.

Steve Steinhauer, manager, Finance and Housing Program at ARCW, said the facility is an ideal living environment for people living with HIV

disease. "At this facility, people are able to live comfortably in a spacious and relaxing atmosphere and at the same time receive emotional support from their fellow residents," said Steinhauer.

Residents may access MAP services including case management, support groups, legal assistance, practical and emotional support, the food pantry, nutritional counseling, recreation programs, art therapy, and cooperative therapies.

Household and furniture items are needed by the MAP's new independent living facility, including: twin beds, dressers, sofas, chairs, lamps, tables, microwaves, b o o k c a s e s pillows, b e d d in g/blankets/comforters, towels/washcloths, plants, sewing machines, recreational equipment (pool tables, weight sets), wastebaskets/garbage cans, and cleaning equipment. Other items needed include recreational electronics (stereos, VCR's, TV's) & personal care items. Donations should be directed to Kathy Prodoehl at 461-7672.

## MAP Receives Three Grants Totaling \$7,400

Milwaukee - The Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) has received three grants, ranging from a \$2,000 grant from the Stackner Family Foundation, Inc. to be used in the expansion of the agency's Food Services and Transportation Assistance Programs for people living with AIDS and HIV disease; a \$5,000 grant from the Glenn & Gertrude Humphrey Foundation, Inc. to be used in the expansion of the agency's Food Services and Transportation Assistance Programs for People living with AIDs and HIV disease; and a \$400 grant from the Community League of Menomonee Falls which will be used to purchase nutritious food for its Food Pantry Program.

The Stackner & Humphrey grants will be used to support operation of the agency's new mini-van, a 1990 Chevrolet Lumina APV, which was purchased by the agency in response to the number of clients utilizing the Food Services and Transportation Program.

## Chicago Pride Parade June 27

One of 3 biggest Pride parades in USA

Chicago - The 24th annual Chicago Gay and Lesbian Pride Parade will step off at 2pm, Sunday, June 27 with the theme "A Family of Pride". The parade will begin lining up on Halsted at a new corner this year. Belmont at Halsted. The parade lines up in the east curb lane from that corner, continuing south on Halsted to Altgeld Street. At 2pm, the parade will step off, and proceed north on Halsted to Broadway, south on Broadway to Diversey, then east on Diversey to Sheridan Road, then south onto Cannon Drive to the Rally/Music Fest. The Rally site is in Lincoln Park (groves 9 & 10) at Diversey and Sheridan along the lakefront.

By starting the parade at Belmont this year (two blocks further south), it will continue the trend in recent years of parade onlookers moving to Halsted to watch the parade. Besides easing crowds on Broadway, it will also offer an opportunity for parade entrants — who devote so much time and energy on their entries — additional time to express themselves and get their individual message across.

To assist in crowd control efforts, parade entrants are again required to provide 2 monitors alongside their parade entry. To further assist these safety efforts, parade spectators are being urged to remain on the curbs while watching the parade, and to view the parade from less congested sections of the route.

Parade participants are required to register in advance. Commercial entries must pay a fee of \$120; and non-profit groups must pay \$60. We found out that it is a bit more complicated than that. We also found out that many of the representatives of the nation don't mind if the Gays serve the country as long as we shut up about it.

It looks as thought his objective may not be taken. As of this writing everyone is coming up with every possible alternative to Gays being openly members of the military. They'll let us serve, but only if we're nice and quiet about it. I'm sorry. If I'm good enough to spend years in the service, I'm good enough to do it as who I am. I don't plan on any marriage ceremony at the base chapel with crossed swords and the whole bit. I don't plan on demanding on-base housing for my spouse. I do expect that we should be able to serve without having to have one eye looking behind us all of the time.

The number of Gay/Lesbian veterans in this country must be in the many tens of thousands. Among that staggering number of ex-military there must be many many medals and decorations. I think what I will do, if this whole enterprise falls though, is pack up my medals, and mail them back to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. I will include a note: "These decorations are returned to an Ungrateful Nation."

I think I will time it for Flag Day, 1994. I figure if, say, one hundred thousand Gay veterans (and I'm sure there are more than that around yet) do the same, there will be several tons of colorful ribbon and metal along with a lot of terse notes showing up at the nation's capital sometime next June. I like to think there is at least one Medal of Honor out there given to some Gay or Lesbian veteran that will end up prominently on the speaker's podium. That alone should embarrass the representatives of the nation, such as they are.

Perhaps I'll try to communicate this idea to other veterans around the country and see what they think. The Congress should be ashamed of itself.

I felt the Gay community should compromise on the issue of Gays in the military to help Bill Clinton at a time when he is under a lot of pressure. Some reversal of past policy with hope that experience would pave the way for equal treatment seemed a realistic and acceptable alternative.

Clinton's remarks of May 28, changed my opinion. Gays still have to compromise, but they must re-evaluate their support for Clinton.

Newspapers reported Clinton saying "We are trying to work this out... so that our country does not appear to be endorsing a Gay life style..." Television news showed him uttering that phrase, which was bad enough itself, but also making remarks about acts that have been considered crimes for centuries. In this he is wrong: Most sodomy laws date from the middle or late 19th Century.

Clinton clearly was pandering to religious fundamentalists. His remarks were a response to a fundamentalist minister who said he was afraid of degradation of the morals of the nation and the military.

I think Clinton was influenced by the "1%" study. He is making a big mistake, and this should be brought home to him.

Understandably Clinton might have to compromise, but his remarks were uncalled for. They not only harmed the civil rights cause, they hurt the heart: not just because they were factually wrong, but because they were absolutely unnecessary. They bordered on homophobia.

What can "1%" do? A great impact is possible by opposing Clinton on key issues.

Right now his budget/tax bill is in deep trouble. It barely squeaked by the house, and the analysts say it will have a tougher time in the Senate. I would suggest a campaign against Clinton's budget/tax bill.

## The Chemistry of S/M

Most of us are familiar (at least in theory) with the "Natural high" commonly associated with physical exercise. Whether jogging, bicycling, weight lifting or playing racquetball, prolonged strenuous activity is often rewarded by a state of mental euphoria. Simply put, working out can give you a nice buzz. The same thing occurs in S/M play.

This buzz, whether occurring in the weight room or the playroom, is actually a complex series of electrical and chemical reactions. To illustrate this, we'll use nipple

play as an example.

As with most S/M scenes, the most enjoyable reactions are gained through a gradual increase in stimulation as opposed to a sudden attack. Massaging and squeezing the nipples sends fastmoving, tactile messages to the spinal cord which are relayed to the brain. As pressure is increased or clamps are applied, the earlier pleasurable signals suppress new, slower-moving painful signals. Those painful messages, which do make it through to the brain result in a release of endorphins and enkephalins. Endorphins and enkephalins are naturally occurring opioids (substances similar in nature to opium or morphine) which block the painful signals.

These effects accumulate. Repetitive painful stimuli (or repetitive flexing and stretching of a muscle under stress) can cause areas at the base of the brain to release more opioids, which then circulate through the brain and spinal cord.

The effects are similar to those of codeine, limiting the perception of pain while still allowing one to experience the physical sensations involved. In conjunction with the opioid receptors in the brain, it also induces the aforementioned state of euphoria.

These same chemical responses occur to varying degrees every day and are associated with the reward centers of the brain. Activities such as eating, sleeping and urinating all result in a release of opioids. By learning to manipulate these reactions, the pleasure/pain boundaries can be explored and expanded.

There are, however, factors which can effectively shut down these reactions. Entering a scene with a high degree of nervous tension or agitation can actually hypersensitize the body, causing stimuli to seem more painful than no...al. As most players in the S/M arena have learned, it is not pain itself — but how it is applied — that leads to pleasure. Also, excessive use of any mind-altering substance, including alcohol, will numb the nervous system and can block the effects of the bodies own chemical responses.

You should also remember that opioids are very potent substances, so I highly recommend that you refrain from driving or operating heavy equipment while

engaging in intense S/M play.

These responses, combined with other effects of S/M play both mental and physical, have led many of us to redefine S/M from Sado/Masochism (a term coined by the late Dr. Kinsey) to Sensuality/Mutuality or my personal favorite. Sex/Magic.

(Special Acknowledgement: The connections between brain chemistry and S/M play were first widely espoused in the writings of the late Geoff Mains. For those wishing more information on the subject, I highly recommend his 1984 masterpiece, Urban Aboriginals (Gay Sunshine Press).)

## "Closet Case"

Closet Case by Robert Rodi Dutton, Hardcover \$21

Closely following the enormous success of the March on Washington, where an estimated 1.1 million Gay men and Lesbians proclaimed to all the world their sexual preference, ironically comes Closet Case by Robert Todi. In contrast to these real life out Gay men and Lesbians is Rodi's closeted protagonist, Lionel Frank. Lionel would never dream of participating in a Gay pride march in his hometown of Chicago much less Washington DC because Lionel is deathly afraid that his Gayness might become public knowledge. The extremes to which Lionel is willing to go to preserve his closet is the heart (and the humor) of Closet Case.

In his first book Fag Hag, Rodi set many Gay readers on their collective ear with a delightful mix of quirky characters, outrageous situations, scathing satire and yet without bitterness or any meanness of spirit. There is no shortage of similarly quirky characters peopling Closet Case Besides poor Lionel are Yolanda, the Latina prostitute-turned sci-fi bookstore clerk and Lionel's very best friend; Tone', his flaming faux-French hairdresser;

July 17 Madison Lionel's Aunt Lola who is about to launch a Gay greeting card line; Colonel Frank, Lionel's father who raises in his basement chinchillas named after famous generals; and Franklin Potter, a Soap Opera star who habitually falls asleep while standing in front of public restroom urinals.

Rodi begins Closet Case with Lionel well cocooned within his hermetically sealed closet. We quickly become acquainted with Lionel's life. He is a successful advertising executive whose harmless office flirtation with the desirable Tracy helps maintain his cover. He has had one doomed love affair (doomed because both were too closeted) and currently, he makes frequent calls to 1-900-Boy-Toyz. Perhaps Lionel isn't actually happy but after all, his is a closet of his own choosing. Yet Lionel's cocoon begins slowly to unravel when he is spotted in a Gay club drooling over a big hairy male stripper in priest's garb by Donna, a deaf dyke who works in Lionel's office. From this humorous, seemingly insignificant event, Lionel's obsession will take him to jail and later to be attacked at a company couples-only getaway by Yolanda's spear-toting, weekend-warrior former boyfriend.

Despite its camp, the occasionally forced coincidences, and the increasingly outrageous situations, Closet Case does have a serious mission. Rodi manages to reveal the very real pain of being afraid to be Gay within a homophobic workplace or family. As readers we root for Lionel to stop hiding behind his closet door. Yet Rodi is a perceptive writer who makes Lionel and his predicament all too real, forcing us to identify with him sympathetically, whether we want to or not. All along we know that Lionel will eventually be yanked out of his closet, most probably kicking and screaming. But

## Medical College of Wisconsin Now a Leading Center for Research

On AIDS Prevention and HIV Mental Health Issues

Milwaukee - In less than three years, the Medical College of Wisconsin (MCW) has become a leading national center for research that is identifying improved new approaches for HIV prevention and improved methods to meet the mental health needs of persons with HIV infection. In just this short period of time, the MCW Community Health Behavior Program has attracted nearly \$10 million in federal research funding that is addressing such questions as how to help Gay men consistently maintain behavior changes to reduce their risk for contracting HIV; how to develop and extend effective AIDS prevention programs to better reach innercity women, the chronic mentally ill, and the homeless; and how to provide mental health services that can assist men and women with HIV infection cope with the stresses and emotional ramifications of their health status.

"People think of San Francisco and New York as the centers for research on AIDS, yet Milwaukee has now gained a reputation for major research on HIV prevention and mental health issues," says Jeffrey A. Kelly, Ph.D., Professor of Psychiatry and Mental Health Sciences and Director of the MCW Community Health Behavior Program. There are two reasons for Milwaukee's new prominence in AIDS research, says Dr. Kelly. "First, we have been able to attract to the Medical College of Wisconsin a group of behavioral scientist faculty who devote all their effort to HIV prevention and mental health research, as well as 25 community research personnel who have dedicated their careers to solving problems related to AIDS. Second, Milwaukee is a city in many ways representative of much of the country where AIDS prevention is urgently needed and where it must work. Approaches that

work in Milwaukee can be used by public health and AIDS organizations throughout the nation."

As an example of the attention being given to AIDS studies conducted in Milwaukee, Dr. Kelly points out that nine different presentations will be made by Community Health Behavior Program researchers at the International Conference on AIDS that takes place in Berlin June 5-11. Also in the past year, over 15 scientific articles have been published by the MCW group in national public health and medical journals. The objective of the presentations and articles is to inform public health. mental health, and AIDS service organizations about new approaches that appear most effective in preventing HIV infection and in assisting persons with HIV disease. With this information, community and public health organizations can improve their AIDS prevention activities and services to persons with HIV infection.

#### RESEARCH ON AIDS PREVENTION

Within the Gay community. knowledge about AIDS is high but many men have trouble putting knowledge into consistent effect. "Unfortunately, HIV is now prevalent among Gay men, with about 10% of men infected in very small American cities and over half of men in cities like San Francisco already HIV positive," says Dr. Kelly. "This means that there is now little margin for error in following safer sex practices. It also means that we must shift our attention from providing very basic AIDS education to a new generation of HIV prevention efforts which help people to actually make and then consistently maintain risk reduction changes." Community Health Behavior Program research is evaluating the benefits of groups that help Gay men learn specific strategies for avoiding unsafe sex "lapses." approaches that provide support for maintaining behavior change, and friendstalking-to-friends approaches that make risk avoidance an accepted social norm within the Gay community.

Although a number of their studies are evaluating approaches for stopping new HIV infections in the Gay community, the MCW researchers are also addressing AIDS prevention methods with other vulnerable communities. "Because AIDS is disproportionately affecting the urban poor, ethnic minorities, and women in addition to Gay men, we have launched

Katrina Kaye, First Runner-Up Miss Gay WI At-Large large-scale HIV prevention research focusing on the socially-disadvantaged," Dr. Kelly says. "Examples include projects that evaluate women's risk reduction support groups offered in Milwaukee innercity health care clinics, programs that incorporate AIDS prevention into mental health clinics serving the chronic mentally ill, and evaluations of HIV prevention for homeless men and women. In each case, our research is attempting to find the best ways to help disadvantaged and disenfranchised people reduce their risk for contracting HIV."

#### HIV MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES

"As people with HIV live longer, it is critical to also help people with HIV live better. For that reason, our research also identifies the mental health needs of people with HIV disease and evaluates the effectiveness of mental health services to meet those needs and improve life quality," according to Dr. Kelly. In an article published in the May, 1993 issues of Health Psychology, a research team headed by Dr. Kelly found that persons with HIV disease often have high levels of depression, that high depression is related to absence of personal social supports, and that persons who cope better emotionally with HIV infection are less likely to abuse chemical substances and less likely to engage in unprotected sex. In a related study to be published later this year in the American Journal of Psychiatry an MCW team directed by Dr. Kelly, Debra Murphy Ph.D., and G. Richard Bahr, Ed.D evaluated 8-session small group mental health interventions for depressed persons with HIV infection. That research established that even brief specialized mental health services produced evidence of reduced depression, improved coping, and more healthful self-care regimens among HIV positive persons. "These findings," reports Dr. Kelly, "underscore the need to make available high-quality mental health services to the one to two million people in the country with HIV, many of whom will need - and can benefit from help in coping in order to maintain and improve their quality of life."

## Dallas to Host Gay/Lesbian Sports Festival

## Tuberculosis Fought On Many Fronts

To combat the re-emergence of tuberculosis (TB) and the spread of drug-resistant strains of the TB organism, the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) has formulated a broad-based research agenda to combat TB on many fronts.

Zeda F. Rosenberg, Sc.D., assistant to the director of NIAID, presented an agenda in an oral presentation at the IX Annual International Conference on AIDS in Berlin, Germany, on June 9. NIAID is the lead institute for TB research at the National Institutes of Health (NIH), funding more than 50 projects related to the disease. Dr. Rosenberg coordinates the NIAID TB research effort and is the NIH representative to the U.S. Public Health Service Task Force to Combat Multi-Drug Resistant TB.

"The NIH has responded to the public health emergency of tuberculosis with a multi-faceted research plan that addresses all aspects of the disease," says Dr. Rosenberg. "NIAID is well-positioned to

lead this effort with our long-standing expertise in immunology, microbiology and epidemiology and in drug and vaccine development, honed as part of our research programs in microbiology and infectious diseases as well as AIDS."

In FY 1993, NIAID will devote an estimated \$20.7 million to TB research, a nearly six-fold increase since 1991, Dr. Rosenberg says. NIH-wide, TB spending will total an estimated \$35.9 million in FY 1993. In FY 1994, NIAID TB funding will increase to an estimated \$28.0 million and NIH-wide, to \$46.5 million.

Approximately 1.7 million people — one third of the world's population — are infected with the predominant TB organism, Mycobacterium tuberculosis. Worldwide, TB kills nearly 3 million people every year, more than any other infectious disease. In the United States, TB has re-emerged as a serious public health problem, fueled by the HIV epidemic, immigration from TB-endemic areas and poor living conditions associated with homelessness and poverty. In 1992, a total of 26,678 cases of TB, in all 50 states, were reported to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, an increase of 20 percent since 1985.

Of particular concern is the growing number of people with multi-drugresistant TB (MDR-TB), caused by M. tuberculosis strains resistant to two or more drugs. Even with treatment, the death rate for MDR-TB patients may be as high as 40 to 60 percent, the same as for TB patients who receive no treatment. For people coinfected with HIV and MDR-TB, the death rate may be greater than 80 percent.

The comprehensive NIAID TB research agenda, formulated in 1992, includes support of studies of the epidemiology and natural history of TB; basic research into the biology of TB; development of new tools to diagnose it; and development of new TB drugs or new ways to deliver standard drugs. Also on the agenda: clinical trials of anti-TB therapies; development of new vaccines to prevent TB; training to increase the number of researchers; and new ways to educate health care workers and the public about TB prevention.

## 15th National G/L Health Conference

July 21-25 in Houston

Washington, DC - More than 900 Lesbian and Gay health care providers will discuss strategies for including Lesbian and Gay issues in the emerging national health care agenda on July 21-25, at the 15th National Lesbian and Gay Health Conference and 11th Annual AIDS/HIV Forum to be held at the Hyatt Regency in downtown Houston, Texas.

"We've seen tremendous positive changes in the Lesbian and Gay movement since it began at Stonewall in the 60s. But, one recurring problem that has impeded our progress is our community's tendency to splinter over specific issues and to create hostile 'camps,' "said Joyce Hunter, president of the National Lesbian and Gay Health Foundation (NLGHF), and 1993 conference program co-chair. "By addressing this issue at the opening plenary session on 'Horizontal Hostility,' we hope to create an environment which will unite the efforts of our health care community in one forward direction," she added.

Other plenary sessions which will address the current state of Lesbian and

Gay health care include: "The Politics of the Lesbian and Feminist Cancer Movement," "Perspectives on Future AIDS Policy," "Gay Positive School Curricula," and "Is Our Community Under Seige?"

Preceding the opening session, 11 full-day pre-conference institutes will explore health topics such as sexual abuse. internalized oppression, and special health care concerns for people of color. Following the opening, more than 220 workshops will be presented in five educational tracks including AIDS/HIV Forum, Lesbian and Gay Health, Mental Health, Substance Abuse, and Strategies for Inclusion. A special evening workshop track on rejuvenation is designed to help veteran health care providers regain their life focus, and "recharge."

radicalizing me. In addition, I made lifelong friends through and because of women's music, and I met my girlfriend because of women's music. I even got a couple of small but significant career boosts as a result of my involvement with women's music. On a personal level, I owe a great deal to women's music and its purveyors.

One of the few rules that I would ever suggest that we all live by, is, if you meet someone and they refuse to engage in safer sex practices, don't have sex with them. Some of you may be thinking, "that's easy for him to say," but it's not. I've been in situations where as much as I didn't want to say anything, I just had to say NO. I'm not willing to further jeopardize my own health, or put anyone else at risk.

PEOPLE WHO THINK SAFER SEX IS BORING ARE USUALLY BORING SEX! After all, it's the person you're with that makes sex exciting. But, if they're not interested in safer sex practices you should not be interested in them. Tell them, "no thanks, I don't want to die." And if you're not sure about what constitutes safer sex practices, contact your local AIDS service organization.

While I love having this column as my soap box, I've tried to not become to preachy because I feel that tone might turn people off to the message. This issue, however, requires that I really speak my mind. Sex is great, but it is not worth dying for. Take a few minutes and think about your own sex practices. If you or someone you know is engaging in unsafe sex, you're putting you're life and the lives of others at great risk. AIDS is not fun. This is not a disease you want to have — trust me.

For those of you who are HIV+ and feel you can have unprotected sex with another HIV+ person you're wrong! HIV can be a progressive virus, the more exposure, the more rapid the disease progresses. You also expose yourself and your partner to additional opportunistic infections that one of you might have, but not the other. Be safe, enjoy yourself, but don't kill yourself.





I realized recently, in a vivid way, what a pivotal role women's music has had in creating the sense of a national Lesbian community at a friend's funeral. A local singer performed several songs during the course of the church service, songs by the likes of Ferron and Chris Williamson, And I noticed that virtually all of the dykes in the crowd were singing along. Maybe it was just because we were in a church, but it was then that it occurred to me that the songs of women's music from the "old days," at least are like hymns in the Lesbian community: songs we all know by heart, songs that move us in some emotional or spiritual place. And almost never is it more clear that we are, indeed a community than when we are all singing these songs together and singing without, even, the aid of hymnals. In fact, if I were to take the religious analogy further yet, Chris and Meg and Holly and all the others were like our cultural ministers, giving us faith in ourselves and our community, lifting our spirits, drawing us together, and becoming some of our first positive Lesbian role models: the women who made us lust in our hearts if not to be with them, then to be like them. Lending even more support to the religion thing is the fact that the coffeehouses and other concert venues where we came to listen to and sing with these women were often housed in actual churches. And one could even think of the festivals as semi-naked revival meetings without the tent and with a little goddesstalk instead of a lot of god-talk.

But if I'm a fallen-away Lutheran, I am also something of a fallen-away women's music fan; it simply does not play the big part in my life it once did. (But even at that, it's still a larger part than the lutheran thing ever was!) In a way, though, it's a little like being the child of immigrant parents: you grow up steeped in that culture, and even though you're not still doing step-dancing at folk festivals or eating chamina anymore or wearing a sari, it's part of who you are, it's part of what shaped your worldview, your personality, maybe even your love life. The gestalt of women's music the musicians and singers, the lyrics of their songs, the gathering together of a significant part of the community taught me to lofe myself as a Lesbian, to be proud, irreverent, and politically conscious on many levels. Women's music definitely played a role in



## Inside Out

## The Biggest Girl Group of All

When I was a kid growing up in Milwaukee, I always wanted to be some ethnicity other than what I was. What I wanted, I thought, was to be from a more "exotic" background, by which I meant something other than a German American in a town where almost everyone, or so it seemed, was German American: I wanted to stand out from the crowd. I generally focused on wanting to be Greek or Italian, primarily, I think, because I had a notion that, with my perpetually tan tomboy skin and my dark, dark hair, I could maybe sort of pass for a child of one of those Mediterranean countries or more so, at any rate, than I could pass for someone of, say, Vietnamese or Nigerian descent.

In retrospect, it is clear to me that what I was really longing for was some sense of a community larger than my family, a sense of a long-standing shared tradition, whether emanating from ethnic background or religious background, that connected me to others of my own kind, both people known to me and those whom I would never know, ancestors and living strangers, but with whom I was connected nonetheless because we shared this same rich cultural history and "language." I'm not saying that this connectedness was not possible for German American families. It was just not a part of my own family, which was less German and more American, in that bland 1950s sort of way. Ours was a culture of TV and TV dinners that divided us from the rest of the world like the neat little divisions of the aluminum frozen dinner trays themselves as much as, or maybe more than, they connected us with everyone else

It is for this sense of community, this feeling of shared culture, that a lot of disaffected people join cults. For me, it's the reason I joined the Lesbians. That, of course, is not an entirely true statement: 1) All debates aside, I didn't exactly choose Lesbianism; it more or less chose me. 2)

For your average dyke, Lesbianism is not very cult-like at all; it's just who we are. Period. Like being German American. Or Chinese American Or whatever. What is true about my statement about joining the Lesbians, though, is that a lot of Lesbians and Gays in this country have been made to feel disaffected by the society at large and, further, that hooking up with some part of the organized Gay and Lesbian community helps alleviate some of the feeling of being estranged in one's own country, one's own city, one's own family. And for a large percentage of Lesbians of my generation, a major part of that sense of community was made possible and fostered by women's music the other main community-building agent being, of course, dyke softball, but that's a whole 'nother

## The Supreme Court Rescued Operation Rescue

Those who think that reproductive rights and Gay and Lesbian rights are not inextricably interconnected need only read the January Supreme Court decision involving abortion rights. Just as the 1986 Hardwick decision upholding Georgia's sodomy law had negative implications for privacy rights in general, so too does the

Supreme Court decision throwing out an abortion clinic's lawsuit against Operation Rescue have grave implications for civil rights in general, including Gay and

Lesbian rights.

The connection between Gay and Lesbian rights and reproductive rights is particularly clear since Operation Rescue, which has mounted massive blockades of abortion clinics across the country, announced in January that it will target the Gay and Lesbian community. The January decision of the Supreme Court in Bray v Alexander Women's Health Clinic makes it plain that the Supreme Court will not stand in Operation Rescue's way.

In yet another setback for equal protection, the Supreme Court ruled in Bray that women who are blocked from access to abortion clinics by mob action coordinated by Operation Rescue cannot sue under a nineteenth century federal civil rights statute that was designed to ensure

equal protection of the laws.

That statute, passed in 1871, was a response to the organized mob violence that was widespread in the South, as white Southerners sought to terrorize newly-freed Blacks and their supporters. The statute provides that a person who is injured by a conspiracy that has the purpose of depriving a person or class of persons of equal protection of the law, or that has the purpose of preventing local authorities from protecting all persons equally, can sue the conspirators in federal court. While the immediate purpose of the law was to protect blacks and their supporters, the floor debate on the bill in 1871 made it

clear that the law was intended also to cover conspiracies directed at persons due to their membership in other groups or classes.

Despite this clear legislative history, the Supreme Court has been whittling away for some time at the scope of coverage of this statute. In 1971, the Supreme Court held that the law was limited to conspiracies involving an Intent that is based on "some racial or perhaps otherwise class-based" discriminatory animosity against the victim or victims. In 1983, in a case where nonunion workers claimed that there was a conspiracy by union members against them, the Court held that the 1871 civil rights law did not apply to conspiracies motivated by economic animosity. It also held that it did not apply to conspiracies to infringe First Amendment rights, unless the State was involved in the conspiracy or unless the purpose of the conspiracy was to influence the activity of the State, because the First Amendment applies only to governmental officials.

Applying these decisions to Operation Rescue's activities, the Supreme Court ruled in Bray that a private conspiracy to deprive women of the constitutional right to abortion cannot be the subject of a lawsuit under the 1871 civil rights law. It held that, because the constitutional right to abortion protects women only from certain state interference with abortion, but not with private interference, the law did not apply to private conspiracies to deny women the right to abortion. The majority opinion. written by Justice Scalia, indicated that only conspiracies to violate the Thirteenth Amendment protections against slavery and involuntary servitude (broadly speaking, conspiracies to deny Blacks their rights, and conspiracies to deny the right to interstate travel, violate the 1871 civil rights

As Justice O'Connor pointed out in her dissent, the case really was not even about abortion. "Rather, this case is about whether a private conspiracy to deprive members of a protected class of legally protected interests gives rise to a federal cause of action. In my view, it does, because this is precisely the sort of conduct that... Congress sought to address in the legislation... The statute was intended to provide a federal means of redress to targets of private conspiracies



seeking to accomplish their political and social goals through unlawful means." And, as Justice Stevens stated in his dissent, "The Court ignores the obvious (and entirely constitutional) intent behind (the statutel to protect this Nation's citizens from what amounts to the theft of their constitutional rights by organized and

violent mobs across the country."

Certainly, if the Court will not find the types of massive blockades of abortion clinics conducted by Operation Rescue to be covered by the 1871 law, it will not find conspiracies, whether by Operation Rescue or other right-wing groups, which are directed at Gays and Lesbians, to be covered by the law. For example, if a rightwing group should begin a campaign of hate violence against Gays and Lesbians, persons injured could not sue members of that group for damages in federal court under the 1871 civil rights law. Likewise, if Operation Rescue decided to mount massive blockades of the offices of any of our Gay and Lesbian rights organizations. those organizations could not sue in federal court under the 1871 law for a federal injunction to stop the blockades.

As Gays and Lesbians face increasing attacks by the right wing that appear to coordinated nationally, the Court will not allow them to sue national rightwing organizers in federal courts for conspiring to deny equal protection to Gays and Lesbians. Instead, Gays and Lesbians will need to file their legal attacks in the state court systems, which have varying legal standards for damage suits and injunctions. Thus, while lawsuits against the right-wing will not be impossible to win, the Supreme Court has narrowed the legal claims available for such lawsuits. ©1993 by Arlene Zarembka

Now, I have to tell you, that always seemed to me to be a very, very strange way to get people to give you money.

So now we're at the March On Washington. Sunday morning on the Ellipse, an uncountable number grumbling into assembly. The most surprising thing is that they aren't particularly surprising. They look like a company picnic. The casual attire on the multiple-thousand men looks like it came from drawers that also harbor starched, pastel-banded, oxford cloth button-downs. Chinos and Dockers and Levi's, oh my. Certainly a sufficiency of

emblazoned T's. But even those have the give-away slogans that inform even the stupid that they were purchased last night from a pile on a folding table around the Circle at Dupont Metro, But, for most, polos with plackets were the dress order of the

The women were a little looser. understandably. Our acceptable-office and real-life costumes diverge more drastically. We wore levi's, and our older T's. Because we already had them in the drawer with our best thoughts, wants and wishes spelled across our chests. Because a mere march wasn't going to cause us to need a new voice. And because we didn't want to spend any more money than we had to. We wore uniform dyke-drag. Not offensive, because we're not good at it yet. But not so carefully casual as our brothercounterparts.

It was apparent that nearly everybody in the throng had gotten the same memo. The one that read, "We're going to Washington on Business," So we were shorn, and pressed, and laundered and dry cleaned into mass respectability, a presentable press of petitioners. Our manner and demeanor brought whole new definition to the "civil" part of our rights demonstration.

So? So what?

So, most of us have been to the Pride parties we throw ourselves annually. We've seen our outer limits. We've been part of the public binge of expressionfreedom we accord ourselves every June. Only this time, for the most part, we left our chains at home. We left our feather boa's behind. No gender wore high heels.

Except...

As he pranced through the crowd, absorbing attention, you could feel the attitudes torque-ing. He was a glitter jamboree in American paint. Red torso. White and blue body make-up and skin tight tights. Perhaps a cape? Memory blurs. Clearly he was not dressed for work unless he worked in a Halloween factory. What else holds clear is the apparent, but unvoiced animosity, in enormous subtlety. It was the politest outrage. Not from Mr. In-Costume, but from Mr's In-Calvin Klein.

If you moved at all in the mingle around him, you could hear the murmurs.

"Doesn't he get it?" "Oh, no. There goes the cover of Time Magazine." "Why doesn't someone tell him to go back to his room and get dressed."


Armistead Maupin is a Man I Dreamt Up features Maupin, the acclaimed author of the series of novels The Tales of the City, an outgrowth of his San

The program features interviews with Kramer, his family members and two men who have been targets of his anger — Dr. Anthony Fauci of the National Institutes of Health and former New York City Mayor Ed Koch. Also included are readings from Kramer's collection of essays, Reports From the Holocaust, and his novel Faggots, as well as scenes from his plays The Normal Heart (with Martin Sheen) and The Destiny of Me.

Kramer has been on the AIDS front line since day one, often resorting to confrontation and hyperbole, he says, because no one will listen otherwise. But long before he co-founded ACT UP, Kramer was controversial. The publication of Faggots, in which he argued for monogamy in an age of freewheeling Gay sex, made him an outcast in the Gay community. When Gay men began dying of the unnamed, undefined disease, Kramer again counseled against sexual overindulgence. But these warnings went unheeded because people considered Kramer a "prude."




