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

### Gays Rally Support for Right to Marry

#### Nationwide Observances Call for Equal Rights

Los Angeles (AP) — Gary Reisch and Charles Goldman know that if they were allowed by law to marry, they would enjoy certain benefits: tax breaks, joint health coverage, inheritance rights and hospital visitation privileges.

But those advantages are secondary to the real reason the two men wish they could legally register their 8-year-old relationship, which was sanctioned in a Jewish ceremony five years ago.

"We think we should have the same rights and the same obligations as any couple that wants to marry," said Reisch, a 33-year-old small-business owner. "We're talking about discrimination."

In California and the nation last Thursday, same-gender couples and their supporters turned out for the first national Freedom to Marry Day.

In West Hollywood, activists held a breakfast with supportive religious leaders and tied hundreds of lavender ribbons around trees, lampposts and street signs — a symbolic "tying of the knot."

Atlanta-area activists held a wedding cake celebration. In Kansas City, Mo., gays and lesbians caravaned in cars marked "Just Married."

Proclamations were issued and news

conferences were held in San Francisco and New York City. And Montana gayrights supporters kicked off a statewide letter-to-the-editor campaign to educate the public.

The actions were partly to support efforts in the fight to legalize same-sex marriages and partly to try to stave

In Hawaii, a same-sex marriage case is on appeal to the state's Supreme Court. Legislators, hoping to derail that explosive case, forged an unprecedented compromise bill allowing couples to register as "reciprocal beneficiaries." That designation allows registrants to qualify for benefits usually reserved for married couples. Among other things, they can obtain family medical insurance and file domestic violence complaints.

Similar smaller-scale measures are spreading. A survey last year by the accounting firm KPMG Peat Marwick found that nationally, nearly a quarter of employers with more than 5,000 workers extended health benefits to domestic partners — straight or gay.

However, even as Hawaii was supporting domestic partnership rules, its legislature approved a companion bill that will put a constitutional amendment before voters allowing the legislature to recognize only marriages between the sexes.

At the federal level, President Clinton in 1996 signed the Defense of Marriage Act, which would allow states to disregard gay and lesbian marriages performed in other states

In West Hollywood, couples came for the kind of recognition they cannot get elsewhere. They brought "wedding" albums, full of glossy pictures of events sanctioned only by each other, and wore plaintive name tags, such as "Gary and Charles, eight years waiting to marry."

And they told their stories.

Pat Alford-Keating, a 43-year-old UCLA psychologist, recalled breathing a sigh of relief when her two children turned 18. It meant that if anything happened to her, her son and daughter couldn't be taken away from her long-time partner, Shannon Keating, the woman the children call "Mommy."

Now, there are different worries: Suppose she or her partner were hospitalized in grave condition?

"There's always the fear that some family members would come in in the eleventh hour and say, 'No, she means nothing to her, she has no rights — I'm the family member here,'" Alford-Keat-

"Our country is built on the right to the pursuit of happiness," she said. "What could be more central to the pursuit of happiness than finding your true love and getting married?"

#### Book Vandal Targets Dayton Libraries

Dayton, OH — Librarians say books — especially books dealing with homosexuality — are increasingly the target of vandalism as a kind of political protest.

The latest victim of scrawled hate messages are a half-dozen branch libraries in Ohio's Dayton and Montgomery County area, where several thousand dollars worth of books have been damaged since the unpredictable vandalism began more than two years ago.

"Every time we let our guard down, he strikes," says Tom Weitzel, manager of the Kettering, Ohio, library system.

Police in Dayton, Kettering and Huber Heights have all investigated the work of the vandal, who calls himself the "Mad Sh---er," but have never come up with even a suspect.

Police say the vandal, whom they believe is male, usually leaves a note in the gay books he targets and refers to himself as "the righteous guardian of public decency."

According to police, the books are all damaged beyond use by being smeared with feces. The books are usually found left in the library's men's toilet, along with a "hate note."

The attacker's most recent target was Zack's Story, a book about growing up with same-sex parents, that was found destroyed in the library in the Dayton suburb of Kettering. A note found with the book called it "an affront to public decency. How dare you corrupt young children...?"

Cynthia Robinson, associate director of the American Library Association in Chicago, said gay and lesbianthemed books at libraries have increasingly been targets of censorship attempts around the country. But she also said that there have been a number of gay books intentionally destroyed in various libraries, from San Diego to New Mexico to Minnesota to Virginia in the past few year.

The vandal has also been something of a problem for the Dayton Lesbian and Gay Center where volunteers say the man has "made a few deposits" at their location as well.

Michael Hawk, a director of the center, said he's fairly sure it's the same man because he "uses the same nickname." Hawk said the man once "mailed us a piece of his soiled underwear" and that he's believed to be the person who makes obscene and harassing phone calls each week to the center's phone answering machine.

Police say they've continued to investigate the case and have even retained some of the soiled books and feces for DNA analysis because they think the bizarre nature of his vandalism could escalate to more serious attacks.

"This goes beyond political protest," said Jeff Caldwell, a Kettering police officer. "This guy is on the edge. He can come back at any time in almost any way."

#### Maine Voters Repeal State Anti-Bias Law

Augusta, ME — Rights advocates around the country are hoping that the political saw, "As goes Maine, so goes the nation," will prove untrue as the state's voters narrowly became the first in the nation to repeal a standing anti-discrimination law protecting gays and lesbians.

Unofficial and less than complete returns from the statewide balloting had the gay rights law repealed by 51 percent to 49 percent.

Activists on both sides have been watching the special election with interest, in part because Maine has been a gay rights battle-ground for the past two decades. Gay rights advocates have focused on the Maine repeal because many now consider national legislation unlikely with a largely hostile Congress.

"The momentum for gay rights has shifted from Washington back to the states," said Mark Johnson of the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force. "I think most state activists are watching and they realize that if they want to have anything happen in terms of civil rights, they have to do it in their state capitols."

Although preelection polling had indicated that some 60 percent of the state's voters in fact support equal rights for gays and lesbians, the outcome obviously was going to be determined by which side could get its voters out to the polling booths. Voter turnout for the election had been expected to be low, partly because of cold weather and partly because single-issue elections tend generally not to draw high voter interest.

But a number of cities and towns in the state were reporting voter turnouts greater than the expected 20 percent — some as high as 30 percent of the electorate.

But in the end, it appears the battle in Maine turned out to be the cities vs. the rural areas of the state. While support for the anti-bias measure was strong in cities like Portland, where the repeal move was rejected by a 3-to-1 margin, in most Maine's hundreds of small rural communities repeal was being supported with equal ratios. In the end, it appears the state's predominately rural population carried the vote.

Not typical of such campaigns, gay rights advocates fighting the repeal move had raised a substantial \$450,000 for their campaign coffers, about three times the amount raised by the repeal backers — the Christian Civic League of Maine and the Christian Coalition of Maine. Strapped for cash, the repeal backers had focused their efforts mainly on getting their core supporters to go to the polls, circulating some 250,000 leaflets urging a repeal of the state law that were passed out in more than 800 churches in the weeks just before the vote.

The same conservative religious groups had failed in their efforts two years ago to enact an anti-gay state ballot measure, and with polls showing most Maine voters supported anti-bias protections for homosexuals, the repeal of the state measure is a distinct setback for rights advocates and a boost to their opponents.

Governor Angus King said some economic harm to Maine might be inevitable after its repeal of a gay rights law, but no one should interpret the vote as a sign the state is hostile to any visitors.

King noted the organized campaign on the losing end of the vote had urged out-of-staters not to let the referendum affect their perception of Maine.

"They know that Maine people aren't hateful and bigoted people," he said.

But King forecast some economic backlash from the vote. "A lot of it will be immeasurable ... but I think it will be real," he said.

King said the decision by voters on gay rights deserved some ... measure of acceptance, but declined to declare how long that should last.

And in answer to questions by reporters, King noted that "next year will be a new Legislature."

In any event, he predicted new gay rights legislation would contain a referendum clause so that state voters would be given the final say.

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#### Milwaukee Presbyterians Stand Ground on Gay Ordination

Milwaukee — At a conference in West Allis on January 27, the activist Milwaukee Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) adopted two proposals to repeal a constitutional amendment that prohibits ordination of gays and lesbians as ministers, deacons and elders.

According to the presbytery's Clergy Commissioner, Rev. William H. Humphreys, until recently the PC/USA's Constitution did not clearly address the issue of ordination with regard to sexual orientation. A 1978 "definitive guidance" declaration by the Church's General Assembly banned ordination of persons who confirm that they engage in "homosexual practice."

This standard was debated and sustained by subsequent annual General Assemblies, and in 1993, it was assigned the status of "authoritative interpretation." Within that framework, Rev. Humphreys told *In Step*, individual churches, and presbyteries had some latitude to exercise their own ordination practices.

In June of 1996, the General Assembly began the process of incorporating the amended language into their *Book of Order*. The changes were enacted in June of 1997. The amendment dictated adherence to scripture, and other written standards, which are interpreted to ban ordination on the basis of sexual orientation.

In May of 1997, the Milwaukee Presbytery had responded with a stinging Covenant of Dissent.

The PC/USA's Synod of Lakes and Prairies, whose jurisdiction includes the Milwaukee Presbytery, convened a special committee to review the Covenant. The synod upheld that the presbytery's stated incapacity "...to abide by the recently passed amendment without violating our informed conscience, faith and interpretations of our obligations," and was a permissible conclusion within the framework of the Church's Constitution.

However, the synod ruled unconstitutional the Covenant's assertion that suitable and deserving persons would be ordained without regard to sexual orientation. Expunging the unconstitutional language, the synod approved the Covenant of Dissent.

On June 17, 1997, the Church's General Assembly distributed to the presbyteries a proposal that would rephrase the language that did not restrict ordainment on the basis of sexual orientation. The new language would allow the principles of "Scripture and the Book of confessions to be interpreted as guiding light rather than absolute course."

On January 27 of this year, the Milwaukee Presbytery adopted "Overture A." At the same conference, the presbytery transmitted to the General Assembly, for consideration at its June 1998 convention, an amendment that would completely delete from from the Book of Order either the existing language, or the new Overture A if adopted.

Such deletion would revert the position on ordination of gays and lesbians back to its condition prior to 1997. Still according to Humphreys, one would be hard-pressed to predict a timeframe for the finality on this issue.

### Hormel Nomination Postponed Indefinitely

San Francisco, CA (AP) — A vote on openly gay businessman James Hormel's nomination as ambassador to Luxembourg has been postponed indefinitely amid increasing signs that he may never be confirmed.

Hormel, who would be the first openly gay ambassador in U.S. history, got a nod from the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in November. But his nomination has been held up because of opposition from a growing number of senators who have been bombarded with material on him from far-right organizations.

Majority Leader Trent Lott would be the one to schedule a vote on the Senate floor, but he has no intention of doing so any time soon, he said.

"I don't foresee it in the near future," Lott told the San Francisco Chronicle. "But haven't declared it dead."

"There are enough objections to the nomination so it would be impossible to bring it to the floor without working them out first," Lott spokeswoman Susan Irby said.

Objections to Hormel stem largely from a \$500,000 donation he made to the San Francisco Public Library to establish a reading room dedicated to gay and lesbian material. Library officials, as a way of saying thanks, named the room after him.

Hormel's opponents are upset that the room contains materials from the North American Man Boy Love Association, a group that some claim extols pedophilia and incest. They say Hormel should denounce the material and demand that his name be removed from the room.

But Hormel, in a letter to Foreign Relations Committee member Sen. Gordon Smith, R-Ore., said he has no control over what materials are put on the shelves. And library Executive Director Chuck Forester pointed out that Hormel did not want his name attached to the room in the first place.

In any case, the library does not accept gifts that stipulate what books should or should not be bought, Forester said.

And library officials said they have included information about NAMBLA in the room specifically because the group has been such a focus of controversy that people may want to research it. The presence of the materials does not constitute an endorsement, they said.

Hormel's opponents also are upset that he has refused to condemn the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence, a group of gay men who dress up in nuns' habits at public events.



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#### **Washington Bans Gay Marriage**

Olympia (AP) - Washington became the 27th state in the United States to ban same-sex marriages earlier this month when the state legislature overrode a governor's veto to enact the ban.

It was Democratic Governor Gary Locke's first veto override, but the governor said he was consoled by the fact that the override meant Republicans would not send the gay marriage issue to state voters in a referendum.

'No governor likes to have a veto overridden," Locke said. "But at least this issue does not go to the ballot. I did not want a divisive, bitter campaign. I did not want contributing members of our society vilified or used for false fears and scapegoating.'

Same-gender marriages are not now legal in Washington, nor in any other state. But conservative lawmakers worried that courts elsewhere might legalize such unions, and that Washington state might then be forced to recognize them.

State courts in Hawaii and Vermont have issued preliminary rulings in favor of homosexual couples who challenged their denial of a marriage license.

It's because a bunch of unelected judges in another state could impose this on us," Republican Senate Majority Leader Dan McDonald said. "That's why we're doing this."

Plenty of Democrats joined the Republicans in the legislature to achieve the two-thirds majority needed to override the gubernatorial veto.

The vote in the House of Representatives was 65-28; in the state Senate, 34-11

The legislation approved Friday defines marriage as a contract between one man and one woman and says Washington will not recognize marriages performed elsewhere that vary from that standard.

Gay and lesbian leaders vowed to carry on the fight against the same-gender marriage ban.

"We're going to the courts," said Seattle Democrat Ed Murray, the only openly gay member of the Washington legislature. "We're putting together a legal team right now."

Murray called the legislative vote "dehumanizing" and unnecessary and said it violates state constitutional protections against discrimination.

#### Young Gay Males at **Higher Suicide Risk**

New York (AP) — Gay or bisexual adolescent boys are over seven times more likely to attempt suicide than their heterosexual male peers, according to a study published this week in the American Journal of Public Health.

Bisexuality/homosexuality is a risk factor for attempted suicide in male adolescents," according to Dr. Gary Remafedi and his colleagues at the University of Minnesota School of Public Health in Minneapolis.

The study findings are based on data gleaned from a 1987 survey of over 36,000 Minnesota 7thto 12th-grade public high school students, a group which the researchers say "closely resembled the demographic composition of the Minnesota student body."

Survey questionnaires focused on, among other things, each student's self-identification with a particular sexual orientation. A total of 212 boys and 182 girls identified themselves as either bisexual or "mostly/100% homosexual."

The Minneapolis researchers asked that subset of students to complete another questionnaire that included questions focusing on previous attempts at

suicide (if any), as well as current levels of suicidal thoughts and/or intentions. Their answers were compared with those of a group of 336 adolescents who labeled themselves as "mostly/100% heterosexual."

The report found that adolescent "male bisexuality/homosexuality was associated with a greater than sevenfold increased odds of a suicide attempt," compared with adolescent male heterosexuality. The researchers also found more than triple the incidence of suicidal intentions among male gay or bisexual teens, compared with their straight peers.

However, "bisexuality/homosexuality was not significantly associated with suicide risk in young women," the researchers report.

This gender disparity seems to confirm that "suicide risk among homosexual students was not attributable to homosexuality per se." Instead, they believe that peer pressure, troubles with gender nonconformity, and family dysfunction may exact a much heavier toll on young gay men compared with lesbian teens.

Randall Cole, coordinator of communications for the Hetrick-Martin Institute, a New York Citybased support and advocacy center for gay, bisexual and transgendered youth, said the results of the Minnesota study come as "no surprise" to those who work with troubled gay adolescents.

"Social intolerance of their sexual orientation puts gay and lesbian youth at much greater risk of suicide, substance abuse, isolation, and other highrisk situations," Cole said.

#### **Group Takes Precautions for AIDS Vaccine Volunteers**

CHICAGO - The Chicago Tribune has reported that the group of more than 200 volunteers around the U.S. who have stepped forward to test an experimental and still unapproved AIDS vaccine using the live virus have begun preparations for the health care of anyone in the test group who may become infected with HIV.

A spokesperson for the Chicago-based International Association of Physicians in AIDS Care, which called for the volunteers for the vaccine testing, told the paper that it had arranged with drug manufacturers and a medical company to provide the volunteers with blood testing and HIV medications should any of them contract the virus during

The vaccine trials, which are still being reviewed by the Food and Drug Administration and aren't actually expected to begin for some time, would use an attenuated or weakened version of the HIV. But the virus would still be live and many scientists and AIDS experts have called the proposal to use human guinea pigs for testing the vaccine reckless.

#### **British Using Gay Spies**

LONDON — The British government has shattered yet another barrier - and one that's rarely discussed in public: gays in the country's top foreign spy service, MI6.

Reports in British news sources quoted a talk by Sir Gerald Warner, one-time deputy head of MI6, in which he said the super-secret spy service, best known to the public through James Bond thrillers and the more sanguine novels of John LeCarre, had just sent its first gay couple to "an interesting" country where the men are believed to be serving in one of the service's larger field offices.

Warner said MI6 "now has a staff of 1,800 and has just sent the first homosexual couple abroad." He said the couple wasn't considered any kind of security risk because they were open about their orientation and their relationship.

The assignment of the gay spies - and even more, the public acknowledgement of it by so prominent an official marks a radical step forward in official British attitudes.

During the Cold War era, MI6 was shattered by "homosexual scandals" involving spies Guy Burgess and Anthony Blunt, and modern foreign intelligence services have traditionally been intensely anti-gay.

#### Arthur C. Clarke Denies Report He Paid Boys for Sex

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka - Science-fiction author and futuristic visionary Arthur C. Clarke is charging that an "exclusive interview" published in London's Sunday Mirror Feb. 1 is untrue and a fabrication and that he is seeking legal advice about the published article in which he is alleged to have admitted paying to have sex with young


In a press statement issued from his home in this islandnation off the tip of India, Clarke, best known among the general public for his novel and film "2001: A Space Odyssey," said he was "outraged" by the allegations in the newspaper's article.

Clarke, a British expatriot who has lived in Sri Lanka for some 30 years, was named on this year's "honors list" of citizens who would received knighthoods - in Clarke's case, his second knighthood. Slated to receive the honor on Feb. 4 from visiting Prince Charles, Clarke's statement said he had asked that his investiture be postponed to avoid causing any embarrassment to the prince.

Clarke, an Oscar winner and once nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize, is quoted in the paper's interview as saying he was unsure of the age of the youngest boy he had paid to have sex with "because of course you can't tell here."

The paper quoted him as saying, "Most of them had reached the age of puberty," and that the usual rate he paid was around 1,000 Sri Lankan rupees (about \$16).

Homosexuality is illegal in Sri Lanka and carries severe penalties - up to 10 years in prison - but as in many countries it is rarely prosecuted. Even so, the Mirror reported that an international child welfare agency and UNICEF are now calling for an official investigation of Clarke's sexual behavior.



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
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### Straight Talk on Gay Dress

Denver, CO — In these modern times, there are only a few bad things that still can get you kicked out of high school.

You can't bring your gun to class. You can't sell most drugs in the cafeteria. You can't "make" your baby in the middle of homeroom.

And now, at Denver's Lutheran High School, there's a new rule: You can't dress like a gay boy.

At a time when most schools are begging students to stay, Lutheran booted a teenager for coming to school dressed like a "homosexual," whatever that means. In the words of school director Kenneth Palmreuter, "Our dress code states that students can't wear clothes in such a way to be in opposition to the Bible. ... He wasn't asked to leave because he is gay. He was asked because of the gay clothing, the gay jewelry."

Just how did 18-year-old Jeremy Garza dress gay? He was an admitted fan of the men's fashion magazine *GQ*. Occasionally he would wear black leather pants. Other times he would go retro, with buttoned-up green polyester shirts and Ward Cleaver pants. Some fabrics even were a little shimmery.

Though he never donned T-shirts with gay messages, he did wear a bracelet and necklace with the rainbow logo favored by homosexual activists. He also conceded, in a trip to the principal's office, that he sometimes highlighted his eyes with a touch of mascara. Compared with contemporary non-gay role models such as Marv Albert, Mick Jagger and Paul Shaffer, Garza's fashion tastes are downright conservative.

Besides, he wanted to stay in the school. He had attended Lutheran schools since kindergarten and was just one semester from graduating with his class. He found some of his best friends in the school when his 8-year-old brother died of cancer and when he was kicked out of the house by his father for publicly acknowledging his homosexuality.

With a 3.3 grade-point average and an impressive 1,250 score on his SAT college entrance exam, Garza wasn't considered a troublemaker in school. Then his theology teacher pulled him aside and asked if the rumors and jewelry hinting at his homosexuality were true.

"I thought it was better to tell the truth than lie," Garza said. "I told him I had a boyfriend. He quoted me a few Bible verses and told me I was wrong."

School officials began praying for

Garza and bringing him in for weekly meetings. They kept telling him to change clothes. He decided instead to change schools.

"We don't want to remove a student just because he's sinful. If we did that, we'd all be gone," said director Palmreuter. "But we do have a dress code."

Ah, yes: That Lutheran High School dress code. It bans students from wearing anything that brings undue attention, though school officials said covered tattoos and even Green Bay Packers jerseys are OK, as are male students with earrings.

While visiting school, I asked if my clothes conformed to code. The director looked at my soft, swishy corduroys and my plush, velvety sweater and said: "You're wonderful."

In the hallways, I saw kids in heterosexual jeans, heterosexual shirts and heterosexual sneakers.

To be perfectly straight, I thought they dressed a lot like Ellen DeGeneres.

# Illinois to Require Mandatory HIV Reporting

Springfield, IL — John Lumpkin, head of the Illinois health department, has announced that the state will begin requiring mandatory reporting of the names of patients infected with HIV.

Illinois already requires that physicians report some 60 other diseases, and state health officials say reporting HIV infections will help notify partners of possible exposure and track the epidemic as well.

AIDS activists and service providers have criticized the proposal, saying the mandatory reporting will discourage people from getting tested for the virus and seeking treatment.

But Lumpkin said the health department had "carefully studied the issue of name reporting for two years and believes the time has come to treat HIV like other sexually transmitted diseases." Thirty-one other states already require reporting of HIV infections.

A recent federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention study of nine states that have mandatory HIV reporting found that less than 2 percent of high-risk individuals who hadn't been tested said it was because of the mandatory reporting requirement.

The new requirement will take effect in 90 to 120 days.

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### 'Army of God' Declares War

Birmingham, AL — A little-known extremist Christian sect called the Army of God has claimed responsibility for the bombing of an abortion clinic in Birmingham that killed an off-duty police officer and seriously injured a nurse at the facility. In 1997 the anonymous group had also said it was responsible for a blast at The OtherSide Lounge, a popular lesbian nightclub in Atlanta, that slightly injured four women at the club.

Federal investigators said a recent letter, sent to a number of news sources following the Jan. 29 bombing at the New Woman All Woman clinic in Birmingham, was "identical" in style and handwriting to one received in 1997 taking responsibility for the explosion at The OtherSide in Atlanta.

The letter, printed in large block-letters, says in part, "The bombing in Birmingham was carried out by the Army of God. Let those who work in the murder mill's [sic] around the nation be warned once more — you will be targeted without quarter — you are not immune from retaliation. Your commissar's [sic] in Washington can't protect you!"

The shadowy group, Army of God, is a name that has been floating around since the 1980s as a force in extremist anti-abortion activities. While the group has no formal structure, a manual that contains detailed information about how to make explosive devices that's been widely circulated among a variety of far-right groups in the U.S. was published under its name. Various anti-abortion activists have either been linked to it or claimed to be part of it over the years.

In 1982 a group of men kidnaped Dr. Hector Zevallos, a physician who performed abortions, and his wife from the Edwardsville, Ill., home. Later, a letter to the FBI from the Army of God demanded ransom for the couple's safe release and a repeal of federal legislation permitting abortions. The doctor and his wife were released, and later three men were caught and convicted of the kidnaping. One of the men is later also convicted of abortion clinic bombings in Florida and Virginia.

A series of abortion clinic bombings takes place in 1984 in the northeastern U.S. Later a man calls federal investigators and claims responsibility for the explosions in the name of the Army of God. No one, however, was ever convicted for those bombings

That same year, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Harry Blackmun, who wrote the high court's 1973 decision, Roe vs. Wade, that established the right of women to get legal abortions, received a letter signed in the name of the Army of God and threatening his life. No attempt was ever made on Justice Blackmun's life, but federal agents began providing him — and other Supreme Court justices — with protection for several years afterward.

After several years during which the group seemed quiescent, in 1993 Rachelle Shannon was convicted of attempting to murder Dr. George Tiller, a physician who performed abortions. Authorities found in Shannon's Grants Pass, Ore., home several Army of God manuals buried in her back yard. She is later also convicted on charges of bombings at six northwest abortion clinics, which she told authorities she had learned how to do from Army of God manuals.

In 1994, Paul Hill, a close friend of Shelly Shannon's, is found guilty of the killing of a doctor and a volunteer escort outside a Pensacola, Fla., clinic. On a death-row interview with a reporter after his conviction, Hill said the Army of God's anti-abortion views "encouraged and inspired me."

In 1997, news sources in Atlanta get a letter from the Army of God claiming responsibility for two bombings — one at a suburban clinic that injured seven people, and another that injured four at The OtherSide Club. The bombing at The OtherSide was the first time the Army of God had been associated with any attack on a lesbian or gay facility, and federal investigators were at first reluctant to believe the extremist anti-abortion sect had actually been connected with the bombing of the popular lesbian club.

Although investigators in Birmingham and Atlanta are reluctant to talk about the Army of God, there have been reports that those close to the continuing investigations in both cities remain mystified about why the anti-abortion group ever targeted a lesbian bar for a bombing.

After investigators in Atlanta acknowledged the link between the bombings at the clinic there and the explosion at The OtherSide Lounge, one official said it was "virtually impossible" to speculate about the reasoning behind the actions of violent extremist groups. "Among other things," the investigator told an Atlanta television news crew, "these sorts of groups are often little more than a loose collection of like-minded individuals with their own ideas and agendas. They may follow 90 percent of the guidelines of the group, but if they want to go off and do something largely unrelated on their own there's no one to really stop them."

What all this means, officials say, is that as long as there are fanatics and extremists who are willing to kill total strangers in an effort to impose their political views, no one can feel safe.

Authorities noted that the 1996 bombing at Atlanta's Centennial Olympic Park, which they believe may also be linked to the Army of God, had nothing to do with the extremist organization's anti-abortion philosophy either.

Although the FBI says he is not now considered a suspect, the agency is looking for Eric Robert Rudolph, 31, of North Carolina, whose pickup truck was seen leaving the Birmingham blast scene. CBS News also reported that a friend of Rudolph's was once arrested on explosives charges and that Rudolph's mother has disappeared after an initial FBI interview after the Birmingham explosion.

### Up to 900,000 Are HIV-positive in US

Chicago, IL — Between 650,000 and 900,000 people in the United States are currently either HIV-positive or have developed full-blown AIDS, a US epidemiologist said here Monday. Kevin De Cock, of the Atlanta-based Centers for Disease Control (CDC), also told an international conference on infectious diseases that as of the middle of last year, 259,000 people were living with AIDS.

HIV, the human immunodeficiency virus, unless checked leads to the killer disease AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome).

De Cock also said that treatment advances had brought AIDS deaths down 44 percent to 12,040 during the first half of 1997, compared with the same period of 1996. He added that new AIDS cases were growing fastest among heterosexuals, blacks, Hispanics and women.

De Cock stressed that the impact of treatment advances both in slowing progression from HIV to AIDS diagnosis and in slowing progression from AIDS to death were hampering authorities' efforts to monitor trends in new infections.

He suggested that files of HIV-positive people be established just as they exist for AIDS patients.

"The CDC has not taken an official stand on the issue. But most public health agencies and epidemiologists want HIV-positive people to come forward and identify themselves by name, with full guarantees of confidentiality, just as with AIDS patients," he added.

#### Gay Fingerprint Link Studied

London — A British scientist studying the roots of male sexuality has discovered that homosexual men's fingerprints are more similar to women's than heterosexual men's, a report said last week.

In a two-year study, Professor Richard Green of London's Charing Cross Hospital and the Institute of Criminology at Cambridge University found that although fingerprints are unique to each individual, said the *Sunday Times*, both men and women have more ridges on their right hand than on their left.

The study found, however, that the difference was less marked in women and about a third of gay men. The paper said the study added weight to the theory that homosexual men have a genetic disposition to their sexuality, and might lead to fingerprint studies of dead celebrities to determine their sexuality.

### Research Suspended Because of Rumored AIDS Vaccine Study

LOS ANGELES — Dr. Peter Kerndt, the chief researcher with Los Angeles county's health department, has been put on a leave of absence in because of rumors that poor African-Americans would be used as "guinea pigs" in experimental AIDS vaccine research under a proposed study by the doctor.

Kerndt had reportedly proposed to study the behavior of "high-risk" African-American women, which news reports said would help later lay the groundwork for an AIDS vaccine test by the National Institutes of Health. Kerndt also heads a federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention study that tests people for exposure to HIV.

Mike Neely, head of the Homeless Outreach Program, told the Los Angeles Times that he had raised his concerns with L.A. County Supervisor Yvonne Brathwaite Burke that Kerndt would "sneak people in" to the vaccine study after enrolling them for the CDC research.

In late January, both projects were suspended amid assertions that Kerndt did not properly request approval for the study and did not disclose that the vaccine might contain viral components of HIV.

#### Researchers Report Earliest Known HIV Infection

CHICAGO — U.S. and British scientists reported at the Fifth Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections that they have traced the earliest known case of HIV infection to an African man who died in 1959.

In 1985, a study of more than 1,200 blood samples obtained in Africa between 1959 and 1982 indicated one with the distinctive traits of HIV. The sample was taken in 1959 from a Bantu man who was living in Kinshasha (then known as Leopoldville) in the Congo.

Molecular analysis of the sample shows that the infected man probably contracted the disease about a decade after the virus moved from primates to humans, according to the scientists. The researchers reported that the sample indicates a "common ancestor" virus from the late 1940s or early 1950s. The study is also being published in the journal "Nature."

#### Millennium March on Washington Called for Year 2000

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Gays and lesbians from around the country will be marching into the next century with a Millennium March on Washington for Equal Rights in the year 2000 — a move that has been endorsed by the Human Rights Campaign (HRC) and the Metropolitan Community Church (MCC).

In addition to the endorsement by the two groups, the Millennium March has also been endorsed by the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force, the National Black Lesbian & Gay Leadership Forum, the National Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, the National Center for Lesbian Rights, the Gay & Lesbian Victory Fund, Parents, Families & Friends of Lesbians & Gays (PFLAG), and the National Latino/Latina Lesbian and Gay Organization.

The event will be the fourth march gay rights advocates have organized, but ironically, it will be the first that doesn't actually include the words "gay" or "lesbian" in its title—a decision organizers said was made to try to avoid controversy over naming more and more specific sub-groups in the march's title.

#### Cincinnati's Issue 3 to Supreme Court

CINCINNATI — Civil rights advocates say they will appeal a lower federal court decision that effectively upholds a voter-approved Cincinnati ordinance barring the city from permitting anti-bias protections to include sexual orientation.

The full U.S. Court of Appeals upheld an earlier ruling by a three-judge panel of the court that Issue 3, the city charter amendment being contested, was constitutional.

The 15 judges of federal appeals court reviewed the earlier ruling and a majority agreed with that decision upholding Issue 3, although the court did not indicate how the judges voted in the case.

Technically, Issue 3 already went to the Supreme Court once — in 1996. But the high court had just ruled on Colorado's anti-gay Amendment 2, which Issue 3 was modeled on, and rather than review the Cincinnati case, it sent it back to the 6th Circuit appeals court for reconsideration in light of the Supreme Court's decision that Amendment 2 violated the U.S. Constitution.





That will be an all night affair, and I still have to decide which of my couture outfits I'm going to wear (just kidding). This old thing in couture? More like *cow*ture.

The Pageant is still considered one of the gay social events of the year. But time was, bars would sponsor numerous tables and most everyone at the table would have matching tuxes. In the past each table would compete with the next for the biggest, most lavish or tallest centerpiece. It got to the point where you couldn't see your table mates around the damn flowers and balloons. I remember one Pageant back in the late 80's when the emcee had to announce "Please remove the centerpieces from your tables, we're getting complaints people can't see!"

Since then, its become much more mellow, and I'd be surprised if I saw a table of 10 in matching outfits and *foufouish* floral displays. Then again, I wasn't there last year... I was having chemo, so I don't know what to expect in these heady economic times of the late 90's.

Figures, first segment and our cat, The Mama, has to start screaming at me and nudging my leg. She just can't be happy, even after having some fresh shrimp when I made dinner tonight. Her and Kim, they run my life!

Got this Mac thing down pretty good now, and I've even ventured onto PlanetOut, and visited some of AOL's Wisconsin M4M chat rooms. I really did do some research, too... subscribing for daily e-mails from AEGIS, the AIDS Education Global Information System web site to keep abreast of current AIDS news.

There's such an overwhelming amount of stuff out there on the web, it's mind boggling. It's the worlds biggest library and meeting hall combined. I can't believe it took me this long to get connected and now I have to rethink the way I gather info. I'm really a news nut, always have been, but it was print media and CNN before, and now there's this whole new resource.

Younger lesbigay people really have it made with the internet. When I was a kid, (I can't believe I said that) and first started having my gay genes kick in, the only thing available was the school library, and I was too scared to hover in that section too long in case someone figured out My Story. (Hell, I wasn't even sure what Page I was on!) The gay community is right there at their fingertips on a keyboard. Hit search "Gay" and you're swamped with sites.

#### \* \* \*

Ain't that a kick in the pants that Maine voters rejected the state gay rights law? It was close, 51% to 49%, but polls the week prior showed 2 to 1 in support. Lesson: Don't trust polls. Voter turn-out was close to 30% and the referendum was the *only* item on the agenda in this mid-Winter vote. In that situation, most people who even bother to vote are either rabidly pro or con. Obviously the cons were out in force.

"No Special Rights" was the divisive rallying cry for the Right, and the Catholic Archdiocese in the area came down against us, too. With the success the Right had in the liberal northeast, you can bet your blue-jeaned butt they're going to go after the rest of us that have protections on our state books.

Cupid struck last weekend, and Totem International's first gay doll, Billy, now has a lover, Carlos. Yes, now Billy's got a boyfriend, and the world has its very first gay doll couple.

Heaven help us.

Totem has sold more than 100,000 Billy dolls at \$49 each since his inception. Buyers are about 50% gay/straight collectors. You can even buy designer outfits for the boys at \$22 each. Over 100 of the worlds top clothing designers including Jean Paul Gautier and Tommy Hilfiger are designing outfits for the original blond Billy which will be auctioned off in May at Sotheby's in NYC as a benefit for LifeBeat (music industry against AIDS).

Speaking of coupling, writer Andrew Sullivan penned a provocative three plus page article in the Jan. 20 issue of *The* 

Advocate titled "The marriage moment'. This man has an incredible mind and a profound insight into our community psyche in the late 90's. He looks past the worst of the AIDS pandemic and the gay rights struggles of the 80's and 90's and tries to focus on what's next for us as a people.

His answer is gay marriage. When gay marriage was thrust onto the national "agenda" by the Hawaii case, I was, admittedly, torn. Why this now? I asked myself, as did many other activists. There are other things we need first: anti-discrimination protection; domestic partnership; repeal of Sodomy laws; Hate Crimes legislation, etc. But, those changes are being made (with fits and starts), and as Sullivan says, "We know that the horror of the past two decades... has ceded to a new order of legitimate expectation."


Treatments for AIDS have given many of us a new chance at life who just months ago feared no future at all. He talks about starting over: "The old comforting inanities of sex and career and money and friends can once more be unrestrainedly part of our world. And whether we acknowledge it or not, we are relieved, relieved beyond anything we can

Sullivan detects among many gay men an "intense need and longing for intimacy and an equally intense reluctance to achieve it — a reluctance bred by both our wounded self-esteem as homosexuals and our general inculturation as men."

Sure hit me between the eyes. Oh, someone else feels that way too. Cast aside the survivors guilt and get on with life. We don't want to wallow in the past, we need to find "the stability and love we really need and deserve."

Sullivan calls this the time of "victim panic" and urges us to move onto the future that might contain "opportunities gay men and women have never previously envisaged, let alone grasped... maturity may be calling us to more difficult and challenging terrain... marriage."

Marriage, explains Sullivan, "the only political and cultural and spiritual institution that can truly liberate us from the shackles of marginalization and pathology. It is the critical institution in our culture related to the emotional and sexual attraction of one human being to anoth-



er — guaranteed under the Constitution to anyone who loves another person... and yet it is denied to gay men and lesbians."

He reminds us the battle of gay marriage is not coming, it is already here, and likely to determine our future. He concludes: "At the very moment that we are emerging from the experience of mass death, we are bring presented with the possibility of a more fully integrated life. We would, I think, be betraying all those who are no longer here — all those who died in the hope that we might see this day — if we didn't recognize the potential of this moment. And if we failed to seize it."

His arguments, which I've summarized here, are compelling. We'd still have our gay culture, which itself, sets us apart from the mainstream, but we could have the same social standing as everyone else. Not total assimilation, who wants that? But how about the best of both worlds?

Personally, I don't know if marriage is for me at the moment. Hell, I just had the first sex I had in seven years last week and I'm certainly not looking to get hitched yet! (Talk about the 7 year itch! And yes, the testosterone shots have really helped) It's nice to know having sex is like riding a bike, and I haven't lost my touch (at least that's what He said!).

It's afternoon on Monday, now and I'm finally recovered enough from The Pageant and a night on the town. About 200 people attended the dinner portion of the evening at the Hilton and dined on prime rib and roasted potatoes and assorted chunk veggies. The chocolate decadence dessert with raspberry sauce was the highlight of an otherwise acceptable banquet meal. At least it wasn't rubber chicken!

As the 8 p.m. Pageant contest time rolled around, approximately another 150 people had settled in for an ontime grand opening production number that was very well done by the reigning Mr. and Miss Gay Wisconsin, Gregory Diring and Kenya Summer Moore and the contestants (8 "girls" and 4 men).





### Madison Art Center to Premiere Von Rydingsvard Sculpture

Madison — Ursula von Rydingsvard: Sculpture presents 14 of her large-scale sculptures and premieres at the Madison Art Center (MAC), 211 State Street on March 1. Organized by MAC director Stephen Fleischman with the full support of the artist, this is the first traveling exhibition to comprehensively survey the indoor work of this important American sculptor.

Ursula von Rydingsvard's wood sculptures resonate with a sense of history and human presence. Their varied shapes and surfaces, while essentially abstract, suggest the human figure, landscape elements, household utensils and farm implements. He work is based, in part, on the memories of the German work and refugee camps where she spent the first eight years of her life before emigrating to the United States.

Sculpting mainly with cedar since the mid-1970s, von Rydingsvard's hybrid technique involves both constructing and carving her works. She stacks and laminates machine-milled four-by-four boards, which she saws, planes and carves before both and after joining them. She frequently applies graphite or paint to the highly textured and complex surfaces. The flexibility of her technique allows her to construct both intimate and extremely large-scale work.

On Saturday, February 28, sculptor Ursula von Rydingsvard will give a lecture about the evolution of her career, with a particular focus on the indoor work in the new Art Center exhibition, at 7 p.m. in the third floor galleries. An opening reception and exhibition premiere follow the lecture from 8 to 10 p.m. The festivities include refreshments, a cash bar, and music by solo cellist Lee Richey.




### Black History Month Exhibit Features Local Photographer




#### **BOOK REVIEW**

The Gay Men's Wellness Guide by Robert E. Penn

his 594-page book is subtitled: "The National Lesbian and Gay Health Association's Complete Book of Physical, Emotional, and Mental Health and Well-Being for Every Gay Male." The Preface states: "... The author

and many of his male advisors are openly gay men involved to a greater or lesser degree in organized lesbian and gay activities." It contains a forward by Christopher J. Portelli, Esq., Executive Director of the National Lesbian and Gay Health Association (NLGHA).

We are also told that "sections of this book attempt to address concerns of male sexual minorities that overlap with those of gay men. This is done in order to recognize the diversity of same-sex attraction not only among different racial groups but also as it affects different expressions of gender. ..." In other words, it's a book for all gay men, all bisexual men, all transsexual men and all transgendered people. It's approach is all encompassing. Isn't that what we're all about?

This long overdue book is basically a Guide to Gay Men's Health 101. Each chapter contains everything you need to know to stay physically healthy and mentally well and is followed by suggestions for further reading as well as medical referrals across the country. In some cases there are hotlines and websites listed. There are sidebars and illustrations throughout that relate specifically to the subject matter being discussed in each specific chapter.

The first chapter gives advice on finding "Gay-Affirmative Primary Health Care Professionals". Included is a "Clinical Center Patient's Bill of Rights" provided by the NIH Clinical Center Nursing Department of Bethesda, Maryland. This is followed by a chapter on "Clinics And Hospitals" and a chapter

on "Maintaining A Workable Collaborative Relationship With Your Primary Health-Care Providers" and a chapter on "Mental Health". After this preliminary information everything you need to know is listed clearly and concisely.

The text is written in easy-to-understand, user-friendly language, and was written in consultation with twenty-four leading health-care providers who are members of the NLGHA, who specialize in gay health concerns. This authoritative reference book "features helpful sections on physical and physiological wellbeing, body image, aging, substance abuse, needle exchange, HIV and AIDS, tuberculosis, hepatitis B, genital warts and lesions, safer sex, masturbation, steroids, domestic abuse and coming-out issues. ..."


Also included are "physical ailments; constructive coping tips for dealing with social biases; techniques for overcoming isolation, especially that experienced by young gay men, and by gay men who reside outside major metropolitan areas; ideas for building supportive social, emotional and community networks; useful suggestions for improving sexual pleasure and health; and comprehensive referrals for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender services."

It contains an easy to understand glossary of medical terms, appendices with contacts for Medical And Mental Health Organizations with gay and lesbian policy statements, Sodomy Laws listed state-by-state, and other pertinent information. There is a full index.

"The 14 million gay men in this country are disproportionately affected by certain ailments, and in addition, diseases often take on different manifestations in gay men than in straight men. In some urban gay communities, hepatitis B is in epidemic proportions; one in two men are HIV-positive; 54 percent are taking care of a seriously ill friend; and a third of gay men have sought the advice of a therapist."


