GOP Readies Anti-Gay Stance

Washington — The Republican Party national platform is expected to include a condemnation of same-sex marriage and to support a constitutional amendment barring gay and lesbian couples from being wed.

"There is a lot of energy out there, a lot of concern about gay marriage," said RNC chair Ed Gillespie. "So it wouldn't surprise me if it were addressed in some form or fashion in the platform."

Gillespie, in an interview with the Washington Times accused gays of "intolerance and bigotry by attempting to force the rest of the population to accept alien moral standards." As a result, he said "tolerance is no longer defined as my accepting people for who they are."

"I think when people say, 'Well, no, that's not enough that you accept me for who I am, you have to agree with — and condone my choice,' that to me is religious bigotry, and I believe that's intolerant. I think they are the ones who are crossing a line here."

Gillespie went on to tell the paper that on the other hand, "when people are free to pursue the choices that they want in the privacy of their home, that's tolerance."

Gillespie said the plank likely would define marriage as "a monogamous, heterosexual union, and would forbid states from legalizing homosexual marriages." But, he suggested it also might be broadened to include civil unions such as those in Vermont and California. "Frankly I don't see the difference between the two," he said.

His comments are expected to play well with the extreme right within the GOP. A Republican bill is in the House of Representatives calling for a constitutional amendment and Senate majority leader Bill Frist (R-Tenn)., has said he would support it.

But, gay Democrats were quick to condemn Gillespie's remarks, especially his reference to gay Americans as intolerant bigots.

"Gillespie is the one displaying his bigotry, not gay Americans," said Dave Noble, NSD Executive Director. "Suggesting that someone is a bigot because they want the legal right to visit a dying partner in the hospital is wrong, and frankly, disgusting."

In July. President Bush said marriage should be between a man and a woman, and "we ought to codify that one way or the other." (story). Federal law (DOMA) already defines marriage in heterosexual terms.

In early September, a national poll was released showing that while most Americans oppose same-sex marriage, but an even greater number reject a constitutional amendment.

Married Gay Couple Barred From U.S.

Toronto — A married gay couple on their way from Canada to a human rights conference in Georgia were not allowed to enter the United States today because the two men insisted on filling out a single Customs clearance form declaring themselves a family.

"We were not going to divorce ourselves in order to enter a country," Kevin Bourassa, a 45-year-old gay activist, said. "We could have gone in as single individuals, signed two forms, but to do that would be an affront to our dignity and human rights."

Bourassa said he and his partner. Joe Varnell, first approached the United States immigration desk at Pearson Airport in Toronto and an officer stamped their forms. But when they went to a Customs agent for final clearance, the agent would not accept a joint declaration.

Gays Begin Planning for GOP Convention

New York — The so-called "backlash" to the so-called "Summer of Gay" may not reach its zenith until next August at the Republican National Convention in New York City.

"The Summer of Gay," of course, refers to the stunning sequence of gay issues that burst to the forefront of media and public attention in June, July and August of this year — Ontario's legalization of same-sex marriage: British Columbia's legalization of same-sex marriage; the U.S. Supreme Court's legalization of gay sex; George W. Bush's denunciation of same-sex marriage; the proposed constitutional amendment to ban samesex marriage; the Vatican's denunciation

of all gay relationships; the Democratic presidential candidates' near-unanimous support for gay civil unions and gays in the military; Wal-Mart's embrace of gay employees; the Episcopal Church's election of an openly gay bishop; Michael Savage's firing; the smash success of TV's "Queer Eye for the Straight Guy;" the controversy of TV's "Boy Meets Boy," and Madonna, Britney and Christina's French-kissing at the "MTV Video Music Awards."

Did we forget anything? Liza's breakup? Maybe. Then, of course, there is this looming earthquake: Massachusetts' Supreme Judicial Court may legalize same-sex marriage any day now. If that happens, Religious Right leaders may suffer the nation's first mass heart attack.

Given that conservative reaction to this year's huge gay successes may come to a head at the GOP conclave, how are activists preparing for the possible homophobic hurricane?

"There are direct actions being formulated locally by various lefty groups, peace groups, environmental groups ... and certainly there are gay people involved in that stuff," said longtime New York City lesbian activist Ann Northrop.

"If the constitutional amendment against same-sex marriage is hot, that will increase the participation of gay groups," she said. "I would like to see gay groups heavily involved whether the constitutional amendment is hot or not because I think Bush and the Republicans are such evil monsters that we have to go after them no matter what."

Northrop, however, is worried that demonstrators will be tightly controlled.

"My fear is that ... we will see what we've seen here for a long time now -- very, very, very heavy police protection of the convention and a pushing of dissent to very far-away margins," she said. "They will shut down dissent no matter what it takes, they will violate everyone's civil rights to do so."

FOREMAN: BEST APPROACH UNCLEAR

The head of the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force, Matt Foreman, says it's not clear what approach to the convention would best serve the gay cause. Historically, NGLTF has helped execute direct-action protests at the

Democratic and Republican conventions. "We've discussed this for hours on end," Foreman said. "Part of the goal is to make the investment of the resources worthwhile in terms of a message that you get out via the media. ... The point is to think creatively in a way that will get some attention."

Foreman, who is based in New York, shares Northrop's concerns about a police clampdown.

"The police here during the '90s have become progressively more repressive around marches and demonstrations." he said. "They have become experts at preventing people from exercising their First Amendment rights. The anti-war demo in front of the U.N. earlier this year is a classic example of that. They kept people from getting to the demo, they made arbitrary arrests, they used horses inappropriately, they made it so you couldn't hear or see the speakers. It will require incredible planning because the police here have just become extremely difficult."

But marching and chanting just for its own sake may not accomplish much these days, Foreman said.

"Demonstrations are effective only when you can make a point to a broader audience," he said. "If all we're doing is providing an outlet for people to vent, to show their rage and anger, that is not what is going to produce a good election result.

is going to produce a good election result. "The real work," Foreman said, "is going to be getting people out to vote, and voting those bastards [the Bush administration] out of office.

"The vast majority of Americans do not support what this administration is doing," he said. "The reason the president is in power and the reason we keep losing so many battles is because our side – the people who believe in equal rights, choice, affirmative action – we don't get together. We don't focus and we don't get people out to vote. We need to set aside petty issues, focus on issues we agree on and get people to vote. Fundamentally, the people of America support the core values that all of us on the center-to-the-left believe in."

HRC: RIGHT WING IS FIRED-UP

The Human Rights Campaign also has been involved in organizing convention protests, in addition

to press conferences, receptions and other events.

"We've been talking internally about both conventions and how they will play out in terms of media and focus and what the issues will be," said Communications Director David Smith. "In 1996, we rented an old theatre near the convention site, and various gay organizations came and scheduled events and engaged in activities that were consistent with their message.

"In 2003, it's largely going to depend on how this issue unfolds," Smith said. "The Right Wing is organizing like never before. I've never seen them behave like they're behaving right now. Many of them are openly saying the issue of gay marriage is better than abortion. It's galvanizing their grass roots. ... If a vicious, meanspirited campaign emerges, there will be increased gay organizing.

"Conventions are all about media coverage," he said. "They are for communicating with the country through the media."

QUEERS WON'T BE SILENCED

A CT UP-type groups were active during the 2000 GOP Convention in Philadelphia. Julie Davids, executive director of New York's Community HIV/AIDS Mobilization for Power, says 'queers' and AIDS activists plan more of the same next year.

"It's important that people recognize that protest is important and possible in New York City, and it's going to be extremely prevalent at the Republican National Convention," Davids said.

"We believe it's important to link HIV organizing with queer organizing and with other social and economic-justice areas — housing, prison issues, criminaljustice issues, welfare, health care, Medicaid, Medicare, immigration, attacks on civil liberties."

A preliminary RNC planning meeting of groups working on these issues took place in New York Sept. 18, Davids said.

"The conventions are a good opportunity to show the interrelation of these issues and allow people to bring their whole selves to the efforts," she said. "This is also an opportunity to bring our communities together to forge stronger working relationships that will last beyond the convention. We want to rebuild a strong, grass-roots base in this country that includes people who support queer rights and understand the importance of continuing to struggle against HIV/AIDS."

City of Madison Accused of Whitewashing **Gay Bias** Complaints

Madison — A state investigation has found that there is probable cause that the city of Madison discriminated against two municipal workers because of their sexual orientation and then tried to cover up the bias.

In an initial probable-cause investigation equal rights regulators determined. the state Equal Rights Division found that the city may have violated the Wisconsin Fair Employment Law on four counts in its treatment and termination of the former employees.

Jeffrey Earle and Douglas Sonntag were fired by city parking utility manager Robin Williams in 2002.

Unless the parties settle, the Equal Rights Division will schedule a hearing before an administrative law judge who will decide whether the city in fact violated the law.

Earle and Sonntag are among several parking utility employees who have filed complaints in recent years with the city Affirmative Action Office charging that Williams discriminated against them because they are gay. That office, however, said the complaints were unfounded.

Following a series of articles about the complaints in the Madison Times, Mayor Dave Cieslewicz ordered an investigation.

In-July, Cieslewicz announced that a "thorough" investigation showed there had been no bias against any workers in the Parking Authority.

Earle and Sonntag then took their complaints to the state.

"I am very pleased the state took this seriously because the city of Madison opted not to," Sonntag told the Madison Times.

Sonntag said that while much of the blame lies with Williams, the ERD finding confirms that many in the city dropped the ball on the complaints, including employees in the Human Resources Department, the City Attorney's Office and the Affirmative Action Office.

Arnold Posed for Erotic Mapplethorpe Nudes: Report

Los Angeles - The reporter who uncovered the Monica Lewinski scandal claims a new scoop: full nude erotic photographs of Arnold Schwarzenegger taken by renowned gay photographer Robert Mapplethorpe.

Matt Drudge, on his Drudge Report, says that "voters have never seen an elected official in such detail.'

Although copies of a benign nude photo of the bodybuilder-actor-politician that appeared in the 1970s publican After Dark have been circulating for months on the internet, the Mapplethorpe photos are reportedly "shocking.

In a world exclusive, Drudge reports that pictures so steamy they have been kept under lock at the New York Estate of Mapplethorpe who died in 1989.

Operatives with the Schwarzenegger campaign are reportedly rushing to ensure that pictures are not published.

Mapplethorpe is considered the foremost American photographer of the 20th century. Openly gay, his outrageous homoerotic pictures caused a fury in the 1980s over an exhibit in Cincinnati. The Contemporary Arts Center was charged with pandering obscenity.

The exhibition, funded by the National Endowment for the Arts, included a self portrait of Mapplethorpe with a riding crop inserted in his ass. Other photographs were of male models having sex and closeup shots of penises.

The furor over the exhibit reached the halls of Congress. Led by Republicans, federal funding the arts was slashed.

In his report Drudge does not indicate if the pictures are of Schwarzenegger alone in the photos or if other male models were with him.

There has been no official comment from either the Schwarzenegger campaign or from the Mapplethorpe Foundation which oversees the artist's estate.

The revelation came as a federal appeals court in San Francisco rejected a three-judge panel's decision to put off the gubernatorial recall election for months. The court unanimously reinstated Oct. 7 as the date for the vote.

Davis Signs California DP Bil

Sacramento - Gov. Gray Davis signed a domestic partner bill tonight granting same-sex couples in California nearly all the same rights and responsibilities as married spouses.

"A family is a family not because of gender but because of values, like commitment, trust and love," Davis said before he put pen to paper amid cheers and applause from the standing-room only crowd at San Francisco's Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender Community Center.

But not everyone in the room was supportive — a representative of state Sen. William Knight passed through the crowd. warning that Knight would challenge the law in a lawsuit to be filed in Sacramento.

Knight wrote Proposition 22, the 2000 ballot initiative approved by 61 percent of voters, which confirmed that "only marriage between a man and a woman is valid and recognized in the state of California." The new law expands the rights of gay

couples in areas such as health coverage. parental status, property ownership and funeral arrangements.

The law takes effect Jan. 1, 2005.

Etheridge & Michaels Say "I Do'

Los Angeles - Singer-songwriter Melissa Etheridge and actress Tammy Lynn Michaels wasted no time in taking advantage of California's new domestic partner law. Within hours of of the legislation's signing by Gov. Gray Davis, Etheridge and Michaels exchanged vows at a Los Angeles ceremony

For the past two years the couple has been living at the singer's Los Angeles home.

In a joint statement the couple called their ceremony as a "wedding". Although same-sex marriage is illegal in California, the two are, under the new law, registered domestic partners.

"We are so grateful for the blessings from our friends and family as we commence our vows, and begin the rest of our lives together," their statement said.

The ceremony attracted Hollywood's Alist. Guests included Steven Spielberg and Kate Capshaw, Tom Hanks and Rita Wilson, Al and Tipper Gore, Jennifer Aniston (Brad was invited but is on location with Troy in Malta and couldn't make it). Helen Hunt, Mike Myers, Sally Field. Ellen DeGeneres, Shervl Crow, Christina Applegate and Kathy Najimy.

Green Bay Mayor Meets with Gay Group

Green Bay - First-term mayor Jim Schmidt shared his vision for the city and the region as part of a 90 minute "meet and greet" session with about 20 members and guests of Positive Voice (PV) at the Brown County Library here September 15.


Schmidt, who had been invited by the northeast Wisconsin LGBT educational and social organization, outlined the three major projects begun since he was elected last Spring: the development and expansion of the city's neighborhoods program, the acquisition and development of a high tech industrial park and the revitalization of the downtown area. In turn, gay and lesbian attendees briefed the mayor on their views on community diversity issues.

In addition to the ongoing struggle for same-sex couples to obtain legal civil recognition of their unions through domestic partnership registries and state legislation, several PV members focused on the continued refusal of the city's Coalition To Promote Respect to include LGBT representation on its member council. The city provides a subsidy for the community-based nonprofit organization's multicultural center. The mayor promised the group that he would look into the matter.

Others brought up the impact of the near doubling of the city's other minority communities and the similar struggles members of those groups were having in finding adequate, affordable housing and living wage jobs. Attendees noted recent public remarks by Brown County Board of Supervisors Chair Kenneth Simmons that those in county government who want diversity training should "take a bus to Milwaukee." In a public apology earlier that day Simmons had asked forgiveness claiming his original statement "was misconstrued, and which apparently was seen as politically incorrect."

In their concluding remarks both the mayor and PV leaders pronounced the meeting as a successful "first start" in understanding the multiple diversity challenges facing both Green Bay and the county.

Positive Voice's next meeting will be on October 20 at 6:30 p.m. in the lower level conference room of the Appleton Public Library. The meeting's presentation will focus on "The Gay Internet."

Juana Gloria Vega Scholarship Bestowed on MATC Student



REALITY CHECK The Lies The FRI Tells About Same-Sex Marriage

iven their "virtuous" sounding name, it may seem almost impossible to believe. However, the Family Research Institute of Wisconsin (FRI) is attempting to mislead the citizens and lawmakers of Wisconsin through scare tactics, glittering generalities, circular logic, half-truths and outright lies about the need for its so-called "Defense of Marriage Act."

Let's look at the FRI "Fact Sheet" taken from their own website most recently updated in late August 2003. Then let's look at the real truth of the matter. The "bold sections" below are taken in order verbatim from the FRI site. My rebuttal follows.

FRI "Facts" On Marriage and Wisconsin Marriage Law

Wisconsin's current law refers to marriage being between a "husband and wife." Opponents of AB 475/SB 233 claim that these words are sufficient to protect one-man/onewoman marriage. However, a liberal, activist court could determine because the law doesn't specify that "husband" means "man" and "wife" means "woman," and because there is no clear statement of the intent of Wisconsin's public policy about marriage, that the current law is broad enough to include something other than one-man/one-woman marriage.

SCARE TACTIC & OUTRIGHT LIE: The word "wife" comes from the 11th Century Middle English. For almost 1,000 years it has meant the female partner in marriage. No court in U. S. history has interpreted the word "wife" to mean anything other than that nearly millennium old, gender specific definition. Moreover, every court decision to date that supports same-gender marriage refers not to redefining marriage but to extending equality of opportunity to having unions legally recognized to all citizens regardless of sexual orientation. AB475/SB233 replace one heterosexual definition with another and thus in reality change nothing. However, the bills do perpetuate ongoing prejudice against LGBT people — the real intent of the FRI.

Throughout history, all civilized cultures have recognized marriage between one man and one woman as the norm.

OUTRIGHT LIE: Even the Bible refers to the plural marriages of some of its greatest heroes. Plural marriages, the same gender marriages and communal marriages have been recorded throughout world history in multiple cultures. The "norm" has been a diversity of unions, the majority of which have been heterosexual.

Throughout history, all civilized cultures have understood that the best environment for children is to have both a physically present mother and a father, that is, a man and a woman married to one another.

GLITTERING GENERALITY: A classic propaganda technique that makes a seemingly important statement using vague language that states nothing factual. If "understanding" means written documentation, there are numerous historical and contemporary documents that show a diversity of environments can produce well-adjusted children. Well-constructed scientific surveys have repeatedly demonstrated that quality parenting involves consistency, boundary setting and other characteristics. These skills can be performed by any number of individuals, couples or

even groups of adults. The findings by the American Psychological Association and the American Psychiatric Association simply trump Bible-based bigotry.

Throughout history, all civilized cultures have recognized that children growing up to be stable, contributing citizens is the guarantee of that culture's future. These societies have therefore historically protected marriage.

GLITTERING GENERALITY COV-ERING AN OUTRIGHT LIE: Cultures that permit quality parenting are a product of the stable social systems that result from the acceptance of naturally occurring diversity of race, ethnicity, religious belief, etc. Religious intolerance is one of the most pervasive and destabilizing forces in recorded human history. Such intolerance has lead to such things as religious wars. pogroms, Inquisitions, heretic burning and - most interestingly - the settling of the majority of the colonies that formed the United States, whose founders wisely created a "godless" Constitution. The FRI of WI is just a contemporary example of such religious intolerance.

Marriage is not just about "love and commitment." It is the union of the two sexes and the union of two families, and the means by which families are built and maintained and family names and lineages are perpetuated.

OUTRIGHT LIE: Apparently the FRI hasn't read the traditional marriage vow that expressly asks each party to "love and honor" and to commit to do same "until death us do part." If family names and lineages were important to those other than royalty, there would not be a hobby known as genealogy. Tracking lineage has uses a variety of records and tracks not only traditional marriages but "unsanctified" unions.

Marriage is not discriminatory. All citizens have the same right: if they meet the other statutory requirements, they can marry if their intended spouse is someone of the opposite sex.

HALF TRUTH: Marriage is not discriminatory, as long as anyone can participate in it with the adult they choose to

commit to. Categorically limiting the civil marriage definition to reflect a particular version of a religious dogma is in fact the very dictionary definition of discriminatory. It also violates both the Constitutional principles of separation of church and state and of equal treatment under the law.

Research has shown and continues to show that monogamous, life-long marriages between one man and one woman result in, among other things, fewer abortions, safer homes for both women and children, safer communities, less poverty and welfare, less premarital sex and out-ofwedlock children, fewer divorces, a healthier society, more revenue and a broader tax base, and more citizen involvement in civic activities.

GLITTERING GENERALITY AND HALF-TRUTH: With the exception of abortion and tax revenue, the same can be said for same-gender unions that are lifelong and monogamous. And if same gender couple's relationships are legally recognized, the tax revenue issue will be true as well. The statement also begs the question: with over 10,000 heterosexual divorces disrupting families in Wisconsin in the last decade, why isn't the FRI working to strengthen the above mentioned "lifelong" marriages?

Because monogamous, life-long marriage between one man and one woman brings order and numerous benefits to society, there is a legitimate "state interest." Governments, therefore, should protect and strengthen this institution in public policy and programs.

CIRCULAR LOGIC COVERING AN OUTRIGHT LIE: In order to ask for the force of law, you have to prove your case. As the above rebuttals show, the FRI has woefully failed to do so. Inclusion of samegender civil marriages will also bring greater stability to the LGBT community that makes up anywhere from 4-10% of the entire population. Is such enhanced stability not a legitimate "state interest"? (Just a side note to the FRI folks: you put your summary argument last, not next to last.)

Marriage encourages the sexes to complement each other's strengths and weaknesses. It is the way that men and women, with all their differences, have been united to bring out the best in the individuals and therefore in the children and in society at large.


HALF TRUTH AND GLITTERING GENERALITY: All working relationships between two people - marital or otherwise work best when the parties bring complimentary skills and deficits to the union. All people are unique and our society in its advancement of full gender equality has demonstrated that beyond basic biology. most of the so-called "differences" between men and women result from sexual stereotyping and cultural conditioning.

In theory at least, individuals and organizations make decisions after coldly reviewing all the facts and weighing all the risk-versus-benefit arguments. When it comes to its "facts" to prove the need for its so-called "Defense of Marriage" law, the FRI simply hasn't made its case.

However, the reality of contemporary American and Wisconsin partisan politics is that all decision-making occurs with foresight that extends merely through the next election cycle. Balanced perspective comes only in retrospect. History will not be kind to either the legislative supporters of Wisconsin's DOMA or its prejudiced primogenitor, the Family Research Institute of Wisconsin.

"Die Mommie Die!" is Camp Hilarity

By Carl M. Szatmary ollywood cinema of the 1950s has rarely been funnier than in Charles Busch's hilarious "Die Mommie Die!" the opening night sensation of this year's Milwaukee LGBT Film/Video Festival playing Thursday, Oct. 2 at 7:30 p.m. at the oriental Theatre.

In last year's "Far From Heaven," director Todd Haynes gave today's movie audiences an opportunity to re-evaluate the lushly filmed 1950s melodramas in which such contemporary social issues as homosexuality often lurked just beneath the surface.

Charles Busch and "Die Mommie Die!" director Mark Rucker have less loftier aspirations. Here instead is a glorious send-up of the "women's films" of the 1940s and 50s, the ones Bette Davis, Joan Crawford and Barbara Stanwyck would increasingly star in when their careers were on the wane.

Charles Busch's Angela Arden is cut from the same shimmering fabric. Once a big star. Angela is trapped in a loveless marriage to her producer husband Sol Sussman (Philip Baker Hall), whose own career is on the rubbish heap. Throw in a grown daughter Edith (Natasha Lyonne)

Murder on the big screen has rarely been so excruciatingly hilarious.

Angela might be the picture-perfect grieving widow but daughter Edith isn't buying it for a second. A daddy's girl shown in definitely incestuous tones, Edith convinces her cute but dim-witted brother Lance to help, concocting a plot to find out if Angela is a murderess.

Equally determined to get at the truth of Sol's suspicious death is Tony who happily seduces both siblings - although seducing the already naked Lance in the garden shed is anything but a challenge.

Director Mark Rucker seems determined to give the film the right cinematic look, utilizing plenty of close-ups, lots of quick cuts and gobs of soft-focus. Initially seeming rather artificial, one cannot help but quickly enters into the spirit of fun Charles Busch, adapting his own play for the screen has whipped up quite an addictive cinematic confectionary. Besides boasting plenty of red herrings, Busch's script offers up plenty of memorable lines: "You can't discard me like one of your false eyelashes!" and "he slipped into my life as

easily as vermouth into a glass of gin." Best of all are the fabulous performances from the talented ensemble. Baker's Sol

is suitably curmudgeon-like. Stark Sands

invests a delicious naughtiness and a sly sexiness to his hilarious Lance.

Yet Charles Busch, as both Angela and twin-sister Barbara Arden manages to claw her way into the spotlight at ever turn of the camera. Perfectly coiffed and dramatically lighted just as those great stars were in countless pot-boilers. Busch proves she is an absolute star.

"Tipping the Velvet" – A Lesbian Romp

ipping the Velvet," a mustsee for all women-loving women, will be screened on Sunday, Oct. 5, at 1 p.m. at UWM's Union

Theatre.

'Tipping the Velvet" is a touching, sexy. funny, wild, passionate, and deliciously melodramatic rendering of Sarah Waters' popular novel - a modern lesbian version of the ribald "Moll Flanders." And who'd a thunk the staid old BBC would produce such a sexually explicit - but morally uplifting, of course - lesbian romp? The original three-part series aired on BBC America this spring. Since many of us didn't see it, what luck to have the entire unedited show presented at this festival!

"Tipping the Velvet" is the coming out and coming of age saga of Nan Astley (Rachael Stirling), a working class girl from the southwest coast of England who becomes a star in the music halls of late Victorian London. Early scenes in which Nan senses that she's 'different' will be immediately recognizable to any queer. In Kent, she becomes smitten with a beautiful male impersonator, Kitty Butler (Keeley Hawes), who invites Nan to London as her dresser. Dare she tell Kitty her true feelings? The expressions of self-doubt, of sexual yearning, of falling in love, and blissful connection are played out in wonderfully over-the-top fashion. The cross-dressing lovers soon become headliners on the London stage.

But, as the poet said, the course of true love never did run smooth. Nan's love is cruelly betraved, she's crushed, bereft, and ultimately chooses to sell sexual favors (as a boy to male patrons!) on the streets. A savior seemingly arrives in the guise of a wealthy dyke dominatrix (the perfectly cast, imperious Anna Chancellor). The domineering Diana takes our Nan in, using her for pleasure and public exhibit while also loving her in her own perverse way. This second episode of the series is delightfully tawdry but alas, once again, things do not end well for our beleaguered heroine.

The final episode reveals whether poor Nan will recover from her latest trauma. and whether she'll reunite with her great love Kitty, or find a more stable life with someone new (Jodhi May, always reliably typecast as the 'good' girl). The stage once again beckons, and Nan makes her final. critical decision during a drawn-out, heartstring-pulling number that is pure corn but it works!

The performances in "Tipping the Velvet" are outstanding and the main actresses are all wonderful to behold (tho given what she survives. Nan ought to have aged a bit by the end instead of looking as fresh and virginal as she was at the beginning). The glimpses of underground lesbian life in turn of the century London are fun to see. The adaptation by veteran screenwriter Andrew Davies is sharp and moves swiftly. An added kick for old-timers like me is watching actress Rachael Stirling play Nan. In many scenes and from so many angles I saw the image of her real life mother Diana Rigg, who immortalized Emma Peel, my own girlhood lesbian icon from "The Avengers" in the 1960s.

In addition to its endearing mix of pulp and schmaltz, "Tipping the Velvet" is suffused with layers of lesbian culture that will be savored by viewers in many different ways. Sexy, funny and fine - enjoy!

Grade: A

Additional LGBT Film Capsules, Oct. 3-8

Friday, October 3, 7 p.m. "Blue Gate Crossing (Lanse de Men)"

This Taiwanese feature is an alternately wistful and mournful tone poem about the touching relationship between a young lesbian and a boy in high school. Kerou has a crush on another girl. Yuezhen, who in turn only has eyes for the handsome swimmer Zhang. Kerou serves as a go-between to draw Yuezhen and Zhang together, but Zhang develops a real affection for Kerou instead! The angst of teen desire and heartache are nearly palpable in this very slow-moving but visually stunning and sensitive film.

Friday, October 3, 9 p.m. "My Life on Ice (Ma Vraie Vie a Rouen)" (with "Nebel (Mist)"

From the directors of "The Adventures of Felix," comes this charming coming-ofage film, "My Life on Ice."

French teenager Ettienne (Jimmy

Tavares) receives a digital video camera for his 16th birthday and life will never be the same. Camera in hand, Ettienne spends most of his time annoying his mother (Ariane Ascaride) by filming her constantly, annoying his very cute best friend Ludo (Lucas Bonnifait) by filming him with his various girlfriends and annoying us in the audience by including long sequences of him practicing his figure-skating routines.

The inclusion of "My Life on Ice" at an LGBT Film Festival makes certain that audiences are going to assume Ettienne is gay from the start. Yet given that how much time Ettienne spends with his camera lovingly focused on best mate Ludo, his handsome history teacher Laurent and seemingly every fireman that Ettienne encounters, it is likely that even the most obtuse mainstream audience member will likely to clue into Ettienne's sexuality long before the poor lad has done so himself.

The film's awkward and improbable ending, while certain to be a success, proves to be the film's only false note.

Filmmakers Duscatel and Martineau capture the tedium of an adolescent's "video diary" far too well but Tavares makes for such an appealing protagonist, few in the audience are likely to complain. Grade: B (Carl Szatmary)

Saturday, October 4, Noon "Call Me Kade" and "Sir: Just a Normal Guy" (shown with "Thorn Grass")

This set of videos deal with transgender issues, specifically transitioning from female to male. "Call Me Kade" follows the early stages of transitioning by 14-year-old Kate who has known virtually from infanthood that she is really a boy. Supportive parents and friends are a definite plus in this story. Given Kade's youth, it would be great to see a follow-up film five or ten years down the line to see how his new life has turned out.

"Sir" is a chronicle of the FTM change of 29-year-old Jay Snider. This second video is longer and has somewhat more depth partly because Jay is older, more experienced, and better able to articulate his feelings. There is more detail about his physical transformation too. Especially interesting is his realization that although transgender, he finds himself identifying more as a strait man than as part of the queer community.

Both videos should stir some interesting discussions. They are playing with "Thorn Grass," a short tribute to Fred Martinez, a Two-Spirit Navajo teen who was murdered in 2001. The screenings are co-sponsored with FORGE, a local transgender activist group.

Grade: B (Jamakaya)

Saturday, October 4, 4 p.m. "Hooked" presented by ARCW's Bag Boyz

The joys and the dangers of surfing the gay internet chat rooms are surveyed in Todd Ahlberg's fascinating and yet ultimately unsatisfying documentary. "Hooked." When Ahlberg became intrigued with "online cruising," he sought participants in a survey for the documentary and received a whopping 1,200 responses.

Eventually Ahlberg chose three dozen men from different age groups and ethnic backgrounds. In their early segments, interviewees sing the praises of the wonderful ease and variety of sex and sexual partners available online. Then as the film progresses, many cite a fear of addiction and the emptiness of such anonymous encounters.

Slickly produced, Ahlberg's too often

casual approach and arbitrary editing make "Hooked" a less authentic examination than it might have otherwise been. Grade: C+ (Carl Szatmary)

Saturday, October 4, 7 p.m. "Gasoline (Benzina)"

"Benzina" is a short (85 min.) Italian feature that offers a lesbian version of the "Thelma & Louise" girl outlaws-on-the-lam scenario. The premise is fun but the delivery here is slow and predictable, right down to its incendiary conclusion.

Stella and Lenni, young lovers who run a gas station/café, are visited by Lenni's disapproving mother. Mama meets an unexpected demise, and attempting to dispose of her body provides most of the hijinx that follow. The only really amusing touch to me was the mordant voice-over commentary by the corpse.

Callie Khouri gave us a whole lot to love about Thelma and Louise, which made their adventures and desperation so hearttugging. This film's biggest booboo is that we're given almost no background or insight about the two gals to really make us give a hoot about what happens to them. The sex scenes (on floors and in restroom stalls) failed to raise the heat quotient for me, and the most compelling character seemed to be Stella's dog. (Give that pooch an Oscar!) After watching "Benzina," my partner and I agreed that a more appropriate title might have been "Bad Hair Day."

"The Trip"

"The Trip," by first-time director Miles Swain, must surely be the most eagerly awaited film being shown at this year's LGBT Film Fest. Heavily promoted by TLA Video and featured in all of the glossy gay magazines this past summer, "The Trip" is an ambitious gay love story spanning the politically turbulent 1970s and '80s.

Swain's screenplay begins in 1973. Allan (Larry Sullivan) is an eager young journalist and out and proud Republican. Larry is also deeply buried in the closet – at least until he meets long-haired, pot-smoking, free-loving Tommy (Steve Braun). Such opposites are rarely the stuff of great love stories in real life, but heck, this is a movie after all.

It is this film's delicious conceit that Alan meets Tommy while doing a bit of research for an anti-gay book. While Alan explores his budding homosexuality, he continues writing "The Straight Truth." Now, how's that's for a dilemma?

Alan can't tell Tommy, an enthusiastic gay activist, about the book and is thrilled when the publisher decides to postpone its publication. Sadly, his relief is short-lived. With the arrival of Anita Bryant's crusade comes the perfect time for "The Straight Truth" to be released. Immediately, the book becomes a bestseller. Alan is horrified. Then Alan is outed as the anonymous author.



Tommy is enraged. The boys separate.

Ten years flash by in a matter of moments. Alan, after realizing the mess he's made of his life, finally goes after Tommy, hoping for one last moment in the sun with the man he has always loved, before the final credits roll.

Director Swain probably commits every mistake known to first-time directors: much of the dialog is stilted, his political message far too didactic, too many scenes drag on endlessly and he allows some of his actors to shamelessly overact. Still, only the most heartless of LGBT audiences will remain unmoved by a movie that so blatantly wears its heart on its sleeve.

Grade: B- (Carl Szatmary)

Saturday, October 4, Midnight "Rise Above: The Tribe 8 Documentary"

I'm not a big fan of punk rock but was affected by this documentary on Tribe 8 in an unexpected way.

There's plenty of hard-driving music and concert footage for afficionados, and band members seize the opportunity to explain some of their more infamous onstage antics. like strapping on dildos (or slicing them!) and simulating sex with male fans. Gee, can't imagine why these gals ran into critics when they first performed at the Michigan Womyn's Music Fest... Video coverage from that culture clash is included here.

Along with their art, interviews with the women expose just what they've had to "Rise Above," in some cases absent or indifferent families; class, race and gender oppression; drug addiction; sexual abuse; and more. Although performing is fun and a great release, it's also clearly hard work that doesn't pay all the bills. So we get to see the rockers in their mundane "day" jobs as well; delivery person, tattoo artist, etc.

More than 10 years after Tribe 8's formation, several original members have left the group, one to expand her musical chops, others to settle into more stable jobs and relationships. I left this video not with pulsating punk music but with the strains of Donna Summer's "She Works Hard for the Money" echoing in my head! Very little glamor here, just hard rock and hard living. **Grade: B (Jamakaya)**

Sunday, October 5, 7 p.m. "Porn Theatre (La Chatte a Deux Tetes)" (with "K.I.P." and "Making Maps")

Jacques Nolot's "Porn Theatre (La Chatte a Deux Tetes)" meanders through one night at a seedy Parisian porn palace showing a heterosexual porn flick charmingly titled, "The Two-Headed Pussy." Action alternates from the circumspect



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lobby box office to the ritualistic maneuverings of the theatre's denizens in the rundown auditorium.

Unlike the hunky specimens who populate the porn theaters as depicted in gay porn or the crowded backrooms featured on so many episodes of "Queer as Folk," patrons of this theatre, most seemingly regulars, are older, less attractive and tend to fall into one of two categories: crossdressers and "straight-trade."

Much like the moves in a game of chess, these men hunt their prey with meticulous deliberation. Sex, when it happens, is random, often spontaneous, quick and anything but pretty. Nolot somehow manages to include just about every conceivable encounter during the screening of the dreadful black & white porn flick, from gay-bashing to a police raid.

Breaking up the monotony of the sexual goings-on. Nolot often cuts to the theatre's lobby. There, the theatre's worldweary ticket taker (Vittoria Scognamiglio) drinks too much and chats up the cute, sexually-ambiguous projectionist (Sebastien Viala) as well as the handsome aging man (director Nolot) she's long had a crush on.

While the ending promises something more than the above-mentioned trio, festival-goers are likely to be left as unsatisfied as most of the porn theatre's other patrons. Grade: C- (Carl Szatmary)

Wednesday, October 8, 8 p.m. "The Bitter Tears of Petra Van Kant"

Critic Molly Haskell described "The Bitter Tears of Petra Van Kant" as "a tragic love story disguised as a lesbian slumber party in high camp drag." Rainer Werner Fassbinder's lurid melodrama from 1973 is about three women playing sexual and mind games with each other while holed up in the apartment of powerful fashion designer Petra Van Kant (Margit Carstenson). The object of Petra's affection/obsession is the model Karin (Hanna Schygulla). Petra's assistant (Irm Hermann) also gets dragged into the fray.

Some lesbians have attacked the film as misogynistic male porn, others have recognized its camp sensibility and enjoyed ogling its cast of beautiful actresses. I'm of both opinions, but also find the film claustrophobic and over-long.

Grade: C (Jamakaya)



Rep's "Mary Stuart" is Highly Recommended

The Milwaukee Rep is opening its 50th season in style. Deciding that something spectacular was called for, Milwaukee Rep's Artistic Director Joseph Hanreddy decided to open with two classic historic dramas.

The Rep opened with Shakespeare's familiar cautionary tale of power and its abuses, "Richard III." Now, joining "Richard III" in rotating repertory is Friedrich Schiller's "Mary Stuart," both continuing until November 9th.

"Mary Stuart" focuses upon a unique moment in English history. When Henry VIII died in 1547, he did so seemingly

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secure in the knowledge that after his many trials and tribulations, he was leaving a male heir for the throne of England. Young Prince Edward, son of Henry and his third wife, Jane Seymour, was born in 1537. But the lad was sickly and although he took the throne at 9, died in 1553 at the age of 15. His death left a battle between Mary, Henry's only daughter with first wife Catherine and a Catholic, with Elizabeth, the only child of his with the ill-fated, Anne Boleyn.

Schiller picks up the drama in 1586. Mary has been held prisoner in Fotheringay Castle. Earlier in the year a plot to assassinate Elizabeth was uncovered and Mary, Queen of Scots implicated.

But is Mary, no stranger herself to political intrigue, innocent of the plots to kill Elizabeth. Should Elizabeth, whose reign is at best uncertain, sentence Mary to death and end forever her claim to the throne?

Such are the questions that give Schiller's fascinating play its drama and resonance.

What elevates this production of "Mary Stuart" above typical "Masterpiece Theatre" fare is its complex depiction of the two monarchs and those so very important people that surround them. As Schiller spins this royal tale, deception and betrayal are revealed at every turn.


actress. But what is the real Mary?

Hanreddy's fine ensemble seems to relish playing the noble rogues that surround the two queens. John Hoogenakker's Sir Edward Mortimer skillfully manages to fool all those around him – not to mention most of the audience – as to his true loyalties while Mark Corkin's Burleigh is so oily a fellow, it is near impossible not to suspect his real motives. Only James Pickering's stalwart jailer. Sir Amyas Paulet, proves to be the play's one truly honorable soul.

Add in Helen Q. Huang's opulent costumes, Thomas C. Hase's dramatic lighting and Hanreddy's crisp direction and the result is a historical costume drama that really comes to life.

Highly recommended.



Your guy knows you're interested, and he might change his mind sometime, but for now the answer is simply no. Accept it and be thankful for what you've got.

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


If you get the chance to catch "Camp." do so. It's a bittersweet trip back to teenage, this time with show tunes! No, it's not my autobiography!
