

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

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DOMA Dies By a Single Vote

Madison — AB475 Wisconsin's so-called "Defense of Marriage" (DOMA) bill has died following the failure of the State Assembly on November 12 to override Governor Doyle's veto to the bill. The bill, which would have reworded the state's current heterosexual marriage definition from "husband and wife" to "one man and one woman," died in a 63-33 vote, with three representatives absent. AB475 had earlier passed that body by a 68-29 in late October.

Calling it mean-spirited and unnecessary. Doyle vetoed the DOMA bill on Nov. 7, just two days after the State Senate approved the measure by a 22-11.

The failure of override is believed to be the first time in US history that a gubernatorial veto of similar legislation has been sus-

rial veto of similar legislation has been sustained by the legislature that passed it, according to Action Wisconsin. The statewide LGBT civil rights group claims over 8,000 anti-DOMA messages were delivered to lawmakers during the bill's three month progress through the legislature. Additionally, 500 people attended committee hearings, witnessed floor votes or participated in AW's September 30 LEAD Lobby Day.

The Family Research Institute of
Wisconsin, the group that has promoted
sponsorship and passage of this and similar
DOMA bills since 1995, decried the outcome. In a press release, FRI executive director Julaine Appling commended Assembly
lead sponsor Mark Gundrum (R-New Berlin)
or his continuing efforts to protect the state's
citizens from legal challenges to the "undefined words husband and wife" and dismissed opponents' redundancy arguments as
"pure vitriolic political palaver."

Opponents Claim Doyle is Promoting "Gay Agenda"

Gov. Jim Doyle was attacked for allegedly promoting the "gay agenda" following his DOMA veto and his announced support for the inclusion of domestic partnership benefits as an issue in union contract negotiations for state employees.

Gundrum, in a November 12 press release, tied the DOMA veto to Doyle's alleged "behind closed doors" promotion of the expansion of benefits to non-married employees regardless of sexual orientation. Gundrum claimed the governor was "obsessed with the gay agenda."

A day earlier Doyle had defended his support of the expansion of benefits as a negotiation issue in a press conference. Doyle noted that "it's worthy to put on the table, to see whether the unions have any interest in it." Doyle tied his support to the ongoing health care coverage crisis. "I think we should be trying to work to get health care for people."

Six of state government's 19 unions have requested that extending health insurance coverage to domestic partners be a subject of current negotiations. Several of the unions have been seeking such benefits expansion for nearly a decade. Doyle's predecessor Scott McCallum specifically had precluded domestic partner benefits from the bargaining table.

Action Wisconsin Executive Director
Christopher Ott accused Gundrum of distorting the benefits issue. "Treating employees fairly is not a 'gay agenda,' it's a basic principle," Ott said. "It's become a common practice for companies to offer domestic partner benefits as a way to ensure fairness."

Ott noted that over 75 private employers in Wisconsin already offer domestic partner health insurance. Ten other states, including neighboring lowa, offer domestic partner benefits to state employees.

Mass. Court Strikes Down Gay-Marriage Ban

Boston — In a much anticipated ruling, Massachusetts' highest court ruled on Nov. 18 that it is unconstitutional for the state to deny marriage rights to gay couples but stopped short of issuing marriage licenses to the seven couples challenging the law.

In a 4-3 ruling, the Supreme Judicial Court said the state "failed to identify any constitutionally adequate reason for denying civil marriage to same-sex couples." The high court ordered the legislature to come up with a solution within 180 days. The case, Goodridge vs. Department of Rublic Health, sought the right of seven gay couples to marry. The ruling falls short of that goal.

The ruling closely matched the December 1999 Vermont Supreme Court decision that led to that state's legislature approving civil union laws, giving couples many of the same benefits of marriage.

Writing for the majority of Justices, Massachusetts Chief Justice Margaret H. Marshall called marriage "a vital social

institution" and noted that the state's Constitution "affirms the dignity and equality of all individuals," and "forbids the creation of second-class citizens."

The court rejected the state's argument claiming that the primary purpose of marriage was procreation. The court ruled "it is the exclusive and permanent commitment of the marriage partners to one another, not the begetting of children, that is the sine qua non of marriage."

The Massachusetts legislature appears divided over the issue of gay marriage. Presently, they are considering a constitutional amendment that would legally define a marriage as a union between one man and one woman. Speaker of the House Tom Finneran of Boston, has said he will push that proposal.

A similar amendment, launched by citizens, was proposed in Massachusetts last summer, but the then Senate President Tom Birmingham (D) refused to let the Constitutional Convention hear or vote on the proposal. Proponents of the measure, who collected 100,000 signatures from citizens, cried foul and said they were denied "a referendum process."

Ron Crews, executive director of the Massachusetts Family Institute, a group opposed to gay marriage, said he was "disappointed that the court did not uphold and affirm marriage" but added that he was "grateful" that the court passed the matter to the legislature.

"The matter is now onto the legislature and I believe they will have to act on the constitutional amendment," Crews said.

The Constitutional Convention is scheduled to meet on Feb. 11 to possibly begin debate on the marriage amendment.

Mass. Ruling Galvanizes Gay Marriage Foes

President Bush vowed to defend the sanctity of marriage after Massachusetts' highest court struck down the state's ban on same-sex unions.

"Marriage is a sacred institution between a man and a woman," Bush said in a statement released shortly after he arrived in London for a state visit.

He said the ruling by the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court "violates this important principle."

In Washington, congressional Republicans renewed calls for a constitutional amendment banning gay marriages.

Legislation is already in the House, and Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist said following the Massachusetts court ruling that he expects a separate version of the bill will be presented in Senate. The amendment already has 96 co-sponsors in the House of Representatives.

An amendment to the Constitution must be approved by two-thirds of the House and the Senate and then ratified by three-fourths of the states.

"We must amend the Constitution if we are to stop a tyrannical judiciary from redefining marriage to the point of extinction," the conservative Focus on the Family said in a statement.

"Radical homosexual activists have made their intentions clear – 'couples' will now converge on Massachusetts, 'marry, and return to their respective states and file lawsuits to challenge Defense of Marriage Acts (DOMAs) and try to force the states to recognize their 'marriages,'" Alan E. Sears, president of the Alliance Defense Fund. said in a statement.

Rev. Jerry Falwell recently claimed that the coordinated efforts of conservative Christian groups had resulted in one million signatures on petitions in support of the constitutional amendment.

Democratic Candidates Oppose Mass. Marriage Ruling

None of the leading candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination support the Massachusetts court ruling on same-sex marriage.

While they all said they support the right of same-sex couples to receive the same benefits as married couples, only the three candidates at the back of the pack, Al Sharpton, Dennis Kucinich, and Carol Moseley Braun would come out and support gay marriage.

"As a society we should be looking for ways to bring us together and as someone who supports the legal rights of all Americans regardless of sexual orientation, I appreciate today's decision," said Wesley Clark. "As president, I would support giving gays and lesbians the legal rights that married couples get."

However, Clark said he did not support the right of gays and lesbians to marry. John Kerry and John Edwards issued statements Tuesday restating their opposition to gay marriage.

Howard Dean would support civil unions, such those enacted while he was Governor of Vermont, but not marriage, "The state should afford same-sex couples equal treatment under law in areas such as health insurance, hospital visitation and inheritance rights."

Gay Activists Praise Decision

ay activists and civil rights advocates across the country were viritually unanimous in their support and praise of the decision.

"This is a historic day for lesbian and gay couples in Massachusetts who until today have only dreamed of being able to get married. The court has said explicitly that civil marriage can't be limited to different-sex couples. The state legislature will now look at how — not whether — Massachusetts couples will have equal marriage rights," said David Buckel, Lambda Legal's Marriage Project Director

"Our work is not done, and this victory is not final," said Rev. Troy D. Perry, MCC Founder in a statement. "There is already a strong movement in the Massachusetts Legislature to circumvent this court ruling with an anti-gay amendment to the state constitution."

The American Civil Liberties Union praised the ruling as well.

"This court ruling says that individuals who are police officers, firefighters and teachers who serve in our military and pay taxes cannot be denied the same rights as other couples simply because they are gay or lesbian said Matt Coles, Director of the American Civil Liberties Union's Lesbian and Gay Rights Project. "The court today recognized that a constitution that protects individual rights does not allow government to say that only some families will be protected."

Wisconsin Reaction

The Massachusetts Supreme Court's ruling on gay and lesbian couples right to marry is a strong statement for equal rights for all citizens, according to State Rep. Mark Pocan (D-Madison).

"I applaud the Massachusetts Supreme Court decision that recognizes that all people should be treated equally, regardless of their sexual orientation. I look forward to a day in Wisconsin where we can have laws that recognize the civil rights and equality for all our citizens," Pocan added.

Republican legislators were less enthusastic about the decision and pledged to pursue a state constituional amendment to ban same sex marriage in Wisconsin.

Rep. Mark Gundrum (R-New Berlin) said state Republicans were working on "appropriate language" for such an amendment and that the ruling in Massachusetts demonstrates that Wisconsin needs a ban on same-sex marriage.

Action Wisconsin hailed the decision and said it will help advance equality throughout the country. "We believe the Massachusetts decision will demonstrate to people everywhere that the sky doesn't fall when lesbian and gay couples have the rights and responsibilities of civil marriage," said Action Wisconsin executive director, Christopher Ott.

Pocan noted that the bill recently vetoed by Governor Jim Doyle would have had not effect on the Massachusetts ruling. Current Wisconsin law would not allow for recognition of other state's laws. Only federal law could supersede state law, something that a "Defense of Marriage" law would be unable to affect anyway, according to Pocan.

Federal legislation already prevents Washington from recognizing same-sex unions. The federal Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA), while not outright banning gay marriage to get around court rulings that bar federal interference in state matters, affirmed that states are not required to recognize a same-sex marriage performed in another state.

PrideFest Town Hall Launches Major Fundraising Drive to Save Festival

\$65,000 Needed by January 31 for Festival to Avoid Bankruptcy

Milwaukee — A standing-room only crowd of over 75 persons attended an "emergency" PrideFest town hall meeting on Nov. 12 at UW-M. The meeting concluded with an enthusastic show of hands giving near unanimous support for a proposal to save PrideFest, Wisconsin's beleaguered LGBT pride festival held annually at the Summerfest grounds.

The nearly two-hour meeting illustrated PrideFest's dire financial status and a option to ensure the festival's survival. A new PrideFest leadership team was introduced and the new group unveiled an aggressive fundraising appeal to pay off PrideFest's debt. That appeal brought in nearly \$35,000 within the campaign's first 48 hours.

The new PrideFest group also clarified that in addition to paying its creditors, PrideFest must raise additional funds required to produce a festival in 2004. The new group hopes to accomplish that goal through additional fundraising campaigns, corporate sponsorships or grants.

If the debt is paid, the Cream City Foundation would administer the festival in 2004 along with a reorganization of PrideFest led by a new "PrideFest Task Force." CCF President Denise Wise pledged the effort to save the festival would be done with "complete transparency and accountability."

Brenda Coley, a member of the Task Force, stated that responsibility for the production of the festival beyond 2004 would likely be accomplished through an open bidding process and interested organizations or parties would be asked to submit proposals to CCF.

The town hall, hosted at UW-Milwaukee by CCF and the UW-M LGBT Resource Center, was the first town hall meeting called to discuss the status of PrideFest since its June announcement of a projected shortfall of between \$120,000 and \$150,000. An unofficial audit by the CCF posts the current debt at approximately \$120,000. A complete and independent audit of the 2003 festival, funded by CCF, is under way.

Yves LaPierre, Director of the UWM LGBT Resource Center, and Rev. Lew Broyles of the Metropolitan Community Church, opened meeting followed by introductions of the new PrideFest leadership.

Wise updated the crowd on events since June, stating that CCF began working with PrideFest during the summer to determine the extent of the debt situation. Negotiations with the PrideFest Board of Directors produced an agreement which included resignations of the its board. CCF took on a more direct leadership role in September and quickly assembled a diverse community group to investigate options for the festival.

Wise detailed PrideFest's current financial status and outlined PrideFest's revenue and expense trends over the last three years. The festival showed revenue growth of 13% in 2000-'01, 5% in 2001-'02 and 4% during this past season. Expenses during these periods grew 21%, 5% and 34%, respectively.

"One of the key sources of the debt was the lack of a revenue development strategy that compensated for the rise in expenses during the 2003 season," Wise explained.

Scott Gunkel, Vice President of the CCF, then explained that communication between the new PrideFest leadership group and PrideFest vendors helped determine clearly what amounts were owed and if the vendors would negotiate payments. He outlined two options that the community group identified. The first option called for paying the negotiated debts to vendors for services rendered during the 2003 festival and declaring bankruptcy for the festival.

After much deliberation and recognition that bankruptcy would like cause PrideFest to fold and do irreparable harm to the reputation of the LGBT community, the new group then explored and developed a debt reduction strategy.

Gunkel stated that this one-time fundraising appeal must raise \$65,000 by January 31, 2004 or there would be no PrideFest 2004 and the festival risked losing the Summerfest grounds permanently.

"I look at this as a one-time investment in the future of the entire LGBT community. I wouldn't feel right if there was no PrideFest and if I hadn't done everything I could to save it. I hope the rest of the community feels the same," Gunkle said.

With a hopeful eye towards a successful debt-reduction campaign, Susan Cook discussed preliminary plans for PrideFest 2004. They included a reduction in expenses by limiting the festival to two days — Saturday and Sunday; using a smaller portion of the Summerfest grounds; and focusing on local and regional entertainment.

Cook, a past co-director of PrideFest, recounted the proud accomplishments of the PrideFest and its value to the community, including the move to the Summerfest grounds in the company of the city's other major community festivals and the flying of rainbow flags throughout the downtown area during the festival season.


Paul Williams unveiled details of the fundraising drive to retire the debt which would allow the festival survive. The PrideFest Legacy Fund is the group's aggressive fundraising plan which seeks 15 "PrideFest Angels" who will raise \$3,333 each; 30 "Friends of PrideFest" to contribute \$333 or more apiece; and 150 "Supporters of PrideFest" to raise \$33 or more each.

To a hearty round of applause, Williams also announced that three supporters in attendance had pledged that very night to be "Angels." They were Dr. Robert Starshak, Ross Draegert and Stephanie Hume.

"The first funds are easy because longtime members of the community know how important it is to stay on the Milwaukee World Festival grounds," said Ross Draegert, the first Angel. "I am confident that if we can get the festival back on its feet ... the festival [will not] get into trouble again."

The following 48 hours produced even more dramatic support with eight additional "PrideFest Angels" stepping forward to make pledges. They are the Washington Heights Neighborhood Association; John Blaszczyk; Scott Gunkel; Jim Schleif and Bill Morley; Denise Wise and Kathleen Niesen; Dan Lagerman; BOOM; and one anonymous Angel.

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
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SPRAWL to Hold a "Snow Ball" January 24


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Women Strategize to Confront Abuse in Lesbian, Bisexual Communities

Milwaukee – On October 23, eighteen women gathered at the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center to take part in a dialogue about domestic abuse and sexual assault in the lives of lesbian and bisexual women.

Organized and facilitated by the Center's Anti-Violence Project, the dialogue was seen as an opportunity for women to talk about these difficult issues in a safe environment.

According to Kathy Herbst, Director of Programs at the Community Center, "One of our goals was to identify ways in which we, as individuals and as part of distinct communities, can react and respond to domestic abuse and sexual assault."

The women at the table represented a cross section of Milwaukee's lesbian and bisexual women's community in terms of sexual orientation, age, race, ethnicity and socioeconomic background. Participants were diverse, also, in their understanding of and experience with abuse. Some were survivors; some had supported friends who were victims, and others knew abuse happened to lesbian and bisexual women but had no personal experience. This diversity contributed to a multi-layered and complex analysis of what it means to recognize domestic violence and sexual assault issues in the lesbian and bisexual women's communities.

Perceptions and attitudes among lesbian and bisexual women about abuse were seen as wide-ranging. Some women said that it was "prevalent" and "accepted," while others said there was a lot of denial and skepticism about woman-to-woman abuse. Some women still see violence and abuse as a "male" phenomenon perpetrated by men; they see women as being nonviolent and somehow "above" that kind of behavior. If a woman rapes another woman, will it really be recognized as rape?

Domineering behavior, treating a woman as property, or isolating her were seen as potential signs of abuse. Alcohol and drugs can intensify abusive behavior, and the role of "bar culture" in enabling domestic violence was discussed. Culture, race and gender roles are sometimes used to rationalize or excuse the abuse.

Some women who acknowledge that woman-to-woman abuse occurs may assume it only happens in certain segments of the community. Others who have witnessed abuse between two women say they are uncomfortable or unsure of whether to intervene. When is it appropriate to speak up?

Most agreed that homophobia makes reporting and dealing with abuse harder and creates a greater stigma.

The evening concluded with participants addressing the question of what services they thought were needed to address abuse and to truly support victims.

"While we agreed that mainstream service providers need to be held accountable to offer appropriate and effective services to all women, including those in samesex relationships, we mostly focused on the vital role that friends and community must assume," Herbst told IN Step.

Among other possibilities discussed were: establishing an 800 crisis line staffed by trained survivors and allies; providing opportunities to learn about healthy relationships and how to resolve conflicts; setting up "safe houses" – places where women could go to relax, rejuvenate and receive support; initiating preventive education in the bars; and developing some sort of peer support/educator network.

This was the second in a series of such meetings planned by the Center. The LGBT Domestic Abuse & Sexual Assault Advisory Council supported the effort, and women from the Healing Center, the Sexual Assault Treatment Center and Sojourner Truth House assisted with both the planning and the facilitation of the evening.

"Although these are not easy issues to address," Herbst said, "lesbian and bisexual women are ready to talk about and do something about domestic violence and sexual assault. Almost all of the participants said they'd attend another dialogue and would encourage other women to do so, also."

"It will be extremely important not to lose the energy and momentum that came out of this discussion. At the same time, the task before us is formidable and deciding what steps to take next will not be easy. Fortunately, the Center's Anti-Violence Project is not in this alone."

Herbst said the Wisconsin Coalition Against Domestic Violence and the Wisconsin Coalition Against Sexual Assault have brought together individuals from throughout the state to form an LGBT Committee. And in Milwaukee, the Milwaukee Commission on Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault and a number of mainstream agencies are committed to working with the Center.

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
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REALITY CHECK

Ding! Dong! DOMA's Dead — For Now

"Defense of Marriage" Act once again has failed to become the law of the land. Certainly not for lack of trying. This was the Family Research Institute of Wisconsin's (FRI) fifth attempt to get the state's lawmakers to make the already heterosexual statutory definition of marriage somehow even more so.

What has changed since the bill's defeat? Nothing. Gay and lesbian couples remain second-class citizens, getting none of the thousand-plus federal and state legislated perks for making personal commitment to the responsibilities inherent in "lifelong, monogamous marriage" that their straight counterparts do.

In their November 12 press release, Action Wisconsin savored their win and documented much of



their hard work on a separate, online "victory page." The failure to override the gubernatorial veto on a bill passed with such large majorities in the legislature was a historic first, but "victory"? I beg to differ. Victory suggests mastery over the issue. At least that's what the dictionary says.

Momentum, if not mastery, certainly seems to be with the FRI. This time the right-wingers missed shoving our queer face in it by just one vote. Considering the Institute started with just seven sponsors for their first DOMA bill in 1995, you have to give Marv Munyon and his successor Julaine Appling a lot of credit. They've achieved a lot in eight years.

Of course, that odd couple has had a lot of help from the extremist right that controls the state GOP's leadership. Not only have they won seats from the Democrats, they've worked to force out the elected Republican moderates within the party. The recent electoral dominance of the Far Right has had all but those in the safest seats in both parties quivering in their boots when it comes to social justice issues.

This conservative cadre also has made it perfectly clear that they will continue to work for the preservation of discrimination in the name of marriage. The push for a DOMA amendment to the state's constitution began with the suggestion of same in FRI's AB475 post-mortem press release. Now that the Massachusetts Supreme Court has ruled in favor of same-sex unions, I would not be surprised to see a drive attempt begin as a coda to next month's planned extraordinary legislative session on economic issues.

All is not lost, however. The recent DOMA fight has re-energized many in the LGBT community, partic-

ularly the youngest members of the tribe. Straight allies also have visibly arrived to support us in numbers previously unseen.

More importantly, Action Wisconsin has emerged as a credible, if not yet a completely respected, political force. To achieve the kind of clout that wins genuine victories in the legislature, Action Wisconsin will have to notch a few documented electoral defeats on its belt. A few targeted defeats of bipartisan bigots, especially one or more outside of the Madison-Milwaukee electoral axis could reverse momentum, giving the moderate majorities the spine they need to stand up on social issues.

That means AW's legislative arm needs to build coalitions and coordinate meaningfully with established mainstream progressive political action committees and similar LGBT PACs such as HRL-Pac or the LGBT Center's OutVote project. That arm also have to find the critical funds needed to expand AW's person power. More staff are needed to take those meetings and to jawbone legislators full-time.

Action Wisconsin could also use a little strategic lobbying assist from what used to be one of the most vibrant state chapters in national LGBT political history: the Wisconsin Log Cabin Republicans. Two years after placing one of their own in the White House (Scott Evertz as "AIDS Czar" for those with short memories), the cheesehead brigade of the gay GOP seems to have become little more than a post office box. The LCR website, which IN Step reported last year had become a portal for porn, is now merely "for sale."

In its defense, LCR Wisconsin historically had taken a low-key approach to its legislative arm-twisting. But there is a difference between low-key and nonexistent. LCR Wisconsin's silence during the recent DOMA debate not only was deafening, it

was embarrassing. Hopefully that domain name will be sold to a revived queer Republican group that cares what is happening in the state Capitol and will represent the quarter of the LGBT community that continues to steadfastly support the GOP.

On the other hand, AW's educational arm (Action Wisconsin Education Fund - AWEF) also has its work cut out. In addition to continuing its already successful corporate outreach on domestic partner benefits, media outreach on LGBT issues and community outreach to like-minded activists, AWEF needs to find ways to dialogue those in the LGBT community who think the apparent emphasis on marriage rights is misguided. For many outside the state's big city gay communities, the reality is not securing marriage rights but our alreadylegislated basic civil rights, all the while avoiding physical manifestations of the anti-gay backlash the marriage issue is fueling.

Another part of AWEF's educational mandate will be to maintain the focus on the civics lessons that need to be reinforced during the ongoing and increasingly center stage national dialogue on gay marriage. AW's Chris Ott alluded to the issue in the group's November 18 press release on the Massachusetts gay marriage ruling. "Opponents of equality are already arguing that only lawmakers should be able to decide these questions, but protecting the rights of minorities is one of the critical things that our judicial system is designed to do," Ott said.

In the coming months Ott and Action Wisconsin will need to remind all involved of the three core realities that inform the gay marriage debate. First, there is the social reality is that families headed by unmarried couples of all sexual orientations have always existed and that real harm comes to those unions from the current state of legal recognition. Secondly, the Constitutional reality of equal protection under the law limits legislative initiatives that further curtail equality, no matter how currently popular or politically advantageous such initiatives may be. Finally, historical reality demonstrates that social evolution is ultimately unstoppable and by its very nature inherently inclusive of diversity.

The current jubilation over the AB475 defeat seems somewhat akin to the Munchkins' celebration in the movie version of The Wizard of Oz. Now that Governor Doyle has dropped a house-sized veto on Julaine and her FRI minions, Wisconsin's "friends of Dorothy" may want to join in the DOMA version of "Ding! Dong! The Witch Is Dead."

But just like Oz, it's early in the DOMA movie and a lot of peril awaits down this particular Yellow Brick Road. Only moving steadfastly forward, paying attention to the truths behind the Religious Right's sanctimonious curtain of "traditional marriage," and keeping the social, Constitutional and historical realities in perspective will allow same gender couples reach that "no place like home" final fade out.

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
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
Tax Cap Sponsors Threaten Services at AIDS Network

Madison – Officials at Madison's AIDS Network say the proposed elimination of their entire city budget will wreak havoc on Madison families trying to cope with HIV/AIDS. Executive Director Bob Power says the alders' proposal will in effect eliminate a case manager and leave 60 plus families without support. Madison Mayor Dave Cieslewicz and Common Council President Mike Verveer have told Power they are opposed to this cut and will fight it on the council floor.

"While we understand the difficult economic times we are having in this city, to completely slash city support for families living with HIV/AIDS seems especially harsh," said Power. Power said the \$24,700 supports one of their six case management positions at AIDS Network and is the only source of funding support for families with HIV/AIDS that the city provides. The Madison Public Health Department provides HIV/AIDS counseling and testing, but then will refer new positives to AIDS Network for case management support and other essential services provided by the agency.

In addition to the city cuts, Power said the agency is facing cuts from both the county and the state. The State of Wisconsin AIDS Program has already reduced the agency's current prevention budget by \$22,000 and Dane County is proposing a \$20,000 cut for 2004.

"Each section of government is saying, well, these small cuts in their budget won't be that bad, but when everyone is making cuts, they add up to significant deficits that won't easily be made up," concluded Power.




For the Girls



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

"Times Square" and "Winter Wonderettes"

"Times Square Angel"

The 1940s were a strange time in Hollywood. On one hand, legendary film director Frank Capra was still spinning his Capra-corn, reaching his zenith with that perennial Christmas favorite, "It's A Wonderful Life." Can there ever be another film out of Hollywood that more perfectly captures the folksy ideal of small town American spirit?

While Jimmy Stewart emerged as something of an All-American Everyman, actresses like Joan Crawford, Bette Davis, Barbara Stanwyck to name just a few spent the 1940s clawing to stay on top, carving out memorable portrayals as dames who were as tough as nails.

Both sides of '40s Hollywood come together in Charles Busch's hilarious parody, "Times Square Angel,' a not-so-very traditional Holiday show offered by R.S.V.P. Productions.

Firmly entrenched in Busch's spotlight is Irish O'Flanagan (InStep's very own Dear Ruthie). What sort of a gal is Irish? Think Joan Crawford in "Mildred Pierce." Think Gloria Swanson in "Sunset Boulevard." What the heck, think Neely O'Hara scrapping bottom in "Valley of the Dolls." Irish is so tough that when she says, "I wouldn't trust a man as far as I can throw a drink," you know she has thrown many a man and many a drink.

But she wasn't always like that. Once upon a time, she was a real nice girl, got good grades, was willing to help any friend in need. See even planned to marry Eddie (Trey Korte), the not-too-bright boy-nextdoor. Then her mother became ill and she had to leave school to work in a zipper sweatshop. The rest of the first act follows Irish as she toughens up, first becoming a stripper, then falling in love with dashing and rich Dexter Paine III (Michael Endter). Just for a moment, one golden moment, everything seems too good to be true. As is so often the case in stories such as this, it proves to be too good to be true. Mamma Paine tells Irish that Dexter won't get a dime if he marries her and when she offers Irish a big payoff, Irish says to heck with love and grabs the money.

Irish becomes a big star but instead of thanking all of the little people, she steps on them. We know that she will have to face a reckoning. However, can her guardian Angel Albert (James Henderson) teach Irish to fly right before it's too late?

Busch is on firm footing as Dear Ruthie's ravishing Irish works her way to the top. From schlepping schoolgirl to beautiful nightclub headliner crooning, "You're Getting to be a Habit with Me" to her pint-sized co-star Georgie (Michael Endter), Ruthie has us eating right out of her hand.

Busch is decidedly less nimble bringing "Time Square Angel" on home, a la "It's A Wonderful Life." A detour to the junkyard scene straight from "A Christmas Carol" is a real head-scratcher but still great fun in the hands of the hysterical trio of scavengers.

"Times Square Angel" might offer a familiar story but with a marvelous nostalgic twist and a welcome addition to the canon of holiday entertainment. "Time Square Angel" continues at the "Off the Wall Theatre until Nov. 30

"Winter Wonderettes"

It's still before Thanksgiving and there ain't no snow yet - at least not as this review is being written – but the Milwaukee Rep's Stackner Cabaret is all decked out in holiday colors with the welcome return of those Marvelous Wonderettes in aptly the titled, "Winter Wonderettes."

The occasion is the annual Christmas holiday party at Harper's Hardware - think Cunningham's Hardware from the popular sitcom "Happy Day." The time is the 1950s as seen through the rose-tinted glasses of the 1970s.

Once upon a time Betty Jean (Lucia Spina), Missy (Misty Cotton), Suzy (Bets Malone) and Cindy Lou (Susanna Hall) were the Marvelous Wonderettes. Many years have passed and Betty Jean, now a Harper's Hardware employee, has gotten the old group together to provide the evening's entertainment for the company party.

Such is the loose narrative provided by Roger Bean to hold together a genial, nostalgic trip down memory lane with a couple of dozen holiday tunes from the 1940s, '50s and '60s.

The highlight of the evening is to be the arrival of Santa - as played by Mr. Harper-who will bestow upon the roomful of Harper employees (we in the audience) a bagful of bonus checks. But Mr. Harper is late as usual and the Wonderettes must keep entertaining until his arrival. 
Bill at a ringside table. Poor Betty Jean's beau has left her again, this time for good.







Enough, already! Wanting to wish you and yours a **HIT** of a Thanksgiving Weekend ahead as I remain, "Cordially yours."



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
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
