Proposed Bill Would Weaken State's Open Housing Law

[Madison]- All owner-occupied single-family residences would be exempted from the Wisconsin Fair Housing Law under a bill introduced by State Representative Joanne Huelsman (R-Waukesha).

Under Huelsman's proposal, Assembly Bill 552, any owner-occupied rooming house may legally refuse to rent based on sex, race, sexual orientation, religion, handicap or any other protected class that exists under state law. The effort drew immediate fire from State Representative David Clarenbach (D-Madison) who labeled the plan "a foot in the door to undermine the integrity of our Open Housing Law." discrimination is acceptable under some circumstances. It becomes a slippery slope from there to more substantial loopholes and exemptions to our civil rights laws," Clarenbach said.

AB 552 is co-sponsored by 25 members of the legislature and has been referred to the Assembly Committee on State Affairs for public hearings next year. [Milwaukee]- Pianist and cabaret singer, Michael Feinstein, 32, noted interpreter of the American musical theatre whose repertoire includes classic Broadway show tunes from the pens of such renowned composers as Irving Berlin and George and Ira Gershwin, will perform a benefit concert for the Wisconsin AIDS Fund, Tuesday, February 13, 1990, at 7:30 p.m. in Uihlein Hall of the Performing Arts Center.

The Wisconsin AIDS Fund is a philanthropic Milwaukee agency composed of well-to-do Milwaukeeans. Peter Mahler, one of the 20 members of the Fund's Steering Committee called the Fund "The UPAF (United Performing Arts Fund) of AIDS." A Gay leader who spoke on the condition that he not be identified, called the Fund "very high toned."

According to Linda Stephenson, another member of the Fund's Steering Committee, the group has as its "principal function" the raising and disbursement of funds for AIDS prevention and treatment programs. Money is allocated on the basis of grants received from the appropriate AIDS care agencies.

The Fund, Stephenson said, "does not duplicate the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP)."

Light contacted Doug Nelson, Executive Director of MAP, asking him what MAP's relation was to the Fund. Nelson responded, "The Wisconsin AIDS Fund raises money to contribute to other organizations that are involved with AIDS."

When asked if MAP had received money from the Fund, Nelson said, "In its first disbursement of funds this past year, MAP received a grant of \$7,500 to make the Milwaukee House, our home for persons with AIDS, handicapped accessible." Nelson continued saying, "We also received a \$12,000 grant to fund a bilingual case manager to work with our Hispanic clients." He added, "We were really grateful for this financial support."

When asked if MAP could expect additional money from the Fund for MAP's client-care programs, Nelson said that there was no guarantee of how the AIDS Fund would disburse the money it raised. However, he said, "it is our hope and expectation that the important client services of MAP will continue to receive major funding from the Wisconsin AIDS Fund. Feinstein will donate \$10,000 of his fee for this concert to the locally- based AIDS Fund which is managed by the Milwaukee Foundation. He will play a series of memorable songs from his six albums and previous performances on Broadway. Recognized for his ability to transform old lyrics and melodies into new and contemporary arrangements, he has performed in leading cabarets across America, including New York's Algonquin Hotel, the Ritz Carlton in Washington and San Francisco's York Hotel, as well as on numerous occasions at the White House for former President and Mrs. Reagan.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), which has lobbied Sasser, Nunn and a host of other cosponsors and potential supporters, is optimistic that the bill can pass during the 101st Congress--depending on whether attempts by Senator Jesse Helms to delete Gays from the bill can be defeated.

NGLTF's Anti- Violence project reported last year about 7,250 cases of anti-Gay violence and defamation, with a vast majority of the incidents going unreported. In an earlier survey, NGLTF reported that one in four Gay men and one in ten Lesbians have been assaulted.

Huelsman defended her bill as an effort to "protect persons in owner-occupied, single- family residences." She cited the recent dispute in Madison involving a Lesbian roommate being refused a roommate lease.

Clarenbach responded that AB 552 also covers all owner-occupied rooming houses of up to four persons, and thereby violates the Federal Fair Housing Act.

"AB 552 would result in Wisconsin statutes failing to be substantially equivalent with federal law and that non-compliance would result in the loss of \$75,000 in federal revenues as a penalty," Clarenbach noted.

[Vancouver, British Columbia]- According to Seattle Gay News, full page advertisements paid for by religious groups threatening the Gay Games III planned for next August in Vancouver appeared in local newspapers in November, outraging the Gay and Lesbian community there.

The ads proclaimed: "...Because these games will bring God's judgment upon us all in this city, we therefore forbid them in the name and authority of Jesus Christ. We believe that they shall not take place."

The threats have raised awareness about the need for adequate security at the games, and organizers are working cooperatively with the Vancouver police to ensure everyone's safety.

A spokesman for Gay Games III, Shawn Kelly, told SGN: "We believe this is part of a well organized strategy to harass and disrupt the event." Kelly also noted that more support and volunteers were rolling in as a result of the belligerent ads and he insisted that, despite the intimidation, planning for the athletic games and cultural festival will move forward on schedule.

Fundamentalists Fail To Close Play

[Springfield, MO]- "The Normal Heart," Larry Kramer's play about AIDS, finished its two week run at Southwest Missouri State University to sold out audiences, despite attempts by fundamentalists to ban it and the fire- bombing of the home of a student who rose to its defense.

The Christian Fundamentalist arsonists did succeed in killing the student's two pet cats who perished in the flames.

Opposition to the student production was led by a group called Citizens Demanding Standards and the Assemblies of God Church, headquartered in Springfield. Each protested the university's financial support of a play they claimed "promotes homosexuality and anti-family values." The home of theatre student Brad Evans, who had formed a group called People Acting with Compassion and Tolerance, was saturated with gasoline and burned to the ground on the evening of the play's opening night performance.

Georgia PWA Sentenced to 10 Years

[Smyrna, GE]- Philadelphia Gay News reports that 27 year-old Gregory Scroggins has been sentenced to ten years in prison on charges that he attempted to kill a police officer when he bit the cop on the arm during a struggle. Scroggins is HIV-positive.

The police were intervening in a domestic dispute between Scroggins and his roommate when officer David Crook put a chock hold on Scroggins. Scroggins claimed that he bit Crook in an attempt to loosen the tight grip around his neck, not with any lethal intent. He described the difficulty with accepting his own HIV-positive status and said, "I wouldn't want to inflict this on anyone."

Initially, Scroggins was charged with the misdemeanor offense of obstructing an officer. It was only ten months later that the state filed the charge of attempted murder. Scroggins thinks his homosexuality and HIV status strongly influenced his treatment by the court. His attorney says that Scroggins is being "treated like a leper and a vaudeville sideshow act."

Harvey Milk's Ashes Still In Limbo

[Washington, D.C.]- Gay writer Rex Wockner reports that some of Harvey Milk's ashes are "stuck in a safe in the Congressional Cemetery in Washington," lacking the money needed for proper burial. Most of Milk's ashes were scattered in San Francisco Bay after his assassination in 1978, but Leonard Matlovich brought the remainder east for use in a special memorial plot near the nation's capitol. Matlovich himself died in 1988.

John Hanley, who oversees burials at Congressional Cemetery, is "personally upset" that "this great man is sitting in my safe... he doesn't deserve this. Harvey Milk was a person everybody should be proud of. I can't imagine that the community of millions of people who looked up to him can't come up with \$5 to buy the site."

San Franciscan Ken McPherson is hoping to raise several thousand dollars to purchase a larger plot and to erect a memorial that will do Harvey proud. Once properly buried, Harvey Milk's name will be added to the cemetery's roster of famous people, including J. Edgar Hoover and John Phillip Sousa.

Pacific Telephone Adds Gay Listing

[San Francisco, CA]- The Pacific Bell Telephone Company agreed this Fall to include a listing for "Gay and Lesbian Organizations" in over 100 of its Yellow Page directories in California and Nevada. The action came after the San Francisco Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) met with company executives.

The GLAAD chapter in New York had to resort to a lawsuit before the New York/New England Telephone acceded to a similar request in January, 1989.

NGRA Supports Right to Die Case

[Washington, D.C.]- National Gay Rights Advocates (NGRA) has filed a "friend of the court" brief with the U.S. Supreme Court in support of a family that seeks to terminate the life support system of their comatose daughter. As a result of a car accident, Nancy Cruzan has been in a coma since 1983. The State of Missouri has opposed the wishes of the Cruzan family all the way to the highest court. It is the first time the Supreme Court will hear a case involving the right to end extraordinary life support systems. Said NGRA Director Jean O'Leary, "This case has obvious implications for people with AIDS and their loved ones who may have to make similar decisions."


[Dallas, TX]- The Texas State Commission on Judicial Conduct has publicly censored Judge Morris Jackson Hampton for homophobic comments he made during the sentencing of the murderers of two Gay men last year.

Judge Hampton said (among other things) that "some murder victims are less innocent in their deaths than others. In those cases, a defendant is unlikely to deserve a maximum sentence... I put prostitutes and Gays at about the same level,"

A special investigator had found no fault with Hampton but the Judicial Commission said the judge's comments were "destructive of public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the judiciary because the public reacted... with disbelief, abhorrence and indignation."

Gay leaders in Dallas feel the censor is

only a slap on the wrist and are redoubling their efforts to remove Hampton from the bench.

Lypomed Donates AIDS Drugs To Community Centers

[Rosemont, IL]- Lyphomed, Inc. of Rosemont, IL has launched a "Patient Assistance Program" to provide certain quantities of free NebuPent (TM) (nebulized pentamidine) for prophylaxis of AIDS patients at high risk, for the prevention of Pneumocystis carinii pneumonia (PCP). The program will provide limited quantities of pentamidine to indigent patients unable to obtain reimbursement for the purchase of the drug through medical insurance coverage or government reimbursement programs.

PCP is the leading cause of death in people with AIDS. In June, 1989, after more than two years of extensive, nationwide clinical trials designed to show that NebuPent is safe and effective in preventing PCP, the drug received approval from the FDA. Upon approval, Lyphomed announced the company would begin designing a Patient Assistance Program to help those indigent AIDS patients unable to obtain reimbursement for purchase of the drug through medical insurance or government assistance. The program has been launched and approximately 40 community based not-for-profit AIDS care clinics and physicians have contacted Lyphomed for assistance. By law, Lyphomed cannot donate the drug directly to patients. The community based clinics will control the process and assume responsibility for providing the free drug to patients who qualify. Lyphomed will rely on their judgment.

Said Brian Tambi, Senior Vice President and General Manager of Lyphomed's Ethical Pharmaceutical Division, "The Patient Assistance Program is a creative initiative, the first of its kind and a continuing demonstration of Lyphomed's commitment to assist the AIDS community." "If it concerns you, it concerns us!"

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

Money Is Really Key Issue For ROTC Staying in Madison

M. Daniel Henry, a newly hired dean of an eastern college, told the assembled faculty and student representatives that, "the institution is more important than any member of it." Many quelled, but he spoke the truth — from his point of view.

No matter whether it's Harvard or Marquette or UW-Madison, colleges and universities are businesses whose main purpose is to survive by projecting an image and selling a product. Whatever conflicts with those, be it idea, human being or group, is viewed as a threat which must be expunged for the good of the institution.

Therefore, it comes as no surprise to those with more than a passing acquaintance with academia that Marquette should seek to suppress a Gay/Lesbian organization or that, in the end, UW-Madison's Board of Regents will not eliminate ROTC from campus simply because of anti-Lesbian/Gay discrimination. There's too much money involved.

Universities change, not usually because of ideas, but only when the academic bureaucracy finds it in its financial or other interest to do so. That takes considerable pressure applied by a strong organization. This the Gay/Lesbian community here in Wisconsin does not have.

Money available to community organizations is pitiful compared to what should be there. In Milwaukee, at least, there is no openly Lesbian or Gay man in a significant public office, no one who seems willing to run and no organization to help them if they did.

Until this changes, we can expect further abuses and defeats at the hands of our enemies.

Guest Editorial UW-Madison Faculty Stands Up For Wisconsin's Progressive Tradition

The recent vote by the University of Wisconsin-Madison Faculty recommending that the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) be removed from campus for its discrimination against homosexuals was a brave and principled stand. The vote of 386-248 sends a strong signal to the Board of Regents, which has final decision-making power, that arbitrary discrimination based on sexual orientation has no place in the academy, in the military or in society at large.

Mainstream media coverage of the vote focused almost exclusively on the potential loss of financial aid to those students enrolled in the ROTC program. But what of the greater loss to society in excluding the skills and leadership abilities of a whole class of citizens, based on criteria irrelevant to academic or military performance?

Critics suggest that the proper avenue for redressing this particular grievance is at the top, with the US Department of Defense. But Gays and Lesbians have been doing just that for years, with the cases of Miriam Ben-Shalom, Perry Watkins and Joe Steffen prominent examples. We will continue pressuring the top brass, but support from the grass roots is also essential in building consensus on this issue.

Wisconsin statute unequivocally prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation. University of Wisconsin policies likewise ban such discrimination. The UW Faculty's principled vote against the ROTC program as it stands today is therefore consistent with the law and with the proud and progressive tradition of the State of Wisconsin.

For the strides that the Gay/Lesbian community has made over the past 20 years have not only been fought for us as a minority community, but for all minority communities and individuals. The fight for human and civil rights have known no boundaries. They have been fought for all minorities to benefit from. Those in Wisconsin who have made strides in the AIDS crisis, have done so unconditionally. The concern in possible separation of minorities by the Gay and straight community is unfounded for it hasn't existed. Instead, there is a clear realization of the unity that has brought all minority communities dealing with AIDS together in Milwaukee as one community; a community living in the face of AIDS with strong support and dedication from both the Gay and straight community. Organizations such as the Milwaukee AIDS Project offers education and supportive services to the minority and IV

drug using community through programs such as street outreach, support groups, minority AIDS educators, religious support and life care.

Milwaukee, being one of the most supportive cities in terms of supporting all people with HIV infection, should not be questioned as to where our fight and compassion lay. Both the Gay/Lesbian and straight communities have come together in support of all people with AIDS and we should be proud of this.

Drag Need Not Slow Progress

I am replying to the letter by Sharon Gamble in your Nov. 30 to Dec 13 issue.

Upon reading and rereading Sharon's letter, I am unable to find a single argument with validity. While she has the right to her views, she has no good reason to actually believe them and no one has the right to act upon them beyond expressing them.

First of all, pointing out that some drag personae may typify sexist stereotypes does not prove that all or most drag outfits must typify sexist stereotypes. This kind of rash generalization is the root of all the rationalizations that are given for the bigotry that our community has been exposed to.

Second, it is both sexist and homophobic to deny that drag is a legitimate form of expression. There are straight as well as Gay transvestites. The reason a man — whatever his sexual orientation — can be oppressed for his choice of clothes is because of stereotypes our society holds about what men should be like — who they may sleep with, what they may wear, how aggressive and hairy and muscle-bound they must be to be men.

Wearing "female" clothes does not pander to heterosexist dogma, but in fact challenges it — challenges whether "female" clothing is exclusively female, challenges whether we have to go out of our way to depict our gender, challenges whether we have to go out of our way to avoid resembling another gender. It shows that a man can wear a dress and be a man — not that Gay men aren't men, and that the fact that some wear dresses proves it. Deep, deep down, every homophobe knows that under the dress of a male transvestite is a penis.

Accepting drag isn't political suicide; failing to recognize the extent to which we, in the community, still hold sexist and homophobic stereotypes and notions is the deepest form of political suicide there is — it threatens the unity of any movement in the long run, and it allows our own attitudes to deny us whatever freedom is gained from society and the government.

Third, the only image that homosexuals and bisexuals need to present is that of responsible, healthy, whole adults with the right and ability to choose their lifestyle, even if it is an alternative lifestyle. We do not need to prove that we aren't different — we need only prove that our difference is a valid expression of our common humanity. It is political suicide to cede any portion of what makes us different from the majority, in hopes that it will make us "acceptable"; it is political suicide to "earn" acceptance rather than to show that we deserve and have been denied it.

Finally, it is dumb to question how many closeted youngsters extended their period of denial because they weren't into drag, because it is only a question, one we can't answer. The only thing that closeted youngsters need to admit to themselves is that they are attracted to their own gender. Bisexuals, such as myself, have the potential to deny that we are attracted to our own gender because we are attracted to the other gender as well. Does this make us a liability too? It is political suicide for the community to sacrifice its internal minorities to hope that the mainstream will accept some of us; it allows the mainstream to view us as hypocrites who are not secure in our validity, but who only want options, not actual rights, for ourselves and our immediate friends and lovers. Sharon Gamble closes her letter by stating that we may harm the Gay rights struggle by giving coverage to drag. I conclude by stating that my above arguments prove that if we take her views and apply her advice, that we will ourselves be the ones to harm Gay rights. 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

[Milwaukee]- Approximately 30 members of Milwaukee's Lesbian/Gay community attended a social forum held at the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) on December 1, World AIDS Day, to learn, share and discuss AIDS/HIV prevention needs and to be updated on current programs underway.

Among the programs highlighted were the Drop-In Center. This is a new program to be implemented in January, 1990. There will be a Drop-In Center at the Community Center, 225 S. 2nd St., open on Fridays and Saturdays from 10:00 p.m.-2:00 a.m.

The objectives of the Drop-In Center will be to proved an outreach station for Stop AIDS Milwaukee and MAP. It will be a site for AIDS/HIV prevention information, resources and referrals. Brochures, materials and safer sex kits will be distributed. Brady East STD Clinic will provide periodic testing.

The Drop-In Center will also provide a safe environment for everyone by offering non-alcoholic refreshments.

Sometimes we need a place to "drop in," to take a breather, or just relax in a different setting when we go out. An Advisory Committee to meet for the

An Advisory Committee to meet for the first time in January, is being formed to assess the needs within our community and develop programs targeting specific population groups. Some groups include: people of color, womyn, youth and the bisexual community.

Other suggestions that surfaced at the forum included: re-activating the "Bartenders Against AIDS" program as well as a greater bar outreach; develop education/prevention programs aimed at the Lesbian community; develop programs/workshops with the various religious groups that are Lesbian/Gay affiliated.

"We need the support of the Lesbian/Gay bars, organizations and businesses in our efforts in promoting risk reduction in sex/behavior information and practices," said Michael Lisowski, the Gay/Lesbian Community Educator at MAP. "MAP needs your help," said Lisowski, "I need your help." Lisowski said he welcomes suggestions and hopes people will be willing to volunteer to become part of the effort in our community to help prevent the transmission of HIV through innovative education.


We as a Gay/Lesbian minority group need to be particularly careful of what we say about each other. What we say about each other can significantly help or hinder our main support group: each other.

What do the Catholic Church, Hallmark and "Say It With Flowers" have in common? All three know the value of "outward signs"; those things which have the power to convey meaning through their presence in our lives.

We in the Gay and Lesbian community have such outward signs by which we know one another. Pink Triangles are an obvious example which have been in use since Nazi Germany. Whenever I see them, I have a mixed emotional response... proud that the wearer is brave enough to wear such a symbol in public, yet sad when I remember the original purpose to which this outward sign was put.

Robin Tyler, feminist, comic, producer and emcee has suggested we use the Phoenix rising from its ashes as a powerful symbol instead.

Music by Gays and Lesbians is an outward sign for me. I use it for a number of different purposes. Some of the music gives me strength and support to enjoy my Lesbian choices. And the music comes in handy as a starting place to find other people who know these "outward signs." Mention Holly Near, Meg Christian, Chris Williamson, or Rominofsky and Phillips in conversation and see the response that you get. If your listener knows who you are talking about, chances are you have found someone else in the same club we are. (Not a sure bet, but at least it is a starting place.)

The Quilt has become a powerful symbol for many of us. So filled with love and remembering and tears. Too much for words. Such an outward sign of who we are in our love and community.

Pinkie rings have been used as a telltale sign that the wearer is gifted. I used to enjoy noticing who wore them...but now I see that just about everyone has this little finger jewelry on. But you always get to wonder, you know.


Where we meet and where we put our energies and who we know are also, somehow, connected to life symbols. I'm thinking of our meeting places and our organizations and the many women and men who have decided to use their talents to benefit our community.

Everything from the Pride Parade to LAMM, the Galano Club, Cream City Foundation, Brady East, MAP, the choruses, production companies and obvious "out" business owners. 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
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You Really Can't Be Gay -**Just A Little Confused!**

First of all, he's NOT even looking at you. He's cruising that cute guy standing a couple of feet in back of you. Actually, no offense (well, maybe a little), but I don't see one person in this whole place paying the least bit of attention to you. But then you're "REALLY not Gay anyway."

And stop snickering at my button. If



In case you haven't heard yet, there are a lot of excellent new books of interest to Lesbians. A good book always makes a wonderful gift-one that informs the mind and nourishes the soul, or simply delights the eye.

Here are a few titles to keep in mind for holiday gift giving:

A Lesbian Love Advisor by Celeste West

(Cleis Press, 190 pp., \$9.95)

This charming book covers everything from flirting to jealousy, from safe sex to drawing up an iron-clad will. Celeste West's ability to be both whimsical and resoundingly practical may remind you of Miss Manners, but fear not, gentle reader: this is a guide not top the "excruciatingly correct", but to "ecstatically correct" behavior for Lesbians in love. To quote the author, "Romance is a fine madness if you know precisely what is going on and can smile at its excesses and absurdities.'

The Love Advisor herself would caution against giving this book to your lover; it might be rude to imply that she needs advice on the topic of romance. Buy it for a friend or for yourself.

Diamonds Are A Dyke's Best Friend by **Yvonne** Zipter

(Firebrand, 223 pp., \$9.95)

This loving tribute to the Lesbian national pastime covers all the bases (pardon my pun). There are chapters on the history of women in softball, some of our first experiences of the game, love on the playing field, and a rhapsodic "pitch" on the sensual appeal of dykedom's favorite sport. An ideal gift for any player or fan.

Some Women

by Joan Didion, Introduction photographs by Robert Mapplethorpe

(Bulfinch, 119 pp., \$50.00)

Robert Mapplethorpe was best known for his photographs of men (and for his controversial S& M pictures, but he also pointed his camera at gentler subjects.

Some Women shows the late photographer's lyrical side. Always elegant, sometimes erotic, these pictures focus on the texture, form, strength and beauty of women's faces and bodies. Women of all ages are represented, among them Sigourney Weaver, Patti Smith and Louise Nevelson.

A few of the images smack of fetishism, but for the most part, they are simply lovely to look at.

Genet: A Biography of Janet Flanner by Brenda Wineapple

Ticknor& Fields, 361 pp., \$24.95

Like many American Lesbians in the 1920's, Janet Flanner and her lover, Solita Solano, went to Paris to escape the sexual repression they found in the United States. Janet soon landed a job as The New Yorker's Paris correspondent, a job she would keep for fifty years. "Genet" is the pseudonym given to her by the magazine's editor, Harold Ross.

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Flanner is a very human subject: we often find her fretting over her abilities as a writer or trying to juggle two or three lovers in different countries. But what also comes across are her intelligence and wit and a terrific sense of style, qualities that made her the ideal writer to report and comment on Parisian life for readers in America.

Anyone who read Darlinghissima, a volume of Janet Flanner's letters to her lover, Natalia Danesi Murray, will want to read this biography as well. Genet is a very thorough portrait of an elegant, complicated twentieth century Lesbian.

1950's Bodybuilder; Magazines **Featured in New Book**


Do you remember Glenn Bishop? Maybe if you're bumping 40 - or have pushed it to one side on your way passed, you do and remember how magnificently beautiful he was, glowing with a dark simmering sensuality that wouldn't quit.

If he and others like him - Mark Nixon, for example, Leigh Rutledge is about to give you a most delightful trip down memory lane.

On December 15, Alyson Publications of Boston, MA will release Rutledge's new book titled The Gay Fireside Companion. Rutledge is the author of the best-selling "The Gay Book of Lists" and "Unnatural Quotations"

In this, his latest work, he focuses on the body-building magazines of the late '50s and '60s that nourished a lot of pre-Stonewall fantasies and laid the groundwork of more explicit Gay skin mags. Here are a few examples excerpted from the book.

Adonis, subtitled "The Art Magazine of the Male Physique" styled itself as "dedicated to man's desire to improve his face and figure." Adonis featured handsome, muscular young models in posing straps or sometimes, completely nude, but only from the back. The magazine first started publishing in 1951. In 1958, Adonis and Body Beautiful were combined to create a single magazine, The Young Physique. By the mid-1960's, Young Physique was becoming more and more openly Gay. Tomorrow's Man, popular physique magazine of the 1950's and '60s, subtitled "The International Magazine of Bodybuilding." It began publishing in 1952. Tomorrow's Man which, like other physique magazines, stressed muscular development, featured photos of professional bodybuilders as well as some of the best physique photographers of the period. Amid the photos of beautiful eighteen-year-olds shirtless in tight jeans or posing straps, were articles on masturbation, circumcision and other sexual matters. In 1983, Gay porn star Richard Locke spoke for many of his generation when he said that Tomorrow's Man was one of his favorite magazines to masturbate to when he was growing up. Muscles a Go-Go a cover of which



appears with this article (now do you remember Glenn Bishop?), more explicitly Gay than n lished st pi in February, 1966. Muscles a Go-Go featured model layouts under such titles as "He's Butch!" and "Oh Mary, They're Hairy!'



ACT-UP Marches On St. Patrick's In New York

[New York, NY]- At 9:30 a.m., Sunday, December 10, 1989, thousands of protesters surrounded St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City to challenge Cardinal O'Connor and the Roman Catholic hierarchy for their interference in public policy concerning AIDS, abortion and the religious influence that persecutes Gays and women in society.

The demonstration is being sponsored by ACT-UP New York and Women's Health Action and Mobilization (WHAM).

In a press release, ACT-UP New York charged that while the Roman Church professes compassion for Gays and Lesbians with AIDS, it is, in practice, teaching intolerance and hatred.

The Church hierarchy is also charged with conducting a "zealous war" against abortion in which it seeks to deny to women the right to their own bodies.

According to Victor Mendolia, ACT-UP activist and one of the protest organizers, "Morality is not a substitute for education and religious doctrine is not political policy." Happy Holidays & Best Wishes For a prosperous New Year

Gays and Lesbians In The Armed Forces Need Our Help Now

[Washington, D.C.]- Following the October 18 release of "Nonconforming Sexual Orientations and Military Suitability," an internal Department of Defense (DoD) report which openly criticizes the DoD policy of excluding and discharging Gay men and Lesbians from the Armed Forces, the Pentagon is extremely vulnerable to political pressure to rescind its homophobic and dangerous policy.

Please help Gay men and Lesbians in the Armed Forces by contacting your congressional representatives today!

Your Senators and Representatives need to hear from constituents that the Pentagon must implement all recommendations of what is known as the "PERSEREC Report," authored by Theodore Sarbin and Kenneth Karols.

The authors state, "Under prevailing social conditions, a public admission of "omosexuality carries less stigma than in earlier times and is no legal bar to most employment... Our studied conclusion is that the military services will soon be asked by the courts or the Congress to re-examine their policies and practices regarding recruitment and retention of men and women whose sexual interests deviate from the customary."

The PERSEREC Report invites Congressional intervention to drag the Pentagon kicking and screaming into the 1990's. Urge your Congressional representatives to work for rescission of the DoD policy of exclusion and discharge. This policy, which declares that "homosexuality is incompatible with military service," was established in 1943 and has accounted for the early discharges- many of them under less than honorable conditions-of 100,000 men and women. Additionally, a 1989 Gallup poll indicated that 60% of respondents believed that Gay men and Lesbians should be allowed to serve in the Armed Forces.

There Is Much To Celebrate During the Christmas Season

Have you caught the Christmas spirit, yet? Personally, I love Christmas; it is my favorite time of year. But I am aware that some who will read this are in anything but a festive mood! The holidays are, for many, very difficult. With all the Madison Avenue hype, one would believe that only the jolly and wealthy can properly celebrate Christmas. I believe the real spirit of Christmas, however, can be cherished and celebrated by those who are anything but jolly and wealthy. Whatever you may personally believe about the celebration of the birth of Jesus of Nazareth, his life and teachings have something to say to you this Christmas. So, if you find yourself misunderstood, lonely, poor, or in pain because of illness or grief, Christmas has something for you.



Gay people are often misunderstood by families and friends, certainly by society in general. Our very characters are often questioned. Jesus was no different. Was there anyone whose very being was more misunderstood than Jesus of Nazareth? His closest followers wanted him to be a political revolutionary, yet Jesus saw his mission as one of leading people toward an inner peace that would overflow into the life of the world.

Jesus was not out to change systems, primarily. His was the work of changing people who ran the systems-and thus true justice would reign. His own family thought Jesus was mad. (Perhaps a not uncommon thought among some parents when their own sons and daughters come out to them!)

Finally, history testifies (yes, Jesus was a historical figure-bona fide at thatand he did die a violent death) that Jesus was crucified on the basis of false accusations.

But the gift of Christmas for those who feel misunderstood is the reality that when one is working for a just cause, ultimately truth and justice will prevail.

Today we honor Jesus as a person of integrity and, most of all, love. History has vindicated the person of Jesus. It has shown that he lived with integrity-with uncommon faithfulness to his convictions-and stands as a person to be modeled. In our quest for justice and fairness, we may not be understood today, but the great story of Christmas tells us that when a cause that is just is presented truthfully and lovingly- truth, love and justice will prevail. People will come to understand. Some of us may feel very alone and lonely. The entire Christmas story is one of aloneness-no place for a baby's birth, far from home, strangers-especially when he died for his cause. Yet it is the message of Jesus that has lifted millions from loneliness. Jesus' life was one of involvement in the lives of others who needed the compassion and love he had to give. When we step outside of ourselves, outside of our own personal concerns, we find that life becomes richer and less lonely. For some in the Gay community, the message may well be that we need to step beyond trying to find Mr. or Ms. Right and become involved in the lives of people who need us. What contemporary figure is more loved and revered today than Mother Teresa? She did not go into India looking for love, but looked, instead, for those who needed to be loved. She found

what she needed following Jesus' formula. Christmas speaks to the lonely and calls us all to stretch beyond ourselves and become involved in the lives of others, and our spiritual disconnectedness-which is what loneliness is-will fade.

Some of us are poor and Madison Avenue would have us believe that Christmas can't really be celebrated by the poor; yet Jesus was poor-homeless and without a lot of cash-and still we know that Jesus was one of the richest people who ever lived. Jesus taught us that the real gifts-gifts that last-are gifts of the heart. So you can't buy gifts this year for your friends and loved ones. A thoughtful note of appreciation for their friendship and love may be the best gift you could give them.

Share your time and listen to them-really listen- for their joys and pains. Care - let them know that they really matter - and you will have given them the best gifts they could receive. Anyone who cannot receive the true and lasting treasures that we can bring in our human vessels, one who expects material gifts as a sign of caring and friendship, has misplaced values. There is only one gift you can give that cannot be taken away or that will not ultimately decay or break - that is the gift of yourself. Share from that richness as Jesus did and you will be making others infinitely rich!

Some in our community are in pain because of disease or grief because a dear lover or friend, son or daughter, has died or is dying. The specter of AIDS certainly dampens our holidays. But even here, the message of Christmas is one of hope.

Jesus' own painful death gives us a glimmer of hope. We can see that those who are dying or grieving are not forgotten by the Eternal Spirit we call God. If you believe that this life is all there is, we still know that the good we've done does outlive us - as it continues in the lives of others.

If we have touched only one person for good, then there is still a legacy that we leave behind. We live on in them, and have left them and the world a little better place.

And if we grieve the loss of a loved one, Christmas teaches us that the best way to enshrine those whom we mourn, is to live to be our best selves - to live from the source of the love and strength of our loved one - and make this a better world.

Of course, if you believe that Jesus is not dead, but that the tomb is empty and that the faith of the disciples is true, you know that Jesus came to awaken us to the gift of eternal life. Death for a person with that kind of faith is a door to a deeper, more serene existence. Our sorrow is for ourselves - for our loss - but a temporary loss, at that. For sorrow will one day be ended as will misunderstanding, loneliness, poverty and death. All because of Christmas. So, if you think that you don't have anything to celebrate this Christmas, maybe it's because you haven't Christmas' message to you. examined

Questioning Authority Remains Vital

TO THE EDITOR:

Re: Abortion Question authority. One would think that after the big lies fed us in the century, we might be more cautious in believing people and agencies who parade themselves around as images of public trust, like government, capitalism and the church. One issue might be well to remember: agencies exist for **their own** convenience and agendas **as institutions**. Capitalism cares not one wit for the product, the customer or the employees. Government fears open hearings and investigations into its workings.

And church leadership? Check out Matthew 23:9 for a taste of hypocracy ("And call no man father on earth, for you have one Father, who is in heaven."). Indeed, the whole point of Matthew, chapter 23 is that leaders of religion have led their flock, if not to slaughter, at least astray.

Fortunately, it is easy to attack the enemy **outside** our community, but we are, naturally, reluctant to question people **inside** our community who have been given a public trust. We should not be mindless in our support of single-issue Gay supportive elected legislators who are reactionary conservatives on most all other issues. It may be time to seek better candidates who are consistant in their progressive agendas rather than the new politicians we see emerging in "politically correct" Madison, especially in the area of abortion.

THOU SHALT NOT KILL, curiously, did not mean what it seems to mean when it is understood in its historic context. The ancient Hebrews killed their enemies and fellow Hebrews who violated their law ("Let him who is without sin cast the first stone."). And they seemed to have killed with God's approval!

It would seem, then, to take a reading of Scripture OUT OF CONTEXT, i.e. IN ISOLATION is a misrepresentation of the original intent and meaning. How about David's slaughter of the recently circumsized Phillistine soldiers? Ouch! He and other Hebrews, like Judith, got lots of strokes for being sneaky and killing. When the community is threatened, it seems it was okay to kill, in God's name, of course. And then there is church history and the Crusades and the German church's complicity with Hitler. Hey! It all depends WHO does what, right? QUESTION AUTHORITY.

If bible pounders are going to use the Scriptures in their arguments against us, we might well use the best scholarship in biblical studies to pound their arguments to dust and show what hypocrites they are for trying to use an authority to hide their own bias.

And while we're on the subject of the Scriptures, what's **their** authority? Angels whispering in the ears of mortal man? Have **you** been hearing voices could be further from the truth. Gay and Lesbian couples — and their children are genuine families. They share with all families the traditional values of love, caring and mutual support.

The truth is, Gay and Lesbian couples are already marrying one another in both religious and secular ceremonies. According to preliminary results of our national survey of Gay and Lesbian couples, 16 percent of female couples and 10 percent of male couples had "ritualized their relationship with ceremony." More than one-third had executed legal agreements to protect their relationship. (Results based on 812 respondents.)

Unfortunately, these couples cannot choose to legally marry and depend on existing laws to support their family life. The legal contracts we make can replicate only some of the protections that are automatic with marriage.

And this inequity is far-reaching. At least 10 million Americans are in same-sex relationships, judging from a recent **San Francisco Examiner** poll that found 60 percent of Gay men and Lesbians in relationships.

Our society should support these Gay and Lesbian families for the same reasons we support traditional families. Functional families make better neighbors and more productive citizens.



New Code of Conduct For Judges Proposed

[Boston, Mass.]- The new code of ethics for judges will include a ban against discrimination based on sexual orientation if the National Gay and Lesbian Law Association has its way. Board member Suzanne Bryant testified in Washington, D.C. before the American Bar Association committee which is currently revising the ethics code.

Bryant described the current "epidemic of violence" against Lesbians and Gay men "who are often reluctant to report crimes because they fear they may, like rape victims, be victimized a second time by the judicial system.'

Other testimony at the hearing showed that the justice system is not always impartial when it comes to Lesbians and Gay men.

In a 1987 pre-trial hearing in Fort Lauderdale, a victim of a Gay-bashing was asked by Judge Daniel Futch, "That's a crime now, to beat up a homosexual?" The judge later said he was kidding.

The frightening implication of a remark like this is that Gay people are fair game. If the Code of Judicial Conduct is revised to include a ban against judicial discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation, judges will be accountable if they fail to provide equal justice under the law


