The United is an agency designed to serve the needs of Lesbians, Gay men and Bisexuals in Madison and throughout the state of Wisconsin. The United provides workshops, individual counseling, resource information, and a library, in addition to serving as a public voice for the LesBiGay community.

"Pride and Power" is a five year plan for growth and outreach involving expansion of workshops and the library, media trainings, new grant development, creation of a "learning center," and extensive networking throughout Wisconsin. Some of the many issues The United will tackle, include health concerns and HIV/AIDS, media sophistication, same-sex marriage legislation, and hatecrimes, as well as expanded outreach to disenfranchised LesBiGay groups like rural men and women, teens and seniors.

The 1990's have been both an exciting and scary time for the LesBiGay community. Our visibility has increased dramatically and with that, the need for the services of The United," said Board President, Dale Johnson. "For example, in just two years we've more than doubled the number of people who we serve. More than 18,000 people will utilize our resources in 1994 alone

"I don't know about that," was the reply. So the next time you see those ads and dream of a weekend in some fantasy-like place, such as Sybaris, with your honey, forget it. Sybaris is a heterosexual couples only kind of place.

On Sept. 13, Vote For Matt Gunderson in the U.S. Senate Race

Not for the first time, Wisconsin Light is urging its readers to vote for a Republican. Now we are urging it again. This time, we strongly suggest that voters cast their ballots in the September 13 Primary, for Matt Gunderson, Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate. We take this position for the following reasons:

1. Gunderson has assured us that he supports the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA) and would become a co-sponsor if elected to the Senate.

2. He has told us that he would have voted against the Helms-Hancock amendment to the Education bill. If passed, this amendment would have potentially catastrophic effects on LesBiGay teens.

3. He has said that he is solidly Pro-Choice.

4. He has told us, and made public statements, that he supported President Clinton's

original intention to life the ban on LesBiGays in the military.

5. But, to our mind, most importantly of all, he has said that he believes that Wisconsin's law preventing discrimination against Lesbians, Bisexuals and Gay men (AB 70) should be extended to the nation as a whole. He has said that, if elected, he will work toward this, becoming a co-sponsor of the federal legislation that would guarantee Les-BiGavs our civil rights.

We realize that for many, voting for Gunderson in the up-coming Primary, will mean a cross-over vote. We realize too that if you cannot switch back and forth between Republicans and Democrats on the ballot. But we believe that it is urgent that you do vote for Gunderson.

We are convinced that the incumbent, Sen. Herb Kohl, has betrayed us right and left and that he will continue to do so. We believe that he has no one's interests at heart except his own. We believe that it is time to end Kohl's term in office. We do not like having a hypocrite there. Voting for Matt Gunderson is the way to begin the process of stopping Kohl.

Media Attention May Have Driven Alleged Serial Killer Gary Ray Bowles From State

(Milwaukee)- In an update to our front page, lead headline story of last issue about alleged serial killer, Gary Ray Bowles, the FBI says that media attention may have driven Bowels from the state.

But this is only a "maybe," according to Brian Manganello, a spokesman for the Milwaukee bureau of the FBI. Manganello told Light that they didn't know where Bowles was, but Manganello asserted that if he were still in the Milwaukee area, "We would have caught him.

Media coverage was extensive. Not only was Bowles' picture and description widely covered, but the FBI put his picture up in all of the Milwaukee bars.

The search received national attention as well. It was profiled on "America's Most Wanted.'

Manganello told Light that the FBI had received numerous leads, all of which had been "run out," but "nothing substantial" had turned up. There were a lot of "look alikes,"

Asked if they thought Bowles had left Wisconsin, Manganello said that no one could be sure, but "the case remains open," he said.

Bowles original venue was on the east coast, where he traveled up and down I-94. It was only within the last month, that he turned west and was seen in Springfield, Illinois. He

was sighted next in Kenosha and finally, Milwaukee.

Manganello said that besides being wanted by various local police departments on murder charges, he is wanted on a federal warrant of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

Manganello urged anyone with any information to call the FBI at (414) 276-4684.

Bowles has been called "a predator." He is armed and considered extremely dangerous. Do not take action yourself, but call the FBI or the local police.

"The AIDS community is large and diverse and we will not let anyone divide us," Nelson said. "This Walk will always serve the broadest representation of the AIDS community and that definitely includes ACT UP Milwaukee and Camp Heartland, the Hemophilia Foundation, the Hispanic AIDS Coalition, and 16 other agencies that will benefit from this

Nelson singled out praise for the strong Walk commitment that is being demonstrated by the Madison AIDS Support Network (MASN) and Center Project, Inc., in Green Bay. He enthusiasticly predicted that record numbers of people will come to this year's Walk from the Madison and Green Bay areas.

Library is Repository for Lesbian and Gay History

Chicago-AP- The Gerber-Hart Library and Archives isn't as abounding in books and manuscripts as many libraries, but the subject matter of its literature fills a void. Gerber-Hart is believed to be the only library on Gay history in America's heartland. There are similar institutions on both coasts. "We're here to serve a unique need," said Kevin Boyer, the library's board president. "We provide a safe space for people who want to look at materials that are Gay and Lesbian-related. Our patrons know they are not going to have to ask a presumably heterosexual librarian for The Joy of Gay Sex.

The Library's mere existence on Chicago's North Side indicates there is a growing consensus that Gay history is an area worthy of serious study. Michael Sherry, a history professor at Northwestern University, who has taught Gay history for more than 10 years, says Gay history has not only been ignored and suppressed: It was not even considered a field of study because homosexuality was seen as a phenomenon that didn't have a history.

Gerber-Hart serves several functions, but it is first a lending library. About 250 members pay \$25 a year for the right to check out any of its 8,000 volumes of Gay-oriented non-fiction and literature.

Japan Holds Its First Gay Pride Parade

Tokyo-AP- Coming out of the closet and into the street, Gays and Lesbians on August 28, staged the first-ever Gay Pride Parade in Japan. While the turnout of more than 1,000 participants was smaller than such parades in New York or San Francisco, organizers were pleased since they had originally received only 300 applications. The three mile route took nearly three hours to traverse in scorching 91-degree heat. There were no protests nor harassment.

First Openly Gay Ambassador to be Appointed

Los Angeles--The Advocate reports that the Clinton Administration is gearing up to appoint openly Gay San Francisco philanthropist James Hormel ambassador to Fiji, a move that would make him the first openly Gay person to receive an ambassadorship. Hormel-heir to a meatpacking fortune amassed through development of the once-again-trendy Spam--has backed several causes and groups, including National Gay Rights Advocates, a now-defunct public interest law firm.

Congressman's Remarks Upset Gay Groups

Chicago-AP- U.S. Rep. Mel Reynolds is being criticized by Gay and Lesbian groups for saying that the teenager with whom he's accused of having an affair is a Lesbian and a devil worshiper. But Reynolds' attorney, Edward M. Genson, said the comment about the teenager being a Lesbian "wasn't a negative comment on her lifestyle choice. Instead it's showing that what she's saying is less likely to have occurred," Genson said. Reynolds, who represents Chicago's South Side and some suburbs, has been hit with a 20-count indictment alleging that he had sex with the woman while she was still a minor.

Reynolds is one of about 150 Congressional co-sponsors of the Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA), which would bar bias based on sexual orientation.

Canadian Customs Seizes Gay/Lesbian Books

Vancouver-AP- Canadian customs has seized two more shipments of books sent to a Vancouver Gay and Lesbian bookstore on suspicion that they were obscene. The books include a children's book, Belinda's Bouquet, a biography of Noel Coward and an exchange of letters between poets Byron and Shelley. "This is the fifth time for us that it has been seized," said Janine Fuller, owner of Little Sister's Book and Art Emporium, adding that the store has previously appealed and won.

Thailand Urged to Strengthen Laws To Protect People Living with AIDS

Bangkok-AP- Thailand should give the same legal protection to foreign children forced into prostitution in Bangkok that it gives to youngsters of Thai nationality, a human rights activist said. Vitit Muntarbhorn, the U.N. special investigator on the sale of children, told a seminar on AIDS and child rights that the government refused to recognize the rights of non-Thai children smuggled into Thailand from around Asia and the world. These children are sold and trafficked across frontiers. Child prostitutes are increasingly popular among customers who mistakenly believe that their youth makes them less likely to be HIV carriers. Vitit said that there were more than 600,000 HIV-positive Thais with up to 6,000 children joining their ranks each year.

SEC Sues Company that Deals in Insurance Bene- fits for AIDS Victims

Washington, D.C.-AP- The Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) has sued the leading dealer of agreements that allow people living with AIDS and other terminally ill people to collect cash on their life insurance policies while still alive. In a suit filed in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., the SEC charged that the dealings of Life Partners Inc., of Waco Texas, and its president, Brian Pardo, amount to selling unregistered securities to investors.

The issue concerns the growing business of viatical settlements, in which the terminally ill sign over parts of their life insurance policies at a cut rate to investors who receive the proceeds when the patient dies. The \$300 million market allows severely ill people a source of much needed cash. The SEC suit said Life Partners purchases the rights of death benefits. The company then repackages these benefits and sells them to investors. When the insured person dies, Life Partners collects the death benefit paid from the insurance policy and distributes it to the investors.

"Through their sale efforts, LPI has sold millions of dollars worth of such unregistered securities to hundreds of investors in the U.S. and abroad," the SEC charged. The suit seeks a court order to prevent Life Partners from dealing in the viatical policies.

'CultureWatch': Keeping a Wary Eye On the Not Since the Days of **Religious Right**

Want to find out who's screwing whom-figuratively and literally--in the Religious Right? Or from whence came the rise of Black conservatism? Or just how successful the Religious Right is at mainstreaming itself? Want to do it without wading through reams of nauseating right-wing propaganda or subscribing to every progressive periodical on the planet? Well then, CultureWatch, an monthly

newsletter, may be just the thing for you.

CultureWatch, an annotated bibliography on culture, arts and political affairs, was founded by Bill Berkowitz, Nicole Hayward and April Evans a year ago. The newsletter, drawing on almost 400 sources across the political spectrum, from the Christian Coalition to Z Magazine, and including all the mainstream media in between, offers news briefs on the world of the Right Wing.

"Right now I am sitting here with Christian Coalition newsletters," said editor/founder Berkowitz, adding, "I have got TVC Etc., Family Voice, the magazine of Concerned Women of America. Then we have publications from Focus on the Family, Morality in the Media, and a multitude of other newsletters from Right Wing organizations.

Instead of requiring (or forcing) avid fundie-watchers to pore over hundreds of articles to extract the information they need, CultureWatch and Berkowitz do all the work. The newsletter is made up of short, concise, readable "and occasionally funny" abstracts of actual articles. If so inclined, subscribers can then order the originals from The DataCenter-the bibliography's parent organization, which is based in Oakland, California. The DataCenter is a progressive databank, library and research center, which has provided information ammunition to social, sexual and political movements for the last 19 years.

CultureWatch, which deals with the confrontation between the political Right and the Religious Right and the rest of society, is divided into three sections: Arts and Censorship, Politics and Culture, and Organizations and Individuals. Each section contains a dozen or so abstracts on each topic.

Berkowitz says the newsletter was started with a grant from the Nathan Cummings Foundation as a censorship-watch and artsbashing monitor for the National Endowment for the Arts and other artistic groups which have suffered near-constant bombardment from the Right especially since the Map-plethorpe brouhaha. Berkowitz took the idea and ran with it: "We are trying to provide a vehicle for the arts community, to see [that] the attacks on the arts are part of a much bigger picture.

"It is unbelievable what is going on out there, the amount of publications and resources [the Right has]," says Berkowitz. "It is pretty damn frightening on every level. I don't want to convey that level of fright, but I do want to convey that level of information.'

April Evans, CultureWatch's distribution manager, says, "As a Lesbian...one of the things that interests me is getting up-to-date information on anti-Gay stuff." She is also proud of the newsletter's holistic approach, saying that CultureWatch contains information on racism, sexism and homophobia, which, in total, makes clear the Right Wing's overall assault on civil rights.

Anne Frank: Fifty Years Later

This Summer is, seemingly, the 50th, 30th, 25th, or 20th anniversary of most of the important events of this Century. Unfortunately, passing unnoticed is the 50th anniversary of one of the saddest events of this, or any other, century: the arrest and deportation of Anne Frank, her family, and their companions in hiding. On August 4, 1944, the Gestapo broke in to the "Secret Annex" at 263 Prinsengracht in Amsterdam.

Stephen Spielberg's Schindler's List accurately illustrated greed as great a motivation among Nazis as hate. Anne's father, Otto, the only member of the Secret Annex eight to survive the war, said the first thing the Gestapo asked upon breaking in was "Where are your valuables hidden?"

Instead of being thrown down the stairs immediately as one might imagine, the eight Jews stood by almost forgotten as the Gestapo ransacked their quarters looking for anything of value. Worthless to the Nazis, Anne's diary was left in a heap of belongings on the floor.

Anne started keeping her legendary journal at the same time most people start keeping one, at puberty. Little else about her diary is typical.

She started it in June, 1942 when Holland had already been under German occupation for over two years and just weeks before her family went into hiding. Her first diary entry reads: "I hope I shall be able to confide in you completely, as I have never been able to do in anyone before, and I hope that you will be a great support and comfort to me.

Has there ever been a more eloquent or exact description of why one keeps a journal?

It was Anne's dream to be a great writer and so she was. Her diary isn't the quaint musings of an adolescent who accidentally gained immortality. Rather, it is a brilliant document from the soul of a supremely intelligent young woman; wise far beyond her years.

Trapped in a small space with seven other

people, unable to go outside under pain of death, she channeled her exceptional spirit on to the pages of her journal, the only place she could give it free reign.

Back in high school, many of us read the original English translation of The Diary of Anne Frank with its famous introduction by Eleanor Roosevelt. That version was heavily edited by Anne's father and its publishers. Among the topics left out were long passages detailing her sexual awakening.

Remarkably, a passage where Anne dis-

On January 5, 1944, she mentions a past romantic encounter with her best friend. She also writes "I go into ecstasies every time I see the naked figure of a woman. I have difficulty not letting tears roll down my cheeks. If only I had a girlfriend!"

For decades, Anne has given a face and voice to the two million Jewish children murdered by Adolf Hitler. She can also represent the untold number of Gays, Lesbians and Bisexuals who may not have died wearing the Pink Triangle, but were murdered by the Nazis just the same.

The movie, The Diary of Anne Frank, directed by George Stevens, is based on the play which itself is a sanitized version of the already edited book. An excellent film, it nonetheless only scratches the surface of Anne's spirit. I remember Lou Jacobi and Shelly Winters as Mr. And Mrs. Van Daan better than Millie Perkin's Anne.

On September 3, 1944, Anne and her family were put on a train for Aushwitz. According to survivors who remember her in captivity, she was often smiling and full of life. She died in early 1945.

Today, genocide, neo-Nazi, and other hate movements are on the march again. We revere Anne's memory when we resist them at every turn. Anne once wrote, "I want to live on after death." And so she does.

Rasputin, for example, who didn't let gender interfere with the pleasures of sex, kept a private room in a gaslight and shadow place where he entertained guests. Among them were the young nobleman and his lover who would eventually do him in.

Then came the Soviets, a puritanical, stiff-

necked crew, and turned out the lights. They closed down the bars and the clubs and outlawed homosexuality.

But times change. Gay life is beginning to bloom again in Russia. There are even tours to see what it's like.

One that comes highly recommended is being offered by Different Strokes Tours of New York. They're offering a 10-day tour beginning October that includes Moscow and St. Petersburg with chances to meet local Gay

Realistically, either Herb Kohl or his Republican opponent will be elected to the Senate. The other Republican candidates would be no improvement over Kohl. In fact a couple of them, Zueske and Welch may well be even worse. Its hard to believe I know, but

No to Home Access HIV Test Kits

TO THE EDITOR:

The commentary by Sean O. Strub of POZ magazine (August 18-Light) advocating home access HIV test kits raised some of the same issues in my mind as a Milwaukee Journal editorial of 6/30/94 on the same subject. I my judgment, at least four important issues should be raised, as I have previously done "In My Opinion" response to the Journal on July 18th:

There may be a need for home access HIV test kits in some areas, but that need does not exist in southeastern Wisconsin, especially, metropolitan Milwaukee. BestD Clinic, in addition to 10 other anonymous HIV counseling and testing sites is readily available and accessible in our six county area.

Home access HIV testing does not provide the face-to-face counseling and client-specific referrals to bring about risk reduction or intervention to those infected--the major resource we presently have in response to HIV disease and AIDS.

 Many of those most at risk for HIV infection and transmission cannot afford the fees to purchase home kits

4. The process of anonymity can be seriously flawed with the rapid availability of "caller ID" and telephone listings, where home test discussions are carried by phone.

Mr. Strub's views may not be unbiased and objective since he has a potential conflict of interest. According to the June-July issue of POZ, the magazine is published by Strubco, Inc., a direct marketing, consulting and publishing firm based in New York. Direct Access Diagnostics, the Johnson & Johnson Company developing the home access kit for sale, has been a Strubco client since October, 1993.

In view of all of the above, while home test kits may be a resources for some in specific areas of the nation, on-site HIV antibody counseling and testing remains the primary, most effective and reasonable weapon we have to fight HIV disease and transmis-

No To Kohl

TO THE EDITOR:

I enjoyed the commentary written by Bill Meunier in a recent issue, dealing with the continued betrayal of Senator Herb Kohl, as well as the editorial and news articles on this same topic.

I'd like to expand on a point made by Bill, make a strong recommendation in the process. He mentioned that there is a Republican candidate who has expressed views supportive of many Gay and Lesbian issues in Matt Gunderson. Unfortunately, Mr. Gunderson is not regarded as the front runner in his Party's primary; that position is usually acceded to State Rep. Bob Welch or State Treasurer Cathy Zeuske, neither of whom is supportable by anyone interested in civil rights and civil liberties.

The conservative/religious right have shown us that in recent years.

I hope other Lesbians and Gay men will make the same choice, as well as parents of Gay men and Lesbians and other friends and allies. Herb Kohl deserves nothing from Gay men and Lesbians.

Any other minority group member should take notice--if the polls suggest backing away from you, wave bye-bye to Herb. He can't be trusted; he's nobody's Senator but his own. And, even if one looks at the bigger picture, there's nothing there! He's a dud.

If Matt Gunderson wins the Primary Election, I'll work for his election. If he loses, I'll not vote for that office in November, even if it looks like Welch or Zeuske might prevail. At this point in my life, I'm much more interested in being represented by principled elected officials and much less in self-serving, wishy-washy politicians with their fingers in the air.

(College Park, MD)- An independent study at the University of Maryland at College Park on the impact of anti-Gay job discrimination has found that Gay men and Lesbians earn less than their non-Gay counterparts with similar education, training and occupations. The findings refute the stereotype of Gay people as an "affluent elite" unworthy of equal rights under the law.

Federal civil rights laws do not protect Americans from being fired, refused work, paid less or otherwise treated unfairly in the job market solely because of their sexual ori-

The study, "Economic Evidence of Sexual Orientation Discrimination," marks the first scientific economic research conducted on the problem of job discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.

The study found that Gay men earned 11 to 27 percent less than non-Gay counterparts with similar age, education, occupation, marital status and residence.

Lesbians earned five to 14 percent less.

The study will appear in the upcoming edition of the peer-reviewed journal Industrial and Labor Relations Review, published at Cornell University.

"Far from having some mysterious advantage in the labor market, Gay workers face discrimination that actually hits them where it hurts--in their paychecks," said School of Public Affairs Professor Lee Badgett, who studied data from the General Social Survey, a national random sample of the U.S. population collected by the National Opinion Research Center at the University of Chicago. Badgett's study applied research methods developed in the study of race and sex discrimination to the area of sexual orientation.

"The stereotype of Gay prosperity is based on marketing surveys of Gay magazine readers and people attending Gay events. Those marketing surveys are biased toward people with higher incomes," Badgett said.

"Representative data and statistical techniques reveal an economically diverse Lesbian and Gay male community with people who are poor as well as rich, with most falling in the middle. The real economic difference between Gay and straight Americans is the daily struggle of Lesbians and Gay men against the psychological and economic effects of discrimination.

Study Results Questioned

Not everyone, however, agrees with the study's conclusions.

The Point One Management Company, a Gay owned and operated company that markets a national Gay and Lesbian credit card program, has questioned the accuracy and methodology used in the study.

Point One cites a recent survey done by Overlooked Opinions of Chicago in which 20,000 persons were surveyed. They found that the average Gay male household's annual income is \$51,325, and that the average Lesbian household's annual income is \$45,827. These figures were compared with the overall annual average household income of \$36,520.

Figures from Simmons Market Research and the U.S. Census Bureau reflect an average Gay male annual household income of \$55,430 as compared with the overall national average household income of \$32,144.

Further, estimates of the annual buying power and consumer market share of the 18 million member Lesbian and Gay community ranged from \$394 billion to \$514 billion.

Indiana State Trooper with AIDS Shunned by Comrades

(Versailles, IN)- Timothy George Poling was the all-American Boy, a red-blooded kid from small town Indiana whose world was built around all those values the Christian Right talks about.

Bright, good-looking and attracted to the world of law enforcement, he was supposed to rise proudly through the ranks of the Indiana State Police.

According to the "standard scenario" he was supposed to get married, have kids and live a long and very traditional life. Life is like that in small-town Indiana.

But fate rewrote the script.

Instead of a wife, he realized that he'd been born Gay.

Instead of a ripe old age, he died a fragile remnant of his former self, after only 30 years, one month and 28 days of life.

On January 28, 1994, Tim became the first known Indiana State Trooper to die of complications due to AIDS.

Tim had always wanted to be a Trooper and less than a year after he graduated from Indiana University, his dream came true. He was notified that he'd been selected for the 45th recruit class of the State Police.

He worked hard and it paid off. In 1987, he became a probationary Trooper assigned to the Toll Road district in the northern part of the state.

On the surface, things couldn't have been better-or so it seemed. Tim dated several women and announced plans to marry.

But he carried a secret that haunted him.

In conservative Indiana, he'd been able to conceal it, even to deny it to himself. He lived in the closet by day. By night, his need to be with other Gay men led him to a Gay bar. There he met a man named Ron and fell in

Tim and Ron dated. Tim called his engagement off. He wanted to live life to the fullest and with Ron, he thought that finally he had that chance.

When Tim transferred to Indianapolis in early 1990, he and Ron moved in together. This was his coming out period, though he wasn't ready to make an announcement to his fellow Troopers.

Among Tim's closer police friends were Max Weber and his wife Cindy. Did they

"Some individuals kind of had the feeling that he might be homosexual," Max Weber said. "But nobody was really sure. We got along good. Tim was outgoing and likable. He could do the job."

Tim was a handsome guy. In the apartment complex where he and Ron lived, there was a woman who became obsessed with him, Ron said. She sent him cards and letters all the time and wouldn't let him alone.

When Tim refused to have anything to do with her, the woman told Tim's superiors that he was one among several men who gangraped her at a party in the apartment clubhouse.

Tim was relieved from patrol duty and assigned as a temporary dispatcher while he was investigated. Although cleared of the rape

complaint, Tim didn't seem the same way afterward.

His energy seemed to be draining away.

"He started losing weight, and we couldn't
nderstand why," Ron said.

understand why," Ron said.

Early in 1991, Tim underwent tests and learned the answer. He had AIDS. Not just the AIDS virus, but full-blown AIDS.

He told Ron that before they'd met, he'd been sleeping around. Fewer than 10 sexual partners, he said. One was all that it took.

Tim told his close friends, Max and Cindy. "He didn't want us knowing second hand," Max recalled. "We didn't break down and cry or anything. We even went out to eat at Chi-Chi's, one of his favorite restaurants.

He told his family too. His mom basically knew--most mothers know, Ron said, adding "Most mothers know if you're Gay or not--but I think it was kind of a shock, Tim having the virus."

That Summer of 1991, it was clear that Time couldn't keep working. He officially applied for medical leave and disability pay.

As that was pending, Ron said, "he was asked to go on a case and refused to do so for medical reasons." Ron believes that's when things changed.

"Then it leaked out that he had AIDS. This was a little bit before he went on disability."

Tim was angry that word had leaked out. He decided to sue the department for breach of confidentiality. Grapevines in police departments hum louder than most.

In October, 1991, he contacted the Legal Service Organization's HIV/AIDS Legal Project. But, for six months, no attorney would handle the matter. By then, the statute of limitations had passed.

Capt. Charles Williams, a member of the pension board denied that anything had "leaked." "I heard about it through the rumor mill."

Williams said the news jarred a lot of Troopers. There were nervous comments about whether AIDS could be contracted by shaking hands or drinking water.

On disability, Tim tried to keep his life as normal as possible. He and Ron bought a house in Indianapolis. For awhile, Tim played golf and bowled, but as 1992 came to an end, so did his energy level.

By early 1993, his weight was less than 130 pounds-40 pounds below the ideal weight for his 5'9" frame. He had sores and problems with his lips and nose. When he went anywhere, he thought people were staring at him.

Tim was bothered because no one from the State Police visited or called. He felt abandoned.

Then, the day before Mother's Day, came a shock. His mother died of a heart attack.

"I think his mom's death kind of put a stake through his heart," Ron said.

Through the rest of the Summer and Fall, Tim reclaimed a little of his weight, but his spirit was slipping away. He died at his home on January 28, 1994.

"He never got any support (from the State Police)," Ron said. "If they would have made an effort to visit him . . . I think he was very disappointed.

Superintendent Jennings doesn't agree.

"He was treated like everybody else," Jennings said. "He received his disability checks. We paid his bills. He absolutely was not treated differently than anybody else."



'Wagons East' is a Rollicking, Satirical Comedy with a Delicious Gay Twist

Jerry wasn't too keen on seeing it, despite the fact that it's John Candy's last film. He wanted to see Whoppi Goldberg in Corrina, Corrina instead. Now, I like Whoppi too. She's one of my favorites. But, for some reason, I wanted to see Wagons East, so he gave in and we went.

Maybe I wanted to see it because I'd heard a little about the plot. There's these folks in a little Western town of Prosperity, who decide they've had enough. What they do is pull up stakes and head east, back to city life and civilization.

My grandmother, born in 1874, lived for a few years of her married life in Mineral Wells, Texas. For a kid who had dreams about the "wild and woolly" West, she dispelled them

Life there, she said, was dirty, dangerous and dull. About the only excitement she ever got was to stand on her front porch with a shotgun to keep the cowboys and longhorns out of her front yard. The happiest sight she ever saw, she told me again and again, was the train that would take her back to Pennsylvania.

That's the way the citizens of Prosperity felt when they decided to decamp.

But they need a wagon master to lead them. That's where James Harlow (Candy) shows up. So, he's been drunk for 20 years? He still knows his way around.

According to all the reviews I've read, Richard Lewis, who plays Phil Taylor, is the supporting lead. Forget it. It ain't so.

The supporting lead is John C. McGinley who plays Julian, an openly Gay man-and plays him delightfully. Sure, Julian's a stereotype, but so is everyone in the film. The movie's a satire after all. But McGinley is a hoot, with fun-filled lines, most of which only a Gay person will get.

I know that from experience. We saw with

an audience of (I would guess) mostly straight people.

There's one scene where Julian and Billy (Lochlyn Munroe) are bathing nude in a river. Billy is one delicious hunk with furnice eyes and a good deep chest. Julian is washing Billy's back. Billy turns and . . . Well, see it for yourself. It's funny, believe me.

Candy plays a rather serious role. It is McGinley, not Lewis who is his comic foil. Lewis seems to labor over his lines. McGinley plays his character with ease as, I think, a good comic actor should.


And he's a hero. When a John Wayne type character threatens blow up the wagon train and everyone with it, it is McGinley's Julian who saves them all by blasting him away.

The thing I liked too was that satire though it is, McGinley's character is treated with sympathy. The audience laughs with him, not at him as it should be.

Some of you may have read Jackie Loohaus's review in The Milwaukee Journal (Aug. 26). I don't think she and I saw the same movie. But then, I don't know how she saw much of anything at all. We were sitting directly in front of her and her friends. They didn't shut up long enough to know what was going on. The trailer at the beginning of this or any film, calling for silence, is there for a reason. Jackie should find out what that reason is.

Regardless of what else it is, this is John Candy's last film. In case you're interested, the final scene he made before he died comes near the beginning. He's in a bar where he's just been hired as wagon master. He accepts the job, turns, and walks out into the rain, closing the door behind him.

It is a good film, a rollicking good timeand it has a Gay-theme. I recommend it highly.

Nearly all of the music makes a point. In one number, Burton and Zero are taken aback by the animals in the exhibit coming to life and complaining about being blamed. Why they ask does society have to "blame" someone for everything.

There are some touching moments as well.

One of the most moving comes when George, one of Zero's former sex partners tells his current lover about how he and everyone else abandoned Zero as he died.

Like other scenes in Zero Patience this one symbolizes larger issues such as the abandonment and ostracizing of AIDS patients, political correctness, the greed of drug companies and the willingness of scientists to follow each other blindly down dead end paths.

Zero Patience is anything but a dead end path. It provokes a thoughtful response while entertaining the viewer. Its rich satire, dark humor, clever plot twists, and excellent music make it well worth seeing.

Anything But a Dead End Path, Film 'Zero Patience' Screens Sept. 16-18 at UWM

What would the original Patient Zero say about all that has been said about him and the progress of the Aids Crisis? That is the premise of the new movie **Zero Patience**.

Zero Patience weaves together crisp writing, black comedy, passable acting, a very good sound track, and swipes at all sides from the drug companies to ACT UP.

The basic plot features Dr. Tim Burton and Patient Zero. Burton is a Victorian era sex researcher who the narrator tell us had an unfortunate encounter with the fountain of youth. Trying to recapture his past glory as a singing about bath house etiquette and Burton

cutting edge intellectual, Burton decides to put together a museum exhibit "The Hall of Contagion"

The exhibit will document Patient Zero's guilt in causing the AIDS crisis.

Burton's problem is that he may have survived into this century, but he brought his Victorian attitudes with him. Convinced that Zero was a serial killer, Dr. Burton sets out to prove his theory to the world.

He tries to interview bath house customers, Zero's friends, doctors, ACT UP activists and former lovers. He gets no support for his serial killer thesis, but that doesn't stop him from doctoring tapes of his interviews to make it look like he is right.

Finally he comes into contact with Zero's ghost. Despite falling in love with Zero, Burton maintains his thesis until he and Zero have an encounter with the HIV virus in Zero's blood stream via a microscope.

Burton ends up realizing that Zero is not the original carrier and recants his theories. He tries to set up the exhibit to show how wrong the scientific community is about AIDS. Alas it is too late. The drug company, Gilbert and Sullivan, has paid for the exhibit and wants it to open on time.


The end is bitter sweet as Burton helps Zero to disappear and ACT UP redoes the exhibit.

There is much to recommend this movie. It does not break new ground, but it does put together a coherent look at many sides of the AIDS crisis.

The writers managed to incorporate their thinking without being overtly political and pushy.

For example in one richly dark comedic scene the viruses in Zero's blood stream have a bitch fight over who really killed him. The scene promots the theory that there is no proof that HIV is a killer without being preachy.

There is enough music in Zero Patience for it to be classified as a musical. The music, all of it original, is quite good. Some of the musical numbers such as three towel clad men and the museum director doing the cha-cha cha

'Eat Drink Man Woman' Is a Luscious **Repast On Two Levels**

Eat Drink Man Woman is not the first film or literary endeavor to make food a metaphor for deeper passions, but seldom, if ever, has the metaphor been carried out so well. If you like Chinese food, as I do, then this movie will provide a literal mouth watering feast.

In this latest film by Taiwanese writer/director Ang Lee (who brought us The Wedding Banquet) wonderfully exotic dishes pass by underlining the action and punctuating

There's dragon salad, clay-baked chicken all crispy and honey-brown, and honey-glazed pork, along with a vast display of other dishes too numerous to mention. I will say this, eat before you go to this movie or you'll gorge yourself afterward. I say that from experience.

But Lee presents us with more than culinary fabulosties. The intriguing, often funny plot concerns a Taipei master chef, Chu, who's lost his sense of taste. Chu is played by Sihung Lung who, you'll remember, was the father in The Wedding Banquet.

Chu's sad condition is coupled with his tangled family problems that include three romantically troubled daughters. You are introduced to them all in a five minute sequence as they prepare the Sunday meal.

Almost at once, the food triggers arguments which, in turn, advance the plot. Just as Chu is bitter over his loss of taste, his eldest daughter, Jia-Chen, is angry because her own talent for cooking was aborted in her youth.

Now, she's a airline executive, but not a

happy one.

When the family isn't eating, it's absorbed (obsessed?) by sex. They think about it, they talk about it endlessly, and they fight over it. All that could be boring, but it isn't as the discussion illuminate the irrationality of life.

Food and its preparation is ordered, like a concert. Sex is uncontrollable. But these, Lee says, order and disorder, are the two primal forces in life. Humans are pulled two ways and rarely wind up winners in the contest.

The fascinating thing to me about this movie is how we begin to understand these characters--and to sympathize with them--from the way they deal with food; how one of them peals an orange, how another dices a carrot or tastes a morsel of chicken.

The movie itself, like Lee's other films, is a blend of glittery American movie techniques and the slower, more serene Asian pace in

More and more, Asian-made films are coming to the fore. Toronto, for example, is becoming a center for Asian filmmakers and actors fleeing Hong Kong. Their works, like Eat Drink Man Woman provide a special flavor, a certain welcome spice to the movie industry that it has needed for awhile.

Unlike my editor, I'm not as enthusiastic as he is about Wagons East, nor did I like it as well as I did The Wedding Banquet, but I am glad I saw it. It is worth the price.

In the year since his last visit to Milwaukee, several other groups have followed the Chorus' lead and given Manilow tokens of their affection. But he hasn't forgotten his



"I'll wear this! I will!" she assured everyone, tucking it down the front of her own top.



There's No Business Like Show Business

True to its title that "Everything's Coming Up Roses," Milwaukee's First Annual Lesbian Variety Show on August 27 was, by all accounts, a smashing success. Sponsored by the Education Fund of the Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee, the dazzling show succeeded in raising needed funds for LAMM while treating everyone to a rollicking good time.

The buzz among audience members leaving the Broadway Theater Center that night was animated, effusive and, in some cases, ecstatic, Everyone was high on the positive energy. One of the most frequent, if backhanded, compliments on many women's lips was "I can't believe how good it was!" Many women were stunned by the quality of the production and the level of talent displayed.

I think we all expected some glitches, seeing that it was the first time a variety show of this scale has been attempted in Milwaukee. There may have been some fear that this first effort might pale in comparison to the Madison show produced by Kissing Girls, which marks its 9th year this November 20.

The inferiority complex was clearly unwarranted however, and shame on all of us Brewtown dykes for having doubted our own impressive homegrown talent!

Kudos to producer Shelli Marquardt, who did most of the bedrock organizing, delegated tasks and supervised the whole shebang. All reports are she effectively negotiated the many personalities involved and was a steady hand during weeks of auditions and rehearsals and through the inevitable last-minute panics. Shelli gives lots of credit to Nancy Troia, the show's stage manager, for her technical expertise and advice. Laurels too, go out to the ASL interpreters, who donated their time and skills.

This is not meant to be a comprehensive review because I didn't intend to write one and some very talented acts did not want their names in print. But here are a few highlights of the show. It certainly lived up to its name, with variety in the form of comedy, dance, poetry and lots of music--from folk and country to jazz to rap and even bagpipes!

Power singer Diana Jones shook the rafters with her country-rock stylings, including the Janis Joplin favorite "Mercedes Benz." Scotty delivered a powerful rap about being happy, proud and Gay, earning a respectful but too restrained response from the audience.

Julie Darrough ably performed four songs (but in a short set should have ended with a more upbeat tune). Mari Hang drew guffaws with her ditty "You Creamed My Heart and Then I Creamed My Jeans" (or is it the other way around?) and then hushed the crowd while at the piano for "Somewhere in Between."

Sue Silvermarie enthralled the gathering with a reading of erotic poetry from her collection Menopausal Lust, and four women displayed their flair for Thespianism in a comedic play about Lesbian roommates an their romantic entanglements. Beth and Lynn, two well-known professionals in our community, did a comedy routine a la Burns and Allen. Some of the jokes were as old as the Borscht Belt, but their deadpan delivery and the Lesbian twist had everybody giggling.

MOOK, a guitar-playing trio of singers and performance artists who alternate between beautiful harmonies and biting political satire, drew perhaps the most sustained laughter and applause. Their hilarious hijinx to "Brenda Vaccaro," an irreverent ode to tampons and the gravel-voiced spokeswoman for Tampax, must be seen to be believed!

And the Shoreline Dancers closed the show with a surprise encore with four male members of the group, led on the floor by four handsome dykes, camping it up mercilessly in tacky drag outfits to the tune of "Trashy Women." The number brought down the house and prompted many bemused comments like: "Boy, you sure wouldn't see that at the Madison show!" No shit.

(After the show, a representative of Kissing Girls asked the women of MOOK if they'd like to be in the Madison show. "But can you perform, uh, without the boy?" she asked Jane and Jen about MOOK's third member, Bill. "We can," was Jane's admirable reply, "but we'd rather not.")

A great time was had by all at Milwaukee's first Lesbian Variety Show, and plans are already in the works for next year's. Because the show sold out, some are urging a move to a larger venue, like the Pabst. Bad idea--too sprawling, obstructed views, inadequate restrooms.

I think much of the show's success this year was due to the intimate atmosphere of the Skylight Opera Theater (358 seats) whose circular design draws the audience closer together and in which every seat is a great seat. In addition, the bar/lounge, lobbies and restrooms at the newly renovated Broadway Theater Center are spacious and clean and classy. I vote for two shows at the same place next year. The positive word-of-mouth from



Warren's 'Harlan's Race', A Worthy Sequel to 'Front Runner'

Harlan's Race by Patricia Nell Warren Wildcat HC, \$21.95

For a generation of Gay men, Patricia Nell Warren's The Front Runner was a coming out book. First published in 1974, The Front Runner was a break-through book with its portrayal of Gay men in a positive, three-dimensional manner.

It was released by a mainstream publisher at a time when there were no positive Gay role models, few if any openly Gay writers, and no more than a handful of Gay bookstores across the country. Only Gordon Merrick's quasi soft-porn titles offered any alternative to books dominated by straights.

The Front Runner was a revelation.

Here was a realistic, sensitive story about the love between two men, budding track star Billy Sive and his coach, Harlan Brown.

It was long rumored that there would be a film version with Paul Newman playing Coach Brown. But years passed and there was no film--and no sequel to the book.

Finally, after 20 years, Warren brings us Harlan's Race.

Having read The Front Runner as a youth back in the mid-'70's, the book would prove to have considerable impact on my life and has provided life-long fond memories. Thus, it was with some apprehension that I picked up Harlan's Race. Would the specter of Billy Sive haunt Warren's sequel? Could Warren match the romanticism, the power and the impact she had in her first and now classic love story?

Although Harlan's Race lacks some of The Front Runner's lyricism and is no longer tackling ground-breaking issues or subject matter, Warren has nevertheless produced a

highly satisfying book that shouldn't disappoint and will leave most readers eagerly awaiting the final book in this intended trilogy, "Billy's Boy."

As Harlan's Race opens, it is the Summer of 1990 and Coach Harlan Brown, now 55, has returned to New York for the Gay Games and can finally reflect on the course his life has taken following that fateful moment in Montreal back in 1976.

Although the sniper was caught, his partner escaped and would continue to stalk Harlan over the next several years, playing a deadly game of cat and mouse. Harlan has attempted to stay out of the limelight as he worked through his grief and tentatively enters a rather volatile relationship with Vince, Billy's best friend and former track star.

Over the course of Harlan's Race, Warren chronicles the onset of AIDS, the emergence of Gay athletics as well as establishing Harlan's relationship with his son and his coming face to face with a ghost from his past.

Harlan's Race becomes quite a pageturner as it races to its dramatic and shattering conclusion.

Warren is doubtless a gifted storyteller whose concern and caring are clearly evident throughout the book. Also remarkable are her insights into the dynamics of Gay men's relationships.

If there is a weakness in Harlan's Race, it is that Warren assumes that the reader will be intimately familiar with the first book and therefore, she enters the narrative giving little background or character development.

I would guess she's right. Most of you have read The Front Runner. But, if not, be sure to pick up a copy along with Harlan's Race.

'Temple Slave' is a Hilarious, Romantic Fairytale With a Decidedly Sensuous Side

Temple Slave Robert Patrick Masquerade Press, \$12.95

Robert Patrick's first novel, Temple Slave, is a hilarious, haunting, romantic, raunchy epic. It's a total trip to the Gaydominated underground theaters of New York in the 1960's.

Patrick wrote dozens of plays for these "Off-Off Broadway" theaters. He escaped them with his international hit, Kennedy's Children. Now he returns to them with total sensual and emotional recall.

Temple Slave is the story of Bob, a young man from New Mexico, who flees his anti-Gay homeland to hit New York in 1961. By magical coincidence, he wanders into the first "Off-Off" theater, the Espresso Buono. In this tiny coffee house, refugees from American cruelty and ignorance find a place, first to conceal, then to express, themselves.

What starts as a refuge becomes a showplace. Little plays put on for their own enjoyment bring playwrights into the limelight. Fame, greed, jealousy, and destruction follow. A wonderful world devours itself before your

Patrick evokes this fairytale hideout in such detail that you smell the coffee and sweat and semen--and the blood that finally flows.

Dominating the book is Joey Buono, a fat, failed dancer who opens the Espresso Buono-and his heart--for young escapees from prejudice and persecution. Joey Buono is written with a three dimensional quality so vivid that eventually just his name on the page evokes a living human being.

Equally alive is his beautiful, brilliant lover, Johnny. Johnny is the living Apollo whose charm inspires the transformation of the Espresso Buono from a dump on a side street, into a famous temple of love and art.

There are dozens more unique characters: Peacock-proud playwrights, enchanting performers, hardworking "temple slaves" who make the place possible, eccentric "regulars" who set its Bohemian tone, and the ambitious "piranhas" who smell fame and invade the temple.

All this is described in a letter from one "temple slave" to another, written many years after the wonderful place is gone and its promise betrayed.

The writer of the letter is Bob (certainly the author's spokesperson). Bob is a temple slave who saw his temple fall. He's not happy about it. His letter--the novel--is written in bright and angry prose that blossoms in complicated puns, enraged essays against American savagery, and sometimes into silly limericks.

Flashing from the remembered would he loved to the current one he hates, Bob compares them sarcastically and sentimentally. The sense of love and loss is overwhelming. As the past inevitably sours into the present, Bob gathers his considerable spirit to look for words to heal all his wounds. The novel's climax is a heartbreaking peak of both hilarity and heroism.

This long book gives its author room to paint full-scale pictures of an artist's colony, a Summer theater, big city offices, crowded pre-Stonewall cruising grounds, and the pent-houses and pads that the swinging sixties swirl into Bob's life.

Above all, the Espresso Buono becomes so real that you could draw a floor plan of it. It lives and dies around you. You are present at rehearsals and performances of plays both silly and celestial. You are at numerous stereoscopic orgies at the Buono and elsewhere (A trip to a bathhouse is a high point).


Most important, you are at endless endearing conversations in the Buono, after house, when the gates are closed.

The charming, doomed inhabitants of this mythological paradise hold long, loony conversations about art and sex and especially about each other. You'll wish you were there. You'll feel that you are. You'll want to go back.

Patrick, like his hero Bob, is a bookworm. The influences of hundreds of authors are apparent. It's a rich broth of styles, as rich as the mix of people and relationships at the Buono. But the final flavor of the broth is delicious and completely individual.

If you've ever wondered why "people of the sixties" sigh when they talk about that era, you'll find out here. Everything wonderful about the period comes to life.

Temple Slave is an absorbing fable about an important, never-before-revealed area of Gay history. Its gripping plot, exciting atmosphere and irresistible characters, will stay with you for a long, long time.



'Maud's House' is a Spunky, Folksy Novel That Asks How Do We Define Art

Maud's House Sherry Roberts Papier-Mache Press, \$18

In numerous USA Today guest columns discussing everything from taxes to terrorism, essayist/novelist Sherry Roberts poses the question: "What's wrong with this picture?" She's asking it again. This time, though, the format is fiction, and the "picture" in question is the way we define art, how we handle creative expression (or lack thereof), and how artistic creation is at the heart of social change.

Roberts' first novel, Maud's House, tells the story of Maud Calhoun, a brilliant painter who has lost touch with her muse. As a child prodigy, she painted every available surface in her house--her talent put the small town of Round Corners, Vermont, on the map.

(Round Corners is the kind of town where "everyone will butt into your business and love you to pieces.)

Now, ten years after the end of a lamentable marriage (her late husband whitewashed the house), Maud's neighbors are pressuring her to paint a town mural.

As Maud struggles to reclaim her art, a host of unforgettable small town characters swirl around her. There's Odie, the birdhouse-building sheriff, T-Bone, the dairy farmer who tap dances for his cows, and many others.

To all of them, Maud is their "artist in residence," but what they don't realize is that they are all artists in one way or another. Each one has his/her own "artistic pleasures that define the soul"--as do we all, according to Roberts.

Roberts argues that "art" isn't necessarily what's hanging on the walls of a museum. It is not a statue or a picture or a book. It's not the product, finished though it may never really

Art is the process of creating, an act that is different for us all, everyone of us. For some, it's painting by numbers. For others, it's building birdhouses or maybe tap dancing for your cows. Whatever expression it takes, it is this process of creativity that helps to define us, a thing utterly essential to being who and what we are.

One of Roberts' biggest concerns about people today is "the hopelessness that so many people are feeling, especially young people." Kids live in a violent world, she writes, where 13-year-olds plan their own funerals, thinking that their only future lies in the grave.

In Maud's House, Roberts proposes a salvation from this dark anguish. It is the process of creating, she says, that defies hopelessness by implying a future in which that creation will survive.

For most people, an "artist" is one who works at it full-time. That, Roberts says, is a misconception. In Maud's House, no one gets up in the morning to "do art." But here and there throughout the day, the postmistress, for example writes a little poetry as the spirit moves her, and so she is an artist. The same is—or should be—true for us all.

It is these artistic moments that keep us sane, no easy task in a world sweeping like a waterfall, over the edge.

Any reader who has ever found joy and meaning in self-expression, who longs for the warmth of a tightly-knit small community, or who still believes that love is a viable part of a full life, will be right at home in Round Corners

'Same-Sex Unions,' a Scholarly Blend of **Subtlety and Tact**

Same-Sex Unions in Pre-Modern Europe John Boswell Villard Books, \$25

Readers who still haven't dipped into Same-Sex Unions in Pre-Modern Europe by John Boswell, have probably come away with the impression fostered by recent sensationalist reviews that the book blatantly advocates same-sex marriages, that Boswell makes extravagant claims for such unions. Those who know his earlier book, Christianity, Toler-ance, and Homosexuality, will give Boswell credit for greater subtlety and tack.

The focus of the present study is upon Roman Catholic and Orthodox manuscripts of the pre-modern or Medieval period which contain liturgies for same-sex unions between two men. But Boswell does not discuss these church ceremonies (at least 11 were discovered in the Vatican libraries) until he has reached three crucial chapters at the center of

He points out in Chapter 5, "Development of Nuptial Services," that in the 4th and 6th Centuries, Europe was entering the Dark Ages after the fall of Roman civilization, and that Greek and Roman paganism was intermingling with early Christian institutions.

During this early period, marriage, following the Roman pattern, was a civil, legal func-tion in which the church did not participate ex-these nuptials. He answers them one by one in like the Byzantine emperor Basil and a young man named John.



My Son's Gay; Now How Do I Make Him Straight?

When, in 1975, Mary Borhek learned that her son, Eric, was Gay, she decided to write a

"This was going to be a book about how one person changed from Gay to straight, said Borhek, a native of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. "Along the way, I discovered I was the one who was changing.

Borhek, who lived in Minnesota, said her first reaction to her son's coming out to her was to "get him fixed" by finding a therapist. But in the months and years that followed, Borhek discovered it was her perceptions of

homosexuality that were being "fixed." "I changed 180 degrees," she said.

Borhek wrote and published her book, My Son Eric. But her book was as much about the changes in her as it was about Eric.

My whole objection to homosexuality was based on biblical verses," she said. But in researching the subject, she discovered only seven or eight verses in the whole bible dealing with the subject, and they'd been mistranslated. Jesus never mentioned it.

"What we think the bible says has to be taken in context of the conditions of the time it was written," Borhek said. "Many people simply pass over what doesn't fit in with their

Though she and her son had discussed being Gay, she discovered that she really didn't know much about it.

"I began to see that it was quite different from what I thought," she said. "When you hear the word 'homosexual,' the part of the word that jumps out is sex. But the amount of time people spend in bed is quite small compared to the others things everyone must to do maintain themselves.

Her second book, Coming Out to Parents, was written after she heard a speaker discuss how parents went through typical stages of grief response when they learn that their child has cerebral palsy.

"Parents go through the same reaction when they learn a child is Gay," Borhek said. "That opened my eyes. I had the typical reaction most parents have. They go into a grief reaction because they have lost their mental

Coming Out to Parents deals step by step with the stages of anger, denial, guilt, bargaining, depression and acceptance. One chapter deals with the religious connotations of being Lesbian or Gay.

"I dealt with deciding whether to even tell parents that they are Gay," Borhek said. "There are many reasons people don't. The issue of sex is very explosive and that's why parents get so upset. Neither Gay people nor the parents themselves realize the parents are going through the classic stages of grief."

After she wrote the original text of Coming Out, she asked a Lesbian and a Gay therapist to read it.

"They made many substantial sugges-tions," she said. "There was a lot I had picked up at parents' groups and I wanted to give something out.

Both of her books have been published by Pilgrim Press, which is affiliated with the United Church of Christ. Borhek said she was rejected by 24 publishers before she found Pil-

In addition to writing, Borhek has been active in promoting civil rights for Gays and

"I see it as a justice issue," she said. "I see the freedom I have and think 'Why shouldn't my son and his friends have the same rights and freedom?' Gays and Lesbians are not asking for special rights--they are asking to be first-class citizens along with every-



'Bob & Rod', a Book for Lovers and for Those Who Love Love

Bob & Rod Tom Bianchi St. Martin's Press, \$60

"You are the most important single, human fact in my life. Beside you and beyond you, there is no other.

Neither Bob nor Rod Jackson-Paris said this, nor did Tom Bianchi, but they might as well have for this is the whole, radiant atmosphere created by Bianchi's new book, Bob &

On one level, the book is a collection of photographs, a tour de force in both color and black and white, showing the beauty of the well-developed, magnificently defined, male physique. There is the sensual blonde with furnace thighs and the smoldering brunette with features of a young god lost in a forest full of stars.

Going through the book, page by page, is like having a personal tour through some ancient arcade where the statues of the Olympians are displayed in all their nubile grandeur.

But on another, and perhaps more interesting level--to a romantic, at least--the book is a picture essay of two married Gay men solidly in love with each other.

It is Bianchi's genius to be able to show this love, to make it reach out and hold the observer warmly in its grasp. You can see it in the eyes of his two young subjects as they romp together naked in the snow. You can sense it as they play together in some sunlit California woods. You know it's there when you see them resting, one with his head in the other's lap.

A marriage, any marriage fulfills itself in the mutual desire of the two partners to provide a loving and nurturing place for each other. Usually, we try to depict this in poetry or prose, rarely successfully, most of the time,

It is the deeper beauty of this book that Bianchi has managed to convey both the nurturing sweetness of married life along with the commitment that must be at its core.

To my mind, this book shows Gay life for what it should be and often is, a deep, fervent and beautiful love for someone with whom you exchange your soul. This is the one true path and this is a book that portrays it, as idealistic

So Rod & Bob brings out the romantic in me? I like that and I think it will do the same

'That Day at the Quarry' is One Hot Little **Book and an Echo from the Past**

That Day at the Quarry Tom Shaw Outbound Press, \$8.95

That Day at the Quarry is a particularly American work. It is plain spoken as American Gothic, and as hot as Kansas in July. As such, it harks back to the likes of Cooper, Melville and Poe; to Theodore Dreiser or even the vastly overrated Ernest Hemingway. It is, in short, a quick, but burningly intensive read.

the story of torture and se tiation, but it goes beyond that to a bizarre gothicization of the male psyche. We see such a thing in Poe's novella, The Narrative of A. Gordon Pym where, in an all-male sea voyage the male bonding leads with a certain grotesque logicality to physical incorporation of close friends through cannibalism.

The plot of the work is strictly genre. The unnamed narrator loses to his friends in a game of cards. His young, muscular body is the prize. He is taken from his "feminized" home to the wilderness (a quarry), where he is subjected to great amounts of torture so they might possess him. It all happens in much the same way and with many of the same results as in the "captivity narratives" that enjoyed a wide popularity during the American colonial

In these works, the captive many times decides to stay with her (or his) captors because he (she) has become transformed to another and more fulfilling life.

Something of the same thing happens here. While the narrator does not stay with his tormentors, what they force him to endure, admits him to the status of an adult male. And a Gay male, because his torment is metaphoric of the pain many men and women suffer in this country in coming to terms with their sexuality. At the end of the book, he is what we all long to be, free.

The narrator's pain then, becomes an almost mystical journey to self-knowledge that we see in Billy Budd or Moby Dick.

We see too reflections of the male-bonding rituals that we see in all of Cooper's works (as bad a writer as Cooper may be).

That Day at the Quarry is a hotly sensual book. The very sparseness of its prose assures it of that. But it also takes us along to face with the narrator, something that perhaps we would rather not confront--the necessary and liberating nature of pain.

New Handbook Gives Exhaustive Survey of the Religious Right

The Religious Right: The Assault on Tolerance & Pluralism in America David Cantor

The Anti-Defamation League, pub. \$7.50

The problem with critiquing the Religious Right, is that much of what this movement says it wants is right. As surveys show, most Gay people value strong families, healthy communities, better schools, and a government founded on liberty of conscience. In upholding these things, the Religious Right speaks for many, Gays and straights alike.

But where the Christian Right parts company with people of good will, is by its demonizing those with whom it disagrees. With this attitude, respect for tolerance and pluralism, essentials in a democracy, inevitably plummet

In a new handbook, The Religious Right: The Assault on Tolerance & Pluralism in America published by the Anti-Defamation League, David Cantor and his fellow researchers show that what the Religious Right brings to the cultural debate a rhetoric of fear, suspicion and hatred. That this all culminates in violence that leads to murder, should not be

"I want you to just let a wave of intolerance wash over you. I want you to let a wave of hatred wash over you. Yes, hate is good," Randall Terry is quoted as saying. Terry is the founder of Operation Rescue.

"Expect confrontations that will be not only unpleasant, but at times physically bloody," said Pat Robertson, according to the report, in November, 1992.

In four well-documented and readable sections, The Religious Right profiles the shakers and doers of the movement; everyone from the major players such as Pat Robertson, Phyllis Schlafly, Randall Terry and Jerry Falwell to lesser known people such as R.J. Rushdoony of the Reconstructionist move-

(This latter group is particularly homophobic and advocates the physical elimination of its enemies.)

Included also are detailed descriptions of the various Religious Right organizations and political action groups. These include everything from the Christian Coalition to Focus on the Family to Lou Sheldon's Traditional Values Coalition. The report details their histories, their aims and goals and shows how they are all interconnected

The report discuss the Religious Right's attitude and hostility toward the pro-Choice movement, women in general, African Americans and others

There is a full section entitled "The Gaybashers" that hones in on the Religious Right's on-going attack on us. There is a discussion of the Colorado situation as well as the anti-Gay initiatives going on in other states and munici-


The book ends with a very useful annotated bibliography.

The Religious Right: The Assault on Tolerance & Pluralism in America is a book no one interested in democratic institutions should be without. It is of special interest to pro-Choice advocates and LesBiGay activists.



Gay Fiction

After a Summer filled with vacations, Pride festivities and any variety of other warm weather pleasures, it's time to reconcile ourselves to the fact that Labor Day is upon us. The spirits of Fall will soon be moving through Autumn's fogs.

With the onset of cooler weather, more and more people begin returning to their favorite bookstores to stock up on reading for those lengthening, rainy nights. Lesbians and Gay men will be surprised at the number of new books that await them.

In Gay fiction, Patricia Nell Warren's long awaited sequel to Front Runner has, at last, appeared. It's called Harlan's Race and continues the story of Coach Harlan Brown. He is older now and reflects upon his life, beginning where Front Runner left off. Harlan's Race is an exciting, old-fashioned page turner sure to please Warren's legion of fans.

While Warren's book will entice, beguile and perhaps, even bring a tear to the eye, Matthew Stadler's new book, The Sex Offender is sure to be more controversial. This is the story of a man, a lapsed teacher, guilty of having a sexual relationship with a 12-year-old boy, and his subsequent, relentlessly official, therapy. The work is a curious mixture of comedy, dark satire, farce and politics, that is sure to intrigue some and anger others, but is nonetheless, a good read.

Possessing a not too dissimilar tone is Bruce Benderson's User. The author explores the terrors peculiar to subterranean, big city life after midnight as seen through the eyes of Apollo, a beautiful, drug addicted male prostitute.

Following the success of his Fragments that Remain, Gay African American writer, Steve Corbin, has just published A Hundred Years from Now. In this blistering novel, Corbin has created a multi-generational story with an unflinching examination of Black self-hatred coupled with the very unique challenges that Black Gay men face.

On a far more lighthearted note is Eric Shaw Quinn's debut novel, Say Uncle. Possessing equal parts of Auntie Mame and Armistead Maupin, Say Uncle tells the story of Michael, an irreverent Gay man who finds himself the legal guardian of his infant nephew.

If you have ever wondered about the pitfalls--or joys--of parenthood, this is a book you will want to read.

Gay Fiction in Paperback

The pickings in recent Gay fiction in paperback have been quite thin, but there are a few noteworthy titles.

Gay playwright Robert Patrick's debut novel, Temple Slave, chronicles the adventures of the talented misfits of the Espresso Bruno--the archetypal Greenwich Village cafecum-performance space. For a first-time novelist, this is a fascinating piece of work which, in the end no doubt, he will turn into a play.

From Perry Brass, comes Out There, a collection of strange and erotic tales of private desire, horror and the afterlife. If it's true as they say, that all of us have thoughts that would shame Hell, this is a book where you might find some of them.

Every time, it seems, that a writer wants a quickie, he hustles into print with an anthology. We shouldn't disparage these works. There are some good ones out there. Among them are Waves edited by Ethan Mordden, and In Another Part of the Forest, edited by Alberto Manguel and Craig Stephenson

Also new in paperback is Stephen Fry's comic work, The Liar and Lilian Lee's Farewell My Concubine, the latter of which should be familiar to movie goers.

Lesbian Fiction

As per usual, unfortunately, there are only a handful of new Lesbian fiction titles in hardcover, with the vast majority of them being mysteries.

Leading the way, is Martina Navratilova's The Total Zone, co-written by Liz Nickles. Not surprisingly, Navratilova has stuck with what she is most familiar: tennis, in this her first mystery. Jordan Myles, former tennis champ turned sports therapist, is drawn into the disappearance of 16-year-old sensation Audrey Armat. Along the way, he discovers a shocking tale of abuse, suicide and murder.

Highlighting the Summer in Lesbian fiction has been Sandra Scoppetone's latest in her best-selling series. This one is My Sweet Untraceable You. Once again we are treated to the adventures of Scoppetone's heroine, Lauren Laurano, a computer literate chocoholic who is incurably hip. It's a good read, sure to keep you up late as the fog swirls in off the Lake and Mother Michigan calls to her own.

An equally intriguing, if perhaps somewhat less well-known Lesbian sleuth, is Phyllis Knight's Lil Ritchie, a once promising rock guitarist, now working as a private eye in "down east" Maine. Knight first introduced Lil in Switching the Odds and now she returns in Shattered Rhythms investigating the mysterious disappearance of legendary jazz guitarist, Andre Ledux.

Two prolific fantasy writers have released

books this Summer, each with strong Lesbian themes and characters.

Mercedes Lackey's Storm Warning is another of Lackey's books set in Valdemar and the first in her Mage Storm series.

As is to be expected, the computer revolution is providing a great deal of grist to the writers' mills. Another example is Melissa Scott's **Trouble and Her Friends**. This book combines cyberpunk computer technology with sociological extrapolation that despite what it sounds like, really is good reading.

The weightiest Lesbian entry is the diverse and comprehensive anthology of Lesbian literature, Chloe Plus Olivia that comes to us from noted scholar and historian Lillian Faderman. Tackling such subjects as "Romantic Friendships", "A Man Trapped in a Woman's Body", and "In the Closet", Faderman has included some exceptional selections with her own insightful commentary. Though the price of the book is \$29.95, it is a bargain at over 800 pages and is not to be missed.

Due out at some point this Fall is the eagerly awaited (and long overdue) is Jane Stewart's third book in her Isis series. This one is titled Warriors of Isis and, rumor has it, will be well worth the wait.

Wisconsin author, Jackie Calhoun, follows her successful Friends and Lovers with Triple Exposure. Still passionately involved with Beth who is unable or unwilling to leave her husband, Nicky finds her life drastically changing directions when she meets Meg.

Set in the town of Victory, North Carolina, Maureen Brady's Folly, follows the love that develops between Folly and Martha against the background of a textile mill strike during the late 1970's.

Ellen Frye has once again turned to the period of Greek mythology with Amazon Story Bones.

Les/Gay Non-Fiction

No Gay man's or Lesbian's coffee table should remain bare over the next few months with the publication of several exceptional books. Should it be added, just in time to look them over before deciding on holiday gifts? No. Why mention that?

Anyway, the most eagerly awaited book in this class is **Rod & Bob**. For the legion of fans of Rod and Bob Jackson-Paris, no last name is necessary.

The book is the work of photographer Tom Bianchi and sets out to portray two beautiful men in love. He does it masterfully, showing two young men who are not only in love with each other, but whose near perfect physiques are works of art in themselves.

For those of you who met Rod and Bob when they visited Milwaukee for the Victory Fund celebration, this book will bring back exceedingly pleasant memories indeed.

Due out a little later this Fall, but sure to be at the top of everyone's Christmas list, is Out in America. This is a portrait of Lesbian and Gay life produced by the editors of Out Magazine. It features over 250 photographs of average Lesbians and Gay men in America, our people from all segments of society. Out in America is sure to stimulate discussion of what it means to be Gay in '90's America.

On a somewhat smaller, less lavish scale are two other photographic essays, Family by Nancy Andrews and Uncommon Heroes edited by Phillip Sherman.

In Family, Andrews has sought to give a face to the varied cross section of Gay and Lesbian America.

Taking a slightly different approach, Sherman has selected over 100 Lesbians and Gay men, many couples included, who can serve as role models. These are courageous women and men who have successfully lived outside the closet.

Both Family and Uncommon Heroes are

very special books indeed.

The institutionalized religious types are having a hissy-fit over this one. It is John Boswell's latest, Same-Sex Unions in Pre-

Modern Europe.

As the churches try desperately to keep their strangle-hold on marriage laws, and Gay people increasingly demand the right to marry, Boswell's book (his last one, probably) comes like a bombshell to blow the religious argu-

ment apart.

Don't be put off by the title. It's an easy read. Boswell's prose is lively and carries you along. His footnotes are an utter delight. He is living proof that the worst thing a minister or priest can hear about is that there is a scholar in his parish.

An equally important book is Laura Benkov's Reinventing the Family. This is a legal and social history of Lesbian and Gay parents, and an invaluable resource for all same-sex couples struggling to protect and nurture their children.

Ann Heron's One Teenager in Ten was a classic text for all Gay teens. In her new book, Two Teenagers in Twenty, she has sought out stories from a new generation of teens and combined them with some of the essays from her earlier book to present a marvelous collection of very courageous young voices to prove to Gay teens everywhere that they are not alone.

Two other recent titles joining an increasing body of work aimed at Gay teens include Am I Blue? This is a collection of sixteen original short stories by such noted young adult writers as Lois Lowry, M.E. Kerr and Bruce Coville-Bennett.

The other is Bennett L. Singer's Growing Up Gay/Growing Up Lesbian. This is a fine collection of essays, poems and short stories by a host of Lesbians and Gay men.

The list of exceptional Gay and Lesbian non-fiction titles could easily double those already noted, but space is limited. Neverthe-

less, mention must be made of Paul Monette's final book, Last Watch of the Night. This completes the autobiographical trilogy begun with his Borrowed Time and which continued with Becoming a Man.

Also new in paperback is Michelangelo Signorile's Queer in America. The book gets into the outing controversy and created quite a stir when it first showed up in hardcover about the time of the 1993 March On Washington.

Finally, deserving of mention is Richard Mohr's Gay Ideas. This is one that will certainly stir you up, no matter what you think.

Jewish and Christian Women Examine the Bible Anew

Out of the Garden: Women Writers on the Bible

Consider Eve, not as a temptress who helped cast humanity out of the Garden of Eden, but as the person who gave human beings the knowledge to be able to freely love God.

Or imagine Delilah as a prostitute who used Samson for her own amusement, and then dropped him when he no longer served her purposes. Or Hannah, the mother of Samuel, as a religious heroine for daring to pray on her own in the sanctuary.

These are some of the striking views in a new anthology, Out of the Garden: Women Writers on the Bible.

In the book, 28 Jewish and Christian writers, many from liberal, feminist backgrounds, were asked to choose a story, figure or theme from the Jewish bible and interpret it from the viewpoint of a woman reading that bible to-

"We wanted to hear what they themselves had to say, not what religion had to say, said Celina Spiegel, the editor of the collection.

In many cases, what the writers came up with were not traditional readings, but fresh perspectives on biblical figures that moved beyond simply dividing female figures into camps of "good" women such as Ruth and Esther--and "bad"--women such as Eve, Delilah and Jezebel.

For example, in the first essay, writer Barbara Grizzuti Harrison offers a meditation on Eve that praises the first woman in the bible for giving us the world as we know it.

"Without the genetically transmitted knowledge of good and evil that Eve's radical act of curiosity sowed in our marrow, we should not desire to know God and to love God, we should have not need of Her," Harrison writes.

In defense of Delilah, author Fay Weldon portrays her as a woman pursued relentlessly by Samson and pressured by the civil authorities to trap him. When she tricks him into having his hair cut, Samson becomes impotent, in Weldon's story.

"So what was the point of having him around? I turned him in and didn't think much more about it, though how the world keeps harping on," Weldon writes in imagining Delilah's version of the incident.

Somewhat surprisingly, the biblical woman who gained a great deal of attention was Hannah, the mother of Samuel.

In I Samuel, the biblical writer introduces Hannah as a woman distraught over her apparent infertility. Defying religious convention, she goes to the sanctuary and prays for a son.

Author Cynthia Ozick says that Hannah, as the inventor of inward prayer at a time when all liturgical speech in the Tabernacle had been public, is an authentic religious heroine.

But Ozick says it is Hannah's husband, Elkanah, who is the feminist hero in the account. When he tries to console Hannah with the words, "Am I not better to thee than 10 sons?" he asserts that both he and his wife have value with or without sons, according to Ozick.

In another essay, Marcia Falk takes a different view. She chides Elkanah for not understanding Hannah's pain at being childless.

"Had Elkanah ceased patronizing and begun listening, might he have begun to glimpse the possibility of reciprocity in marriage?" Falk asks.

So too, religious institutions today, Falk says, need to hear the voices of women such as Hannah, who want to be heard in their congregations.

Stanley Siegel, Author of 'Uncharted Lives,' Went Looking For His Map

Uncharted Lives Stanley Siegel Dutton, \$21.95

Stanley Siegel lost his map. He had been following one, of course, on the psychological journey that took him far in his career as a family counselor, and gave him a wife and daughter. But when he came out at age 37 and realized his old map was ill-suited to Gay living, Siegel found himself without a blueprint for his new life. In his new book, Uncharted Lives, Siegel examines how Gay men draw their own life maps, and where they lead.

In Uncharted Lives, Siegel, along with co-author Ed Lowe, Jr., attempts to delineate the stages of life common to Gay men across the lines of difference, by interviewing a hun-

dred Gay men.

While straight men generally follow a somewhat predetermined menu of life choices, Siegel writes, Gay men are left without parallel conventions and psychological landmarks to guide them through life. His book simultaneously pieces together a rough Gay map based on common experiences revealed through extensive interviews, and also examines the impact on Gay men of going through life without a formal "chart."

A psychotherapist by training, Siegel is keen to analyze personal histories, repressed memories, family relationships and sexual maturation. Siegel further relates his broader analysis to his own story of delayed adolescence, sexual experimentation and subcultural bonding. Thus, his book becomes a hybrid of a social scientific thesis on the "life passage of Gay men" and an autobiographical sketch of the author himself.

Finding the Gay community is one of the most significant steps in a Gay man's life, says Siegel. It is here that a Gay man can first become an insider, instead of the outsider he has become in what Siegel dubs the "heterosexist community.

Once a Gay man discovers the Gay community and comes to identify himself with it, Siegel finds he often separates himself from the heterosexist world he has known, and submerges himself in a Gay ghetto. While he believes most Gay men eventually find a more balanced position of re-integration with the larger community, Siegel maintains that this ghetto-ization is a vital component of a Gay

"I think most people go through a period of pride and separatism at some stage," he says. "I think it's a necessary stage, both in one's individual evolution and in a cultural evolution. Immersing oneself in an affirmative, like-minded culture allows for a sense of

freedom without hostility."

But as society becomes increasingly tolerant, and Gay men come out at younger ages and adjust more quickly, the life stages that Siegel has described tend to speed up. What this means in terms of Gay self-segregation may also affect the entire essence of being Gay, Siegel warns.

There is the chance that the ghettoes in the process will be more or less accelerated to the point of elimination by the changes," he "While there are many advantages to that, there are also consequences and dangers. It's a question too of thinking about what we give up that is so unique and original that we want to save and protect. That's the dilemma of change.

While Siegel is hardly one to celebrate the heterosexism that forces Gay men and Lesbians both into outsider status even in their own minds, this marginalizations has left Lesbians and Gay men with the ability--and the need--to create their own life patterns from scratch. "Adversity forces Gay people to develop a creative genius for living," Siegel asserts in his book, and that valuable asset may be lost as Gays enter the mainstream.

"What was wonderful and extraordinary in

the interviews I did was the constant discovery of the inventiveness and creativity of Gay men," Siegel said. "I think collectively, maybe as we push for our civil rights, that we invent conventions to assimilate, and I think it actually comes at a very high price, at the expense of quieting our many voices.

"Unless we protect this and remember what we are, we'll move from margin to center and in the process, lose our inventiveness and creativeness," Siegel warns. "We need to fight for our civil rights, for what we deserve as equal citizens in this society, without compromising our wonderful position of outsiders, and that's a hard line to walk, or a hard paradox to maintain.'

If increasing openness has changed the speed with which Gay men and Lesbians progress through the life stages Siegel has described in his book, another factor may change the equation and consideration much more drastically. AIDS.

In the book, Siegel discusses the periods of re-evaluation Gay men encounter in their lives. But AIDS has pushed issues of mortality and limitation into younger minds, creating a sort of mid-life crisis immediately following a belated Gay adolescence, with little room for unfettered psychological security in between.

The fact of AIDS has made every Gay man and Lesbian deal with the question of what is death and what is life, and what is important in life, so it has forced a very early period of re-evaluation," says Hopefully, in the lessons of AIDS, it has forced a recommitment to life that's based more on the present and more in love. In general. Gay men, in order to know who they are and justify their existence, have developed a terrific ability for self-examination.

Even if AIDS has changed the time frame, it has not changed the stages of sexual development in Gay men, Siegel says. While previously, Gay men had to shed the heterosexist constructions of sexuality before going on to construct their own new sexual paradigms, this same model still holds true even with AIDS to consider. And true to the creative model, says Siegel, Gay men have developed myriad ways to handle AIDS while still building a new sex-

"AIDS does not have to stop sexual enjoyment, or even recreational sex," he says. There are people pioneering a relationship to sex that involves safety, taking the lessons of the epidemic, involving a sense of spirituality that grows out of dealing with death, and also returning to some of the lessons of the '70's and the sexual liberation movement in terms of openness, enjoyment and freedom.

"We're headed for a second sexual revolution," he predicts, adding that straight people will likely follow suit, albeit years behind as usual.

Although Siegel includes a wide divergence of individual experience in his book, he still finds common threads that tie them together and create a basic sketch of Gay life--a map that need not be followed, but one that should be recognized.

Little of what Siegel reveals is shocking or trailblazing; it is the kind of book where readers go along, surprised only to see what they already know molded into a coherent tale with apparent simplicity.

Above all, Siegel hopes that his book will encourage Lesbian and Gay male readers to examine their own personal lives and create their own maps for living.

It's important to know your narrative, because it is your narrative that guides you," says Siegel. "As much as we can recall, remember, and sew together about our lives, the know of the story we're guided consciously or unconsciously. I hope this book does the job of helping people place where they are in their lives, and gives people the opportunity to look backward and forward to where they might be going."

An Interview with Mark Merlis, Author of 'American Studies'

Mark Merlis is a first-time author bringing out Gay novel, American Studies, that Quentin Crisp has called "A remarkable book." Others have agreed.

The book tells the story of an older Gay man, beat up by a hustler, yet yearning hopelessly for the buff straight guy in the adjacent hospital bed. The older man, many say, is patterned after F.O. Matthiessen, a Harvard professor of history who may have committed suicide in 1950 for fear his Gayness would be

Merlis, 44, is a native of Baltimore and makes his home in Washington where he works for the Congressional Research Service of the Library of Congress, specializing in research on healthcare reform.

Wisconsin Light: How do you feel about

the label "Gay" novel?

Mark Merlis: It is, as labels go, not as inherently gratifying as, say, best-selling or prize-winning, especially if it means that only Gay readers are supposed to be interested in the book. Still, I'm old enough to remember when books with Gay themes were published only by Grove, their dustjackets bearing terms like "shocking" and "candid." So perhaps we're at some midpoint between those times and the day when novels by Gay writers will be novels. But I don't think that day is immi-

For the indefinite future, it will be impossible to write fully about Gay characters without writing, at least incidentally, about what it feels like to be Gay.

WL: I would think some would call the book "politically incorrect." Would you agree with that?

MM: I've had all along the sense--and some early readers have confirmed--that the book violates some unwritten rules. If I knew exactly what they were, I'd violate them cheerfully.

I would say grandly that the responsibility of a writer is to capture some fragment of felt life as fully and honestly as he can., and devil

take the politics.

But I did, after all, pick what I wrote about, and my main characters are egocentric, self-hating, intolerant, sexually obsessed and often downright silly. Perhaps my best defense is simply to assert that they are heroes, that their broken lives are positive ones and their abortive romances affirmative relationships. What matters about them is that they have at least some vision of a better place, another way to live, even if their habits and compulsions prevent them from getting to it.

WL: And the message?

MM: Well, it's perhaps to be sighted in the opening quotation from Walter Benjamin: "Only that historian will have the gift of fanning the spark of hope in the past who is firmly convinced that even the dead will not be safe from the enemy if he wins.

Benjamin was, of course, referring to the Nazi revision of history as part of the "Final Solution"; the attempt, not only to kill Jews, Gays and others, but to wipe out any memory that they ever existed.

While it is absurdly overreaching to compare the Gay experience in this country to the Holocaust, our enemies have something of the same intention. They would like it if there were no Gay people and some actually assert

that we don't exist and never did. So maybe at least part of the point of the book is just to affirm that we are here.

WL: You seem to have an affection for the '40's and '50's. Why?

MM: I've always been drawn to the life of that period because I think it was the last time in our history when people had large hopes, really thought that the world was about to change. Much of their optimism came from Marx. Even those who weren't fellow travelers were persuaded that history had a direction and that it pointed towards a better life. That belief is gone now, and with it all the energy it generated.

Perhaps the McCarthyites didn't just happen to pick Communists and Gay people as their two great villains, but correctly identified the two major challenges to the world they be-

It is a commonplace that the Right Wing today, having lost Communism as an enemy, has turned on Gay people as the next most convenient patsies. But perhaps this move too, is not so much calculated as an inevitable extension of what went on forty years ago. With Marxism gone, Gay voices are now among the loudest still insisting that there is another way to live. We are, in this sense, the surviving half of what was once a dyad.

WL: How do you approach the art of writing? How do you do it?

MM: I've written, scribbled, for 20 years. My work was slapdash and dishonest; no one would publish it. Meanwhile, the job that was to tide me over became permanent, but I never stopped writing, not entirely.

But during that time, I always settled for the second best word and resolved difficult situations by having all the characters get hit by a truck. I wanted to be a writer without writing. Now, it's almost the reverse.

While I still have fantasies about sudden riches and fame, the act of writing is what matters. I can't wait to get to the computer in the morning and can hardly tear myself away to go to the day job.

WL: I know what you mean. MM: I know you do.

Francis Bacon, Part Pixie, Part Painter, Part **Unconventional Guttersnipe**

The Gilded Gutter Life of Francis Bacon by Daniel Farson Pantheon Books, \$25

In 1962, the normally staid Tate Museum in London staged a retrospective showing of the paintings of Francis Bacon, and a Welsh friend with the BBC persuaded me that I just had to experience this exhibition.

I was horrified at what I saw upon entering the vast space given over to Bacon's huge canvases. At every turn, I was faced with misshapen, bloated, supposedly human figures with cruel, ape-like features; there were dissected torsos and heads, hunks of raw meat as well as screaming popes and baboons. Most of the figures seemed to ooze away into small

Bacon, as I was told, was expressing his view of the human predicament, the agony of modern man and the dire despair of our times. I was not convinced. I saw little technical ability in the smeared paints and I was not impressed to hear that Bacon's paintings were fetching prices in the millions of pounds in the art market.

Afterwards, I had to take a stroll through the Tate's magnificent collection of paintings by Turner to quiet my jangled nerves.

So just what was this Francis Bacon like? He died in 1992 at the age of 82, and Daniel Farson who knew him for a period of over 40 years, has written this intimate biography of his friend.

He shows Bacon to have been the kind of chap who would go up to perfect strangers and introduce himself as, "I'm an old pouf!" This delineator of dark despair lived a

jolly, raffish sort of life, much of it spent in Soho clubs and bars putting away bottle after bottle of champagne, his drink of choice.

He mingled with rent boys, whores and criminals, as well as the dissolute British aristocracy, than which none can be more deca-

Depending on his mood, Bacon could be a cheerful, gregarious pixie or an insulting bastard who love to embarrass others. He was self-taught and disparaged his painting, calling his study of two male wrestlers "The Buggers," for example.

He was generous with the money that continued to flow in and kept several male lovers, men of the lower classes, some illiterate. He was not interested in boys. His special kink was to be whipped and on occasion, would display the welts on his back. Altogether a man of many contradictions.

Farson has detailed a wild, unconventional life in a book full of wonderful gossip, full of humor and salacious stories much more entertaining to read than much of today's so-called

In the introduction to Rock on the Wild Side: Gay Male Images in Popular Music of the Rock Era (Leyland Publications, \$15.95), author Wayne Studer describes his book as "the product of one flawed, opinionated devotee, a Gay man in love with rock." For better or for worse, Studer delivers exactly what he has promised.

Studer's main qualification in writing the book is not the occasional writing he does as a sideline to his career in computers, not his long-ago stint as a music critic for his college paper. His expertise stems mostly from how own personal devotion to rock music. The passion that he feels about music and the trivia only a heartfelt fan could accrue, shine through in his examination of four decades of rock music, and those personal touches provide the bulk of his insight.

Breaking down music by artist and single, Studer has gathered hundreds of entries, from Aerosmith to Frank Zappa. He provides a few basic statistics like album titles, chart positions, release dates, and current availability. He then analyzes lyrics for Gay or ambiguous content, and speculates on artists' inclinations.

What Studer relates first hand-the way fans and critics have interpreted the music regardless of the artists' intentions--are the strongest details of all, however. He finds significance where other listeners cannot even understand the words, and he explains how the music personally affected his life as a Gay

The limits Studer places on his musical repertoire weaken the book's potential as a comprehensive reference book, but they do allow Studer to stick to familiar music and keep his judgments first-hand and subjective.

The major limitation is that the "popular" music he reviews tends to be white and rock oriented. Women's music is left out, with a sincere apology from the author, explaining that he could not do the subject justice due to his lack of expertise.

Finally, betraying his baby boomer roots as a child of the '70's, Studer seems to focus more on ambiguous classic rock than on more forthright recent progressive fare. Younger music fans will be baffled as Studer devotes more space to the Beatles than Boy George, more entries to Steely Dan than the Smiths.

At the very least, Rock on the Wild Side is a great place to start. Popular music has a long history of dealing with sexuality, and sometimes overly

homosexuality comes up more than incidentally. Too often, these references are hidden, ignored or downplayed. Thankfully, Studer is paying attention to the lyrics, taking them to heart, doing his homework. Rock and roll never sounded so good.

Gay Music Guide

When Will Grega writes about Gay pop music, unlike Wayne Studer, he puts the emphasis on "Gay" rather than on "pop.

In Grega's Gay Music Guide (Pop Front Press, \$11.95), the author showcases openly Gay and Lesbian music recorded on independent labels in recent years. And he does not have to analyze lyrics or find subtle connotations; all of the profiled artists are recording explicitly "Gay music."

Aside from working as a music journalist, Grega has a range of involvement in the music industry that makes him a reliable authority on the subject. He has worked as a composer, a musician, a songwriter, and a disc jockey. And he is married to Randy Jones, the Village People's original cowboy--although he insists that he was never into disco.

Using his own expertise to describe and categorize the music, Grega organizes his entries by album and artist. He describes the music, and interviews many artists about their

The greatest thing about the hundred artists he includes is the diversity of musical genres they span. Country, jazz, punk, and gospel are mixed in with the women's folk music and Gay men's choruses.

Men's and women's music are both well represented in both commercial and more offbeat recordings. Well known acts like Romanovsky and Phillips and Alix Dobkin are featured, alongside lesser known performers like country singer Doug Stevens and alternative rock artist Laura Love.

Grega also adds an essential feature to his guide that makes it invaluable for prospective fans. Each album listing includes an address where the record can be purchased by mail, and in the rear of the book, additional music resources are listed as contacts.

Also, Grega has put together a cassette sampler of two dozen songs he discusses in the book. A good mix of music from diverse groups, the tape is available for free with the purchase of the book.

Filled with artists' personal insights into Gay music, and the author's own vivid--if effusive--commentary,

"I'm here to let Gay and Lesbian people know that they have the option to support artists who record music with a specifically Gay perspective," he says.







A Little History

Polynesians settled the Hawai'ian islands more than a millennium ago. Most authorities agree that these Pacific islanders had their origins in southeast Asia; their language is similar to Thai and other southeast Asian dialects. (Their features area also distinct from those of Amerindian, which rules out North American migration.)

The Polynesians had a well-developed maritime technology and were able to navigate by the stars while exploring the Pacific. There's evidence that the early settlers came to Hawai'i to stay: They sailed to the islands in ocean-going canoes filled with domesticated animals (chickens, dogs, pigs), plants, seeds and their spouses.

Once in the islands, they depended primarily on fishing and the cultivation of yams, taro, breadfruit, coconuts, bananas and sugar

Over time, the islands came to be ruled by a powerful hierarchy of chiefs and nobles who acquired prestige by controlling and redistributing wealth and food supplies. Their formidable religious and social powers led them to undertake elaborate agricultural projects, and to erect stone shrines and temples.

Captain Cook, the first Europeans to visit the islands, was hailed as a god when he arrived in 1778. On a return visit (after the islanders realized their mistake), he was killed over a dispute over missing property. None the less, the islands were known for years by the

name Cook gave them: the Sandwich Islands Despite what you may have read about (after the Earl of Sandwich who also invented

None of the would-be colonialists, how-Hawai'i is one of the best places in the ever, had as much impact on the island culture world to see the full force of nature at work; as the Christian missionaries who began working there in the 1820's. They preached the gospel, wrecked general havoc, and did little good.

The U.S. government obtained rights to Pearl Harbor in 1887 to prevent the British or Germans from getting it. Eleven years later, in a staged coup, the U.S. took over completely.

Today's visitors are seen as neither gods nor demons. Though a few Hawai'ians may regard the tourists as mere sources of inc most accept them with genuine friendliness.



If you're not interested in cattle, whale watching is great from November to March.

The Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park features two very active volcanoes (Mauna Loa and Kilauea) and is only a 45-minute drive

Mauna Loa is for the committed outdoors types. Kilauea, which is equally impressive, is much more accessible. Be there at noon for the Volcano House Hotel's buffet lunch on the rim of Kilauea crater and be sure to take the crater rim drive.

Be sure not to miss the Halemaumau Crater, supposed home to the goddess Pele. Many leave offerings at the fire pit for her.

Volcanic activity in the park is unpredictable from day to day. There may be glowing red lava streams, or they may have cooled and blackened. To get the best vantage point for Kilauea (the most active volcano), go to the end of Crater Road and follow the path. Flashlights are required at dusk. Allow at least two to three hours for the trip.

Hawi, on the north tip of the Big Island, has black sand beaches made by volcanic rock that's been pulverized over the years.

Hawi is rich in history and a couple of the attractions are "must see.

First, Mookini Heiau State Monument, is one of Hawai'i's most famous and impressive heiaus (places of worship). It's a great place to take your vows--or renew them. Traditionally associated with such kings and heroes as Kuamo'o, Mookini, Pa'ao and Kamehameha I, this temple, once the scene of human sacrifices, is said to be have built in one night by 15,000 plus men passing basalt rocks, firebrigade style, from Palulu Valley to the temple

In Lapakahi State Historical Park, a re-

stored fishing village is the site of living history demonstrations. Here you can listen to some authentic Hawai'ian storytelling ses-

Kailua-Kona, or "Sleepy Kona" as it is called, lies on the west side of the island, perfect for magnificent sunsets.

Plan to see the recently restored, Hulihee Palace, of King Kamehameha I. Near here is the small white monument marking the spot where Captain Cook landed and nearby is the Heiau where the islanders sang his praises when they still thought he was divine.
