

THE WISCONSIN PRIDE PARADE

What has all the colors of the Rainbow, 4,000 legs, a band and even an antique fire engine and a fifty-three foot long decorated

The Wisconsin Pride Parade!

Contrary to a persistent and thoroughly wrong rumor, the Wisconsin Pride Parade will take place on Sunday June 11th.

Last year's parade was a record breaker. Over 2,000 jubilant marchers from all over the state and region, went through downtown Milwaukee chanting slogans and showing their pride

The truck is hand-painted and depicts the inside of Fort Stonewall. It was painted in Hollywood, California as a memorial to all those who have died of AIDS. It is currently the largest mural on the road in the U.S. today.

The semi's current owner is Robert Sobeczek of New Berlin, Wisconsin. Sobeczek is employed by Road Runner Freight and will be driving the truck in the Pride Parade.

One thing of note is that the truck was scheduled for display in the Long Beach, California Gay Pride Parade. However, Sobeczek decided to put it in the Wisconsin Gay Pride Parade.

Among the many floats to be included in the parade will be a wedding float sponsored by the Walkers Point Cafe. It will show same-sex couples being married amidst decorations that will include a typical wedding cake.

There will also be "The Ridiculously Outrageous Twirlling Corps" (ROC) from northeast Wisconsin. They will be doing productions numbers all along the parade

Parade Co-ordinators Rick Finger and Sheldon Schur are looking for an even bigger crowd in 1995. "Last year's parade was really great It was so long that those at the beginning nearly met those at the end as they returned to the PrideFest grounds. It was the first time that nearly the entirely route was covered with marchers." said Schur.

Schur added, "With every-thing going on in Washington we need to let the politicians know that we are not giving up."

Finger adds, "We would like to see people who don't wish to march come out and cheer on those who do."

The parade will be begin and end on the PrideFest grounds. Assembly begins at 11:00 a.m. It will be preceded by a pre-parade rally at 11:45 a.m. and will include entertainment and several inspiring speakers.

Led by members of the Minnesota Freedom Band and Grand Marshal State Representative Tammy Baldwin, the parade will step off at 12:30 p.m.

The parade route will be same as last year's. North on the Lincoln Memorial Drive Bridge to Mason, West on Mason to Prospect, South on Prospect to Wisconsin Ave, West on Wisconsin to Van Buren, North on Van Buren to Kilbourn, East on Kilbourn to Prospect and then back to the PrideFest grounds. In order to encourage participation in the parade, PrideFest will offer free admission to everyone entering the grounds before 12:30.

Grand Marshal Tammy Baldwin will speak following the parade at a brief post parade rally, which is scheduled to begin at 1:30.

PrideFest wants everyone to participate in the parade but it also wants to remind participants that the Pride Parade rules prohibit bare chested participants (male or female), displays or depictions of genitalia, and signs, banners or groups promoting sex between adults and minors.



Thanks to his stubborn determination, Wisconsin kept its fledging newspaper. That newspaper, at the time called Wisconsin Instep, kept us informed, made us aware of what was going on around the state and helped us to build a Gay and Lesbian economy.

It is difficult to imagine how anyone ever found out about new organizations, new businesses and special events before we had our own papers. Those who were around in those days can tell you that In Step provided a means of communication that allowed us to begin building a real community.

Ron Geiman is the heart and soul of his paper. He has shaped it and honed it. He has saved it from the fire more times than anyone will ever know.

Even now as he struggles with AIDS, Ron continues to work on making it the best it can

It is especially appropriate that PrideFest honor Ron Geiman with this award.

At 4:00 each day, the stages will fall silent, and the booths will stop operations Silence will descend on the PrideFest grounds as we honor those who have gone before us.

Saturday's moment of silence will be in honor of those deceased persons who have given their lifes for and in some cases, given their lifes to, the cause of equality for Gays and Lesbians.

Without these individuals we would not be celebrating our pride. In fact without their strength, their courage and their dedication we would not have much to celebrate.

Whether it is Harvey Milk, Audre Lord, Oscar Wilde, Wisconsin's own Alyn Hess, or the latest victims: two young men gunned down in Mississippi, we owe them a debt of gratitude.

Saturday's moment of silence will begin at 4:00 p.m. with a tolling of bells from all of the PrideFest stages. It will end with a barrage of cannon balls from the Bartalottas.

PrideFest asks that for those brief moments, all of those on the grounds stand in silence. At the end of this silent commeration PrideFest asks that everyone cheer and make as much noise as they can in celebration of all that these individuals have helped us to accomplish.

On Sunday

Sunday's moment of silence is set aside for all of those who have fallen victim to AIDS.

It will begin at 4:00 p.m. with a tolling of bells from the PrideFest stages and it will end with a shout of rage emanating from all of sound systems on the grounds.

"Our society has many commemorations for the fallen, but seldom if ever do these rituals overtly include Gays and Lesbians." said PrideFest Co-Chair Bill Meunier. "If don't remember these people who will?"

Join PrideFest and thousands of festival goers in remembering the forgotten at 4:00 on Saturday and Sunday.

PRIDEFEST AND THE MEDIA

Milwaukee--What's that? You want to come to PrideFest but are afraid you'll wind up on the TV news? Put your fears to rest.

If you are among the camera shy you aren't alone. PrideFest takes great precautions to help protect the privacy of those at the festival.

The PrideFest Committee is well aware of the fact that many people who attend our festival are not out of the closet. It also knows that there some people who don't attend because they are afraid they will be on TV. The Committee does its best to protect your privacy.

In fact PrideFest has yet to hear of anyone who was inadvertently outed at the Festival.

Even before the festival, PrideFest contacts local television stations. These stations are asked to avoid indiscriminate filming of the

crowd. PrideFest also asks them to request permission before filming starts. There has not been one TV News camera person that has failed to honor that request.

PrideFest volunteers escort TV camera crews. These volunteers work with the crew and the crowd to help protect privacy and to help the media get the shots they want.

These volunteers work hard to make sure no one accidentally gets caught on camera. For example if the crew is doing an interview the volunteers accompanying it will warn people who may inadvertently walk into the shot.

The average TV news report is fairly brief, normally about 20 to 30 seconds. It normally includes an introduction, a wrap up and a sound bite from a PrideFest committee member as well as SEVERAL scenes from the festival.

In other words even if you ignore our volunteers' warnings you and you are caught on camera, chances are that unless you are only a few feet from the camera you won't be close enough or on long enough to be recognized.

Anyone who still feels uncomfortable should follow the three step plan for the camera shy

1. Attend PrideFest in the evening. Since night filming requires more equipment, all of the camera crews have been coming during the afternoon. On Sunday the cameras are normally gone within an hour after the parade.

2. Dress normally. Blue spiked hair may be your thing but it may also be irresistible to a TV camera operator.

3. Follow Directions If you hear a PrideFest Volunteer warning "There's a TV crew here if you don't want to be on film move to the side: " then move to the side.


The CD also features a guest appearance by Connie Grauer of Mrs. Fun fame.

Vermont Lesbian Couple Seeks to Legalize Same-Sex Marriage

Burlington, VT-- In a custom-made wedding dress with a veil and six-foot train, Pat-"Pasha" Rivers-McMahon was joined with her beloved before 70 guests.

The September 24 garden ceremony at the Mad River Inn in Waitsfield, Vermont, had all the trappings of a traditional wedding, with one exception: Pasha, a labor and delivery nurse at Fletcher Allen Health Care, said her vows to another woman, Penny Rivers-McMahon, her partner of two years

Now the South Burlington couple seeks to have their union recognized as a legal marriage in a country where no state, including Vermont, recognizes same-sex marriages.

By a fluke, the two women were issued a marriage license from the city of South Burlington, but their marriage has not been legally recorded. The city's position is that the license was issued in error and was not recorded because same-sex marriages are illegal.

To the couple, who classify themselves as a 'Mrs. and Mrs.' and 'wife and wife,' the rejection is disappointing.

We want the same benefits and deserve the same benefits that any other married couple gets and takes for granted," Pasha said.

Both women say they have long known they were Gay. Each came to the relationship with a son. Penny's son, Joel, is 7; Pasha's son, Ian, is 9

The boys were in the wedding party, and each wears a ring to symbolize the creation of the new family

The family's homey apartment is lined with photos of the boys and wedding pictures of Pasha in full bridal regalia and Penny in dressy slacks and a vest.

The couple says their cause is not a political one, but one of the heart. They are at pains to show how their affection and trust is universal to love, not simply Lesbian love.

But due to their gender, the Rivers-McMahons are constantly re-casting the concept of family, as is evident when their sons refer to each of them as ``mom.''

The "moms" are in the process of crossadopting the boys for which there is legal precedence in Vermont but they must first locate Ian's father to ask him to legally relinquish his rights. Ian's dad has chosen not to be involved in the boy's life, his mother says. Penney declines to discuss her son's father, other than to say he has signed off on the adoption papers.

The couple say they are considering a discrimination suit against the state, but not just for the practical benefits. They value the institution of marriage.

It's just something that we want, so that we can be a family," said Penny, who works nights at a Colchester manufacturing plant. Or, as Pasha puts it: "I don't have a domestic partner. I have a wife.'

Although Lesbians and Gay men have made advances in their struggle for equal rights under the law, the right to marry is not yet among them.

Some 30 counties and cities around the country including San Francisco, Madison and Seattle offer same-sex couples the right to legally register as domestic partners. But the benefits offered under such ordinances are often scant, especially compared to the range of tax, health and pension benefits that are available to married people.

While Gay and Lesbian "bonding" ceremonies in the mold of traditional weddings become more popular, public opinion polls show only small support for legal same-sex marriage and many religious leaders, Right Wing ones especially, are stridently opposed to the idea.

The Most Rev. Kenneth Angell, bishop of The Roman Catholic Diocese of Burlington, believes same-sex marriage goes against God's plan. In Genesis, he points out, God "who is male in his attributes and name," created male and female and blessed them, saying fertile and multiply; fill the earth and subdue

`This was the Creator's plan,' Angell wrote in a statement. `No other plan works."

The Rivers-McMahons have faced this kind of opposition even within their own extended families. The people who would deny them the right to marry "just don't understand," Pasha "They aren't educated."

Gays and Lesbians argue that the laws barring them from marriage are discriminatory and compare them to laws that once prevented African-Americans and mixed-race couples from marrying.

After years of challenging marriage laws with little success, a landmark Hawai'i case has attracted the attention of both conservatives and liberals.

In Hawai'i, three same-sex couples sued the state for discrimination after being denied marriage licenses. The state Supreme Court

ruled that denying the licenses was discrimination and asked the lower court to either present a compelling reason for the discrimination or allow same-sex marriages

A trial date is scheduled for April, but the state could decide not to argue, in which case Hawai'i could become the first state in the union to allow same-sex marriage. However, the case still could face legal obstacles.

In Vermont, same-sex couples have attempted to obtain marriage licenses since the early 1970s. They are routinely turned away.

In 1975, after a Plainfield town clerk refused to issue a marriage license to a same-sex couple, the Vermont League of Cities and Towns asked the Vermont Office of the Attorney General to review state marriage law.

The Attorney General agreed, and in an eight-page decision concluded that same-sex couples cannot legally marry in Vermont.

Although there is no law specifically prohibiting same-sex marriages, the Attorney General's office interpreted the use of words such as 'marriage,' 'bride,' 'groom,' husband' and 'wife' in the statutes to apply exclusively to heterosexual couples.

In the decision, the words were defined according to the gender-specific meanings spelled out in the 1965 Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary.

It defines marriage as `a mutual relation of husband and wife.

Vermont's argument against same-sex marriage is similar to those made by state governments around the country

That's classic," said Evan Wolfson, senior staff attorney at the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund in New York and cocounsel for the Gay couples in the Hawai'i

'Looking at a dictionary is not reasoning; it is restating," he said.

That doesn't answer the question of whether the law is right or wrong or constitu-

Although almost 20 years have passed since the Vermont opinion was written, there is no sign that the Attorney General's Office is going to take up the matter again, though the Rivers-McMahons initially hoped it would.

There really isn't any reason to review it at this point," said Vermont Deputy Attorney
General J. Wallace Malley, Jr. "The wording General J. Wallace Malley. Jr. of the statute is the same as it was in 1975.'

The fact that the couple obtained a marriage license without deceit did not influence the attorney general's position. It is unusual, how-

Pasha applied for the license alone, stating

her partner's full name, Penny Jean McMahon, when asked for the name of the groom by assistant city clerk Laura Reinders.

'I said 'Penny'; they said 'Penny?,' " Pa-

sha recalled.

Reinders apparently realized that both the first and middle names were feminine, Pasha said, but issued the license without ever asking the sex of the groom.

Reinders declined to comment on the case.

Pasha returned home, elated, and told Penny the good news. But their celebration was short-lived: Within 10 minutes, the clerk's office called to say the license was issued in error and asked the couple to return it. They declined that request, as well as another that came by registered mail the next day.

Instead they followed the same procedure that heterosexual couples are asked to follow when they marry. The Rev. Gary Kowalski of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Burlington signed the license after a private church ceremony that preceded the couple's formal ceremony before family and friends the next

Kowalski returned the certificate to the city by registered mail. Records show the license was received, though never registered. South Burlington City Attorney Steven Stitzel said the marriage will not be registered because same-sex marriages are not legal in Vermont.

The Rivers-McMahons vow to pursue the matter with the kind of lawsuit that Gay couples in other states have filed, with, until Hawaii, little success.

'It looks like we're going to court," said

Susan Murray, a Middlebury attorney who is representing the couple, said it is time for Vermont law to change.

You're talking about a community of Gay men and Lesbians throughout the country who are really proud of themselves and are now demanding that they be treated respectfully and

Initially, the couple thought that their case might be treated differently because they were able to obtain the marriage license. It is unusual but not unheard of for a same-sex couple to obtain a license, according to Wolfson.

In his opinion it would not have legal significance unless the marriage were duly re-

It's happened occasionally by fluke," he said. "But the issue really isn't 'Was there a fluke in which they obtained the paper or wasn't there?' The issue is really, 'Why is the state discriminating?"

State AIDS Funding Increased After Strong, **Unified AIDS Lobby Effort**

Madison-- Bucking waves of budget cutting by a legislative Joint Finance Committee determined to reduce state spending, AIDS advocates from throughout Wisconsin won a major victory by securing bipartisan committee support for a major increase in the state's primary AIDS grant.

By a unanimous 16-0 vote last week, the Joint Finance Committee approved a \$223,000 increase for the "Life Care Services" grant which funds AIDS case managers at Wisconsin's nine AIDS Service Organizations (ASO).

"It was a fabulous victory." said Doug Nelson, Executive of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), the parent agency of the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP). "We were unified, we had an effective advocacy strategy, and thanks to ASO's from around the state, we were tenacious in our lobbying."

The increased funding represents a 7% in-

crease in the total Life Care Services grant over the 1995-'97 biennium.

"We are facing annual 20% increases in HIV clientele and this increase is simply essential," said Nelson. "Even with this increase, in Milwaukee, we will need to suppliment these state funds with increasing private sector contributions to keep pace with the HIV epidemic," said Nelson.

Leading the AIDS funding initiative on the Joint Finance Committee was State Senator Mary Panzer (R-West Bend), who garnered crucial support from committee co-chairs Joseph Leean (R-Waupaca) and State Rep. Ben Brancel (R-Endeavor).

Senator Panzer made an early commitment on our issue and offered great leadership that was a key to our success," said Mike Gifford, ARCW Director of Public Policy

Gifford also praised the Log Cabin Republican Club for its contribution. "They were highly effective in convincing Republican legislators to support the AIDS increase," Gifford

Madison AIDS Support Network (MASN) interim Executive Director David Clarenbach said the success was a result of a "sophisticated and coordinated lobbying ef-

"Every member of the Committee received contact by clients, constituents and organizations," Clarenbach explained.

"The bipartisan support necessary to our success is well worth note and is consistent with the history of HIV/AIDS funding in Wis-

Club of Wisconsin, said "We are pleased to be a part of this effort. This \$223,000 will help a great number of people. We look forward to continuing this partnership to meet the special needs of people living with AIDS. Republicans and Democrats can work together to meet the needs of the people of Wisconsin."

Federal AIDS Housing Funds Saved by President Clinton's Veto

Milwaukee-- President Clinton's announcement that he will veto he 1995 Recisions Bill has saved a cherished AIDS housing program and has national AIDS advocates elated

The Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA) Program had been targeted by Congressional budget-cutters for elimination in the Recisions Bill. Last week, a House/Senate Conference Committee agreed upon a \$30 million cut to the \$186 million HOPWA Program.

Within one day, the President announced his decision to veto the bill and specifically cited

HOPWA as a program too important to cut.

"It's great news because we have been battling for many weeks to save HOPWA," Doug Nelson Executive Director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW). "It means that our Milwaukee HOPWA application of \$973,000 is still viable and that Wisconsin will receive more than \$650,000 of formula HOPWA funding for AIDS housing services throughout the state.

We had a lot at stake and once again President Clinton has come through for the AIDS community," said Nelson.



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500 Attend Hearing as Maine Considers Anti-Gay State-Wide Legislation

Augusta, ME-- A legislative committee will review a citizen-initiated bill later this month to ban further municipal laws that aimed at providing Gay people with equal rights, a cochair of the Judiciary committee said on May

In what may be a prelude to a fall referen-dum campaign, sides for and against local laws to protect Gays from discrimination appeared before a legislative committee during a hearing attended by hundreds on Tuesday.

At issue is a citizen-initiated referendum proposal to keep municipalities from passing Gay rights laws like Portland's. The committee plans to discuss the measure May 17, said Rep. Sharon Treat, (D-Gardiner).

Green "Maine Won't Discriminate" signs in the audience of about 500 people at the Augusta Civic Center on May 2, far outnumbered red signs displayed by those who want the question to be approved by the Legislature or voters.

Concerned Maine Families, a Right Wing group of religious extremists, which is leading the referendum drive, said the central issue is whether Mainers want to endorse homosexual-

"Are we for toleration or are we for mandatory endorsement?" Bruce Fein, a constitutional lawyer who drafted the proposal, told the committee. He added that Gays should neither be tolerated nor endorsed.

But opponents said that what would be endorsed by passage of the measure would be the right to discriminate against Gays.

'Should Maine law allow me to be fired solely because I am a Lesbian?" asked Sen. Dale McCormick, (D-Monmouth). "The an-

If approved by voters, protected classes in municipal Gay rights ordinances would be limited to race, color, sex, physical or mental disability, religion, age, ancestry, national origin, family and marital status.

Unless the Legislature passes the measure exactly as proposed, it will go to Maine voters in November.

Each of the two sides appeared to be focused more on a November vote than on legislative

"We're very comfortable going into this campaign," Concerned Maine Families leader Carolyn Cosby said prior to the hearing.

"Maine voters will not uphold this referendum," Maine Won't Discriminate executive committee member Patricia Peard said.

Cosby's group stressed its proposal does not attempt to stop future legislatures from passing statewide Gay rights laws and therefore, she said, it is moderate.

But Assistant Senate Majority Leader Jane Amero, a Cape Elizabeth Republican who opposes the referendum proposal, said future legislatures would be reluctant for political reasons to pass Gay rights laws if the referendum is approved.

Supporters of the referendum proposal, who collected 67,000 signatures to force the question before lawmakers, returned repeatedly to the theme that adding Gays to protected classes in civil rights laws extends to them special

Lawrence Lackman, a Concerned Maine Families leader, took issue with hate crime figures from the attorney general's office that have become a fundamental justification for Gay rights protections.

Lackman asserted that hate crimes against gays are "rare and diminishing" and that figures have been pumped up by overzealous officials in the attorney general's office.

A deputy attorney general who has been ac-tive in prosecuting hate crimes, Stephen Wessler, said in an interview that he gets his figures from police departments.

Gay rights laws were also attacked on religious grounds. Michael Schools of All Catholics for Truth took the Catholic Diocese of Portland to task for opposing the initiated bill, saying Bishop Joseph Gerry's position conflicts with that of Pope John Paul II.

The Pope's position, Schools said, is that homosexuals are all intrinsicly evil. "That's God's position. That's how they should be treated," he said.

But opponents said Lesbians and Gays would not be the only losers if the bill becomes law.

Patricia Ryan, executive director of the Maine Human Rights Commission, said two of the groups Concerned Maine Families purports to protect--the poor and children--would lose protections from bias if the bill passes.

Ryan said the Human Rights Commission currently protects those groups and other classes not specifically mentioned in the law. By spelling out which groups are to be protected, others, including injured workers and 'whistleblowers," would not be protected.

Ray Turner of Auburn, who said he has a Gay son and a Lesbian daughter, said he opany legislation that "perpetuate discrimination against my daughter and my son.'

"As a father, I have concern for their safety," Turner said.

Other opponents of the initiated bill include Attorney General Andrew Ketterer and Gov. Angus King, who sent a letter saying he would campaign against the referendum's passage.

The constitutionality of the initiated question has been challenged by Gay rights advocates and the Maine Civil Liberties Union, and a hearing is scheduled for May 16, said Stephen Whiting, a lawyer for Concerned Maine Families. Whiting appealed to for legislative approval of the bill.

South Carolina Gay Pride Rally Hears from One of the Few, the Proud and the Gay

Columbia, SC-- By most accounts, Kevin Blaesing was an outstanding Marine.

Two years ago, he was selected Marine of the Month and Marine of the Quarter at the Naval Weapons Station in Goose Creek. Blaesing's performance was so good that he was promoted to corporal with a glowing rec-

But his career as a full-time Marine ended quietly in December, he contends, because of a conversation he had with a Navy psychologist in September 1993.

During a counseling session, Blaesing asked the psychologist several questions about sexual orientation, including, "If you're Gay, do you stay Gay?" and "What does it mean to stay

Those statements launched Blaesing on a collision course with the nation's shifting policies on Gays in the military.

His commanding officer was told of the conversation by the psychologist and sought guidance from his superiors. After being advised to do nothing, the commanding officer determined it should not affect Blaesing's status.

But Blaesing says his career took a downward turn a short time later after a new Marine commander arrived at the Weapons Station and took a different position. Blaesing says he was harassed and discredited until he felt he had no choice but to leave the Marines Corps-an outcome the "don't ask, don't tell" policy was designed to prevent.

Under "don't ask, don't tell," military personnel are expected to keep their sexual orientation a private matter. The services seek to discharge Gays only when evidence exists that they intend to engage in sexual acts.

The Marine Corps says Blaesing got a fair shake. Capt. Whitney Mason said Blaesing was offered a chance to transfer from Charleston to another duty station, which he declined.

The 24-year-old Blaesing, who still lives in Charleston, recently joined the Marine Corps Reserves and is thinking about enrolling in college. Even if "don't ask, don't tell," overturned someday, Blaesing said it's unlikely he will ever try to rejoin the active-duty

Blaesing's case emerged as the military policy on Gays was undergoing dramatic change. During that time, the Pentagon dropped its longstanding ban on Gay people, debated the issue and then instituted a policy that some say is hard to interpret.

The "don't ask, don't tell" policy wasn't in force in 1993 when Blaesing talked with Navy psychologist Christine Bachmann. But it was several months later when, Blaesing says, several of his Marine Corps superiors forced him

Blaesing says he believed his conversation with the psychologist would remain confidential. He later learned that doctors in the military aren't held to the same confidentiality rules as civilians.

Recently, Blaesing introduced himself as "a very proud Gay man" in an address at the South Carolina Gay and Lesbian Pride March in Columbia. It was the first time he had acknowledged his sexual orientation publicly, and now he wonders if it will affect his status in the Marine Reserves.

Bachmann testified that she told Blaesing it was probably in his best interest to be discharged. Blaesing initially agreed with the psychologist but later changed his mind. And, he says, that's when his troubles began.

Blaesing says Lt. Col. M.J. Martinson, who took command of Marines at the Weapons Station after Rueger left, considered him a capable Marine when he arrived.

But after learning of Blaesing's conversation with the psychologist, Blaesing said, Martinson pressured him into signing a statement about his conversation with the psychologist.

After a Marine Corps board voted 2-1 to discharge him last May, Blaesing challenged the decision. The Marines later overruled the board's decision, but Blaesing said that didn't end his difficulties.

Blaesing said Martinson gave him marginal scores on his re-enlistment rating, making it unlikely he could remain in the Marines.

At Blaesing's request, the Marine Corps investigated his case but determined Martinson had not lowered Blaesing's re-enlistment ratings because of "bias or retaliation."

Today, Blaesing says he misses military life

But, he adds, "Anything short of a complete reversal of the ban (on Gays in the military) is unacceptable.'



Serial Killer Stalking Gay Men in Norfolk, Virginia Area; 10 are Now Dead

Chesapeake, VA-Police on Monday, May 15, said a man found dead in a cul-de-sac a day earlier was the latest victim of a serial killer who has preyed on young Gay men since

The victim, identified as Samuel E. Aliff, 31, was found nude about 6:45 a.m. Sunday, May

"We are investigating the case as a serial killing," police spokesman Tony Torres said. Authorities have said privately in the past

that a serial killer may have been responsible for several unsolved slayings, but Monday was the first time police publicly acknowledged that at least 10 men probably have been killed by the same person.

ference that investigators have focused on these similarities:

All but one of the 10 men were dumped nude, and all had been strangled: At least nine of the 10 victims were Gay and

some were activists in the Gay community; None of the bodies bore defense wounds,

indicating the victims died without struggling; All of the victims had been socializing in Gay bars in Norfolk before their deaths.

Police said Aliff, the latest victim, was a drifter from Richmond who sometimes visited Hampton Roads. Aliff may have stayed at the Union Mission in Norfolk during his last visit. He was identified through fingerprints, police

Aliff was arrested in Richmond November 15, and charged with two counts of felony burglary and one count of felony grand larceny, court records show. Those charges weren't pursued.

According to police records, the first of the serial-killing victims, Charles F. Smith, was found July 17, 1987, in Chesapeake's Bowers Hill section. The bodies of seven of the 10 victims were dumped in Chesapeake, two in Suffolk and one in Isle of Wight.

Detectives have faced several problems during the investigation. First, they have never located a crime scene. Police believe all of the victims were killed in one place and dumped in another

Second, a Gay man who admitted knowing several of the victims killed himself in February, 1994 rather than speak with investigators about the serial killings.


But police may have gotten a break with the latest slaying. A police cruiser patroled through the cul-de-sac less than an hour before the body was found by a driver who had missed the Interstate 64 turnoff.

That means the body was dumped between 6 a.m. and 6:45 a.m., police said.

Investigators hope someone may have seen

the vehicle from which the victim was presumably removed.





Rhode Island Becomes Ninth State to Protect Civil Rights of Lesbians and Gays

Providence, RI- On May 22, as expected, Rhode Island Republican Governor Lincoln Almond signed a bill prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing, public accomodations and credit. With the Governor's signing, Rhode Island becomes the ninth state to pass civil rights legislation for Gay men and Lesbians.

The other states are: Wisconsin (the first), Massachusetts, New Jersey, Hawai'i, Vermont, California, Connecticut and Minnesota. All have some type of prohibition on discrimination based on sexual orientation.

On May 19, the Rhode Island Senate passed a House-approved bill prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing, public accommodations and credit.

The crowd of supporters who packed the ' Senate gallery listening to the 2 1/2 hours of heated debate, erupted in cheers as the final vote tally lit up the board, 26 to 21.

Melinda Paras, Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) called Rhode Island's action encouraging, even inspiring.

"Rhode Island has passed this measure of fairness while Lesbians and Gay men and Bisexuals in other states are being attacked by divisive campaigns."

Paras spoke of the Right Wing groups who, she said, are out to deprive Gay people of their civil rights and hailed Rhode Island as a state that "values and respects all its citizens" rather than trying to pit one group against another.

Opponents of the bill furiously offered five

amendments, including a Boy Scout Amendment which would have exempted the Boy Scouts from he bill's employment provisions. The amendment failed 25-19.

Opponents also attempted o extend the exemption for religious organizations to individuals, but that too failed.

Senator William Fitzpatrick (D-Cranston), the only openly Gay legislator, rose to comment on the recent decision by the Sixth Circuit of the U.S. Court of Appeals regarding Cincinnati's ban on protections for Gay peo-

"The Court," he said, "found that Cincinnati had the right to deny protections for Gay men and Lesbians, but it does not affect our right to protect those citizens.'

Christine Nickerson, President of the Rhode Island Alliance for Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights said she had been repeatedly asked why 1995 was the "magical" year.

In some ways," Nickerson said, "1995 was the year to pass this legislation. We enjoyed the support of the leadership in both houses and of Governor Almond. It was incredible to watch our friends in both chambers works to well as a team. But this was a long process for us and for the legislature. It took the work of countless people for so many years to get us to the place we arrived today.

The bill had been supported by Rhode Island PFLAG, the Straight But Not Narrow Coalition, the Interfaith Coalition of religious leaders and many labor and civil rights organiza-

Cincinnati Civil Rights Case Seeks to Join Colorado before U.S. Supreme Court

Cincinnati, OH--The U.S. Supreme Court, already considering a case involving civil rights for Gay people from Colorado, will be asked to decide a similar case from Cincinnati

A federal appeals court ruled Friday, May 12, that Gay people are not an identifiable class and do not warrant special civil rights protection. The 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals upheld the city voters' decision to strip sexual orientation from Cincinnati's humanrights ordinance.

Opponents of the court's decision planned to

appeal.

"Friday's decision should make those groups opposed to Gay rights happy." said Suzanne B. Goldberg, a New York attorney for the Gay activist organization Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund. "But they ought to be careful about moving too quickly. This issue is still undecided.

Lambda and the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) have agreed to pay for an appeal to the Supreme Court, said local attorney Alphonse Gerhardstein. He hoped the court would consider the Cincinnati case in conjunction with the one from Colorado.

Both cases have gotten a lot of national attention," said David Miller, an ACLU lawyer in Colorado. "I think that with these cases, the U.S. Supreme Court will define its role in this

Colorado's case is older than the local one. Voters there passed a state referendum prohibiting laws that some cities had designed to protect Gay people from discrimination in jobs and housing among other civil rights. The state Supreme Court declared the amendment unconstitutional last October, and the U.S. Supreme Court agreed to consider it.

Colorado for Family Values, a Right Wing religious group, contributed \$390,000 of the \$525,526 spent in the campaign to get civil rights protections stripped out of Cincinnati's human-rights ordinance. Voters approved the issue 62 percent to 38 percent in November

U.S. District Judge S. Arthur Spiegel blocked the change and ruled it was unconstitutional. The three 6th Circuit judges overruled Spiegel on Friday.

Spiegel was way, way out in left field," said Robert Skolrood, executive director of the ultra-conservative National Legal Foundation, which was involved in the Colorado case.

"These are the two cases of the decade," Skolrood said. "They point to the question of whether people have a right to participate in their government and also, the family is at

The 6th Circuit concluded that Spiegel misinterpreted relevant precedent in making his "novel" ruling last August.

Spiegel made "findings of fact" about the onset of sexual orientation and its relationship with a person's ability to participate in society. He also made pronouncements on correlation between homosexuality and pedophilia and the relevance of children being raised by Gay

The appeals court said that even assuming Spiegel's conclusions were accurate, "the reality remains that no law can successfully be drafted that is calculated to burden or penalize. or to benefit or protect, an unidentifiable group or class of individuals whose identity is defined by subjective and unapparent characteristics such as innate desires, drives and

The court said that unlike skin color or gender--which is obvious on sight--Gay people generally are not identifiable unless they choose to be "by conduct, such as public displays of homosexual affection.'

Judge Robert B. Krupansky wrote the 6th Circuit opinion, in which Judges Cornelia G. Kennedy and Alan E. Norris concurred.

Lesbian Avengers Sweep the Nation in Their Campaign for Civil Rights for Gays

Milwaukee- In January, hot pink fliers cropped up all over downtown Baltimore, in what appeared to be an overnight "zap" of the city. A bomb with a lighted fuse is prominently featured in the middle of the flier, the name The Lesbian Avengers circling it. Beneath were the words "Calling All Baltimore Dykes! It's time to get OUT of bed, OUT of the bars and into the streets! Come Make Herstory! Help Plan the 1st Action & Party!.

Until this, the Lesbian Avengers were an unknown commodity in Baltimore, but they plan to be as well-known in this city as they are in cities across the country. With their motto, "We Recruit," there are 60 chapters world-wide and they plan to make Baltimore number 61.

Six Lesbian activists, including novelist Sara Schulman and playwright Ana Maria Simo, founded the Lesbian Avengers in New York City in June, 1992 in response to what they felt was a lack of support and action for Lesbian issues. Founders claimed that Lesbians had always worked to further the cause of so many other groups, while Lesbian issues seemed to be put on the back burner.

The Avengers are decidedly confrontational.

To cite a few examples:

In June, 1994, a caravan of Avengers crossed through the Midwest from Minneapolis via Lansing and Pittsburgh staging visibility actions all along the way to New York for Stonewall 25. Another caravan took the southern route and did the same thing;

Last Winter, Avengers from around the country converged on Camp Sister Spirit in Mississippi to rally in support of the Femi-

nist/Lesbian camp; In April, 1994, Avengers in Austin, Texas dumped a three-foot pile of horse manure near a Baptist church marquee which said, "Don't be deceived. Homosexuals commit the most heinous crimes in America.'

These are but a few examples. There are many more and their number is growing.

On February 8, 1995, in San Rafael, California, the San Francisco Avengers Chapter summoned a "Plague of Locusts" onto Exodus International, an Right Wing Christian organization whose mission is to "cure" people of homosexuality.

In agreement with all of the experts in the field, the Avengers say that Exodus is composed of a group of religious amateurs who don't know what they're doing and whose actions can have profoundly devastating effects on Lesbian, Bisexual and Gay people who suffer from religious guilt about their sexual ori-

The Avengers stormed the organization's headquarters, carrying signs proclaiming "Queer Love Is Not a Disease!" and chanting "Exodus, stop your hate and fear! Help like yours is killing queers!"

Exodus International

The reference, the Avengers say, is to the number of Gay people who commit suicide after they go through Exodus' program and remain unchanged--except for the fact that they are more guilt-ridden than ever.

'The 'ex-Gay' ministries pretend to provide a service to struggling, traumatized peo-ple," said Avenger Liz Harris. "In reality they're a cult."

According to past participants who have rejected program teachings, Exodus leaders zero

in on people's weakest emotional areas. For example, an HIV-positive man was told his disease was a punishment from god because he 'had chosen" to be Gay and that if he didn't change, he would "go to hell."

Once involved in the program, which lasts for a year, those who have experienced it say, everyone is assigned to a "buddy" who is with you night and day. You can go nowhere without the "buddy.

A young woman named Kathy (she asked that her last name not be used) said doors are always locked from the outside "to avoid temptation."

According to Chris Glaser, author of Coming Out to God: Prayers for Lesbians and Gay Men, Their Families and Friends, who attended meetings of Exodus incognito, Gay men are "forbidden to go to hairstylists," but must choose barbers instead.

Glaser lamented a program that would force people to choose between spirituality and sexuality. "The fortunate ones," he wrote, will be those who find their way to a congregation which welcomes them as self-affirming Gays

Glaser left the gathering wondering, he said, at "the horrendous implications of a theology that blames variations of life experience on sin. Are non-whites a product of the Fall? Is a deformed baby God's punishment? Even Jesus rejected such ludicrous notions," he wrote.

Some Exodus program participants turn to organizations like Evangelicals Concerned for help, a nation-wide, non-profit corporation founded in 1976, that helps people to reconcile their Gayness with Christianity

The number is: (415) 621-3297. They make furtive calls to the group's Hotline during rare moments they can get away

from their "buddy.

Psychologists say that no one really changes their sexual orientation. According to the documentary, One Nation Under God, Gary Cooper and Michael Bussee, the Gay male founders of Exodus, met during their work with Exodus, fell in love and have been lovers ever since. They have publicly denounced the organization.

Jallen Rix, who experienced Exodus' program and is now a Evangelicals Concerned volunteer, said that what the program leads to is "despondency when people find out that they can't change.

Rix said he has seen many become obsessive, mentally ill, and often kill themselves. One victim wrote that he'd rather blow his brains out and "be with God than live as a Gay person and spend eternity in hell.

The Lesbian Avengers entered Exodus headquarters and climbed onto the reception desk, releasing 1,000 crickets that spread across the office floor.

According to Avenger accounts, a woman in the office picked up the phone, dialed 911 and screamed, "There are Lesbians here with bugs!" By the time she was able to convince the police she wasn't some crank, the Avengers were gone.

The Avengers' Plague of Locusts is part of a broader campaign the activists are waging against the Christian Right. Fight the Right actions have been staged by many of the 60 chapters across the U.S., Canada, Great Britain and Russia.

Randall Terry, Operation Rescue Founder To Launch Radio Attack Against Gays

Denver, CO- Operation Rescue founder Randall Terry on Friday, May 5, announced the startup of a nationwide radio call-in show called "Randall Terry Live" that he said will make Oliver North look "moderate" and Rush Limbaugh "liberal."

"We will have people listening just to see why they want to hate me," said Terry, who last month was released from a federal prison in Allenwood, Pennsylvania, where he served a five-month term for contempt of court.

Terry said he was jailed after a judge found out that his group planned to show thenpresidential candidate Bill Clinton an aborted

But Terry's message on Friday was aimed at neither abortion nor radio call-in shows.

"We must seek to rebuild America on the Ten Commandments," he said. "Be-cause once you depart from the Ten Commandments as the foundation of civic law and cultural law, you are in a moral freefall."

Terry warned that without the Ten Commandments as moral absolutes in America, it will be an "anything goes" society with homosexuals "running rampant all over the place."

He said proponents of equal rights for Gay people say "If a they want to have a relationship, express their love this way, they should have the freedom of choice to express that.

That, he said, departs from the "Biblical Christianity as expressed in the Ten Commandments. If you depart from Biblical Christianity, you cannot condemn homosexuality and other sins," he said.

He said America's future depends on an inflexible moral foundation.

"We're not talking about the state being ruled by the church. We're talking about faith, and leaders acknowledging they are under

"The only alternative is a pagan nation," he said. "Do you want to be like India?" he

He said the United States today is promoting its own religion- "messianic statism."

"The government is trying to be healer, provider, daddy," he said. "The state is trying to be all things to all men."

The Republican Party

On other topics:

Terry said the days of the Republican Party are numbered and it soon will follow its predecessor, the Whigs, into oblivion. "The Whigs refused to deal with slavery. The Republicans are refusing to deal with homosexuality and abortion.

If Timothy McVeigh is guilty of the Oklahoma City bombing, his actions are "the substance of the ideology of the left. It tells me McVeigh's actions are the fruit of moral anar-

Militias are not the fearsome threat to America some believe. "You will remember that the Minutemen were militia. Patrick Henry's 'Give Me Liberty or Give me Death' speech was given to raise militias.

"They (Founding Fathers) knew the greatest potential for the oppression of the citizens was to have a huge centralized federal government that was armed and a citizenry that was disarmed," he said.

Terry concluded saying that "homosexuality is a behavior, not a right. It is the stuff collapsed civilizations are made of, whether it's Sodom and Gomorrah or the Roman Empire.'


Charity" and "They're Playing Our Song."

The New York Theater's Fascination with Gays and Gay Story Lines Continues

Two years ago I reviewed here four Gaythemed productions playing on and off-Broadway (Kiss of the Spider Woman, Angels in America, Jeffrey and Falsettos) and I wondered at the time whether this theatrical fascination with Gay characters and story lines would continue. Well, not to worry. During a recent play-going weekend in New York, I counted at least nine plays and musicals focused on a wide variety of Gay lifestyles (See Box Score below).

The most highly acclaimed play this year is Love! Valour! Compassion! By Terrence McNally. It has received five nominations for the Tony award including Best Play and a Pulitzer may be in the offing.

There is a naturalness to the acting and the men often get together in pairs, small groups to discuss their lives and in doing so, reveal Gay men who are at ease with themselves and one another.

AIDS is no longer the preoccupation that fueled earlier Gay-themed plays and Buzz is the only one who is HIV+. He's sure he'll beat the odds and doesn't talk about it much until in Act II James, John's identical twin brother, arrives from England for medical care for his full blown AIDS. James, unlike his twin brother, is a deliciously funny eccentric Brit queen. He and Buzz bond early on.

McNally always keeps his audiences on the alert for surprises. At one point, Glover as the twins, John and James, carries on an emotional discussion with himself with a clever bit of stagecraft utilizing a high-backed easy chair and the fact that James goes around wearing loose garments.

Toward the end of the play (Labor Day), the cast members come on doing a creditable job of the "Dance of the Little Swans" from Swan Lake. At one point the lights dim and each character steps forward to describe the time and circumstances of his death. It's a stunning coup de theatre, chilling and unforgettable. Then the lights come up and the dancers continue their rehearsal which quickly degenerates into campy takeoffs and comments. They end up singing "In the Good Old Summertime." Party

At first glance, another current play, Party, written and directed by David Dillon, sounds like McNally's Love! Valour! Compassion!. Seven Gay men gather for an evening party and play a variation on "Truth and Dare" in which losers must forfeit an article of clothing. At evening's end, all are down to essentials and non-essentials, though Ray, a young priest, bows to convention by donning a nun's wimple.

Evidently the contrasts far outweigh the similarities of the two plays. The mature thoughtfulness of McNally's characters contrasts with the raucously funny hijinks of Party. It's all camp and fun and games with a bit of bitchiness and self-parody thrown in. In fact, Party is more like The Boys in the Band, Mark Crowley's play now almost 30 years old.

Both plays have aroused much discussion in regard to a noticeable trend toward total male frontal nudity on Broadway this season.

Ramon in LVC spends a good part of Act II sprawled on a raft sunning himself in the buff while other members of the cast skinny dip and join him on the raft from time to time.

The total nudity, I suppose, is intended to express the naturalness of the individuals, but it can be distracting from the main, less Arcadian action taking place at center stage. I was surprised at the number of those in the audience who had brought along their opera glasses.

Not that nudity on stage is something entirely new (remember Hair?), but I think that the difference today is that it is prolonged full frontal nudity, not just the flick of a towel.

Nancy Franklin reviewing Indiscretions, a new version of Cocteau's play, remarks that when the young man in the play takes a bath "he takes so long to dry himself off that you

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

'The Englishman Who Went Up a Hill...' is a Sweet Story that is Full of Froth

Until the chiseled British actor Hugh Grant appeared on the scene, American women were beginning to feel a little Bruce Willised out.

Four Weddings and a Funeral, starring Grant, showed the return of a particular kind of romantic lead: the bashful, but charming gentleman.

Knowing a good thing when he sees it, writer-director Chris Monger has transplanted Grant's Mr. Nice Guy to foggy Wales in 1917

Two English map makers drive into a sleepy village and rent a room at the town's only inn. They've come to measure Ffynnon Garw, a mountain much prized by the local commu-

But the beloved landmark, which bears the same name as the town, doesn't match up. It's only 984 feet tall. So Reginald Anson (Grant) and his boss (Ian McNeice) inform the citizens their landmark is 16 feet too short. It's only a hill, and so it can't appear on any official government map.

The proud townsfolk are outraged. Led by their lecherous innkeeper, Morgan the Goat (Colm Meaney), and the strait-laced Rev. Jones (Kenneth Griffith), a plot is hatched: They will trap the unwitting Englishmen in town until they can find a way for their mountain to gain its place in history.

The villagers, whose names include descriptions of their jobs or personalities, pull out every stop to keep the guests around. Williams the Petroleum dismantles their engine. Thomas the Trains plays havoc with the railway schedules.

Finally, the conniving Morgan sends for Betty of Cardiff (Tara Fitzgerald), a sexy country girl with a wicked gleam in her eye.

The Englishman Who ... is a sweet, but lightweight comedy from Miramax, reminiscent of British movies of the 1940s and '50s that were filled to the brim with well-meaning

eccentrics.

This nostalgic, gentle look at a tight-knit mining town has a great cast and several very funny moments. But the sum of all these good parts just doesn't add up to a memorable, must-see movie.

The predictable narrative isn't substantial enough for a 99-minute feature, and the saccharin cuteness is a little too thick.

Grant is natural as the shy idealist who grows fond of his surroundings. But his stammering, befuddled Englishman is a carbon copy of his role in Four Weddings. And the blinking, wincing persona is so overdone at times, you begin to question its authenticity.

Fitzgerald is impressive as the vulnerable beauty who longs to leave her small, conscribed life. And the film is brightened by the battle of wills between the pompous preacher and the promiscuous innkeeper who is so ob-

sessed with sex he declares "maps are the undergarments of a country."

It's a nice turn from Meaney whose building a

fine body of work alongside his roles in TV's "Star Trek: The Next Generation" and "Deep Space Nine."

The isolated Welsh town is well out of the line of fire of World War I, but the horrors of trench warfare are illustrated by a moving character named Johnny Shellshocked (Ian Hart).

Monger brings a sense of real love to this fable, passed down through his family from his grandfather. And his feel for the surroundings is presented by beautiful shots of the Welsh valleys and a dramatic torchlit procession along the hillside.

But no amount of great landscapes can completely balance the movie's cloying quality and slight story line.

Gay Director John Waters Says He's Changed Since his "Divine" Times

Cannes, France— Gay Director John Waters, sitting on the jury of this year's Cannes Film Festival, insists he's a changed man since he made Pink Flamingoes and his other outrageous flicks of the '70s with the wildly wonderful Divine.

Divine's last recorded in-depth interview was with Wisconsin Light in the Milwaukee Howard Johnson's Motel. She was in Milwaukee, appearing at Club 219.

"I certainly am without the slightest bit of irony proud to be here," the director said at a news conference Wednesday, May 17.

Now graying and 49, Waters once said he considered someone throwing up at his movies to be a standing ovation.

"Did I change my state of mind? Well, certainly since I made my first movie," said Waters, who made Polyester, Desperate Living and Eat Your Makeup.

"You know, at 20 it's fun to be crazy, and at 50 it would be kind of sad."

Waters is on a 10-member jury that for the first time at Cannes has four women, including jury president and actress Jeanne Moreau. Nadine Gordimer, the South African author

and Nobel laureate, is also among them.

The jurors were grilled by reporters about conflict of interest, due to past collaboration with those involved in the 24 films under consideration in the 12-day festival, which opened Wednesday night. American films dominate with six.

"Cinema is a big family, and it's true we all know each other, so we're not going to withdraw because of that," said Miss Moreau.

Said Waters: "I think we all on this jury know people who have made good and bad movies, so I think we can be very fair."

Early today, a fire burned two booths at the festival's trade fair, including one selling erotic movies, but no injuries were reported. The cause was under investigation.

Smoke detectors in the seaside Festival Palace alerted firefighters and the blaze was extinguished 20 minutes later, said a fire department spokesman.

The fire occurred in a basement level area set aside for the trade fair, featuring hundreds of companies selling movies, posters and equipment.

Dale Gutzman's 'Three Penny Opera' is a Cross Dressing Extravaganza

Milwaukee-- Men play women, women play men and sex runs rampant in Dale Gutzman's production of The Three Penny Opera to be held at Vogel Hall on June 8, 9 and 10. This is the perfect way to start out your Gay PrideFest weekend.

The famous musical by Bertholt Brecht and Kurt Weill was first presented in 1928. At the time it shocked and delighted audiences in Berlin.

In the next five years, over 10,000 performances of Three Penny Opera were given all over Europe. In America, the show is mostly known for its hit song "Mack the Knife."

The play is all about social injustice and inequality, a message as powerful today as it ever was and Gutzman's staging of this wickedly funny musical promises to open a few local eyes.

In Gutzman's concept for the show, a group of ruffians (street people) break into the home of a wealthy conservative family...time them to chairs and put on The Three Penny Opera for them to "educate" them. The story concerns cut-throat and thief, Mack the Knife, and his double-dealings, double-marriages and double crossing, all played out to jaunty music hall numbers as well as beautiful ballads.

At the center of Gutzman's concept is the fact that the cast mix up the genders they play. Much of the action takes place in a London whore house. Gutzman has male actors playing the female whores and female actors playing the male customers. The youngest actor playing a female prostitute is 16 years-old and the oldest is 77.

All of this creates a nightmarish hallucina-

tory effect, says Gutzman. "In the show, the whores dance an erotic tango with their clients and it was hell deciding who was going to lead!"

Of course, the leads in Gutzman's show are always seasoned professionals. Karl Miller, well-known to the Gay community, plays Mack the Knife. He recently acted in Gutzman's production of Follies. He will be performing with Gutzman at the Cafe Royale in Thailand this November once again.

David Flores, an outstanding singer, dancer and actor, plays the street singer. Flores has worked for many of the major companies in town. He played the emcee in Gutzman's radical staging of Cabaret a few seasons ago. He too will be performing in Gutzman's Gay Revue in Thailand.

Marilyn White plays the whore with the head of steel, Jenny. Marilyn has worked in over a dozen Gutzman shows. She has also performed at the Skylight Theatre, Broadway Baby and other prominent local groups.

As with all Gutzman shows, the cast is a mixture of Milwaukee "pros" joined with young actors just starting out. Gutzman proudly announces that half his cast is from Milwaukee's Gay community.

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


Next to the card and magazine racks, the wall and shelves display a colorful array of party favors, costumes and generally fun stuff, guaranteed to brighten any fete.

Gay Son of Marine Colonel Writes Soul-Stirring Biography about Growing Up Gay

White Marsh, MD— When Marine Col. Fred Peck testified two years ago that he opposed Gays in the military even though his son Scott was, himself, a Gay man, the younger Peck became a cause celebre.

Scott Peck did 30 interviews in two days. Book deals followed with many publishers looking for an "Amy Fisheresque, let's- capitalize-on-our-15-minutes-of-fame book," he said.

But Peck was determined to write a story true to his life.

In his memoir, All-American Boy, which hits bookstores this week, the second week in April, Peck talks about his sometimes-strained relationship with his father, the violence of his alcoholic stepfather and his own desire for other men, which, at the time, filled him with shame.

Although 26 seems a young age to pen an autobiography, Peck says he has lived plenty during that time.

His parents married after he was born- and after the elder Peck graduated from the Naval Academy. But the union between high school sweethearts soured, particularly since his fa-

Sondheim Creates Romance in 'A Little Night Music'

Good things come in threes: waltz time, love triangles and three-ring circuses.

In A Little Night Music, the Broadway classic being presented through June 11 at Milwaukee's Skylight Opera Theatre, love triangles waltz into a three-ring circus. During a long Scandinavian Summer night, young and old lovers sort their affairs out with comedy, insight and only very minor bloodshed.

Stephen Sondheim wrote the music and lyrics in 1973. He's better known for colder and more cynical works such as Sweeny Todd, about a murderous Victorian barber, and Assassins, about killers of U.S. presidents.

A Little Night Music is lighter fare, although its most famous song, "Send in the Clowns," reflects Sondheim's usual irony.

In this show, based on an Ingmar Bergman movie, he wanted to create a romantic musical. He did. He set the music all in waltz time, although that never grows tedious. He set the scene at the turn of the century, when the cast would be costumed in lush satin gowns and formal evening wear.

And in the show, the Summer night smiles three times, explains one character, an elderly courtesan named Madame Arnfeldt: "First for the young, who know nothing; second for the fools who know too little; and third for the old, who know too much."

Old Madame Arnfeldt is the mother of the foolish Desiree, an actress loved by both Carl-Magnus and Fredrik. Both Fredrik and his son Henrik, love young Anne. Carl-Magnus loves both Desiree and his wife Charlotte, who tells Anne about Fredrik and Desiree. Then Charlotte makes a play for Fredrik at Madame Arnfeldt's house . . . Well, the night eventually smiles on them all, somehow.

Watch for the delightful performance of the Libesleiders, the white-clad chorus that explains what the self-deceptive lovers can't bring themselves to admit. Perra, the maid, finds many mouths to kiss with busty lust.

A Broadway-experienced cast and crew includes April Shawhan as Desiree, Richard Kip as Fredrik and stage director/choreographer Elaine Petricoff.

If Springtime doesn't warm you, A Little Night Music, set in a dreamy Swedish Summer will. ther spent so much time stationed overseas.

When Peck was 6, his parents divorced and he spent his formative years in Florida with his mother and stepfather.

"I didn't want to hand my father 270 pages of guilt. I wasn't looking for an apology. I just wanted an acknowledgment, "Here's everything you never asked me about. Here's who I am,'' Scott Peck said.

A week after receiving the book, his father telephoned him.


"I could tell he was nervous. When he's nervous, he talks about nothing. So we did that for about half an hour," the younger Peck said. "And then he said, 'I read the book...Guilty as charged."


Scott Peck said the two then had the most honest conversation of their lives.

"In a perfect world, I wish Scott had written the book, gotten a tremendous amount of money, and only printed one copy and gave it to me," said Fred Peck, 46, deputy director of public affairs for the U.S. Marine Corps in Washington.

The elder Peck said he was pained to know what Scott sometimes thought of him.

"If I were writing the ending, I would have expanded on the reconciliation," he said. "But then it wouldn't have been the Scott Peck story. It would have been the Fred Peck story."

A Peter Hart survey in 1994 found that American voters overwhelmingly favored, by 66 to 28 percent, concentrating on improving the quality of public schools.

Cultural Agencies. The Contract calls for abolishing federal support for the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting because, according to Reed, they "undermine moral values.

An Opinion Research Corporation Poll released in January, 1995, reported that 84% of Americans supported current or increased levels of funding for public television.

A 1994 Lou Harris poll indicated that 60% of the American people believe that the federal government should provide financial assistance to arts organizations. Almost as many, 56%, said they would be willing to pay \$15 more in their own taxes per year to support federal efforts in the arts

Parental Rights. The Contract calls for protecting parental rights in the care and nurturance of their children.

Restricting Information on the Internet and cable TV. The Contract calls for restricting access to "pornography" on the Internet and on cable TV.

Among other things referred to by the term 'pornography," are LesBiGay sections on BBS's or LesBiGay BBS's themselves. The Coalition support legislation that would censor these or shut them down.

Reproductive Choice. The Contract calls for further restrictions on women's access to abortion services. The Contract calls for eliminating federal "subsidies" and tax funding for abortions and banning certain abortion pro-

Opinion polls almost universally show that more than 70% of Americans believe that abortion should be available and should be a choice left up to a woman and her doctor

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

Two Americans, One German, Share T-Cell Prize

Frankfurt, Germany-AP- Two Americans and a German are to share a top German medical prize for work that may help to develop vaccines or treatments for AIDS and cancer. The winners of the Paul Ehrlich Prize are Jack Strominger of Harvard University, Pamela Bjorkman of the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena and Hans-George Rammensee of the German Cancer Research Center in Heidelberg. Their work on the T-cell has led to "essential progress in the development of vaccines against infectious illnesses, and possibly in treatment of cancer and AIDS," the Ehrlich Foundation said in announcing the prize. The research of the three scientists expanded the knowledge of how a virus activates the immune system.

Feds Agree to Retire Lesbian as a Major

Long Beach, CA-AP- A woman investigated by the Army when she publicly acknowledged she is a Lesbian will be retired with the rank of major in a settlement proposed by the U.S. Department of Justice. The settlement means that Dusty Pruitt, 48, will qualify for full retirement pay and medical benefits when she reaches 60. "It's a wonderful settlement and I'm thrilledextremely thrilled," said Pruitt, who is now a minister of the Metropolitan Community Church. "This is an end to an incredibly long struggle. I'm walking on cloud nine."

Pruitt was given an honorable, but involuntary discharge in 1986. The proposed settlement

would change that status to a voluntary retirement.

"The military has a long way to go when it comes to Gays and Lesbians who want to serve their country," Pruitt said. "The military has to look at discrimination against women and Gays and Lesbians-they're all tied together.

Newt's Sister Would Oppose His White House Bid

Atlanta, GA-AP- Candace Gingrich said on May 12 that she would openly oppose her brother if he decides to run for the presidency in 1996. Her brother, House Speaker Newt Gingrich, has not declared his candidacy, but has said he hasn't ruled it out. Ms. Gingrich said she believes her brother's supporters may be pressuring him to run before he's ready. "Personally, I think he needs to learn the position of Speaker first," she said.

Ms. Gingrich, who was in Atlanta attending an awards ceremony for the Human Rights Campaign Fund, for the first time met another Lesbian whose family ties to ultra-conservative Georgia politics have put her in the public eye. Shannon Byrne, the daughter of Cobb County Commission Chairman Bill Byrne, came out last June. She stepped forward to oppose her father's support of a Cobb County resolution that condemned Gay people.

Kansas Town Bans Anti-Gay Discrimination

Lawrence, KS-- In a three-two vote on Tuesday, May 2, the City Commission of Lawrence, Kansas, voted to add the words "sexual orientation" to the city's existing Human Relations Ordinance. The decision is being hailed as making Lawrence the only city in the State of Kansas to extend protection against discrimination to Gay people. Proponents of the amendment who spoke before the commission included local representatives from several Christian congregations and the Lawrence Jewish Community Center. The opposition came from Christian Fundamentalists who used the argument that in the Garden of Eden "there was no Adam and Steve." The Fundamentalists are promising a referendum battle. Preparation against the expect Far Right backlash and a battle at the polls, is already underway.

Lesbian Wins Joint Guardianship of Slain Lover's Sons

Buffalo, NY-AP- Pamela Hennessy believes that her being a Lesbian has deprived her of the chance to be a full-time parent and raise three boys born to her slain lover's sons. Hennessy said that she reluctantly agreed to share custody of the boys with their grandmother, Patricia Bartel, the mother of Hennessy's former spouse, Michelle Hennessy. If she had not agreed, she said, she believed that the judge would have given Bartel full custody of the boys because Hennessy is a Lesbian. Under the settlement, which ended a year-long custody fight, the boys will live with Bartel in her Buffalo home, but will spend alternate weekends and some vacations and holidays with Hennessy, 38, who lives in suburban Cheektowaga. The boys were conceived through artificial insemination by Michelle Hennessy. Michelle Hennessy, 29, was stabbed to death at her Buffalo home. The case remains unsolved.

Hennessy accepted the settlement against the advice of her lawyers, who said she could have won the case on appeal if the court had ruled against her.

Kate Kendell, legal director of the National Center for Lesbian Rights in San Francisco, said that "What cases like this point up most starkly is there's a real lack of protection for these kids

who have already lost one parent and are threatened with losing a second.

Emotional Testimony in Lesbian Custody Hearing

Dover, NH-AP- After listening to hours of emotional testimony, a judge is deciding whether a Lesbian estranged from her former lover has the right to visit the child the two of them raised when they were together. "She's the child that Lucinda and I had together," Joan Comeau said of the child born in 1989 to Lucinda Grondin, who had been artificially inseminated. Comeau said that she and Grondin planned the baby and that she accompanied Grondin to every prenatal hospital visit and coached her through the birth. It was understood that the couple would raise the child together, until last October when Grondin cut off Comeau's contact with the child. Grondin now has a new partner and the child is seeing a therapist. A guardian has been appointed to ensure the child's rights are protected.

"I noticed my daughter was very angry with me when she'd come back from visiting with Joan," Grondin said, adding that on a few occasions the child would push her and say, "Joannie's my mommy. I want to live with my real mommy." Grondin's lawyer, Mark Hanlon, questioned Comeau's motive and accused her of pursuing the case "to champion the Lesbian

As seen on the front cover, the first of the 38 Rainbow flags is being raised on E. Wisconsin Avenue in downtown Milwaukee on Thursday, May 18, 1995, by Chris Lubus.

There will be 38 Rainbow flags in all. Seventeen will be flying from Prospect to 8th St. on Wisconsin Avenue

Ten flags will be flown on Juneau Ave and ten will be flown on Kilbourn. One flag will be flown on Astor.

PrideFest plans to begin installing the flags on May 18th. They will remain in place until October 1st. The flags will be mounted by

volunteers from Triangle Tire and PrideFest. "These flags will help people feel proud all summer long." said PrideFest Co-Director, Bill Meunier. "We've gotten a fantastic response from the entire community. This is an idea that seems to have captured people's imagination. We are gratified over the financial support being extended to this

PrideFest had to raise money to purchase flag holders, flag poles, brackets and of course the flag themselves. In addition to those costs PrideFest had to pay a permit fee to the city for each pole being used. All told the cost for this project ran close to \$1,500.

"Its money well spent," said Meunier, "These flags will serve as continuing reminder of the many contributions Gays and Lesbians have made to the community.

Meunier says he already has had out of towners who heard about the project asking about it. "Others are interested in repeating this in their cities."

in succeeding years the project costs will be limited to the city permit fees and to replacements for worn out flags.



We are truly a remarkable people. Out of chaos, we create art. Out of oppression and degradation, we draw the reality of self-worth and nobility, the dream of Pride.

For that, if we do not falter (and we will not), history, we think, will treat us well.

Response to Margo Szews

In a Milwaukee Journal Sentinel "In My Opinion" column of May 18, 1995, Margo Szews writes that "it is simply wrong for 27 MPS and suburban high schools" to accept an advertisement that provides information on Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual support groups and resources for teens.

The purpose of the advertisement is to alleviate Gay and Lesbian youth from the painful and spiritually disfiguring isolation of being Gay and Lesbian in a society that is typified by the sort of ignorant prejudice that Szews demonstrates.

Homosexuality is natural. Schools should candidly acknowledge the fullness of human sexuality in its true and natural range and form. More prescripts are irrelevant. We should cherish and preserve our tradition of freedom of information and ideas and allegiance to truthfulness.

The most important benefit of education is instruction in the ability to reason. The most significant detriment is the possibility that an educational system will be used for indoctrination and for instruction in principles and methods of thought that are contrary to reason. This does not argue against the importance of morality—nor theology—unless it is given political importance and used for purposes of discrimination, oppression and the selfish advancement of truthless and undemocratic agendas.

Szews closes her opinion by lauding the failure of the school system's integrity. I understand the rhetorical importance of her representation of cowardice as courage—this is a selfish statement of Szews' consciousness of her authority, the very consciousness that has evidently prompted her to write her opinions—but cannot honor it.

For what Szews defines as courage is, in fact, cowardice. It is fear of the power that she and others who share her opinions might have that restrains schools from including truths about natural human sexuality in their curricula and their media.

I won't tolerate her view that homosexuals are interested in "recruiting" children. Homosexuality is not a social philosophy regardless of its social dimension. If a child is Gay or Lesbian, he or she will be naturally Gay or Lesbian. Advertisements about the availability of social resources cannot affect human sexual orientation and only indicate humane concern in a desire to alleviate the pain of isolation and oppression that young Gays and Lesbians experience.

The terms Szews uses to describe the actors in this contest are skewed. It is those whom she accuses of turpitude, Mike Lisowski among them, who truthfully, honestly and courageously fight to advance a just and humane cause against bigotry, hatred and irrational fear.

Finally, Szews argues against our great American tradition of tolerance and personal freedom. She chooses not to recognize that in her denial of the civil rights of homosexuals, including freedoms that pertain to educational systems, she proclaims opposition to the political tradition of America and its Constitution

We are yet free, Ms. Szews, and you are one of the free. May we continue to respect America's great political tradition of liberty and justice for all.

Editor's Note: While heartily agreeing with Steve Brondino in everything he writes, the problem that I have with Szews is that she obviously has no idea whatever about the proper use of source material or how to critique those sources. To put it another way, the woman has dipped deep into the well of

knowledge-and drowned.

For example, "Every homosexual is the product of premature seduction in child-hood..." Really?? I live to tell you that you are wrong!

Or again, "homosexuality is...caused by environmental factors." How very remarkable. Countless researchers in human sexuality have not been able to discover what Margo passes off with a stroke of her pen.

The worst part of all this is that there will be people who will believe her; young people, many of them, and many of them Gay people.

Have you any idea Szews what words like your can do to someone? Do you have any idea Szews that people commit suicide because of people like you making them feel less than what they are? Do you know Szews that words have power and that someone could set out and Gay-bash using what you've written as a justification for the act?

Are you willing to accept the responsibility for all that?

My most earnest suggestion to Szews is to go back to school, get some education, talk to some Gay people.

The sad thing about it is that she probably won't do any of that. Instead, she'll be like the professor of legend who told his class, "I have my theory, heaven help the facts."

SPEAKING FROM THE RIGHT

After celebrating the recent victory by Republicans at all levels of government, Wisconsin Log Cabin has turned to its legislative agenda.

Log Cabin began by writing to all of the Republican members of the Wisconsin State Assembly and State Senate congratulating them on their victory and urging them to quickly enact tort reform. The winning of a Republican majority in the Assembly and the retention of a Republican majority in the Senate made tort reform possible since the Democrats refused to allow a vote on tort reform bills at the behest of the plaintiffs' attorneys.

Tort reform is vitally important from an economic perspective because it will restrain the growth of liability insurance premiums.

The litigation explosion which has occurred in this country has forced insurance companies to increase their premiums significantly because of rising claims experiences. This is especially difficult for small businesses which cannot easily absorb such large expenses, but it also constitutes a significant drain on the economy.

In addition, tort reform will restore a sense of justice to the legal system. Under the current system, a person can be forced to pay for damages which were caused by another party just because that person is partially liable for damages to the victim.

Tort reform would do away with this illogical rule.

Tort reform would also restrain the practice of many juries of awarding ridiculously high punitive damages (In a recent case actual damages amounted to \$250,000 but the jury awarded \$25 million in punitive damages). Thus, tort reform will stop an unelected judiciary from redistributing wealth instead of allocating responsibility.

Log Cabin also wrote to the Republican members of the Wisconsin Congressional delegation, congratulating them on their victory and urging them to support tort reform at the Federal level.

A similar letter was written to Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole and House Speaker Newt Gingrich.

The litigation explosion has affected every state in the union, and Log Cabin would be happy to see action on this issue at any level of government.

Log Cabin was pleased with the results of these lobbying actions. Within two weeks of sending our letter to the Republicans in the State Assembly, the Assembly overwhelmingly adopted significant tort reform.

The State Senate also has adopted tort reform, as has the House of Representatives.

Log Cabin has also been busy lobbying the state legislature on welfare reform proposals. As can be seen, Log Cabin has been very busy on issues of concern to the nation as a whole, and as a Republican organization, Log Cabin feels these issues are paramount since the survival of the nation as a strong economic entity depends on the proper resolution of these problems. Log Cabin has also been involved in legislative issues which more specifically concern the Lesbian and Gay community.

In A Day When There Was No Pride

Back in the days when I was coming of age, in the 50's and early '60's (That's in this century), there weren't any Pride celebrations, not anywhere. I knew, of course, that I was powerfully attracted to other males, that I wanted to date a guy, that I wanted to love one and have him fall in love with me. I knew all that, but I didn't know any words for it except "homosexual" and the word "sodomite" that got flung around in church every now and then.

Not only that, but I thought I was the only one on earth who felt as I did. That's such an awfully lonely feeling. You just feel so isolated, so alone, so full of guilt and self-recrimination—at least I did.

When I got to Geneva College, I learned there were other guys just like me. I didn't know who they were, but I figured there had to be more. When the Director of Spiritual Activities, Rev. Williard MacMillian, got up (as he did every so often in chapel) and started ranting and raving about how "sodomites" were the scum of the earth, how they all deserved death and belonged in Hell, I didn't think he was talking just about me. Hell, I didn't even know that man that well.

As I've written before. Stanley took old Williard to heart and committed suicide. I heard later that Williard's judgment on the situation was that Stanley had only done with his own hand what God had intended for him anyway.

When I got to Catholic University for grad work, I was on my way out of the closet, a slow process, but it had begun. That's when I met Dick Borrell.

Dick was short, of compact build, with olive skin, black hair and the map of Ireland on his face. I thought he was as cute as he could possibly be. We became good friends.

One evening we were in my apartment on Perry Street, splitting a couple of six-packs together and talking. One thing led to another and I asked him if he'd like to stay the night.

Up he got and away he went, going out the door, head down. I chased after him, asking him to come back. Without looking at me nor stopping, he muttered, "You don't want to be like me."

Which was just the point. I was like him, exactly like him, felt like him, wanted what he wanted, but we had such a hard, nearly an impossible time, talking about all that, even to each other.

Dick and I resumed our friendship. Things

seemed the same as they had been before. And one night, he did stay and taught me such an awful lot. I shall be forever grateful to him.

He never finished at CU-or anywhere else I know of. He suffered a breakdown and left school. I have never heard from him again.

But once, I got up my courage and asked Father Moody who taught French History, if he knew what had happened to Dick. I knew Moody thought of Dick as his prize student.

I will never forget. Moody looked at me, his face screwed up in disgust and said, "People like him belong in a cage."

Over the years, I've known a lot of men and fallen in love with one who now is my spouse. But I've never forgotten Stanley or Dick. It is at this time of year that I think of them most.

In those days, there were no Pride celebrations, no places where young people such as we all were then, could learn that there was no reason to hate yourself, no reason to think that you were not worth of human dignity and love because you'd been born Gay.

I hear some people say that PrideFest is a political statement. I hear radio talkshow hosts and bilious ministers say PrideFest is only an excuse to "flaunt it." But to me, PrideFest is neither.

Had there been PrideFest back in my "day," maybe Stanley would be alive. And maybe Dick would have finished grad school and gone on to build a brilliant career. He was certainly capable of it.

But those were the days when there was no Pride and no place like it where you could affirm yourself and be affirmed in your turn. There was no PrideFest to go to where you could be among your own people and feel for a couple of days, at least, what it would be like to be truly free.

To live in the shadows, to live with selfhatred, to live in fear is a horrible thing. It eats away at you so the bigots like MacMillian and Moody can get at you. It can make you think you're less than you are.

In large part because of PrideFest, I know now what I wish deeply that Stanley, Dick and I--and countless others like us--knew back then. That we are part of a great and wonderful community, members of a noble people who have given and continue to give so much.

How I got through, I don't know. Maybe like Wilder says, by the skin of my teeth. But Dick and Stanley didn't get through and the thought I have is that had there been a PrideFest then, they might have survived.

Give the People Light and they will find their own way.

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
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Hate Speech Aimed at Gays and Women **Moves American Backward**

I don't know whether to be mad or glad. But there's something unsettling about how quickly the flap over Lesbians, boobs and the Ladies Professional Golf Association disappeared from the national debate.

Does it mean we immediately dismissed as nonsense the comments from CBS golf expert Ben Wright, who was analyzing his own prejudice instead of the game and its players. Or does it mean that we so easily accept homophobia and the derogation of women without pausing to challenge and debate?

I fear it's the latter.

When I think of all the Gay and Lesbian friends I have known, one common thread runs through our relationships: I didn't know they were homosexuals until someone else told me. With one tragic exception, however: A close friend and colleague informed me on his own--through his suicide note.

He believed all the crap that he was the worst of people and a blight on society. So he hanged himself from a pecan tree in his yard.

The destructive thing about Wright's comments is not whether he is right about women's golf. It's that instead of moving society forward in understanding a purported 10% of our population, his comments have taken us backward to the stereotype that Gays and Lesbians are out to dominate.

I fear that those people who will take Wright's remarks to heart will now turn their sights to society as a whole. And their communities. And their civic organizations. And their schools. And their families. They'll de-

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termine they'd better root out Gays and Lesbians before they do to society what they've done to women's golf.

The sports world and the impact of Lesbians is not the big issue. I don't know whether Wright is wrong or not. And I don't want to know. Sexuality should really matter.
All I really know is that Wright's comments

on women's pro golf do not carry over into society. All that my Gay and Lesbian friends were and still are trying to do is live.

It's too bad more heterosexuals don't follow that lead. But I worry about a new wave of homophobia in society that could be unleashed by Wright's comments and the lack of subsequent debate and opportunity for enlighten-

Will college athletic directors believe they have more ammunition to turn back the limited gains of Title IX for female college athletes?

Will some lawmakers now reason that taxpayer dollars should not be used for sports purportedly overrun by Lesbians?

I don't believe Wright's denials. If he had said such negative things about African Americans, he would have been taken off the air immediately. Remember Jimmy Greek" Snyder?

But it's acceptable and even laudatory in some circles to be publicly bigoted against women and Gays and to demean anything they are involved with.

Hertz kept O.J. Simpson after he pleaded no contest to beating his wife.

CES has kept Ben Wright, which affirms to society's bigots that it's all right to generalize that women's boobs get in the way and ladies' pro golf is a butch game.

Just a month after the Oklahoma City bombing and the president's call for us to challenge hateful speech that generalizes and demonizes, we've said so little to challenge

Did we really learn anything? I fear not a

damned thing.





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Camp Sister Spirit's Neighbors Don't Want to Live Near Lesbians, They Say

Laurel, MS-- The founder of a feminist retreat in Jones County testified Monday, May 22, that she and her Lesbian partner never meant to start a controversy.

"We are not there to be offensive to anybody," Brenda Henson said Monday in the final day of the nuisance trial for Camp Sister Spirit in Jones County Chancery Court.

She said the lawsuit was the first complaint she received about noise and traffic being a problem around their retreat near Ovett.

In testimony last week, residents said the Ovett area had been tranquil before the camp opened on an old farm in late 1993.

Everywhere I go, people ask me what it's like to have Lesbians for neighbors. It's hard to be proud of where you live." said Michelle Carter, one of five residents seeking to shut down the retreat.

Michael Barefield, the attorney for Carter and the other plaintiffs, said Monday that Brenda and Wanda Henson "came here to start a war to propagate the homosexual agenda. That's not a reasonable land use in an essentially residential community." he said after the trial.

Camp Sister Spirit attorney David Daniels said the retreat is lawful.

Chancellor Frank McKenzie is giving attorneys several weeks to file briefs before ruling. Camp Sister Spirit has been under fire since the Hensons founded it. Barefield filed the lawsuit in March 1994 on behalf of neighbors. The Hensons testified that the retreat is not an activist organization. They also said claims the group came to Jones County as part of the "Gay movement" were false.

gaining Republican support for AIDS LCR was successful in persuading both the Senate and the House chairmen of the committees dealing with AIDS funding issues to support reauthorization of the Ryan White Care Act, which provides needed funding for the care of people living with

LCR was also largely responsible for reversing a House Appropriations Subcommittee vote to cut millions of dollars from the Ryan White Act. The critical votes which changed were the votes of several extremely conservative Republicans including Rep. Istook, the Oklahoma Congressman who once declared that he would never hire a homosexual (Other conservative Republicans supporting restoration included Reps. Forbes, Bunn, Wolf, and Dickey).

At the state level, Log Cabin Club of Wisconsin has also been very active on the issue of AIDS funding in the state budget, as described more fully elsewhere in this newspa-

Log Cabin has monitored and responded to comments from Republican leaders regarding

We recently responded to comments that Speaker Newt Gingrich made about counseling programs for Lesbian and Gay students, calling them attempts to "recruit"

We wrote to Speaker Gingrich and expressed our outrage over his reference to the recruitment" myth which has long since been debunked by almost all scientists and medical experts. We asked him to refrain from resorting to falsehoods and myths to support his viewpoints on these issues.

In a recent New York Times Magazine article, Senator Dole expressed his opposition to discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and stated he had not made up his mind on the Gays in the military issue. After sev-

eral weeks of being viciously attacked by the Radical Right. Senator Dole sent a letter to the Washington Times noting his opposition to President Clinton's initial proposal to allow Gays in the military

He also stated that he was opposed to "special rights" legislation which included efforts to obtain a Federal law banning discrimination against Lesbians and Gays.

We asked Senator Dole to take steps to resolve this inconsistency by supporting legislation which would guarantee equal rights rather than special rights.

We noted that Log Cabin was instrumental in pushing for the Employment Non-Discrimination Act which bans discrimination in employment on the basis of sexual orientation, but also specifically bans quotas for Lesbians and Gays. This contrasts with efforts by Gay Democrats in the past to merely amend the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to include sexual orientation, which would then incorpospecial rights into sexual orientation discrimi-

Log Cabin remains hopeful that Senator Dole will be persuaded to abandon his illfated attempts to court the minority of the conservative wing which is preoccupied with the issue of homosexuality (especially since they already have three more reliable candidates to support). Instead, we urged him to focus on social is-

his past statements in opposition to discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.
