"We put 'The Main Place' on the papers because we had to put something down." said Scheel Nelson. "It'd be a beautiful thing to have happen but I don't think that site is as promising as it looked at

The Scheels, owners of the Hotel Washington, had told The Light they were planning on opening as many of the former Hotel's businesses as they could at a new

The Main Place


The Main Street site was formerly occu-pied by "Going My Way" a Madison Gay bar that closed over 10 years ago.

Paras Leaves NGLTF With Stellar Record Kerry Lobel Named as Replacement

Washington D.C. Melinda Paras, Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), has announced she will step down from the helm of the nation's oldest Gay and Lesbian civil rights group, upon completion of her term, to pursue personal goals.

NGLT was founded in 1973. The group organizes, lobbies, advocates and educates for the civil rights of Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender people. It has a staff of 21 and 35,000 members.

Replacement Named

Paras' two-year term will end Dec. 1, 1996. The NGLTF Board of directors announced that Kerry Lobel, NGLTF Deputy Director, has been named new Executive Director, effective Dec. 1.

As second-in-command of the Task Force and a former chief executive herself, Lobel brings years of grassroots and national expertise and leadership to her new role.

Paras Praised

"Melinda has been instrumental in stabilizing the Task Force and in setting a new vision for NGLTF," said Joe Hall and Sue Anderson, NGLTF board Co-chairs. "She distinguished herself by reinvigorating the Policy Institute -- the movement's think tank -- stabilizing the organization and its

management team, and emphasizing NGLTF's commitment to building a stronger grassroots movement."

Paras, 43, said she and her partner, Barbara Englis, will move back to their home in San Francisco to have children, build a family and pursue other personal and professional goals. Englis is returning to her work on behalf of homeless veterans.

The board Co-chairs said Paras was brought in to stabilize NGLTF administrative operations and shore up its political work. During her term, Paras took a leadership role in numerous battles for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender (g/l/b/t) equality and responsible federal HIV/AIDS

Paras Thanks NGLTF

"It has been a time of pride and empower-ment for me to serve NGLTF and our community in what will go down in history as possibly the most important period of our movement for social change," said Paras. "Despite the ups and downs we have witnessed and been a part of -- from the Supreme Court victory on Amendment 2 to the Defense of Marriage Act, from promising new life-prolonging AIDS treatments to at-tacks on Medicaid – it has been a profoundly significant time for us. More and

more people are coming out and creating change in their communities. It has been an honor for me play a role

NGLFT Made Progress Under

During her term Paras directed several important new initiatives. She reinvigorated the NGLTF Policy Institute when she hired noted historian and author Dr. John D'Emilio of the University of North Carolina to direct the research, analysis and publishing arm of NGLTF. Under her direction,the Policy Institute published a series of path-finding activist tools, including "To Have and To Hold: Organizing For Our Right To Marry;"
"Power At The Polls: The
Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual Vote;" "Here to Stay: A Working Paper on Lesbian and Gay Family Issues;" "Beyond the Beltway: The Gay, Lesbian and Bi-sexual Vote;" and the NGLTF Cam-

pus Manual. Under her leadership the Task Force sponsored two ground-breaking Youth Leadership Trainings that attracted some of the brightest g/l/b/t young talent in the nation. NGLTF co-sponsored "All God's Children," the award-winning video by filmmakers Dr. Dee Mosbacher,

Washington D.C.—The results of the first ever statistically valid poll of Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Americans have been released by the Human Rights Campaign (HRC).

The poll shows a picture of Gay and Lesbian life in America that is not very differ-ent from that of the population as a whole. It backs up Gay activist's claims of a large voting block of Gays and Lesbians and provides good news for Democrats hoping for Gay support in the November 5 election.
The HRC commissioned research was

conducted by ICR, a well respected polling firm. Lake Research assisted HRC in formulating the questions and tabulating and interrupted the data.

High Turn Out, Support for Clinton The data shows that over 3/4 of all Gay voters are planning to participate in the November elections and that 70% of them intend to vote for President Clinton versus only 11% who selected GOP nominee Bob Dole. Ross Perot polled 9%, other candidates garnered 2% and the rest are unde-

cided or declined to answer.

The HRC poll also shows that Gays and Lesbians turn out at the polls in higher numbers than the rest of the population does. In 1994, only 38% of the electorate turned out at the polls. Over 66% of the poll's respondents said that they voted in that election.

The ratings for Clinton and Dole are nearly reversed in the poll. While 74% said they had a favorable opinion of President Clinton, 69% said they had an unfavorable view of Dole.

Dole Fares Poorly

Dole's numbers in the poll are so poor that he even trails Clinton among Gay Republicans and he runs well behind the GOP controlled Congress in terms of popularity.

Some clues to Dole's low ratings among Gays and Lesbians can be seen in answers given to some of the other questions in the

Nearly 50% of those polled said they were liberal versus only 20% who defined them-selves as conservative. Nearly half of the sample identified itself as Democrats but only 12% said they are Republicans.
In addition almost half of the respondents

said that they would not vote for a candidate who was opposed to Gay rights.

Dole is viewed as the more conservative of the two major Presidential candidates. Party affiliation plays a major role in determining which candidate to support for President Furthermore, Dole is widely seen as opposing equal rights proposals for Gays and Lesbians and has chacterized such measures as "special rights."

But party affiliation and political leanings are not enough to explain Dole's poor showing. Among Gay Republicans and Independents, he runs well behind Clinton. The poll also show nearly double the number who said they supported Dole intend to support a GOP candidate for congress.

Negative Image Has Stuck

The low ratings given to the Republican Presidential nominee and his party may be the result of the highly publicized role that far right Christians played in the nominating and platform writing processes. Throughout the primaries, Dole and other candidates for the GOP Presidential nomination denounced the concept of Gay rights.

The Republican platform opposed Gay

rights as well. The GOP was burned by an image of intolerance that resulted from its convention in Houston in 1992. The Party went to great lengths during its 1996 convention to make a case that it was "the party of the big

The HRC poll, seems to show that at least among Gay voters, the image of the party's presidential candidates pandering to the far Christian right has stuck

Support For Democratic Congress The research data also contained good news for those hoping the Democrats will

Paras Recruited Management Team Paras also brought together a management team that has strengthened the Task Force organizationally, including executive director-designate Kerry Lobel, seasoned lobbyist Helen Gonzales as NGLTF Public Policy director, Mary Farmer as NGLTF Director of Finance and Administration, and Michael Rogers as Director of Development.

Building Partnerships
Identifying the need for stronger grassroots organizations and networking, Paras worked to build partnerships with local Gay and Lesbian groups through NGLTF's Cooperating Organizing program and Creating Change conference. NGLTF now has more than 120 groups in its Cooperating Organizing than 120 groups in its Cooperating Organization program, and hundreds more represented in its "activist alert" network.

At the 1995 Creating Change conference, Paras convened a gathering of state gay and lesbian groups to strategize around better coordination between national and local groups. The meeting of state groups will be repeated at this year's Creating Change conference, Nov. 6-10 in Alexandria, VA. More than 2,000 grassroots activists are expected to attend the conference

The Fight For Health Care

Paras often joined in on battles around health care reform, in particular attempts to weaken Medicaid/Medicare and the disastrous impact that would have on people with AIDS and HIV. In a letter to President Clinton upon the signing of the Health Care Coverage Act, Paras said the bill was an "important step in protecting the health care of all Americans, including people with AIDS." Paras was invited to the White House for the signing of the bill.
Paras directed NGLTF to launch a massive

"Undo 2" visibility and organizing campaign around the Supreme Court case on Colorado's anti-gay Amendment 2. Vigils, protests and, ultimately, celebrations were held in dozens of communities around the nation. Recent Accomplishments

Most recently, Paras spearheaded NGLTF's coalition efforts as part of L/G/B/T VOICES '96 at the GOP Convention in San Diego. Under the banner, "Stop the Scape-goating – Immigrants, Poor People, People of Color, Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual/ Transgen-

der: Equality and Justice for All!", NGLTF sponsored a protest against Patrick Bucha-

nan and the Radical Right's domination of the GOP. Later, she briefed gay delegates at the Democratic Convention.

Paras personally intervened in recent antigay violence cases, including the murders of two lesbians

in Medford, OR, by meeting with Department of Justice officials and urging Attorney General Janet Reno to fully investigate suspected hate crimes against gay, lesbian, bi-sexual and transgender people.

In addition, Paras lent her voice to other progressive campaigns for justice, including opposition against the dismantling of welfare and attacks on immigrants and the poor.

Lobel's Qualifications Detailed

Kerry Lobel, 43, was former lead organizer of the Women's Project in Little Rock, Ark., from 1985 through 1994. While there, she focused on bias violence, women and AIDS, women in prison and domestic violence. Lobel was responsible for fundraising and financial planning for the organization.

She has served as an organizational consultant to some 200 groups around the country to help them clarify purposes and goals and strengthen internal operations. Prior to moving to Arkansas, Lobel was executive director of the Southern California Coalition on Battered Women from 1979 to

She is editor of "Naming the Violence: Speaking Out About Lesbian Battering (Seal Press, 1986); co-author of "Lesbian Teens in Abusive Relationships" in "Dating Violence: Young Women in Danger" (Seal Press, 1990); and co-author of "HIV, AIDS, and Reproductive Health: A Peer Trainer's Man-ual" (1992). She was chair of the National

Coalition Against Domestic Violence (1988, 1989); is a board member of the National Network on Women in Prison; and was a board member of the Ryan White Center, a service agency for people with AIDS in Ar-

A True Picture Of Gay Life In America

It's about time. The Human Rights Campaign poll showing Gay and Lesbian life in America is long overdue. HRC is owed our thanks for conducting this first ever statistically valid research on what we are like.

The results of the HRC poll show that America's Gay and Lesbian population is not the wealthy, spoiled, pampered community the religious extremists say that it is. The research shows that our income, educational levels and other markers of status are very close to those shared by the population as a whole. Of course we always knew that, but now there is hard evidence to prove it.

The data also makes it clear that the politics of division practiced by the Republican Party have failed to make an impact on America's Gays and Lesbians. Despite DOMA and other measures intended to drive a wedge between President Clinton and his Gay supporters, Clinton is the overwhelming choice of our community. We have not bought into the politics of alienation either. Nearly 80% of us say that we will vote on November 5.

Now it is up to HRC, NGLTF and other organizations to use the data to disprove the Radical

Now it is up to HRC, NGLTF and other organizations to use the data to disprove the Radical Right's contention that we don't need legal protections. And it is up to each of us show the overwhelming disgust the poll shows we have with the wedge politics practiced by the Republicans. The best way to do that is by voting in the election on November 5.

LesBiGay History Month

Periodic outbreaks of disease were common in the cities of the Ancient World. They arrived as if out of "nowhere," worked their misery, and left devastation in their wakes. No one knew what caused them or how to prevent them. In most cases, their outbreak was attributed to angry gods or the work of malignant spirits that would have to be assuaged by offerings and sacrifices of one kind or another. Christianity made little, if any difference in that approach.

Christianity was made the religion of the Roman Empire by the emperor Constantine I. It was he who founded the city of Constantinople set up on the crossroads of Europe and Asia. Perfectly placed for trade and defense, it was intended to be as associated with the Christian faith as Rome had been with pagan beliefs.

A little over 200 years later, in the early 6th Century, it was Justinian and the magnificent Theodora who jointly held the Eastern Roman (or Byzantine) throne. Where he was short with tendency to be plump, she was tall, regal, with a rod of iron down her back.

In 535, there occurred on of the periodic outbreaks of plague in the city. The usual steps were taken. Bonfires blazed on the corners and in the public squares, people wore concoctions of herbs around their neck, multiple masses were celebrated in packed churches. Nothing worked and the epidemic raged on.

As is often the case in situations like this people wailed aloud asking why God had visited this affliction on them? What had they done? The answer from the priests came quickly. They were being punished, not because they were sinners, but because they had allowed sin to go unchecked in their midst.

What sin?

Homosexuality.

They didn't call it that, of course. That term wouldn't come into use for another 1,400 years. In those days (as in some circles now), we were known as Sodomites. The church had coined the term and defined us as demon possessed.

Regardless, Justinian and Theodora were quickly convinced that the way to restore God's favor to Constantinople was to purge the city of every sodomite on which they could lay their hands.

Hundreds of Gays were rounded up. Some were undoubtedly Gay, many, most probably, were not. Gay or not, their fate was the same. They were stripped of all wealth and position and flung into prison. From there, they would be taken to the Hippodrome to be publicly put to death. The Hippodrome was Constantinople's answer to the Circus Maximus in Rome.

In February, 536, a vast crowd, including Justinian and Theodora, had gathered in the arena to watch the races. But before the start, 50-60 hapless Sodomites, naked save for loincloths, were to be tied to stakes and burned alive. The crowd was used to such a spectacle by this time so that little attention could be expected to be paid to the gruesome sight, but this time was different.

Word had gone out in the city about the arrest of a young man named Thaddeus. He was tall and handsome, the scion of one of the most powerful families in the realm. Considering who his family was, how he'd gotten caught in the dragnet, no one knew, but he had, and not all his father's wealth and influence had been able to save him.

What was known was that he'd been tortured to force him to reveal the names of his partners, but he'd kept his silence, throughout his enormous sufferings, saying not a word

The victims were chained to wooden posts, while faggots were heaped up about their feet. Considered to be the worst of sinners, they were, in effect, sacrifices, offered by the city to mitigate God's wrath.

In the vastness of the arena, at first no one noticed him at all. His name was Lukus, a young man who was a favored member of Theodora's guard. Now, he slipped away from his station in the imperial box and made his way down the stairs, going until he had reached the floor. He stopped and removed his sword and buckler and laid them on the ground.

Quickly he crossed the race track and headed toward the spina where the victims stood ready to feel the flames. It was only then apparently that the empress saw him for she stood and leaned forward, hands on the rail of her box to get a closer look. The emperor stood as well and reached out a hand as if to restrain her, but she brushed him angrily away.

By this time, Lukus had reached the spina. He vaulted easily over a low barrier and made his way to where Thaddeus was.

A great hush had fallen over the crowd. All eyes were on the little scene. Down on one knee, facing Thaddeus, Lukus bowed his head.

On both ends of the line, the fires were being lit, and getting closer all the time. Lukus stood and climbed the pile of faggots until he and Thaddeus were face to face. As the people watched in wonder, Lukus took Thaddeus' head in both his hands and kissed him warmly on the mouth.

There were gasps from the crowd at the horror of seeing such a thing.

To celebrate October as LesBiGay History Month, I could have chosen any one of countless tales: Sappho, perhaps, or David the king. The thing is, I think that the story of Thaddeus and Lukus, a lovely tragic tale set on the Golden Horn, bears some marked parallels to today.

But that, perhaps, is not the point. We don't celebrate this month because we want to read stories. We celebrate it to learn about what has been ignored or obscured for

so long. We celebrate it to learn what has so nearly been lost.

We are a part of the total human experience, but we can't fully share in that until we, as a people, know who we are. Our history can teach us that, which is why we must constantly be engaged in its recovery.





Scientists Find More Evidence that Male **Sexual Orientation Is In the Genes**

New York, NY-A study of pairs of Gay brothers has produced new evidence that a gene inherited from mothers helps influence whether a man is Gay, supporting a similar, study that made headlines in 1993.

Our result says that genes are involved in male sexual orientation, although they certainly do not determine a person's sexual orientation," said Dean Hamer, an author of the study, which involved University of Colorado scientists.

There probably are other biological factors like hormones, for example, and other vari-ables we simply don't know anything about

The study follows others that have suggested a biological influence in sexual orientation, but scientists still can't explain what makes a person Gay, Heterosexual or Bisexual.

The study does not identify any gene. But like Hamer's 1993 study, it suggests such a gene resides in a particular portion of the X chromosome, one of the microscopic threadlike structures that carry genes. Men inherit the X chromosome from their mothers.

Hamer said there was no way to know how strongly the gene influences the development of homosexuality in men. Researchers looked for such an effect in women but found no evidence for it.

Hamer, a researcher at the National Cancer Institute, reports the work in the November issue of the journal Nature Genetics with colleagues at the institute, the University of Colorado and the Whitehead Institute for Biomedi-

cal Research in Cambridge, Mass.

Dr. Elliot Gershon, chief of the clinical neurogenetics branch of the National Institute of Mental Health, said the work does not prove such a gene exists in the chromosome segment, but it is suggestive.

The study focused on a region of the X chromosome that had been identified by the 1993 study.

In a man, this region can get its genetic material from either of the two X chromosome versions in his mother. As a result, two brothers normally have about a 50-50 chance of

sion. The study showed that was the case in nine of 11 families studied.

Hamer said that by focusing on families with two Gay brothers, the researchers were more likely to find a genetic effect on homosexuality than if they studied a broader population. The study also excluded Bisexual people to simplify analysis.

This study is an important addition to the growing body of evidence indicating a biological basis for homosexuality in some people, said Beth Barrett, spokeswoman for the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "And it shows that homosexuality is a naturally occurring and common variation among humans-a fact that Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual people have known all along.

Right Wing Christian groups have claimed that homosexuality is not genetically based and groups therefore, encouraged some "reparative therapy" to "cure Gay people of their "abnormal behavior."

For the most part, these "reparative therapy" sessions are designed to get people to act like Right Wing Christians.

Upon release of the LeVay brain study four years ago, homophobic minister Lou Sheldon of the Traditional Values Coalition, insinuated that if homosexuality were proven to be bio-logically based, he believed medicine and science should seek to genetically alter Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual people.

sharing the same version of the genetic material within this region.

But if two brothers share a trait linked to a gene in this region, they will run a higher chance of having inherited the same version.

Hamer and colleagues examined 32 pairs of exclusively or mostly Gay brothers from unrelated families. Twenty-two pairs, or twothirds, shared the same version of the genetic material, suggesting that it contains a gene predisposing to homosexuality.

By the same logic, Hamer said that if Gay brothers shared a version containing a homosexuality gene, then any heterosexual brother of theirs would probably have a different ver-

End Military Gay Ban, Allow Gay Marriage, Says Libertarian Party Candidate

By Chris Thomas

Harry Browne, the Libertarian Party's candidate for president this year, is remarkably focused on his core message - one that he says the two larger parties mostly

If Browne were to overcome tremendous odds and become the next President, what would become of the fight for Gay equality? Browne gives answers that, at first glance, might cause an activist's hair to stand on end. But as he continues to explain his philosophies and how they all center on the freedom of individuals to live their lives free of government interference, the consistency and fairness of Libertarian philosophy can begin to emerge.

Browne, 63, lives in Tennessee with his wife Pamela. His running mate, Jo Jorgensen, is the president and owner of a software duplication company in South Carolina.

The Libertarian Party, which recently celebrated its 25th anniversary, is once again on the ballot in all 50 states this year. Their candidates have never received more than a million votes in a presidential election. At the local level, however, the party has been much more successful; about 140 Libertarians currently serve on elected bodies such as school boards, city councils, and state legislatures.

Chris Thomas: Let's talk about any distinctions that you care to draw between the roles of government and private institutions in bringing about an end to discrimination. For instance, one side of the Libertarian position would be in not passing sodomy laws. But the other side of the coin would be that private individuals would have the right, presumably, to discriminate.

Harry Browne: I don't think that anybody can do that. I don't think any government can do it. All it is going to do is create more problems. People cite the Civil Rights Act of 1965, but they don't realize that all the lawsuits we have today - people suing because they were fired for being a drug addict and all of these things, all of the litigation explosion is the direct result of that.

First of all, the whole purpose of the civil rights movement was to do away with segregation laws in the South. But the federal government never stops. It didn't just do away with the segregation laws; it imposed integration laws in effect and said that nobody can discriminate, not just the state, but private business, and it was against the law to discriminate on the basis of hiring and so

Well, once that was in place, why shouldn't women have the same coverage? Why shouldn't handicapped people? Why shouldn't Gays? Why shouldn't obese people? Why shouldn't elderly people? And the next thing you know, everybody is covered in effect, and you can sue on the basis of almost anything, because all of these laws have provisions to sue other people. And the final result is what we have today.

The slow way is just simply, over a period of time, things are going to change, and they have changed tremendously. Major League Baseball was desegregated in the '40s, twenty vears before the government did anything. But everybody thinks that nothing happened until the government did it.

Now there will be those who will take a stand on the cost and say, "I don't care, you know, I'll pay it, I'm going to indulge my prejudices

But the vast majority of businessmen simply can't afford to do that because there profit margins are about that thick and they're living on the edge every week, trying to meet their bank loans, trying to do all the other things, and they just do not have the margin of error to be able to make those kinds of personal

CT: How would you conduct your own administration in terms of hiring policies?

HB: It would be completely on the objectives I want to reach, and not on any kind of quota system or any kind of basis that would try to display diversity or anything else.

In the armed forces, if somebody disrupts things, then he should be censured or even discharged. But if he does his job and he doesn't disrupt things, then he should be commended for what he does.

When I say "disrupt," it might be anything. It might be a Gay making a pass at

somebody, it might be a heterosexual making a pass at a woman officer, whatever it may be. It may be a slackard, it may be anything. But if somebody disrupts the operations, then he should be dealt with. But as long as he does his job, he should be treated like anybody else

CT: Would you take action to change the policy on Gays serving openly in the mili-

HB: Yes. I see no reason for the "don't ask, don't tell" policy.

CT: A concern that some people have expressed in dismantling agencies such as the FDA is that AIDS research might suffer as

HB: It's actually a separate question, but AIDS research by the government would suffer, but for a different reason. The FDA isn't involved in that at all.

But what the FDA is concerned with is approving drugs and making them available. It is such a perfect example of everything that we face with government.

CT: AIDS research; that's a separate department of the government.

HB: It's easy when you deal with the Post Office, and then compare that with Federal Express if you have courier mail. You see the difference, and you can imagine, "Gee, if Federal Express could deliver first-class mail, we might get two or three deliveries a day, who knows what it would be.'

The comparison is stark. You go to get a drivers license at the motor vehicle department, and you know it's a bureaucratic nightmare. It's the last place you want to have to go and spend your afternoon.

But you don't deal with the Centers for Disease Control or the FDA or any of these other agencies, so it's easier to imagine that these are well-oiled machines that are engaging in scientific research. But it's just the Post Office in white smocks. It's just another DMV, only at a federal level.

The only thing I can say is that, if we could get research out of the hands of government and put it in the hands of people who can only succeed if they find the cures we do that by repealing the income tax, by repealing the Social Security tax, leaving a trillion dollars a year in the economy, which will make it possible for much more research by private companies who have a vested interest in getting something to market as just as soon as they possibly can.

Every time there's been any kind of a com-

parison between private and government research, the private research has always been way ahead.

CT: How about government support systems, such as the Ryan White CARE Act, which is providing funds to local communities. Obviously, those types of funding would disappear completely. HB: Yes.

CT: What would be done in its place to take up the slack?

HB: If you realize how generous the American people are, 48 percent of our income goes to taxes: federal, state, and local, hidden taxes, direct taxes like income, property, sales, taxes - 48 percent. And yet there seems to be somehow enough money left to finance hundreds of thousands of churches without any government aid whatsoever.

And when you think of putting a trillion dollars a year back into the economy and lowering, overnight, that tax burden from 48 percent to 25 percent - which in effect means that, instead of keeping half of what you earn, you'll keep three-quarters of what you earn, which means really a 50 percent increase in disposable income - a tremendous amount of that is going to go to care of that kind. It's going to go into research, it's going to go into all of these things.

CT: What's your position on the Defense of Marriage Act?

HB: The position is very simple. There's nothing in the Constitution that authorizes the federal government to be setting rules for marriage in any way whatsoever. It has absolutely nothing to do with the federal government.

Now you can't say that on a state and local level. It would be up to a state constitution as to whether the state of California or somebody else could outlaw same-sex marriage and do it in a legal way.

As far as family values is concerned, is Bob Dole reviewing movies going to make America better? Is Bill Clinton talking about school uniforms and curfews going to make America better? What business is that of the President of the United States, what they do in local school districts? No business whatsoever.

The problem so often is that government seems like such a fast solution, instead of educating people, instead of developing ways, instead of building businesses that do certain things, or organizations, or whatever, "if we'd just get a law passed." But it's a futile idea because the law will never satisfy you. The law you get passed will not be the one you imagined.

CT: Obviously, the policy on drugs would be very different in your administration.

HB: Yes, it would be different. The War on Drugs would lose its teeth on the

first day of my administration, and I would press very heavily to repeal, all federal laws on drugs. Before we had drug laws, we didn't really have much in the way of drug problems.

There was a time in this country a little boy could walk into a drugstore and buy heroin simply because it was sold as a pain reliever and sedative, the way Bayer sells aspirin today. But despite the unrestricted availability of drugs, there was not widespread drug use.

There was drug use, obviously; there were people that abused drugs, obviously; there always will be. But it wasn't really a widespread problem until the War on Drugs

started in the 1960s. I would press very hard to get the drug laws repealed. But in the meantime I would do a number of things. First of all, I'd fire David Kessler - without question, that would be on the first day - and appoint somebody to be the FDA commissioner until such time as the FDA was abolished, somebody who would make sure that marijuana was available to anybody who was suffering, no matter what the law said, and make sure that approval of drugs is expedited, and make a statement

to the American people that they will have to take more responsibility for themselves.



'Wild Reeds' is Possibly the Best Gay Coming of Age Film Ever Made

Lyrical and rather unsentimental, Wild Reeds focuses on the relationships of a group of teenagers. The year is 1962 and France is still caught up in the Algerian War, much as America would soon find itself entangled in the Vietnamese War. Amidst this turbulent political period, Francois, Serge, Henri and Maite face their often conflicting sexual desires and relationships.

Francois (Gael Morel) and Maite (Elodie Bouchez) have been boyfriend/girlfriend for ages and ages. Maite is truly in love with Francois and is confused by his lack of physical, sexual advances.

Francois sees in Maite a confidante and best friend but soon finds physical yearnings for his fellow classmate, Serge (Staphane Rideau). Their relationship briefly turns sexual and François realizes that he has fallen in love with Serge. This he confides in Maite, who is disappointed but who, with great maturity, encourages her friend to come to terms with his sexual orientation.

Serge does not share similar feelings for Francois and has in fact grown very attracted to Maite. Maite however soon finds herself attracted to Henri (Frederic Gorny), a very angry young man, whose political beliefs and opposing sympathies in the Algerian War have alienated him from the majority of his instructors and classmates.

Upon learning that Algerian resistance has suffered several severe defeats at the hands of the French army, he leaves the boarding school in a rage. Determined to burn down

the local Communist Party headquarters, he spots Maite inside. She welcomes him and offers him coffee but as Henri reveals his original intentions concerning his appearance at the headquarters, she becomes shocked and orders him out.

Writer/Director Andre Techine has crafted a beautiful film highlighting the many and varied emotional and sexual struggles that we all face in our youth. Lacking the sniggering innuendoes and sophomoric humor so typical Hollywood's usual treatment of teen love (see Threesome for example), Wild Reeds is a refreshing change.

There may be no forced, fairy tale-like happy ending (no pun intended) in the stars for any of the film's four attractive leads. Still Techine manages to bring Wild Reeds to a splendidly satisfying conclusion.

As the youth just coming to terms with his Gayness, Gael Morel makes Francois an especially appealing and sympathetic character.

Equally attractive are Stephane Rideau and Frederic Gorny as the straight yet still confused and conflicted Serge and Henri.

Wild Reeds has played in just about every major International Film Festival to acclaim and has won numerous awards, including four Cesar Awards (the French equivalent to our Oscars) and quite deservedly so. Wild Reeds is a wonderfully engaging and entertaining coming of age film and quite possibly the best Gay film of 1995. A must see!

Stonewall" Appealing Cast, Worthwhile

Immediately our handsome hero finds his way to Greenwich Village where he is immediately befriended by a group of drag queens and taken for a drink at, you guessed it, The Stonewall Inn. Ah, fate does move in mysterious ways.

LaMiranda (Guillermo Diaz) might be a tough-talking drag queen but she finds that her heart's a melting when the simple, idealistic Matty Dean comes to her aid.(Glenn asks you to imagine a Gay John-Boy

Walton falling in love with a drag queen!). Meanwhile, Matty is befriended by Ethan, a handsome middle-aged teacher who is involved in one of the early "homophile groups" planning a demonstration at Liberty Hall in Philadelphia. A demonstration where Gay men were "men", Lesbians wore dresses and drag queens were not invited. (Imagine a party without drag

queens?)

If Rikki Beadle Blair's screenplay weighs heavily on melodramatic histrionics, there remains an appealing undercurrent of dignity and respect for all of the film's characters, however broadly drawn. Even better, there seems to be few concessions made to make them acceptable for mainstream audiences.

Perhaps it is impossible to translate the events leading up to those sultry June evenings in 1969 onto the silver screen, necessarily balancing historical fact with entertainingly fictitious pleasures. Blair and company do try really, really hard and if their efforts are not always successful, there at least is truly never a dull mo-

"The Ghost And The Darkness" Is A Thrilling If Comfortable Film

True-to-life stories and the Hollywood Dream Factory have always maintained a tenuous, decidedly uneasy relationship. Entertainment rules in Tinseltown. Always did, always will.

When chasing domestic and worldwide grosses exceeding \$300 million, who's going to worry about accuracy? Annoying, inconsequential facts getting in the way of a good story? Change 'um. An unhappy ending causing bad test results with preview audiences? Turn that frown upside down!

Glenn isn't sure if it a matter of art imitating life or life imitating art but Glenn has begun to notice how "true-to-life" stories seem to be a whole lot more fiction than fact. Those looking for an example need to look no farther than the recent, entertaining Stonewall.

Which brings Glenn to another "true-tolife" pic, The Ghost in the Darkness. Clearly here was a story tailor-made for Hollywood.

Long, long ago. Far, far away. In deepest, darkest Africa, the white man sought to bring all that was good in Western Civilization to the "Dark Continent." This presumably meant Christianity and good, old-fashioned exploitation of the native populations. Had McDonalds been around in 1896, there certainly would have had one springing up near Tsavo, the locale for The Ghost in the Darkness. But Glenn digresses...

Ghost's protagonist is Colonel J.H. Peterson (Val Kilmer), required to build a bridge over the Tsvaro River, completing an extraordinary representation of the British Empire: a 580-mile railway from Mombassa, on the Indian Ocean, to Lake

On his first night on the continent, Peterson slays a lion with a single rifle shot, emerging as an honest to goodness hero. This Great White Hunter is handsome, has great teeth and by golly, has that bridge building way ahead of schedule. Why, Peterson must be some sort of superman. Still, something's gotta happen otherwise you haven't got the makings of much of a blockbuster.

Soon their camp's peace and tranquility are again disturbed. More lions. A justifiably smug Peterson is hot to once again sort things out. Only this time, things don't sort themselves out quite so nicely. The new lions are a force, a forced to be reckoned with, not like the pussycat Peterson bagged.

Sadly, this is all formula stuff. It takes half the film (and a whole lot of dead natives) but sure enough, Michael Douglas shows up as Remmington, another Great White Hunter, this one sure to save the

Natives that didn't end up as "cannonfodder" soon flee camp, leaving the stage set for the climatic show-down between our heroes (plus their faithful servant/companion/sidekick, Samuel) and the almost mystical, devil-like pair of li-

That The Ghost and the Darkness is so effective and so entertaining is due largely to some spectacular background scenery, a stirring musical soundtrack and some fine performances from Val Kilmer as the idealistic Great White Hunter, John Kami as the wise, dependable Samuel and Brian McCardie as the briefly seen missionary Starling.

In less capable hands, one might easily dismiss The Ghost and the Darkness. Yet, thanks to director Stephen Hopkins, here is an adventure pic that is refreshingly familiar. Thrilling? Sure. But as comfortable as an old shoe.

From the Journals of Jean Seburn Worth Seeing. Don't Miss It!

From the Journals Of Jean Seberg A film by Mark Rappaport starring Mary Beth Hurt **Couch Potato Productions**

Glenn must admit that he has long been curious about Jean Seberg, an actress he knows only from her performance in that pinnacle of all disaster flicks: Airport. An all-star, thoroughly soap-sudsy melodrama with wings, Airport was so completely stolen by the elfin actress Helen Hayes that they should have jailed the octogenarian actress and thrown away the Ms. Seberg too might have been lost in the shuffle but had the unfortunate job of playing Ms. Hayes' on-screen foil.

Playing romantically opposite the likes of Burt Lancaster, plus her high billing suggested that Ms. Seberg too was indeed a star. But who was she? What films had she made? Which road had brought her this point, to be forced to stoop so low as to play stooge to Ms.

Haves? Forget "world cinema", movies are as American as pizza and apple pie, as Betsy Ross and the flag, as indeed as Hollywood, the dream factory, was a place where anyone, at anytime, might be discovered, sitting for instance at a drug store lunch counter and overnight turned into a star. Everyone knows

that. Ask Jean Seberg! Ask Jean Seberg is exactly what innovative filmmaker Mark Rappaport does in his innovative film essay, From the

Journals of Jean Seberg. Jean Seberg, in a fairy-tale scenario similar to that of Vivien Leigh, was chosen over literally thousands of other young actresses to play rebellious Joan of Arc in Otto Preminger's big-screen epic based on George Bernard Shaw's Saint Joan. Over 18,000 girls sent in their photos, including Barbare Streisand. Yes, Barbara Streisand, a possibility Jean and Mr. Rappaport amusingly ponder.

Unlike traditional fairy-tales, there would be no knight in shining armor to rescue Jean Seberg. Saint Joan flops, as will her follow-up Bonjour Tristesse, also helmed by the great Mr. Preminger. Perhaps all might have been well if Jean Seberg had returned in disappointment to Marshalltown, Iowa. Perhaps.

Instead a young Jean-Luc Goddard cast Seberg in Breathless. A has-been at 19, at twenty she becomes an international sensation and admittedly, the first modern movie star. But her star would shine only briefly. Soon Jean Seberg is back on the long and lonely road that would lead from bad films and bad marriages into a descent into addition to pills and booze before ultimately committing suicide in 1979 at the age of 40.

Mr. Rappaport allows Jean Seberg, as impersonated by the splendid Mary Beth Hurt, to have a final, if bittersweet say in From the Journals of Jean Seberg.

Whether exploring the misfortunes awaiting other screen Joans (of Arcs), pondering the careers of other such 1960's actress/rebels as Jane Fonda and Vanessa Redgrave or exposing her own cinematic degradations at the hands of her real life husbands, Rappaport and Hurt offer a Seberg who is shrewd, wise and above all, brutally aware that her weary, cynical, insightful perspectives would not, indeed could not have occurred to the disturbed, ravaged Jean Seberg who lived.

In a clip from Saint Joan, Joan/Seberg declares, "But I am wiser now and no one is the worse for being wiser." Mr. Rappaport has generously given Jean Seberg, as if a ghost from fallen-movie star heaven, a chance to prove it.

From the Journals of Jean Seberg is a cautionary tale, exposing the underside of the American dream. In star-crossed, movie-made America, Jean Seberg died for all of our sins.

Fresh from screening the all-star First Wives Club, Glenn found himself at Girl's Town, a low budget (grainy look, bad sound quality low budget) independent film following three high school friends in the aftermath of the suicide of a fourth friend. A similar scenario perhaps but a decidedly different approach.

As in the all-star venture, the three remaining friends in Girl's Town struggle to bond together: they fight, they drink, the seek to wreck havoc on the men (boys?) that have used them up and then thoughtlessly discarded them. Or worse. Only here, their respective stories aren't played solely for laughs.

Although presented as the best of friends, there initially seems little common ground amongst them. Racially, intellectually and socially diverse, Glenn wonders how these four would have become bestest friends in the first place. In Glenn's day, high school cliques were based on sameness not diversity. Of course, that

was the pre-history and the times they are a-changing.

The marvelous stillness of the initial moments of the film is shattered by the suicide of Nikki (Aunjanue Ellis). On her way to an Ivy League school, Nikki seems


to have her entire future before her. When the three friends steal Nikki's (Aunjanue Ellis) journal, they are shocked to learn that she had been raped by an editor at a magazine where she had had an internship. Initially incredulous, they discover that each has been harboring secrets from each other.

Amidst the drinking and swearing, fighting and reconciling, the three promise each other that they will share their lives more fully with each other. They will not end up like Nikki.

Unfortunately, in the wake of Nikki's suicide, our three protagonists seek some concept of justice, using whatever means available in seeking to right the wrongs they've endured. Initially this involves trashing the car of a boy who also dateraped one of them. The moment is exhilarating and yet disturbing. It will not be an isolated moment.

Breaking into the apartment of the man who fathered Patti's (Lili Taylor) baby, the three steal every piece of electronics in the apartment they can get their hands Particularly amusing is what ease Patti carries off the large screen TV. They will later pawn these items for food and baby clothes (shades of Robin Hood). Eventually they confront the man who raped Nikki in a curious scene, one filled with violence but which offers them little satisfaction





regain control of Congress in November. Over 60% of the respondents said they planned to vote Democratic in the Congressional elections. Republican candidates for Congress were chosen by 21% of respondents.

Democratic control of Congress, especially the House of Representatives is viewed as vital for Gay rights legislation to pass. Last month a bill to outlaw anti-Gay job discrimination lost in the Senate by just one vote.

Most experts give the Democrats an even chance of regaining control of the House, but a poor chance of recapturing the US Senate.

Gay Life In America

On demographic questions, the poll results show a picture of Gay America that is not all that different from the rest of the country.

These questions regarding race, relationships, home ownership, income, and educational levels, showed figures that were very close to what the U.S. Census Bureau projects for the population as a whole.

In addition to questions on the election and politics Gay respondents were questioned on being out at work. The results showed that while 61% of all Gays and Lesbians have told a co-worker of their sexual orientation, only 44% have actually shared that information with their employer.

Poll Is Significant
Kim Mills, spokeswoman for HRC in an exclusive Wisconsin Light, said "The importance of the poll is that it confirms some things we suspected about our community, but that we could not statistically prove until now."

Mills said that the data concerning the demographics of the community is especially important. "We were being judged by religious political extremists on the basis of marketing research. That's like judging the entire population of the United States based on a survey of people who read Vanity Fair."

"We have been saying that the Gay electorate is an engaged electorate. The numbers of Gays and Lesbians who say they are going to vote in this election and who say they voted in the last one far exceed the population as a whole."

Mills adds that the poll was taken during the DOMA controversy. "Those being polled clearly knew that the President was planning to sign the Defense of Marriage Act. Yet they still supported him in overwhelming numbers."

That is good news for Gay and Lesbian activists who accused the Republican Party of promoting DOMA to drive a wedge between the President and his Gay supporters. The numbers show that the strategy did not work.

Poll Methodology

The poll was conducted through a series of interviews with 365 self-identified Gays and Lesbians from June 7, 1996 to September 2. ICR used professionally trained, paid, independent interviewers for the poll.

IRC conducted the research as a "piggy back" poll. That means that in the course of taking other polls, IRC asked respondents if they were Gay, Lesbian or Bisexual. Those who answered yes were asked questions prepared for HRC by Lake Research.

The margin of error is 5.2%. That means that if everyone who is Gay or Lesbian were interviewed the results would be within 5.2% of the results shown in the sample. In other words 70% of the respondents said they intend to vote to re-elect the President. If all Gays and Lesbians were asked that question, there is a 95% probability that between 67.4% and 72.6% would say they are supporting the President.

WISCONSIN AIDS RESEARCH CONSORTIUM

HIV THERAPY TRIALS OPEN FOR ENROLLMENT

Wisconsin AIDS Research Consortium (WARC) is currently enrolling individuals with HIV/AIDS for participation in three trials of research drug therapies. These trials may advance scientific knowledge and future treatment of other individuals with HIV/AIDS.

TRIAL NO. 1 - REMUNE™

REMUNE™ is an experimental treatment intended to boost the body's natural immune response against HIV. In Phase I and II studies, REMUNE has so far been found safe and well-tolerated. The study compares the responses of individuals having equal chances of receiving REMUNE or placebo by injection every 12 weeks for up to 3 years.

ELIGIBILITY – If you are over 18 years of age, HIV positive, have a CD4+ count of 300-549, have had no prior investigational vaccine or immune-based therapy treatment and no changes in antiretroviral drugs or doses within the past 30 days and have no history of or current AIDS-defining conditions except for Kaposi's Sarcoma, you may be eligible for this study.

TRIAL NO. 2 - DELAVIRDINE

This is a double-blind, randomized study. The study compares the responses of individuals taking varied doses of Delavirdine (DLV) and AZT, AZT and 3TC or a combination of DLV, AZT & 3TC.

ELIGIBILITY – If you are 14 years of age or older, HIV positive, have a CD4 count greater than 200 but less than 500, and haven't been on AZT more than 6 months, you may qualify for this study.

TRIAL NO. 3 - STAVUDINE PLUS DIDANOSINE

This is an open-label study of the safety and biological effects of Stavudine (d4T) taken in combination with Didanosine (ddI) in HIV positive patients who have had prior therapy with AZT.

ELIGIBILITY – If you are over 18 years of age, HIV positive, have a CD4 count between 100 and 500 and have taken AZT as single drug therapy for more than 3 months, you may qualify for this study.
