The event was billed as one supporting Greer and building a movement against the legalization of same-sex mar-

Greer is a pastor of Trinity Evangelical Church in Madison. He says he needs money to fight the Fire Department.

Greer was handed a 90 day suspension and had been ordered to undergo diversity training after he broke department rules by handing out anti-Gay literature. His case is expected to go before the Madison Police and Fire Commission in April.

The Times reports that Greer's speech

The Times reports that Greer's speech was less about money and more about his frustration in getting people to support him. Only 5 preachers have come out in support of him.

"All you have to do is stand up and fight!" he told the crowd. "My question is, if the Lord has given us the power, given us the weapons to fight, why is the church standing back hiding in the foxhole? What is going on here?"

"I am so sick of foxhole Christians, I could just puke!" he yelled.

came up to congratulate him.

One man said, "The more you love, the more people dislike you."

"Then I guess I'm on the right track,"
Greer replied.

Hawaii Struggles With Same-Sex Marriage

Honolulu, HI-AP- House and Senate conferees squared off Monday, March 3rd,
over two bills intended to resolve the same-sex marriage controversy.

But after a half-hour session of defining their major differences, the two sides broke off and said they would review each other's position and meet again in a few days.

"We're here to undo a wrong and most importantly to let the people of this state to

decide that the definition of marriage as being between one man and one woman," said Rep. Terrance Tom, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee and head of the House conferees

"wrong" Tom refers to is the 1993 state Supreme Court ruling that it is unconstitutional gender discrimination for the state to deny same-sex couples marriage li-censes without showing a compelling public interest to do so.

Both sides are proposing a constitutional amendment to clarify that licensed marriages in Hawaii are to be between one man and one woman, but they disagree on which section of the Constitution to amend.

Both sides also have bills to give some of the benefits of married couples to couples of the same-sex or other couples who are now allowed by law to be married.

The House wants to limit those to such things as hospital visitation rights, health de-

cisions, joint ownership of property and wrongful death suits.

The Senate's bill includes those and hundreds more, including state retirement and tax benefits, something Tom said would have an untold financial impact on state and county governments as well as the private sector.

Catholic Group Seeks Greater Role for Gays

Pittsburgh, PA-AP-Auxiliary Bishop Thomas Gumbleton doubled his efforts to teach tolerance after learning of his own brother's homosexuality. Sister Jeannine Gramick changed her life's course after learning of the anguish Roman Catholic college students felt at being gay.

Gumbleton and Gramick are among 620 activists and church leaders who met in Pittsburgh to discuss how the Catholic Church, which still teaches that homosexual activity is sinful, can help reach out to gays and lesbians.

"Homosexual people have experienced such terrible alienation from the church," said Gumbleton, an auxiliary bishop in Detroit. "They've felt unwanted and condemned

very often. The church has not been very successful in ministering to them."
"Too often the church has been a follower and not a leader," said Gramick, a nun

who directs the Lesbian-Gay Ministry for her order, the School Sisters of Notre Dame. I think we have a responsibility now, at the end of the 20th century, to educate people about acceptance of minorities and of people who are different from the main-

Gumbleton and another bishop are attending the meeting, the first time such highranking church officials have shown up. The organization, which is based in Mount Rainier, Maryland, was started in 1977.

Episcopalians Debate Homosexuality

Birmingham, AL-AP- The discussion was supposed to be about the sanctity of marriage, but Alabama's Episcopal church leaders conceded that the church was really trying to clarify its stance on homosexuality.

The Episcopal Diocese of Alabama concluded its three-day convention Saturday, February 16<sup>th</sup>, at St. Luke's Episcopal Church. Clergy and elected delegates from each of the state's 89 churches worshipped together and voted on a platform.

The one they passed affirmed the sanctity of marriage, while deleting controversial sexual references that could have been seen as inconstitute to homesoccurate.

sexual references that could have been seen as insensitive to homosexuals.

After long debate, the phrase "sexual intimacy finds its fullest expression in holy matrimony" was deleted from the platform.

During the debate, such substitute terms as "genital sexual intimacy" and "inter-course" were suggested and voted down before the whole phrase was finally dropped. It was weakened a bit," said the Rev. Coleman Tyler. "Any mention of sexuality was taken out."

Church Accepts Gay Civil Rights Bill

Concord, NH-AP- The Roman Catholic Diocese of Manchester has given its blessing to a bill that would ban discrimination against homosexuals after lawmakers agreed to modify the bill.

Diocese officials insisted the bill be amended to protect the policy positions of the church, as well as the inclusion of a section stating adoptions by homosexuals and

same-sex marriages still would not be permitted. Supporters say New Hampshire lags behind other New England states in passing laws to protect homosexuals from discrimination. Opponents argued the bill would create a

eran who was stationed at Hickam Air Force Base, said in a statement.

"However, I am disappointed that the process got this far and that the Air Force still feels the need to spend money and effort to delve into such matters." During the past two years, eight Air Force personnel in Hawaii have been discharged

Pro-Gay Bills Outnumbered in the States

Washington, DC—According to The Washington Blade, a survey conducted by the paper of the 50 state legislatures has found that 40 pro-Gay bills and 48 anti-Gay bills have been filed to date. Of the 48 anti-Gay bills introduced, 39 of them seek to prohibit same-sex marriage. The Blade found that GOP lawmakers introduced about 75% of all anti-Gay bills filed thus far.

"It's no surprise to me," Rich Tafel, executive director of the Log Cabin Clubs, when asked to comment on the high percentage of GOP-sponsored anti-Gay legislation. "That's the whole reason Log Cabin was created. Our purpose is to educate the Republicans...The question for the Gay movement is how to reach those Republicans. If we can't make them friends, how do we at least not make them enemies."

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### MAP Calls for Action as State Plans to Distribute Ryan White Funds

Milwaukee-Access to community based services, and therefore access to new lifesaving AIDS medications, such as those provided by the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) are jeop-ardized by the State of Wisconsin's distribution plan for federal Ryan White AIDS

Community based AIDS services, including transportation assistance, benefits planning, food services, housing and legal assistance are crucial to enabling people with HIV/AIDS to maintain rigorous treatment regimens. Since the advent of new triple combination AIDS treatments, demand for community based services is dramatically higher:

food programs have experienced a 60% increase in the last nine months

transportation requests have doubled requests for legal assistance and bene-

fits planning are up as much as 40%
Compounding the need for increased
community based AIDS services is a 25% lower AIDS death rate in Wisconsin, and a projected new 400 cases of HIV in 1997. These trends result in client to case manager ratios approaching 100 to 1 in urban areas of Wisconsin, and 40 to 1 in rural areas. Without greater funding, Wisconsin's AIDS service providers will be overwhelmed and people with HIV/AIDS will not have access to services they need to maintain new drug regimens.

The State of Wisconsin is requesting

input on how to utilize federal Ryan White funding in 1997. The State's grant

has increased by 40% in 1997, however the state has only increased funds for community based services by 10%

Instead of providing increased funding for community based services, the State has unnecessarily overbudgeted for the purchase of AIDS drugs, and increased administrative funding by 158% in the last two years. This funding needs to be allocated to direct services to people with HIV/AIDS.

"Because demand for community based AIDS services is dramatically higher, we need people concerned about the quality of life of those living with HIV/AIDS to encourage the State to redirect at least \$200,000 of the Ryan White CARE Grant funds to much needed com-

munity based services," said Mike Gifford, director of Public Policy for ARCW.


### **Anti-Gay Marriage Bill Assembly Floor** Debate Put Off Until May 13th

Madison - Efforts to pass State Representative Lorraine Seratti's (R- Spread Eagle) Anti-Gay marriage bill, AB 104 suffered a set back when a full Assembly vote on the bill was delayed unti May 13.

The decision to delay the vote followed

an acrimonious meeting of the Assembly's Committee on Families and Children. The Committee voted to recommend passage of AB 104 on a 6 to 3 vote.

The Committee meeting was punctuated by sharp exchanges between Democrats and Republicans. State Representative Shirley Krug (D-Milwaukee) offered a motion to table consideration until everyone who attended the Committee's hearing in Wausau had a chance to speak.

Chairman Michael Hubesch Crosse) refused to give in on the issue. Hubesch said none of the 165 people who were not called to speak would have said anything that wasn't already said by the 80 who did speak. Hubesch also said he had made certain that everyone on the Committee received copies of written testimony from some of those who didn't

Other Republicans spoke of other hearings where not everyone who came to speak was allowed to do so.

Krug responded that she doubted anyone on the Committee had the time to read the hundreds of pages in the short time that had elapsed between the Committee vote and the distribution of the testimony. She also argued that because of the hearings location and the distance most people traveled to be there, it was unfair to vote on the issue before allowing them to speak. "No wonder people are growing more cynical towards government," she

Rebecca Young (D-Madison) and Notestein both weighed into the debate asking for a postponement. Both questioned why the bill was needed. pointed out that Wisconsin law already forbids Same Sex Marriage and would prohibit Wisconsin residents from going out of state to get married in any state that recognizes Same Sex Marriage.

Young said "This would not affect any situation except for someone who lived in Hawaii, (if Hawaii ever does allow Gay marriage) got married there and then left paradise to move to Wisconsin."

Notestein attacked some of the testi-

mony given by the bill's supporters at the Wausau hearing, calling their testimony "hateful and offensive." Even some Republican supporters of the bill admitted that some of the testimony disturbed them as well but they claimed that hateful testimony was a property of the bill admitted that some of the testimony disturbed them. timony was given on both sides citing those speakers who called the bill hateful and homophobic.

Following the vote, a visibly angry Notestein held up some papers in front of where she and the other Committee members sat. The papers contained information on AIDS fransmission and other STD's among Gay men. Even some of the bill's supporters seemed to view the sheets with disdain.

"I find these things to be extremely of-fensive," said Notestein, "How can anyone look at this and still say that this bill is not motivated by hate."

The Committee clerk reported that the papers were put there at the request of

Later that day, the Assembly's Rules Committee, over Seratti's objection, voted to delay further consideration until May.

eschedu ling followed last minute maneuvering by openly Lesbian State Representative Tammy Baldwin (D-Madison) and Notestein, and others.

Baldwin and Notestein threatened to use every procedural rule they could to tie up the Assembly for a full three day debate if the vote was not delayed to May.

Although the Republican leadership wanted to approve the deal, Seratti balked and kept insisting that the leadership honor its promise of a quick debate and

Sources say the Republican supporters now want to run away from Seratti's bill as fast as they can. They were taken by surprise when hundreds of Gays, Lesbians and their supporters turned out for the public hearing in Wausau. They are also said to be concerned about being identified with proponents of the bill who called Gays and Lesbians "perverts" and "degen-

Action Wisconsin with help from Tammy Baldwin's office is working on plans to use the time before the vote to convince members of the State Assembly to vote against the bill.

As it stands now, floor debate on AB104 is rescheduled to Tuesday, May 13th, for a one day, six hour debate.







### **Endorsements**

State-Wide Walt Kelly

Judicial campaigns usually do not generate much passion. We believe this time should be an exception. In the race between Walt Kelly and Jon Wilcox for a seat on the Wisconsin State Supreme Court, we whole heartedly endorse Walt Kelly.

Wilcox voted to deny visitation rights to divorcing same-sex non-custodial partner. Wilcox wrote that a Lesbian couple were not a family.

Wilcox is strongly supported by former governor Martin Schrieber who told a gathering of 102 Lesbians and Gay men that he did not think same-sex couples could

have a moral relationship. Walt Kelly is a progressive who is on record as saying that he disagrees with Wil-

cox on his decisions.

We, therefore, endorse Walt Kelly without qualification.

### John Benson

In the race for State School Superintendent, the contest is between a moderate and the ideological Right. In this race, we endorse the moderate, John Benson.

Benson's opponent, Linda Cross, is a strong supporter of giving public funds to private religious schools, many of which can be counted on to teach homophobia. For this reason, Cross has received unstinting support from the Religious Right. We

### Milwaukee Bill Brash

There is one Milwaukee judicial race that we believe deserves your consideration. This is the contest for the Circuit Court, Branch 7. In this race we endorse Judge Bill Brash. Brash has a long record as a progressive on the bench. His support includes US Congressman Tom Barrett, Milwaukee County Executive Tom Ament, Milwaukee County Supervisor Dorothy Dean, all progressives and friends of our commu-

### Madison

### Deborah Carter Lawson

In the race for School Board in Madison, we strongly support incumbent Deborah Carter Lawson. Lawson's opponent, Tom Ragatz, is said by local LGBT community leaders as representing one of the worst threats to the rights of our community since ultra-conservative Earl Kielley. Ragatz has a long record of opposition to civil rights. For example, he was a leader in defending the Madison Club in its efforts to exclude women members. He refused to attend a school board forum sponsored by Gays, Lesbians and Allies for Diversity in Education.

In other contested Madison races, we endorse progressive candidates Andrea Houlihan and Ruth Roberts. We endorse incumbent Juan Lopez.

A Close Call: Falk for Dane County Exec

Dane County voters are faced with a difficult choice in their April 1 election of a new County Executive. On on the one hand they have an experienced public official. On the other hand there is an attorney whose concerns and ideology seem to be

more in tune with Dane County's. Michael Blaska is the more experienced candidate. He has been a County Supervisor and a County Board Chairman. But many have been disturbed by Blaska. His

tenure as County Board Chairman was marked by rancor on the Board. Furthermore his visit to the opening of a "Hooters" night club seemed to be in very poor taste.

Blaska's opponent is Susan Falk, an attorney who works with the Wisconsin Attorney General's office. Falks stance on the issues is more progressive than Blaska's.

But Falk lacks any experience in County Government.

Furthermore we are disturbed by the fact that twice during the primary campaign a representative of this publication was told by Falk supporters that its founder was supporting Falk. We believe that misinformation may have been deliberately spread by Falk's campaign team in order to justify pulling away support from openly Gay candidate, Dick Wagner in the primary, the candidate wholeheartedly supported by the real founders of The Wisconsin Light.

Nevertheless we give Falk the edge in this race. Blaska's experience in County Government has been marked by division and argument. His attitude on a wide variety of issues is disturbing. So too is Falk's lack of experience, but while it's a close call, we believe that Falk is the better choice for Gay and Lesbian voters.

### Brandon

I wanted a cigarette-and that led to all

the rest.

It began simply enough. Jerry and I were attending the annual Make A Promise Dinner at Milwaukee's grand, Fin de Siecle Pfister Hotel. While Jerry went off to mingle, I went looking for a spot to sit and smoke. From there I would watch the passing parade of hundreds of people, most in formal wear-tuxes or beads.

As I recalled from previous years, there was a table with an ashtray and a small grouping of chairs back by the dining

room. I went there.

A man and a woman were there before me, both in their mid-30s so it seemed. He was good looking with a strong, friendly, open face. She had a startling beauty about her, willowy without being fragile in the least.

The man and woman were smoking. I lit up. Though we'd never met before, the three of us struck up an easy conversa-tion, prompted by the camaraderie that

bonds smokers these days.

Seated with them was a boy, 12, 13 years-old, I thought. He was wearing a black tuxedo. A small red rose clung stoutly to the lapel. His hair was the color of spun honey. His large, solemn eyes had look to them as if, even at his age, he had had a world of trouble flung at him. The man and woman were his parents. His

name was Brandon.

I could not get over how angelic he was. His pale skin had a translucency to it that gave him an ethereal beauty that I had only rarely seen before. Yet, at the same time, he was boy, all boy, boy with skinned knees and a dirty face; boy with a mischievous glint in his eyes that said he might have just replaced the sugar with the salt; boy walking barefoot with a fishing pole in his hand; but boy of the '90s who liked video games, spent lots of time on the Internet, and wore a diamond stud in his left ear.

Brandon said little. Like any kid his age, he was clearly bored. Besides, he had new shoes on and they pinched. His tux itched. I didn't need words to tell me that he was there because his parents were there. That brought back so many memo-

His mother told me that they lived in a town up north. I asked them what brought them to the Make A Promise Dinner. She said that Brandon was portrayed in one of the paintings in the "Faces of AIDS" se-

They come regularly to the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin, she said. They also go to the National Institutes of Health (NIH), in Washington, DC, every other week. Brandon is one of the first two children to be accepted in NIH's protease inhibitor program. She told me

he is doing well.

I looked out on the crowd swirling around us. They were all here in this hotel to contribute what they could in the fight against AIDS. It makes no difference how its contracted, it's still a disease, a disease like any other, terrible, tragic in its conse-

no matter who you are.

Hundreds of people were at Make A Promise that night. He will laugh, he will sing Christmas carols before a glowing tree. He will go fishing and he will spend more hours on the Internet.

Because of those "in the trenches," he will grow and know love. He will learn about love because of all those who loved

And if one little boy will live and grow, others will, too. Others will taste the wine of life, young and old, rich and poor, fe-male and male, all races, all faiths, all sexual orientations. They will get this chance. They must have this chance. Everything in our humanity cries out that they must have this chance.

I had long since finished my cigaretteand several more. I went inside to eat. Afterward, as I was leaving, Brandon's mother and I embraced. I said something to her-I don't know what it was-and

Outside the hotel, the air was cold against my cheek. A few snowflakes danced in the wind. As I looked back, my eye got some dust in it. I wished Brandon well before I pulled up my collar and headed into the night.

### Leave Us Out

TO THE EDITOR:

I want to preface that the following contains my expression and not those of any organizations with which I am affiliated.

I just experienced one of the most moving experiences of my life, having been able to participate in the democratic process in testifying against Assembly Bill 104, banning same-sex marriages in the State of Wisconsin.

However, I was and am distressed at the fact that the Gay and Lesbian movement in recent years has extended the hand to include Transgendered people. I vehemently am opposed to discrimination in any form and do not want my comments to suggest or imply such.

As people assembled at the hearing in Wausau, several transgendered people came to oppose and testify on AB104. Gays and Lesbians have a valid sexual orientation, which Wisconsin law protects. Transgendered people have gender identity issues.

So, when you look at the transgendered movement, it is not compatible with the Gay and Lesbian movement. A man who self-identifies as a woman (trapped in a masculinized body, yet perceived feminine identity), attracted to a heterosexual male is not Gay.

Again, not to demean the agony of such a condition, this scenario is one that invokes gender issues as opposed to sexual orientation

When transgendered people make the "change," its heterosexual, not homosexual and their political and civil rights have no correlation and no right to being umbrellaed within the Gay movement. All in all, about 90% of the transgendered community, in reality is dealing with heterosexual issues, not homosexual.

The transgendered community must organize, develop, and fight for their cause on their own just as the Gay movement has done for over 25 years and not ride the coattails and be under the same umbrella as Gays and Lesbiane.

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

There were several people who were very informative on Sodom. One told the Committee that "God killed as many people who live on the earth today when he destroyed Sodom, and he will do it

Boy, that was a shocker. I had no idea that 6,000,000,000 people lived in little old Sodom. Wonder how many Queer

bars they had? Some of the "witnesses" at the hearing in Wausau were also very informative on the sexual practices of Gay men. (Lesbians were rarely mentioned, I guess they don't have sex.)

I had no idea I was supposed to be having sex with 400 to 500 men a year. Now there's a challenge.

This could be especially difficult since as I learned at the hearing we are less than

of the population. Those 400 or 500 guys must all be

sleeping with each other and leaving the dozen of so us who are left, out in the Perhaps my difficulty in racking up big

numbers is because (as I was informed) I don't really have Gay sex.

One of the speakers was kind enough to reveal that Gays like to "ingest feces and

Perhaps my refusal to even consider something like that has held down the number of men I've been with. I wonder what Lesbians like to eat during sex? The speaker never said.

I was very surprised to learn that people who call us "perverted degenerates" and accuse us of trying "to destroy the moral fabric of society," are not really homophobic or hateful. I learned this because the people saying those things told me that was the case.

Apparently we have a lot of Fundamentalist Christians who just love perverted degenerates dedicated to destroying family life.

Another interesting bit of info I picked up is that if the State legally recognizes Gay marriages, people will want to have the right to marry animals, children perhaps even their plants. Who knows

(They would want to marry more than one cow of course because as we were told, Gay marriages will also lead to polygamy.)

demand the right to marry their cows.

And did you know that the average life span for Gay men is only 42 years old? You should have seen the shocked look on the faces of the older Gays and Lesbians who were present. None of them realized that they were already dead.

At the hearing in Madison, I learned

some more surprising "facts."

a hearing, it was okay and proper to trample on other people.

It's also why they put AB 104 on the "fast track."

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### Congressional GOP Support for ENDA **Increases Hope That It will Pass**

Washington, DC-The memory of an excellent high school teacher has led Rep. Christopher Shays to take up the cause, controversial in Congress, of banning job discrimination based on sexual orienta-

The thought that he could have been denied an opportunity to teach at my school just made me realize how strongly I felt about this bill," said Shays, a moderate Connecticut Republican who will be a prime sponsor of the Employment Non-Discrimination Act.

"I wouldn't be a member of Congress today if it hadn't been for this teacher,"

Shays said.

The bill's backers say the support of Republicans like Shays and Sen. Alfonse D'Amato of New York may make the difference this year. The bill was also introduced in the past two Congresses

"We have a solid chance," said Winnie Stachelberg, legislative director of the Washington-based Human Rights Cam-

Republicans in the majority, so the argument goes, will be more open to the bill if the pitch comes from within their own caucus. Shays, in particular, is close to the

House GOP leadership.

Chances for passage are 'better, but it's going to be a difficult debate," Shays said. I'm in this for the long-term and the ultimate success ... I can't say that it will pass this year."

The bill would bar employers from using sexual orientation as a basis for hiring, firing, promotion or compensation. Exemptions would be made for voluntary

and religious organizations, and businesses employing less than 15 workers.

Rep. Barney Frank, (D-MA), who is Gay and the bill's other main House spongary in a property to be a property to be a second to the property to be a p sor, is among those hoping Shays' role will make a difference.

Chris is close to (Speaker Newt) Gingrich. If he's a cosponsor, I guess one test of that will be if we are able to get the bill moved and voted on," Frank said.

No one expects an easy ride, especially

not in the House, where conservative GOP leaders have tighter control on proceedings than the Senate. Last year, House leaders didn't allow a vote on the bill.

Cabin Republicans, the nation's major Gay Republican group. "The trick on the Republican group. House side is getting that groundswell of support among Republicans.

In the Senate, there are already 47 confirmed votes and another five likely supporters, said Stachelberg. However, 60 votes would be needed to keep the bill alive if an opponent threatens a filibuster.

In September, the Senate defeated the bill, but by just one vote. Republicans allowed a vote after Sen. Edward Kennedy, (D-MA), threatened to try and attach the bill to another defining marriage in federal law as a legal union between one man and one woman, which passed easily.

Supporters point out that 64 senators, including some conservative Republicans, ban job discrimination based on sexual orientation in their own offices. At the end of the 104th Congress, 241 of 435 House members had similar policies.

Opponents, meanwhile, are readying their case. The bills are to be introduced

"If you are a good employee, and you are minding your own business, you will not be fired," said Kristi Hamrick of the Family Research Council, which plans to lobby against the legislation.

Hamrick said the bill isn't needed because Americans already have remedies available for unjust firings, including law-suits and appeals to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. It will inject sexual issues into the workplace, she

There is no way to ensure that an employer is not discriminating on the basis of sex behavior without talking to everyone about their sex life," Hamrick said.

Proponents counter that most Americans think it's unfair to fire someone because they're gay. The trouble is that most Americans also think it's illegal, even though only nine states, including Connecticut, prohibit it, they said.

That misperception, said Frank, has been exploited by opponents who insist homosexuals are demanding some sort of

special right.

"The leaders of anti-Gay people try to perpetuate this false notion," he said. They understand that defending against something called a special right is easier than defending against the right not to be

terms of federal policy. That happened primarily through people like Doug Nel-son [executive director of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin], saying, "Look, the epidemic has changed in the past decade or so. If it was ever about just a few metropolitan areas, like San Francisco, it's not now. Now it's about places like Wisconsin as well, so we need equity in terms of federal programs.

That was a contentious debate which happened in the past year or so and, as a result, most people came around to that view. Now, New York and Los Angeles recognize that there have been important geographic changes in the epidemic and that policy should respond to that.

Now, you have groups who look to Milwaukee for leadership. Now the epidemic has changed again in a way more profound than the geographic changes in terms of the new drug therapies. We know we have to change the way we do business in Washington.

So, I'm here to find out what the leadership thinks because I know they have a track record.

TB: What is the situation with AIDS? Is there light at the end of the tunnel?

DZ: I think you go right to the heart of the matter. Yes, there is hope with the new protease inhibitors. This is a pivotal moment in the epidemic. This is not the end, but it is the beginning of the end. TB: Is there a cure coming?

DZ: I'll tell you what I believe in my heart. I believe that we can go into the new century with tremendous hope. I think, yes, that we probably will cure

TB: We hear a lot of talk about apathy towards the AIDS epidemic. Do you see

DZ: I've heard a lot of talk about that. What I see is people responding to a whole new set of challenges and coming from a different kind of motivation. I think we ran off of compassion and concern for our friends for over a decade. Now, I see people coming into this battle-and I'm a new-comer-and I think it's about hope. I think it's about seeing an historic opportunity to get about the business of putting AIDS behind us. I think there's something about a challenge like that comes out of optimism for doing something important. TB: Needle Exchange?

DZ: There is no area of AIDS prevention where the data is so convincing as it is around the needle exchange. We know that needle exchange programs get tainted needles off of our streets and prevent in-

We know from recent studies that tens of thousands of lives would have been and will be saved if federal decision makers would allow local communities to implement programs of needle exchange.

Milwaukee's actually doing better than most places because some folks here, like MAP (Milwaukee AIDS Project), have found ways to get private funding for needle exchange programs that are reaching some IV drug users. Those programs are under resourced because of the federal ban. You all are actually ahead of the game.

It is a slow process in Washington to bring decision makers around to following the science rather than, what I call "cultural politics"—their own discomfort with needles.

The Secretary of Health, for example, now acknowledges that the data is in and that local groups should be free to explore needle exchange programs.

The Congress is not anywhere near there. They still remain hostile. We'll take it step by step, but ultimately, I think, our goal should be to get the federal government out of it.

TB: How is it working with the Republican Congress?

DZ: The shift in the debate from AIDS being only about certain metropolitan ar-eas to about all places in America has actually put us in a stronger position with many Republican members of Congress. They have begun to "own" the epidemic in a way they hadn't before.

I don't find (working the GOP) as daunting as one might expect.

There is no question that the era of budget cuts makes it difficult to persuade them to do the right thing, but we have some allies on both sides of the aisle. TB: What about the new drugs and the

poorer countries?

DZ: The treatments with the new drugs are very expensive. Only a tiny fraction of people around the world with AIDS are able to get access to them because of the cost. Quite honestly, I don't think that's going to change.

I was pleased to hear the President talk about a vaccine in his State of the Union speech because when you look at AIDS globally-which you have to-the only way I can see for us to obliterate AIDS from the planet is with a vaccine. It's the only way we'll be able to afford to get to all the people.

It's a daunting problem in terms of access to the treatments, but hopefully we'll get about the business of developing a

A vaccine is a pretty cheap thing, once

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

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
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### Women Across the Country to Take **Back the Trails**

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### Batman and Robin; Being a Houseboy Among the Rich and Famous

The other day, I read a story in the Internet written by a man who said he had been a houseboy. He said that some, including his those, like him, who had been houseboys, might be "shocked" at his writing about his experiences. Au contraire. I wasn't shocked or offended at all. I thought it was great that he was willing to tell his story. It brought back memories of my own life, and I thought Wisconsin Light's readers might be interested in my tale.

I lived with my parents in wealthy suburb of a city in upstate New York. I had the best of everything; nice house, expensive clothes, the best school. For my 16<sup>th</sup> birthday my father had promised to get me a car.

All that came to an end one evening when my parents came home early from wherever they'd been. They found my best friend Tom and me in the livingroom, buck naked, going down on each other.

They threw Tom out and both got on the phone to tell Tom's parents what had happened. I overheard them say that both Tom and I belonged in mental institutions; that we needed professional help; and that they planned to send me to a military school.

I wanted none of that and ducked out the back door. Fortunately, I had a little money with me. I spent that night on the Greyhound bus heading for New York City. I have never seen or talked to my parents again.

Manhattan can be overwhelmingespecially in the winter and it's raining, as it was. It can be especially frightening if you're a kid, you're hungry, you have no money and have never been there before.

I had no idea what I was going to do or how I would make my way. I don't mind admitting it now. I was scared shitless. All I knew for certain was that I didn't want to go back. What I'd face there would be a shrink's couch-or worse.

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There was a guy in the bus station—the Port Authority, they call it-who saw how bewildered I was and invited me to go home with him. He'd give me a meal and a place to sleep, he told me. I went with him. I knew enough to know it was dangerous, but I went anyhow.

He was an older man, in his fifties, I think. His name was "Mike." He turned out to be a decent sort, giving me food and a bed. Sure we had sex, but that was okay. The next morning, he gave me a hundred dollar bill and sent me on my way

I guess that's when I decided that if I could make \$100 with one man for sex, I could do the same again-and again. I became a hustler.

This was in the days before AIDS, so I 'didn't have to worry about that. All I had to be concerned about was turning the next trick-and I turned a lot of them, an awful lot of men.

There were clubs where hustlers hung out, many of them no older than me. There was no problem getting in. I made a lot of friends among the "hustler fraternity." Some of them had a "Daddy," in other words, a pimp. Some worked "freelance." But no matter which, they exchanged valuable information.

For example, they knew which tricks were to be avoided and which ones paid the best. Most importantly, they could "smell" a cop a mile away. Drugs? Sure, they were around, but I stayed away from them. Most of my friends did too.

One of the things I learned from my friends was about houseboys. What a houseboy did was cook, clean, and be a companion for plays, movies, travel, that sort of thing. At the same time, the houseboy provided sex whenever it was needed. that, I was told, you could make thousands of dollars. I was immediately inter-

A friend of mine who was already working as a houseboy referred me to a guy who was looking for one. I gave him a call.

His name was "George" (I'm sure you'd recognize the correct name). We met in a restaurant for dinner and hit it off right

He had a wife who he'd married for appearances, he told me. She lived outside the city, while he kept an apartment in Manhattan. If I took the job, he said, I was expected to be "super discreet," which meant dressing and acting appropriately at all

Publicly, I was to be his houseboy. Every-

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
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I took care of all the household chores. As time went by and I learned more about his life, I took on the task of being his social secretary as well. I handled all his parties (he gave some fabulous parties, believe me), got theater tickets, made his dinner reservations (at the very best restaurants), and

Sometimes he would tease me and tell I was playing "Robin" to his "Batman." The only thing different was that we shared the same bed

I even got to know his wife. She knew what I was to her husband, but she didn't seem to care. Believe it or not, we became friends. She was a pretty woman who did not lack for men-and a woman every now and then, she told me once.

George and I traveled together, to California, Florida (he had homes in both places), Europe and the Far East. I saw many things, met many people and learned an awful lot.

I "worked" for George for over five years. All that time, I never lacked for a thing. I even think he grew to love me in his own way. But it all had to end. I had dreams of my own I wanted to fulfill.

Finally, I told him that I wanted to quit. I wanted to get my high school diploma and go to college. He was sad about it all, but conceded that getting my education was the best thing for me. He said that as a sort of severance pay, he would pay for it all-and

That was many years ago. George and I have remained good friends and have kept in touch, although less frequently as the years have gone by. I guess that's why I'm writing this to you now. It's not only because of the story I read on the Internet. The holidays are here and I've just gotten a card from him with his usual little note. He wants me to come to California for a visit. Maybe I will.

So that's my story about being a houseboy. Would I recommend it? Yes, I think I would. I'm not saying that my situation was typical, but I can tell you this. During the time that I was George's houseboy, I met others very much like myself, doing the same thing.

Certainly life as a houseboy is better, far better than being a hustler. I should know.

What I would advise is that if you want to be a houseboy, research the role. Treat it as any other job. Get to know your employer. Understand what work is involved and what you must give up to do that work. Keeping a house or apartment is not, I can tell you, a part-time job.

It doesn't hurt either if you're good looking and decently built. Stay away from all forms of drugs, and learn to flirt with and flatter your employer's friends. It makes them feel good-and makes your employer look good.

And these days, I understand, many times being a houseboy is just housework. There are women and men out there who want a live-in "butler," and nothing more.

That's about it. I imagine, if you print this, you'll get letters from people who will be upset, but they'll get over it. I know one thing: I survived.

seek another term.

Klug's announcement has created a flurry of activity in Madison political cir-cles as potential successors from both Baldwin may have gotten the jump on them. "I was in the right place at the right time," she said.

Baldwin said that she had two days of meetings in Washington during the same weekend that Klug made his announcement. "I came back to Madison on Sunday and saw the banner headline 'Klug Is Not Going to Run Again.' I had no inkling that he was not going to run. It was great fortune. In view of Klug's announcement, peo-

ple I had met with in Washington have been calling and saying 'It's an open seat Tammy

With a few exceptions, however, those national groups are not likely to weigh into the race until after the primary. Baldwin understands that to win the primary she must get support from within the District.

Baldwin also revealed that she had considered making a run for Klug's seat in 1996. "I spent about a month analyzing it," she said. Baldwin decided not to make that race because of the difficulties in ousting an

Should Baldwin win the Democratic primary she would have an excellent chance to win the general election. The Second Congressional District is the most Democratic leaning district represented by a Republican anywhere in the country.

While there have been several openly Gay Congressional Representatives, there have been no open Lesbians in Congress. Furthermore those Gay men who have been elected did not run as openly Gay candidates. They were outted after their election.

Last year for the first time, there were three openly Gay and Lesbian candidates making an initial bid for Congress. Two Gay men, one in California and one Oklahoma lost in the general election, a Lesbian State Senator in Maine narrowly lost in her

To those who might say that an openly Gay or Lesbian candidate can not win a seat in Congress Baldwin answers "As long was we have discrimination in our society, being non male, non white and non heterosexual will always be an issue for any candidate who has any of those characteristics. If we want a Congress that is not all white, all male and all heterosexual, we must recognize that your representative doesn't always have to look like you in order to represent you well.'

Baldwin realizes that she will have to work hard to win. "There are two very different races that have to be won, the primary and the general election, both are going to require an intensive amount of work

To win the election she must win the primary. In order to do that she has to convince Democrats that she is the strongest candidate.

"Certainly there are people who will vote on principle and vote their heart. But there is a great sector out there who will vote based on their desire to have this seat in the D column. I have to convince everyone of these people that I am the winning candi-

When asked how those favoring her candidacy can help Baldwin responded

"There will be much to be done, but its absolutely doable, but only if we exert a lot of energy and we first and foremost recognize that we have an irreplaceable resource like the time we have. The closer we get to election day the less renewable that resource

Baldwin added "It will be an expensive race, financial support is important, but I will run a campaign that will allow everyone to be a part of the team no matter what their financial resources are.


Reaction to Baldwin's potential candidacy has been uniformly positive. National and local activists were universally supportive. Typical of their reactions were statements

by Madison activist Mark Pocan who called a Baldwin candidacy "A very exciting pros-pect. Tammy would an excellent Congresswoman for all the people of the district.

Baldwin did not set a time table for making a formal announcement of her candidacy. Before taking that final step Baldwin said she wanted to assess the field wouldn't be surprised if we didn't have clarity on that until early 1998"

Meanwhile she says "I am hitting the ground running."

Fred Hersch lives life through the music he creates. He is a musician's musician, delving into introspective places that only few artists can and having a vision that transcends the boundaries of any one musical genre to produce colorful and vibrant movement.

With 14 solo recordings and more than 60 collaborative recordings to his credit, the jazz pianist has won praise from his peers for his innovative genius and prolific style. He has also earned himself two Grammy nominations.

"Music is the focus for everything in my life. It's the thing that means the most to me," says the 41-year old composer and pianist. " As a pianist I'm more in the jazz realm than anything else. But I also play classical and work with various vocalist. also pull from various other places like R&B, Motown, the Beatles. I compose a fair amount myself in different idioms. Jazz piano is just the hub of the wheel."

Though he has

sionally for nearly two decades, Hersch gained substantial media attention two years ago when he disclosed that he was HIV positive.

"I'm a folder within a folder. I'm a music pianist who happens to be Gay who happens to be HIV positive--in that order," he says. "I decided that if I am going to be an artist with any kind of integrity, couldn't waste energy in any closet, 97% gay or HIV. But I'll always be a musician before anything else."

These days, Hersch is enjoying the success of two recently released and critically acclaimed recordings, the stellar "Passion Flower: Fred Hersch Plays Billy Strayhorn" and "Fred Hersch Plays Rodgers & Hammerstein," both on Atlantic/Nonesuch Records.

A master technician, Hersch sparkles on both sets, which he produced, arranged and orchestrated. Much of his impact stems from tonal nuance, his gift for

### Owners of Wausau's Madhatter Bar Lay Out the Welcome Mat State-Wide

In Wausau underneath the veneer of a nearly solidly white, straight community, there beats a lavender rhythm. It is the same beat that is seen in countless small towns around the nation, a courageous beat, a festive beat, a friendly beat, a beat of Gay and Lesbian life.

Just as it is in so many other small towns, the lifeblood of that beat is a local Gay and Lesbian bar. In Wausau that bar is called the Madhatter. Located in the heart of the downtown area, the bar is the pride and joy of Anne Bruno and her partner of five years Vicki

I was fortunate enough to spend a Sunday evening there, the night before the Anti-Gay marriage bill hearing that was The Madhatter held a few miles away. stands as evidence of the oft stated fact that we are everywhere.

More than that it stands as a welcoming beacon for Gays and Lesbians, who without its presence would not where to go. I was more than happy to have the chance to interview the owners, I was proud.

DS: Does your ability to draw people from all over give you a sense of pride? Vicki: Yes, you know there a lot more people in Wausau that are Gay who are in the closet. If this was Milwaukee, this bar would be packed every night, but there are a lot of closet cases in this area.

DS: So if you're up here in business in the great northwoods. of Wisconsin, you should stop in at the Madhatter and have a great time?

Anne: You bet, yeah sure. Glad to have

DS: What kind of community exists up here outside of the Madhatter and CWAN (the local AID.S. Service Organization)?

Anne: We're it. Other than going to Point for the 10% society at the university, we are it.

DS: Does that put pressure on you because you know how important the bar is the community?

Anne: We always want to have something for Wausau. We want to make sure that people have a safe place to go to. Isn't that the way all people who have Gay bars

Dusty Sass: How long have you owned or Gay groups feel? Believe me If I were the Madhatter? Anne: Six years.

DS: So why did you decide to go into the Gay bar business up in Wausau?

Anne: Well the last owners were going out of business and no else wanted to open up a Gay bar, so I just picked up the baton to make sure we had a Gay bar in Wausau. We have had a Gay bar in Wausau since 1974.

DS: Why did the last owners want to leave?

Anne: Bar burnout. It was just their time to leave.

DS: Obviously it's different running a Gay bar in a small town like this versus a big city, where attitudes may be more liberal. Have you had a lot of problems with the town?

Anne: Our problems only come from white middle class children who follow what they're taught in their homes and give us

DS: What do you mean how they are taught in their homes?

Anne: They're not taught tolerance. A great deal of effort primarily on being a white community. Within the last 10 years we've only had some integration with Asians and a few African Americans. So

they're not used to differences. DS: Do you have a big staff?

Anne: Our staff consists of Vicki and I. We are small owner operated. Our customers come in to see us. We're a home-

DS: How long have you two been together?

Anne: Five years.

DS: How many people live in Wausau?

Anne: They say on the sign its 34,000. With surrounding communities it's up to about 75,000.

DS: So how many people would you get in here on busy night?

Anne: It ranges anywhere from 50 to 200. DS: Do they come just from Wausau or further away?

Anne: Oh they come from Wausau, but also from Rhinelander, Eau Claire, Green Bay, Stevens Point and even further. We have a lot of people who are business people who come here.

in it for the money, I would have been gone a long time ago.

DS: Does running a bar with your partner put a strain on your relationship? Anne: No not at all.

Vicki: We spend a lot of time together. It's good to get away for a few hours or so, but we like being together.

DS: Does it bring you closer together maybe?

Anne: I guess so. We're just a very strong couple. Our relationship is built on trust. We have strong relationship, a good understanding of each other.

DS: So where did you guys meet? Vicki: A bar.

DS: Which one?

Anne: The Platwood in Stevens Point.

DS: So what do you like best about owning the Madhatter?

Vicki: We meet a lot of nice people. Yeah, we meet a few real butt heads, but we meet a lot of nice people. It's given us some opportunities we wouldn't have otherwise, like getting involved with ROW, Rainbow Over Wisconsin.

DS: What are you doing with ROW?

Vicki: I work on the picnic and I do a lot of the entertainment and Annie does secu-

DS: Do you have a lot of problems up here with Gay bashing or whatever. Vicki: I'd say in a year we might have at

most one or two incidents. We have a good relationship with the police. If we ever have a problem, the cops are here in a matter of minutes.

DS: What do you do for fun and excitement.? You have no bartenders other than yourselves so you always have to be here. You don't have any life outside of the bar.

Anne: Vicki is a performer so she goes out of town and performs a great deal. She dances, lipsychs, she was Ms. Gay Wisconsin.

Vicki: I also sew. Plus every year we go to the Renaissance fairs in different states. That's our only vacation.

DS: Since you have no bartenders don't you have to close the bar when you leave?

Gutzman is looking for interested actors, including a singing drag queen and an actor to play a young Nazi. The show includes violence and some nudity.



### An Intimate History of the Sex Lives of **Gay Men--Postwar to Present**

The recently departed Michael Callen, famed AIDS activist, musician and longtime survivor, had many admirers who now miss his passionate public expressions of sex wisdom. Callen, however, left a startling legacy among his survivorcompanions. This legacy, surfacing powerfully in a new book, Sex Between Men, proves that a continuity of ideas and values, if not of a physical immortality, does

Author Douglas Sadownick, Callen's close friend, has penned a volume resurrecting Callen's searching, vital spirit, allowing it to whisper wisely into the silences of our most intimate physical/emotional encounters.

Douglas Sadownick went regularly to the dying thinker's bedside, faithful to the end. He saw, not surprisingly, that a living mood can transcend death's blank darkness and he vowed to tell what he knew of Callen's contributions to humanity's understanding that sexual consciousness need not be staid and static, but is continuously open to an ever more powerful and satisfying awareness.

Sex Between Men, therefore, is more than mere theorizing about male sexuality. It is a space shuttle, packed with investigative data. The author, with a gutsy taste for futurism, talks in the tone of a non-

judgmental adventurer.

From heavenly perches he sees the globe with a fond and earnest caring, sending Callen's message to other futurists who are eager to vanquish their erotic weariness. To Sadownick, there's more to our discovery of sex/affection than most ever imagine.

The message embodied in Sex Between Men says our approaches to sex are in a highly transformative or developmental stage. Changes had already been occurring rapidly, even before the onset of this era of AIDS.

While there's no seeming design, no deliberate cosmic plan, there does exist an extraordinary body of evidence pointing to social alterations, mutations, and modifications leading humankind to new variations as colorful and exciting as its uncounted fantasies themselves.

Sadownick knows we're being weaned away from old-fashioned sexual habits and that pressured behavioral demands melt while old rusty chains, keeping us shackled to a host of unimaginative repetitions, break.

The author's research, covering the last 50 years of Gay male behavior, strikes out toward majestic heights. Using often vivid quotes from interviewee experiences, readers recognize those faint familiar tunes they themselves have often sung.

Sadownick's interviews are cleverly arranged. At first they seem to leave readers in limbo, but the author rescues in the nick of time, finding men lonely at the baths; at a disco, breathing hard after dancing; or slumped over a bar at closing

these ordinary perches, Sadownick lifts them to new levels. The panorama widens and sexual inter-changes assume a new significance. Each level aims to increase—in same-sex contacts-the maximization of human affection. On one level learn of a sexual awareness that increases not only personal pleasure but the happiness of recognizable outcasts, including the bald, the effeminate, the fat, the foolish and the boring, all types too seldom included as comrades who are worthy of attention.

Any Gay man who dares to regard himself as knowledgeable about sex needs the spirited counsels that pop up regularly in this extraordinary book. Those unwilling to rethink sexual habitualism may turn away, but even so Sadownick proves an able opener for closed minds.

To men who understand sexuality as adventuresome shoots into greater spaces, Sex Between Men opens its shuttle doors onto alluring futureworlds, places where satisfaction continuously develops and where perplexity and defeat

are perpetually diminished. No single book about sexuality will appeal to everybody. Taste, certainly, is a matter of taste. But Sadownick gives, in the lan Young tradition of psycho-history, a psycho social chron-icle.

There are several other major works examining masculine sex, including Homosexual Behavior Among Males by Wainwright Churchill and The Geography of Perversion by Rudi C. Bley. But when meeting today's sexual quandaries head on, one feels hard pressed to recommend a more provocative and challenging approach than Sadownick's prodigious, Sex

### David Leavitt's New Book is Best Titled The Lost Language of Whiners

Success came early to David Leavitt. Barely into his twenties Leavitt had stories published in the oh-so prestigious New Yorker magazine. Naturally a book came next, a collection of short stories, Family Dancing, which was nominated for several oh-so prestigious awards.

Quickly emerging as the darling of mainstream literary critics, David Leavitt continued to carve a name for himself with such other well-received Gay themed works of fiction as The Lost Language of Cranes, Equal Affections and A Place I've Never Been.

Leavitt's soaring success suddenly, dramatically stalled in 1993 with the publication of While England Sleeps. his early, autobiographical fiction, While England Sleeps was Leavitt's first attempt at historical fiction, the story of an aristocratic British writer's love affair with a working class lad in the 1930's.

The less than unanimously flattering reviews that normally accompanied each new Leavitt book quietly faded into the background with the stunning revelation that the acclaimed poet W. H. Auden was accusing Leavitt of plagiarizing his own life story.

A lawsuit ensued. Leavitt's publisher, the mammoth publishing house Viking Penguin, pulled all existing copies of While England Sleeps, an extraordinary

In modified bookselling development. form (as per the revisions dictated by Leavitt's settlement with Auden) a paperback version of While England Sleeps appeared last fall, to surprisingly little

Why all the bio info? Such familiarity with Mr. Leavitt's career proves to be almost a prerequisite in delving into his latest literary effort, Arkansas: Three No-vellas (Houghton Mifflin HC \$23.00).

This collection's centerpiece is "The Term Paper Writer" in which a protagonist, a writer oh-so conveniently named David Leavitt, has been hiding out at his father's house following a publishing scandal that exactly mirrors that experienced by the author David Leavitt. Suffering the malaise brought upon by this scandal, he and his writing become rejuvenated when he agrees to write term papers for UCLA male undergraduates in exchange for sex.

Nathan and Celia, two well-loved Leavitt characters dating back to his first shortstory collection, Family Dancing return in "The Wooden Anniversary." Having grown up and grown apart, Celia and Nathan have an awkward reunion after a five year separation. Celia has changed, in ways both visible and not so visible to her friends. She has a husband, although their marriage seems loveless. She's begun a successful cooking school in Tuscany despite persistently claiming no culinary gifts. Most of all, Celia has lost a tremendous amount of weight and with it, her obsession for Nathan. Nathan, on the other hand has remained Nathan.

In the collection's final story, "Saturn Street", Leavitt follows Jerry Roth, a disaffected screenwriter in Hollywood who avoids writing by spending most of his time delivering lunches to homebound AIDS patients or cruising adult bookstores looking for sex. Somewhere along his delivery route, on Saturn Street, Jerry meets and falls in love with Phil. Like most of Leavitt's characters, Jerry is unable to lower the carefully constructed barriers which guarantees his solitary existence.

Readers who like scandal and controversy (you know who you are) are sure to find much to pique their interest in Arkan-sas, particularly in "The Term Paper Writer". Others are likely to find this collection curiously unsatisfying.

Leavitt certainly seems to enjoy teasing his readers in "The Term Paper Writer", blurring factual details of his own life with that of a fictional David Leavitt. Are we actually supposed to believe that the real David Leavitt, in the aftermath of his While England Sleeps scandal, bartered for sex with undergraduates or that one of these self-same undergraduates (Ben) toyed with the idea of writing a fictional account of their transaction? In the end, will anyone care?

Glenn was also struck by the striking similarities between the protagonists and the urban LA landscape of "The Term Paper Writer" and "Saturn Street." protagonists are writers who cannot write but rather divide their days either riding the streets of Los Angeles, listening to a radio call-in show hosted by the acerbic Dr. Delia or cruising the shelves at Circus of Books. Likewise, both protagonists seems more comfortable in anonymous phone sex rather than in real human relationships.

Leavitt places all of his characters in this rather bleak collection into a strikingly barren emotional landscape, one in which failed dreams and lost loves ominously dominate. Having reached middle age, his protagonists have acquiesced to the seductive powers of longing and regret rather than chance the potential risks in gambling in either love or career.

Leaving Arkansas, one cannot help but think how fortunate we are that these depressing characters are David Leavitt's friends and not ours.

### Out of the Dust of Adversity, Rudy Galindo Becomes a Star

Rudy Galindo thought this day never would come. If he ever dreamed of it, he would push the idea out of his mind. How could he win the men's national figure skating championship? How would the conservative world of figure skating ever allow an openly Gay Mexican-American to take even third place, much less the national title, he had asked aloud.

Well, it happened in 1996. Not third. But first. The national title, won in San Jose, his own home town before a raucous crowd of 10,869 that rose to its feet 15 seconds before he finished the perfect long program in San Jose Arena.

Here was Rudy Galindo, someone who was eighth last year, who never had been higher than fifth in seven national men's competitions, who was so lightly regarded that he wasn't included in the media guide, rising to beat the top skaters in the country and take the title.

In his book, The Autobiography of Rudy Galindo, we get to savor the glittering magic of that victory in what the Washington Post called "one of the grandest upsets in figure skating history.'

As his book chronicles, Galindo's victory at Nationals was an unexpected (by everyone, but him) triumph in more ways than

He was Gay, he was poor, he was raised in an area where drugs and gangs are far more prevalent than dreams of triumphs in gold. Yet, with his father behind him and his older sister Laura, beside him, and an inner strength that he didn't know he had, Galindo beat all the odds.

The book is completely frank. Galindo is forthright about his problem with alcohol and drugs. He writes movingly about his mother's illness, his father's death from a heart attack, the deaths of two of his coaches and his older brother from AIDS. As if this weren't enough, he is plunged into the sloughs of despond when his partner, Kristi Yamaguchi, decides to leave him and go it alone, thus dashing his hopes for Olympic gold.

Despite all this, he will reach for his dream-and he will grasp it. In the process, he is true to himself, a Mexican-American, an "effeminate" Gay man.

In effective declarative prose, what comes through in this book is the portrait of a young man of tremendous courage. But one who is also incredibly tender, warm-hearted, and decent. He is a young Gay man with a fantastic capacity for love, so much so that there are times in reading the book when you want to take him in your arms and cuddle him and never let

This is a book that, at times, will make you weep. At times, too, it will make you

feel all warm and fuzzy inside. It will make you want to meet him because after you finish the book, you will believe that you know him so well.

The book is co-authored with Eric Marcus who also co-authored the autobiography of Greg Louganis, Breaking the Silence.

The Autobiography of Rudy Galindo is just now reaching the bookstores. It should be a "must read" on everyone's list. This story of a gallant young Mexican-American athlete is too good to pass up.

# OUT on Film

### 'Prisoner of the Mountains' is a Stunning Adaptation of a Tolstoy Story

Competing for screen space (not to mention audience) with the mammoth Star Wars epics and the shameless, adolescent mugging of Jim Carrey, a terrific little foreign film like Prisoner of the Mountains doesn't seem to have much of a chance and that's a darn shame.

Loosely based on a Leo Tolstoy short story, *Prisoner of the Caucasus*, written over 150 years ago, Sergei Bodrov's cinematic adaptation proves to be just as fresh and topical today's newspaper headlines.

The story is astonishingly yet deceptively simple. When local rebels ambush a small troop of Russian soldiers, two are taken captive: Sacha (Oleg Menshikov) and Vania (Sergei Bodrov, Jr.). Rebel leader Abdoul-Mourat (Jermal Sikharulidze) hopes to exchange these captured soldiers for his son who is currently being held in a Russian jail.

Much of the film's early focus is on the relationship of the two captured soldiers, different as night and day but forced to get along because of the chain that shackles them together.

Sacha is the older, the more worldly of the two, an experienced soldier who expects the worst and who is ready to kill his jailers, however sympathetic, if escape seems within their grasp. While Sacha initially seems to hold the young, innocent Vania in contempt, their relationship effortlessly moves to that of an older and a younger brother.

For inexplicable reasons, the exchange doesn't come off as planned. Frustrated, Abdoul-Mourat instructs his two captives

to write to their mothers, hoping that family intervention might rule the day. Sacha, an orphan has no mother but Vania's mother, a teacher, quickly descends upon the Russian garrison.

Vania's mother cannot persuade the garrison's commander, a man too mistrustful of the rebels and too unwilling to act against orders. Undaunted, Vania's mother sets out to plead with her son's captor.

Bodrov places his story within a near fairytale landscape, a breathtakingly beautiful mountain region. If not for the fighting, it is possible to imagine that the little village Abdoul-Mourat takes the soldier to has been forgotten by time.


Sergei Bodrov effectively offers his antiwar message in **Prisoner on the Mountains** without resorting to cardboard characters or conventional plotting. Nothing is black or white, there are no villains, at least not villains in the Hollywood sense of the word.

Particularly impressive is Bodrov's use of non-professional actors for all roles except that of the two soldiers. Especially appealing is Susanna Mekhralieva as Dina, Abdoul-Mourat's twelve year-old daughter who befriends the two soldiers.

Prisoner on the Mountains is a marvelous film, a simple and poignant story exquisitely told. Do not miss it.

### Suspense, Great Characters Make 'Smilla's Sense of Snow' a Good Film

When you go to see a suspense thriller, the last thing you want to have happen is for your mind to wander—due to the fact that the film is boring, predictable, inane, or worse yet, all three of those things. It's during films like that that you'll start looking at your watch and thinking what you'll do after the movie's over, which can't come too soon.

When you go to see a film with such an off-beat title as Smilla's Sense of Snow,

cops on the scene believe the boy accidentally fell off the roof. "No child plays like that," retorts Smilla, and her search for the truth behind this boy's death becomes her all-consuming passion. The mystery leads us in directions we could never predict, and does so in a convincing, thrilling, entertaining fashion.

As I mentioned in the title of this review, "great characters" help to make this a worthwhile film to see. This includes the aforementioned Julia Ormond as Smilla,

you're at least initially intrigued because you have no idea what it means (unless you've already read the novel of the same name by Peter Hoeg). What happens afterwards is entirely predictable. I'm glad to report that in the case of this film, you'll continue to be intrigued long after the title makes sense.

The ball gets rolling immediately in this two-hour mystery, as a young boy lies face-down in the snow on the sidewalk below the apartment building in which he lived. Smilla (Julia Ormond) was very close to the boy, and is distraught when she arrives home to see this awful sight. The apparent accident of his death is, however, immediately brought into question.

Smilla is an expert on Arctic conditions and snow (largely due to her upbringing in Greenland). You see, the boy's footprints in the snow on the roof of the building lead directly off the edge in a straight line. The

the angry, conflicted, suspicious, driven central character.

A stuttering fellow living in the same apartment building (Gabriel Byrne) slowly and painfully makes his way into Smilla's somewhat chilled heart and mind, but, as we later find out, perhaps her initial suspicions of him were well-founded after all.

Veteran actors, too, make excellent supporting appearances. Robert Loggia is Smilla's caring father, and there's Richard Harris in another one of his sleazy, villainous roles at which he excells. Finally, we have one scene with Vanessa Regrave, who eventually agrees to help Smilla in her quest for the truth.

Directed by Bille August, the Swedish director of The Best Intentions and Pelle the Conqueror, and written by Ann Biderman (Primal Fear, Copycat) Smilla's Sense of Snow is a fine mystery which I highly recommend. On a 1-10 scale, this film rates an 8.

### 'Devil's Own' is an Intelligent, Gritty Action Film-Plus Brad Pitt

Arriving at the preview for **Devil's Own**, armed with his usual Biggie Popcom and Biggie Diet Pepsi, Glenn was absolutely shivering with excitement. The pairing of Harrison Ford and Brad Pitt certainly suggested a highly engrossing thriller. More importantly, perchance **Devil's Own** would be the film to include a silly, superfluous nude scene by the ever delectable Brad Pitt.

Well, while Glenn is sorry to dash the hopes of all those seeking a sneak peek at Mr. Pitt in the buff, **Devil's Own** does prove to be an engrossing, if occasionally a somewhat perplexing thriller.

Mired in controversy, particularly from reluctant co-star Pitt, Pakula's Devil's Own is a curious hybrid of action block-buster and thoughtful character study.

Brad Pitt is Francis "Frankie" McGuire who at a tender age witnessed the spectacle of his father being gunned down at the dinner table. Jump about twenty years and Frankie is now one of the most sought-after members of the IRA, having the deaths of 13 soldiers and 11 cops to his credit.

Following a fierce battle on the streets of Belfast, Frankie flees to New York, under the sponsorship of New York Judge Peter Fitzsimmons (George Hearn), a IRA-sympathizer. Fitzsimmons contrives to have Frankie stay at the pleasant suburban home of Tom O'Meara (Harrison Ford), a sergeant in New York's finest who knows nothing of Frankie's infamous nast

The O'Mearas welcome their Irish guest with open arms, quickly making him a part of their lives. Quite predictably a bond grows between Frankie and Tom, even while we in the audience know that they are headed to a major, climatic confronta-

Financed by the Judge, Frankie undertakes a mission which involves the purchase of Stinger missiles from Billy Burke (wasn't she Glinda in **The Wizard of Oz?**) which Frankie hopes to transport back to Ireland in a boat he's been refurbishing.

A hitch in the deal occurs. Frankie tries to stall Burke (Treat Williams) but the saloon entrepreneaur-cum-arms dealer has little patience to wait for his money. When Burke's henchmen search the O'Meara household, they uncover no money but prove to be a rather unpleasant surprise Tom and his wife Sheila (Margaret Colin).

Eschewing simplistic action-flick cliches, Pakula is more concerned with issues and with their impact upon the individual, focusing on the relationship between Tom, the good cop and Frankie, the rebel sol-

er. At first uncomfortable within the O'Meara household, by degree we begin to see Frankie responding to their warmth and caring. To similar effect is an emerging romance between Frankie and the beautiful young Megan. Yet when the film's climax occurs, how Brad Pitt's marvelously enigmatic Frankie will react is totally unpredictable. This is the best work Brad Pitt has done in some time.

Tom O'Meara might be a much more predictable a figure, a traditionally heroic family hero yet Harrison Ford does an equally fine job.

### 'Rosewood' is a Frighteningly Accurate Film

African-American director John (Boyz N the Hood) Singleton brings to light the story of the small Florida town of Rosewood, a harrowing, shameful moment in America's history.

The year is 1922. Rosewood is a pretty

The year is 1922. Rosewood is a pretty and prosperous little town lived in and owned by African-Americans along with a few whites, including shopkeep John Wright (Jon Voight). The town's seemingly idyllic existence is nonetheless thwarted almost daily by the poor white trash folks that populate the neighboring town of Sumner.

Theirs is not exactly a peaceful coexistence. Sumner's poor seethe in their racially based discontent, merely awaiting the spark that will enable them to reestablished the proper status quo.

When that spark comes to pass it is suitably stupid and ugly. A local white woman claims that she has been beaten (but not raped, she is quick to add) by a mysterious black man. Sumner's bigoted citizens are all too quick to accept a story that we in the audience knows is not true.

The result is a brutal retribution against Rosewood, something that the town's sheriff (Michael Rooker) is too ineffectual to prevent, despite doubting the woman's story from the start.

If Singleton is occasionally guilty of over simplifying the film's exploration mob violence, too quickly resorting to easy stereotypes and cardboard caricatures, Rosewood is nonetheless a frightening and effective piece of filmmaking.

Fine performances abound with Don Cheadle particularly impressive as the stubborn Sylvester Carrier. Only Ving Rhames as the fictional Mann seems to have wandered in from some other film.

### Lesbian Activist Brings Out Film on Life for Gays in Castro's Cuba

Milwaukee--Americans' view of Cuba is based more on the right wing's mythmaking (a process they've become expert at) than on qualities inherent in Cuban society. In some areas--literacy levels, for example--Cuba has a better track record than we do.

The situation for Cuban Gays is also awash in misinformation, which Sonia de Vries', a Lesbian activist, level-handed documentary goes far in countering.

Gay Cuba combines interviews with Lesbians and Gay men, government officials, and average citizens, with musical performances and Gay pride parades. Along the way, we get a quick, painless lesson in Cuban history.

From 1898 to 1902, the island (now 11 million people) was occupied by the United States. From 1902 until 1959, the U.S. supported dictators to protect our corporate interests-a process that turned the island into a model of Third World corruption and exploitation.

Even after the revolution, Cuba offered to compensate American companies that were nationalized, but, typically, the U.S. refused and thus began the destructive blockade that continues today beyond all reason, logic, and morality.

What effect did the revolution have on the acceptance of Gay people in a country drenched in machismo?

Unfortunately, the government adopted the familiar Stalinist line that homosexuality is "a byproduct of decadent capitalism.

The Public Ostentation Law was enacted in the 1930s specifically to encourage harassment of Gay people who refused to stay in the closet, and in spite of the revolution process of reexamining old attitudes, the government refused to repeal that law until 1988.

Police, used to casual harassment and arrests of Gays, were ordered to desist. Director de Vries interviews people who recall this time, but as one activist says, "Cuba right now is not a human rights

Cuba was rightly condemned also during the 1980s for quarantining people

with HIV, a practice that also collapsed under careful scrutiny. In 1993, the incarceration law was lifted, and HIV patients enjoy free medications, housing, and full wages if they're able to workpolicies that again show the superiority of this island nation over its neighbor to the

The National Center for sex Education leads workshops throughout the country to try to eradicate homophobic attitudes.

One of the women who works for the center blames the Catholic Church for much of the anti-Gay attitude that continues to exist. "The Catholic religion simply rejects pleasure; life; sexuality in general." Many Cuban Gays, like many American Lesbians and Gay men, have in turn rejected the Church, finding spiritual solace in their own growing sense of community, or in the more sensual and open-minded Santeria religion.

The extraordinary success of the literacy campaign initiated after the revolution is evident in the articulateness of the people.

Even many of the soldiers interviewed recognize the foolishness of homophobic attitudes: " Homosexuality has nothing to do with a person's intellectual capacity," one of them says.

Cuba has room for improvement, as some Gays still hide their real identities. A union leader says with simple eloquence, Many of us live our lives in the closet. This works against our human development."

On the other hand, we have a young Cuban Lesbian who insists on holding hands with and kissing her girlfriend in public, "right in front of the police," daring them to intervene.

Gay Cuba shows that a society that encourages its people to think and examine their prejudices can change for the better, and this is exactly what's happening there.

### 'Waiting for Guffman' is an Endearing and Entertaining Film You Should See

Buried deep in the utter depths of Glenn's closet are memories of starring roles in long past (and mercifully forgotten) productions of some of the finest examples of lost classics of the American musical theatre. Indeed, Glenn sang, Glenn danced...

Much like Corky St. Clair (Christopher Guest), the protagonist in Waiting for Guffman, at a young age Glenn was dazzled by the twinkle of the footlights and soon found himself on a Greyhound headed towards the Great White Way. Also like Corky, Glenn found stardom illusive and sadly returned to the warming bosom of home and hearth.

In the finest fashion of those fabulous "let's put on a show" movie musicals of the 1930s, Corky has returned home to mount the most sensational productions ever seen in Blaine (located anywhere, America).

Against all reason, against all logic, Corky has managed to somehow keep that faint flicker of hope alive, the desperate dream of someday becoming a star on Broadway. What could be more existen-

Suddenly, Corky is faced with one last chance, that one big break that will break him loose from Blaine and carry him off to New York: Red, White and Blaine, a lavishly glorious musical extravaganza commemorating the magnificent 150 year history of the town. And who better than Corky to write, direct, costume and choreograph (not star in?) such a production?

In stark, mock documentary fashion, Waiting for Guffman explores the dreams, the hopes, the trials, the tribulations and the applause that surround the creation of such a dramatic entertainment.

Beginning with auditions, it becomes immediately apparent that Blaine is a hotbed of musical comedy talent. Besides Corky himself, there is for example the Albertsons, Ron and Sheila (Fred Willard and Catherine O'Hara). Recalling (if in fact only faintly) Rob and Laura Petrie for the old Dick Van Dyke Show, Ron and Sheila are travel agents by day, a softshoe duet at night.

Urged to explore his creative side, Dr. Allan Pearl (Eugene Levy) proves to be a revelation to Corky at his audition (Glenn

### Fine Performances Make 'Blood and Wine' a Tense Thriller

Like most movie goers, I suppose, I try to guess what will happen next as the film progresses from scene to scene. Who falls in love with who? Who gets killed next? Very often, when those guesses come true, the movie ends up being a disappointing one (earning the unwanted epithet, "predictable"). When you find your guesses incorrect, more often than not, the movie will be a good one ("surprising," "unpredictable"). That observation holds true in my case with Director Bob Rafelson's noir thriller, Blood and Wine.

Predictable or not, no film can survive even slight scrutiny if it's poorly cast, written or acted. Again, on all three levels, this film holds its own. The film centers on two middle-aged crooks looking for one last, lucrative score to send them into easy retirement. Alex and Vic (Jack Nicholson and Michael Caine).

Alex slyly uses his relationship with the nanny of a wealthy friend (Gabriel played by Jennifer Lopez) to gain access to a million dollar, diamond-studded necklace. All Alex and Vic need do is enter the home, out maneuver inane security guards, steal the necklace, pack up and

Only it's not so easy. Alex's life is complicated by a disastrous marriage. His wife (Judy Davis) confronts Alex in a brutal scene, and unwittingly absconds with the necklace, accompanied by her protective son, Jason (Stephen Dorff). As for Vic, he's fighting a losing battle with lung cancer-his goal in life now reduced to avoiding death in a county hospital.

What really makes Blood and Wine a fine thriller are the central characters, all of whom are interesting, multi-dimensional people. Realistically, none of them are wholly good or evil. Instead, they occupy a kind of moral gray area, allowing you to judge them for yourself (rather than having the writers and director feed you your thoughts and emotions, as is so often the case in other films).

The movie has some rough language and violence, but these don't overwhelm the characters as often happens in thrill-

Essentially, Blood and Wine is a taut, tense, dark, dysfunctional thriller, unpredictable at nearly every turn, and well worth seeing. I rate this one an 8.



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### 'Return of the Jedi' is a Fine Finale to the Special Edition of Star Wars Trilogy

Review by John Jahn Return of the Jedi, the last of the origi-nal trio of "Star Wars" films which debuted in 1983, begins where the whole series started-on Luke Skywalker's home planet of Tatooine. Luke has returned there after having completed his Jedi training with Yoda in order to rescue Han Solo from the clutches of the vile, wormlike gangster, Jabba the Hut.

Meanwhile, the evil Galactic Empire is in the process of constructing a new, improved Death Star, in orbit around the forest moon of Endor, and protected by a force field projected around it from the moon's surface. It is precisely this new Death Star where the Rebel forces plan to strike a decisive blow against the Empire, and it is there that Darth Vader and the Emperor himself wait in ambush.

Return of the Jedi is somewhat more light hearted than its predecessor as it

goes about tying up all the loose ends of the space trilogy. The scenes at Jabba's Palace are some of the best in the film, filled with bizarre creatures. Here, Luke battles the Rancor, a gigantic beast that devours human-sized beings whole.

Finally, Luke, Han, Leia and the others fight an epic battle aboard Jabba's sail barge as the latter attempts to execute them by way of the Sarlaac, a creature of teeth and tentacles that lives in a desert pit. It is also in Return of the Jedi that Luke must confront his father, Darth Vader, once and for all, and frustrate the Emperor's plans to make Luke his next apprentice in evil.

The most obvious changes to this film for its re-release included digital, computerized singers at Jabba's Palace (replacing rather fake looking puppets in the original), you get to see what the Sarlaac looks like (in the original, it was somewhat of an inert hole in the ground), and the scenes of celebration at the end of the film no longer focus exclusively on Ewoks on Endor. (The Ewoks, incidentally, are a main reason many fans place this film third on their list of favorite Star Wars films. Certainly, that hold true for this reviewer. I hate those little teddy bears!)

Nevertheless, Return of the Jedi is certainly a must-see film, rating a 10 quite

admits he sometimes has difficulty in recognizing genius) as is Libby Mae Brown, a DQ waitress who wows Corky with a thrillingly original rendition of "Teacher's

The characters of Blaine prove to be, well, characters, caricatures rather than three-dimensional human beings. Still, Guest's affection for these simple, goodhearted if sadly talentless souls is both obvious and infectious.

As the oh-so very theatrical Corky, Christopher Guest walks an oh-so fine line, broad swatches of Gay stereotypes tempered by energetically original, decidedly quirky touches. He's definitely nuts and he's definitely Gay, even if the town of Blaine believes his story about his absent

Much of the film is given to the performance of Red, White and Blaine and the real surprise is how entertaining it is, especially having seen just how much talent was available. This is especially surprising in comparison to Woody Allen's Everyone Says I Love You.

If perhaps lacking the comic genius that made This is Spinal Tap a cult classic, Guest, McKean & Co. have produced an endearing and entertaining little film filled with delightful moments.

And what about the Guffman of the title? Glenn'll never tell!

Channel surfing last week, Glenn mo-mentarily paused on an old I Love Lucy episode. Lucy is forced into a bet which requires her to tell only the truth. Briefly she struggles with this terrifying proposition but soon enough, with gleeful abandon, Lucy begins to relish the freedom

telling the truth can bring.
Liar Liar, written by Paul Guay and Stephen Mazur, changes the story a bit, updating it for the '90's.

Jim Carrey plays Fletcher Reede, an hotshot attorney who is too clever by half and makes sure everyone knows it. When he is handed a big case, one in which a big win is sure to bring with it the reward of making partner in his law firm, nothing is going to stop Fletcher. Certainly not telling a few lies. Not even missing his son's fifth birthday party.

True, Fletcher has proved to be a complete and total bust as a father and a hus-band but that doesn't stop adorable son Max (Justin Cooper) and devoted ex-wife Audrey (Maura Tierney) from continuing to hold a soft spot in their hearts for the scamp. He's not really a bad guy, he just keeps making promises that he can't

Sure, Carrey's mugging occasionally begins to resemble someone's worst nightmare on crack, particularly in a truly creepy scene which has Fletcher beating himself up in a public toilet, but heck no one in the preview audience seemed to mind. Howls of laughter accompanied not only this scene but Carrey's each and every new face or antic. Nor did anyone seem to care that with an effortless slightof-hand that Liar Liar wrapped up in an astonishingly predictable, "happily-ever after" fashion.



improvisation and a unique vision to unearth a totally original, poetic jazz

On the "Rodgers & Hammerstein," Hersch interprets 12 of the famed songwriting team's classics and makes them very much his own, with a jazzy twist. From shows such as "Oklahoma," "South Pacific," "The King & I" and "Cinderella," Hersch brings the American song back to life.

"Passion Flower," which was released earlier last year, is one of Hersch's most powerful and passionate releases to date and one of the most satisfying jazz releases of 1996. On the sterling opus, the versatile pianist interprets the work of Strayhorn--a jazz 1950's popular composer--with his impermeable tonal palette of solo piano, trio and string orchestra.

Strayhorn and Hersch have a lot in common. Both are pianists. Both compose and arrange their own music. And both use strong classical influences in the music they write and perform. Hersch, himself, draws much of his lyrical approach from Bach and Ravel. They both happen to be Gay too.

"A lot of people think that I chose to record the works of BIIIY because he was Gay. But, I definitely did not. I chose him because he was good," he says. "He's a composer that I thought I could do something with on a personal level. His music spoke to me in ways other composer's never have."

Born and raised in Cincinnati, Hersch began to get the music bug when he was just a tot. Though his mom and dad were not musical by trade, they always had music playing throughout the house. "I'd always improvise as a kid, but I didn't have a clue was jazz was not until I got out of high school," he recalls. "Then I started going to jazz clubs and began to learn to play through improvisation."

He graduated with honors from the New England Conservatory. And in 1977, he packed his bags and moved to the Big

Apple, where he has remained ever since. Hersch became established pretty quickly in New York, playing with such jazz giants as Joe Henderson and Stan Getz. He later collaborated with Janis Siegel of The Manhattan Transfer and soprano Dawn Upshaw. In 1985, he recorded his first solo recording. Then, in 1993, he earned his first solo Grammy nomination

for his "Dancing In The Dark" opus. Last year, he earned his second Grammy nomination for "best instrumental performance" for "Fred Hersch Plays Johnny Mandel." But, whether by his own design or not, his most notable work came in the form of the 1994 AIDS benefit album he produced.

Entitled, "Last Night When We Were Young," the jazz ballad recording was created as a fund raising effort for Classical Action, Performing Arts Against AIDS. It featured some of the today's top jazz performers, including Gary Burton, Toots Thielemans and Mark Murphy. The album has so far raised more than 100,000. (Anyone interested in ordering a copy can call 1-800-216-AIDS.)

"I figured I couldn't afford to write huge checks," he says, "but this was something could do to make a difference. Promoting the release also gave him a reason to talk about being HIV positive, something he had not previously discussed with the media. "I felt that I had to be honest and tell people about my own status and not hide behind any walls," says Hersch, who has been asymptomatic for more than 10 years. "I didn't want to feel like I was being hypocritical or dishonest in any way. I figured that if I was going to talk, now was the time."

The revelation landed him on numerous talk shows, on the pages of dozens of magazines from the Advocate Newsweek and propelled him into the national spotlight as the only jazz musician openly living with HIV. "I was pretty shocked by media avalanche. For 22 years I lived openly about my sexuality. But this was not about being Gay. It was about having HIV. Most of the attention was great. The only exception was that I felt like people were looking at me with this poster child mentality. They didn't want to talk about my music, they wanted to talk about my being HIV positive," he says.

"Here I was promoting my music and everyone was focusing on me as a person with AIDS," he recalls. "I became a poster boy for the jazz community. But it was a risk I was prepared to take. Just like Bill T. Jones is the poster boy for the dance world, I'm this for my musical circle. Occasionally it's exhausting. I only wish that people would look beyond that now and focus in on my music."

Coming out hasn't hurt Hersch professionally. Since then, he's playing more gigs than ever before, landed a with deal record label Atlantic/Nonesuch Records and earned his

jazz second Grammy nomination. Hersch hopes people don't buy his music simply because he's Gay.

He disagrees with the notion that because an artist is Gay or Lesbian, the Gay community should automatically support that artist. Talent, he says, should outweigh sexuality. "Being Gay is not particularly interesting, really. I have a lot of problems about so-called 'Gay music.' A lot of it is just not that good," he says. "I don't care who writes it, it should at least be good."

"I don't think that just because someone is an openly Gay artist, their music is inherently worthy of support or extra support, unless they happen to be a good

As for other mainstream artists such as himself coming out of the closet, Hersch isn't overly optimistic either. He doesn't believe the recent "coming out" by Melissa



Etheridge and kd lang will start a trend.

"They're all girls, that's the thing. No major male performer has come out of the closet while they are hot," he says. "There are a lot of artists who are Gay but are afraid to talk about it. Instead, they become musically constipated. They worry about what everyone will think about them. As a result, they are not connecting with the audience with who they are personally. When you are an artist you have to take risks and be prepared that not everyone will embrace it.

In the meantime, the future continues to look bright for Hersch. His next onesuch set is due in the spring, and he also plans to pursue projects of original music and collaborative projects with other artists.

Along the way, Hersch hopes to maybe even meet Mr. Right. "I'm single and not a he jokes. "I've had extended boyfriends and lovers. But it's complicated by the HIV thing. If you're with someone who is HIV negative, they might have to go through some unpleasant shit down the road. And you have to be ultra, ultra careful. If both are HIV positive, then you run the risk that either of you could take a turn for the worse. Plus I'm 41. But I'm always hopeful. It would be nice to meet someone special, but only if it was right."

### The Clout of the Religious Right is Nowhere Near as Formidable as it Once Was

tion to believe that the Religious Right is

tion to believe that the Religious Right is an overwhelmingly formidable force. While no one should underestimate the strength of the religious extremists, reports of its force may be exaggerated.

As reported in the Echo of Phoenix, Arizona, in the Washington Blade, and other LBGT publications, Gay activists, marketers, and officials officials some companies say a dramatic change has occurred. The impact of the Religious Right has been reduced as more firms are willhas been reduced as more firms are willing and able to resist pressure from the Right Wing, according to Peter Freiberg of the Blade.

Stephanie Blackwood, a partner in Spare Parts, a Gay marketing agency, says companies considering Gay-targeted marketing used to be convinced that they

would be hit by a backlash.

"More and more," said Blackwood,
"they see that, by and large, there isn't
any backlash, and if there is a response by
the Right, it doesn't have impact."

For example, one of the most notable efforts by the Right Wing recently was the boycott of the Walt Disney Company. Disney had drawn the anger of the 16 million member Southern Baptist Church and the American Family Association (AFA), for granting domestic partner benefits and allowing an unofficial "Gay and Lesbian Day" at Disney World in Orlando, Florida.

That was seven months ago.

The Disney company has reported that their net income increased by 60% for the fourth quarter of fiscal 1996—a time that included the boycott. The theme parks also set new attendance records during that time, Freiberg reported.

"That balloon sank and nobody heard it crash," said Alan Klein, spokesman for the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against

Defamation (GLAAD).

Currently, the AFA is in a flap over the "coming out" episode of "Ellen" on ABC.


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
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### "In The Life" Presents its 'The American as Apple Pie' Episode in April

New York—An automotive plant in Detroit, your local Congressional representative, the circus, Campbell's soup cans, Disneyland, farm life in the Midwest, Mom and Dad...They're all as American as apple pie, in In the Life shows how they're also as American as Gay apple pie in its April-May episode.

First, host Katherine Linton profiles the efforts of Lesbians and Gay men working for Chrysler to achieve workplace protections for themselves by the inclusion of sexual orientation clauses in union contracts and company nondiscrimination statements.


Also previewed: the upcoming documentary "Out in the Workplace," by coproducers Kelly Anderson and Tami Gold.

"A Day in the Life" moves on to Washington, DC, where last fall the city elected the country's first openly Lesbian African-American representative to Congress. Sabrina Sojourner has no actual vote in Congress. But it's clear she doesn't let that stop her as she takes viewers through a day of outreach to the different groups and interests she represents in the nation's capital.

Side shows and big tops: In the third segment, viewers learn just how Gayfriendly circus folk can be when Katherine Linton profiles bearded lady Jennifer Miller, founder of Circus Amok; lovers and partners Jonathan Nosan and Eric Newton, as they perform their trapeze act in Airmales; and Eric Michael Gillett, a Gay man who also happens to be the ringmaster for Ringling Brothers and Barnum & Bailey Circus.

Next, correspondent Hal German visits the Andy Warhol Museum in Warhol's hometown of Pittsburgh. Publicly asexual, but privately Gay, Warhol made use of his Gay "lens" to image the world in a new way. Famed for his Pop Art reproductions of soup cans and Brillo pad boxes, he also left a legacy of homoerotic drawings and photos, on view at the museum.

The Walt Disney Company is about as all-American as an institution can get. In the fifth segment, correspondent Bill Britt profiles a number of the Magic Kingdom's Gay and Lesbian employees. He also de-



scribes the recent emergence of a strongly Gay-supportive stance at the company in regard to both its employees and its customers—a position that has met with a less than enthusiastic response from the Religious Right Wing.

Last, but hardly least, In The Life takes a look at PFLAG in the newly activist role it has assumed during the past few years. Billboards, TV ads, booklets, videos, lobbying Congress-PFLAG vice president Sy Zwan discusses the ambitious program the group has launched nationwide targeting homophobia in mainstream Amer-

In the Life travels to Wisconsin to talk with Gay men and Lesbians who grew up on farms and rural areas. Included is an interview with Will Fellows, author of Farm Boys, a book which profiles over three dozen men who tell their own stories of growing up on farms in the Midwest.

Slice the pie of this episode any way you like, and there's a tasty morsel for everyone. Once again, In The Life proves that, no matter what the metaphor, Gay men and women are a vital part of Ameri-

unjustly condemned and executed on a hill overlooking the town dump. He was a man who was born in an obscure village, an uneducated man, whose only crime was to challenge the Establishment of His day to create a society of peace, charity and love.

He said there is a place for all in his kingdom. He accepted the diversity of people as Children of God and demanded that the church establishment do likewise.

The people in power decided that they could end his subversive ideas with His death. They had a surprise on Easter

Christ protected outcasts and the disinfranchized. He called Matthew, a tax collector, as a disciple. He cured a pagan's slave and, to add injury to insult, the slave belonged to a Roman Centurion. He protected a prostitute from a selfrighteous mob.

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### ABC Has Made its Decision: "Ellen" is Coming Out on Prime Time TV

New York, NY-In an update to a story in the last issue, yes, it has been decided. ABC ending an off-screen cliffhanger that has lasted almost six months, will air the segment of "Ellen" in which the lead character comes out as a Lesbian.

The character played by actress Ellen DeGeneres reveals her attraction to a Lesbian woman to a therapist, played by Oprah Winfrey, in an episode of the sitcom set to air April 30, the network said Mon-day, March 4<sup>th</sup>.

While other television shows have featured Lesbian, Bisexual or Gay male characters, "Ellen" will be the first prime-time show to have an openly Lesbian lead.

We were persuaded that the quality of the story lines presented were worth pursuing," said ABC spokeswoman Janice Gretemeyer.

Actress Laura Dern plays Ellen Morgan's love interest in the episode. ABC hasn't decided whether the show will be an hourlong special or air in its regular 9:30 p.m. slot.

The network said a later "Ellen" episode will deal with Morgan telling her parents about "this startling self-discovery.

Since word first leaked last September that "Ellen's" producers were considering the Lesbian story line, DeGeneres has led a steady stream of jokes and cryptic remarks about it.

They began in the opening scene of the fall season, when Ellen Morgan serenaded herself in the bathroom: "I feel pretty, I feel pretty, I feel pretty and witty and...' She didn't complete the lyric as written,

Executives for ABC, which is owned by the Walt Disney Co., said they took their time giving "Ellen" the go-ahead because they wanted to see scripts that show how it would be done. The episode is to be taped this week.

it's a really brave step and I'm really glad," said Chastity Bono, spokeswoman for the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation. "I really don't know why it took so long to come to this decision. I think it was probably well thought-out."

GLAAD even set up an Internet site for fans to talk about the "Ellen" plot twist and organized a letter-writing campaign in support of it.

As expected, the Rev. Donald Wildmon, head of the Far Right Wing American Family Association, has threatened to organize an advertiser boycott if "Ellen" came out. Wildmon could not be reached

Strategy or not on the part of ABC, the story line's long gestation has served to quell much of the nervousness in the advertising community, said Walter Staab, chairman of the SFM Media Corp. in Man-

Most of us have gotten used to the idea," Staab said. "It's going to be sort of a non-event.
