## **ARCW Needle Exchange Program** Ranked Second Best in the Nation

Milwaukee- The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW) was awarded a \$25,000 grant provided by the George Williams Fund of the Tides Foundation, San Francisco, Calif., for operation of its 1998 needle exchange program in Mil-

waukee and Racine.

ARCW ranked second out of more than 60 grant applicants nationwide for its successful needle exchange program LIFEPOINT by a committee of national needle exchange experts. ARCW's needle exchange program ranked second best in the country because of its harm reduction philosophy and its comprehensive, nonjudgemental approach to working with injection drug users, their spouses and/or sex partners, a group increasingly at high risk for contracting HIV disease.

"We are proud that in Milwaukee we operate one of the finest needle exchange programs in the country," said Doug Nelson, ARCW executive director. "This grant not only recognizes ARCW's proven track record in this area, but it enables us to reach more people at risk for HIV and

save more lives.

"The Tides Foundation grant along with the recent selection of ARCW to receive a \$103,000 needle exchange grant from the Wisconsin AIDS Fund will help ARCW expand programming and staff, said Nelson.

In 1997, through five prevention out-reach workers, ARCW exchanged over 300,000 clean needles in Milwaukee and Racine. ARCW also referred 191 drug users into its AODA treatment program

through its needle exchange program.

#### Statewide AIDS Hotline Established at **ARCW for Teens**

Milwaukee - Carrie Staller, 18, a student at Nicolet High School, has been answering phones on the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin's (ARCW) Wisconsin AIDSline during its teen hours since this new initiative began in July.

She and other teens working on the Wisconsin AIDSline want their peers to ask any questions about AIDS that they may have and encourage teens not to put themselves at risk of contracting HIV. All calls are anonymous.

"I think that it's important that teens volunteer, give something back to the have historically prohibited use of gov-emment funding for the successful needle exchange program. community and prepare to take our posi-tions in society," said Staller. "We are the new generation."

When working on the Wisconsin AID-Sline, she finds that there is one question most commonly asked:

Caller: "Where can I get tested?" Staller: "There are anonymous testing sites, where names are not kept on file and confidential testing sites, where medical records are kept but not revealed, in all Wisconsin counties. Would you like to

hear about the ones in your area? She knows the answer to questions about AIDS because she and other teens who serve on the three-hour shifts, 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. or 6:00 to 9:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday, have taken extensive

training at ARCW The teen hours appear to be the practical way to supply correct information in an easily accessible form," said Neil Albrecht, ARCW regional director.

He explained that it began in response to suggestions from focus groups. "We wanted to learn what kind of prevention efforts would be effective with teens and the focus groups came back with peer education as the best tool," said Albrecht.

"Teens need to be able to talk to other teens. Peer education is a highly effective prevention strategy," said Albrecht. "In recent months, teen calls to the Wisconsin AIDSline have nearly doubled."

Estimates are that 50 percent of all new incidences of HIV infection are in people under the age of 24. One recent study cosponsored by Yale University and MTV Cable indicated that many teens seem to be uninformed about the risks of contracting the disease through the exchange of bodily fluids, namely sexual inter-

Ten teen volunteers have completed a minimum 25 hours of training plus three, 3-hour shifts of observing other Wisconsin AIDSline operators. Teens staffing the Wisconsin AIDSline will be supported by an adult at all times and generally work two shifts a month.

Posters and informational flyers have been sent to principals at public middle schools and high schools across the state, and to some private schools. Posters and flyers have also been sent to coffee houses and other teen gathering places.

This program is funded by a grant from

the Centers for Disease Control and Pre-vention through the Wisconsin AIDS/HIV Program, Madison.

Teens in the Milwaukee area may call the Wisconsin AIDSline at 414-273-AIDS, and those across the state may call 800-334-AIDS.

The Madison school board is reported to be the first local governmental unit in Wisconsin to offer these benefits.

Gay and Lesbian leaders were quick to condemn the proposal which has twelve co-sponsors, all of them Republicans.

## **Nation's Leading LGBT Groups Planning** March on Washington in 2000

Washington, DC- The nation's largest Gay and Lesbian political organization and the nation's largest Gay faith-based movement announced plans on February 4th to sponsor a march on Washington in the spring of the year 2000. The event will be produced by veteran march organizer Robin Tyler who brought the organizations together to formulate planning.

The two groups are the Human Rights Campaign (HRC) and the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches (MCC). Spokespeople for HRC and MCC said that they are exploring dates in spring 2000 for the "Millennium March on Washington for Equal Rights."

Several prominent organizations have signed on as endorsers, including the National Black Gay and Lesbian Leadership Forum, the National Latino/a Lesbian and Gay Organization, the National Center for Lesbian Rights, the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, the National Youth Advocacy Coalition, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, and the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund.

Representatives from these organizations and others will be sought to participate on an organizing committee which will help facilitate the organization and

presentation of the event.

"This march will set a new tone for a new century," said Elizabeth Birch, ex-ecutive director of the Human Rights Campaign. "Full equality under the law will be our achievement in the new mil-

"Together, we will solidify the gains we've made over the past decades and call upon our nation to live out its promise of liberty and justice for all," said the Rev. Troy Perry, founder of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches. "This march will set the pace for social justice and human rights."

The organizations are working closely with Robin Tyler to produce the event. Tyler, was an instrumental organizer/producer of the past three marches on Washington dating back to 1979.

"Robin's depth of experience, community commitment and unstoppable energy uniquely qualify her to lead the organizing efforts for this historic event," said Birch and Perry.

"This is a historic time in our movement. Although we have much greater visibility and a measure of cultural acbian AlliNational
Parents, march will once again show the self esteem, strength and unwavering determi-nation of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and

Transgender community."
The last march was April 25, 1993, and attracted more than 1 million participants,

according to organizers.

The Universal Fellowship of Commu-nity Churches is the world's largest and oldest predominantly Gay Christian spirituality organization. Founded by Perry in 1968 with a commitment to social and spiritual justice and headquartered in West Hollywood, Calif., UFMCC is composed of more than 300 local congregations in 15 countries.

## **News Briefs**

#### Suicide in Little Rock

Little Rock, AK-The Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) reports that once again, a newspaper's irresponsible publishing of the names and addresses of men arrested in public sex raish has led to one of the victims committing suicide, this time following a January 30 story in the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette. In the story, "24 men are cited in 3-day park sting," the newspaper published eight men's names and addresses for being arrested on charges of "public sexual indecency: a misdemeanor." One of those men then killed himself. The Democrat-Gazette does not print the identities of others arrested in misdemeanor consensual sex-related offenses, or any other misdemeanors. When the newspaper ran a June 25, 1993 article on a major heterosexual prostitution sting, it did not identify any of the men arrested, and even blurred the photo of one man to protect his identity.

Gray Lady Visits New York's Bourgeois Gay Bars

New York, NY-Examining the sociological reasons behind the development of a new aesthetic for the city's Gay bars, an article in the February 1 edition of the New York Times raises several interesting issues facing New York Gay men. "A new generation of Gay bars have all but jettisoned dark and dingy interior designs for cleaner, airier, more creative spaces," writer David Colman says. "[It] mirrors a broader change in attitude among patrons of Gay bars: a self-confidence about being out, a rising economic prosperity and less fear of harassment by non-Gays. Traditionally, Gay bars have been windowless dives that cloaked patrons in anonymous darkness while prohave been windowless dives that cloaked patrons in anonymous darkness while protecting them from the scrutiny of passers-by." The open, windowed new bars, Colman says, "illustrate that many Gay men appear to be embracing some of the values and freedoms of mainstream society, from which they have often been excluded. Although such bars still function as they always have-as pickup places-they are now also attractive meeting places for friends, where a Gay man can bring a heterosexual acquaintance without fear of complaint and even where Gay couples can go, undaunted by a heavy cruising scene." He cautions, "But the more wholesome-looking digs have not been universally embraced. The closing of [sex-oriented] back rooms has been attacked by Sex Panic, a vocal Gay group that advocates sexual liberation, for representing a crackdown on the freedom of Gay men.

Arkansas Sodomy Law Challenged

Little Rock, AK-Local Little Rock, Arkansas, organizations joined with the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund (LLDEF) on January 28 to announce a lawsuit on behalf of seven Lesbians and Gay men against the state's sodomy ban. Currently, the statute makes certain sexual behaviors, including oral sex between two same-sex consenting adults a misdemeanor, punishable by up to a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine. LLDEF is seeking that the law be declared unconstitutional, with the plaintiffs arguing that the statute violates their rights of equal treatment and privacy.

Marine Court Martialed After Anti-Gay Bombing

Washington, DC-Groups monitoring the investigation of the July 12, 1997, bombing of a Washington, D.C. Gay bar issued guarded praise to the U.S. Marines for the punishment given to a Marine who plead guilty in the attack, but hastened to criticize the Marines' for failed to identity the bombing as an anti-Gay hate crime. On January 29, Lance Corporal Ryan Barren admitted to conspiracy, assault and theft and was court martialed with a bad-conduct discharge and sentenced to 120 days' confinement.

Lawmakers Ban Same-Sex Marriage

Olympia, WA- Washington lawmakers, with the help of the governor, have banned same-sex marriage, putting to rest a volatile issue that had threatened to overshadow the fall elections.

The choreographed, possibly unprecedented, action Friday, Feb. 6, included passage of the ban, a quick veto by Democratic Gov. Gary Locke and an override by bipartisan super-majorities in both houses

All sides, even longtime backers of Gay rights, pronounced themselves satisfied with

the result, since it avoids a November referendum.

Foes, including Rep. Ed Murray, who is Gay, said they will turn to the courts.

Washington becomes the 27th state with such a ban. The bill, HB1130, defines mar-

riage as the union of one man and one woman and says the state will refuse to recognize any same-gender marriages performed elsewhere.

Bishop Prays for Bad Weather

Nassau, Bahamas- Bad weather prevented a cruise ship filled with Gay men from landing in the Bahamas, and clerics who opposed the visit said the storm was an answer to their prayers.

The Norwegian Cruise Line already had been refused permission to dock in the Cayman Islands with some 900 Gay people who have chartered its vessel, the Lee-

ward, out of Miami.

Then the Bahamas government stepped in with an invitation. But the storm quashed

'The weather was a great factor because the government made it abundantly clear to us that they were going to allow that ship to come," said Baptist Bishop Harcourt Pinder, president of the Bahamas Christian Council. "But I still feel that prayer is the weapon we should use to fight a lot of the ills about us. Prayer fails not and history has proven that" proven that.

Church leaders had taken part in a demonstration Tuesday in downtown Nassau to protest the visit, organized by Atlantis Events Inc., a Gay tour operator in West Holly-

King's Niece Urges Repeal of Pro-Gay Law

Augusta, ME— The niece of Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. urged Mainers to repeal Maine's Gay rights law when they go to the polls on Feb. 10.

Alveda Celeste King told a rally of about 300 sign-waving people in the State House Thursday, Feb. 5, that the Gay rights movement should not be compared to the black civil rights movement.

There is no similarity," she said. King told the crowd, assembled by fundamentalist Christian groups leading the assault on the newly enacted law, that she was not con-

demning homosexuals, but said Gay people violate God's laws.

Alveda King, who began her address by asking the crowd to kneel in prayer, said Gays are not told to sit in the backs of buses or barred from restaurant counters as blacks were in the South before the civil rights movement.

She also questioned claims of many Gay people that they cannot help the way they re, saying, 'I've heard the 'I was born that way story many times."

During the rally, Maine Won't Discriminate distributed photocopies of a letter from

Coreta Scott King, in which the widow of the slain civil rights leader says ``workplace discrimination against Gay men and Lesbians is real (and) widespread."

Teens Arrested in Gay Bashing

Corvallis, OR- Police have arrested three teen-age boys suspected of beating a Gay student on Feb. 4

Police arrested Robert P. Huffaker, 16, of Corvallis; Cyle A. Schroeder, 15, of Albany, and Michael B. Nash, 16, of Corvallis.

All were charged with intimidation and assault in an incident Monday, Feb. 2 Paul Miller, 17, reported a group of four boys began following him, taunting him with slurs like "queer" and "faggot," police said. Miller said when he responded to one of the boys making the taunts, the boy slugged him in the mouth, knocking out two

Miller, a senior at Corvallis High School who leads a support group for Gay students, said two adults walked by as the name-calling was taking place, but did nothing.

The attack prompted support from residents of the community

Onstad said people had called or dropped off supportive messages.

"Paul, I was so sorry to see your face on the front page today," Onstad read from one note. "It sickens me to think that a town with a generally higher level than average of educated folk could harbor such idiots as those who attacked you."

Drama Students Forbidden to Perform Gay Play

Spearfish, SD- The show won't go on for a group of high school students who wanted to perform a controversial play, and one South Dakota group is calling the situation censorship.

The Spearfish High School drama team planned to present the one-act play called 'Removing the Glove," which is about discrimination against Gay people, at a state competition Thursday and Friday, February 5 and 6, in Vermillion.

Barry Wick, the group's executive director and board president, said not allowing students to perform the play the way it was written violates their right to free speech.

'The mere suggestion of homosexuality sends chills down the yellow spines of minister-bigots and legislator-loonies in the state of South Dakota," Wick said in a new release issued before his press conference Thursday, Feb. 5.

#### Plan to Name HIV Patients Causes Worry

Austin, TX- A proposal to require people with HIV infection to report their names

The Texas Department of Health, which is considering implementing the practice, is holding a series of public meetings on the issue. The Austin-Travis County health department is drafting a statement in favor of name-based reporting.

Although the proposal is preliminary, many advocates of people with HIV and AIDS

oppose it. Dennis Nelson, chief executive officer of the city's David Powell Clinic, an HIV treatment center, believes there is a need for accurate surveillance, but "I'm not convinced that tracking by name is a safe thing to do ... There are questions, always, about information stored by any large organization as to who has access to it."

Birmingham Gay Bars on Alert

Birmingham, AL- A letter was received in the first week in February claiming the Birmingham bombing of a women's clinic was carried out by the Army of God, which previously claimed responsibility for last year's bombings of an abortion clinic and Gay nightclub in Atlanta.

Wary of what happened in Atlanta, where the bar blast followed the clinic bombing by about a month, Birmingham police have cautioned Gay bars and Gay-related serv-

ice agencies against being an easy target.

They've told them to clean up around their buildings, to make sure things aren't just lying around," said David White, Birmingham coordinator of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance of Alabama. "The main thing is, since Birmingham is more of a close-knit community, to be more aware of people they don't know."

Court Declines to Reconsider Pro-Gay Law

Cincinnati, OH- A federal appeals court on Thursday, Feb. 5, left intact a ruling that upholds Cincinnati's 1993 charter amendment that forbids the city to enact or enforce any laws based on sexual orientation.

The 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals turned down a request for the full court to reconsider an Oct. 23 decision by a three-judge panel of the court that upheld the Cincinnati charter amendment.

Gay rights activists who oppose the Cincinnati amendment had asked the court to reconsider. They failed to get the required majority of the appeals court judges to go along with the request to reconsider.

The court did not disclose how all of the judges voted, but six of them dissented. The Gay rights activists now plan to ask the U.S. Supreme Court to review the case, said Alphonse Gerhardstein, one of their lawyers. They have 90 days to file with the Supreme Court, he said.

Chicago Cuts Ties With Boy Scouts

Chicago- The city has agreed to sever ties to Boy Scouts of America programs until

the group accepts Gays and stops requiring a religious oath.

The agreement Wednesday, Feb. 4, settles a federal lawsuit filed against Chicago by the American Civil Liberties Union. In agreeing to settle, the city avoided accepting

The ACLU sued last April seeking to end the city's sponsorship of 28 Scout programs. The lawsuit alleged the city's involvement violated the separation of church and state principle and that the Scouts' ban on admitting Gays is discriminatory.

The ACLU called the settlement a victory and urged other cities to "take a cue from Chicagola action and grad their sponsorship of these discriminatory programs."

The city agreed to pay dlrs 20,000 in court costs, said ACLU attorney Roger Leish-

London- A Gay couple is gathering intelligence for Britain's foreign secret service agency on an espionage mission to another country, newspapers reported.

The Sunday Times said the two men had been sent to one of Britain's largest over-

Sir Gerald Warner, the former deputy head of the MI6 spy agency, disclosed the information accidentally, the newspaper said. 'MI6 is the human end of the intelligence and operates in a straightforward way. It now has a staff of 1,800 and has just sent the first homosexual couple abroad," Warner

said during a talk to a local group about his experiences.

The Daily Telegraph said the Gay spies were not seen as a security risk because their relationship was known.

State Workers to Get Domestic Partner Benefits

Eugene, OR-A state panel has voted to extend health and other benefits to Gay and

unmarried heterosexual partners of state employees.

The 7-to-1 vote by the Public Employees Benefit Board applies to all of the state's approximately 45,000 employees, making Oregon one of a few states and a growing number of cities and private companies to make such a move.

The policy is to take affect limit limit benefits to case the companies of the compan

The policy is to take effect June 1 but hinges on a case before the Oregon Court of Appeals, which is expected to decide whether such a board has the authority to extend such benefits.

The state is appealing a ruling that says it must extend such benefits to employees at Oregon Health Sciences University.

#### Actress Says She's Not TV's Resident Lesbian

Los Angeles-AP- Actress Lisa Darr wants to make it perfectly clear: She's not ABC-TV's resident Lesbian.

It's understandable that the first question of interviewers is, "Are you Gay?

After all, Darr portrayed the lover of Officer Abby Sullivan on the network's "NYPD Blue" and she's currently playing with significant other of Ellen Morgan on ABC's Ellen.

Darr says she's a single heterosexual with a boyfriend and that her casting on the two series is "a complete coincidence." She is savoring the attention, however, after a decade of steady but obscure work in such failed series as "Crime & Punishment" and The Office.

"Playing characters like this is a non-issue for me, and I really don't think about it at all," she told the Los Angeles Times in Wednesday's editions. "These are two women that just happen to be Gay. Their sexuality is not the focus of who they are. I'm really proud to be able to bring this to the forefront.

It's a part of life and should be accepted as such."

U. of Georgia Panel Rejects Partners Benefits

Athens, GA-AP- A University of Georgia panel has rejected a proposal to extend fringe benefits to unmarried and same-sex partners after an outpouring of negative public comment.

The executive committee of the university's staff council voted Wednesday, October

15, to table the proposal "until such time as state law changes.

Supporters of the measure said they hope to revive the proposal at a full staff council meeting and to lobby students and faculty, said Michael Albert, a staff member who supports the proposal.

# LAMM to Hold Annual Meeting to Kick Off Year's Activities



#### No Virginia, There Isn't a Santa Claus

A couple of years ago Madison's Hotel Washington burned down. This venerable institution consisting of bars, a dance club, a restaurant and hotel rooms was recognized as a Mecca for Gay and Les-bian Wisconsinites. It was a place where many partnerships were formed and where Gay and Lesbian students from the University of Wisconsin could go in peace. It was a place where you could watch porno flicks to the sounds of a group of guys jerking each other off in the corner. It was even the place where one Madison alderperson says he came out. Indeed, it really must have been an extra special place. I don't think I know of any other building for which memorial services have been held.

But, alas, all was not lost. The building's proprietors promised that, like the phoenix rising from the ashes, the Hotel Washington would rise again on the very same spot. They warned, however, that it would not be cheap and so there would need to be a first large and so there would need to be a fundraising campaign.

Oh yes, this place must have been a very special place indeed. Just as I've never heard of a memorial service for a building before, I've never heard of people making charitable contributions to the owner of a for-profit business, but make contributions they did. Struggling Gay and Les-bian couples who could hardly make ends meet made contributions so their beloved Hotel Washington would come back to

Unfortunately, even though the Hotel's owners were to receive a sizable amount of money from their insurance company and loyal patrons were making "contributions," there still would not be enough money to rebuild, so the aforementioned alderperson, who referred to the Hotel's owners as "wonderful people," helped them secure city funds and the necessary waivers to make the rebuilding project move closer to reality.

Now all they needed was a loan from a bank and the project would be on again.

The community rejoiced. We would not be without our place to watch drag queens and porno flicks for much longer. The owners indicated they were going to receive the much-needed loan. The Hotel Washington was coming back to life, or

But there were more glitches and the Hotel's owners finally declared that the project was dead for good. There would be no new Hotel Washington. Sobbing Gay and Lesbian Madisonians praised the Hotel's owners for their hard work and dedication to the community and listened with interest as they articulated a vision of another, less costly, club.

Now, I'll admit that I'm not in the proverbial loop in Madison so there may be

facts of which I'm not aware. I must say this from outside the loop, however. This entire Hotel Washington fiasco has made our Gay and Lesbian community look extremely naïve, immature and prone to

What would cause us to believe that individuals who would stand to gain a great deal by simply collecting their insurance check and selling the land on which the Hotel sat ever really were intending to rebuild except extreme naivete? The owners of the Hotel Washington were savvy business people and they had to be thinking that the land on which the former Hotel sat would be worth a great deal when the \$70 million Kohl Center opened a block away. Meanwhile, the Gay and Lesbian community elevated these individuals to hero status, even presenting them with community service awards.

Why, you may ask, have I spent so much time thinking and writing about something that happened some years

Well, I'll tell you. It's because the experience with the Hotel Washington is really a metaphor for what's wrong with our community. It seems we are still just as prone to buying goods from the proverbial snake oil salesman as ever. We elevate those who do very little for our community and ignore those who are making contributions in one form or another every

day.
We fawn all over a mayor who may attend every AIDS event he can, but who consistently votes against increases in funds for people living with AIDS. We ignore, on the other hand, a governor who has a flawless record of support for people living with AIDS because we have not seen him cutting ribbons much.

We give standing ovations to candidates for Congress who have yet to introduce one piece of pro-Gay legislation and we don't even know the names of those legislators who have.

We refuse to believe a candidate for the Senate who will endorse efforts to end discrimination and we endorse a Senator who vowed to strip funds from schools which promote homosexuality.

We get up and walk out on speeches given by a Congressman who has worked to ensure that people living with HIV are not kicked out of the armed forces, but we scream our approval at a President who gives us "Don't Ask, Don't Tell."

Indeed, this hero worship would be laughable if it were not so dangerous. If we continue to follow those "leaders" who are really nothing more than real life Wizards of Oz while ignoring those who are truly interested in making a positive contribution to the Gay and Lesbian cause, we lose and we look stupid. It's time to take Joan Rivers' advice and "grow up!"

We have to lie.

"Me? Have a girlfriend? No, I'm too busy studying." Or some other lame excuse. Ms. King, would you say lying is good for someone? You think it's healthy?

And it doesn't stop at high school, Ms. King. It goes on and on, sometimes throughout life. You can only live as a



#### Clinton's Budget Proposal Has Good News and Bad News for Those With HIV/AIDS

Washington, DC-President Clinton's budget proposal includes increases for programs that deal with people living with HIV and AIDS, but shortchanges essential prevention programs administered through the Centers for Disease Control administered and Prevention, according to the Human Rights Campaign (HRC). The Good News

"The good news is that the president is asking for increases for care, housing, drugs and research in a budget that is balanced," Winnie Stachelberg, HRC's political director, said today. "Unfortunately, by calling for no increase for HIV prevention, we miss an opportunity because prevention is the only sure path we have

right now to save lives.

Among the most significant increases in the president's overall HIV/AIDS budget for fiscal 1999 is 35 percent more for the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP), which enables people with HIV and AIDS to obtain new, life-prolonging drugs. A year ago, the president's budget asked for no increase in the ADAP program. no increase in the ADAP program.

We are heartened that the administration has heard the message of the HIV and AIDS community and is asking for a sig-nificant increase for these programs,"

Stachelberg noted.

The Bad News A report last July by the National Alli-ance of State and Territorial AIDS Direc-tors and the AIDS Treatment Data Network, found that more than half of the 52 state ADAPs have had to impose limits on their programs because of inadequate federal funding.

Although the president's budget includes no increase for AIDS prevention programs at the CDC, it does earmark \$5 million in new money for HIV prevention in minority communities as part of \$80 million for a CDC program addressing ra-cial inequities in health treatment.

"This is a good step, but small in light of the need," Stachelberg said. "As the presi-dent's own HIV/AIDS advisory council indicated in a report card last year, this over fiscal 1998.

administration needs to exercise bolder leadership in HIV prevention efforts. We had hoped to see an indication of that leadership in the budget request and are still waiting for Health and Human Services Secretary Donna Shalala to allow some of those federal funds to be used for lifesaving needle exchange programs.

The president also requested a \$21 million increase in the Housing Opportunities for People With AIDS program. This represents a 10 percent boost over fiscal 1998, when \$204 million was appropriated for HOPWA. About 90 percent of these funds go directly to states and cities

to provide housing for people with AIDS. In the area of care, the president asked for a \$165 million increase above the \$1.2 billion appropriated last year. Of that increase, about \$27 million would go to states under Title II of the Ryan White CARE Act, giving them the flexibility to earmark the funds for drugs.

Title I of the CARE Act would receive an increase of about \$25 million. Title I supports cities and counties hardest hit by the AIDS epidemic to fund primary medical care and essential support services like case management and transportation to and from the doctor. Title IIIB of Ryan White, which provides funds for direct services to people living with HIV and AIDS, would get an increase of \$10 million, 13 percent above fiscal '98 levels.

"These increases are particularly welcome in light of the dramatic health improvements some people with HIV and AIDS have shown after taking the new drug combinations," Stachelberg said. "We continue, however, to call on the administration to find ways to allow more people with HIV to enroll in Medicaid. This more systemic approach is essential to provide early and comprehensive access to medical care for people with

The budget also calls for \$1.7 billion for AIDS-specific research at the National Institutes of Health, an 8 percent increase

## New Study Places HIV Origins a Decade Earlier Than Was Thought

Chicago -- An analysis of a blood sam-ple preserved since 1959 from the oldest documented case of infection with the AIDS virus called HIV-1 shows that the first such infections probably occurred in people in the late 1940s or early 1950s, about a decade earlier than many estimates, scientists said Tuesday, February

The researchers compared that sample with others to build a family tree to trace changes in the fast-mutating AIDS virus. The family tree, or phylogenetic analysis, is in the shape of a starburst, with branches radiating from the center, and the 1959 virus is close to the center. The scientists used calculations to estimate the date when the virus first developed.

The viral family tree cannot pinpoint where the AIDS epidemic began or how it was propelled so rapidly through the

world, the researchers said.

But by providing a closer approximation to the date of the origins of HIV-1, the most common form of the AIDS virus, it can help scientists to better understand how the disease evolved into one of the

deadliest epidemics in history.

The 1959 sample came from a Bantu man who lived in Leopoldville, Belgian Congo (now Kinshasa in the Democratic

Republic of Congo).

In 1986, scientists used what were then the latest laboratory techniques to show that he had been infected by HIV-1. But only now could scientists, using the latest powerful tools of molecular biology, identify key fragments of the virus in the last few drops of the blood sample in a quest for the origins of the AIDS virus.

At a scientific meeting in Chicago on Tuesday, Dr. Toufo Zhu of the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center in New York City said his team's conclusions derived from information from the fragments, or sequences of nucleic acids, of the 1959 virus.

Those sequences were then compared with those from hundreds of other virus

samples isolated from people infected since the AIDS epidemic was first recognized in 1981. The comparisons included data from a Norwegian family that was infected in the early 1970s.

Scientists study the evolution of viruses

that cause epidemics in the hope of learning how to predict and prevent such outbreaks. In the case of influenza, for example, such information could lead to better flu vaccines. The knowledge of how HIV developed could someday help scientists prevent similar epidemics.

Many scientists have presumed that the current worldwide epidemic got under way when the virus was introduced on multiple occasions in people who were bitten or cut while butchering infected primates for food.

But Zhu's team concluded that the major subtypes of HIV-1 that dominate the current epidemic of AIDS in the world have evolved in humans from a common ancestor virus rather than arising from repeated cross-species transmissions from primates to humans.

The findings also give the lie to a widely publicized theory put forward by the So-viet KGB that the AIDS virus had escaped from a U.S. germ-warfare laboratory, Dr. David Ho, the head of the Diamond AIDS Center, said in an interview.

Ho said the findings indicated that the major group of viruses that "dominate the global AIDS pandemic at present shared a common ancestor in the late 1940s or

The findings also pointed to the need for close monitoring of HIV strains because the virus was likely to diversify further in the future, Ho said. The virus could theoretically mutate to become more dangerous or less so.

Ho speculated that HIV-1 might have been spread by such means as reusable needles in large-scale immunization programs for diseases like polio and small-pox. But Ho said social changes, like

Doctors have known almost since they began widely prescribing potent threedrug combinations two years ago that fewer people with AIDS were dying, but even the experts seem surprised by the

scope of their success.

'We can't see the end of the epidemic, but it's the beginning of a new era,"-said Dr. Kevin DeCock of the national Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in At-

The latest evidence of this change came Monday, February 2, when CDC officials presented new data at the Fifth Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections.

Deaths from AIDS peaked in 1994 and 1995, then nosed downward in 1996. Last year, that fall accelerated.

Treatment is having a marked, dramatic impact on AIDS mortality," said the

CDC's Dr. Patricia Fleming. According to the CDC, 12,040 Americans died of AIDS in the first half of 1997, compared with 21,460 in the first half of 1996.

## HIV Conference Told Search for Better, **Easier Treatment is On-Going**

Chicago- The AIDS cocktail is being treatment fails: Patients simply cannot shaken and stirred.

More than 200 reports at an AIDS conference this first week in February decribe new combinations of AIDS drugs, all intended to improve on the spectacular success of the three-drug mixes credited with the steep drop in AIDS deaths over

the past two years.

The goal is to concoct new formulations that are more powerful, less toxic and easier to take.

Ideally, these new mixes will offer a second chance to those who failed to do well on the original combos. And they will require fewer pills, taken on less rig-orous timetables, with fewer side effects.

At the Fifth Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections, a meeting this week of the world's top AIDS investi-U.S. officials announced that AIDS deaths dropped by nearly half dur-ing the first six months of 1997. They said the reason was largely the use of the so-called AIDS cocktail, which is actually a combination of pills consisting of a newer medicine called a protease inhibitor and two older ones called nucleoside ana-

Despite this surprising turnaround in the war on AIDS, there is no suggestion the virus is licked.

Some people with AIDS cannot take the drugs or don't respond. In others, the virus grows impervious to the medicines after first seeming to succumb. And experts worry that many more are enjoying a sort of honeymoon, after which the virus will someday reappear with the upper hand.

We've made progress, but the progress is not complete. Not everyone is helped by the new therapies," said Dr. Douglas Richman of the University of California at San Diego. "Potency, tolerability and ease of use are the real goals."

A few new AIDS drugs are nearing the end of human testing and will be submitted soon to the Food and Drug Administration for approval. Many more are in the test tube stage of development, and no one knows if they will pan out.

Missing even a few doses allows the virus to... come roaring back

Taken diligently, the AIDS drugs often reduce levels of virus so low they cannot be detected in the bloodstream. But the side effects can include high cholesterol, diabetes, kidney stones, intestinal upset, h. fatigue and headaches.

And missing even a few doses allows the virus to develop mutations and come roaring back, impervious to the drugs. Experts say this is the most common reason

stick to regimens that require downing four or five pills at once, three times a

The goal is to get that down to twice a day and to get the number of pills down substantially, too," said Dr. Emilio Emini of Merck & Co. ``This will make it easier for patients to adhere to lifelong therapy."

Several twice-a-day combinations were

presented at the meeting, and evidence so far suggests they work just as well as taking the medicines three times daily.

Attempts at starting patients out on the standard triple therapy, then cutting back to two drugs, have not worked. Doctors at the meeting say the virus soon re-emerges, probably from hiding in dormant cells where it is shielded from the drugs' ef-

Eleven AIDS drugs are now on the market, and they fall into three categories the protease inhibitors, such as Merck's Crixivan and Agouron Pharmaceutical's Viracept; the nucleoside analogues, a category that includes the older AIDS drugs, such as AZT and 3TC; and the nonnucleoside analogues, which like the nucleoside analogues block viral production of an essential protein called reverse tran-

Among other new developments:

plans to seek approval in the second quarter of this year for Sustiva, or efavirenz, a powerful new nonnucleoside analogue. Eight reports on the drug were presented at the meeting, including one showing that a two-drug combination with the protease inhibitor Crixivan kept virus levels below detection for 90 percent of patients after one year.

Protease inhibitors may not be an essential ingredient of the cocktail. Studies of abacavir, Glaxo Wellcome's experimental nucleoside analogue, suggest it may be combined with two older medicines in the same category to suppress HIV. This could be an option for those whose virus has grown resistant to protease in-

Several studies presented looked at four, five- and even six-drug combi-nations. The most common of these approaches test the idea of giving two protease inhibitors along with two older drugs in an attempt to knock the virus down more forcefully from the

Hydroxyurea, a cancer drug, is being investigated by several teams for its apparent ability to boost the power of nucleoside analogues, such as ddl.



## One Soldier Tells How he Lives in the Army Under "Don't Ask, Don't Tell"

"When you're in a foxhole, you don't holler, 'Oh God! There's a faggot next to me.' You holler, 'Oh, God! Somebody

help me'."
That's how a senior non-commissioned Army officer who's Gay and agreed to an interview if he were not identified succinctly describes the senselessness of the Pentagon's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell, Don't Pursue" policy and deflates the argument that it is needed to preserve combat effec-tiveness. He agreed to an interview on what it is like to live under the policy if he were not identified.

Paul (a pseudonym) tells a story to make his point: "I was in combat, but I can't tell you where it was. The operation never officially existed. I was in a small bunker with another guy. There was some heavy shelling and I woke up to this person - I'm going to say his name is John wrapped around me like a python. He was laying on top of me crying his eyes out. He kept repeating, 'We're gonna

I said, 'There's a good chance.' I was

When the shelling stopped, I grabbed him by the ears, pulled him up to me, gave him a kiss on the forehead and said, 'We're alive, John.' And he gave me a kiss. This was a straight man who knew I

was Gay.' While Paul says he peacefully coexists with Don't Ask, Don't Tell, he would like to see the policy lifted. "I want to emphasize that you do need to have discipline and cohorusance because the military is and cohesiveness, because the military is teamwork," he cautions. "There still has to be something which says conduct un-becoming a soldier that can be applied and enforced equally regardless of sexual orientation. It doesn't matter whether you're a man or a woman. If you're a slut, that's conduct unbecoming a soldier

He lives quite happily with the policy because, he says, he has always kept his professional and personal life separated.

"[My philosophy is] 'you don't play in your own back yard.' I maintain my own lifestyle outside the military. I have al-ways been able to do that. I usually live away from the base and am more familyoriented. I don't go to clubs a lot, just

## Frank Backs Air **Force Down on Base Sexual Orientation** Policy

his urging, has taken steps to require a correction in the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base non-discrimination policy for civilian employees so that it clearly protects employees against discrimination

Previously, base commander General George T. Babbitt had issued a base-wide anti-discrimination policy that omitted reference to sexual orientation. Gen. Babbitt has no reissued the non-discrimination policy with a specific reference to sexual orientation, after intervention from Defense Secretary Cohen, with whom Frank had raised the issue.

In a memorandum dated October 29, 1997, then Air Force Secretary Sheila Widnall had reiterated the Air Force nondiscrimination policy for civilian employ-ees and included sexual orientation.

Notwithstanding that memorandum, in November General Babbitt issued a policy for Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, which was the same as the Widnall memo, but omitted any reference to sexual ori-



#### Man's Long Walk for Equal Rights Brings Out the Best in Maine

Editor's Note: As the people of Maine go to the polls on February 10th to vote for or against equal rights for Gay people, Wisconsin Light will be at press. So, you might say this story will be dated. Not so. Courage and determination to do what is right are never dated. Paul Fuller is the best of what our LBGT community is all about, in Maine and elsewhere.

Portland, ME-He'd covered only two miles of his Canada-to-Kittery walk when Paul Fuller saw the truck slow down and stop just outside of Van Buren. The driver, clearly troubled by the "Vote No on February 10" printed across the back of Paul's bright orange vest, motioned him

over.
"You know, Jesus loves you," the man

You know, Jesus loves you, the man said patronizingly.

"Yes, I know," Paul replied.

The trucker picked up a flyer off his seat, handed it down to Paul and drove off. Paul walked on in the early morning stillness, marveling at the freshly fallen snow, the sun chining through the stately snow, the sun shining through the stately fir trees, the sheer beauty of the northern Maine woods.

Then he looked down at the flyer, boldly entitled "How to Get to Heaven.

"I wished he hadn't left so quickly," he recalled. "I would have told him heaven is right here, all around us. But he just couldn't see it.'

Paul has seen it - and not just in the scenery. Since he began his 390-mile hike on January 15, he's seen time and again that Michael Heath and his band of Biblethumping homophobes are nowhere near the majority they claim to be.

Rather, this 58-year-old antique dealer from Waldoboro, whose eyes keep smiling even as his feet grow more blistered, has witnessed the real Maine - the one he hopes will go to the polls February 10 and vote against repealing the new state law

granting equal rights to Gay people.

"I hope it's working," he said, waving back to the tooting homs on Bath Road. 'And I think it is.'

The idea came to him - actually, it woke him out of a sound sleep - one night late last year. Long active in Gay politics, Paul wanted to do something to help preserve

the equal-rights law . . . but what?
"I woke up and said, 'You know what you can do? You can walk.'"

That he can. He hiked the Appalachian Trail in 1990. Four years later, he trekked the 2,750-mile Pacific Crest Trail. Van Buren to Kittery? No problem.

He enlisted two friends - Larry Godfrey and Frank Hart - to escort him in a pair of support vehicles. He drove the route himself, logging landmarks down to the tenth of a mile and plotting out his three-week, 20-mile-a-day itinerary. Other friends lined up lodging - all donated - for each stop along the way. News releases went out . . . cell phones were distributed . . .

"It's amazing, just amazing, how it all came together," Paul said.

Even more amazing, however, has been the response.

Sure, he's received the rare obscene gesture or cry of "faggot" from those too blind to see what he's doing. But when he reaches Kittery on Tuesday, February 10, those are not the people Paul will remem-

He'll remember the woman in Edgecomb who stopped one cold morning and told him he looked hungry. Before he could respond, she handed him a grapefruit and

wished him good luck.

He'll remember the man in Presque Isle who pulled over his pickup and, while his wife and kids waited, walked over, took off his glove and shook Paul's hand.

"I want to thank you," the man said. "I know what discrimination is all about. I'm a native American."

He'll remember the two women in Caribou, both in their 60s, who handed him check - one of scores of donations totaling more than \$2,800 so far. They were Lesbians, the women explained, and after all

these years together, they're tired of life in the closet.

He'll remember another woman in Wis-casset who walked up to him, hugged him and suddenly burst into tears.

Why?

"She didn't want to say," Paul replied.

He'll remember the delegation of two dozen supporters, led by former Bath Iron Works President Buzz Fitzgerald, that proudly led him through downtown Bath. And the crowd 10 times larger that met him as he crossed Tukey's Bridge one Saturday afternoon and escorted him to a reception and rally at Portland's First Parish Unitarian Universalist Church.

The celebration was a far cry from the solitude outside Van Buren, but for the man with the aching feet, it was yet another sign that the state he loves so dearly is already much closer to heaven than some might have us believe.

"I've never been so proud to be a Mainer," Paul said.

## Skylight Opera's "Threepenny Opera" is a Sterling, Disturbing Performance

Welcome to a musical nightmare where all the basic sins of mankind: greed, lust, betrayal, drug and alcohol addiction, robbery, murder, fraud and degrading poverty are thrust so strongly into your face in a series of scenes and tableaus that the audience found itself shocked into silence for the entire first act of The Three Penny

Of course, this look at the squalid world of pimps, beggars, thieves and prostitutes was a deliberate choice of director Paula Suozzi who decided to "go to the dark side and stay there." So, the audience, which was looking for pleasant entertainment, either had to leave the theater (which a few did), or stay there to admire the acting and singing abilities of the performers who portrayed so effectively this ugly world of lost and degraded souls.

Drab costumes, stark lighting and makeup, minimal walls of rusting meshed wire, ramps and platforms of varying heights, rotting boards and crates, wooden barrels, and scraps of old newspapers and yesterday's garbage all helped to create a forlorn slum that only the dregs of society could hope to find inhabitable.

But then, this is the gritty and gruesome life according to the lyricist, Bertolt Brecht, when one lives under Capitalism. With the help of Kurt Weill's music, Brecht set his manifesto of Capitalism's degrading and dehumanizing effects on people's souls, hearts and lives when money (the root of all evil) enters the picture and corrupts everyone.

The poor, in order to survive, not only beg for money, but flaunt fraudulent afflictions in order to elicit pity and thus, gain more money. In turn, they are exploited by J.J. Peachum and his wife who organize them, demand half their earnings and have them beaten or worse if they don't

Then there is Macheat also known as Mack the Knife, played very effectively by Norman Moses. Mack runs a gang of thieves, takes his cut from them, sleeps with every slut he can, even though he's married to the Peachums' daughter, Polly.

Mack's list of sins is celebrated by the drug addicted, leather-clad Street Singer (James Moye) in the chilling ballad, "Mack the Knife." While he sings, the blood spattered pictures of Mack's victims are projected on the wall behind him.

The Peachums, Mack, the Street Singer and all the rest, including the police, are all corrupted and thrive in the Capitalistic world according to Brecht.

It is only in the moments of the songs themselves, when the music delights the ear, does some hope shine through the hopelessness.

Especially to be noted are Kate Eagan (Polly) who has a beautiful voice that she uses effectively in songs like "Pirate Jenny. Michelle Smith's voice is slightly breathy, but is lovely as she sings the la-

## The Boulevard Theater's Production of "A Delicate Balance" is Masterfully Done

A message to Milwaukee theater audiences: you snooze, you lose. There are many shows to choose from in Milwaukee at this time of year. Many of you can attend simply by showing up as a warm body to fill a seat and occasionally pay attention. The latest offering from the Boulevard Ensemble, A Delicate Balance, is not one of those options. When making your reservation to see this dark comedy by Edward Albee, be aware that attending this show is going to take a great deal of active listening on your part.

A Delicate Balance examines the lives of a well-off family and their "best friends." Being well-off, of course, means that everyone is completely dysfunctional. (Hence

Agnes and Tobias are the central couple who we first meet at the beginning of the play. Enter Claire the alcoholic sister of Agnes who, of course, despite her addiction, sees the family situation most clearly.

Next, we meet Julia, Agnes' and Tobias' daughter. She's come home from husband number four and is ready to move back into her old room.

The real twist in this script is the characters Harry and Edna. They are Agnes' and Tobias' "best friends" and they've decided to move in. Permanently. What ensues is a great deal of discussion of who belongs where, why, and who makes that

The reason to attend is simple enough: the entire cast of A Delicate Balance handles the difficult script superbly. The actors are able to connect to each other throughout the show very realistically. There's even an eerie physical likeness among the mother-sister-daughter trio of Agnes, Claire and Julia (played by Michelle Waide, Elaine Wyler and Cheryl A.

Something that was a distraction for me was actually the script. I should note that Edward Albee won the Pulitzer Price for A Delicate Balance. The highly stylized writing however, requires a great deal of attention from the audience from the moment the show begins. Because of the language the show is written in, the performance got off to a slow start. Once Claire enters the room, the dialogue becomes far more conversational, which proves to be a good break from Agnes' methodical discussion of her impending loss of sanity and creates distinction in character for Claire.

Also, the program lists the setting as occurring now, in this time. I'm not sure if that was the strongest choice given the dialogue. The discussions of gender roles were very dated although I know that, unfortunately, some people still do think men do one thing, women do the other and heaven forbid if you take a role not assigned to your particular gender.

The set also includes a "bar table" with a variety of liquors and their corresponding glasses out and at the ready. The style of the bar was reminiscent of the era of hard drinking and again didn't appear to support the addiction-aware contemporary time period. And although cocktails have come back into fashion, these people drink like fish. After two hours of watching the cast pound back martinis, a few scotches, cognacs and even anisettes, I wanted to mix myself up something. This isn't necessarily a bad thing, especially since you'll probably want to discuss the show with whomever you attend.

The show is being billed as a comedy and I'm not sure if it was simply the chemistry in the audience on the night I attended, but there wasn't much laughter.

There were a few times, however, that I wanted to laugh, but not too many others did. Perhaps the extreme amount of dysfunction was too real for some to find funny. Thankfully that hasn't been my experience, so I was able to find the show sadistically funny.

## Scandalous Secrets Make Wilde's "An Ideal Husband" Aptly Contemporary

By John A. Jahn Sir Robert Chiltern (Jonathan Smoots) is a well-to-do British politician, definitely an up-and-comer destined for the Cabinet - if not perhaps the Prime Ministership itself. He's built his reputation upon undisputed honesty and forthrightness - a fact which pleases the puritanical streak that's a mile wide in his adoring wife, Gertrude (Kate Goehring).

But Robert harbors a secret, the secret of the less than respectable origin of his fortune. Unfortunately for him, the secret is not entirely his, and physical evidence of his scandalous past reside in the possession of one who will not stop at blackmail, one Mrs. Cheveley (Elizabeth Noment).

Chiltern's well-constructed world is about to collapse around him, threatening to leave him broke, divorced, and a social outcast from the ruling class - the idle rich of turn of the century English society.

If that scenario sounds vaguely familiar, it should - echoes of the latest presidential peccadillos, and that fact wasn't lost on the audience of the Milwaukee Repertory Theater's current production of Oscar Wilde's An Ideal Husband.

The 3-hour, 3-act play focuses on four central characters at the center of a potential political storm set in London of 1895. That would be the above three aforementioned, plus the dandy and foppish Lord Goring (Arthur Hanket), closest friend of Sir Robert and past flame of Mrs. Cheveley. The writing is essentially flawless (this is Oscar Wilde, after all!), and transports one back to the era of Victorian sophistication, elegance and indirectness. It is a play full of talk about governmental

change - exactly what changes Wilde had in mind remain opaque - concealed behind a carefully constructed mask of aristocratic aloofness and decadent frivolity. Though a long play (there are two 10 minute intermissions) the comedy and drama keeps up a steady pace throughout.

The Rep's current production, led by the company's artistic director since 1993, Joseph Hanreddy, consists of an excellent cast of well-rehearsed actors, whose affected English accents deliver the sense of place without making it difficult to under-

Likewise, the staging is authentic looking, consisting of beautiful light fixtures, paintings, a balcony and staircase, and turn-of-the-century furnishings on a mar-ble-like floor (all thanks to scenic designer Scott Bradley). The costumes really make An Ideal Husband a feast for the senses, however, with the men sporting elegant evening wear and the ladies gorgeous gowns (thanks to costume designer Robert Morgan).

As an added touch, the opening and closing moments of each act are accompanied by excerpts of Sir Edward Elgar's sumptuously English orchestral music.

An Ideal Husband surely provides an evenings' entertainment well worth your time, and it's most aptly timed (coincidentally) to give you a new perspective of the potential scandals in 1998's America. # Gutzman and Company to Perform Disturbing Sondheim Masterpiece

Although when Stephen Sondheim's darkly comedic and sometimes shocking musical Assassins first opened, it was widely misunderstood as are most of his shows and, although its opening on the same day that the Gulf War broke out dampened its cynical examination of the collapse of the American Dream, it has, nevertheless, proven to be one of Sondheim's most popular and potent musical ventures.

Assassins is a dark, disturbing, bleakly comic, ultimately chilling bad dream of a vaudeville which explores everyone's need to belong and to receive some sort of attention. It examines the twisted American logic that now allows many to think that our country "owes" them something...some sort of prize just for living here.

This exploration is accomplished through subversive rewritings of American popular music as sung by nine women and men who tried to, and in four cases did, kill the President of the United States.

The show uses the assassins as a tool in the exploration of the ideas about violence, reward, dreams, desires, defeat and anger. The show makes no attempt to be historically accurate as it often has historical personalities from very different eras talking to each other. Neither does it seek to put to rest any of the controversies about the assassinations themselves. Rather, it seeks to probe the frame of mind of people suffering so much in one way or the other that they believe killing a powerful political figure will somehow ease their pain.

How can such a show be a musical and how can it entertain? That is the genius of Sondheim and Jerome Weidman (who wrote the music and lyrics and the book, respectively).

Sondheim and Weidman present in revue format a nightmare history of American entertainment from turn of the century folk songs through cakewalks and John Phillip Sousa-type marches, right up to modern pop rock and Broadway-style showstoppers. Each song gives a perspective or sometimes several perspectives on "Why I tried to kill the President."

A character called the Balladeer acts as a sort of media talk show host to challenge

the ideas of the assassins. The songs are some of Sondheim's most haunting and melodic. The dialogue is often very clever and cunning and the entire show is packed with every element that defines stunning musical theater.

Producer/Director Dale Gutzman, a Sondheim affectionado and contributor to the international Sondheim Review, will bring this powerful piece of musical theater to Milwaukee on February 27 and 28 and March 1 to Centennial Hall of the Milwaukee Public Library.

Although Assassins has been presented in the area before in productions that were well-staged and well-sung, none of those productions came near the dramatic depth of the piece, Gutzman said. The London production came closer to these truths than did the off-Broadway run and, consequently, Gutzman said, it was the most successful. Mystery lurks in Cat's personal and family background. She has always coped until now, when her life threatens to blow up in light of her sexual orientation. Her crisis intensifies when she is called upon to mentor Manuelita Maldonado, the daughter of the dictator of Tierra Del Culo.

The offbeat family members and pals who rally around Cat make her orientation seem positively staid. The triumphant human heart is revealed in 62 minutes of outrageous laughter.

School Girls in Uniform which Quentin Crisp, author of The Naked Civil Servant, calls "wickedly funny," is based very loosely on the scandalous German tearjerker, "Madchen in Uniform."

"The movie and the Broadway play, which were done a thousand years ago, were about subterranean, illicit quivering,"

said playwright Neville. "School Girls has subterranean quivering, but it's strictly rock and roll with a bottle of Wet."

School Girls in Uniform stars Sarah Behrendt as Cat. Elaine Thorton-Wyler plays Nina LaRocque. She is currently delivering a heroic Sapphic turn in Vampire Lesbians of Sodom at Theater X. The play is directed by Mark Bucher, Artistic Director of the Boulevard Ensemble Theater.





## Despite a Few Faults, 'Oscar and Lucinda' is Absolutely Worth Seeing

is) admiration for those audacious filmmakers willing, often eager to take on the cinematic adaptation of celebrated novels. Such ventures are so desperately fraught with danger. One need only look to the recent and quite ghastly modernization of Charles Dickens' Great Expectations.

Few recent novels have as impressive pedigree as Peter Carey's quirky Oscar and Lucinda, winner of the prestigious Booker Prize for literature. To bring to the big screen this magical novel of two compulsive gamblers, director Gillian Armstrong set off on a similar wager.

As suggested by the title of both novel and film, this is a character study of two oddly matched lovers.

Following his widely acclaimed matineeidol turn in The English Patient, Ralph Fiennes would seem a curious choice for the frail, twitching young minister. First captured as the son of a "fire and brimstone" puritanical Minster, Oscar will catch such a gambling fever not found on the big screen since fabled Barbara Stanwyck's delicious turn in The Lady Gambles.

Oscar's female counterpart is Lucinda (ravishing newcomer Cate Blanchett). A young heiress, Lucinda's love for all things made of glass results in her purchase of a glass-works factory. In the process, Lucinda develops two obsessions, one for the Reverend Hasset (Ciaran Hinds) and the other, gambling.

Fate, surely, rather than coincidence will bring together Oscar and Lucinda on a vessel headed for Australia. The oh-so tempting sounds of ship board gaming tables acting as the catalyst in introducing at Milwaukee's Downer Theater. these two lost souls together.

Immediately drawn together in best Glenn has untold (at least till now, that storybook fashion, their lives will intertwine until drawn into an ill-fated, daring wager.

Glenn has the sad misfortune to admit that Oscar and Lucinda proves to be something of a disappointment. The film's pleasures are many, yet Oscar and Lucinda never quite adds up to a great and satisfying whole.

No faults to Armstrong's fine cast. Can the actor playing this gentle, timid Oscar be the same as the one who stole Glenn's heart in The English Patient or the grotesque embodiment of evil in Schindler's List? Under a mop of red hair, Fiennes' Oscar is nothing short of mesmerizing and a performance that is well worthy of Oscar consideration.


Her character perhaps somewhat less developed, Cate Blanchett's Lucinda still manages to match Fiennes' Oscar. Their relationship is haunting and haunted, yet the screenplay by Laura Jones leaves their romance undernourished. The one, tentative kiss between these two is

ultimately too little, too late.

Gay audiences will be hard pressed not to raise an eyebrow at the touching scenes between Oscar and Percy Smith (Bille Brown), Oscar's protector on the

doomed journey.
Purists might also quibble with some departures from Carey's novel, but few will not be moved by such extraordinary and unforgettable images impossible not to linger in memory: the Devon coast, the bursting of the Prince Rupert glass and finally, the eerie spectacle of Oscar's solitary figure in the church of glass drifting down the river.

## Robert Duvall Excels as a Religious Fanatic in 'The Apostle'

I've always appreciated the talents of Robert Duvall, and his career spans four decades: the '60s (To Kill a Mockingbird, True Grit), the '70s (M\*A\*S\*H, both Godfather movies, Apocalypse Now, The Great Santini), '80s (Colors, The Natural), and the '90s (Days of Thunder, Falling Down, Stalin).

He's at a point in his career where he can not only pick and choose acting roles, but also write, produce and direct. He assumes all four roles in the stirring and heartfelt drama.

A story about one man's journey on the road to redemption, The Apostle represents a tour de force for Duvall, who triumphs in the title role and thoroughly grabs your attention every second he's on the screen. This is partly due to Duvall's always strong screen persona, but also because his character, Sonny (later known as "The Apostle E.F."), is a complex, driven revivalist southern preacher...not normally the type of person one can easily ignore (even when you want to!). One gets the impression Duvall knew someone like Sonny very well in real life.

Threatened with the simultaneous loss of both his family and his church, Euliss "Sonny" Dewey, a Pentecostal preacher, is driven to commit a crime of passion, killing Horace (Todd Allen), a young preacher who's come between him and his wife Jessie (Farrah Fawcett). Sonny flees, even though it means leaving behind the wife and children he adores, his ailing mother (June Carter Cash), and the church he's worked so hard to make

Leaving Texas behind for the bayous of Louisiana, he destroys all traces of his past and changes his name to the cryptic "E.F.", or just "The Apostle." Haunted by the past he left behind, E.F. works his way into the hearts and souls of the people now surrounding him in an unsuccessful attempt to forget the past and find personal redemption.

Duvall's central performance is riveting, indeed. Regardless of your taste for preaching and religious fanaticism (which his character surely represents), you'll either find it engrossing and inspiring or just downright silly...often a mixture of both.

Duvall surrounds himself with a fine supporting cast, including Billy Bob Thornton (Sling Blade) as an irreligious

The Apostle is a long movie: 2 hours and 13 minutes long to be exact, but it moves along quickly - for the most part thanks to the near constant, dominating screen presence of Duvall's Sonny/E.F The film does, however, get a little tedious here and there as we're subjected to a few too many sermons (the climactic ending in particular is somewhat marred by the fact that Duvall's entire final sermon is given it just eats up too much time and gets rather dull).

The Apostle comes highly recommended, despite its few flaws, and Robert Duvall deserves tremendous credit for bringing this passionate morality tale to the screen. (3 1/2 stars)

## **Emotionally Stilted and Artsy, 'The** Tango Lesson' is Simply Out of Step

Writer/Director Sally Potter (Orlando, Thriller) was formerly a professional dancer. She stars in her latest film, The Tango Lesson, as Sally, a woman trying to get her scripts turned into artful film, taking tango lessons from a Latin heartthrob named Pablo. Pablo is played by real life professional dancer Pablo Veron who also choreographed the film. With all this interaction of real life and the fiction of the motion picture, you'd expect something truly special and heartfelt to emerge. You'd be wrong!

I can already say this will in all likelihood go down as one of my least favorite films of the year. The supposed romance be-tween Pablo and Sally is never convincing - not for one minute. This is largely because the only physical contact we see between them occurs when they're dancing together (or in many cases, Pablo dancing alone for Sally in an off-putting, egotistical fashion).

The only scene with them in bed to-gether follows a fight, and Pablo lies in fetal position on the opposite end of the bed from Sally, looking at him forlornly.

## 'Blues Brothers 2000', a Musical—if Not Comedic—Tour De Force

It's hard to believe it's been 18 years since the release of one of the coolest musical comedies ever, The Blues Brothers, with the late John Belushi and Dan Aykroyd as Jake and Elwood Blues, respectively. That film was notable for many reasons, among them the biggest car chase ever put on film (culminating in the biggest car pileup), great R&B music (provided by a whole slew of musical artists), and for Milwaukeeans, the scene taking place on the then incomplete freeway ramp connecting I-894 to the Hoan Bridge. It's a comedy classic, achieving legendary status partly due to the untimely death of Belushi, but mostly because it's just a darn good film.

Many of the same elements have come together nearly 2 decades later for the highly-anticipated sequel, Blues Brothers 2000, and, while in many respects musically superior to the first film, the comedic elements are nowhere near as strong.

I say that not just by comparison to the original, but also with 2000 standing completely on its own. This isn't to say there aren't laughs, but just that so many of the punch lines are blatant rip-offs of the first movie. And when you hear a joke the second time, no matter how good it is, it's just not as funny.

The first word that comes to mind when watching Blues Brothers 2000 is derivative. Many, many scenes are just retreads from the 1980 film. For example, the original gave us those infamous Illinois Nazis, a scene where Reverend Cleophus James (James Brown) "zaps" Jake into his holy mission of reforming the Blues Band, and the massive car chase through downtown Chicago where police cars topple and

crash into one another, forming a huge pile of smoking, crunched up steel

Well, 2000 gives us skinheads and white supremacists, Rev. James "zapping" Cabel Chamberlain (Joe Morton), an Illinois sheriff, into joining up with the band, and a massive police car pileup on a highway. "Been there, done that," is a common feeling one gets throughout this film, and there are many more obvious parallels.

Even if you haven't seen the 1980 film (a crime, indeed!), this film will still only leave you chuckling at best, since most of the comedy is, frankly, rather lame. Nevertheless, if you like rock & roll or rhythm & blues music at all, this film has loads of it, performed in nicely choreographed numbers throughout.

There are some 26 different songs, including "Respect," "Ghost Riders in the Sky," "Green Onions," and "Funky Nassau." The movie's chock-full of musical legends and cameo appearances, including B.B. King, Nia Peeples, Aretha Frank-lin, Wilson Pickett, Steve Lawrence, John Popper ("Blues Traveller"), Paul Shaffer, Bo Diddley, Billy Preston...etc.

The plot, such as it is, serves only to move the Blues Brothers Band (and all the original members from the first film are back) from Illinois to the swamps of Louisiana and a "battle of the bands."

A decidedly mixed review - great music, relatively mediocre and highly derivative comedy. It could've had much better writing (and with Aykroyd and John Landis, you'd expect much better!). But it could've been much worse, too (let's say they brought in Jim Belushi to be Jake and hope no one noticed!). The soundtrack, certainly, comes more highly recommended than the film. \*\*1/2

In all too predictable fashion, The Wedding Singer offers up rather routine The likable hero, Robby must realize he isn't in love with Linda but with Julia who must likewise discover that her boyfriend is a complete shit.

## From the Start, a Film's Quality as Art Has Been Due to the Director

Films have always been the director's medium. With the universal eye of the camera, directors were the original soothsayers conjuring up images and apparitions out of shadows and light, pioneering this great new technology of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, giving breadth and focus to what must have seemed an odd curio of an invention at the beginning of the century.

The magic of early movies was limited to constrictive stages, unwieldy immobile cameras and the need to create action out of silence. These early magicians of shadow -play seemed limited to what their cumbersome all seeing eye could reproduce on narrow strips of celluloid-and the need to coalesce these pinpoints of light into something

resembling narrative coherence.

D. W. Griffith attacked the problem by taking his cameras outdoors, mounting them on movable transports, and creating the first story spectacles. Chaplin did him one better by producing ,directing ,and acting in his own films, setting a new standard of artistic coordination and foreshadowing the later efforts of Orson Welles.

But these were gifted men and their European counter parts-W. G. Pabst [not the beer]] Murnau ,Dreyer Lang, remained less renowned but were no less influential. The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari [1919], Nosferatu [1922] and Metropolis [1926] were admired by cinema historians, but seemed too studied for general consumption. Danish director Dreyer's Passion of Joan of Arc [1928] introduced creative use of the close -up ,but his later films were marked by an almost sadistic Puritanical religiosity [Day of Wrath 1943] which alienated audiences and limited his international appeal,

Then as now ,movies are a curiously American phenomena ,and attempts to overintellectualize film has never been long lasting, or particularly popular. Movies at their best were a kind of glorious entertainment blending the artistic with an accessible ver-

nacular and an easy-to-take style.

The "vision thing' [George Bush.'s favorite amalgam] in films was the director's main job .As in politics it was mandatory to combine these "pinpoints of light ' into a coherent seamless audience -pleasing format, but it was American made films that dominated the movie world from the outset.

But if directors were the alchemists, movie stars were the lodestones of popular attraction.. Fairbanks, Chaney ,Pickford, and, of course, Chaplin emerged out of these silent pinpoints of light and dominated he international scene as well as their succes-Garbo ,Shearer, Davis, Stewart, Hepburn, Grant, and many others who would define and refine sound films into a more serious art form, challenging the stage as

sound added prestige to films. This was not lost on many talented directors ,who, realizing that those who appeared before the camera would at least equal in importance those who operated behind the camera, became resigned to the emerging studio system which demanded that directors deal with given starring actors. This may in fact have been a blessing in disguisethere was an enormous amount of talent before the camera during the first half of the 20th century ,and with the technical as well as the monetary support that studios could provide, and combined with the personal dedication that executive producers such as Thalberg, Goldwyn, and Selznick had for films ,it was not quite so difficult to blend commercial with artistic pursuits. A De Mille or a Capra had a much freer hand than is generally supposed [as long as they were commercial], and a great wealth of talent to

Many famous stars emerged as the result of a proprietary mentorship at the hands of a dominant director: Lillian Gish with Griffith, Garbo with Maurice Stiller, Dietrich with Sternberg and even Alfred Hitchcock allowed himself an obsessive fascination with his famous blonds: Madeleine Carroll, Ingrid Bergman ,Grace Kelly, Eva Marie Saint. John Wayne did his best work under the direction of John Ford who elevated Western's into a more respectable genre. The Golden Age of sound films lasted from about the 30s through the mid -40s, coming to an abrupt halt after World War II.

The post war depressive let -down dominated by the emerging Cold War and hearkening to the Korean conflict, combined with the realization that the recent war had not made the world "safe for democracy" resulted in a curious sense of denial of the for-

#### 'The Replacement Killers' is a Movie for Those of Stout Hearts

The Replacement Killers would, at initial glance, seem an unlikely film to find Glenn and his "Biggie" popcorn. Never a particular aficionado of ultra-violent gangster flicks, Glenn must sheepishly admit to having neither seen Coppola's classic The Godfather nor any of Bruce Lee's antics.

Faithful readers of the Wisconsin Light must therefore pardon Glenn's lack of expertise. Still, nothing wrong with bringing a fresh, naiveté to the otherwise jaded busi-

ness of film reviewing!

Top-lining The Replacement Killers is that international hunk o' man, Chow Yun-Fat. Never heard of him? Glenn neither! Press clippings suggest that the brooding Chow is Hong Kong's leading leading man. Whether he takes America by storm remains to be seen.

Chow plays an assassin with a decided sense of right and wrong. Right is killing bad guys -- even in huge, huge numbers while wrong is the killing of adorable little seven year-old boys while being hugged by their fathers.

Gee, Glenn has managed to offer up The Replacement Killer's scanty plotting

with scant effort.

A brutal nightclub slaying, followed by the appropriately exciting chase sequence begin The Replacement Killers. good-guy cop Stan Zedkov (Michael Rooker) is forced to kill the arrogant killer, he will learn that he has slain the son of underworld kingpin Mr. Wei (Kenneth Tsang).

Bad luck. Really bad luck. Wei per-suades noble John Lee (the aforementioned Chow Yun-Fat) to accept the assignment to exact revenge. All seems to precede as planned. Lee has father and son targeted, yet he fails to complete his assignment. Inquiring minds want to know

Now on the run, John Lee turns to Meg Coburn (Mira Sorvino) to fix him up with a fake passport, so he can hightail it to mainland China to protect his mother and sister. Meg is interrupted in her task and before she knows it she and John find themselves thrust together, unlikely partners against the evil Mr.Wei.

Mira Sorvino was something of a revelation to Glenn. As the tough-as-nails Meg Coburn, Ms. Sorvino was delightfully .. well, tough-as-nails and Glenn isn't talking those fake kind you can purchase at your better convenience stores. Sorvino reminded Glenn of those wonderful gun molls in the 1930's Warner films that featured such memorable bad guys as Jimmy Cagney or Edward G. Robinson.

Initially Glenn thought Chow Yun-Fat something of an expressionless enigma. Highly skilled assassins might be trained to show little, if any emotion but such characters are difficult to elicit much audience sympathy. Even the deliciously wooden mega-hunk Arnold S. only became a superstar after revealing his humorous side.

Director Antoine Fuqua offers some nice stylish visual touches while keeping the action going along at a brisk pace.

Those faint of heart take heed, The Replacement Killers is not for the squeamish. A particularly unpleasant, barbaric murder of an innocent woman driving a van nearly had Glenn tossing up in his "Biggie' popcom. Souls braver than Glenn however should get their money's worth!

## Violent, Brain-Dead and Derivative, 'Deep Rising' is One to Miss

From the bottomless depths of the South China Sea, computer-generated creatures surface to attack and cannibalize the passengers on a luxury cruise liner, the "Argonautica." The first victim is killed as one of them sucks her down through the toilet upon which she sits.

From there it just gets worse.

You can't help but feel your soul being drained out of your body while watching Deep Rising, the mere existence of which seems predicated on the notion that people are far, far too easily entertained.


Deep Rising has everything you'd expect to find in a clichéd horror film, and less. It's full of cardboard cut-out characters for one, including the handsome leading macho guy who gets the girl in the end (Treat Williams), the hero's comic sidekick (Kevin O'Connor), the snarling bad guy who dies ever so slowly and horribly (Wes Studi), the corrupt, moneyhungry Capitalist (Anthony Heald), and of course, the girl/romantic interest who ends up being the superheroine she never knew she could be (Famke Janssen; think of her

as a bargain basement Sandra Bullock).

Then, of course, there are dozens of automatic weapons that never need reloading, and a gang of bad guys, each representing a different ethnic group. There are also the big, disgusting, gruesome creatures - entirely computergenerated in this case, and not remarkably well, either.

A quote from writer/director Stephen Sommers perhaps sums things up best of ail: "I saw something on television about a vampire squid - a really nasty-looking thing. I...did some research on giant sea anemones. And then decided to write a big thriller action movie." Revealing, is it not?

Essentially, Deep Rising is a violent, bloody monster movie, filled with every shopworn cliché of the genre. It's poorly written, directed and acted, and what suffices as the plot isn't worth analysis as it's so full of holes that the film becomes a 90 minute sieve of forehead-slapping nonsense. Summed up: a big body count, standard, cardboard action hero types, the girl, big, ugly creatures. Hey, sounds original and entertaining to me! NOT!

mer war -time optimism that had given spiritual unity to the arts-this embarrassed revocation of faith in humanism would dominate the arts for the next half century.

A gradual unraveling of the balance between star and director gradually came into effect as a "new wave' of foreign films began to shift emphasis in favor of innovative directors who reflected the dark side of a new pessimism.

The first were the almost unwatchable hand -held camera movies—Rossellini's Open City[1945] and De Sica's Bicycle Thief [1947] that confused artistic laggardness with realism, although the latter film is still widely admired by film dilettantes for the "purity of its simplicity"—a favorite term of film connoisseurs at that time.

It is much better than the other initial neo -realistic films of this period.. But these early Italian films served a masochistic post- war need to bury the audience in grit. The age of director -deifying films came into being in the 50s, but now their was a greater emphasis on the European product-always the home of post war malaise-and of malaise there would be aplenty. Soon foreign films would become more sophisticated and ob-

Most prominent in Italy were Antonioni [L'Aventura 1960, La Notte 1961, Red Desert 1964] whose characters wandered aimlessly and scenario-less though city streets while taking their emotional temperatures in endless monologues about spiritual destitution; Frederico Fellini who viewed surrealism as temporary psychosis[81/2 1963, Juliet of the Spirits 1965] and threw in some abstract eroticism [Satyricon 1970] along with a hand -slapping view of hollow merriment [La Dolce Vita 1960-very popular here] but came up with a real mini -tragedy in the ineffable self -induced loneliness and heart-sick pathos of La Strada [1954]—but this film unlike the others required star performances-provided by Anthony Quinn and Guiletta Masina (Fellini's wife) and survived its trendiness for guite a while.

The French, of course would regard their films as fit for the true epicures of intellectualism ,but a certain urgency was lacking -like settling for a bon bon when the times demanded a steak. Francois Truffault never equaled his film debut The 400 Blows [1959] a film still loved today for its delicate sense of unconscious parental lovelessness and the loneliness that ensues in children-but here again the famous final shot of the boy staring at the empty ,endless sea is almost as fondly remembered as Garbo's in Queen Christina. His subsequent films Breathless [1959] and Jules and Jim [1961] suffered from a cold -blooded sleight of hand so often mistaken for sophisticationcharming but forgettable—like trying to involve yourself in watching an accident from

Others, like Alain Resnais delved into the metaphysical aspects of sub conscious memory blockage, producing films of brilliant incoherence with camera work so studiedly [and slowly] elegant that you didn't mind if it seemed like a series of unedited sequences. He convinced unemployed coffee house intellectuals -and well-paid film aficionados-that it didn't matter if you could follow the film as long as you could savor its tastefulness. But his Hiroshima Mon Amour [1959] and Last Year at Marienbad [1961] are far more compelling than our contemporary psychiatric obsession with hidden memory recall.

Resnais's films capped nuclear age depression by denying the importance of personal experience -a dangerous concept in these politically correct times but probably close to the truth. The films retain a certain distinction despite their pervasive negativism., although no one cares to watch them any more.

But it was Swedish director Ingmar Bergman who gamered the most respected praise from American cinemaddicts. Basically a stage director, Bergman transformed his actors into speaking mannequins bearing long ,long recorded messages emanating from the director's psyche- a form of free association dialogue with no beginning or end.

Bergman was not adverse to using extensive close ups but at his worst, as in the nearly unwatchable Persona 1966] (recently seen on TV), action comes to a dead halt, and one is aware of rapidly trying to decipher obtuse subtitles. At his best, as in Wild Strawberries [1957] and the Virgin Spring [1960], Bergman strives to create modern day morality plays out of the disillusionment of old age and the pointlessness of venge-His most remembered scene is the figure of death in the Seventh Seal [1957] leading his characters in a routeless circular dance of the macabre- very propitious of the post war dark ages.

From Japan, director Kurosawa earned a place of repute for more careful and certainly more spirited cinematography as in Rashomon [1950]and relieved cinema weary audiences with a bit of action in Yojimbo [1961] and the classic, but slightly overrated Japanese western - Seven Samurai [1954].

Of the many remakes, Sturges's The Magnificent Seven [1960] failed to capture Kurosawa's sense of serious- minded merry making and Peckinpaw's overwrought [and overpraised] Wild Bunch [1969] failed to duplicate Kurosawa's sense of classic poise-

On this side of the Atlantic, executive film producers such as Zanuck, Dore Schary, and Howard Hawks, took a more cautious view, and, with the studio system still in operation, left the darker side-soon to be known as "film noire'- to lower budget productions. Today, such over praised films as Kiss Me Deadly [1955], Crossfire 1947], and The Big Heat [1953] are noted more as trend setters rather than for their intrinsic qualities. The dark ominous geometry of nighttime city streets dominated these films with a sense of nameless hostility which has a strange appeal even today . What they lacked was the scalpel -edged determination of their European cinema -verite counterparts. But they were easier to take if less ambitious

Ironically, two of the finest film noire movies were made before 1945 -- the merciless Double Indemnity and the poetic pyscho -romantic motif of Laura. Both were made in 1944, the same year as Bing Crosby warbled Going my Way. The enduring longevity of both these films might be attributed to exceptionally strong star performances,. although their respective directors [Wilder and Preminger] valued star acting as well as structure. It was Wilder who was to give Sunset Boulevard its immortal "close up" line. But it was an era that was doomed to close

declined in every conceivable fashion.

First of all, unlike the Beatles, the Spice Girls do not write their own material, nor do they possess discernibly individual personalities. However, a much more apropos comparison should be made with the Brady Bunch, the Partridge Family, or perhaps best of all, the Archies!

The film essentially follows them in their bus running around from (supposedly) comedic and musical scene after scene for two days, culminating in a performance at the Prince Albert Hall. Jokes aren't followed up on; characters come and go within a few minutes, never to be seen or heard from again; nothing ever seems to have any effect on what follows.

Sound like an overblown music video? Righto, that's exactly what Spiceworld is. It's really too bad, especially given the fact that the film contains some notable personalities: Elvis Costello, Bob Hoskins, Elton John, Meat Loaf, George Wendt, and even Roger "007 of the '70s" Moore. All that talent is wasted in this brain-dead movie which deserves consignment to the scrapheap of Krap for Kids.

But then again, what else could we have expected? The central characters are unable to act (much less lip synch accurately); the film's idea was dreamed up by the Girls while waiting in an airport one day; the writer (Kim Fuller) has a bunch of cancelled T.V. comedies on his resume; and director (Bob Spiers) was in charge of one of last year's worst movies, That Darn Cat. In the end, there was nothing, NOTHING, to recommend Spiceworld to anyone over the age of 13 (and even those 13 and under surely have better things to do then make their folks suffer through this mess of a movie). 



"This bill is purely an attempt by a small clique of legislators to control local govemments outside their own districts," said Walt Jackson, President of Action Wisconsin, a sate wide organization that works on behalf o Gay and Lesbian civil rights., "It is undemocratic and insulting to local taxpayers.'

State Representative Tammy Baldwin (D-Madison) the only openly Les/Bi/Gay member of the State Legislature told The Wisconsin Light "It is vitally important that people concerned about access to health care speak out against this bill. Domestic partnership health care coverage is an important tool to assure that all Wisconsin families can access comprehensive

health care services. Observers say that while AB-759 does not forbid local units of government from providing domestic partnership health insurance benefits, its passage would make

it difficult for them to do so. There are two reasons for this. A large part of local budgets comes from state revenue sharing. This is especially true of School Districts which also have their property tax levies (their other source of revenue) regulated by state law.

Furthermore, many local governments State funded local government heath insurance plan. Leaving that plan and getting coverage on their own would

be costly.

AB-759 would effectively forbid the plan from offering domestic partnership coverage making if financially impossible for many local governments to provide

Sources at the State Capitol say that the Nass proposal is unlikely to pass in this legislative session which is scheduled to end in a few weeks. They say that even if AB-759 did get through the State Assembly, it would in all likelihood be bottled up in committee by the Democrats who control the State Senate.

'All the Republicans are doing is giving Gays and Lesbians another reason to help the Democrats take control of the State Assembly in next November's elections,

said one State Senate Staffer.

Others, however, say that a high turnout of opponents at the hearing on February 19th is important. They point out that during the debate on AB-104, Lorraine Seratti's (R-Spread Eagle) bill to prohibit state recognition of Same Sex Marriages, the massive outpouring of opposition at the bill's hearing helped convince some legislators not to push for AB-104's pas-

The State Assembly did pass AB-104, but it has languished in the State Senate which unlike the Assembly is controlled by Democrats. In the State Senate, AB-104 hasn't even gotten a Committee hearing let alone a vote.

Unlike the fight over AB-104, Gays and Lesbians may find that they are not alone in their opposition to AB-759.

The bill would affect contract negotiations with a variety of public employee unions, many of which, especially the powerful state teachers union, the WEA, may decide to oppose its passage. Furthermore, AB759 would require an unfunded state mandate and put more controls on the use of state funds, two things are very unpopular with lobbyists for those interests.

Nevertheless, no one wants to take any chances. As Representative Baldwin put 'We need to turn out in force on the 19th and let our voices be heard.

In addition to Nass who was first elected to the State Assembly in 1990, sponsors include State Representatives F. Lasee, Grothman, Ladwig, Owens, Schafer, Ainsworth, Hahn, Urban, Albers and Kreibich; and is cosponsored by Senators Fitzgerald and Zien. All are Republicans.

also in the military."

Not that he stays in the closet while on

"Probably half my unit knows I'm Gay," he says. "They don't say anything. I think if you earn the respect of people who work for you, they don't care [what you do in your personal life]."

He says as the Army has become what he calls a "techno-service," soldiers are more intelligent: "You have to deal with them on their intellectual level. You have to get their minds. They don't have to get yours. There are still some out there who are a little homophobic. But, for the most part, the Army's been pretty good. I'd say that out of all the services it's the best as far as Don't Ask, Don't Tell. The worst are the Navy and Marine Corps."

Ironically, the most homophobic services may contain the most Gays and Lesbians in their ranks. Paul estimates as much as 35 percent of the Navy is Gay, 'higher in the Marines.'

While the younger soldiers are, for the most part, not homophobic, "It's the old-timers who have not changed," he says.
"They are the autocratic, dictatorial man-

see something that they don't like in a soldier. Maybe he's a little effeminate. I'll tell you there are a lot of straight people who are a little effeminate. Just as there are a lot of Gay people who show no signs of femininity whatsoever. So it works both ways.

That's when the investigation begins.

"An off-duty officer or NCO puts some-body under surveillance. They'll ask, 'Is he living on the base? Do girls come pick him up, drop him off? Does he go off by himself a lot?' Then, a non-commissioned officer will ask some junior non-coms, 'Isn't he a little strange?' That's when the harassment starts. It's very subtle. Like being shunned, being excluded. I've never encountered physical or verbal har-assment, though."

However, if superiors regard a soldier as an asset, someone who is an outstanding performer, they will look the other way, even if the person is very obvious.

Paul recalls an instance where someone wanted to be discharged and played his Gay card, to no avail. He used Corporal Klinger, the M\*A\*S\*H TV character, as a role model.

"He did everything to try to get out. He was one hell of a finance person and no one ever harassed him. I went over to visit him once on the base and he was prancing around the barracks in red silk It is they, he says, who conduct the panties. Everyone laughed at him, but witch hunts, which are illegal under Don't they didn't kick him out. He did his six sk, Don't Tell. years and then left. But he loved every "You might have a commander or a first minute of it. I saw him after he was dissergeant who's homophobic. They might charged and he said, 'you know all the time I was trying to get out, I had a good time. I can say it was the best time of my life'."

easier access to transportation, increasing population density and more frequent sexual contacts, might have been bigger factors.

Those findings are also being reported in the scientific journal Nature. In a separate article in that issue, Dr. Simon Wain-Hobson of the Pasteur Institute in Paris, agreed that the worldwide epidemic had probably come from a single HIV ancestor. Wain-Hobson said findings of Zhu's team "all make good sense."

Experts attribute the improving figures to better treatments, not any advances in preventing people from catching HIV.

Prescriptions of so-called three-drug cocktails, two older AIDS drugs plus one of the newer class of medicines called protease inhibitors, have revolutionized AIDS care. Typically people start on them as soon as they learn they are infected, even before they get sick.

When all goes well, these medicines drive the amount of virus in the bloodstream so low that it cannot be measured. Many who were deathly ill when the combination therapy came into widespread use two years ago are now in out-wardly good health.

An AIDS Honeymoon?

Still, the drugs fail for some, and the most common reason is that people stop taking the medicines. Patients must swal-low 20 or so pills a day on a precise time schedule, and missing even a few can allow mutant unkillable strains to emerge in

No one knows how long the benefits will last. Many wonder if even those who diligently take their pills will eventually succumb to a losing battle with a runaway

"Are we in a honeymoon period?" asked the CDC's Dr. Harold Jaffe. "Is there something bad on the horizon?"

The New York City data offer no hint of a looming reversal of AIDS fortunes. In 1995, there were 19 AIDS deaths per day in New York. Last year, that fell to seven.

Between 1995 and 1997, AIDS deaths in the city have declined 71 percent among men and 63 percent among women. Among the women during this time, they fell 73 percent among whites, 66 percent among Hispanics and 59 percent among

The new treatments are also credited with keeping HIV-infected people well so they do not develop full-blown AIDS. Nationwide, the CDC reported that the number of new AIDS cases diagnosed in the first six months of 1997 fell 12 per-

AIDS Care Groups Struggle to Meet Needs

With fewer dying, the number of Americans living with AIDS is increasing, up 13 percent to 259,000. This is presenting an increasing strain on the limited budgets of AIDS Service Agencies

(ASO). ASO's and other AIDS Service Providers (ASP) are now trying to meet

demands for housing, rent assistance and other needs of those living with AIDS.

This increased need for fimds comes at precisely the time when giving and other sources of funding has decreased. This is due, experts say, to the fact that many people believe that the disease is licked. Not so, the researchers told the Conference attendees.

"The AIDS epidemic is not over," said Dr. Thomas Wein. "It is not over by far. The public must not become apathetic. AIDS agencies need more funding, not

While no one knows precisely how many Americans are infected with HIV, the CDC estimates this to be between 400,000 and 650,000 people.




