Tuesday Election Focus on Milwaukee

Milwaukee – Many voters, including those in the LGBT community, may think that what happens in Tuesday's primary election is not of real significance. Most observers expect the key race on the ballot, the Mayoral primary, to be a coronation of incumbent John Norquist but as they say, appearances can be deceiving.

What's At Stake?

At stake are efforts to gain Domestic Partnership benefits for City and County employees, funding for AIDS programs, improved Police community relations and other issues. With three Milwaukee Alderpersons giving up their seats, control of the Common Council is up for grabs.

Even a cursory look at the City's primary races indicates that the pro-LGBT civil rights faction of the Common Council may be in for a rough ride. All of the Aldermen facing primary challengers have records of supporting LGBT equality. If they are unseated there is no guarantee their successors would offer the same support. There is concern that the scales could be tipped against attempts to broaden the political progress Milwaukee's LGBT community has made in recent years.

Pro-LGBT Aldermen Challenged

Alderman Paul Henningsen, who has an exceptional record of support for LGBT causes, is in the political fight of his life. So is Alderman George Butler, who co-sponsored Milwaukee's Domestic Partnership registry ordinance.

City Hall political junkies give Henningsen no better than a 50-50 chance to win his bid for re-election. His district, which runs from the near West Side to the lakefront, includes one of the largest concentrations of LGBT residents and businesses in the State.

Henningsen won his post in a 1983 special election, when he received widespread support from Gay and Black voters and he has delivered the goods for both communities. He is one the few Council members who can always be counted on for pro-LGBT civil rights votes. He played a key role in getting the initial funding for the BESTD Clinic's fledging AIDS program, which later became MAP and then ARCW. He has continued to support City funding of AIDS programs.

Two years ago, Henningsen sponsored a resolution to give Domestic Partnership benefits to the City's LGBT employees. Last year he co-sponsored the legislation that established Milwaukee's Domestic Partnership registry.

In addition to his more public stances, Henningsen has also quietly worked to open doors for Milwaukee's LGBT community. He has also supported and gained City funding for a variety of programs aimed at improving the housing and security of the largely minority and lower income population on the district's Western end.

Yet, the four term Alderman faces strong challenges from three of the five candidates trying to unscat him. Several years ago, his battle with alcoholism was publicized in the mainstream press. The revelations of his struggle soured some residents on an Alderman who some believe is one of the most effective members of the Common Council. Henningsen has worked hard to win this personal battle. Nevertheless, some of his constituents can't get over the fact that he had to wage it at all.

Then there is "the Downtown factor." Like other Alderpersons, Henningsen takes the lead on major projects in his district. Unlike the others, his district includes Milwaukee's Downtown area. His proposals are of general interest to the entire city and therefore they are put under a microscope by the press.

For example, when Henningsen proposed making East Wells Street into a two-way thoroughfare, wealthy residents of the expensive condos on its eastern end publicly objected. Henningsen wanted to make access to and from Milwaukee's lakefront easier for those who live on the Western end of his district. Nevertheless, the battle over his idea, and the publicity it generated, gave some the impression that Henningsen didn't care about his constituents.

LGBT activists are worried that their long time friend may not survive the primary. There is reason for them to be concerned.

Henningsen barely won re-election in 1996. Many observers think that he would have lost that race if his opponent, Bob Bauman, hadn't been filmed as he tore down a Henningsen sign shortly before the vote.

Bauma, is making his third race against Henningsen. Two other major challengers - George Aldrich and Claude Krawcyzk - are first time contenders. Bauman (because of his previous campaigns) and Aldrich, have name recognition. Krawcyzk reputedly has a pile of money donated by downtown business interests. All three men are engaging in traditional door to door campaigns. Henningsen, encumbered by a serious hip problem has been unable to go door to door himself.

Aldrich is the son of County Supervisor Sheila Aldrich, who represents most of Henningsen's district on the County Board. Supervisor Aldrich lost to Henningsen by just 25 votes when he first ran for Alderman. Some analysts felt that she lost because she largely ignored the district's Gay voters until it was too late.

Her son is not making that mistake. George Aldrich is openly appealing for LGBT votes and promises to support efforts to provide DP benefits for City employees. Privately, activists say they are impressed with both Henningsen and Aldrich. Publicly, they are solidly behind the incumbent. "He has a history," said one. "We owe him." The theory is if the LGBT community abandons Henningsen, it will send the wrong message to other officeholders who expect Gay support when they put their jobs on the line by supporting LGBT rights.

Krawcyzk and Bauman have not made any overt appeals to



the LGBT community. Nor have Henningsen's other opponents, Lauri Gonion and Chreyle Williams. Neither woman has mounted a serious campaign.

Henningsen says that he has always won by small margins. "The people on the East end think I am too concerned about the neighborhoods. The neighborhood people think I am too concerned about downtown," he said. Money is not a problem for his campaign. The Alderman has raised over \$50,000.

Gay activists are hoping that either Henningsen or Aldrich, or both, come out of the primary. If Bauman or Krawcyzk win a place on the April ballot against Henningsen or Aldrich, the Human Rights League's Political Action Committee is expected to launch an all out effort to keep them from winning the general election.

Note from the Publisher

In recent weeks our readers have seen some changes and even some controversy in our pages. Last weeks coverage of the close of the Sharon Dixon arson trial brought some very impassioned responses. Interestingly, the cute nude blond on the cover brought nary a peep.

Former Publisher Jerry Johnson was very disappointed in our coverage, or over-coverage, of the trial. He was particularly disturbed by last week's cover. I think its clear that he speaks for s significant group in our community that believes we sensationalized, and made fun of, a somewhat tragic situation. The irreverent "Doing the Jailhouse Rock" headline, the sexually suggestive "Fannies Tries to Finger Dish" subhead, the sad picture of Ms. Dixon with "Guilty "stamped over it and the articles initial preoccupation with the Dish allegation all contributed to a sense that we had not been unbiased and did not live up to reasonable journalistic standards

How we presented this story was most heatedly discussed by virtually everyone involved in this newspaper. The author (Bill Meunier) argued for a traditional "Dixon Found Guilty" headline and de-emphasized the Dish allegation in his article. Just like a lawyer in a court room, he found his objections noted and overruled.

My personal suggestion for a headline was far, far more provocative than the one used. We ended up in the middle and with a touch of humor. Despite the objections, I am very proud of our coverage, and yes, even last week's coverage.

The word tabloid has been bandied about lately, within and without our offices. What most people refer to as tabloid journalism is when words and images are used in a provocative fashion to garner interest whether or not they present an accurate reflection of the story

As with all of our covers, they should be designed to foster interest. This one certainly did. What differs us from the tabloids is that we also strive for accuracy. This cover was very accurate. Sharon was found guilty. Sharon was in jail. But most disturbingly, in a last minute desperation attempt to shift blame away from her, her attorney did accused persons involved with Dish with setting the fire at Fannies.

I happened to be in the court when this occurred. I was astonished. So was the judge. The attempt was dismissed but not before an energetic effort was made to get this allegation to the jury. The fact that there were no facts to support this argument won out.

I, like many in our community, like Sharon. I was rooting for her. I was hoping that she would win her case. However, the evidence and a jury's decision says otherwise. Bill's coverage from the beginning has been unbiased and has presented both sides of the case exhaustively. Until last week, even Ms. Dixon would acknowledge this. The District Attorneys office also thought the coverage was balanced and well-researched. In my opionion, last weeks coverage was no exception. While we have no special insight as to whether she's guilty or not, the fact is that there was what many believe to be a presentation of overwhelming circumstantial evidence against her. That is not our, or Bill's, fault.

Some of you may have been bothered by the interjection of humor," The Jailhouse Rock". Why, may I ask is there the need to present every news article in a serious and dry fashion? The most successful weeklies in the country often use humor to make their points. Not everybody likes it all the time but it makes for a more interesting presentation. I hope this paper continues its trend towards a bit more irreverence and does not fall into the trap of overblown self-importance.

For me, there is a little lost fact, first reported in these pages, that exemplifies the importance of this case. Someone tossed a molotov cocktail on the roof of Dish.At the time, Sharon Dixon suggested this was perpetrated by a serial homophobic arsonist. Maybe, maybe not - but if that fire had been successfully set there would have been a blaze only a wall away from many sleeping tenants, mostly young gay men. We don't know who tossed that fire bomb, but may that potential serial killer rot in hell.

We cannot change our community unless we can effectively get information to them. For those of you who object to ANYTHING we present, please write to us. We want to present that diversity of opinion. It is a good thing. We are not a monolith. Please don't expect us to be. Bland, uncontroversial, milquetoast would be easy, and uncontroversial, but would be boring and would not serve the requirement to expand readership. Stagnation is simply not an option. Please do not get preoccupied by an individual article, photo, letter or even misjudgment on our part. I ask those of you disturbed by the occasional foray into areas that do not meet with your approval to look at our overall mission to inform and to assess us in a broader way. Think what you ask when you ask that we NEVER offend you.

The real lesson in the Dixon case is not new. Not one shred of evidence connecting her directly to the fire or the arsonist was presented. An expensive legal "Dream Team" could have hammered and hammered for days about the lack of direct evidence. All of her personal alibi witnesses were turned into reluctant standard bearers for the prosecution. Her ability to take care of financial pressures through legal loans was not presented in an effective manner. Her supposed suspicious behavior, around the time of the fire, would have been picked apart mercilessly by expensive hired hands. If she had tens and tens of thousands to spend on a defense her chances for conviction would have been dramatically reduced. That is the sad truth.

It is also a sad truth that none of this has any real bearing on whether she did it or not.

Some people seem to think that they really know what happened. Only Sharon and the torch person actually know for sure. This story is not over. We believe that the torchbearer will be found. You can rely on us for all further developments.

Marriage Bill Introduced Providence, R.L. - Openly Gay state Rep.

Michael S. Pisaturo, D-Cranston, introduced a bill in the state House of Representatives that would allow all Rhode Islanders equal access to civil marriage, according to the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund. The Victory Fund, which works to elect qualified openly Gay and lesbian candidates to public office as a means of ending discrimination, supported Pisaturo's two successful campaigns for the state Legislature.

"This is a pro-family, pro-marriage bill that would allow more Rhode Island families to take on the commitment and responsibility that a civil marriage entails," noted Pisaturo. "Gay men and Lesbians should no longer be excluded from the same protections for our families that others take for granted."

Air Force Leaders Take Stance Against

Harassment

Washington (AFPN) – As the issue of harassment in the armed forces continues to be a subject of scrutiny, the Air Force's top two leaders are letting it be known such behavior will not be tolerated in the service. Secretary F Whitten Peters and Chief of Staff Gen. Michael E. Ryan released a policy letter Jan. 10 reiterating the Air Force's zero tolerance toward harassment. Under the policy, commanders bear ultimate responsibility for ensuring prompt and appropriate action is taken against individuals who engage in this type of behavior. "Every Air Force member deserves to work and live in an environment that is free of discrimination and harassment," stated the two leaders in the letter, which was released Air Force-wide.

Attackers Thought She was a Lesbian

Boston, MA – Days after a Boston High School student said she was sexually assaulted and beaten unconscious on an MBTA train by classmates who thought she was Gay, two 15year-old girls from the school were arraigned in juvenile court, charged with attempted rape and civil rights violations.

A third female student, who is 17, was to be arraigned Feb 3 in Boston Municipal Court. Officials would not release the names of the juveniles.

Prosecutors asked Judge Leslie Harris to set bail for one girl at \$5,000 cash because she has a prior record. But Harris set bail at \$500 for her, and released the other girl on personal recognizance. Both will return to court on Feb. 16.All three defendants were among a group of six students who police said boarded an Orange Line train at New England Medical Center and attacked a 16-year-old classmate, molesting her and taunting her with accusations that she was a Lesbian.

The girl, who is Moroccan, moved to the United States about a year ago with her father. She grew up in a culture where hand-holding among schoolgirls is customary.

Dayton Rejects Civil Rights Law

Dayton, OH - City Commissioners have rejected a proposal to change the local anti-discrimination law to protect Gay men and

The commissioners voted 4-1 on Dec. 22 to take the proposal off their calendar, effectively killing it. More than 40 people spoke out about it at a packed commission meeting. After scratching the proposal, the commission unanimously approved an informal resolution stating that it does not condone discrimination against any group and opposes any attempt to deny Gays their rights.

Lakewood, Ohio, Rejects Domestic Partner Benefits

Lakewood, OH - Concerned about the potential costs of a prolonged legal battle and increasing division in the community, the City Council voted 5-2 against providing benefits for same-sex partners who work for the city. The Jan. 18 council session was the sixth time the issue was discussed during a public meeting. Recently, more than 400 people jammed Lakewood City Hall's auditorium to debate the ordinance's pros and cons. According to the estimates of city officials, the additional costs would be \$16,795 to \$39,417 per fiscal year, depending on the number of employees and the type of health.

Southwest Airlines Amends Policies On Sexual Orientation

Dallas TX – Southwest Airlines has amended its non-discrimination and anti-harassment policies to include sexual orientation, according to Chief Executive Herb Kelleher.

The move, announced Jan. 24, came after a spate of alleged anti-Gay harassment at the airline, which led some Southwest employees to raise safety concerns. The tensions boiled over when Southwest Airlines' Pilots' Association published a homophobic letter from one of its members in its December newsletter. The letter, by Capt. Gary S. Ward, urged Kelleher to reject calls for the airline to provide domestic partner benefits.

California Domestic Partner Registry Opens For Business

Sacramento, CA - More than 70 Gay and Lesbian couples took advantage of a new law that went into effect on New Year's Day allowing them to register their domestic partnerships with the secretary of state's office. Retired state workers who register can get health coverage for their partners and current state and local employees enrolled in the state's retirement program also may secure benefits for partners. Additionally, those who register will be entitled to visit their partner in the hospital. The registry also is available to heterosexual couples if they are over 62. Older people often avoid marriage because it can create financial burdens for them.

New Hampshire and Massachusetts Consider Domestic Partner Provisions

Portsmouth, NH – Legislators in New Hampshire are considering a bill that would extend health and other benefits to the samesex domestic partners of state employees, while in Massachusetts, legislators are considering a similar but broader package covering domestic partners in that state.

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Claim for Medical Coverage

Olympia, WA – Two Gay couples have filed a claim demanding that medical insurance coverage be given to same-sex domestic partners of Washington state employees.

The claim against the state Health Care Authority, a prerequisite to a lawsuit, was filed in December by lawyers for the 19,000-member Washington Federation of State Employees. "We are hoping really strongly that we don't have to file a lawsuit here," Ed Younglove, a lawyer representing the federation, told The Associated Press."We're going to do everything we can to persuade them to change their poli-

Counties Don't Have To Recognize Domestic Partnerships

Austin, TX - Issuing a clarification of state law, the state attorney general has ruled that declarations of domestic partnership are not "required or permitted by law to be recorded." In a Dec. 17. opinion that applies to all 254 counties, Texas Attorney General John Cornyn said even if state law authorized their filing in county courthouses, the documents don't "create a marital relation under Texas law."

Bexar County Clerk Gerald Rickoff posed the question to Cornyn after he was asked by members of San Antonio's Gay and Lesbian community to accept the declarations, as his counterpart in Travis County has done. Travis County Clerk Dana DeBeauvoir said in October that she would protect the Travis registry. "We will continue to operate the registry until we hear differently," stated, DeBeauvoir.

POZ Publishes List of 'HIV-Friendly' Companies

New York, NY – POZ Magazine named 25 American corporations with the best workplace policies for HIV-positive workers in its January issue.

The companies are: American Airlines, American Express, Bank of America, Bell Atlantic, Ben & Jerry's, Charles Schwab, Chase Manhattan, Coors Brewing, Eastman Kodak, The Gap, Glaxo Wellcome, IBM, Levi Strauss, The Limited, Liz Claiborne, Lucent Technologies, MCA/Universal, Naya Inc., New York Times Co., Polaroid, Quark, Starbucks, Time Warner, Unumprovident and Walt Disney.

The criteria used to rate corporate policies included: access to good employee insurance, including domestic partner health-care coverage; a non-discrimination policy and action plan for supporting the needs and confidentiality of employees living with HIV; a manager or work-group committee in charge of addressing HIV issues; a strong track record in recruiting, employing and promoting women and minorities; and a documented history of charitable giving to AIDS organizations.

The article reported that the majority of large companies still operate without policies and protections that support HIV-positive employees. It also chastised companies for being partly to blame for a decline in charitable giving to AIDS organizations in an age of declining death rates.

The article's author, Grant Lukenbill, author of the newly released <Smart Spending, The Gay and Lesbian Guide to Socially Responsible Shopping and Investing >(Alyson Books), also rebuked some mainstream media outlets for ignoring sexual orientation diversity. A July News & Politics



HRL-PAC Endorsements

Milwaukee - The Human Rights League Political Action Committee (HRL-PAC) has made its first ever endorsements. The group, which is Wisconsin's first registered LGBT political action committee, sent a survey to all of the candidates in contested Milwaukee area races but it declined to release responses to the survey to the press. A spokesman for the group said it decided not to release the survey results because it didn't tell the candidates that it would do so.

Political observers were puzzled as to why the PAC would believe that any candidates for public office would believe that such responses were confidential.

The HRL-PAC endorsed John Norquist's bid for re-election for Mayor. In contested primary races for the Milwaukee Common council, it endorsed the Aldermanic candidacies of Paul Henningsen (District 4), James A. Bohl Jr. (District 5), Fred Gordon (District 7), Rick Kissell (District 8), George Butler (District 10), James Witowiak, (District 12). Bohl and Kissell are running for open seats. The others are incumbents.

The PAC also endorsed Dawn Miller's bid to succeed longtime Riverwest County Supervisor Dorothy Dean.

Bar Brawler Allegedly Strikes Again

Milwaukee - Dantrae Baker a man who the District Attorney's office refused to prosecute after he was accused of breaking the nose of a La Cage bartender has reportedly struck again. As reported in the *WT Light* Justice in Milwaukee series Baker was accused of punching Jacob Weinstein while the bartender was asking patrons to keep away from a bar fight.

Although Weinstein and another La Cage employee knew Baker and identified him as the assailant, Assistant District Attorney Don Jackson refused to file charges. Jackson said that Baker brought in a unidentified witness who said someone else attacked Weinstein. He insisted that Weinstein bring in additional witnesses.

Sources at 219 say that on Sunday, January 30, Baker attacked two employees when they tried to get him to leave the club because he refused to pay a cover charge. One staff member received a black eye and bartender Mike Westley's front teeth were damaged when Baker allegedly punched him.

Westley refused to comment on the report. Weinstein told *W1Light* that following the incident, Westley called him and identified Baker as the person who attacked him. On Monday, February 7, *W1 Light* received a report that Baker was arrested Sunday by the Milwaukee Police. Assistant DA Don Jackson office told *W1 Light* that he declined to press charges against Baker in the earlier incident because he didn't feel he could convince a jury of Baker's guilt.


ty men are particularly vulnerable to the disease.

"With all of the issues young men face as they enter adulthood, HIV prevention can be overlooked," said David W. Seal, Ph.D., assistant professor of psychiatry and behavioral medicine and principal investigator of the study. "Through collaboration between researchers, the community, and youth themselves, CITY Project will seek to integrate HIV risk reduction into other issues that are important to young men."

The project offers young men ages 15 to 25 the opportunity to combat the threat of HIV to their peers by becoming CITY Project community health advisors. These community leaders will use their creative energy to plan and carry out educational and social events for young men, provide advice to help their peers make healthy decisions, and assist other young men in getting connected to supportive community services.

All community health advisors will receive extensive training. CITY Project is a community-wide effort that also seeks assistance from persons over 25 years old and from community organizations that want to create an affirming environment for young men. Individuals and groups will have opportunities to collaborate, network and receive technical assistance related to HIV prevention among young men.

"We are putting out a general call for support from the community. All persons and organizations with an interest in reducing HIV among young men are encouraged to attend and learn how they can be involved," said Dr. Seal. For more information, call the CITY Project hotline at (414) 456-7702.

Please read this information carefully before taking VIRACEPT. Also, please read this isafiel each time you renew the prescription, just in case anything has changed. This is a summary and not a replacement for a careful discussion with your doctor. You and your doctor should discuss VIRACEPT when you start, taking this medication and at regular checkups. You should remain under a doctor's care when taking VIRACEPT and should not change or stop treatment without first talking with your doctor.

WHAT IS VIRACEPT AND HOW DOES IT WORK?

VIRACEPT is used in the treatment of people with human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection. Infection with HIV leads to the destruction of CD4 T cells, which are important to the immune system. After a large number of CD4 cells have been destroyed, the infected person develops acquired immune

After a large number of CD4 cells have been destroyed, the intected person develops acquired minimie deficiency syndrome (AIDS). WIRACEPT works by blocking HIV protease (a protein-cutting enzyme), which is required for HIV to multiply. VIRACEPT has been shown to significantly reduce the amount of HIV in the blood. You should be aware, however, that the effect of VIRACEPT on HIV in the blood has not been correlated with long-term health benefits. Patients who took VIRACEPT on HIV in the blood has not been correlated with long-term health benefits. Patients who took VIRACEPT also had significant increases in their CD4 cell count. **VIRACEPT is usually taken logether with ofter antiretraviral drugs** such as Retrovir[®] (zidovudine, AZT). Epivir[®] (lamivudine, 3TC), or Zerit[®] (stavudine, d4T). Taking VIRACEPT in combination with other antiretroviral drugs reduces the amount of HIV in the body (viral load) and raises CD4 counts. VIRACEPT may be taken by adults, adolescents, and children 2 years of age or older. Studies in infants voncent than 2 years of are are now taking place.

DOES VIRACEPT CURE HIV OR AIDS?

DOES VIRACEPT CURE HIV OR AIDS? VIRACEPT is not a cure for HIV infection or AIDS. The long-term effects of VIRACEPT are not known at this time. People taking VIRACEPT may still develop opportunistic infections or other conditions associated with HIV infection. Some of these conditions are pneumonia, herpes virus infections, *Mycobacterium avium* complex (MAC) infections, and Kaposi's sarcoma. It is not known whether VIRACEPT will help you live longer or reduce the number of infections or other

illnesses that may occur. There is no proof that VIRACEPT can reduce the risk of transmitting HIV to others through sexual contact or blood contamination.

 WHO SHOULD OR SHOULD NOT TAKE VIRACEPT?

 Together with your doctor, you need to decide whether VIRACEPT is appropriate for you. In making your decision, the following should be considered:

 Allergies: If you have had a serious allergic reaction to VIRACEPT, you must not take VIRACEPT. You should also inform your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist of any known allergies to substances such as other medicines, toods, preservatives, or dyes.

 If you are pregnant: The effects of VIRACEPT on pregnant women or their unborn babies are not known. If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant, you should tell your doctor before taking VIRACEPT.

 If you are pregnant. You should discuss with your doctor the best way to feed your baby. You

VIRACEPT. If you are breast-feeding: You should discuss with your doctor the best way to feed your baby. You should be aware that if your baby does not already have HIV, there is a chance that it can be transmitted through treast-feeding. Women should not breast-feed if they have HIV. Children: VIRACEPT is available for the treatment of children 2 through 13 years of age with HIV. There is a powder form of VIRACEPT that can be mixed with milk, baby formula, or foods like pudding. Instructions on how to take VIRACEPT powder can be found in a later section that discusses how VIRACEPT Oral Powder should be prepared. If you have liver disease: VIRACEPT has not been studied in people with liver disease. If you have liver disease, you should tell your doctor before taking VIRACEPT. Other medical problems: Certain medical problems may affect the use of VIRACEPT. Some people taking protease inhibitors have developed new or more serious diabetes or high blood sugar. Some people with hemophilla have had increased bleeding. It is not known whether the protease inhibitors caused these problems. Be sure to tell your doctor if you have hemophilla types A and B, diabetes mellitus, or an increase in thirst and/or frequent urination.

CAN VIRACEPT BE TAKEN WITH OTHER MEDICATIONS?

VIRACEPT may interact with other drugs, including those you take without a prescription. You must discuss with your doctor any drugs that you are taking or are planning to take before you take VIRACEPT.

 Taking VIRACEPT together with other anti-HIV drugs increases their ability to fight the virus. It also reduces the opportunity for resistant viruses to grow. Based on your history of taking other anti-HIV medicine, your doctor will direct you on how to take VIRACEPT and other anti-HIV medicines. These drugs should be taken in a certain order or at specific times. This will depend on how many times a day each medicine should be taken. It will also depend on whether it should be taken with or without food.

HOW SHOULD I TAKE VIRACEPT?

HOW SHOULD I TAKE VIRACEPT? VIRACEPT is available only with your doctor's prescription. The light blue VIRACEPT Tablets should be taken three times a day. VIRACEPT should always be taken with a meal or a light snack. You do not have to take VIRACEPT exactly every 8 hours. Instead, you can take it at normal times when you are eating. Take VIRACEPT exactly as directed by your doctor. Do not increase or decrease any dose or the number of doses per day. Also, take this medicine for the exact period of time that your doctor has instructed. Do not stop taking VIRACEPT without first consulting with your doctor, even if you are feeling hetter. feeling better.

feeling better. Only take medicine that has been prescribed specifically for you. Do not give VIRACEPT to others or take medicine prescribed for someone else. The dosing of VIRACEPT may be different for you than for other patients. Follow the directions from your doctor, exactly as written on the label. The amount of VIRACEPT in the blood should remain somewhat consistent over time. Missing doses will cause the concentration of VIRACEPT to decrease; therefore, you should not miss any doses. However, if you miss a dose, you should take the dose as soon as possible and then take your next scheduled dose and future doses as originally scheduled.

Dosing in adults (including children 14 years of age and older) The recommended adult dose of VIRACEPT is 750 mg (three tablets) taken three times a day. Each dose should be taken with a meal or light snack.

Dosing in children 2 through 13 years of age The VIRACEPT dose in children depends on their weight. The recommended dose is 20 to 30 mg/kg (or 9 to 14 mg/pound) per dose, taken three times daily with a meal or light snack. This can be administered either in tablet form or, in children unable to take tablets, as VIRACEPT Oral Powder. Dose instructions will be provided by the child's doctor. The dose will be given three times daily using the measuring scoop provided, a measuring teaspoon, or one or more tablets depending on the weight and age of the child. The amount of oral powder or tablets to be given to a child is described in the chart below.

In measuring oral powder, the scoop or teaspoon should be level. * 1 level scoop contains 50 mg of VIRACEPT. How should VIRACEPT Oral Powder be prepared? The oral powder may be mixed with a small amount of water, milk, formula, soy formula, soy milk, dietary supplements, or dairy foods such as pudding or ice cream. Once mixed, the entire amount must be taken to obtain the full dose. Do not mix the powder with any acidic food or juice, such as orange or grapefruit juice, apple juice, or apple sauce, because this may create a bitter taste. Once the powder is mixed, it may be stored at room temperature or refrigerated for up to 6 hours. Do not heat the mixed dose once it has been prepared. Do not add water to bottles of oral powder.

For help in determining the exact dose of powder for your child, please ask your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist. VIRACEPT Oral Powder contains aspartame, a low-calorie sweetener, and therefore should not be taken by children with phenylketonuria (PKU).

HOW SHOULD VIRACEPT BE STORED?

HOW SHOULD VIRACEPT and all other medicines out of the reach of children. Keep bottle closed and store at room temperature (between 59°F and 86°F) away from sources of moisture such as a sink or other damp place. Heat and moisture may reduce the effectiveness of VIRACEPT. Do not keep medicine that is out of date or that you no longer need. Be sure that if you throw any medicine away, it is out of the reach of children. Discuss all questions about your health with your doctor. If you have questions about VIRACEPT or any other medication you are taking, ask your doctor, nurse, or pharmacist. Butler Faces Opposition

That could be bad news for George Butler, who may need all the help the LGBT community can provide. The Sherman Park Alderman is said to be in serious political trouble. He faces two strong opponents. Some sources report that his co-sponsorship of the DP registry riled his opposition. Most observers believe that Butler will make it through the primary but some of his supporters are expressing concern that he could lose next Tuesday. Even if victorious, he will undoubtedly face a very serious challenge in April.

Witkowiak Opposed

Aldermen James Witkowiak who represents the Walker's Point area, which includes nearly all of Milwaukee's LGBT bars and who supported the DP registry, also faces a primary. He is expected to finish first on Tuesday.

Hot Race in Riverwest

Another big race for Milwaukee activists is taking place in the Riverwest area where longtime County Supervisor Dorothy Dean is giving her up 13th District seat. Dean is a vocal supporter of LGBT rights and other progressive causes. Seven candidates are fighting for the right to take her place.

The newly formed LGBT political action committee, HRL PAC, has endorsed Dawn Miller due to the positive impression she made on members of the Riverwest Rainbow Association (which does not make endorsements). Miller has mounted a door to door campaign, but her ability to win the race is open to question. Willis Johnson, who is backed by labor, has a well-organized campaign and is also supportive on LGBT issues.

The third major contender, tavern owner R. Allen Brown is a legislative aide for State Senator Gary George. The Police and Firefighter Unions have endorsed him. Also in the race are nail salon owner Lennie Mosely, perennial candidate Jose Caban, Children's Court probation officer Robert Isabell, who ran against Dean in 1996, and Walter Love.

Czaja in Trouble

In the 22nd District, a longtime friend of the LGBT community, incumbent Supervisor Tony Czaja, is in serious trouble. Last May, Czaja, who has represented the West Allis district for over 10 years, was found guilty of loitering and illegal drug activity after he was found with a female prostitute outside of a drug house. Three opponents, including John Weisham, the brother of County Board Chairman Karen Ordinans, are running against him. Czaja's opponents make it clear that they are running against him and not his stands on the issues.

Open Common Council Seats

There are three hotly contested races for open seats on the Milwaukee Common Council.

Longtime Alderman and the current Common Council President Jim Kalawitz is giving up his Second District seat. County Supervisor Terrence Herron and Leonard Wells head up the list of candidates vying to represent his near Northwest side district. Herron has been pro-LGBT civil rights during his tenure on the County Board. Wells is an African American Police officer who headed the League of Martin, a minority Police officer organization. He has the backing of the Police Union and the AFL-CI0. His stance on issues of concern to the Gay community is not known. On the West Side, Fifth District Alderman Dan Schramm, who vocally opposed the DP registry, is also calling it quits. The race to succeed him is drawing interest because the two contenders for Common Council President, Aldermen Marvin Pratt and Tom Nardelli are reportedly backing candidates seeking to replace him. Pratt and Milwaukee's HRL PAC support James Bohl. Nardelli is backing Barbara Franzin.

The Common Council President appoints the members and Chairpersons of its committees. That can have a big impact on which proposals get passed and which never make it to the floor for a vote. Pratt is generally favorable to LGBT viewpoints on issues of concern to the Gay community. Nardelli isn't.

In the Eighth District, Alderman Wayne Frank is leaving the Common Council. Frank has been a friend of the LGBT community during most of his tenure. His near South Side district has a substantial but unorganized LGBT constituency. The HRL PAC is hoping that Gays living there will support Rick Kissell in his bid to replace Frank. He is opposed by two candidates who didn't respond to an HRL PAC survey. Kissell, on the other hand, showed a good knowledge of issues of concern to the LGBT community. Whether or not he can win in the primary is another story. Observers say that Kissell is not well organized and needs all the Gay votes he can garner on primary day.

The Unopposed

Six Aldermen are unopposed in their reelection bids. Gay activists say the good news is that they include Mike D'Amato, who engineered the successful effort to establish a Domestic Partnership registry and Marvin Pratt, who supported that effort. The bad news is they also include four anti-LGBT civil rights Alderpersons – Jeff Pawlinski, Tom Nardelli, Annette Scherbert and Susan Brier. There is talk of a write campaign against the unpopular Brier, but no one is certain if it will get off the ground. Brier voted against the DP registry and also made an attempt to cut City funding for AIDS programs.

What Does It Mean?

While the primary is not the final election, it is a very important step in the process. The bad news is that fewer than 20% of the electorate will cast their votes Tuesday. The good news is that a large LGBT vote can make the difference in a number of races.

The historical evidence shows that most voters don't care about primaries. Political activists within and outside of the LGBT community say that, like other minorities struggling to be heard, Gays and Lesbians can't afford the luxury of staying home during any election. The voting booth is a great equalizer where Gay and straight are all on an equal footing with an equal voice.

The LGBT voice raised in previous elections gained Milwaukee Gays a Domestic Partnership registry. Gay activists believe that a strong voice raised in this election cycle could lead to Domestic Partnership benefits for City and County employees and that in turn could set an example that private employers will follow. It could also promote candidates, who will later run for higher office.

Whether that progress will continue may well depend on how many of Milwaukee's Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgendered citizens turn out this Tuesday.


Milwaukee Mayor Jobn Norquist

In the race for Mayor of Milwaukee, incumbent John Norquist is the clear choice. Norquist has been a good Mayor for Milwaukee. His opponents haven't come close to making the case that they should replace him. Under the Mayor's stewardship crime has decreased, jobs have increased and taxes have been held in line. He has maintained open lines of communication with Milwaukee's LGBT community and signed the resolution authorizing the establishment of the City's Domestic Partnership registry. In a time of budget cutbacks, Mayor Norquist has continued the City's support of AIDS programs. He also regularly attends important community events to show that he values Milwaukee's LGBT citizens. While we disagree with the Mayor on some issues, such as his wholehearted support of the School voucher program, we also believe that his proven record of support for our community has earned him the enthusiastic support of the Milwaukee's LGBT community.

Milwaukee Common Council

Fourth District (Near West Side Downtown Lower East Side) – Paul Henningsen

The Fourth District may include the largest concentration of Gays and Lesbians in the State. Its important that it be represented by someone who understands Gay



doing just that. Henningsen faces five challengers. Only one of them, George Aldrich matches his concern for the well being of the district's LGBT residents. Aldrich is an articulate, intelligent candidate, who would make an effective Alderman. The fact that many Gays and Lesbians see him as an attractive choice, should Henningsen stumble in the primary, speaks volumes for his outreach to their community. It's a closer call than anyone expected, but we believe that Henningsen's effective leadership, history of working with the LGBT community, support of Gay causes and his experience has earned our support on Tuesday. Fifth District (Far West Side) -

In James Bohl, voters of Milwaukee's Fifth District have an attractive, intelligent candidate who would be a highly effective member of the Milwaukee Common Council. Bohl is far superior to his more conservative challengers.

Seventh District – (West Side) Fred Gordon

Fred Gordon has done an outstanding job not only on LGBT issues, but also in representing the best interests of his district. Gordon's opponents do not match his ability.

Eighth District – (Near South Side) **Rick Kissell**

Rick Kissell would be a thoughtful, articulate representative for all of the constituents of the Eighth District. Although his campaign organization is not as strong as it should be, Kissell shines in his knowledge of LGBT issues and of neighborhood concerns. He is the right choice.

Tenth District – (Sherman Park) George Butler

In George Butler, residents of the Tenth District have a soft spoken but highly intelligent and courageous advocate of their interests. Butler was a co-sponsor of the resolution that brought about Milwaukee's Domestic Partnership registry. His tireless advocacy for his district and his concern for all of its residents has marked him as an exceptional member of the Common Council. Butler deserves another term on the Common Council.

Twelve District – (Walker's Point) Jim Witowiak

This district has a substantial LGBT population and includes many of Milwaukee's LGBT businesses. Incumbent Jim Witowiak did vote against giving Domestic Partnership benefits to City employees but nevertheless, has maintained open and friendly relations with his LGBT constituents. While we wish he would be an enthusiastic Domestic Partners supporter, he has otherwise shown a willingness to listen to and act on the concerns-of LGBT business owners and deserves a spot on the April ballot.

County Board

See the Light

Thirteenth District – (Riverwest) **Willis Johnson**

It will be difficult to fill the shoes of departing County Supervisor Dorothy Dean, but seven candidates are trying to do just that. We believe that Willie Johnson Jr. deserves the support of LGBT voters in this Riverwest district. Johnson has promised to vote for granting Domestic Partnership benefits to County employees. He supports County funding for the ARCW Life Point needle exchange program. He believes that the County should provide funding to LGBT programs just as it does to programs targeting segments of other minority communities.

The Human Rights League PAC has endorsed one of his opponents, Dawn Miller. Miller seems equally committed to LGBT equality and while her passion and energy are refreshing we must give the nod to Johnson.

Miller's lack of political skills as shown in a recent campaign mailing call into question her ability to mount a serious general election campaign should she survive the primary. Furthermore, she has campaigned on the idea that the County should monitor foster care and W-2 programs, something the State has taken over.

Miller would have Milwaukee County reassume an unfunded State mandate at a time when such mandates are a major source of contention between the County and the State. That betrays lack of understanding of political reality, which in turn calls into question how effective she would be as a County Supervisor.

Johnson and Miller have both demonstrated a commitment to work for LGBT equality, and the residents of the district. However, the LGBT community needs more than passion to advance the notion of Gay equality, it needs effective leaders working on its behalf. We believe that Willie Johnson would be such leader if he were elected and is the better choice.

Twenty-Second District (West Allis) – Tony Czaja

This is not an easy endorsement to make. Incumbent Tony Czaja embarrassed himself when he was arrested buying drugs while in the company of a prostitute. To his credit, Czaja spent nearly two months in a drug rehabilitation program following the incident.

While his conduct is disturbing, we believe that Czaja's honest admission of his problem; solid record of support on LGBT issues and his record as a progressive and intelligent County Supervisor have earned him the benefit of the doubt. Voting for Czaja is not an endorsement of drug abuse or of his conduct. It is an endorsement of the idea that drug abusers can defeat their addictions and assume a responsible role as productive member of society. The endorsement is also a result of a lack of enthusiasm for his primary opponents.

HRL PAC Off on the Wrong Foot

It is disappointing to see that the new Human Rights League Political Action Committee decided to withhold the answers given in response to its candidate survey from the rest of the community. Like HRL-PAC, this newspaper also makes election endorsements and like any informed voter, the additional information provided by the candidates would have been welcome.

To be successful, the HRL-PAC must establish a bond of trust between itself and the LGBT community. It needs Gays and Lesbians to trust it with their dollars and volunteer time, therefore it should also trust the LGBT community enough to provide the information it used in making endorsements.

HRL-PAC tries to rationalize its decision. Its leaders say that since the group didn't tell the candidates it would publicize the results of its survey it would be unfair to let the public know *exactly* what those who seek their votes said about LGBT issues. That is a strange stance coming from a group that should be working to promote greater understanding of and participation in the electoral process. It suggests a disturbing naivete that any candidate would not clearly understand that a written response to ANY group could be used for or against them

The work being performed by HRL-PAC is needed. We were pleased to see it get off to a great start last summer with a wellattended event that raised thousands of dollars. This is its first election cycle and it is our assumption that its decision to deny information to the community it seeks support from is not a foretaste of things to come. We urge the release the survey results before the general election.

he democratic foundations of this country tend to get shaky when it comes to people on the margins, like queers. And ironically, even as Lesbians and Gay men are denied full civil rights by a government purportedly "of the people, by the people, and for the people," our own movement has yet to come up with a truly democratic process for itself.

Early in its history, the Lesbian and Gay liberation movement looked to direct democracy as its guiding principle. When I first became politically active in the early 1980s, most Lesbian groups still functioned as collectives, and any woman could have a vote after coming to a few meetings. The AIDS activist group ACT UP also established a democratic process for voting on actions and policies.

But as the Gay movement became more complex, our organizations (and not just the national ones) shifted to a sort of "noblesse oblige" model. The people making decisions about what queers "need" and "want" have, especially in recent years, been those with access to money.

Certainly, anyone who's ever sat through a collective meeting can't deny that decision-making from the top down is more efficient. The hierarchical set-up of much of the Gay movement has gotten a lot accomplished. But as one divisive event - the announcement, exactly two years ago, of the Millennium March on Washington - clearly demonstrated, the question of what gets accomplished by hierarchies can alienate a lot of queers.

Intense pressure from the left wing of our movement has succeeded in tempering the white, Christian, upper-middleclass tone of the Millennium March. Just weeks before the event, the board organizing the march is now 50 percent people of color, and decisions about the platform and the speakers have been opened up for public voting and input. If these changes seem largely cosmetic, they are still a big step away from the initial "Thou shalt have a march" decree by the Human Rights Campaign and the United Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches.

Since the blowout over the Millennium March, there's been a lot of talk about how our national organizations need to be more democratic and more accountable to the queers they supposedly represent. But that's hardly a simple task. It's sometimes much easier to start over than to try to "fix" an already existing system, but I wouldn't advocate scrapping any of our organizations.

There are basic changes that could be made to shift the balance of power. First, our organizations need to revamp their membership dues scales. Second, many of us pay those dues but never have a say in who sits on the boards of directors and, hence, in what endorsements our organizations make and what issues they work on. Ideally, and even though it would mean added time and paperwork, a group's board of directors should be elected by its members.

Similarly, the people who most often use the services of local organizations, such as gay community centers, rarely have input into what those services actually are. I'd like to see community center boards around the country having healthy representation from among the people they serve, not just those who can afford to donate or raise hefty sums of money.

The set-up of the newly formed National Gay Lobby, an online membership group seeking to expand queer activism through the Internet, is worth looking at. I dislike this group's attitude, and its executive director, Michael Romanello, made what I consider racist and sexist remarks in a recent commentary piece Why the Wailing and Gnashing of Teeth? which you can read at www.nationalgaylobby.org). But NGL's structure interests me. Anyone can join at a basic voting level for free, and members who donate \$12 a year are eligible to apply for board membership.

NGL also made a unique move when it

The most fascinating aspect of Topsy-Turvy is how it takes us behind the scenes of a theatrical production around the turn of the century. In detailing the transition of The Mikado from mere imaginings to staged reality, Director Leigh shows every aspect of the process: writing, casting, costuming, acting, singing and dancing rehearsals. Much of these sequences are not only informative but highly amusing. Because of these scenes, Topsy-Turvy's



half flows nicely. Unfortunately, the same cannot be said of the film's first half, which occasionally slips into torpidity.

Topsy-Turvy also benefits from two credible, capable actors in the central roles. Jim Broadbent develops Gilbert into

a slightly larger-than-life figure, but, as can be seen in several quieter, more serious moments, he has a solid grasp of Gilbert's essential humanity and insecurities. Allan Corduner's Sullivan matches Broadbent's Gilbert in giving his character three dimensions. But Topsy-Turvy is truly an ensemble piece, and thankfully excellent performances shine through in the supporting roles as well. Especially impressive is Timothy Spall as Richard Temple, Gilbert and Sullivan's top-billed actor.

It really helps if you're into opera or operetta if you plan on seeing Topsy-Turvy, due to its extended excerpts. 3 Stars

A Night In November

He's utterly horrified by the hatred and racism exhibited not only by Ernie, but also all the other Protestants in the crowd, as they heap scorn upon the visiting Irish team. Kenneth is repulsed by this display of bigotry, all of which seems so excessive and senseless to him. He feels soiled just by being there. After this life-altering experience, he never sees anything quite the same again. Even his marriage ruptures. His wife, who simply represents a softer, feminine version of the same vileness he encountered at the soccer game, repulses Ken.

Actor James Ridge is making his Next Act Theatre debut as Kenneth in A Night in November, does a superb job. In this twohour play, he's not only asked to tell the story through Kenneth's eyes, but also to be all the people this character interacts with, including his boss, coworkers, family members, even a kid on the street he encounters on a trip to his former home town. He gives a simply amazing performance, utterly convincing in every character he's called upon to be.

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
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
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
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Christian Taylor ... Not What You'd Expect! by Andy James



Many of us would agree that few kinks are as delicious as the interplay of rope and flesh.

Experts can do amazing things with restraints and ropes: full-body immobilization; elaborate rope harnesses; even suspension bondage, where a tied-up bottom floats mid-air like a kinky Peter Pan. But, fortunately simpler scenes are a cinch. It's cheap and easy to start experimenting with bondage; all it takes

is some clothesline, imagination, and the ability to tie a square knot.

Sure, it's great to use specialized gear like wrist-cuff restraints and bondage collars, but all a novice top really needs is a 50-foot length of clothesline. The nylon stuff, easy to find at your local hardware store, is a bit more slippery than cotton, but it has a nice feel against naked flesh. One thing to avoid is rope with a stiff reinforcing core - it can bite into nerves and restrict circu-Cutting lation. the clothesline into two 5-foot pieces, a 15-foot piece,

and a 25-foot piece will provide sufficient materials for a basic scene. If you're using nylon rope, seal off the ends with a match.

A first scene can be as easy (and hot) as tying a kneeling cocksucker's hands behind his back. Or a top can tie the bottomboy *to* something. A bed's an obvious choice; few things are prettier than a naked guy stretched out, vulnerable, dick pointing skyward, wrists and ankles tethered to the legs of the bed or to eyebolts screwed into the bedframe.

But be careful; whenever a guy's in bondage, the top takes responsibility for the well-being of both of them. Perhaps the most important safety consideration is to keep the blood circulating and the nerves free from harm: a too tight loop of rope around a wrist or ankle can do serious damage. For spread-eagle positions, it's far safer to use cuff-type restraints - usually leather but sometimes cloth-and-Velcro - that will spread the pressure over a wider area (and they look spiffy, too!). But note that metal handcuffs, despite their theatrical flair, can do harm. Also, bending limbs into stressful positions is, obviously, unwise.

And responsible tops keep checking the temperature of tied-up hands and feet; when they're cool to the touch, it's time to release them.

Raser

Novice tops can learn to make rope cuffs, looping the rope several times around the bottom's wrists held several inches apart, then winding it around the section between the hands. Tied off with a square knot, the handcuff-like arrangement keeps the wrists firmly bound without harmful pressure on the vulnerable inner wrists.

A fun thing for beginners to try is tying a bottom boy to a chair. Hands bound behind the chair back, rope wound tightly around torso and chair, ankles secured to the chair legs, hard-on where the bottom can't reach it but the top can... You get the picture.


Good bondage scenes strike a mental balance between safety and fear. The top



should feel firmly in control of the scene, with the bottom feeling vulnerable but ultimately safe. What's going to happen once the ropes are in place should be negotiated beforehand, and it's no faux pas for a top to ask, "How does that feel?" before proceeding further - or for the bottom to honestly tell him. The mood and pace of a scene can be fast and forceful or slow and elaborate. Discovering just what you prefer, either as Bondage Master or bondage slave, is part of the adventure.

Just remember to keep a decent pair of scissors at hand to release the bottom quickly, should the need arise. If the scene's well-planned, odds are good that there never will be a need - and that, soon after the ropes are coiled and the bed sheets changed, both guys will be eagerly planning their next bit of bondage fun.


