





DP Bill Advances In VT

Montpelier, VT - The Vermont House Judiciary Committee overwhelmingly approved a bill that would create "civil unions" for same sex couples. The bill grants all of the benefits and rights or marriage the state can legally offer.

"I'm incredibly proud of what we've done," said State Rep. William Lippert after House Judiciary Committee voted 10-1 to approve the bill. Lippert, the only openly Gay member of the Vermont Legislature, made the motion to recommend the bill. The lone dissenting vote came from Rep. William Mackinnon, who backed allowing same sex couples to marry.

The legislation is in response to a Vermont Supreme Court ruling that prohibitions on Gay marriages violate the State Constitution's "common benefits clause." The Court told the legislature to either legalize Gay marriage or come up with an alternative that allows same sex couples the same legal standing as that enjoyed by married heterosexual couples.

First Lady to March in Gay Parade

New York, NY - First Lady Hillary Clinton left no doubt as to where she stands on New York's St. Patrick Day Parade controversy. This weekend Mrs. Clinton became the first resident of the White House to march in a Gay parade, when she joined in an alternative Gay St. Patrick's Day march.

The controversy swirls around the refusal of the traditional St. Patrick's Day parade to allow the Irish Gay and Lesbian organization, LLGO to march with it down New York's Fifth Avenue. LLGO took the parade sponsors, the Ancient Order of Hiberians, to court over its exclusion of openly Gay Irish people. LLGO's suit was rejected.

Mrs. Clinton originally planned to march in the traditional parade. When told of the controversy, however, she said that she would join the alternative march adding that she will skip the traditional march unless it is inclusive. Clinton's opponent for New York's Senate's seat, New York Mayor Rudolph Giuliani was also invited to the alternative parade. He declined to attend.

Officials Remove **Textbook Mentioning** Gavs

Naples, FL - Collier County school officials yanked a European history textbook from a high school class after a teacher raised questions about its references to homosexuality.

Barron Collier High School teacher Terry Walters objected to "graphic descriptions of alternative and aberrant sexual practices during the Renaissance" in Houghton Mifflin Co.'s A History of Western Society.

Homosexuality is discussed in nine passages in the 1,063-page textbook, which is used in an advance placement class offering college credit for students who pass a nation-

"What really troubled me was the description of the 40-year-old guy with the 15-yearold boy," Walters said.

"No one, including gay-rights advocates, want that idea promoted," Walters said. The decision to pull the book comes as the school district considers whether Gays should be protected by an anti-harassment policy. Jack Bovee, social studies coordinator for Collier schools, said the class could have used two other district-approved textbooks for the course.

Margaret Sherry, a spokeswoman for Boston-based Houghton Mifflin, said she was not aware of any other complaints about the book used in colleges and high school advance placement courses. Houghton Mifflin found some older editions of the textbook and delivered them to Barron Collier two weeks ago.

MTV Pulls Bashing

New York, NY - The Starr Report by Michael Starr reports that MTV under pressure from the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, has yanked a video by The Bloodhound Gang that featured Gay bashing. The Bad Touch made by Blood Hound gang aired once on Feb. 7 to promote the U.K. group's new alternative rock album, Hooray

In the video, the group is walking around Paris when they see two men dressed as sailors, feeding each other French-Fries with their arms intertwined. The "sailors," who are portrayed as Gay are then attacked by the group and beaten up.

GLAAD officials immediately contacted MTV to lodge a protest. "We realize that the 'Bad Touch' video is a satire, but there's nothing satiric about a gay-bashing in any form, so we asked MTV to pull the video," says GLAAD spokesman Scott Seomin. Insiders say MTV has promised to re-edit the video before airing

Bradley's Blast Dr. Laura

The Internet - In separate appearances on GAYBC internet radio Presidential candidate Bill Bradley and his wife Ernestine blasted radio shock jock Dr. Laura Schlessinger over her on the air anti-Gay remarks. Dr. Laura, who holds a degree in physiology not psychiatry, has called Gays "biological mistakes" and 'deviants"

During his appearance on the Michelangelo Signorile show, Bradley said Dr. Laura's viewpoint on homosexuality, "makes me sick to my stomach." He added his agreement with those who say that Paramount should drop plans to syndicate a Dr. Laura TV

"I bet that there are enough gays and lesbians in Paramount, making it a good company today, that Paramount would not have its own interests served by continuing this sort of thing," Bradley said. "So, I think it should go

Ernestine Bradley made similar remarks when Signorile interviewed her last week. But Bradley and his wife part ways on the topic of Gay marriage. In response to a question on Gay marriage during an appearance at Mills Collage in Oakland California, Ms. Bradley said, "Gay marriage is the one question in which Bill has not seen the light of day ... Bill is very much in favor of, and has a record of voting that all gay and lesbian partnerships should have all the benefits (marriage conveys). The thing he has to grow a little bit on is the actual act of marriage."

Internet Activists Blast Laura

The Internet - Salon reports that a new web site, StopDrLaura.com is designed to build "a coalition against hate," say its sponsors. The web site is promoting a campaign to keep the controversial radio show host off the TV airwayes.

StopDrLaura features some of her more notable quotes on the subject of Gays and Lesbians such as her announcement that Gays are "products of a biological disorder" and "I call homosexual practices deviant.

The Anti-Dr. Laura site asks visitors to "flood Paramount with calls to stop Dr. Laura," and provides a phone number for chairman Kerry McCluggage.

"Dr. Laura is free to malign any minority she chooses, but Paramount Television is not required to aid and abet in the destruction of our civil rights and the denial of our humanity," says the site. "In the names of Matthew Shepard, Brandon Teena, PFC Barry Winchell, Allen Schindler, Billy Jack Gaither - in the name of every one of us - please take a stand against hate."

Also on the site, David Lee Emmy-winning executive producer of Paramount TV's Frasier says: "I think it is outrageous that Paramount chooses to be in business with a woman who is, I think, literally dangerous to the Gay community. She may not have a club in her hand, but she encourages an atmosphere where those who do wield weapons feel free to use them."

Internet guru John Aravosis of Wired Strategies is behind the new site. He says that Dr. Laura's blasting of Gays is not protected free speech. "If someone called a Jew a biological error, you think they'd get a TV show? I don't think so. When you defame African-Americans, it's racism. You defame gay people, it's free speech."

Website provides Info Source to Gay Voters

New York, NY - Super Tuesday 2000 marks the launch of GayVote.com (http://www.gayvote.com), a non-partisan website by Silicon Alley-based Mediapolis. GayVote.com, first launched for the 1998 elections, is the nationwide source for facts on presidential, House and Senate and gubernatorial candidates, their stands on gay issues, coverage of gay political news and online community political forums. The site will also feature the country's most prominent lesbian and gay writers with their takes on regional and national political races.

GayVote.com will take the pulse of lesbian and gay voters with exclusive surveys and polls and will question candidates on issues that matter to gay voters. Candidates will present their positions on controversial issues such as the Military's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy; state and local hate crimes legislation; the legislative battle to end discrimination in employment and housing; the legalization of gay marriage and the rights of lesbian and gay parents to adopt.

Throughout election 2000, GayVote.com will cover the campaign trail, track election results and publish breaking news from the primaries to the November elections.

NGLTF Calls For Investigation

Washington, DC-The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) is calling for a US Justice Department probe into the killing of Amadou Diallo, a Western African immigrant who died on Feb. 4, 1999 after New York Police officers shot him 19 times (out of 41 bullets fired). The officers were acquitted of second-degree murder charges by a jury in Albany, 150 miles north of the Bronx, where the incident occurred.

According to testimony offered at the officers' trial, Diallo was shot after holding up his wallet, which officers said they mistook for a gun. "This case - and others that have preceded it - raises questions that warrant a U.S. Justice Department review," said NGLTF Executive Director Kerry Lobel. "The Gay, Lesbian, bisexual and transgender community (GLBT) in both New York City and across the country has been affected by police brutality and racism.

Ms. Lobel issued her statement even though the Justice Department announced that an investigation into the Diallo murder is already underway following the not guilty verdict. Last week a spokesman of the US Justice Department said its investigators were looking at whether the officer violated Diallo's civil rights. If the Department finds that they did, the officers could face federal charges



Action Wisconsin AW President Testifies Against Internet Filtering Bill

Madison - On March 2, Action Wisconsin President Dan Ross testified against AB 266 before the Senate Committee on Education. AB 266 is a bill which requires Internet filtering software to be installed on all computers in schools that receive funding from the TEACH program (a state program to help schools and libraries get Internet access). The bill's author, Rep. Michael Huebsch (R-West Salem), accompanied by a representative of a filtering software manufacturer, testified that advances in filtering software meant that such software would not unduly block non-pornographic sites.

However, Ross presented examples to the committee of how that particular software blocked all or part of non-pornographic sites related to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered civil rights; State of Wisconsin sites on HIV/AIDS statistics and on teen pregnancy; a chapter of the Wisconsin State Statutes; and the text of Reggie White's speech before the State Assembly. He also explained to the committee how despite this overly broad text-based blocking, the software still could not guarantee that pornographic images would be blocked.

AB 266 had previously passed the State Assembly 76-23 on October 6, 1999, the Senate Committee has not taken any action on it.

Definition of Marriage Bills Introduced

Madison - Wisconsin has now had a "Definition of Marriage" bill introduced, as 1999 Assembly Bill 781 and 1999 Senate Bill 401. They have been assigned, respectively, to the Assembly Committee on Family Law and the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Consumer Affairs. They have not yet been scheduled for public hearings, and the portion of the legislative session dealing with new bills ends on March 30th. You are still encouraged to write your state representa-

tive and state senator in opposition to these bills.

The language of these identical bills defines marriage as being between one man and one woman, and refuses Wisconsin recognition of "marriage other than between one man and one woman" regardless of their validity in other jurisdictions. (Current law defines marriage as being between "husband and wife".)

It is NOT the same language as 1997 AB 104, which prohibited "marriages between people of the same sex". However, the intent is the same: a response to make sure that same-sex marriage is not recognized in Wisconsin, should another state decide to recognize it.

Domestic Partnership Lobby Day Planned

Madison - Action Wisconsin and Rep. Mark Pocan are planning a citizen's Lobby Day at the Capitol in Madison, in support of legislation recognizing domestic partnerships in Wisconsin. The day has tentatively been scheduled for Thursday, April 13th, and would consist of lobby training, issue briefing, and legislator visits in the morning, and a "people's hearing" on the topic in the afternoon.

In the mean time, Action Wisconsin encourages you to write your representative and senator in support of Assembly Bills 608 and 609. AB608 would create a statewide domestic partnership registry, with most of the rights and responsibilities of marriage; AB 609 would provide health insurance for domestic partners of state employees.


Local Elections and Presidential Primary, Tuesday, April 4th

Log Cabin Republicans Oppose Anti-Bush Ads

Milwaukee - The Wisconsin chapter of Log Cabin Republicans (LCR-WI) has announced that it does not support the decision of the national board of Log Cabin Republicans (LCR) to run radio advertisements which attack Governor George W. Bush. LCR-WI was never consulted when the national board deliberated over this issue and strongly disagrees with the decision.

The national board of LCR announced that it is launching a multi-state radio ad campaign which would state that Bush "said he would not meet with gay Republicans, and worse, he wouldn't hire them." The ad also states "Then Bush went to Bob Jones University, a place that preaches intolerance against the Catholic Church, gays and minorities, and he aligned himself with Pat Robertson and Jerry Falwell" The ad does not mention Bush's main rival, Senator John McCain, at all.

LCR-WI has maintained all along that LCR


should not endorse either major candidate for the Republican nomination, and should remain neutral, since a large number of members are supporting Bush. "But this ad campaign against Governor Bush is tantamount to an endorsement of Senator McCain," said Scott Evertz, President of LCR-WI. "It mimics the unfair attacks on Bush which have been coming from the McCain campaign concerning Bob Jones University, and throws in others relating to Log Cabin," he continued.

LCR-WI notes that the ad is clearly designed to influence the outcome of the primary elections, not to educate voters. It does not, for instance, take Senator McCain to task for inconsistently endorsing California's Knight Initiative, which would ban same sex marriages, when McCain would not weigh in on the Confederate flag issue in South Carolina, saying it should be left up to the voters of that state. Bush has consistently refused to endorse state initiatives, whether it be the Knight Initiative or the Confederate flag issue, although he, like McCain, opposes same sex marriage in his own state. Only an even-handed ad, which mentioned these issues, could be considered an ad designed to educate voters about the stands of the GOP candidates on lesbian/gay issues.

LCR-WI is also concerned about the inaccuracy of the radio ad. It inaccurately states that Bush has said he would not hire openly gay Republicans. "Bush has never said that," noted Jim McFarland, Political Director of LCR-WI. "Rather, he has made it clear in the various debates that he would not consider sexual orientation in making hiring decisions, but would only consider a person's merit and political views." Thus, McFarland believes, Bush would be willing to consider appointing an openly gay conservative Republican.

Finally, LCR-WI is concerned about the damage the ad campaign could do to efforts to meet with Bush and develop a dialogue with him should he become the Republican nominee. LCR-WI members who support Bush (most of the other LCR-WI members remain uncommitted) are convinced that Bush would have met with LCR after securing the nomination in preparation for the general

But Bush is not likely to look kindly on LCR after it launches an ad campaign clearly designed to hurt Bush's chances to win the nomination. "This could seriously damage efforts to build mutual trust between Governor Bush and LCR," LCR-WI Political Director McFarland noted. "LCR-WI wants Governor Bush and others in the Republican Party to know that there are many LCR members who do not support this divisive ad campaign, and we hope that he will recognize this should he win the nomination and let bygones be bygones when it is time to unite the party to win in November," LCR-WI President, Evertz said.



Spot ight Next Best Thing

Interviews with Madonna & Rupert Everett

Academy Award nominations have been announced for the upcoming March 26th show. And for the twelfth time in twenty odd years, (and tying Katherine Hepburn's record), **Meryl Streep** has gotten a nod. Why, you may be wondering did I bring this up while writing about forty-one year old Queen of Pop, **Madonna**? Well, it is for her role in *Music of the Heart* that Streep is

nominated this year. And Music of the Heart is the movie that Madonna turned down to do this, The Next Best Thing, the film in which she gets pregnant by her best friend Robert, who happens to be gay and is played by openly gay actor Rupert Everett.

Ironically, it is Madonna who stole from Streep the role in the big screen adaptation of the Broadway hit Evita. As we all know, Madonna got snubbed by the Academy for her effort. "You win some and you lose some," said Madonna, when asked what her feelings were about being given the cold shoulder by the Academy, even though she won the Golden Globe for Evita.

Madonna has continued piling up awards in the music industry, of course, and most recently, last week, won a Grammy for writing and performing the song *Beautiful Stranger* for the film *Austin Powers 2*.

It is doubtful that Madonna will be recognized with a nomination from any group next year for her acting in Next Best Thing. (Madonna was just nominated for a Golden Raspberry Award, the spoof on the Oscars, for Worst Actress of the Century for her roles in both Shanghai Surprise and Body of Evidence (Wow she has come a long way). However, she should be given credit for taking on a role as the woman in a most unconventional family in a film that would make George W. Bush's head turn faster than Linda Blair's in The Exorcist. As for her disco remake of Don MacLean's American Pie, featured in Next Best Thing, (and only available on the soundtrack and not as a single) Madonna may just get her Academy Award. Wouldn't that be nice?" she asks rhetorically. "Of course, the song was not my idea for the film. It was Rupert's. He convinced me to remake it."

Madonna certainly has come a long way

in the almost twenty years that she has been in the spotlight. Changing her image more often than Cher gets plastic surgery, the Material Girl seems to be content at this juncture in her very successful career. And why not? She has a baby, a record company (Maverick), acts, sings, writes music, and keeps her beautiful figure with assistance from daily routines of yoga (which she shows off in Next Best Thing)

and other exercises. She is also in tune with her spiritual self.

Finally, she knows that she is idolized by the gay community and is pretty involved with it, even if, in some instances, indishows that they do have a heart and soul, Madonna will do much to clear the air for all the straight people who line up.


When asked about her friendship with Everett, whom she met fifteen years ago through ex-husband Penn, Sean she explains, "We're both minorities." Of course she is referring to Everett's homosexuality and her gender. "But we both love to shop."

Next Best Thing is awash with gay men. Behind and in front of the camera. Openly gay, Academy Award winning director (Midnight Cowboy) John Schlesinger (who did not take part in the

interviews due to a recent heart operation) takes the helm and "takes the audience on a unique ride," comments Everett.

Everett, a few days later, had lots to say.

"Yeah, I met Madonna fifteen years ago," he says, "but got to know her closely quite recently. Probably over the past three years. I am totally in awe of her. She started her career with a gimmick and then faded away for a couple of months and then comes back with a new gimmick. And this has gone on for seventeen years. She is such a voracious learner. I am



so long."

It seems that recently, Everett has been bursting into song in his films. In My Best Friend's Wedding he carries the tune Say A Little Prayer, in Next Best Thing he sings American Pie with Madonna, et al, and in an upcoming film from Muriel's Wedding and My Best Friend's Wedding director P.J. Hogan, Everett explains what he does. "I can't seem to get away from song," he says, laughing. "In my next film Unconditional Love, I break into song with, you know how it goes?" he asks, giggling and then singing, I Can't Smile Without You.

Seeing that being openly gay has not affected his career in a negative way, at all, I asked Everett where he sees himself in five years. "I'd love to be a James Bond," he admits and then explains that he is working on a screenplay that is "Bond like."

"Other than that I just see myself as a movie mogul" he jests. "I want to produce, write some more and act but not direct."

What about kids of his own? I asked him if Madonna and he ever talked about him fathering her next best thing. "God no. I mean, if I were to be a father to a child, I can't think of a better mother but I am too tall for her and my paternal feelings were ignited at the beginning of the film but quickly doused when I realized how much work it takes to be a parent."

Int If These Walls Could Tall

uring the prelude to 1972, one of the segments in HBO's If These WallsCould Talk 2, there is a shot of a placard reading, "Women: The Largest Untapped Natural Resource." As HBO's talent roster for this popular series demonstrates, that is certainly no longer the case. The original If These Walls Could Talk featured a trio of stories about women and abortion, all set in the same house during different decades. If These Walls Could Talk 2 follows that narrative construct with one exception: This time, lesbians rule the

From a story by Sylvia and Alex Sichel All Over Me Martha Coolidge directs 1972, in which four college housemates, Linda (Michelle Williams), Jeanne (Natasha Lyonne), Karen (Nia Long) and Michelle (Amy Carlson), struggle to reconcile their lesbian sexuality and feminist politics.

Linda thinks it's possible "to have my freedom and be in love, too," but finds that belief tested when the four are booted from a campus women's group they helped found because their sexual orientation makes the other women uncomfortable.

Linda's own sexual taste comes into question when, during a visit to a local bar where butch/femme couples still stride the floor, she becomes attracted to Amy (Chloe

Sevingy), a slicked back butch wearing a pressed shirt and slacks, despite her pals' disgust. ("Tell me that's not a tie!" Karen exclaims.) While she gamely tries to act the part, however, Sevigny is woefully miscast. She lacks both the swaggering gait and imposing stature one expects of a butch and, as a result, what might have been a screen-burning pairing with Williams falls

Sparing us yet another dull parenthood story, writer/director Anne Heche raucously examines the process by which two dykes get preggo. After their ditching intended gay sperm donors, (do either of you guys

remember the zero parenting responsibility clause?) Kal (Ellen DeGeneres) drags her partner to a sperm bank, something about which Fran (Sharon Stone) is dubious: "What genius wants to jerk off in a cup for twenty-five bucks?"

Heche is wonderfully able to wring melancholy from humor, like the scene in which Fran and Kal try to narrow the donor roster. "I don't have sperm," Kal says, gesticulating her way through a stack of profiles."I'm freaking out because I don't have

"We'll never know what it would be like if just by our love we accidentally got pregnant," Kal continues, her hands blurring and her voice rising. "That we could say, "Oops! Look what we did, out of our love!"

"But we can't."

This DeGeneres' finest work in years. Stone, who finally gets to skip sex with some sagging-ass man to enjoy nookie with a real-life dyke, is totally up to the task. Heche's dialogue sometimes

slips into soapbox but quickly recovers. But another problem isn't so easily remedied.

With the exception of Nia Long in 1972 and Regina King here (who plays a sperm bank director) there are no other single

women of color on the roster: The leads, vast majority of supporting characters and the writers and directors are all white. I do not understand why writers and producers seem so reluctant today to create substantive non-white characters. And at the dawn of a new millennium, the inequity cries out to not only be addressed, but to be fixed. This program doesn't look like our

community, and that's a shame.

Despite the craftsmanship and intelligence of 1972 and 2000, I have seldom seen a piece of filmmaking with such an intelligent sense of queer history and deep emotive honesty as writer/director Jane Anderson's 1961.

Heterosexual imagery cut to Doris Day's 'Que Se Ra, Se Ra" fades into

The Children's Hour, at the very moment Martha (Shirley MacLaine) breaks down with guilt over her love for Karen (Audrey Hepburn). This image of hysteria widens to reveal that we are actually in a cinema, where two older women raptly watch the

These lovers, one with gray-streaked dark hair, the other with white hair neatly braided and pinned atop her head, lean on each other in silent support, one pair of hands clasped next to tear-dampened cheeks. The pained understanding on their faces not only speaks volumes about the isolation and secrecy of their lesbian lives, but also reveals the depth of their love.

Quickly interrupted by some rowdy teenagers, the two lovers awkwardly separate: Hands fall to the side, and a canyon of space comes between their shoulders, they slouch down in their seats. Subtly and effectively, Anderson repositions a piece of cinema many of us that today find dated and hateful as document of a time during which real life lesbian love struggled to be heard and seen, often with disastrous

Back at the house they have shared for nearly fifty years, Edith (Vanessa Redgrave) makes tea and lays out their night clothing while Abby (Marian Seldes) checks the hatchlings in her birdhouse. When a freak accident sends Abby to the hospital, a frantic Edith is left in the waiting room, forbidden a bedside visit because she isn't family. The next morning, Edith discovers that Abby has died, although no one woke her, because she isn't family.


Edith notifies Abby's only relatives and quickly separates closets and bureaus into

two rooms to look as though they were only roommates. Even treasured photos are taken from the walls. But no trauma compares to the crushing onslaught of slights Edith endures when Abby's bespectacled nephew (Paul Giamatti) and his wife (Elizabeth Perkins) arrive at the house after the funeral and instantly lay claim to everything, including the very house for which Abby and Edith paid together. (Even though Abby and Edith have agreed on many things, she is not mentioned in Abby's will and is, therefore, unprotected when she most

needs protection.)

Had all the heterosexual actors who played queer characters in the past decade inhabited them with such tender honesty and depth of spirit as Seldes and Redgrave do here, critics like me would have had scant reason to complain. Only briefly on screen, Seldes shines as a woman who delights in her love for another woman. Scene after scene, gesture after gesture, Redgrave's work is among the most glorious portrayals of lesbian love ever recorded. Redgrave's portrayal is the first towering queer performance of this new century and, from this point forward, a new and gloriously high standard for every heterosexual actor who sets out to inhabit one of our queer souls.

A Three Ring Circus By Bill Meunier

The four ring presidential circus is about to turn into a three-ring affair and possibly a tworing event. The insurgent candidacies of both Senator John McCain and former New Jersey Senator Bill Bradley appear headed for trouble.

On the GOP side of the arena, McCain is making lots of waves. Unfortunately for him they've largely been among independents and Democrats. Governor George W. Bush remains the likely nominee but he has been seriously wounded in quest to be the next resident of 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. in Washington DC.

The Steve Forbes candidacy pushed the Texas Governor further to the right than he probably wanted to go (at least publicly.) But even Forbes would have had enough sense to avoid giving a speech at Bob Jones University.

Bob Jones is to Catholics what Jerry Falwell is to Gays. In his speech Bush said nothing about Jones' anti-Catholic remarks. (He once called Catholicism a "Satanic cult.") Nor did he mention the school's ban on interracial dating.

You can bet that come November, plenty of Catholics are going to hear about Bush and his little visit to Bigotry U. He may need their votes to take states like New York, Ohio, Michigan and Illinois, all of which have large Catholic populations.

Add in the congressional scandal where the GOP picked a Protestant House Chaplain over a Catholic one, who had been recommended by the selection committee and you have trouble for the Republicans in a huge voting block.

McCain has been able to make the most of his bid because he's taken advantage of the American voter's willingness to vote for someone they like rather than a candidate they agree with. His feisty, "call 'em as I see 'em" image is hugely popular with the electorate.

Most Republicans, however, are less than thrilled. They like the Bush tax cut proposal. It's modeled on the Reagan tax cuts in the 1980's. Back then they called it trickle down economics, because it was supposed to trickle wealth down to the lower income people. In reality the lower income brackets were tinkled on, not trickled on and it wasn't money that came raining down.

The reality also was a tripling of the national debt. That's why this time it's rightly called "reckless" and potentially destructive to the healthiest economy in American history.

McCain was helped when the GOP a bunch of primaries up on the calendar. The idea was that the anointed one, Bush, would have a huge advantage because he had the most money and would be in a position to compete from coast to coast. The Democrats refused to play this game. They kept their primary dates in place, which gave their voters a chance to have a voice in the Republican contest. The lion's share of those that did voted for McCain.

Bush says those crossover voters are interfering with the Republican nomination process. With the polls show that McCain has a much better chance to beating the Democrats than Bush does its much more likely that crossover voters find McCain to be more appealing than Bush.

That joy ride is coming to an end now. McCain faces a string of primaries where crossover votes from are not allowed. His blasts at the religious right, while right on target, will not help him in states where religious conservatives make up 25 to 40% of GOP primary voters. Unless he is able to find a way to appeal to Republicans, McCain won't get much further than he already has.

His demise will provoke tears and much gnashing of teeth at the Log Cabin Republican headquarters. Gay Republicans have flocked to McCain's banner, a fact that has truly puzzled many. McCain has voted against Gay civil rights at every opportunity. During his muchpublicized meeting with the Log Cabin group, McCain told them that he doesn't agree with anything on their agenda. Just last week he announced his disagreement with "the Gay lifestyle."

For their part the Democrats are secretly dancing with glee over the prospect of facing George Bush. It's much easier to take on a guy who's raised over \$70 million from corporate interests when your party is embroiled in fundraising scandals. They should remember the lesson of 1980 and that guy no one thought could win, Ronald Reagan.

The Democratic race is winding down before it ever really heated up. Bill Bradley is no match for Al Gore. Anyone who wonders why should take in one of Bradley's speeches. Most people would rather watch paint dry than listen to that man drone on.

A challenger needs to make strong case in order to beat out the sitting VP for his party's nomination, especially in a healthy economy. Bradley hasn't come close to doing that.

What he has done is energize Al Gore, who is drawing enthusiastic responses from large crowds. After the March 7 primaries, it's likely that Bradley will either put his candidacy on hold or withdraw altogether. Gore backers are hoping that he doesn't put his new image and energy on hold.

What all this means is that after campaign spending about 300 million dollars, we are going to wind up with the same nominees everyone thought we would have before it all started with Bush against Gore.

Those who think of that as a waste would do well to take a closer look. The primaries bring out the best and the worst in candidates. This time around they've brought out a feisty Vice-President capable of showing emotion and a whining Texas Governor, who talks about inclusion and then denounces those who participate if they don't go his way and who apparently wouldn't know a bigot if one slapped him the face

It should be an interesting fall.



New Tests for Cervical Cancer

The New York Times reports that new tests for cervical cancer may "replace the Pap smear because they make it easier to detect possibly cancerous cells and are more reliable." According to the Times, the Pap test can "overlook cancerous conditions in up to 30 percent of women who are at risk for cancer."

Two companies recently received patents for new approaches to cervical cancer screening. One of the tests, from Matritech, will improve upon the Pap test, by making cancerous and pre cancerous cells collected in a smear glow in the dark or turn red so technologists can identify them easily. Matritech's test was shown to be 100 percent effective in detecting cancerous and pre cancerous cells in two pre clinical studies, while a third study, published in the November-December 1999 issue of Acta Cytologica, found that the test identified cancerous cells in about 97 percent of the cases that were later marked as likely to develop into progressive cancer.

Meanwhile, the Digene Corp. developed a test that searches for evidence of specific strains of the human papillomavirus (HPV), which is related to most cases of cervical cancer. Two recent studies published in The Journal of the American Medical Association showed the test to be about 84percent effective in detecting cancerous and pre cancerous cells

Digene's test, however, is not recommended for younger women, since HPV is present in many young sexually active women whose bodies will naturally fight off the infection. Because of this, the test would supply many false-positive results.

Do Gender Differences in Viral Load Predict Differences in HIV Disease Progression?

Studies on the different viral load (VL) levels among men and women at a given level of HIV infection, HIV disease progression, or whether the differences are important in recommending gender-specific Viral Load level thresholds for initiation of antiretroviral therapy (ART), have been inconclusive.

The study included HIV-infected, ART-naive men and women greater than or equal to 13 years of age who had at least one VL measurement. Combined data analyzed differences in VL by gender using VL assay type, CD4 count, form of transmission, age, race, and gen-

Although differences in Viral Load levels existed by gender prior to initiation of ART, these differences were not found to be associated with survival time to AIDS-Opportunistic Infection or death nor with the prognostic value of first VL on HIV disease progression. Data does not suggest a change in the treatment guidelines based upon gender and viral load at this time.

Time to AIDS, was similar for men and women, analyses resulted in a raised relative risk for AIDS in women. These results can be interpreted in two ways. First, results show directly that single measures of viral load are lower in women than in men, whereas time to

AIDS is similar for men and women, which implies that at the same viral load women have a higher risk of AIDS. Second, the same time to AIDS would be predicted at a lower viral-load threshold (about 50%) in women than in men.

Results are best interpreted not as showing differences in time to AIDS according to sex, but rather that there is a different relation between viral load and AIDS in men compared with women

HIV-1 Superinfection and Acceleration of Disease

Another story coming out of the recent San Francisco conference reports that Canadian researchers described what appears to be the first report of HIV-1 "superinfection" that was followed by more rapid progression of HIV disease. The fact that HIV-1 infection does not necessarily result in resistance to subsequent infection has significant public health implications and emphasizes the importance of safer sexual practices between HIV-infected


The Ottawa researchers reported on a case of a HIV positive male (Patient A) whose 8 year old infection was not progressing. The man had never received HIV medications and had undetectable HIV viremia levels in his blood. After initiation of a sexual relationship with a man with advanced HIV disease and extensive antiretroviral exposure (Patient B), Patient A quickly developed an increasing viral load and a declining CD4 Tcell count.

HIV RNA from Patient A's plasma specimens (A1) before "new" exposure; and sample A2 - plasma after "new" exposure; and Patient B (sample B plasma) were cloned, sequenced and analyzed.

The analysis proved all clones from sample A1 were unrelated to those from sample B. However, analysis of sample A2 revealed significant structure to sample B.All other clones from sample A2 were closely related to clones from sample A1.

Analyses from 12 unselected patients revealed that these were easily distinguishable from results from samples A1, A2 and B.





The Next **Best Thing**



The Next Best Thing has a lot to recommend it to the LGBT community. including Madonna and out Gay actor Rupert Everett. Director John Schlesinger's previous works include powerful films that don't shy away from LGBT themes. Midnight Cowboy certainly qualifies; as does Sunday, Bloody Sunday, which starred Peter Finch as a man caught up in a bisexual triangle.

Abbie (Madonna), the owner of a yoga school, lacks a happy love life. In fact, the film begins with her breaking up with a boyfriend (a relationship not the least bit explored). Robert (Everett) is her Gay best friend. That friendship changes forever when a night of drinking and sex ends in pregnancy! The film tries to explore the complications of a straight woman having a Gay man's son. Such situations surely exist, though more often through invetro-fertilization than through "the act". It's a story worth exploring at a time when traditional definitions of family and marriage are in flux.

The Next Best Thing would be better as a drama. Instead, it focuses on campy

comedy, only gradually building towards credibility. Everett arguably is one of today's best comic actors, and here adds a serious side to Robert (though the father role is oversimplified and idealized). Madonna, never a first-rate actress, doesn't add much to her portfolio here. The plot and performances reach for our sympathy, but the script is more melodramatic than dramatic.

With stars Madonna and Everett, The Next Best Thing will undoubtedly draw a wide audience. LGBT viewers will find in this film the virtue that it at promotes tolerance for non-traditional families. But, if you're seeking a more credible or profound exploration of the subject matter. you'll be disappointed.

Drowning Mond

Big, bad Mama, Mona, has developed a rather dubious reputation in Drowning Mona. Played to all of her evil glory by Bette Midler, Mona has more than her own reputation to deal with - the whole town hates her.

So when Mona is murdered (during the first five minutes of the film), everyone in the small New York hamlet is surprised and relieved. "Let's celebrate!", the police chief's daughter, Ellen (Neve Campbell) proclaims after hearing the news of Mona's demise.

Drowning Mona is a comedy to be sure as well as a who-done-it. So, who killed Mona? The problem is that all who knew her are suspects. Everyone, we learn, had good reason to want her dead.

Mona lived in Verplank, New York, a quiet town located on the banks of the Hudson River. The most exciting thing to happen there is the annual knife-throwing contest. In Verplank, everyone drives a Yugo complete with personalized license plates. Chief of Police Wyatt Rash (Danny De Vito) loves to sing show tunes. But there is never a dull moment when Mona is around. And she appears

throughout the film in flashbacks.

Jamie Lee Curtis, Casey Affleck, Marcus Thomas and William Fichtner fill out the adequate cast. The good-looking Affleck is a landscaper and about to be married to the Police Chief's daughter. Curtis (Rona) is a waitress out to seduce both Mona's husband Phil. played by William Fichtner and Mona's son, Jeff (Marcus Thomas).

Drowning Mona is filled with wacky comic humor and Midler fans won't be disappointed. Mona knows "rough talk" and isn't afraid to use it. (Neither is Miss Midler as witnessed at her recent Milwaukee concert.)

Holy Smoke

Holy Smoke can teach you three things. For one, its shows you how far Director Jane Campion has fallen since her critically acclaimed hit, The Piano. Secondly, it shows you how to take an otherwise interesting, novel subject, cult deprogramming, and utterly waste it. Thirdly, if you really want to see what Harvey Keitel looks like in a red dress and lipstick, this is probably your only

The film begins in a promising fashion, as we witness the spiritual awakening of a young Australian woman, Ruth (Kate Winslet). She falls under the spell of a guru while vacationing in Delhi, India. Back in her hometown of Sydney, her parents (Julie Hamilton and Tim Robertson) are quite understandably upset and concerned. Mom visits her and gets Ruth to accompany her back to Sydney. At this point, the family has enlisted the aid of an American cult deprogrammer, P.J. Waters (Keitel).

A cult deprogrammer and a seriously deluded girl, stuck together in an emotional and mental tug-of-war. This scenario certainly offers a potentially rich vein of drama, but that's not where Holy Smoke goes. Instead, the setting is only a vehicle for Keitel and Winslet to have a tawdry sexual affair. It's ugly, disgusting, unconvincing and utterly ridiculous. The film simply self-destructs after the first 20-odd minutes into unattractive sexual

The characters are poorly developed and act in unconvincing and poorly motivated ways. The Ruth- P.J. relationship is simply not credible. It's not that Winslet and Keitel are bad actors, but they are caught in a bad movie containing a script with cataclysmic failings. Ruth's family comes off as bigots and complete idiots, generating no sympathy from us. They're in the film for comic relief, a complete misstep in my opinion. And then there's Pam Grier (Jackie Brown), who, with a few minutes of screen time as P.J.'s assistant and part-time lover, Carol, must won-

der how she ended up in such a muddled

There's no insight or incisive thinking in this storyline, nor does it effectively address cults, faith, affairs or deprogramming. Instead, what Holy Smoke does have to offer is another example of the film industry's tendency to create "happily ever after romances" in the least likely and most unpalatable of circumstances. The end result is laughable, boring, silly and a miserable flop.

Hobson's Choice

Harold Brighouse's Hobson's Choice is an interesting look at dramatic social changes in England at the turn of the last century, doing so through the lives of an aging, alcoholic bootmaker and his power struggles with three rebellious daughters. What could have been a King Lear - like drama is instead, in Brighouse's hands, an engaging comedy.

The action takes place in Salford, Lancashire, in 1880. We find ourselves in the bootmaking shop of the rapidly declining sot, Henry Hobson (Jim Baker), who tends to business mainly by leaving all the work up to his daughters and the laborers. Eldest daughter, Maggie (Laura Gordon), keeps the books while Alice (Deborah Staples) and Vickey (Katheryn Phillips) mind the shop. Timothy Wadlow (Jonathan Smoots) and William Mossop (Lee E. Ernst), meanwhile, assemble boots in the cellar.

Hobson tries but fails to control his business, daughters' lives and that of his own. He blusters, issues orders, all to no avail. Maggie emerges as a true protofeminist. In this family we social change sweeping England in microcosm. In the late 19th century, social class and sex role distinctions began to blur. Hobson represents the old order. Maggie, however, seems thoroughly modern to our eyes.

The Milwaukee Rep production does Brighouse's Hobson's Choice justice through a fine cast, excellent set designs (Rosario Provenza) and period costumes (Liz Covey). It gives us a history lesson in a most entertaining way: through identifiable characters, a timeless plot and a witty script, brimming with both punchlines and powerful social criticism.

Classical Different 1 **By Charles Grosz**

This season, Milwaukee's International Arts Festival is celebrating Jewish heritage with performances by almost every performing arts group in town. Most musical offerings in the festival have so far maintained tenuous connections to the Jewish theme. Last weekend's concert by Present Music presented a full evening of this ancient culture, and did so with thoughtful programming and impressive performances.

Congregation Shalom served as the unusual venue for the concert, the beautiful sanctuary providing both appropriate atmosphere and sympathetic acoustics. The two major works of the evening, pieces by Osvaldo Golijov and Steve Reich, were framed by short prayers sung by Milwaukee Cantors Jerome Berkovitch and Karen Berman. Both singers delivered the pathos and sincerity needed to convey that the were not just folk songs, but a glimpse into historical heritage.

Golijov's work, The Dreams and Prayers of Issac the Blind is based on a 13th century Kabbalah manuscript, infused with personal memories of the composer. Scored for string quartet and clarinet, the work employs

numerous sonorous effects. The strings play plaintive passages with no vibrato, suggesting chanting of the dead. The clarinet slides between notes, imitating the human voice in wild revelry.

The musicians delivered a first rate performance, displaying wondrous technique and musical depth. Violinists Sharon Levinthal and Eric Segnitz, violist Brek Renzelman and cellist Karl Lavine played as a single unit, producing a color range comparable to the sanctuary's stained glass windows. Clarinetist William Helmers played with controlled abandon, impressing all with his ability to switch from frantic Klezmer style to serene introspection.

Following intermission the strings returned to present Reich's Different Trains. This autobiographical work deals with fate, and how the trains Reich rode as a child could easily have been those transporting Jews to concentration camps just across the ocean. Taped music and voices combine with the live performers, offering a fascinating and emotional work. The rendition was outstanding, a truly world-class performance. Levinthal's concentration remained undaunted by many abrupt tempo changes enforced by the pre-recorded tape and Lavine's chameleon ability to change tone color was mystical. Intensity was never allowed to wane, even during extended frantic passages. What a shame this ensemble will not perform this work outside of Wisconsin.

Haydn: The Creation Review by John Jahn

Austrian composer Franz Joseph Haydn (1732 - 1809) was one of the great masters of the Classical period in music. An extremely prolific and suc-

cessful composer, he is remembered best, perhaps, for his 104 symphonies. Among many other works, though, were two great oratorios: The The Seasons and Creation. The Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra Chorus superbly performed the latter work last weekend.

The impressive Creation is a 100plus minute long work in three parts

retelling the Biblical account of the beginning of the universe and life on earth. After an orchestral introduction representing "Chaos," an archangel intones: "In the beginning, God made

Heaven and earth..." What follows is some of the most glorious music ever composed, dramatic, yet structured and restrained. It represents Haydn in old age, influenced by his friend, the young Mozart, and at the top of his form.

The orchestra sounded forth in great beauty under the baton of German choral conductor and Bach expert Helmuth Rilling, making his MSO debut. Soprano Donna Brown, tenor James Taylor and bass-baritone Nathan Berg, representing three archangels, clearly

> and beautifully mastered the recitatives and arias. The MSO Chorus gave the impression of a heavenly choir, filling Uihlein Hall with sparkling sound. The concert was a potent combination symphonic, choral and solo voices, all under expert leadership, and performing a sublime piece of music.

The next MSO classical concert takes place March

31 - April 2. Titled A Celebration of the Baroque, the concert will feature music of Handel, J. S. Bach and Rameau. For tickets and further information, call 1-(800) 291-7605.

Hard Action Reviewed by Frank Shank

This is my first attempt at a porn review, and do you know what I quickly surmised? It's hard to take notes with one hand, especially when you are using the same hand to... hummm, how do I say this relatively discreetly... test the arousal factor of a video?

After 20 minutes of seascapes, beaches, surfers and verbal banter, the start of Hard Action is totally non-sexual. Interspersed between outdoor scenery we see three young men as they waken ready to start another hard day hangin at the beach.

The first one to hit the sand, complete with surfer stuff, is 19 year old porn virgin [Chris Jennings]. Nice hard swimmers body, and a promising bulge are outlined in his painted-on wetsuit.

After a little surfing action from Jennings, we see 18 year old porn veteran Justin Wagner watching as he walks up the beach. They meet and chat, with Jennings informing him that his parents are gone for the weekend and he has free use of the house. Oh, and by the way, him and his girlfriend have split. (You can just see Justin's eyebrows arch at that!)

Interspersed, you see luscious **Ted Cox** strutting down the streets of the coastal city wearing his red muscle shirt, and jeans tucked into his biker boots (image, baby). Even though he stood out in the intro of the film as he rose to start the day, showered and dressed, Cox makes an immediate hard impression.

Cox runs into Jennings and Winger and sits and is chatting with them for a while before relating "hot wet dream".

You enter Ted's dream as you see him waking up, and is that boy irresistible in the morning! Cox sleepily pulls down the sheet and you get to see that very well put together body, and starts lazingly stroking his thick ropy dick, with his warm balls sliding up and down in his sack. Slow, long strokes is all it takes before the cum slowly globs out onto his side.

After telling his story, Cox heads off with a promise to stop by Jennings house later for a beer. Winger takes the oppor-

tunity to get a little and heads back to Jennings' with a twinkle in his eye. Winger has long, curly auburn tresses, a hard gangly build and comes across kinda fem.

Within minutes of arrival, Jennings is de-pantsed and his pretty, nice sized dick is buried down Winger's throat. Jenning's cock and low hanging balls provide a nice meal for Winger, who eventually offers his horse dick (yeah, those skinny femme types always seem to have big old anacondas) to Jennings' inexperienced mouth. After going inside, it doesn't take long before you hear Jennings cry out "Let me have some of that, strips Cox and demonstrates he doesn't know how to suck dick very well.

After a little 69 action, Cox seems bored and offers up his butt that Jennings fucks hard and comes quickly all over Cox's bubble butt. Exhausted after all that work, he rolls onto his back, throws his legs in the air and Cox shows he knows how to throw a fuck even if his dick isn't as huge as Wingers'. Jennings enjoys it so much his toes are curling with pleasure from the intensity of the action he is receiving. Then Cox rolls him onto his belly and gives it to him long, hard and deep as Jennings' face betrays a vast array of pleasure and pain. Cox finally pulls out at the last minute so we see his big load explode all over Jennings.

Overall; Hard Action is a really good film especially if you like your men just past boyhood. The big letdown, in my opinion, is that like so much of Gay porn, there is little affection and no kissing.

Think the foot is hot? You're not alone. Renowned sex expert Havelock Ellis wrote, "Of all the forms of erotic symbolism, the most frequent is that which idealizes the foot. ... It would seem that even for the normal lover, the foot is one of the most attractive parts of the body." Got that right, Havelock.

The foot is a major erogenous zone, as many of us know, er, first-hand. Rich in pleasure-producing nerves, the soles and toes are, as Dr. Alfred Kinsey pointed out, "areas which may be erotically sensitive under tactile stimulation." But hey, as in most matters sexual, the opposite can also be the case. Stripping off the shoe and sock, getting one's hands on the five-toed fella, playing with the pretty thing... it can easily be a power trip.

There's also the powerful meeting of

foot and dick. While rubbing your feet all over a partner's body can be fun for all concerned, jacking him off with your sole can be truly special. And there's toe-in-the-ass fucking, too.


As in most matters sexual, foot play has its own specialists, organizations, and porn. Yes, there are foot size-queens, while others go for the aesthetic, preferring the beautiful foot to the merely big. And, because the combination of foot sweat and bacteria can produce some mighty potent odors, some guys really get off on the smells, from mild to truly ripe. (The foot, after all, harbors the same sort of bacteria responsible for bleu cheese.) The more fastidious among us, meanwhile, prefer their feet newly washed and gleaming.

Many of the larger cities have ongoing foot-play parties, where like-minded men can get together for a game of "this little piggy." While genital sex may be on the menu at these shindigs, often the play is confined to feet; the sight of a puppy pile of guys licking, sniffing, and sucking can, depending on one's bent, seem either silly or an instant erection-producer.

Unfortunately, my favorite foot-play magazine, with its well-endowed cover boys thrusting their size 12s at the camera, is no longer published. But there's plenty of foot porn out there. Thanks, too, to the Web, it's easy to find foot fetish pics, and only a bit harder to locate someone who shares a yearning for feet.




Young Men On the Pleasure Trail is finally on the market after a hair raising incident with the LAPD. I spoke to Sam Dixox president and director of Boiling Point Productions who told me a disturbing story about the production of the film. Seems that the L.A.P.D. arrested the cast and crew after they had finished filming the video in the Santa Monica Mountains in LA County. They were charged with sodomy and conspiracy to commit sodomy, a law that is not even on the books in California. But that is not the worst of it. When the L.A.P.D brought the cast and crew into the police station they chained them all to a bench while they were playing the footage for all the other officers to see and taunted them while they were chained up according to Sam Dixon. A special prosecutor was assigned to try the case and to find a way to make the charge of conspiracy to commit sodomy stick, which would make it a felony charge (not because of the word sodomy, but because of the word conspiracy).

If this could happen in LA it could happen anywhere if it goes unchecked. The homosexual community should be up in arms about this as it is a blatant attack against the gay community and our constitutional right of free speech. The reason that this has gone unchecked is because

the homosexual community saw it as an attack against the adult industry.

In reality this incident would not have happened if they were filming a straight video and is an attack against homosexuals in America. Just because this happened to a producer of adult films does not make it right.
