

#### **FESTIVAL SITE**

2001 will see PrideFest at the Henry W. Maier Festival Park (Summerfest grounds), along Milwaukee's lakefront for the sixth consecutive year.

#### DIRECTIONS

Once in Milwaukee, take 1-43 or I-94 to the I-794 spur. Exit right at Plankinton Avenue (Exit 1D) or exit left at Jackson Street (Exit 1E) or exit left at Lincoln Memorial Drive (Exit 1F). Follow the green and white signs with the red smiley faces to the Henry W. Maier Festival Park. Watch highway signs for construction detours.

#### **PARKING**

Ample parking is available both in privately operated lots for a fee, or along city streets (meter parking). Disabled parking is available in Lot G for a fee. Vehicles must display handicap plates or permit. Vendors with booth spaces will receive directions to specific gates for loading/unloading.

#### **BRING FOOD, GET IN FREE**

This year, PrideFest will sponsor its fourth food drive for the Hunger Task Force of Milwaukee. You can get **FREE** admission to the festival if you bring four or more non-perishable items of food to the gate from 4:00 to 8:00 p.m. Friday and noon to 2:00 p.m. Saturday.


Over 3.5 **TONS** of food have been collected at PrideFest during the past three years, and the community is encouraged to continue its generosity.

The Hunger Task Force will distribute the food to the Emergency Food Pantry Network, comprised of 100 pantries, including some that are run by AIDS care providers.

The pantries are staffed by more than 700 volunteers and serve about 44,000 people each month in the greater Milwaukee area. The majority of these people are children.

Preferred food items include: Canned tuna, canned and dried beans, peanut butter, macaroni and cheese, canned stews, meat, and chili; canned fruits and vegetables such as corn, green beans, and peas; boxes of corn flakes, oatmeal, saltines, and muffin mixes; all soup products, canned or packaged; pasta, rice, and boxed potato mixes. Powdered and canned milk; baby formula of any type is always in need.

The Hunger Task Force of Milwaukee has its beginnings in 1970 when a group of citizens expressed their concerns about childhood hunger. This group organized as Citizens for a Central City School Breakfast Program, which sought to work with the community and the Milwaukee Public Schools to establish a pilot school breakfast program. The group incorporated in 1974 under its current name, Hunger Task Force of Milwaukee. The Hunger Task Force's mission is to prevent hunger and malnutrition by providing food to people in need and by promoting social policies to achieve the permanent end of hunger.

#### **ID BRACELET**

#### Get Carded, Stay Carded

There is nothing like an ice cold beer or wine cooler to quench the thirst while attending PrideFest! Of course, state law requires all festival patrons to be of legal drinking age. To best comply with this law, and to reduce the constant hassle of carding, PrideFest is doing what many other special events are doing – ID bracelets.

Festival-goers who plan to drink beer or wine need only show their driver's license or ID once and have a bracelet snapped on their wrists by the volunteers from the Holiday Invitational Tournament. Bracelets will be available at tables located near the beer/wine ticket booths. Patrons must have wrist bands on prior to purchasing drink tickets. Ticket sellers and bartenders will be instructed not to serve those who do not have wrist bands.

Bracelets are required regardless of age and apparent wrinkles for anyone buying or consuming alcohol. Different colored bracelets will be provided each day of PrideFest. Patrons without a bracelet spotted by security personnel with beer or wine may be challenged to provide proof of age.

# VOLLEYBALL FOR THE ATHLETICALLY MOTIVATED

For those of you who want to get more of a work-out at PrideFest, check out the volleyball courts located on The Greens located directly across from the main gates behind the fountain. It doesnit matter whether you are a die-hard spiker or just a beginner ñ Social volleyball is for everyone!

Social volleyball has become a PrideFest tradition. With ample bleacher seats along the sides, it also offers great entertainment. If you're not athletically motivated, you can sit awhile and catch some sun while cheering on your favorite athlete or team.

Members from GAMMA, a Milwaukee athletic club, will be on hand to set up nets and lend balls. Sweat is the only thing you will pay to play. There will be plenty of pick-up games Saturday and Sunday. The nets will be up each day from noon until the last player has hit his or her final volley.

Wisconsin's Pride March will step off at 7:30 p.m.

Friday, June 8th. This is the second evening march PrideFest has hosted. Last year's Friday evening march proved to be such a successs,

PrideFest wants to capture that excitement once again as part of the first-day-of-Pride activities.

"The march serves as our grand entry," said Michael Goertz, PrideFest's new March Coordinator. "We want everyone to come

downtown on Friday night and show their Pride. And then join in on the march as it snakes its way to the front gate of the festival. Let that excitement flow onto the festival grounds."

Marchers and units will assemble along North Harbor Drive. At the 7:30 p.m. step-off they will head north to Michigan Avenue; west on Michigan to Cass; north on Cass to Wisconsin Avenue; west on Wisconsin to Milwaukee Street; south on Milwaukee to Chicago Street; and then east to the front gates of the festival.

There will be awards for first place marching unit, first place decorated car and first place float. Units are advised to incorporate this year's festival theme: People. Pride. Power. into their

decorations. Elaborate floats are encouraged for the joy of all.

If participants want instructions on illuminating a float, please contact the PrideFest office for a booklet. The Marching Units, decorated cars, and floats can enter for \$35.00 until May 19th and \$50.00 after May

20th. March applications are available at the PrideFest office and on the web page, www.pridefestmilwaukee.com

# TICKET PURCHASE TO GO FURTHER THAN ADMISSION TO THE FESTIVAL

You will be paying a little bit more to get into the festival, but with good reason. One dollar from every ticket sold at the front gates will be donated to the Cream City Foundation and ear-marked for the purchase of a building for the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center. General daily admission tickets will be \$8 this year.


"The last time we increased ticket prices was in 1999," said festival Co-Director Christine Klein. "Then it was to cover administrative costs. This time the reason is a bit more involved. For each admission ticket sold at the gate during the 2001 festival, \$1 will go to the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center's Building Fund to help them secure the much needed home of their own.

Michael Lisowski, Co-Director, said that the idea was originally brought to PrideFest by Wisconsin IN Step editor William Atewell. "Mr. Atewell once again had his finger on the pulse of this community. He saw that the Center was in need of assistance and that PrideFest was in a position to help," noted Lisowski. "When the Council was approached with this proposal, they were ecstatic! The Community Center is such a valuable asset to our community. The Council

unanimously agreed that we had to do what we could to help."

"Cream City Foundation is extremely pleased with this cooperative effort to help the Milwaukee LGBT Community Center find a 'home of its own." said Patrick J. Milliren, Executive Director of CCF. "CCF is always looking for great opportunities and the generosity of PrideFest is outstanding. We are excited about the future of this project and our community."

The Cream City Foundation, LGBT Community Center and PrideFest signed the final agreement for this very special contribution at the PrideFest Town Hall Meeting on April 12th. Based on past year's ticket sales, the donation is expected to be between \$8,000 and \$12,000. The funds will be held by CCF for up to six years from the date of the donation. If the Community Center does not purchase a building by the end of that period, the funds will be transferred to the CCF General Fund, and dispersed to other community organizations.

# RAINBOW FLAGS FLY ALONG CITY STREETS – THE TRADITION CONTINUES

PrideFest's Rainbow flags have added both color and symbolism to the streets of Wisconsin's City of Festivals since 1995. They serve as an acknowledgment of Milwaukee's Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender citizens, and boldly make a "We are here!" visual statement to locals and visitors alike.

Designed by Gilbert Baker of San Francisco, California in 1978, the Rainbow flag is internationally recognized as the rallying banner of the LGBT community. According to its designer, each stripe represents a different aspect of life: Red is for Life; Orange is for Healing; Yellow is for Sun; Green is for Nature; Blue is for Art; and Violet is for Harmony.

Rainbow flags will once again fly alongside the flags that represent the other festivals that use the Summerfest Grounds for their annual events. Total cost, which includes flags, unfurlers, poles, holders, permits and contractor fees, come to approximately \$150 per flag.

Funding for this tradition is made possible through the generosity of the individuals who make donations to PrideFest through the annual Proud Crowd campaign, the main pre-festival fund raising effort. Donors who give at the \$125 level receive a 3 foot by 5 foot Rainbow flag of

their very own. They have the option of receiving a flag immediately, or one of those that will be flown on the festival grounds during PrideFest 2001 along with a certificate of authenticity. #### FIREWORKS!

#### Lighting Up the Sky with Pride

All eyes will look to the skies and the air will be punctuated with long "ooooohs" and "ahhhhhs" for the spectacular PrideFest fireworks displays planned for Friday and Saturday nights, June 8th and 9th at approximately

10:15 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. respectively. Rockets will be launched from the island in Lake Michigan just east of the festival grounds, so the best viewing spot will be at the lakefront. The rain date is Sunday night.

The tradition of festival fireworks started in 1995, and PrideFest was the first Pride festival in the country to have them. Since then, following Wisconsin's lead, more festivals have initiated their own fireworks displays. Last year, PrideFest Vice President Susan Cook was out on the island with flare in hand, setting off a bombardment of 3-inch shells. She did so well, the fireworks captain asked if she was interested in a part-time job for the rest of the summer! iWhenever I watch fireworks. I have to be close enough to feel them. Last year, I really felt them!î exclaimed Cook.

The Miller Brewing Company will underwrite the costs of this year's display, which should last about 15 or 20 minutes. Wisconsin's own Bartolotta Fireworks Co., one of the nation's foremost fireworks and pyrotechnics

producers, will create the fireworks, design the show, and light the fuses. This is the same company that produces the astonishing July 3rd fireworks display on Milwaukee's lakefront.

Over the years some aspects of the fireworks show have remained the same, but some have been refined. It takes months to plan a fireworks display, starting with the explosives themselves. Because Bartolotta's makes its own fireworks, it designs each show to fit the customer. In PrideFest's case, this includes bright rainbow colors and continuing attempts to create pink triangles. Bartolotta's also strives to meet the standing request for plenty of loud explosions. Ultimately, the show builds to a climax that will thrill the eyes and ears of spectators.

Enjoy! And feel free to "oooooh" and "ahhhhh" to your heart's content!



#### FRIDAY NIGHT THEME PARTY: WIZARD OF "ODDS"

The Friday night theme party tradition continues this year with "Wizard of Odds." Held in the Dance Tent right after the marchers arrive on the festival grounds, DJis will begin to spin house music for the many revelers who want to keep their feet moving. And for the creative folks in our community, a costume contest will take place in the Dance Tent after the fireworks at approximately 10:30 p.m. Everyone who arrives at the front gates in costume will get in free!

PR & Marketing Director Justin Lockridge came up with this year's theme. "I thought if we played a little with the title from the ever so popular movie, Wizard of Oz, it would allow people to really show their artistic flare. People should let their imaginations go wild."

The Dance Tent, which is sponsored this year by Potawatomi Bingo Casino, will be the place to be on Saturday and Sunday nights, as well. With the largest piece of canvass available stretched from two buildings, and the steady thumping of dance music, up to 600 people can dance to their heart's content. Volunteer bartenders from Brew City Bears will be on hand with soda, beer and wine coolers to quench your thirst.

# BJÖRN AGAIN ... AGAIN!! Performing Friday, June 8 - 9:00 - Miller Stage

Okay Milwaukee - you asked for it, you got it! For those of you who missed out on their sensational show

in 1997, here is your opportunity to see ABBA tribute band Björn Again as PrideFest kicks off its national entertainment at 9:00 p.m. on Friday, June 8th.

Who can forget the filled-tocapacity crowd at PrideFest '97 singing and dancing to those old time favorite ABBA songs, "Dancing Queen," "Fernando" and "Momma Mia"? The festival grounds were instantly converted into a huge outdoor dance floor and every picnic table became a stage as thousands of people swayed to the music. At the end of the set, the roar of approval lasted for several minutes, bringing out Björn Again for a grand finale encore that ended only when the fireworks started. This incredible act made such an impression on the crowd, it has become the most

requested band on PrideFest surveys every year.

# SKOTT FREEDMAN: PRODIGY CHILD TURNED STUNNING SONGWRITER

#### Performing Friday June 8 - Miller Stage

Skott Freedman is a piano man for the new millennium ñ part cabarock, part folk and part pop, delivering messages to a general audience with a one-to-one intensity. With a comforting vocal timbre ‡ la David Gray and his signature yodel-trill,

Freedman is someone to be noticed.

Freedman's musical career began at the age of six, over-dramatically slowing down "Hatikvah" (the national anthem for the country of Israel) on the family's small, electric organ in the basement till he felt it was "mournful enough" to

bring tears. When he dragged his parents downstairs to listen, they hesitantly smiled and said, "Um...good honey, keep working at it . . .".

Fifteen years later, Skott Freedman is one of the most exciting singer/songwriters to emerge on the Boston music scene. His work has been both nationally and internationally recognized and devoted fans are becoming increasingly aware of this young rising star each year.

Freedman's stunning three and a half octave voice varies in its flexibility, ranging from the fiery outbursts in "Fairytales" ("Well it can't always be like the fairytales that we used to believe and sooner or later time's gonna run out") to the soft, barely audible whisper in "Angels in the Snow" ("I knew you'd be leaving, I didn't know how soon...my life emptied out in a single afternoon"). Rich in tone and pungent with emotion, Freedman uses his voice as a true instrument, varying the expression and intensity with every note. The final product sends the listener on an emotional roller coaster ride.

A native of New Jersey Freedman grew up a child piano prodigy, winning statewide competitions by the time he was fifteen. He then began straying off the path of his classical mentors, writing music that was

> hauntingly beautiful and further developing his taste for dissonance. In many of his songs today, Freedman uniquely sustains a note just a second longer than the listener-expects and then suddenly resolves it.

In his faster songs, Freedman's fingers fly across the piano, amazing listeners at

his speed and accuracy. Indeed, live audience members have testified that sometimes his hands move so fast that it looks like he's being played on high-speed film!

Other times, Freedman performs the most tender of ballads and uses his soft attack and delicate grace notes to make the piano breathe with him. Lyrically, Freedman also excels in his undeniable talent to write personal songs that still connect to his listeners. "Freedman's lyrics offer consistent vision into his thoughts and emotions, rather than the occasional glimpses that most songwriters seem to offer," hailed Georgetown University's Hoya after a performance last year.


Freedman keeps the listener interested, covering subjects as light as skinny dipping to the intense, darker side of things such as the loss of a loved one. He is a true songwriter with each song unfolding a story that initially invites the listener in, offers some insight into one of many raw emotions, and then gently shuts the door again.

#### ESTRADA HAILED AS "THE PRINCE OF PAGEANTRY"

Vicarious Records Latin recording artist Jade Esteban Estrada has performed in seven languages and 25 countries. In the short time of his unforgettable

presence in the public eye, he has rapidly risen to become the hottest rising star on the Latin music scene.

Mr. Estrada was born and raised in the Tejano music capital of the world, San Antonio, Texas. It was there he discovered his love for Latin rhythms and sounds.

Growing up in the 1980's, his musical influences were the stars of the British pop scene, Duran Duran, Erasure, Culture Club and Wham! But it was the world's fascination with the Material Girl, Madonna that led to his decision to follow his own dreams of stardom.

In 1992, Estrada began his pop music career as a member of the hip hop-doo wop group the Model Citizens. They enjoyed a considerable amount of success as an unsigned group playing many of New York City's trendiest hot spots and were picked up by the FOX-TV pilot Hot City Nights. However, after several heated debates over who the lead singer was, Estrada ceremoniously left the group for Europe to pursue a solo career. The experience in the group sharpened his knowledge of the business and gave him more hands on experience as a choreographer, allowing him to set stage shows for recording artists and working with C&C Music Factory's Kenny Steele.

In 1995, he spent the year onstage in the German production of the Broadway Musical Starlight Express in western Germany where he became an overnight sensation with fans. In 1995, he spent another year as the principal singer at Ocean Dome in the South of Japan all the while honing his craft as a choreographer and dancer. But it was while he was on tour (as the only American) in the European musical By George, It's Gershwin he began to compose his own songs.

He spent 1996 in London writing songs for the beautiful starlet of the West End, Samantha Lavender. Finding a groove that sparked his immense creativity they formed the half British/half American group JELS. After a short time in Great Britain's celebrity limelight, the group broke up.

Already an accomplished artist in the US, Estrada was soon awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts in Washington D.C. to compose the highly-acclaimed one-man show It's Too Late...It's Already In Me which he performed at the 1997 Festival De Libre Enganche representing the US.

This was the first presentation of his own songs in his country. Much inspired by his success, he quickly planned a return to Europe with full intention of conquering Germany where he was already quite well known. After brief trips to Chicago and New York, he would join his entourage in Frankfurt.

While in Chicago in the fall of 1997, he was

approached by Jennifer Houston, one of the lead singers of the now disbanded group Nanapeg on the Total Envision Records label. It was she who brought Estrada to the attention of Anthony Barletta and Gaspare Valenti who were hard at work searching for a new lead singer for their latest brain child, "The Reggae Twist" for the group Envision. Estrada casually walked into Step One

Studios, laid down the vocals and a star was born.

He began his Summer Twist Tour '98 with a bang in Central Park in New York City in June 1998. He played popular venues from San Juan to El Paso and became the first performer to open the Tejano Concert at Christensen Stadium in Midland, Texas since Selena. Never one to rest on his laurels, it was obvious to the industry that this performing genius was just getting started.

He opened his Twist Time '99 Tour in Honolulu in January 1999 and continued on to Mexico, Central and South America and the South Pacific taking full advantage of the unusual popularity of his debut hit. In 2000, he began his much acclaimed Jokers are Wild Tour where he performed in cities across the US and in international cities such as Montreal, Caracas and Athens.

Estrada decided on cultivating complete artistic control of his work by leaving Total Envision Records, his first record company. He established Vicarious Records, his own independent label in September 2000.

Estrada is a devoted contributor to the LGBT community performing at 16 Pride events worldwide during his Jokers are Wild Tour. Known the world over as the "Prince of Pageantry," Mr. Estrada has been hailed in the industry as the new, hip face of today's Pageant World Empire. He has performed, emceed and judged for the world's most prestigious pageant organizations including Miss Universe, Miss America and Miss Canada International. He has also appeared in the Miss Mundo Latino International, Mrs. United States, Miss Latina USA, Miss United States Latina. Miss National and the Teen and Mrs. Globe Pageants. Aside from having been awarded the 2001 Man of Distinction Award by the Miss Black World Organization, Mr. Estrada has also been awarded the coveted Spirit Award from Pageantry Magazine.

Mr. Estrada has been honored to headline Europride in Vienna, Austria in 2001 representing the United States.

# FROM MILWAUKEE: WITH PRIDE A Brief History of LGBT Pride Celebrations in Milwaukee

The Gay People's Union was the first organization in Milwaukee to host an event that had "Pride" appeal, with over 350 people attending the GPU Ball in 1974. Other dances and parties were hosted in the years that followed, but it was not until after the 1987 March on Washington did the Pride Movement take a strong hold in Milwaukee.

The first official Pride events were hosted by the Milwaukee Lesbian/Gay Pride Committee in 1988, complete with a softball tournament and picnic at

Mitchell Park, a formal ball at the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee Student Union, town hall meeting with elected officials and a film festival. Several hundred people participated in the week-long events.

In June 1989, the MLGPC organized a march and approximately 500 sign-carrying people walked the two miles from the Walker's Point bar district to Cathedral Square for a rally where 500 more people had gathered. This particular event generated a great deal of controversy in the City of Milwaukee, mainly because the proclamation issued by Mayor John Norquist ended with the words, "We are proud of who you are." Both the mayor and county executive were threatened with recall campaigns initiated by religious-based conservative groups. By the end of the day, the MLGPC march and rally was the opening story on all three major news telecasts and featured on the front page of the Sunday Milwaukee Journal. The city could not ignore its LGBT citizens because the LGBT community would no longer allow it.

The march and rally were held at Cathedral Square again in 1990. In 1991, 1992 and 1993 the rally was moved to Juneau Park along the lakefront, an area that could accommodate the growing crowds.

Entertainment and food were added, creating a festival atmosphere. In 1994, the original MLGPC was dissolved and the new PrideFest was incorporated. Having outgrown the Juneau Park area, PrideFest moved to Veterans Park and featured exhibits, three stages, a few dozen craftspeople and vendors, and a full two days of activity. This was repeated for

PrideFest '95 with the addition of the "Light Up the Sky with Pride" pyrotechnic and laser light show. PrideFest was the first Pride event in the nation to host its own fireworks display.

1996 found PrideFest moving again, this time to the spacious Henry W. Maier Festival Park, the best festival facility in the U.S. With permanent stages complete with professional lighting, food buildings, vendor pavilions and support from the staff of Milwaukee World Festivals Inc., the managing body of

the park. PrideFest joined 14 other festivals that used the park for their events. PrideFest had the distinct honor in 1996 of kicking off the festival season for Milwaukee, which has the unofficial slogan "City of Festivals." The hours were expanded to 2-1/2 days. Despite a stationary cold front, complete with driving torrential rains, 9640 brave souls attended. The 1996 festival has been fondly remembered as "RainFest" ever since.

By 1997, PrideFest was hosting entertainment on four stages, presentations and lectures in two activity areas, the Miller Lite Volleyball Tournament, the Pride Parade, a religious ceremony on Sunday, the mass wedding/commitment ceremony, and fireworks show. In addition, over 100 vendors sold merchandise or promoted the services of their organizations. The biggest piece of canvas was set up for the largest Dance Tent ever, holding over 600 people at any one time. Friends, family members and lovers danced to the music of the tribute band, "Björn Again," leaving the festival with a sense of fulfillment. More than once people hesitated to exit through the gates from our fantasy-land come true. It was a family reunion for 12,278 people.

A record crowd of 14,478 people attended PrideFest '98. Not only were the festival grounds expanded to include another premier stage, for the first time PrideFest had August dates. The date change was necessary to accommodate the 95th Harley Davidson Anniversary Celebration, which was already scheduled

The History/Herstory Tent will also highlight the stories behind organizations from Wisconsin. They are: AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin; Cream City Foundation; Milwaukee LGBT Community Center; Parents and Friends of Lesbians And Gays (PFLAG); and Project QIn addition, groups from across the state have been invited to create a poster board exhibit that depicts their organizations' past, present and future. This will round out our "family" album.

For the history buffs in the community, there will be a history quiz each day and winners will receive special prizes from PrideFest.

The 2001 motto: "People. Pride. Power." sums up what the History/Herstory Tent brings to the community. People: who have contributed to the community and made it a better place. Pride: which is the force that energizes our community to fight for our rights. Power: which is what people have when they join as one and succeed in their goals.

This project will be on-going from this point forward. PrideFest plans to showcase six organizations each year with an effort to depict a cross-section of the community. years in advance to occur in June.
Fortunately, the month of August had five weekends in 1998, making way for a late summer Pride celebration. The incredible August weather played well to the success of this banner year.

PrideFest was fortunate again in 1999 to have August dates. This time it was due to the five weekends that fell during the month of July. African World Festival, one of the other festivals that used the grounds, opted to take late July dates rather than their traditional first weekend in August, giving PrideFest the opportunity to have another late summer celebration. Despite thunderstorms in surrounding counties, only a few showers fell on the festival on Saturday, with the weather clearing again in time for the Sunday parade. Thirteen thousand four hundred fifty-five attendees passed through the gates and enjoyed three days of camaraderie. The headliner for the festival was Kathy Sledge and her "We Are Family" echoed in the community for many months thereafter.

With only four weekends in both the months of July and August, PrideFest 2000 returned to the traditional Pride observance month of June when it, once again, had the honor of kicking off Milwaukee's festival season. The parade was moved to Friday night and proved to be a huge success with more people watching along the route. Unseasonably WARM weather on the first two days brought out record crowds who rocked to the sounds of CeCe Peniston and Men Out Loud. However, the cold front that passed through on Sunday night did not cool off the audience that came for Latin diva Lisa, Lisa. MICHAEL LISOWSKI, Co-Director and Market Place Coordinator – Michael has been involved with PrideFest since 1993 and became Co-director in 1999. "PrideFest is the one time during the year that our entire community can come together and celebrate together, young and old, white, people of color, men, women, single and coupled, gay and non-gay. To work so hard every year and see everyone else enjoy themselves is worth it." Michael has also spent many years working with Gay Youth Milwaukee and produces the local MATA television show, The Queer Program.

JUSTIN LOCKRIDGE, PR & Marketing Coordinator - Justin has been involved with PrideFest as a volunteer since 1996 and this is his second festival as a Council member. His responsibilities can be captured in a single phrase: "Get the word out!" He is a graduate of Marquette University where he participated in the Urban Journalism program. He also served as editor of the school paper and president of the Wisconsin Associated Student Press. One of the most frequented areas of PrideFest is the Marketplace, the large open-air bazaar located just east of the Miller Stage. Here dozens of vendors set out their wares, from clothing to books, and crafts to fine art.

If it comes in rainbow colors, you will find it in the Marketplace. "We have vendors from all over the country, bringing with them, at times, some of their own regional items," commented Marketplace Coordinator, Michael Lisowski.

This year, vendors will be able to open Friday night giving serious shoppers a first chance to buy some of those limited quantity items. "The community has asked that the Marketplace open the first night of the festival," said Lisowski.

"While there may be some out-of-town vendors still traveling on Friday, we are encouraging them to get to the festival grounds early. That way, even those who can only come down to the festival on Friday can take a little bit of PrideFest back home with them."

For official PrideFest souvenirs, be sure to stop at the PrideFest merchandise booth, located directly north of the Marketplace.

If you are interested in finding something to do rather than buy, there will also be a number of organizations on hand to promote their social activities and services. Representatives from Wisconsin Outdoors Women, LGBT Community Center, Milwaukee Metropolitan Community Church, Human Rights League, Log Cabin Club, and Lesbian Alliance of Metro Milwaukee are just some of the organizations who had booths at PrideFest in years past.



"Bringing everybody under one roof really makes it easy for people to find out what the community has to offer," added Lisowski. "There's something for everyone at the Marketplace."

#### **DRAG WITH A HEART**

In the History/Herstory Tent, there will be a special photo essay of Drag Queens that depicts their commitment to our community. Theresa Lin Schauer created the photography show, "En Femme," for her senior project thesis for the Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design.

"En Femme" is composed of photos taken at benefit shows, such as the AIDS Food Pantry Benefit and the AIDS Walk Benefit. Through their generosity of providing most often-times free entertainment, and ability to collect money through showmanship, Drag Queens have raised hundreds of thousands of dollars for charitable groups throughout Wisconsin.

Drag Queens have a long, colorful history, and have played a significant role in the LGBT civil rights movement. According to *The Advocate*, the Gay magazine that started publishing in New York in 1967, it was Drag Queens who were on the frontlines during the Stonewall Riots in Greenwich Village in 1969. What may have started as a resistance to police intimidation during a bar raid soon ignited the civil rights movement for LGBT people everywhere. "The Stonewall Riots," as one gay wit observed, "was the hairpin drop heard 'round the world."

Theresa's work was published on a national level in 1999 in conjunction with *Photographers Forum Magazine* and won an award of excellence from the Serbian Communications.

#### KNOW YOUR RIGHTS WHEN IT COMES TO PROTESTERS

This is not a news flash: Some people just don't like us.

For the most part, the protesters know what they can and cannot do within the law, and usually they are within those limits. If one happens to cross your path on the way to the festival, refuse his or her literature, or take it and throw it in the nearest trash receptacle (after all, it is their money you're throwing away!). Walk past the offensive sign. Ignore the person who perpetuates intolerance because they are not worth losing a breath over. AND take action when you believe your rights have been violated.

PrideFest spends a great deal of time working with the Milwaukee Police Department, the City Attorney's Office and Milwaukee World Festival, Inc.'s Security Captain, to ensure that the rights of our attendees are not infringed upon by those who object to our desire to exercise our civil rights. Please be aware that The First Amendment does not protect speech that can be construed as a threat to bodily harm. Nor is it within the law for someone to impede your travel to and from the festival, or to make gestures or actions that would instill fear of bodily harm, or to make unwarranted physical contact.

If someone threatens you with bodily harm, or makes a gesture or action that you construe as a threat to your well-being, or prevents you from walking or driving, or touches you, immediately report the incident to the nearest Milwaukee Police officer and inform them you want to file a complaint. Be prepared to give your name and detailed information as to what occurred.

If you believe the Milwaukee Police officer is not cooperative, or is not enforcing the law, get his or her badge number and immediately come to the PrideFest Ticket Booths outside of the gates or the PrideFest Information Booth on the festival grounds and request an incident report form. Be prepared to provide your name, address and phone number, and detailed information about the incident, including what the police officer did or did not do. After completing, return the form to where you picked it up. All complaints will be immediately reported to the PrideFest festival office. PrideFest Security will investigate the incident and seek a timely resolution with MPD, if the situation warrants it. Complaint forms will be collected by PrideFest legal counsel and brought before the City Attorney and MPD Administration.

In addition, Milwaukee World Festival's Inc. has assured PrideFest that it will make every effort to educate its employees about our community and the nature of our event. MWF employees who engage in harassing or intimidating activities towards our patrons should be reported immediately to PrideFest Security or Council members. Be sure to get the color and number of the employees jacket or shirt so the individual can be identified.

#### Things you should NOT do:

- -DO NOT make threatening remarks
- -DO NOT throw objects
- -DO NOT make any actions or gestures that could be construed as menacing
- -DO NOT make any physical contact

PrideFest makes great efforts to make your festival experience a positive one. If you can ignore the ignorance of a few individuals who do not want us to have our festival, you will have a great time at PrideFest. But keep in mind, if their ignorance results in the violation of your rights, you have the power to do something about it.


