Escape, long the primary gay publication in the state of Wisconsin, has joined forces with Chicago's *GayLife* newspaper, becoming an insert in that publication.

"We've always had a problem with providing comprehensive entertainment coverage in *Escape*," said Erin Criss, former publisher of *Escape* and general manager of the new combination. "We could do that, but then we had to sacrifice coverage of news, political trends, women's stories, special features, and so on. With our move to *GayLife*, we can devote that attention to entertainment that the scene deserves and still provide excellent coverage of all those other things, which are certainly important to our readers."

Escape will become a bi-weekly insert, with the first issue appearing on Oct. 7. *Escape* will eventually incorporate most of *GayLife*'s current entertainment coverage, allowing *GayLife* more space for news, political discussion, and other feature-type stories.

"This is a tremendously exciting thing for Wisconsin readers," Criss said. They'll be able to crack the gay market of Chicago, which is the largest city for miles around. And they'll also finally be able to read about things that directly affect them in Wisconsin. Also, the potential for Wisconsin advertisers is unbelievable. Wisconsin, especially Milwaukee and Madison,

are close enough to Illinois to attract customers from those areas."

Karlis Streips, editor in chief of the new combination, was also excited about the move.

"Wisconsin coverage has been something we've wanted to get into for some time," Streips said. "Unfortunately, we haven't been able to up to now. With Erin's contacts in Wisconsin, and with our new distribution up there, we've opened a whole new field of coverage that only needs to be tapped."

Escape will appear in *GayLife* every other week, and initial distribution will be 10,000 copies. Additional distribution will be provided as it becomes necessary.

Escape's combination also combines two experienced staffs. Joining *Escape's* staff will be a series of editorial writers, including *GayLife* staff writers George S. Buse, Paul Cotton, Sarah Craig, Chris Heim, and Marie J. Kuda. *GayLife's* production staff will be enhanced by the presence of *Escape's* Bud Kaz.

The sales staff, too, will be enlarged. Ron Geiman, up to now *Escape's* sales manager, will continue in that position, joining *GayLife's* sales manager, Bob Bearden.

Also, legal counsel has been appointed for *Escape* and *GayLife*. Ronald J. Ehemann, the Chicago attorney who served as *Escape's* counsel since its inception and who writes a weekly column in *GayLife*, will assume that position.

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INTERVIEW

Porno star Richard Locke

Move over, Jane Fonda. Richard Locke, fellow thespian, has a physical fitness program that is sure to catch on with the health-conscious American public.

Reduced to its basics, the regimen followed by this star of X-rated films means the avoidance of sugar and salt in his diet and masturbating at least one-half hour each day. This simple program, asserts the 41-year-old Locke, is responsible for the maintenance of the physique that keeps men of all ages coming to see both his films and the act which he has performed in cities throughout the country.

Last month, the 6' 2", 190-lb. celebrity brought his act to Chicago's Bijou Theater. For four days, twice each day, a mesmerized audience watched as Locke, in the flesh, stood before them. Under blue and amber lights recalling the heyday of South State Street burlesque, and to an accompaniment of music, thunder and rain, Locke masturbated to orgasm. The 20-minute act was followed by enthusiastic applause but no encore.

Clearly, here is a career that requires a special kind of stamina, and this is where Locke's exercise program comes into play. Locke rehearses every day in front of his bathroom mirror. Gripping the floor with his feet, he tenses every muscle, including the one between his legs that is neglected by every other exercise system. His belief in masturbation's benefits began at age 17. He sent away for a Charles Atlas exercise manual and realized that masturbation was a form of isometrics. Today, Locke maintains that it is the only exercise any man should ever need, and "you can do it with a buddy."

Regarding masturbation in public, before a paying audience, Locke feels no inhibitions. "I love myself," Locke explains. "That's what jerk-off is all about. You have to love yourself before you can love anyone else. I like my body, and I hope others will like it. When I'm up there on stage making love to myself, I'm also making love to each one of the men out front."

Sometimes the men out front love him back by masturbating along with him in their seats. Once, at New York's Show Palace Theater, members of the audience took off their clothes and folded them under the seats. "They jerked off with me totally nude," Locke

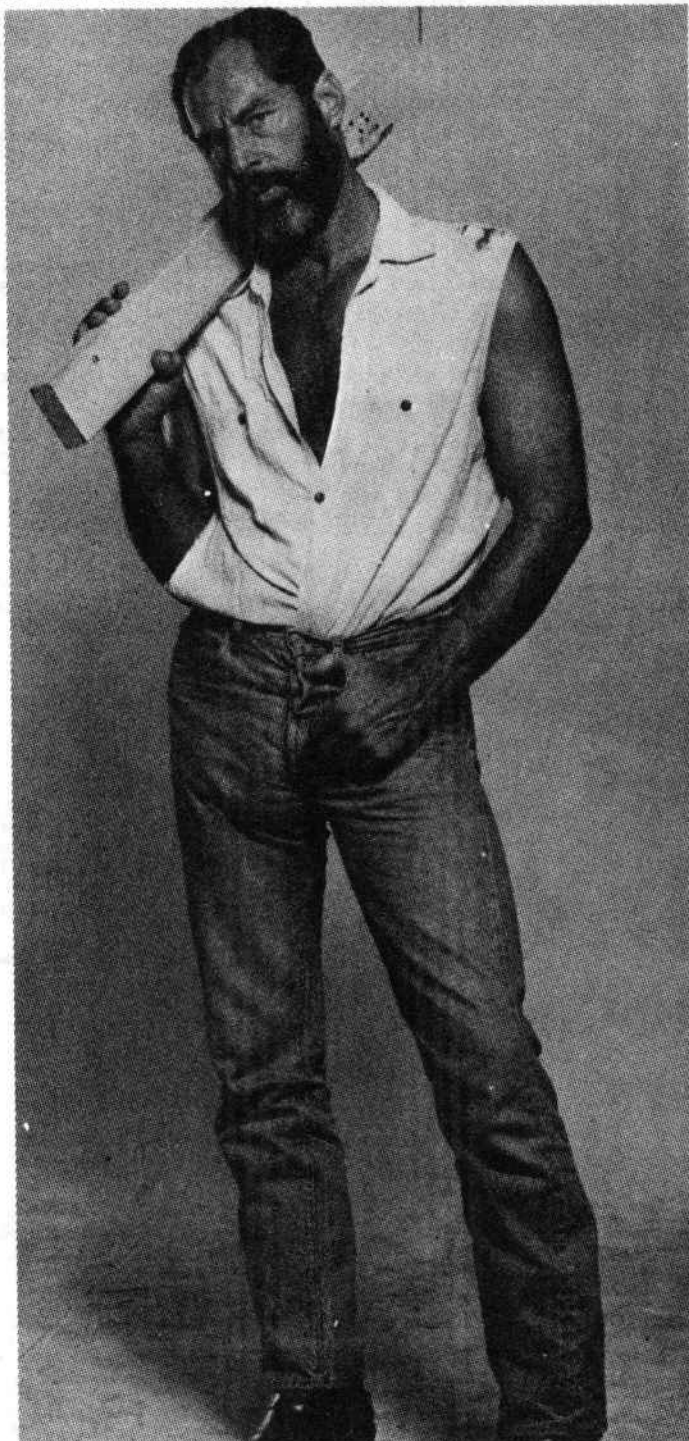
recalls proudly.

Masturbation plays other roles in Locke's life as well. Beginning in November, Locke and a business partner, former Chicagoan Hank Trout, will publish a magazine on the subject called *U.S. Jacks*. The magazine, Locke says, will be dedicated "to all my jerk-off buddies." In addition, horny physical fitness buffs from around the country will soon be able to "exercise" with Richard Locke by phone through Dial-a-Load, the actor's new dirty phone call service. You simply place a call, making a reservation, pay the fee by charging it to a major bank card, and tell Locke what kind of stuff you'd like to hear. Then Locke calls back at the appointed time and gives you an earful. As they say, it's the next best thing to being there. But for many, no doubt, phone sex is even better. As Locke points out, "You don't have to look your best."

All of Locke's work is not single-handed pleasure. Making porn movies brings him into contact with a loose-knit group of people that he says has become a sort of repertory company. He describes the making of porn films as "fun and games on the set. I get to play with some of the most marvelous men in the world; the men with the biggest cocks, the best tits, the nicest asses. That's a fringe benefit. God knows, I'm not in this business for the money."

Just how much money does a performer in X-rated movies make? According to Locke, not very much. Actors in gay films make less than actors in straight films because of the relatively smaller audience, and no one's getting rich. A typical "star" salary is \$100 a day, and shooting schedules can be as short as three days. Because he is well known, however, Locke makes more than some performers. Residuals, even when a film is mass-marketed on video tape, the new growth area in the sex industry, are "virtually nonexistent."

Filmmaker Joe Gage, Locke's most famous employer, brags, according to Locke, that he paid the men in the orgy scene in the

epic *Heatstroke* only \$5 per day. Apparently, many men feel it is a privilege to have their anatomy used in a Gage film. Later, when the film is released, these guys go to a theater and pay \$7, two bucks more than a day's salary, to see how they look. And they may have trouble finding themselves, since Gage often photographs only from the shoulders down.

Locating Richard Locke in a given film is no problem. His bearded, masculine features epitomize the "Gageman," gay porno's most macho image. In an uncommonly striking image from the film *Kansas City Trucking Co.*, Locke's face is seen rising into the frame of a cot to perform fellatio on a fellow trucker whose penis is dangling down through the springs of an upper bunk. Locke is proud to be a part of that scene and names *Kansas City* as his favorite of the fourteen or so films he has made.

Having studied film in college, Locke had originally wanted to be a director. He gave up the idea, however, when it became apparent

to him that in order to work in Hollywood, "you have to know somebody." Some five years later, a friend was casting a film and asked Locke if he'd like to be in it. "Sure," Locke replied.

"It's pornographic," the friend informed him.

"Great," said Locke. "I can combine both my hobbies."

This forgettable first film, called *Dreamer*, was seen by the Gage brothers (producer Sam and director Joe), who found Locke to be just the man they were looking for to play Gene, the horny truck driver in *Kansas City Trucking Co.* This led to *El Paso Wrecking Corp.*, *L.A. Tool & Die*, and *Heatstroke* for the Gages, as well as films by Wakefield Poole (Locke calls him a "genius") and others. The bass-voiced, easy-going sex celebrity suggests that if the ten best gay films were listed, he would be seen in more than half of them.

Locke likes to think of himself as a "role model," a proud, gay, and mature man enjoying his sexuality. He is also aware of being a "daddy image" for his younger fans. One of those younger fans shocked him

during his visit to the Bijou by asking Locke to autograph his shoulder. The blond youth promptly went out and had the signature tattooed in place. Later in the day he returned to show off the finished product. Says an impressed Locke: "I wish I had beautiful handwriting. That kid's going to walk around with my name on his back for the rest of his life." Has any Hollywood actor since Rudolph Valentino inspired such rabid devotion?

The idol reminisces about his own youth: "When I was 17, I was more or less asexual. I knew I didn't like girls, and I didn't like queens. I was in such a strait-jacketed world that I didn't know there were any other kind of gay men. Now, a 17-year-old coming

to a movie theater can see all kinds of men having sex and know that it's OK. I think that's important."

One of the reasons he's so successful, Locke claims, is that he's the "only man my age doing this sort of thing." He plans to continue doing it "until people stop asking. I want to be a 90-year-old man with a hard-on, a dirty old man." Meanwhile, he spent his fortieth birthday last year "jerking off on the stage of the Century Theater in L.A."

True, Richard Locke must occasionally supplement his erratic show-business income with jobs as a masseur and other odd jobs, but, all things considered, he hopes the decision to make a career out of beating off may yet prove to be a stroke of genius.

S.F. captures Gay Softball World Series — Milwaukee 2nd

San Francisco, the gay capital of North America, has now become the Gay softball capital of North America. The Pendulum Pirates, champions of San Francisco's Gay Softball League, defeated Milwaukee's Wreck Room Chaps 5-4 in the championship game to claim the title as North American gay softball champions. (Ironically, the softball team representing San Francisco in the Gay Games defeated Seattle by an identical 5-4 score to win the gold medals in the 4-team Olympic-type competition.)

The champions of 11 cities met in the Gay Softball World Series in San Francisco from Aug. 31-Sept. 4. Participating teams included Pharr Library of Atlanta, the Chaps of Boston, Annex 2 of Chicago, Dirty Sally's of Houston, the defending champions, Griff's of Los Angeles, the Wreck Room Chaps of Milwaukee, the Eagles of New York, the Pendulum Pirates of San Francisco, Partners of Southern New England, the East Side Raiders of Toronto, and the Gay '90s from the Twin Cities. Three of the top four teams in this year's Wreck Room Classic in Milwaukee over Memorial Day weekend—Pendulum, Gay '90s, and Wreck Room Chaps—competed in the World Series. In addition, five other World Series teams were in Milwaukee for the spring Wreck Room tournament.

The Series began on Tuesday evening, Aug. 31, with the opening ceremonies, as all participating teams marched onto the field with their banners. Featured at the ceremonies were the San Francisco Gay Freedom Day Marching Band and Toronto's Gay Men's Chorus, called Timeout.

The first night's game featured host city San Francisco playing against Chicago. San Francisco jumped off to an 8-0 first inning lead and went on to score a 9-1 victory.

The other teams began playing on Wednesday. Milwaukee started off with a 9-6 victory over Houston, with Guy and Rollie providing the offense with home runs, and some key double plays being provided by the defense. Milwaukee was then matched against San Francisco. Playing their worst defense of the series, the Chaps went down to a 7-2 defeat. On Friday, Milwaukee was pitted against Boston. Milwaukee jumped off to an early lead on a three-run homer by Guy, but



Boston bounced back to tie the game and then took a 7-5 lead into the top of the seventh inning. But the veteran (notice that the word "old" was not used) Milwaukee team had come too far to be knocked out here. They scored one run on a ground out with the bases loaded, and with two on and two out, Kent slammed a long double to score the tying and lead runs. Boston went down in order in the bottom of the seventh, and Milwaukee had an 8-7 victory.

Next came Atlanta, the newest team in the Alliance and definitely the surprise of this tournament. Atlanta had earlier defeated Boston and Twin cities and was the Cinderella team of the tournament. An early eight-run explosion by Milwaukee was too big a

hurdle, and Atlanta went down to a 14-5 defeat, but the team still finished fourth in the Series. A great accomplishment for some very nice people.

For Milwaukee, it was time to face the defending champions, Griff's of Los Angeles. The Pendulum had defeated Griff's 3-1 the previous day, giving the Los Angeles team its first defeat ever in a World Series. In 1981, Griff's had defeated Milwaukee 4-0 in the championship game to capture the title and give Milwaukee second place. Milwaukee, however, was as high for this game as it could possibly ever be. Playing some superb defense and providing some timely hitting, Milwaukee defeated Los Angeles 6-2 to put Griff's in third place.

On to the championship game. Unfortunately for Milwaukee, the script writer for this Series lives in San Francisco. The storybook type of ending for the last game only happens in fairy tales (no pun intended). Playing its third game of the day, Milwaukee looked a little tired, as San Francisco scored two runs in the first; but a nice catch and great throw by Artie got a

double play and stopped what could have been a big inning.

When Milwaukee came right back with two runs in the bottom of the first, it was anyone's ball game. Milwaukee scored two runs to take a 4-2 lead going into the sixth inning, but San Francisco came back with two to tie the game. San Francisco got its first two men on base in the top of the seventh inning, but a great double play, started by Guy, looked like the game-saver for Milwaukee.

But it was not to be. Glenn Burke came right back with a tremendous triple to score the go-ahead run. Milwaukee threatened in the bottom of the seventh, as Flo hit a two-out single, but Kent had been well scouted and could not perform the heroics he had the previous day: He hit a long fly, which was caught for the final out. San Francisco fans raced onto the field to greet their champions. A well-earned victory by one super team—Pendulum.

Once again, Milwaukee came home with the second place trophy, but there should be no heads held low because of this. The level of competition has gotten great, and the Milwaukee team had to play its greatest softball ever to accomplish what it did. When the chips were down, Milwaukee came through. The city should be proud of this team's efforts. Congratulations to Artie, Flo, Kent, Guy, Mark, Mike, Bill, Frank, Rollie, Bruce, Steve, Vern, Floyd, Don, Jim, Dan, and all the fans who supported this team. You made your mark on San Francisco.

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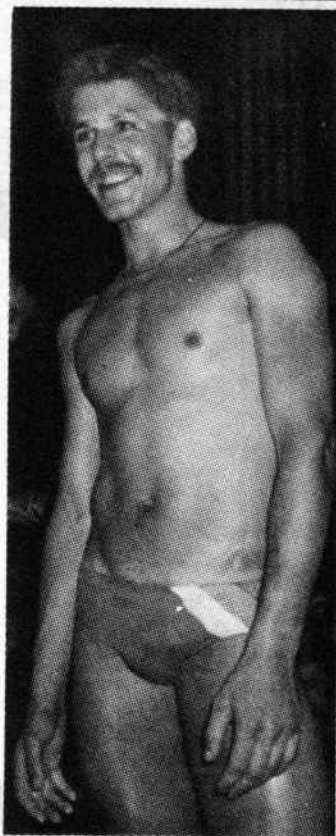
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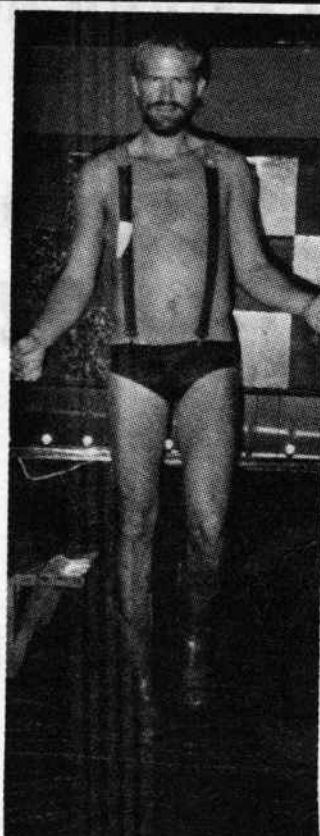
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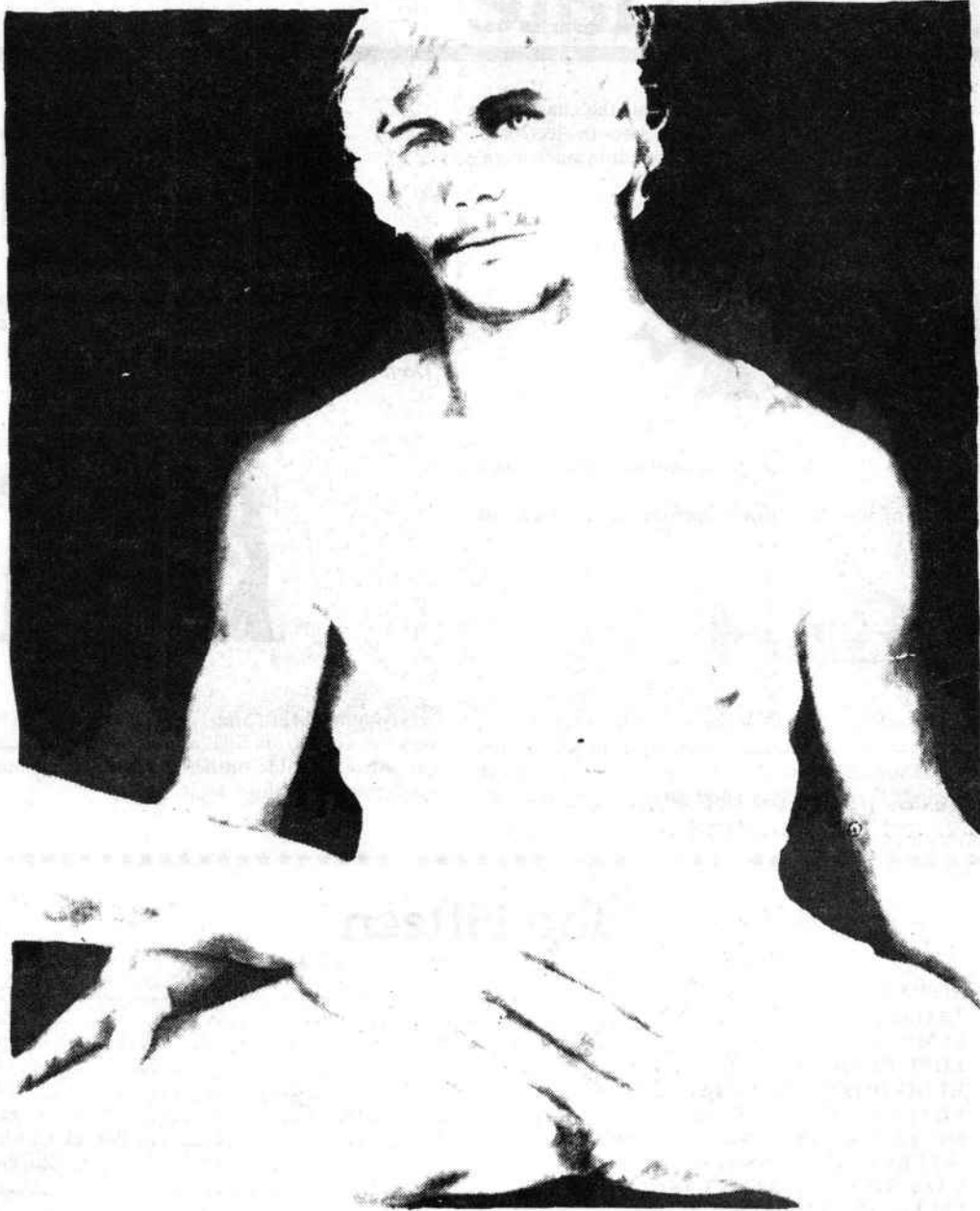
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Music Update

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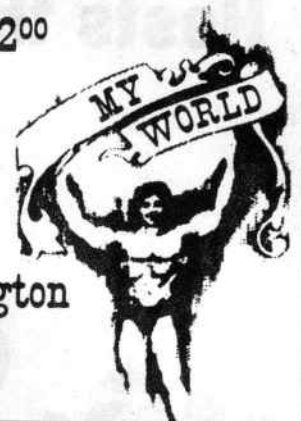
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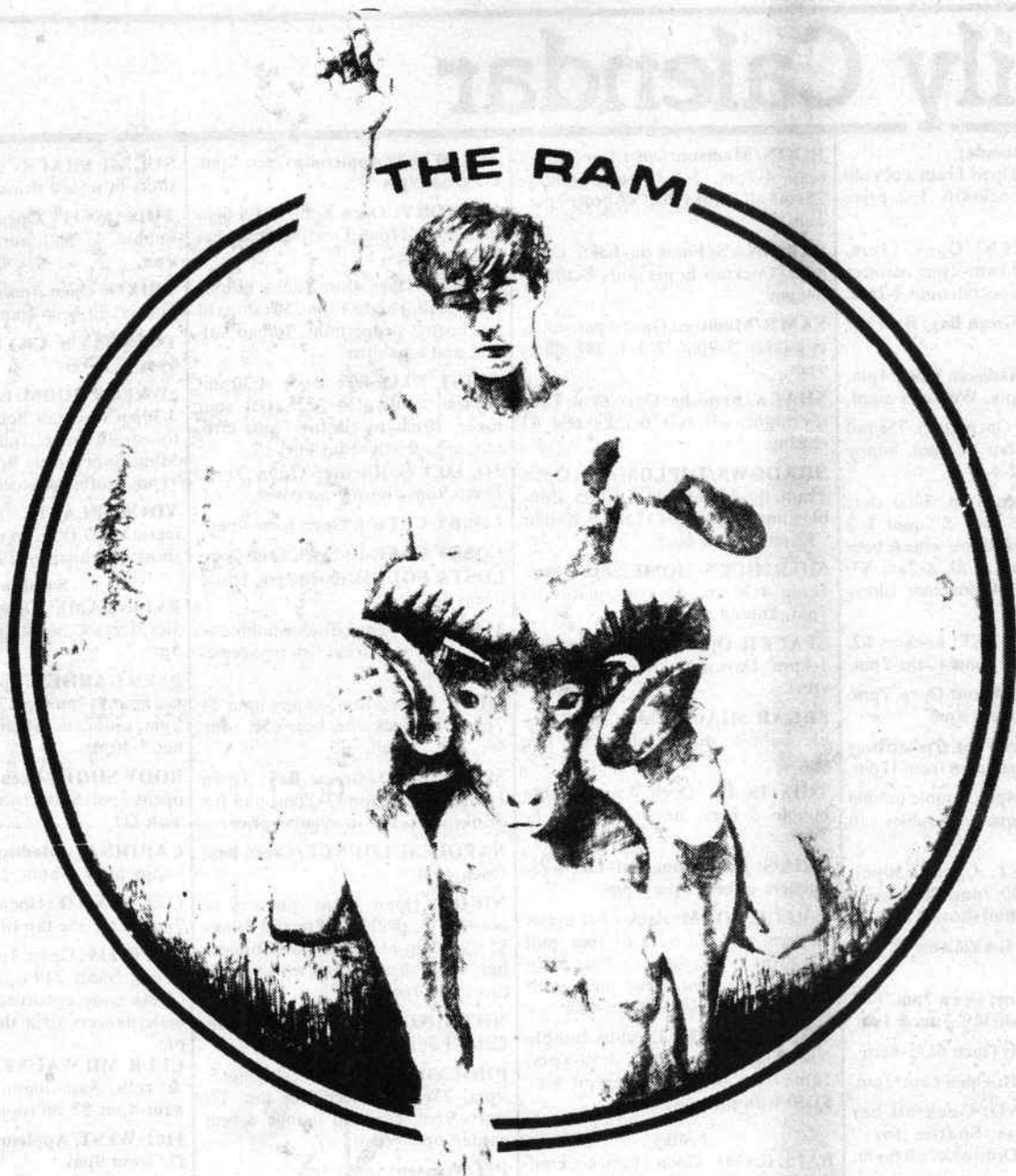

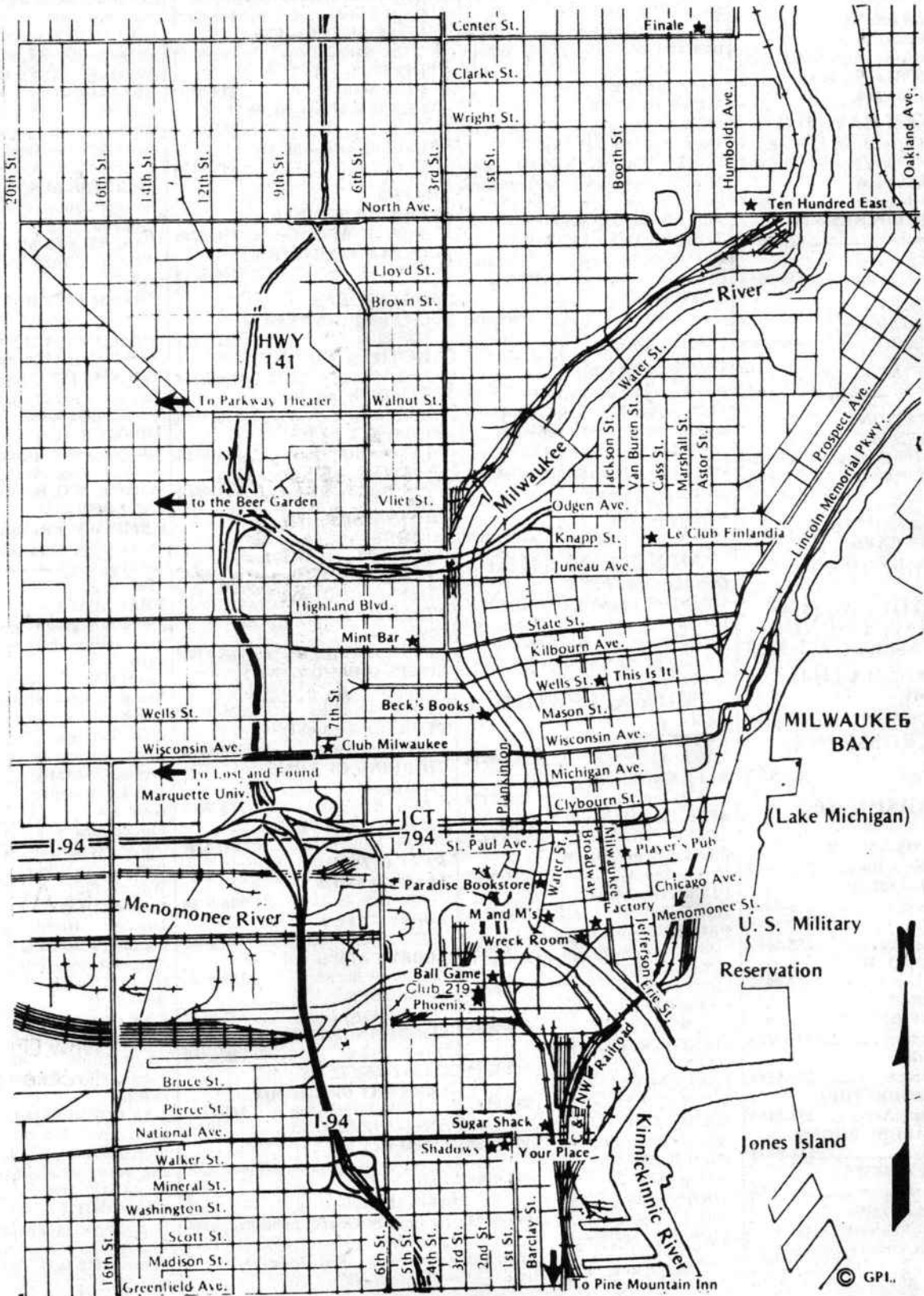
