

ravenous black whip, she gives the impression that she wallows in kink—and that she does. She prowls the stage intimidatingly; she flings down the microphone stand, squeals and growls, and puckers like a wind-up Kewpie doll on the rampage.

But the image is a subterfuge. Her comedy routines center on repression and release, obsession and everyday life. Commenting on her costume, she wryly notes: "This outfit is every Catholic girl's dream!"

Her strong point is her ability to infuse her characters with a life of their own. Amnesia "F'get-Me-Not" Washington, a white hooker who excels at being the blackest girl on the street corner; Helen Not-Quite-So-Reddy, the flip side of one this century's most cheerily inexpressive singers; Lady Schick, who calls McDonald's gift certificates "the best in punk giving"; and "The Perfect International Woman": "Shop at Gucci, eat only Sushi."It's all rather tacky, but without succumbing to tackiness for tackiness' sake, thanks to her transcendent energy and sheer will power.

Dearing brings her audience into the show with her, making them have as much fun as she seems to.

It's time once again for Milwau- the 4th annual Holiday Invitakee to roll out the red carpet to tional Bowling Tournament. welcome bowlers from throughout






Back into the Top Ten this week with the single "1999" and a specially-priced double album is Prince. Out on the Warner Bros. label, this Minneapolis superstar continues to be a forerunner of modern music with his fusion of R&B, funk, rock, and electronics. The new release is a must for all Prince fans.

Patrick Cowley's Mind Warp (Megatone Records) is a wide-ranging assortment of pop-sounding melodies and Euro-disco, combined to create an excellent LP. Both sides, segued loosely, do interesting and exciting changes in the form of mid-tempo instrumentals. "Primitive Man" is very much Voyage-influenced, and break fans will love it. Other picks include "Tech-No-Logical World" (Paul Parker guests here on vocals), "They Came At Night," and the title track, "Mind Warp." Produced by Marty Blechman, this is Patrick Cowley at his best.

Some rock crossovers that stand out strongly this week are: the **Thompson Twins** "Lies" (Arista 12-inch), which teams the group with producer **Alan Sadkin**. Leaning slightly toward a more conventional funk sound this time, the vocals still sound close to their last No. I song, "In the Name of Love".... **Devo's** "Peek-a-Boo" has been released commercially as a 12-inch by Warner Bros. Produced by **Roy Thomas Baker**, this electronic production sounds almost like the **Cars'** last work.

Scherie Payne, former Supreme (remember "He's My Man"?), turns in a sharp, precise reading of 10 CC's "I'm Not in Love" (Altair 12-inch) at pop-disco tempo with all-star help, including Edmund Sylvers, Freda Payne, and Mary



Wilson on backup and arrangement by John Davis and Tom Tom '84. Produced by Rick Giantos, Scherrie really sells her audience on this one.

Cheri's "Give It to Me, Baby" (Venture 12-inch) is a great followup to the chart- and world-busting "Murphy's Law." From adolescent French purring to a neat male rap, producers Hunt and James make another hit tune for this new and exciting duo.


Madonna, a young duo from New York, probably have the solution to Yaz's "Situation." Produced by DJ Mark Kamins, their commercial 12-inch on Sire Records, "Everybody," does the trick. Containing two versions, a vocal mix and a nine-minute dub mix, this spare but bright cut makes everybody wanna party! Watch out for this one.
