What moves today's musicals?



The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas

Not too long ago, I was sitting through a screening of *The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas*. It seemed like a nice idea for a musical: plenty of lively music, an amusing plot, a bunch of lusty guys running around with no clothes on, a bunch of willing girls running around with no clothes on, a good deal of naughty humor, and a restrained sexual kickline designed to titillate. As I said, I was expecting a good time, but what I got was two hours of blandness. *Whorehouse* is hardly an isolated case; the blunt mediocrity of the movie musical has been growing like mold since 1979, and this year has been one of the worst.

I can remember back in 1965, when it was such a big deal to see *The Sound of Music*. Though the film was no masterpiece, I couldn't quite figure out (like many other people) why I liked it so damn much. Julie Andrews, seven motherless kids, the Austrian Alps, Robert Wise's stodgy Old School direction, a heartwarming Rodgers and Hammerstein score ("Do Re Mi"—flapdoodle!), and nuns—how utterly boring! But for seven years, *The Sound of Music* was

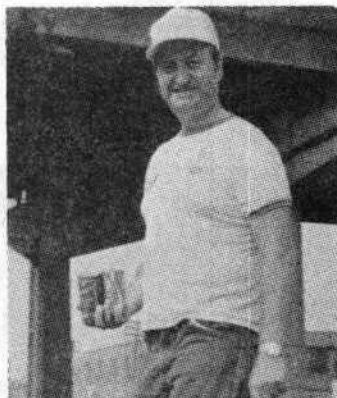

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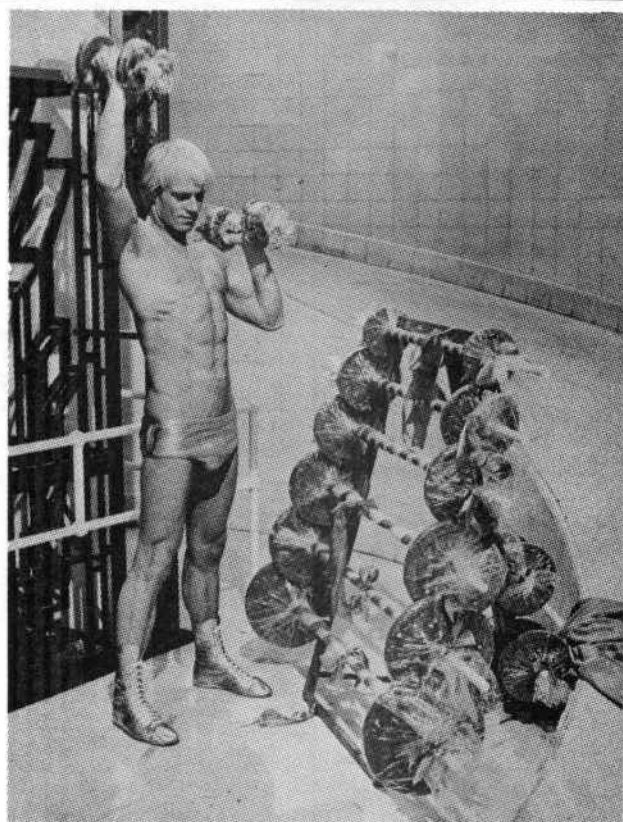

the most successful film ever made, and it's obvious that they just don't make them like that anymore.

Musicals are hard work and they excel in looking effortless while taking their audiences to Never-Never Land. The form is at once dismissable and diverting. The concept, until the 1970s, was wholly illogical:

Characters broke into song with the turn of an emotion and the accompaniment of a 30-piece symphony orchestra from nowhere. If Dolly Levi showed up at a posh New York restaurant, I doubt that the waiters would knock themselves out with a splashy dance routine, but who cares? With a musical you're supposed to expect such foolishness.

Seventeen years after the fact, many people can probably nostalgically remember seeing *The Sound of Music*. But could they have the same memory about going to see *Whorehouse*?

Just what makes a good movie musical in the first place is the key question, one that I think Hollywood producers have lost sight of. *The Sound of Music* is a perfect example. It has a sappy but strong plot (nuns notwithstanding), good characters, good songs in the right places, and a mentality reflecting good craftsmanship and what appears to be love in

equal measure. *The King and I*, *Gigi*, *West Side Story*, and many others have the same ingredients, and people have taken them to heart. In comparison, what's being produced now doesn't take to the heart—it takes to the wallet.

Just why musicals now are so bad is a long topic. But here are some things that all of the recent musicals (from 1980 on) have in common:

Money and Marketing. Just because certain factors (music, scenery, stars) are thrown together doesn't mean a movie is special. It has to have something else. *Annie*, *The Wiz*, *Whorehouse*, *Popeye*, *Can't Stop the Music*, and even *Pete's Dragon* had all of the above, but they misfired. The emphasis was not on a well-made product but on a money-making product. This isn't to say that *Oliver!* or *An American in Paris*, two projects that seem both warm and enduring, weren't produced to make money; but they weren't so blatant

about it. Musicals are produced now with a hard-sell approach, pretty much like those Phone Center Stores: Buy this, you'll like it—even if you can't figure out where to put the Mickey Mouse phone.

Both *Saturday Night Fever* (a singing film—where the background sang and the characters didn't) and *Star Wars* (both from 1977) proved that millions could be plundered with movie soundtracks, and the marketplace hasn't been the same since. Thus, *Xanadu*, *Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band*, *The Wiz*, *FM*, *Quadrophenia* and the relatively recent *Fast Times at Ridgemont High* were albums accompanied by a movie. But if *Fever*, *Grease*, *Urban Cowboy*, and *Fame* could synthesize album buyers into moviegoers, the other films mentioned above couldn't turn the trick. Money and marketing just aren't everything.

Money and creativity. If you have money and you're making a musical, it helps to be practical and sensible. *The Blues Brothers* (about \$30 million), *Xanadu* (about \$15 mil), *Can't Stop the Music* (\$20 mil), *Annie* (\$40 mil), and *The Wiz* (some say \$20 mil, some say \$40 mil—I'll settle for a modest \$30 mil) obviously had

plenty of money behind them, but the producers had very little idea about what to do with it all. If you consider that *Star Wars* cost a paltry \$10 mil, you see the point. None of those films had much going for them, not even in the way of a good story, though they had their moments (Aretha Franklin singing "Respect" in *The Blues Brothers*, the seven Muses jumping off a painted wall and dancing to the accompaniment of the Electric Light Orchestra singing, appropriately, "I'm Alive" in *Xanadu*). But cash can only go so far. It can't cover up a lack of creativity. In fact, the best musicals to come out in the last seven years have been considerably cheap by comparison—*Fame*, *One Trick Pony*, *Hair*, *All That Jazz*, *Phantom of the Paradise*, and even *The Rocky Horror Picture Show*.

Good stories. By nature, so we have been told, musicals were for the whole family—until Bob Fosse (with *Cabaret*) threw that conceit out the window. The dictum of "family entertainment" can cloud the fact that most of the musicals made in the '50s and '60s could work without the music. Look at the sources: *The King*

and I came from *Anna and the King of Siam*; *My Fair Lady* is an adaptation of Shaw's *Pygmalion*; *West Side Story* is an update of *Romeo and Juliet*; *Mary Poppins* and Dr. Dolittle came by way of children's books. In the late '60s and '70s, *Funny Girl*, *Coal Miner's Daughter*, *Cabaret*, *The Buddy Holly Story*, and *The Rose* were all based on real people or real situations. In all of them, the stories are essential. These weren't just any common household stories, they were stories that moved an audience. *Mary Poppins*, apart from the fantasy elements, was about a workaholic father who had forgotten how to love.

By contrast, *Xanadu*'s story concerned a young man who wants to open an Art Deco roller-rink disco. Now, really, who cares about the guy and his roller rink?

Songs. The music in a musical must naturally justify itself. It should have a purpose (apart from selling albums): It should move the story and add a dimension to the characters, not stifle everything that takes place on screen. Examples I can think of are John Travolta's strut at

the beginning of *Saturday Night Fever* (to the accompaniment of the Bee Gees' "Stayin' Alive") and Tim Curry's entrance in *Rocky Horror* (singing "Sweet Transvestite"). It's the characters' first appearance, and the songs tell a great deal about the characters. Lyrical content must mean something; otherwise, why bother to sing in the first place?

Technology. Everything behind the scenes must work in a musical so well that you aren't aware of a cinematographer, editor, sound man, and so on. It's comparable to keeping your eye on the ventriloquist's dummy and not the ventriloquist's mouth. In *Annie*, the technical aspects are so self-conscious that the film feels like it has a cold draft running through it. By the same token, Francis Ford Coppola's *One From the Heart* is so esoteric in its design that the story is lost in the technology.

Cinema is a unique experience in that it can move an audience through simulated sound and vision and take them anywhere. In a musical, much like a Western or a sci-fi extravaganza, there is no better place to

exercise that art. At the finale of *Star!*, a mostly mediocre musical, Julie Andrews was supposed to be performing a big production number onstage in front of a large audience. We only saw this theater audience at the close of the number, because the camera was busy watching her jumping on trampolines, blowing up midgets(!), swinging on trapezes, and shimmying through flaming hoops. Through the fast editing and perfectly placed camera work, the movie audience saw much more than that audience supposedly seeing it live. That's what a movie can and is meant to do.

The idea of a movie is to present something so utterly special (not necessarily awesome) that you can't get it anywhere else but *that* movie. I suppose one could blame the economy on Hollywood's hard-driving

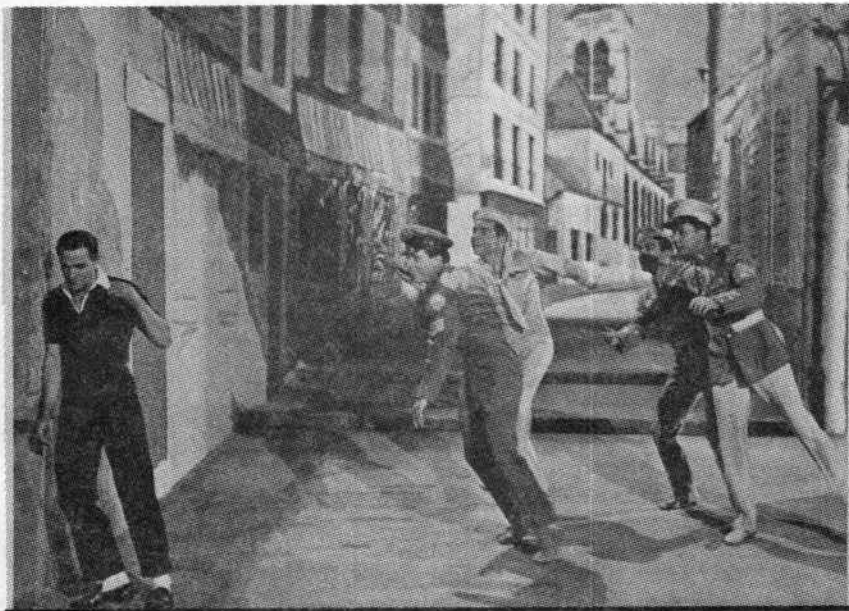
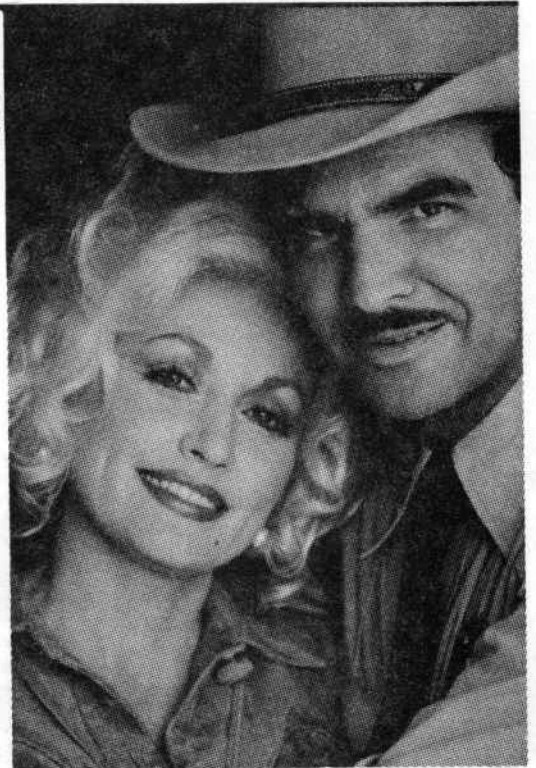
attempt to spend more money on fewer films in hopes of finding another *Star Wars* or *Jaws*. But in the process, filmmakers are losing their audiences. If Burt and Dolly are holding out for \$3 mil for us to have the privilege of seeing them frolic in a cathouse, that's fine, but they at least could give us something worth leaving home for.

Movies can get under your skin; they will take the money out of your hand while they flash in front of you, but if the producers of a movie are interested in more than your money, they will make you believe in anything, even a blue-eyed toad like E.T.
