The holidays are coming, and once again many of us will go through the binge-purge cycle. Some days we all will eat and drink way in excess, until it aches to get up off the floor. Then the regret comes: Oh Lord, let me eat what I want through the holidays and I swear I'll go on that strict diet January 1, then I'll eat no more than an Irish prisoner.

Nietzsche in *Ecce Homo*, his most autobiographical work, asserted that he could never trust anyone who didn't eat. He used to dive into his salads, even when he was a practicing vegetarian. You cannot trust a man who has no appetite. There is something wrong with his soul.

Nietzsche is right. You are not to be trusted if you show no desire for food, drink and sex. You are nobody's companion, nobody's friend. Eat and enjoy.

It's vulgar, it's common, but it is us. And when you eat and drink and are gay then you are one of us. Cheers.

Not to eat is to suffer from anorexia, which literally means you have "no desire", nothing in life for you is worth reaching for. Teen-age girls, mostly, suffer from anorexia as they will compete with one another to eat less and less to grow thinner and thinner. They only eat things like Dannon yogurt because the calories are listed on the carton.

Many gays try to force themselves into anorexia too, because they want to be thin, because thin is always in, thin always gets cruised. Even when you are 50, the gay ideal is to weigh exactly what you weighed in high school.

Two points are easily missed when you become overly pre-occupied with what you eat and drink. A diet is more than just what you eat and drink, a diet, as the ancient Greeks said, is your *daietos* your whole way of life. Not just what you eat, but how you live, your friends, your companions, your activities, your style, your way of being you. If you stop drinking, you probably will lose a lot of friends. If you stop desserts, you will lose a lot of your sweet friends. You'll be an isolated frump during the holidays. That's not a diet, that's a suicide.

Secondly, when you get down to the hard practice of restricting your food intake, because you want to look like you looked in high school (even though everyone else is 20 to 30 pounds heavier), you've got to know that you can lose all kinds of weight and still not change your body type. That's why you

can lose 50 or even 100 pounds and still have the same "look."

If you recheck your high school biology text book, you will recall that there are three types of bodies (1) the large or big frame [endomorph]; (2) the small frame [ectomorph], and (3) the middle frame [mesomorph].

You can change your eating habits and drinking habits, you can lose or gain weight, lose or gain inches around the waist, but you never alter your morphology, or change your basic body shape. It is a cruel hoax to lead you on to believe you can change your original shape, or type of body. Sad, but most diet books play that hoax.

clothes made by and for young Korean boys.

The mesomorph, the middle frame body, is the native Wisconsin, Iowan, Nebraskan farm boy type. It has the Hercules look: shoulders broader than hips, arms, neck, legs, and muscles in easy definition.

This type of body can go in and out of shape rather easily, and with this type of body a loss or gain of 30 pounds will change your look considerably. This type can comfortably wear cowboy or leather, and looks right in young men's clothes even when you are 50 or 60. Among gays this is a very popular lover body.

The ectomorph small frame body is the ever sexy, small hips, tight ass ideal gay profile body type. It is the San Francisco look. It is the frame so tiny that any size cock or basket seems large.

With this shape body, you will always seem to others underfed and undernourished, people will always suspect

you have a heavy cocaine habit or think you just got out of a state prison. No matter what you eat or drink, you remain David Bowie thin, you look like the punk who fell through the floor.

The ectomorph body can actually wear the clothes and hair styles that gay fashion designers invent to tease the rest of us. In the gay world, the ectomorph usually has nothing to worry about other than his soul.


Sad, but true, the shape you are in is probably the shape you were born with. Live with it. Be convivial with yourself.

women from Atlanta, Chicago, Dallas, Houston, Kansas City, Louisville, Minneapolis-St. Paul, New York, Seattle, and Toronto. Bowlers from Milwaukee's three gay leagues, Friday 775 Mixed Classic, Sunday Mixed Handicap, and Monday Night Irregulars will also participate. Up to 50 teams will be competing for the first place prize of \$1,000, in addition to double and single events awards. The tournament will again be held at Oriental Landmark Lanes, 2220 N. Farwell Ave.

Dr. Roger Gremminger and his staff are quite adept at keeping up with the latest in gay-related sexual diseases. There are many gay-oriented diseases that your regular family doctor may not be aware of, which the GPU STD Clinic may be able to track down.

The clinic is also beginning testing at the Club Baths, Milwaukee on the second and fourth Tuesday of every month from 7-9pm.

Donations are urged to help support the operating costs of keeping such clinic services available to you, but no one will be refused services.

Other VD services are offered at the Municipal Social Hygiene Clinic at 841 N. Broadway, Room 110. Their hours are Monday and Thursday 11:30am-7:15pm; Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday 8:30am-4pm.

HOORAY FOR HOLLYWOOD PART II

The Dennis Wesela Memorial Fund Show #2 is scheduled to run for three days in early and mid-December at the Factory-Loading Dock Stage. These shows are done with donated time and effort by the over 35 people involved in the productions. The money raised at the door and for reserved table seating—goes into a separate account and the only money coming out is for the costs associated with putting the show on stage—props and costumes.

When asked about the goals set for the Fund, Director John Rogge said,

"Basically we wanted to get something together so people wouldn't forget Dennis, and to provide a common base for everyone to work from together. We wanted to involve people in a fun-type organization that provides entertainment for the community and at the same time, raises money for worthwhile gay causes. I'm also always open for suggestions on distribution of contributions. They can write me in care of The Factory, or stop in the bar and talk to me." According to Rogge, "The people that saw the first Memorial Fund Show—'Hooray For Hollywood,' they'll realize it's a real polished production show—lots of props and we're planning on making #2 even better yet."

"Many performers—both male and female, straight and gay, have been donating their time for the last three months, doing rehearsals three nights a week, and we're still a month away from the show," Rogge continued. There are over 30 people involved—performers from all over the city, in the production numbers. Very few single numbers will be done, and there will be at least 15 scale production numbers.

Numbers in the show will include scenes from *Camelot*, *Chorus Line*, *West Side Story*, *Ain't Misbehavin'*, *Gi-Gi*, *Bye Bye Birdie*, *Anything Goes*, *Oklahoma*, *Chicago*, and *South Pacific*.

A financial report will be issued during the run of the show and on the last night of the shows' run, cheques will be donated from the fund to numerous organizations and individuals that have made contributions to gays in Milwaukee and Wisconsin. The fund originally started as a legal defense fund, but that has been altered to an overall gay fund-raising concept.

Rogge also noted that The Factory receives no rental fee, and that Chuck

ASSEMBLY BILL 70 PASSED

MADISON—The Wisconsin State Assembly recently passed Assembly Bill 70—(Wisconsin State Human Rights Bill) by a vote of 49 to 45. This bill prohibits discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation in the areas of employment, housing, and public accommodations. The bill draft defines sexual orientation as having preference for either heterosexuality, homosexuality, or bisexuality.

The bill will now move into the State Senate, where hearings are expected to take place in late January, 1982, and if and when passed there, will move to the desk of Governor Lee Dreyfus for sign-

ing into law. If passed and signed by the Governor, Wisconsin would join only two other states with an anti-discrimination law—California and Pennsylvania.

The time is now for you to contact your local State Senator and reiterate your desire for passage of this bill. Call the legislative hotline—toll free dial 1-800-362-9696. Even if you don't know who your senator is, by giving your address, the hotline people will look it up for you. Talk to your friends and relatives, and have them write or call too. The Moral Majority and its cronies could decide to mount an offensive campaign against this bill, and there wouldn't be enough votes to override a governor's veto.

Of special interest to Milwaukee-area gays, Assembly members Gus Menos, James Rutkowski, and George Klicka all opposed passage of the bill. Remember that next time they want your vote.

Legally Speaking

My life, somehow, has gotten quite crazy. Meetings, dinners, speeches, and other commitments have left me very little time for personal relaxation. On top of everything else, I am in the middle of establishing a relationship with someone I care deeply about. So...when Wayne and I were offered a remote cabin in upper Wisconsin for the weekend we jumped at the chance.

Unfortunately, we had about two-hours notice...my desk was piled with work and this article wasn't even started. At first I thought of skipping the column this time. Then I realized I have many small things I've wanted to write about, none of which are long enough to fill two pages...for instance:

Remember *Gaydreams*? That was the Cincinnati radio program whose producer was arrested after he aired a segment on sexual lubricants. If you read my column about the arrest you'll remember that the county prosecutor, Simon Leis, Jr., also has been involved with the prosecution on Len Matlovich. He opposed the showing of *Oh Calcutta!* and *The Last Tango in Paris*...well, Judge Peter Outcalt dismissed the felony charges pending against John Zeh (*Gaydreams*' producer).

Prosecutor Leis wants to appeal, radio station WAIF's chairman says the anti-gay campaign is a "waste of taxpayers' money", and the station, which is supported by subscribers (much like the public television) has seen a large

increase in donations since the publicity.

Of interest to members of my profession...The Florida Board of Bar Examiners is continuing to grill potential attorneys about their sexuality.

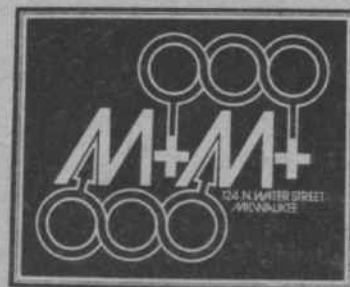
Although the Florida Supreme Court ruled in June that "private non-commercial sex acts between consenting adults are not relevant to prove fitness to practice law," according to a Miami paper two applicants have recently been questioned about their sexuality by the board of examiners.

Twice the Florida Supreme Court has been called upon to stop the practice of questioning homosexual applicants to the bar. The first time concerned questions about "orientation"...the examiners merely changed their questions to concern "homosexual acts." Now it appears that each individual complaint will be litigated.

Moving on...two cases in my office have prompted me to deal with gay youth in several recent columns. In the process, I have increased my reading...my awareness of the difficulties facing our kids today. Things seem to have changed from the days when I came out, although it wasn't that long ago. The reaction of parents doesn't seem to be much different however.

As a result of my contact with the families involved in the two cases I mentioned, I have found another book I'd like to recommend to you.

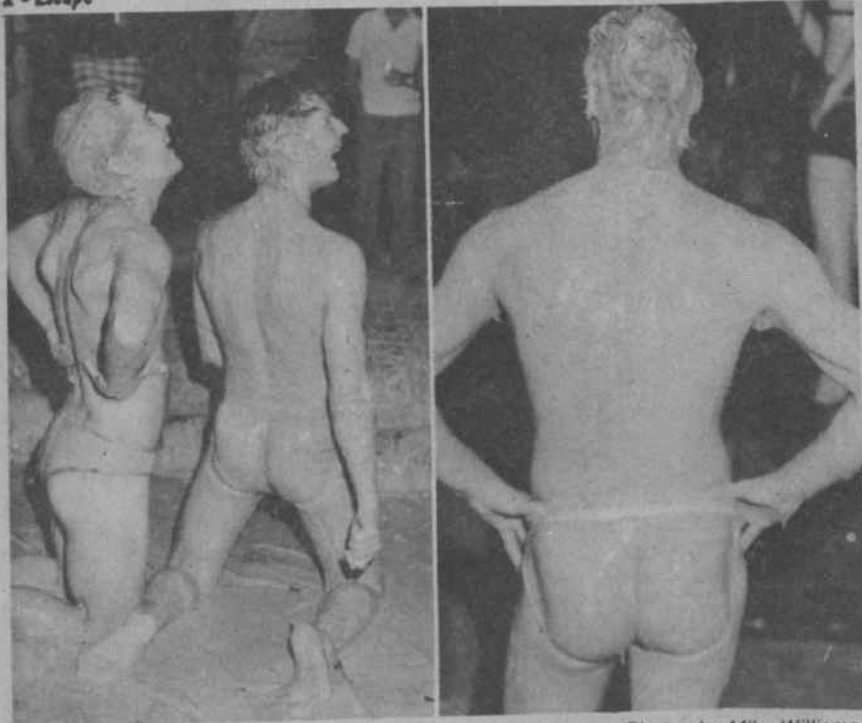

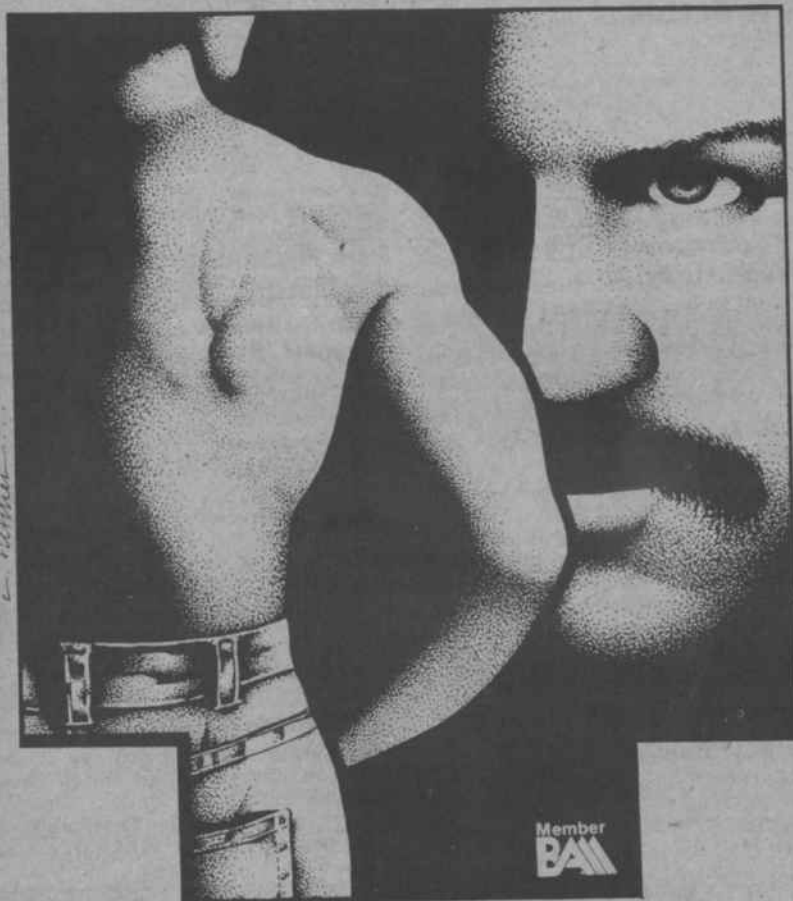

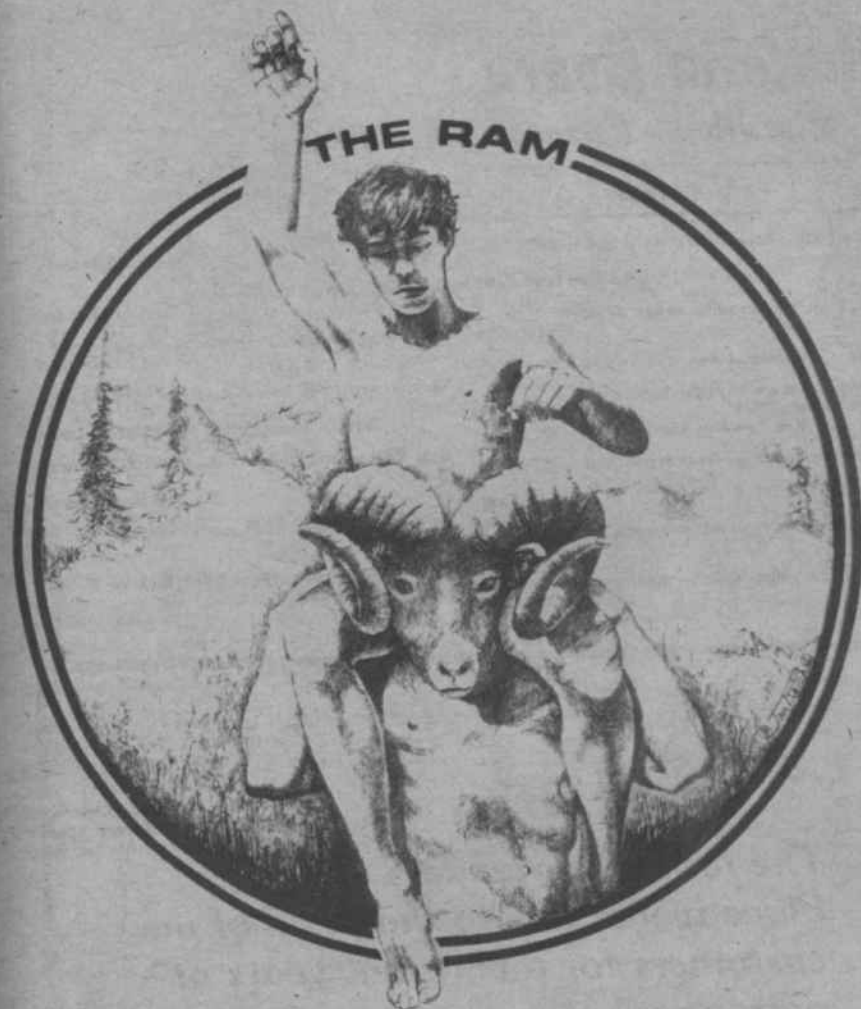
