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Legally Speaking

Speaking Of High School Civics

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for a redress of grievances."

Beginning journalism students learn that a good opening paragraph should tell its readers everything. To keep attention, it should be exact and to the point.

The same stylistic approach must apply to legislation too, as the above quoted First Amendment to the Constitution indicates. Those forty-four words say it all. In one paragraph, the framers created enough work to keep thousands of judges, lawyers, and scholars busy for decades.

What the hell did they mean?

Like the Bible, there are those who believe the Constitution must be taken literally and those who profess it merely sets the tone for future discussion. Ironically, it is often the same people who argue for a literal interpretation of the Bible, arguing against one for the Constitution.

As an attorney, I sometimes suspect that our courts avoid Constitutional cases concerning gay rights. Obviously, it is pretty hard to keep a straight face when telling gay people they aren't part of "the people."

Recently, Oklahoma was faced with a

First Amendment case involving the right of gay students to officially organize and meet on the campus of the State University. Since 1976, gay students have been refused their applications for official recognition as a student group. Having exhausted all administrative remedies, they went to court.

U.S. District Judge, Alma Wilson, must not be a "literal interpretationist." In his decision, Judge Wilson stated, "There is no constitutional guarantee against discrimination with reference to sexual orientation or sex preference."

What the hell did he mean?

To understand Judge Wilson's decision (if that's possible), you have to remember your high school civics class. You have to remember that another Amendment, the Fourteenth, forces each state to apply the first Amendment internally... including the freedom to assemble.

Judge Wilson, if logic applies, seems to imply that it's okay to ignore that freedom guaranteed by this nation, if the denial applies to sexual orientation or sex preference. To put it another way, queers got no right to organize.

"Oh no," his supporters might say, "queers can organize, the state just doesn't have to help them do it."

Now that makes sense... the State, via a publicly financed university, may decide to fund those groups it likes and refuse those with which it is uncomfortable. That's kind of like saying State can fund the Boy Scouts but refuse the Girls... logic.

Fortunately, the Supreme Court Justices in Oklahoma attended a different civics class. Overturning Judge Wilson, their 14-page decision stated, "mere undifferentiated fear or apprehension on the part of the University Regents or disagreement with philosophy, no matter how repugnant to these officials, is not enough to overcome First Amendment freedoms."

Perhaps Justices of the Supreme Court of Oklahoma also took some journalism classes. The First Amendment says it all.

What seems to bother most laymen to the judicial system is the fact that Oklahoma's ruling isn't unique. Gay student groups in Missouri, Texas, New Hampshire, and Virginia have won similar suits in the last few years. Why then isn't it universally recognized in this country that people have the freedom to assemble? Why must the gay community bear the costly legal appeals and why must the public pay the price to defend the States' actions over and over again?

To understand, think back to civics again. Article Ten reserves to the States the right to make laws not reserved to the United States or prohibited by the Constitution. Each state may make different laws on the same subject.

Confused? Don't be. It's all quite simple... particularly when you realize that various religious groups have faced the same uphill battle for State University recognition. Fearing a state by state battle in fifty courts, they shot their wad, so to speak, and went all the way to the big guys. On Dec. 8, 1981, the U.S. Supreme Court flatly told public universities that they must allow religious groups to meet on their campuses.

I suppose it's too much to expect Universities or local courts to understand

that there isn't a difference between religious, political, ethnic, or any other groups when it comes to the freedom of assembly. That right is guaranteed by the federal government and the States have no power to avoid it.

Unfortunately, the lofty nine Justices sitting in Washington have never seen fit to tell the States they can't make separate rules for "queers," and until they do the States will.

By the way, when attorneys for the ACLU and Gay Rights Advocates petitioned the Oklahoma Supreme Court for attorneys fees against the University, they were denied. Granting immunity from liability, the Court noted that in their opinion the Regents hadn't acted with "malicious intent"... Guess I must have been asleep during that civics lesson.

On April 11, I will be addressing a convention of gay student groups from 30 colleges across the Midwest, hosted at Northern Illinois University (DeKalb) by the Gay/Lesbian Student Union (an officially recognized university group). LUCK AND PLUCK

Milwaukee, unlike New York and San Francisco, is not just a suck and fuck town. Appleton, Green Bay, Madison, Kenosha, Oshkosh, and Racine are not suck and fuck towns. They are all luck and pluck towns.

Some people think these towns are too old-fashioned and dull, quaint and Victorian, as though to live there is still to be in the Dark Ages.

These unenlightened snobs wouldn't know a Victorian Blue Boy if he came in bed to sleep with them. With their attitude, they would never be able to light his candle.

Recently, I've had the good luck to pluck off of a used bookstore two early novels by Horatio Alger, a guy, today, either little read, or falsely remembered.

Alger wrote over 130 novels about

Victorian boys growing up in the middle of New York city. That's when the Big Apple still had its shine and polish, and was a decent town like Milwaukee.

As everyone knows without ever reading a Horatio Alger novel, his plots are built around the rags to riches theme, a poor shoeshine or newsboy lifts his own bootstrap and plucks himself a rich one who aids him in becoming a gentleman himself. Thus, a Ragged Dick becomes a Richard Hunter, Esq. "a young gentleman on his way to fame and fortune."

Old men helped young boys, and then the younger gentlemen helped other boys. It is the story of how men and boys cared for and loved each other before the advent of chicken hawks and social workers.

What everyone forgets is that Alger was the first to describe street life for young boys in a major American city. He was an accurate journalist.

These Victorian boys were not as quaint and as out of it as we today like to believe. We make them into virgins, in order to preserve our own false purity, not theirs.

These little Victorian street-hustlers knew how to love and take care of each other. They didn't just play each other for tricks. Sure, they had their smoke, they had their drink, their thieves, their nights at the Bowery, their fights with the cops, their mess of trouble. But they also knew how to be buddies. How to share some

warmth, be companions, and exchange an easy familiarity.

It was not unusual for one Victorian boy to sleep with another. Economy of beds, and economy of style. Boys did not grow up in ultraclean isolation. They associated. Even Abraham Lincoln had a male bed-partner til he was in his early twenties.

Okay, so they slept together. But did they *do* anything?

You mean like suck and fuck.

Yes, of course. But they did not feel compelled to brag about it. They did not trick, either their friends or themselves.

Horatio Alger was driven out of Brewster, Mass., and forced out of his job as Unitarian Minister, because he had been caught in the "revolting crime of familiarity with boys."

He never denied it. He just went on to New York and lived in the Newsboys Lodging House with more boys. He lived openly with boys for the last 30 years of his life.

The Victorians may be wiser and more astute than we give them credit. Why talk about your sex life, it just brings you worse luck. They kept quiet about it, but they also kept their luck — and their pluck, and left the world of overt suck and fuck for the more literal minded squares who would live after them.

So, be careful when you sneer at the repressed Victorians, the joke may be on you.

We, today, are the sharpies who don't go to church, but continue to confess, at every chance, our shameless fantasies. We are the ones who can't wait to tell every lurid detail about last night's trick. It is a

mark of our own peculiar emptiness that we feel compelled to tell all, and show nothing — that we blurt out everything we have ever done with anyone, as though love were a book of lists.

We are the false Puritans, living severe isolated lives. Boys in our world don't have boyhoods anymore, they live in self-imposed isolation tanks. They have their own solloptical sound system covering their ears to keep out the outside world. And if they feel down, they take a pill. Or if they feel too up, they take another kind of pill.

We live in our little private black holes, in a pit of darkness, and think we are enlightened, because we don't need companions, friends, other boys to sleep with. Who needs others, when you can fuck yourself?

Who needs life, as one kid told me snapping his fingers in a disco, when you can get high on drugs? They used to have things like vice and virtue. Today we have attitude. All you need is attitude.

But attitude is not a sign of freedom. It just means you've got your nose stuck up your own black hole.

Those Victorian boys in Horatio Alger never heard of California, San Francisco, the fast lane, the Eagles, Suicide Punks — and they never were so foolish as to take anything to the limit. For that takes the fun out of everything.

Those Alger boys thought "Milwauk-ie" was a town far out West. And they never knew that San Francisco, the suck and fuck town, was going to set the standards of public behavior for all gay people everywhere.

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
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


Let's keep a few places in our land, where boys will not only be boys, but also where boys can still sleep with their buddies and no one will think twice about it.



A LOOK AT F.I.S.T.

Milwaukee is about to be a pioneer in another gay sporting event; the first gay scratch bowling tournament. The first annual Factory Invitational Scratch Tournament (F.I.S.T.), sponsored by Chuck and the Factory, will be held on Saturday, March 6. This one-day bowling event will be held at Pinky's Bowling Lanes on Milwaukee's south side.

Chuck Balistreri, the owner of the Factory, is donating \$1,050 to the prize fund of the tournament. This is in addition to the prize money that will come from the entry fees, so that the total payout is expected to be over \$2,500. First place winners will be guaranteed \$500 for team event, \$200 for doubles, \$150 for singles, and \$200 for all events. In addition, trophies and medals, donated by the Factory will be presented to the top bowlers in each event.

Invitations have been sent to most of the team captains from out of town who participated in the recent Holiday Invitational Tournament. Due to the limited number of alleys and the one-day format, no more than 16 teams will be accepted for the tournament. Entry fees will be \$35 for each bowler. Applications must be mailed, and entries will be accepted on the earliest postmarks.

A reception to welcome the out-of-town bowlers will be held at the Loading Dock bar of the Factory on Friday evening, March 5 from 10pm-midnight. Everyone is welcome, and there is no charge for this. Bowling will start at 9am on Saturday morning, and will continue throughout the day, with a lunch break scheduled about noon. The awards dinner and ceremonies will be held in the Loading Dock of the Factory on Saturday evening. Cocktails will be 7:30 to 8:30, a buffet dinner will be served at 8:30pm, and the awards presentations should start about 9:30. Bowlers will receive dinner tickets. A limited number of dinner tickets for non-bowlers will be available at the Factory for \$6.
