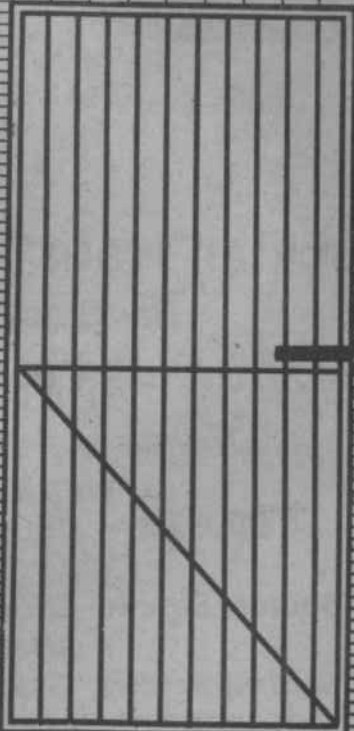


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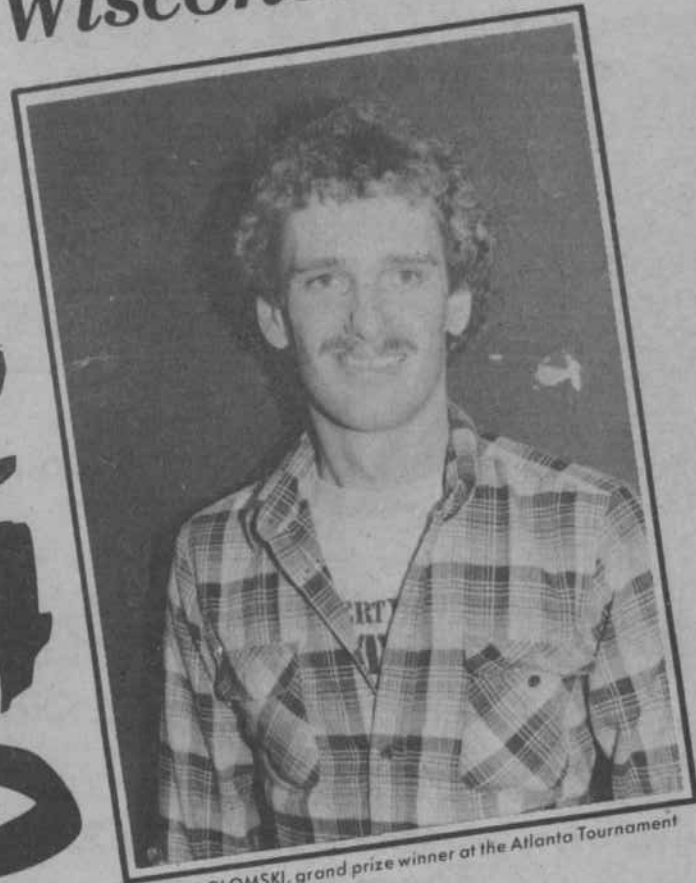
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GREG GLOMSKI, grand prize winner at the Atlanta Tournament

Sexual orientation discrimination is wrong... it's a shame gay people don't believe it.

Standing knee deep in snow last week, some joker tried to sell me his tickets to the season opener. I turned him down.

Actually, the weather notwithstanding, I wouldn't have purchased the tickets. I've lived within spitting distance of Wrigley Field for six years without attending a game.

I did play baseball as a kid. . . . about three times. . . . and my family "allows" me to umpire at their annual reunion picnic.

Obviously I'm no baseball expert. But I do possess a basic knowledge of the rules. And, I know when the rules stink.

Softball season is upon us, and softball has become the national sport of the gay community. In March, eleven members of the North American Gay Amateur Athletic Alliance (NAGAAA) met in San Francisco to

lay policy for the upcoming season. As last year, they passed a rule which is blatantly discriminatory and therefore wrong.

The 80/20 Rule states that NAGAAA will not recognize a team unless at least 80 per cent of its members are gay. To make matters worse, even if a team complies with those prejudicial requirements, *NONE* of the non-gay members may play in the league's World Series.

I'm told that Chicago proposed the elimination of that rule during the meeting in San Francisco. Los Angeles and New York joined in the effort. But NAGAAA wouldn't do it. . . . apparently our Mecca, San Francisco, threatened to pull out if they had to compete with heterosexuals.

I addressed the absurdity of the 80/20 Rule in a similar column about a year ago. At the time I wondered about the logic behind limiting the number of straight players. Do we fear they're better athletes? Is our masculinity threatened? I also pondered the problem of determining each participant's sexual orientation (ah, the casting couch. . . . oops, casting bench). More importantly, I questioned our rights to practice the very same discrimination which we seek to eliminate in this country! Sexual orientation discrimination should *NOT* be tolerated, whether it is practiced against us or we employ it ourselves. Who you choose to sleep with has no more to do with playing softball than it does with seeking employment or housing. Gay people should be in a pretty good position to comprehend.

How in the hell do we justify the implications of the 80/20 Rule?

NAGAAA's World Series will be held in San Francisco this Labor Day. Unless you're directly involved, you might not feel the need to protest this discriminatory rule. But the eyes of our national community will be

watching the games, as will many non-gay people. Next year, the World Series is scheduled for Chicago. It may be too late to affect the west coast, but we can correct the situation before it comes to the Midwest.

By the way, this year's NAGAAA decision does more than just stink. It may effectively eliminate Wisconsin's sixteen teams from competition.

Wisconsin's recent Gay Rights Law has become the flag ship of the movement for our equality. The law speaks to employment, housing, public accommodations and government policy. . . . it's something from a fairy tale. While it doesn't cover membership in a private club, it is very clear in its restrictions on the use of public accommodations.

To the extent that teams in Wisconsin discriminate in membership they may not be

able to utilize public parks for practice. . . to the extent they don't discriminate they are prohibited from participation in a major gay organization. . . . does that make sense?

Obviously the law is new. There hasn't been any litigation at all, much less a determination of whether or not membership discrimination precludes a team from use of a public park. Perhaps we can find a loop hole?

As I mentioned, I'm no expert at baseball. But I know that the 80/20 Rule stinks. Know what else stinks. . . . the fact that the first test case of Wisconsin's Gay Rights Law may be brought AGAINST US rather than FOR US.

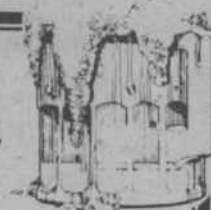

laundry its just to wash sheets while your at work.

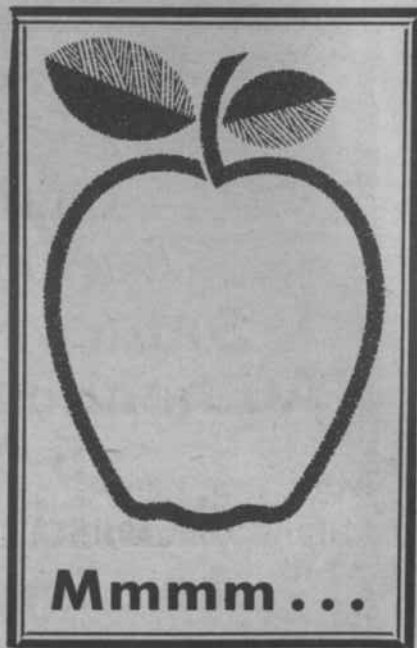

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Think Pieces *Fourth—World People*

What kind of people are gay people? What world do we belong to? Historically, there are three given worlds: the West, the East, and the developing nations. Most people belong to one of these three worlds. Gay people both do and do not belong to one of the three.

Because of this unease over where to place gay people, I see us as possibly a fourth-world people.

First, there is the world of the top dog. It is inhabited by mostly white European-American and yellow Japanese bourgeois liberals. They control all the unnatural resources: They have most of the booze, drugs, guns, wealth and credit cards. They don't have to do anything by being there: they can watch it all on television. The first-world people are not the salt but the sugar of the earth.

In theory and ideology, the first-world is hard on gay people. Its inhabitants do not yet fully accept gay people as members of

the tribe. But in practice they are becoming lax and soft toward gay people. Their latest fashion is making movies that show gay people making love.

Second, there is the world of the barking dog. This is the so-called communist world of "people's republics." Its members rail and bark against the corruption of the top dog; they accurately describe all the horrors of the first world, and then go about making societies that are even more horrifying. They bitch that the first world is just imperialistic bread and circuses, and then create a world that has little bread and no circuses.

In theory, the second world should treat gay people as oppressed people and help them to be free. But in practice it is too puritanical and uptight. In the second world no body is allowed to have fun, so who can be gay in that kind of world?

The third world is the world of the underdog. It is filled with countries that keep changing their names. The people of the third world are all-to-real; in fact, they can only be real, and that is the source of their poverty. People in the first world have fat bellies from overeating; people in the third world have distended stomachs from not eating.

The third world is always choosing for leaders mad dogs who think they are Englishmen. They foam at the mouth and at the other two worlds, and they live like royalty.

In the third world, gay people usually are unnamed, like anonymous bastards. Or if discovered, they are castrated, like eunuchs.

Gay people don't easily fit or belong to any of the three worlds they are born into. Gay people are, by nature, anti-proletarian. *Proles*, from which we get the word "proletarian," in Latin means offspring or children.

In the first world, citizens are expected to make babies and have nuclear families. In the second and third worlds, citizens are expected to follow the leader, be seen and

not heard, and generally act like children. They live in the happy dictatorships of the proletariat.

Because of an anti-proletarian streak in their nature, gay people will never quite get along in any of the three given worlds. They are always in the minority. Everywhere. Even black people are the majority in some third-world countries. But gay people are always in the minority.

Some gay people deeply resent the fact they are not and probably never will be accepted as full and equal members of the Majority tribe. Homosexuals cannot become totally homogenous. Thus, some gay people are filled with rage and outrage, and often seem to live on paths that are self-destructive and suicidal. Some want to party till they are pooped.

Once, however, a gay person overcomes his personal rage and resentment for being excluded from the major tribe, once he stops crying because he is not one of them and never will be, then he is free. Free to try a new self, free to become a fourth-world person.

Fourth-world people do not have to participate in the other three dog-eat-dog worlds. Fourth-world people can smile when young Polish students toast Ronald Reagan as a rebellious act against the oppressive top dogs of the Kremlin.

Fourth-world people can smile when Eldridge Cleaver leaves his ghetto for Paris communes and Red Chinese salons, and then comes home a Bible-thumper.

Fourth-world people do not have to submit to any of the given realities: They are free to invent their own.

I cannot define the fourth world from A to Z or describe its evolving consciousness: It is a possibility. It is the world of the possible, where anything and anyone is possible.

The fourth world is for those who have fought and lost so many battles that they don't even know the name of the war any-

more. But they remain fresh and uncynical.

Fourth-world people are still willing to feel the pain, because they still want to feel their world. They hold on to dreams as the only true reality. Let the other three worlds go to the dogs, and the cynics.

We are cat people. We can be Vangelis or Nastassia Kinski, or Jon Hassel, or Kitaro, or Deuter, or Brian Eno, or Patti Smith, or David Bowie, or just a bunch of anonymous talking heads.

But we are everywhere. Ready to share our new consciousness, which proclaims we are fourth-world people, free, alive, and gay.

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Marijuana:

OUR BODIES OUR MINDS "Marijuana: An Update"

It's planting time across California in thousands of backyards and fields, and this seems a good time to review the nearly 50 articles in the office 'marijuana' file accumulated over the past 10 years from the medical literature. They are often conflicted and suspiciously seem to reflect whatever the author set out to prove. But here are some of the more established points...

There are about 30 'cannabinoids' in marijuana, which refer to the cut flowers, leaves and stems of the Indian Hemp plant *Cannabis sativa*. Hemp is an annual weed growing freely everywhere throughout the United States. At one time, it was used commercially for rope until other natural and synthetic fibers reduced its demand. Hashish, or 'hash,' is the resin of the flowering tops of the female plants and is the most potent material of all, about 10 times as strong as other plant parts. The psychoactive cannabinoid is the delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC. It is neither a stimulant, sedative, tranquilizer, hallucinogen or narcotic, but has properties in common with all these drugs.

Since the cannabinoids are fat-soluble, it can take 30 days for their complete elimination from the body. They have a half-life of seven days. When smoked, though, the onset of 'high' is usually 10-20 minutes and is gone within three hours; these times seem to correlate with the bloodstream levels.

Each cigarette contains about 500 mgms. of marijuana, but only 1% of that is THC. When smoked, 58% is absorbed as opposed to only 50% when ingested. Thus, smoking is a more efficient method.

The lethal dose for THC is very high, and most articles state that no fatalities have been directly attributed to marijuana. One Frenchman survived an attempt suicide after

smoking nine to ten pipes of half-and-half tobacco and hashish!

For the user, there are the familiar sensations: a rise in heart rate, decreased saliva, dry mouth, conjunctivitis, a well-known hunger (the 'munchies'), technicolor visual sensations, keener sound sense and, of course, euphoria. Also documented is a decreased ability by the marijuana smoker to recall what was just said. Emotions are 'loosened,' but at present there is no objective evidence of heightened artistic creativity. If marijuana causes a specific and characteristic effect on perception, it is that of a striking distortion of subjective time estimation.

Surprisingly, attempts to show that it causes decreased coordination haven't panned out. You may have read or heard that the California CHP lately is doing a field study comparing drivers' abilities while on marijuana or alcohol. When this was done 12 years ago and reported by *The New England Journal of Medicine*, marijuana subjects did nearly as well as placebo drivers, and both of these did much, much better than alcohol-influenced drivers.

Marijuana research has been 'hemp'ered by poor controls in that the marijuana used can vary so much; plants grown experimentally can vary 400-fold in potency, depending upon the strain, the growing conditions, the time of harvest and the part of the plant used.

In the literature there are reports of anaphalaxis (severe systemic reactions) to marijuana smoke, with hives, wheezing, and other severe allergy symptoms.

There are numerous articles on the 'therapeutic potentials' of cannabis and, interestingly, it was the grand old man of medicine himself, Dr. William Osler, who was one of its proponents and said this about migraine headaches: "Cannabis...is probably the most satisfactory remedy." A well-

known use is the well-publicized anti-emetic effects of marijuana, and it is in many states legal for certain oncologists to prescribe it for the nausea in cancer patients on chemotherapy.

Marijuana also is associated with reduced intraocular pressure without visual function alteration. Thus, it is being studied for use in patients with increased eye pressure or glaucoma.

In addition, marijuana does seem to cause bronchodilatation, and its use in asthma has been conjectured. Yet it is also known to cause lung damage, probably more than cigarette smoke, along with precancerous changes of the tracheal lining and bronchitis. Measurements of lung function have also shown decreases with moderate-to-heavy usage, but large-scale epidemiologic studies are needed to ascertain if there is a relation to significant obstructive pulmonary disease.

On one hand, marijuana is destructive to the defense systems of the lung that protect against bacteria, but, on the other, certain of the cannabinoids have shown antibacterial activity against gram-positive bacteria, and there's one anecdote of a pathologist using marijuana on an infected thumb with success!

Marijuana has been known to cause abnormal amounts of chromosomal proteins and a condensation of nuclei in both sperm

and white blood cells. There are also reports alleging mutations caused by marijuana in rats, mice and monkeys. This could be an effect on the placenta or interference with maternal pituitary balance. Also, human lymphocytes (a kind of white blood cell) incubated with THC have shown increased chromosome breakage related to decreased DNA synthesis. The amounts in these experiments far exceeded what is taken in single by man, but remember that with chronic use, the marijuana by-products reach very high concentrations in fat, and these could be stored in testes and ovaries to have mutagenic effects.

There was also a flurry of claims that THC caused testosterone decreases, although there is not evident agreement in later conflicting reports. (They tried to show decreased testosterone among male homotoo, but later reports refuted this.)

Other conclusions of the articles are that are no withdrawal symptoms, nor does tolerance develop. Perhaps one of the most surprising statements to find was this closing confession *The New England Journal of Medicine*: must remember that recreational drug use always been a part of human society. It is possible, and it may not be desirable to it to a stop...The ultimate place of mariin our culture will reflect social as well as pressures."

CAN AN INFECTED PERSON DO ANYTHING TO CONTROL RECURRENCES?

There are two important factors- general health and stress- that may be related to viral reactivation. Any attention given to maintaining good health and avoiding stress may help to lessen a pattern of frequent recurrence.

Since medical science has yet to develop a substance that is fully curative and completely safe in dealing with herpes, the body is largely on its own in limiting viral activity. General health maintenance, which includes a balanced diet good nutrition, and adequate rest and sleep, can lead to heightened overall resistance to infection. When a person is in a state of good health, the body's natural defenses are well equipped to counter the virus, not only by limiting recurrences, but by diminishing their severity. When a person's health is not properly maintained the body's natural

defenses are weakened and lack the ability to check the virus; in these cases, recurrence may be more frequent and more severe.

In addition to focusing on factors that promote and maintain good health understanding the relationship between stress and susceptibility to illness is valuable, because - although its precise role has been defined- stress is known to be involved in viral recurrence. Stress may directly trigger viral activity or by lowering resistance, it may indirectly pave the way for a reemergence of the virus. Regardless of the exact manner in which stress may precipitate attacks, there is no doubt that it is a contributing factor.

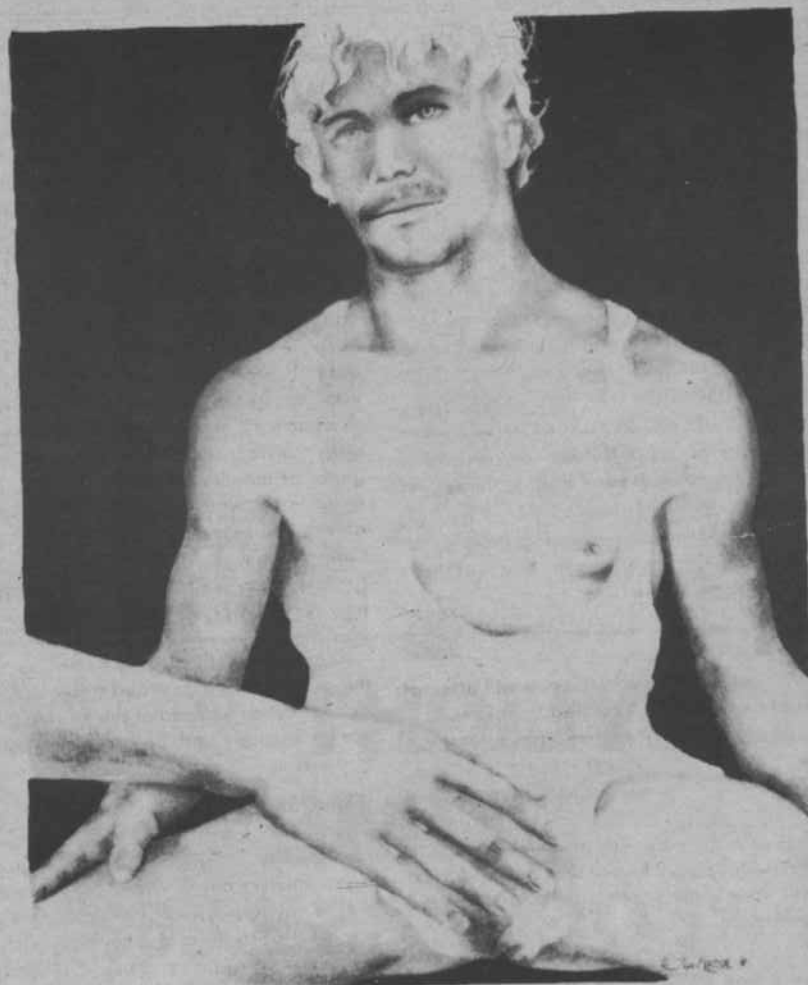
DO ANY SPECIAL PRECAUTIONS HAVE TO BE TAKEN WHEN SORES ARE PRESENT?

During the active phase of herpes three things have to be guarded against; secondary infection, spread of the virus to a new site on the body and the exposure of others to the virus.

Intact skin and mucous membranes form an important protective barrier against infection by many bacteria and microorganisms (icky bugs). When lesions develop because of herpes they offer potential entry points for bacteria and other agents. These organisms can in turn cause a secondary infection on top of the herpes, and in some cases they can be many times more painful and distressing than the herpes itself. To minimize the risk of bacterial infection, herpes sores should be kept clean and, above all dry; ointments and creams, except those prescribed to treat secondary infections, tend to prolong the lesions. To the greatest extent possible avoid scratching, picking rubbing, or touching the sores.

Several simple procedures will minimize

the risk of accidental viral transfer:

1. Wash your hands if you inadvertently do touch the sores.
2. When you wake up wash your hands before rubbing your eyes.
3. If you wear contact lenses and there are sores in your mouth or on your lips don't use saliva as a wetting agent for lenses (under no circumstances should you insert contact lenses without first washing your hands.
4. ABSOLUTY NO SEXUAL CONTACT when sores are present. Normal sexual activity can be resumed once all signs of the herpes have disappeared.

I know this medical mumbo jumbo can be confusing so if you have any questions please come to the clinic.
