"Can Gay People Get Fair Trials?"

Shortly after arriving in Chicago to attend law school, someone gave me a button bearing that inscription. It still hangs on my bedroom door.

Though I waiver on how I'd answer the button's question, recently two cases were reported which tend to give me hope. Both cases were "lost" at trial but reversed on appeal... one in Illinois and one in New York.

The Illinois case involved a seventeenvear-old employee of the Marion (Il.) Ramada Inn. It seems the young man was delivering room service when two men raped him.

In a cleverly filed suit, his attorney sought to hold the hotel responsible for failing to provide adequate protection against the attack. In order to hold the hotel liable, the law requires the injured party to prove that the consequences were clearly foreseeable. Thus the attor-

ney for the boy argued in his written brief:

"When two queers get a young boy in a room by themselves, where one of the queers is drunk and much larger than the boy, it is not unforseeable as a matter of law, that the larger, drunk queer will try to do something to the boy."

Fortunately, while the trial judge bought it, the Appelate Court did not.

In its opinion, the Illinois Appelate Court noted, "No data has been cited that suggests that homosexuals as a class are dangerous or more prone to violence than any class in the general population."

Score one for justice.

In honesty, I can't say that the attorney was wrong in seeking damages for his client. While I'm prejudiced against him for his choice of the word "queer" in a legal document, what happened to his client is an abomination . . . as is the fact that he attempted to generalize against a class of people.

The second case of interest comes from the appelate division of the New York Supreme Court. Reversing a Manhattan Family Court decision, a gay man was allowed to adopt his lover.

The notion of adoption as a means of legitimizing lover relationships is not new. Several states have grappled with it. Not too very long ago a Milwaukee couple successfully completed an adoption. Though I can't advise this recourse to our biased marriage laws, there sometimes seem good reasons for its consideration.

In the New York case, two lovers of several years had resided in an apartment under a lease bearing only one name. The building was in the process of conversion to a cooperative, much like a condomi-





nium. Fearing trouble with a provision which restricted occupancy to immediate family members, one lover petitioned to adopt the other.

In reversing the lower court's refusal, the Appelate Court stated:

"The 'nuclear family' arrangement is no longer the only model of family life in America."

"The best description of a family is a continuing relationship of love and care, and an assumption of responsibility for some other person."

Of greater importance than the factual situations of these two cases is the judicial logic seen in the decisions. Both imply that justice may be blinding itself to society's pressures again.


Though it shouldn't be, often our courts are biased by sociological or cultural moods. Legal abortion, which wouldn't

have been considered thirty years ago is with us today . . . because our society embraced it. Slowly, as our efforts to modify society in general gain acceptance, courts follow suit.

I don't mean to imply that society must change before courts follow suit. Rahter a substantial amount of society seems to embrace a concept and the courts follow through to ensure that those remaining come around. As an example, it may be generations before individual racial prejudice is eliminated, but because enough of society was ready for the change, laws (and judicial interpretation of those laws) protect individuals from race discrim-

Think Pieces The Jears of Pasolini This column was written on special assignment for my friend and Editor of Gay Life Chicago, Albert N. Williams



For the last several days, in humid Chicago, I have been reading and crying over the poems of Pier Paolo Pasolini. Tears? Yes. In America, the land of the smile-face, crying is a subversive act. But in Rome, Italy, and the Latin tradition, warm tears are a sign of humanity. Vergil's epic is unlike all other war stories, because it is filled with lacrimae rerum, the tears of things. In the Latin tradition, when you know the world and see the way things are, you have to cry; otherwise you are a thinking corpse.

Pasolini, speaking to the younger counterculture generation in "The Poetry of Tradition," tells his young friends they don't know what tears are if they have never wept over a 14th century manuscript. If you don't love you books and tradition, you have no place to call your own, no life to call gay. If Pasolini were to speak to some 'American hippie

gay activists, he would wonder why they are not home reading their Emerson and Thoreau, their Emily Dickinson and Willa Cather.

In America we say that happiness is our only goal, and we don't need to read books. Pasolini knew that happiness is too brief and too narrow. He didn't want to get high, he wanted to stay high all his life. That's why books were his drug and chief siurce.

When Americans, the smile-faces, have a midlife crisis they stay in and brood over their depression. When Pasolini had his two year grand funk-midlife depression, he stayed home days writing six verse tragedies in the manner of Corneille and Racine-the kind of stuff for which they name streets after you in Chicagoand went out every night cruising for sex with rough trade country boys. He dressed and looked like Prince Charles, drove an Alpha Romeo, and didn't care if he got beaten up.

Pasolini believed that religion as practiced in church was sexual perversion, people in church were too empty, submissive, and bourgeois. They are real deviants because they try to live outside their senses. They are truly sick. He believed, also, that sexual acts between intimate strangers were religious, sacred acts, the mystical union of fathers and sons. Born in Pieces, he had a complicated, Christ-like soul, and he died 53 years later in Scorpio at the hands of one of his unlucky "nocturnal sons." His death is like a Hitchcock movie. The kid hit him in the groin, after he made a pass; knocked him out, and then ran over him fleeing in Pasolini's Alpha Romeo GT.



Friends and critics are still arguing over what happened: Was it as assassination?—he had political enemies. A murder? He lived dangerously. A suicide. A suicide by proxy? He had rich French cinematic tastes. Or, was it just an accident, a nasty trick?

A man who lived like Pasolini was not destined to die in bed. His end on the Ostia Seaplane Basin, was probably the fates' final compliment to his full sad life. At age 4 he made drawings and paintings that are still worthy of European museums. At age 7, he wrote for his mother sonnets in the Petrach manner. By 20, he was reognized as a poet equal to Rimbaud, Pound, and Villon.

He wrote several novels about slum life in Rome. If he had ever come to Chicago, he would have spent his time in gay bars being polite; he would have cruised for rough trade in Uptown; he would have had a feast on Kentucky Chicken. He wrote about the Uptown of Rome and scandalized everyone with his truth about drugs, pimps, shit, blood, and hustlers. He wrote countless essays and articles. As Susan Sontag says: "he is indisputably the most remarkable figure to have

emerged in Italian arts and letters since the Second World War."

His movies are literary masterpieces, in making them he was every inch a poet. As he says in his introduction, "To The New Reader," every shot in his films is equivalent to a line in a poem. To understand a Pasolini film you have to do more than see, you have to read. Video tapes will help. The Gospel According to St. Matthew won instant praise and prizes from the Vatican, nuns and fundamentalists everywhere were amazed, they had never seen Jesus so sensual and so alive. When, however, they learned that their Jesus film that they were calling "the best Biblical film ever made" was made by a faggot and a Commie, they took back their prizes. "Keep your mildewed laurals!," he told them.

Salo: 120 Days of Sodom, his last film, is a dangerous and outrageous movie. In Salo, unlike the book by deSade, they just din't talk about it, they do it, so you see it and feel the awful horror of being a part of the ultimate S&M orgy. Pasolini describes facist hell in terms all too accurate and all too familiar. In Salo the encounter with hell is all too close to dismiss a mere alien being. It's us, or at least the best of us, when we let ourselves



fall into a world where tears no longer matter.

Pasolini creates a desperate world from which we cannot escape. To get through it you have "A Desperate Vitality." You have to cultivate your life and love like an aggressive Northern Italian farmer who cultivates his land.

They called him a commie, and the commies called him a faggot, and kicked him out of their cell. But he bounced back with his vitality intact. He made poems and works that were too sensual and material for the Catholics, and too Christ-like for the Marxists. And always, he kept his word. It made him cry, the total rejection. But he kept his faith. He was more "Catholic" than the Pope and more "conservative" than Ronald Reagan. For he knew you cannot be a universal man, and whole man, without also being a sexual man. And he knew you are not a conservative if you export 30 billion dollars worth of guns so every homocidal terrorist kid in the world has one. In real life. Pasolini, as he describes in "Souther Dawn," went to Jerusalem and made love to Palestinian boys in the alley behind his bourgois hotel. And the next morning



they tried to blackmail him for being bourgeis. They were unsuccessful, however, because he was not ashamed of their sweet feelings of love for him.

Pasolini was ashamed of nothing. He lived a full sane life: everything he did, every word he said was rich and sad and dangerous. He didn't care. His life was an open book: he was a poet, our poet. He has left us his books, with one warning: he was not out in this world looking for a casual summer reader; he wass looking for someone who would understand green Aprils and grev Mays, how lemons and roses, and blood and shit mix. He was looking not for a reader, but a lover to share his life and tears.

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
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

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

audience that needs to hear her the most. In only his second production, Luther Vandross creates a nice jazzy performance for Franklin, and the vocal arrangements give her vigorous support. Bound to keep the dancers jumping on the floor for awhile. "Jump, jump jump to it"!

In the same high-tempo vein as the Cage. Visages "Night Train" has been remixed by John Luongo for a limited Polydor 12-inch; hailing from Britian, this jazz-funk-influenced cut is by far the group's most accessible, and its hectic rhythm attack gives it heavy cross-appeal. Luongo and Visage's, Rusty Egan, respectively mixed and produced "Do What You Wanna Do."

As often is the case, the most interest-

ing new music goes out on a limb, stretching for an unusual effect of sound or style. The Gunchback Boogie Band's "Funn" (Prelude 12-inch), for example is one of a growing breed of New York records with national appeal, drawing on the riffs on Southern and Midwestern bands such as Cameo and the Time. "Out" enough for the teens and witty enough for adults, it's perfect summer "fun".



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"The Gay Olympic Games: An 9mminent 9nfant" By Jom Waddell, M.D.

Any new idea invites an abundance of new views. The Gay Olympic Games, the first international athletic and cultural event sponsored by the Gay community, has recieved its share of comments, but only recently have I read the first article that detracted from the concept of the Games. At first, I thought it best to dismiss the piece as "sour grapes," but then I decided to address the sentiments it contained, since the ideas it contained might be plaguing others.

Allen Young seems to be disturbed by the notion that the Games are more than just another Gay disco or parade. The scope of the Olympiad bothers him, and he is offened that we view the Games as an opportunity to gain respect from non-Gays and to stretch the image of Gay people in a way that challenges the perspective of the Moral Majority.

I don't know Allen, only his writing. He is obviously not a sport fan. His ideas about what it means to be Gay come from the 60's, when militants and drag queens were the only Gays bold enough to declare themselves and demand equal rights. Thanks to those days and efforts, there has been a near-renaissance in Gay life in the United States.

Allen still thinks we need to develop our own self-respect, and then the rest of the world will respect us as well. We're past that, Allen, a great many of us do respect ourselves, but that doesn't get much mileage when confronting a Biblebelt mentality who doesn't give a damn how liberated we "feel."

There are a number of approaches to

the problem of gaining parity in the eyes of a bigot. One can try to legislate against the bigot's activities and discredit his evangelism. That is being done with equivocal success by several politically active Gay groups.

You can grab the bigot by the throat and throttle him senseless. Very satisfying, but ultimately counterproductive.

There is a way to do something that is good for us and also non-threatening, pleasant, positive, and spirited in the eyes of the bigot. Let them be educated by identifying with our event. If we already spend some of our energies in organized athletics, why not amplify that aspect of our lifestyle to our advantage?

I do hear what you're saying, Allen. You are afraid that the Gay Olympics will not be aggresively sexual when you feel that after all, it is our sexuality that makes us Gay.

True! The Games will not be aggressively sexual. No slogans, no graffiti, nothing sexually suggestive. The Games will be serious for those who take their game seriously, and sexualized only to the extent that the individual imagination wants to sexualize them. Want to sit in the stands and fantasize about two men wrestling, or two women boxing? Have at it; many do.

But what is Gay about exercise, or recreation, or athletics, or competition? Is there some form of basketball that Gays play different from that we already know? Is there Gay swimming? Gay hurdles? What does a Gay javelin look like?



It's just athletics, Allen. A great many Gay people, and a great many non-Gay people enjoy them for a lot of wholesome and healthy reasons totally unrelated to sexuality. And being a "sissy" has no meaning on the playing field; if you can't throw a ball, try swimming. If you don't like any sport, come and cheer for your friends.

Your comment that we are "taking a sad, defensive posture in regard to our sexuality" makes me think you are projecting a wee bit. A firm majority of the Gay men and women I know are not only defensive about their sexuality, they believe they are advantaged! That is also the tenor of the Games. We, who live

openly as Gay have already achieved a freedom in a critical area of our lives which is not enjoyed by those who strive for traditional sex roles. We, at least, chose a role that fits us, rather than fitting ourselves into a prescribed role. Aren't we lucky, and haven't we got something important to teach!

Response to the Games has been phenomenal. We get inquiries from all over the world for both participants and spectators. There is a level of excitement that transcends diversity. Even you, Allen, found the Games sufficiently intriguing to write about, though it was to complain that they are not what you want them to be.

Do you ever attend any non-Gay events? Some of us do, and manage to enjoy ourselves because we are People first, and Gay second. Reverse those priorities, and you get a ghetto with a ghetto mentality.

If you are in San Francisco on August 28, 1982, Allen, I will invite you to watch Gay men and women from all over the world lined up behind the flags of their cities, listening to the Gay Olympics Games anthem played by a spectacular array of Gay marching bands, and watching the Gay Olympic Torch complete its journey by runners from Stonewall in New York. They will see it light the Gay Olympic Flame and signal the beginning of the First Gay Olympic Games. How much more Gay can that be?

And they are the first. They won't be perfect, but can you imagine what those first games were like in ancient Greece? Pretty tattered, I imagine, taking place in some obscure cornfield.

The Gay Olympic Games can grow in a beautiful way. How about your support?

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Places Of Interest By Marianne Ferrari

Nowadays there are many places where same-sex couples can walk down the street arm-in-arm without fear; but not many of those places imbue Gay people with a sense of ownership, and a feeling that the non-Gay population are somehow incidental and part of the background.

That is the atmosphere in Provincetown, Massachusetts, though, an atmosphere so palpable and immediately felt that even the most uptight closet case is guaranteed to arrive in P-Town and EXHALE.

Between Memorial Day and Labor Day each year, Gay people from every country come to enjoy this place, turning its quaint and narrow streets into cruise heaven. And the influx of Gay women, even greater in the last four years, makes this town look like the Lesbian capital of the world.

Even the most cosmopolitan of us are not used to seeing Gay people at literally every turn, so the sheer numbers of Gay people you encounter on your first promenade down Commercial Street are bound to have an impact.

On my own first day, I'm sure I wasn't unique in feeling great exhileration and jubilance. I had to quell a growing impulse to smile at or speak to every Gay person I saw. But then I realized that in THIS town, evolution has gone past the point of striking up conversations with people just because you recognize them as Gay; such signalling is not necessary, and the only rules that apply are those of ordinary propriety.

And what a setting! P-Town's the last stop at the end of Cape Cod, surrounded by harbor and ocean, and looking very much like the old whaling port it once was. Buildings of authentic period architecture overlook streets which discourage anything other than pedestrian traffic.

Gay guesthouse owners have taken careful attention to keep their houses in harmony with the place. There are some 50 of them, most catering to both men and women, a few to one gender or the other. Each is a picturesque retreat where quietude reigns, and time has no substantive meaning.

Guests take full advantage of this hospitable environment, congregating on



verandas where morning coffee and croissants frequently last until lunch. Gone are the petty prejudices of hometown bars. Here, we are family, and when we meet, we know that it's because we're Gay.

Late mornings and early afternoons find most of the "family" at the Gay beaches, one on the harbor side at the foot of Winthrop Street, the other on the beach side at Herring Cove. There, besides the regular beach activities, women are known to indulge in topless volleyball games, while men pursue their particular goals behind and among the sand dunes.

If you arrive at this time of day, you may be surprised to see mostly straight people on the streets. These are the daytrippers, people from the Boston area who've come to spend a day shopping in the antique stores and art galleries. They leave just as the night life is beginning.

Gay bar life in Provincetown is fast, chic, and decadent for the men. For the duration of this vacation, every last one of them becomes an unbridled pleasureseeker who knows that no alarm clock is going to ring in the morning. If he does look at a clock, it's probably to make sure he doesn't miss the tea dance at the Boatslip, which features several hundred bodies-beautiful dancing shirtless under the outdoor canopy. Any male virtuoso miraculously absent from the tea dance will surely be found later among the gorgeous numbers arrayed along the veranda at the Backstreet Bar.

On the female side, P-Town is to "bar Lesbians" what the Michigan Women's Music Festival is to the feminists. A flood of women representing a cross-section of Canadian and American Lesbianism come to see and be seen at the small and conversational Cellar Bar and the larger Pied Piper disco. Many stay at the Greenhouse, a new hotel on Pearl Street.

We women, always grumbling about the narrow field and the incestuous nature of local women's bars, are able to indulge ourselves in this brief illusion of limitless choice.

Those who don't like the bars or the beaches will find plenty else to do. There are 4400 acres of protected National Seashore for hiking and biking your way through a tour of the dunes. Sightseeing aircraft offer panoramic views of the Cape. Sidetrips to Martha's Vineyard are available. This year's craze is whale watching from rented boats, and some guesthouses charter three-masted schooners for daytime cruises.


