National Gay Support

At their annual national convention the American Federation of State County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) passed a resolution that stated:

WHEREAS, AFSCME has historically been the foremost leader among unions on issues of social and economic justice, and

WHEREAS, at its last convention, AFSCME offically lent its support to measures at the federal, state, and local levels which would reduce barriers to employment and encourage full participation by minorities and women, and

WHEREAS, we as trade unionists, know how important our jobs are to our security and to our dignity, and WHEREAS, when a worker is denied a job for reasons having nothing to do with the person's ability to do the work, working people everywhere are threatened; their security is shaken, their dignity is cheapened, and WHEREAS, AFSCME's Bill of Rights prohibits discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation for union mem-

bership, and

WHEREAS, lesbian and gay people should have the same rights to basic protection under the law as all other citizens.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that AFSCME endorses the passage of federal, state, and local legislation which extends basic civil rights in the areas of employment, housing, and, public accomodations to lesbian gay citizens.

This resolution was passed by a unanimous voice vote. Mainly due to the passage of this resolution 5 more congressmen agreed to co-sponsor the Nations Gay Rights Bill. One of the leading sponsors of the AFSCME resolution was District Council 24's of Wisconsin.

At District Council 24's annual meeting in Wisconsin this past June they amended their constitution to include the words "sexual orientation." This was done at the request of Local 82 from the UW-Milwaukee campus. An amendment to their constitution takes a 2/3 vote and it was reported that there was no problem getting the votes needed.

Supportive Women Legislators

find it ironic that a group of people who are trying to have their own rights recognized and respected would so openly be anti someone elses rights.

I would like to make known certain statistics. In the State Assembly when the Consenting Adults Bill was voted on 63.7% of the Democratic men voted for its passage whereas 81.8% of the Democratic women voted to pass the bill. On the Republican side 15.% of the men voted to pass the Consenting Adults Bill, whereas 71.4% of the Republican women voted for passage.

When it came time for Assembly Bill #70 to be voted on 90.9% of the Democratic women voted for passage whereas 74.6% of the Democratic men supported it. For the Republican 42.8% of the women voted to pass the bill only 11.0% of the Republican men voted for approval.


When I lobbyed for the passage of

Assembly Bill #70 I found that the women in the State Legislature were not nearly as hostile as the men. Even the rudest female representative was not as condescending and obnoxious as the average male opponent of AB 70.

If you add up the final percentages as to men and women legislators, 77.7% of the women voted for our right to privacy and less than half, 43.7% of the men did. On our right to be free from discrimination on the job 72.2% of the women voted for us whereas only 47.4% of the men did, again less than half.

I would also like to add that out of all the legislators that received a large amount of constituency opposition to AB 70 most of the women voted their conscience, whereas a higher percentage of the men voted to keep their jobs.

In closing I feel that all members of the gay community, men and women, should be thankful to the women legislators in the State Assembly, because without their help we would not have our basic human rights respected under the law.

The Freedom of Information Act allows private citizens access to government files which contain information on them. A standing joke says, if you don't already have a file with the FBI when you request information, they'll start one to find out why you think they have one.

According to the Advocate (Issue 346), The FBI has been spying on the gay community and individual gay people for years. As a result of various inquiries via the Freedom of Information Act, the Advocate reports that serious FBI investigations began as early as 1943 and continued at least into the late 1970's. To date, we know of 12 volumes of material (each about two inches thick) at the national FBI headquarters. There are 26 or 27 similar volumes in the New York field office and an unknown quantity across the nation in cities such as Chicago, Detroit, Indianapolis and Milwaukee.

What's in those files? So far it has been

confirmed that the information contains (at a minimum) the following:

-Collections of individual names and addresses of suspected homosexuals; -Surveillance reports on gay bars

and their patrons;

-Surveillance reports (gathered by infiltration and informants) on gay civil rights groups including Mattachine Society, Daughters of Bilitis, Society for Individual Rights and, the San Francisco Tavern Guild;

-Reports from intelligence operations in Great Britain which disclose gay people who have contact with British citizens;

-Arrest records and subsequent FBI investigations into the private lives of persons arrested on vice charges (or records on those arrested for any charge "in bars or restaurants frequented by sex deviates.")

How did the FBI secure all this information? Some came from arrest records, apparently including some illegally obtained in violation of local laws prohibiting the removal of such records without a judicially approved warrant. Some information was gathered by infiltrating gay organizations. Some came by way of "fugitive-style investigations" which involved prying into private mail and bank accounts.

The Advocate's investigation also discloses that the FBI actually set up houses of prostitution to lure gay people. Dr. Alfred Kinsey (Kinsey Institute) was enlisted to help establish the brothels . . . a fact confirmed by the current head of the Institute.

My father used to say things like, "If you haven't done anything wrong, why should you worry about an investigation?" My father was naive. Advocate obtained information indicates some Turn to Page 8



arrests were made, some intimidation or coersion was used to force people to become informants, and many violations of personal privacy occured. We may never know how many arrests were made, how many lives were ruined, or how many people's jobs were affected.

Government sources involved with the Advocates investigation indicated that one must keep in mind that the FBI surveillance, purportedly, is not continuing. (Current court cases and laws make much of their tactics and methods illegal). The heaviest investigations were conducted during the "McCarthy-Era."

That our government engaged in such activities does not surprise me. That the surveillance may have been discontinued is somewhat believable. Clearly the investigations began at a time when we, as a

community, were not visable. Blackmail, extortion and national security concerns probably helped those involved to justify the methods used ... and I doubt the FBI, or the emerging gay community for that matter, really understood how vast a gay population we had.

Today, it would require almost 100% of the energy and manpower of the bureau to continue such an extensive investigation. As more and more gay people become visable, the task would seem insurmountable. However, nothing indicates that the agencies involved couldn't or wouldn't continue to utilize the methods they've developed or the information they've gathered to discredit, attack or destroy individuals if they felt the need.

Last year, on the Ides of March, I received a card from Chicago Alderman Clifford Kelley with the inscription, "Just

because you're paranoid doesn't mean they're not really out to get you." The now surfacing realization that our government has gone to great lengths to document and track us may well lead to some paranoia on our part. Given the publicity surrounding the present congressional investigation of homosexuality within its own ranks, some paranoia is probably understandable. But paranoia, in and of itself, does little to change the situation.

Again drawing from the Advocate, (Issue 347, "Opening Space"), there is something we can each do. Our government isn't really run by the people . . . it's run by elected officials. Those officials are elected through costly campaigns. The establishment of local and national political action committees is designed to pump money into those campaigns which can help us.

It is time we work toward electing gay politicians and pro-gay politicians who understand our rights to privacy and equal protections. It's time we worked to defeat those who would defeat us.

Only by ensuring that our government is run by people who will support us will we ensure that our government will never

use that information it already has collected. Given the rise in conservativism and the "new right" mentality, we could easily enter into another "McCarthy Era."

The role of the gay community in our present political structure at all levels cannot be put on a back burner. None of us can expect someone else to do it, nor can we afford to wait.








In a bath house in the early morning hours the chemistry of desire forces a more "open door" policy, and the transracial encounter, which is usually avoided, is permitted. After the Continental breakfast, guys break up again, thing's seperate back to "normal," and each go their seperate way.

It was different, however, for Doug and Karl. Yes, they had great sex together; they liquified, they bathed in each other's sweat. They got along and talked. They found out that they already shared a common love: baseball.

You have to be a baseball nut to appreciate their story. Karl was born 37 years ago, that was 1945, the last time the Cubs were in the World Series. Karl's neighbor was Bill Schuster, "Schuster the Rooster." the scrappy and gamie left fielder for the Cubs. Karl's mother had a crush on Schuster. 
thew, Redd co-wrote three of the songs and all of them are top-notch.

effectively on oral gonorrhea as does penicillin or tetracycline.

How about tetracycline, then, the "aspirin" of the Gay community? Unfortunately, tetracycline has a high failure rate with the resistant strains. It continues to work well for urethral and oral infections of non-resistant strains, but has never been the drug of choice for rectal gonorrhea, where it often fails.

Be assured that the number of resistant cases is rare in North America, and seldom appear overnight. There's no reason to panic; just be aware.

WHAT CAN YOU DO? For one thing, keep up the regular program of VD testing, especially for rectal gonorrhea, where symptoms frequently do not occur. Insist on a culture when you are treated for gonorrhea, and have follow-up cultures after treatment to make sure that you're cured. Be frank with your doctor about your lifestyle, so that he will realize the possibilities of the sites of infection.


The reason for this alert is not to frighten; knowledge is a good thing. When Los Angeles' Gay community was hot with resistant gonorrhea, the health department there wished that there had been awareness much sooner, so that it would have been easier to control. Other localities don't have to make that mistake. We'll keep you up-to-date on any outbreaks of penicillin-resistant gonorrhea in future columns.

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



When penicillin first came out in 1943, the standard dosage for treating gonorrhea was 160,000 units, and it seemed so successful that doctors predicted gonorrhea would soon be eradicated. But with the worldwide epidemic in the '60's, along with the emergence of strains of Neisseria gonorrhea less sensitive to penicillin, the treatment dose has had to be increased to the present 4.8 million units, about 30 times the original dose.

Why has this happened? Aside from the chromosomal mutation that can change the sensitivity of gonorrhea to penicillin, there's a second way for the bacteria to resist; the "R" factor. DNA particles mediate antibiotic resistance, and can attach themselves to bacteria. They had been seen lurking in the cell cytoplasm for years; so had other plasmids (as DNA particles are called) without the capacity to attach. Some far-sighted geneticists went so far as to predict that some day the feared "marriage" of the antibiotic affecting DNA particle and the bacteria's chromosome would occur.

They were right. In 1976, isolates of gonorrhea were found that were resistant to the penicillin antibiotic, and thus were born a new strain: penicillinase-producing gonorrhea. (The suffix "-ase" denotes a breakdown or destruction.) In short, penicillin could no longer destroy those bacteria.

Fortunately, the presence of the strain has never become the problem that was feared. Current public health department reccomendations stick with penicillin, though tetracycline, spectinomycin and ampicillin have their individual applications. Penicillin remains, in most cases, the one medication that can cure gonorrhea at the site; not always a surety with the others.

The fear remains that penicillin-resistant organisms could become a problem. A substantial reservoir of resistant GC exists in the Far East, and enters the U.S. through West Coast ports. There were 87 cases, generally in the Western United States, in 1976, and 220 in 1977.

Penicillin-resistant gonorrhea probably causes the same symptoms as non-resistant strains. Neither doctor nor patient can tell which variety is present. But the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta and local, state, and military health clinics monitor recovered organisms for the presence of the substance that renders penicillin inactive, which is called betalactamase. Its presence is a giveaway that the resistant strain is involved.

When the resistant strain pops up, more effort is put into following up that case and its contacts. It's a necessary meassure that keeps the resistant strain from spreading. Either drugs have been used to treat these cases: Trobicin (spectinomycin.)

You might ask, why not just use this drug for all cases, if it's the drug of choice for resistant gonorrhea? Well, Public Health departments deem it wise to save this medicine as a backup for such resistant cases. The worry is that, with overuse, spectinomycin-resistant strains will arise, just as has happened with penicillin. Not only that, but it costs more: my cost from a drug supply house is \$6.25 per dose. Furthermore, it has the disadvantage of not curing incubating syphilis, as penicillin is known to do, and does not work as




As you may know by now, the building housing the *Gay Community News* of Boston burned down the week after the 4th of July, very likely the result of an act of arson.

Gayellow Pages Available Jo Blind On Jape

CHICAGO— Gayellow Pages #12, a directory of U.S. and Canadian gay/lesbian businesses and organizations, now is available for the blind and physically handicapped persons, according to Terry Gorman, Director, Lambda Resource Center for the Blind, 3225 N. Sheffield, Chicago, II. 60657. LRC for the Blind provides access to the gay/lesbian print media through cassette recordings playable on talking book cassette machines.

Gayellow Pages #12 is available complete on 7 NLS standard cassettes, at cost, for \$10.50 (labelled in braille or large print, upon request). Recording was done through permission of Frances Green, Editor, Gayellow Pages, N.Y.C. Persons ordering from LRC for the Blind should state that they are eligible to receive the special format edition; cassettes are not playable on commercial cassette machines.

A team of twenty Chicago sighted women and men spent 4 months reading the 256 double-column pages. The recording was master-taped reel-to-reel, then converted to cassette form for duplication and sale. ninety-three hours were spent just taping the directory.

The taped edition of *Gayellow Pages #12* is "tone indexed," ' a feature that enables users to locate any state or city easily. "For the first time," says Director Gorman, "information on North American gay/lesbian businesses and organizations is accessible to the blind, at home or traveling."

For those who qualify, *Gayellow Pages #12* is available on cassettes for \$10.50 from LRC for the Blind, 3225 N. Sheffield, Chicago, II. 60657.

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
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Gay Guide Features Maps Jo Gay Olympic Games & Reno Gay Rodeo


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
