Speaking Of Non-Marital Marriages Quent case in Illinois (Hewitt vs. Hewitt, with similar facts was flatly rejected.



Not too very long ago, the man I lived with was hospitalized. While visiting him one day, I tried to find his doctor but was unable to locate him. I asked the nursing supervisor to page the doctor and she asked if I was the "immediate family."

"I'm his lover," I replied.

Though she paged him, I suspect it was more from the shock of my answer than because she considered me "immediate family."

What status should lovers have? It's an interesting question to be sure. Presently, no state in the Union recognizes any legal relationship between lovers. Various lawsuits have attempted to define non-marital marriages, but few have been successful.

California's Marvin vs. Marvin established that states recognition of alternative marriages by awarding Lee Marvin's lover the equivalent of alimony. But the notion of palimony hasn't gotten very far. Mr. Marvin is appealing and to date, no other state has followed suit. A subse-

quent case in Illinois (Hewitt vs. Hewitt)

So if lovers aren't married, what are they? Maybe nothing.

The city of San Francisco has a gay rights ordinance which prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation. California has a law forbidding discrimination based on marital status. Given those laws, if you employer provides funeral leave benefits after the death of an immediate family member, does the death of your lover qualify?

Southern Pacific, a huge Californiabased corporation, says no. Lawrence Brinkin, a Southern Pacific employee. says yes. Brinkin's lover of 11 years died, and Brinkin lost eight days of work while in mourning. Though I wouldn't want to gamble on how the courts will decide this one, it does strike me as biased that a company will pay a husband (though only married one day), yet refuse a lover (though "married" eleven years).

Brinkin's attorney says Southern Pacific violated his client's rights by discriminating on the basis of sexual orientation and marital status as well as violating his right to privacy. That attorney who drafted San Francisco's gay rights ordinance. also plans on challenging a county rule which grants access to public housing via marital status as well as a ruling which denies unemployment compensation to people who leave the state when their lover's employment is transferred.

Though I basically agree with the suit against Southern Pacific, it is arguable that the corporation isn't discriminating. but rather the state of California is. After all, it is the state which has the authority to sanction the lover relationship, and it is the state which refuses to do so.

Presently, there are several things lov-

ers can do to imitate the legalities of marriage. Wills and creative property ownership can guarantee your lover's status after you're gone. A power of attorney will vest lover's rights to such diverse things as determining your medical treatment and handling your business transactions. Cohabitation contracts may be substituted for marital property rights. But nothing will grant a lover legal status equivalent to mariiage, except a change in state laws.

How realistic is that? Who knows? Few of our current political leaders are apt to sponsor amendments to the marriage act. and courts have refused to find any inherent right to marry.

Many people will argue that we shouldn't look for changes to allow gay marriages. They feel marriage might bring as

many bad things as good. There may be some marital benefits to gain such as funeral pay, social security and travel discounts, but with marriage also come costs. Married people seldom fare as well as singles on income tax (though this will change when the Economic Recovery Act takes affect.) Married people tend to suffer much more difficult divorces (though some argue that that knowledge tends to make the committment of marriage stronger.)

My personal opinion is that legal marriages ought to be available to those who desire them. Nothing would require marriage, but for those who opt to take the step, it would be available. That availability would resolve all Southern Pacific cases. If you opted to marry your lover, you'd be entitled to benefits.

Despite official U.S. Census figures indicating that less than one-half of the



Jamie, 19, was a quiet guy with soft features. But a month ago he did a very hard, noisy thing to himself. At his folk's home in Barrington Hills, while listening to the "Eye of the Tiger" on his headphones, Jamie walked into his father's game room. pulled a gun from the shelf, loaded it, put it in his mouth, and blew himself away. He was not a survivor.

He wrote a note telling his folks it was not their fault. The pain was too much. He also told them to give his things to Leon to pass out to the other kids.

Who is Leon? Leon is a 41-year-old man who works, "manages" a video game emporium. His relationship to Jamie? None. He just knew Jamie as that quiet kid who sometimes scored 84,000 on Asteroids. The kid he had talked to about "Tron." The kid no one could reach. Jamie's mother, a manager of a suburban bank, knew Jamie was going through a difficult passage, but he

would come out of it. He did stay in his room a lot and he was always hooked into his music. But kids grow out of that. Sure, the other kids teased him a lot in school. He had all of their equipment, but was no sport: he played in none of their games. He gave his skis and mitts and balls away to strangers.

They used to tease him on the bus coming home. He would just come in slam all the doors in the house and go to his room. He never talked about it, to his sister or anyone. He was a gentle soul. He never fought back.

Jamie's father, who works for the county, hated grounding him. But he had been told: either keep your grades up, get your own money or you can't go out every night playing games.

Jamie was their first born son, they did everything for him. He seemed not to care for their material things. He gave everything away, to anyone who would ask. He never got into the spirit of being materialistic.

Kids at school were perplexed by Jamie's generosity. He was such a soft touch: if you liked his hiking boots he would give them to you. He gave away his calculator to a kid in his math class. They teased him, but they never meant him any harm. They just wanted him to watch out for himself.

Was Jamie "gay"? Some openly gay kids in his class thought so. But openly gay people are often too quick to impose their way on everyone else. Jamie was shy, inward, a pastel spirit, more soft than effeminate, but you could not say he was gay because of his fay disposition. Jamie never "came out" anything, he never materialized.

He liked his games and his tapes. He would buy all the latest casettes, record what he liked, and then give the new casettes to anyone who happened to be around. His mother let me play his last tape and it was



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
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Musically Speaking # 1999



My column this week is a reprint of an article in the July 24th issue of Billboard Magazine. It's topic is one confronting many club DJ's & their patrons. The move from conventional "disco" to "dance music" (in all it's forms) is one I strongly support, and this article says it the best.

NEW YORK-Diehard disco DJ's who have clung defiantly to the disco music format in soite of the general trend toward more progressive dance music sounds, are finally conceding that change is indeed essential to the long range survival of the dance music industry.

So says Tony Martino, independent music director of such clubs as the Red Parrot in New York City, and the Fire Island Pavillion on the resort island of the same name.

According to Martino, onetime owner of 12 West, one of the most popular discotheques in New York City, the trend is



starting gradually on Fire Island, one of the last remaining bastions of the conventional disco sounds of the 1970's.

"Where anything other than disco was a dirty word. DJ's are now showing the courage to incorporate elements of r&b, jazz and even rock into their dance music catalogs," he says.

Martino sees the trend as one born out of a will to survive. "The diehards are realizing that the time has come to change to a new musical groove, or to miss the dance music boat entirely."


Martino sees an irony in the fact that Fire Island, long regarded as a leader in entertainment trends, is placed in the role of follower for a change. However, he is philosophical. "We created the (disco) monster," he says, "and now we must lay it to rest. Heavy duty disco is passing into history, and we must adapt to the changing (musical) environment or lose our audiences."

Martino discloses that fearful of losing their loyal followers, disco DJ's on Fire Island began introducing the "new" music on an experimental basis with great trepidation. "They were encouraged when their audiences responded with standing ovations," says Martino.

"By their responses the audiences made it clear that they did not want to continue to go out dancing and feel as though they

were in a time warp."

Martino conceeds that the disco sound has not been completely eradicated from the repertoires of this last group of holdouts. "Good music will always have a place in our libraries," he says defensively. "However, the emphasis is no longer on beats-per-minute."

Martino is affiliated with a company, Alant Enterprises, "that is putting its energies into pushing new groups and new music for dancing."

He also states that a growing number of progressive producers are emerging with a commitment to providing new, danceable sounds for the discos and nightclubs of the country. Along with these, he praises Ray Caviano of RFC Records for having the vision of the new music, and the courage to pursue it when it was still unpopular to do so."

"It will take some time to convert all the holdouts," states Martino, "but they'll eventually see the need for, and the feasibility of change, and the industry will be a better of this enlightenment."


