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

"The people have failed to demonstrate how government interference . . . will serve to advance the cause of public morality or do anything other than restrict individual conduct and impose a concept of private morality chosen by the state . . ."

People v. Onofre (New York)
In my October 23rd column, I mentioned the Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund's efforts to reverse the New York sodomy laws in a case, People v. Onofre. That case has finally come down from New York State's highest court . . . guess what, we won!

In a 5 to 2 decision, the New York State of Appeals (the equivalent of the State Supreme Court in Illinois or Wisconsin) brought the total number of "consenting adult states" to 24.

Of perhaps even more importance is the fact that *People v. Onofre* was not decided on the state's constitution . . . rather, the court found that the so-

domy laws of New York violated the Right to Privacy and Equal Protection clauses of the *U.S. Constitution!* What's more, the court made its decision in deference to the present political climate of conservativism.

Everything is not rosy in the Big Apple . . . the Erie County District Attorney's Office has announced plans to petition for certiori . . . a move which, if granted, would bring the issue before the U.S. Supreme Court perhaps as early as June.

This, inandof itself, is nothing to fear... indeed we should welcome the opportunity for the Supreme Court to address sodomy laws again... perhaps this time they'll issue an opinion.* The U.S. Supreme Court, however, may be less likely to overlook the political climate.

Obviously, the importance of striking down sodomy laws is far reaching, not only do they interfere with the private sexual lives of our citizens, but they have been used to justify discrimination in housing, child custody and employment.

Had I the proverbial magic lamp, I'd rub and wish for a miraculous change in the political climate . . . a change so sudden that it would jolt the nation . . . a change just like the one we recently experienced with the Moral Majority, new Christian right, Reaganites. How sad it is that we've experienced such a political turnabout at the correct time but in the wrong direction.

Perhaps we have no one to blame but ourselves . . . other headlines tell

us the National Gay Rights Task Force has closed its Washington D.C. office due to funding problems. At a time when we need a voice in Washington, we should not be losing such an important office.

While the NGTF is an important link to the political climate, its retreat to New York will not completely silence it, nor are we left voiceless in the capital. The Gay Rights National Lobby is still active . . . well, to date that is. Without the continued support of gay and pro-gay people, the GRNL will follow the NGTF . . . closed doors, silenced typewriters.

I doubt that any amount of funding will change the political mood before the Supreme Court gets the Onofre case, but I guarantee that without funding the mood will only get worse . . . already the Moral Majority and the new Christian right have major lobbying efforts at work which make Anita's look miniscule by comparison.

gay person donated even one dollar, the chances of political change would improve threefold . . . not such a bad investment. One dollar cash can be sent with little risk via the mails, anonymously if you're in the closet or prefer not to make a donation to a gay organization on your personal check. One dollar is less than the door charge at many bars, wouldn't buy you a gallon of milk, and requires less of a financial burden than buying someone cute

a drink across the bar . . . the effort is minimal, simply place a one dollar bill into an envelope and address it to: The Gay Rights National Lobby, 930 F. Street, N.W., Suite 611, Washington, D.C. 20004.

Please . . re-read the opening quote for this article . . . that quote is taken directly from the majority decision in Onofre . . . won't you buy Mr. Onofre a drink to help celebrate our victory?

In other news . . . several weeks ago I wrote concerning the formation of a gay Vietnam Veterans group. Since that time I have been contacted by the Veterans Administration's Operation Outreach in Chicago. They are very interested in assisting in the formation of an autonomous gay group, can offer space, guidance and perhaps assist in funding. Unfortunately, the persons who once appeared interested in the formation of such a group within the gay community have been less than available. If any gay vet reading this column is interested in forming such a group, phone or write Gay Chicago Magazine, and we'll attempt to set up your initial meeting, and put you in touch with Operation Outreach.

"It should be noted that even if the U.S. Supreme Court agrees that New York's sodomy laws are unconstitutional, that will not eliminate all sodomy laws in the remaining 26 states as New York's laws have a particular distinction between married and unmarried people and part of the decision rests on that distinction.

large cock to whom they also give an extra small brain, does not seem to deter an eager size queen.

From any point of view, cocks are common. fascinating. In fact, the word fascination comes from the Latin fascinum meaning cock.

Cock is not only the source of all fascination, it was the origin of most drama, comedy, tragedy, rite and ritual. The early Greeks used to carry cocks on sticks at festival time through their villages. This caused everyone to laugh. And also it started the drama known as comedy.

One of the sources of tragedy was to take your cock too seriously: so that either you were afraid of being castrated and losing it, or you became so "cocksure" of yourself, that you showed hybris, and set yourself up for a tragic fall.

The cock is a tricky subject. There isn't anything anyone can say about it, even in a column like this, that is not slightly fallacious. All cock talk is hearsay: either taken out of context, or out of proportion.

To talk about the cock as a joke, misses the point that it is the ancient seat of emotions for the male animal. The cock defines the male animal, and as the source of his identity it is more than a joke.

But to talk too long to too seriously about your cock leaves you forgetting that it is a playful thing; and if you are too serious about it, you may never again have cum on your face.

So, everything you know about your cock - medical advice, what you read in handbooks, what you overhear

through bookstore walls, street talk, table talk, school bus gossip, and what your former lovers and partners have told you in bed or behind a tree - all your information is hearsay.

The word cock itself is a good old American farm term stolen from the rooster. Some people find the word vulgar.

But a cock by any other name is not a cock!

A penis for instance: When people say penis, I always figure they are talking about a delicate matter, and they probably are. If a guy came up to me and said, "do you want to see my penis?", I would think he was going to show me a museum piece.

And people who suffer from "penisenvy," don't have a lot to envy.

Dick, as in "suck my dick," from my regional experience, often refers to a bisexual cock. It seems to be the favorite word among married men, middle-class hustlers, and guys new to the

If you say phallus, it shows you've been to college. And if you say "phallic symbol," it shows you've never leftcollege.

Prick better used in needlepoint, than sex.

One problem about cocks most men have to face is size. In America, women are supposed to have big tits, and men are supposed to have big cocks.

In architecture, and in many other arts, people will always tell you: less is more. But in sex, and in the art of lovitl

Oh, I know, many of the new handbooks, and many sensitive people, some with large cocks themselves, will them, it may be just right for them. tell you size doesn't matter.

But it does! At least to most of us matters.

Size is one of the specifics: and specifics are the peculiar things that matter to us in life. How it matters will vary. But to deny it exists, is like dating a black person, and saying I don't see his color.

In America, males are programmed to think big, even if they or their lovers don't have big. It's one of the cruel facts of our society.

Everybody is programmed to say that they want a "big piece of meat." As though eating a cock were like gobbling down a 16 oz. skirt steak.

From my own experience, I have found that cocks can also be like fruits and vegetables: they can be shaped like mushrooms, bananas, or zuchinis.

And each shape can give off a deceptive performance: the little mushroom cock can shoot off like an atomic explosion when it cums; and the big zuchini cock can turn out to be a flaccid performer, leaving you wondering if it was sweating or cumming.

What is tricking about, if it isn't getting fooled? After a while you learn to enjoy and to handle the unexpected.

But there are some big zuchini cocks, that perform like big zuchini cocks, and give off atomic cum shots over your shoulder that hit the opposite

But, of course, if you place all your golden eggs in your lover's big basket, you are going to pay a pretty price for that basket.

You are going to become fixated: like the guy who can't hear music unless he is looking directly at his speakers. And all your sex will become glory, hole sex, and your feelings will be limited to your genital zone.

Sex is atmosphere. Real sex occurs when you catch the whole atmosphere of someone else's being. And sometimes there is more atmosphere in an shapely earlobe than in a jaw breaking cock.





ANDY WARHOL

During the '60s all kinds of interesting people started hanging around Andy Warhol's studio, the Factory. They did odd jobs, appeared as Superstars in the films, transcribed tapes, and so on.

A lot of them were "kids," rich, poor, transvestite, transsexual, gay, bi, hetero, show business kids and art students. Warhol writes in Popism that people thought he was the attraction. Chicago works out so who would use at the Factory when actually "it was me who was hanging around everyone else. I just paid the rent . . . 

The Mendola Report: A New Look at Gay Couples by Mary Mendola, Crown Publishers, Inc., New York, 1960, 269pp, \$12.95, hard-cover.

The Mendola Report. A New Look at Gay Couples by Mary Mendola is the first study ever published which examines gay lifestyles instead of exploring homosexuality from a purely physical perspective. The Mendola Report makes some startling discoveries—gay couples living together are very similar in almost every respect to heterosexual married couples. And there are no significant differences between lesbian couples and gay male couples.

Mary Mendola began her research for the book convinced that there were thousands — perhaps millions — of lesbian and gay male couples in America living in what might be conventionally called "marriage" relationships. Most were living hidden lives, however, and her problem was how to reach them. Her ambition was to do a nationwide survey, one that would reach "the couple next door" in Vermont and Arkansas, not just the more visible gay communities in San Francisco and New York.

She succeeded beyond her wildest expectations and as a result the book is the most thorough and complete sur-
