

Legally Speaking by Ron Ehemann

Several people, I'm sure, expect this column on the report that researchers in Turkey have concluded that disco music causes homosexuality in rats and deafness among pigs...or so an article in the Chicago Tribune reports. While I'm happy for the thousands who can now stop searching for the answer, I decline to write on the topic. Both Milwaukee and Chicago have ordinances which are basically anti-rat in nature and which justify a door policy. which excludes rats from discos. Neither city has an anti-pig ordinance...so what's a few rats if the place is filled with pigs?

No, I won't write about turkeys in Turkey...and, I refuse to address myself to the continuing saga of Rep. Hinson (which has now taken on racial overtones), or the "homosexual"

pervert" who set fire to Las Vegas with a joint. I refuse to talk about the French prostitutes who are being forced out of work by the immigration of Brazilian transsexuals and will reserve my comments concerning the rise in Chicago's male rapes until be coming directly from the office

... coats and ties. Still, a good friend This party was one of those parties you get invited to but seldom attend ... I didn't know the host nor would I know the guests. It was to begin Friday at six, and most everyone would be coming directly from the office ... coats and ties. Still, a good friend asked me to accompany him and it would give me the opportunity to meet different people...

The people I met were indeed different from those I've met before, and they were each different than each other...some were from the suburbs concerned with train schedules, some were older (few were younger) and all were professionals. I prepared myself, in the first few minutes, to be bored...this was going to be one of those cocktail parties where if you didn't know the guest list you were going to be lost with your drink in the corner.

In the kitchen I mixed myself another drink and someone introduced me my mentioning my column in Gay Chicago ... interested flared. Not interest in me, you understand, but in some of the topics about which I've written. Some guests had never read my articles and some had never read the magazine, but as they filtered in and out of the kitchen that

night they also filtered in and out of the discussion.

That evening I met lawyers (several), accountants and CPA's, an engineer, architect, and a professor, several "businessmen" and a number of imortant looking who-knowswhats. We discussed the gay community and most expressed some discomfort about the visible side, noting that it was not necessarily the most desirable. Professionally, they knew that our media image was lacking...collectively they wondered what they could do to help since they didn't, couldn't or wouldn't be able to visibly come out.

After I left the party that night I was feeling fairly good...sure, some of it had to do with the fact that I spent the entire evening in the kitchen, next to the bar, but most of it had to do with the fact that I had met some very interesting people who intellectually discussed gay concerns from points of view seldom heard in the bars... we didn't ponder tricks, clothes, drugs or who's who...unfortunately. neither did we find answers. I did find something else, I found the gay role models I've searched for...the intellectual and business side of our community streamed in and out of the kitchen all night long.

At this point in my story, I must make three observations...one, from my days as a police officer with a high school teacher for a lover, I really do understand that we can't all visibly come out. Second, a list of my friends and clients would reveal more bar owners or employees than other profession, and I don't mean to imply that

they are not proper role models or businesspeople...but they are already visible and represent only one profession. Lastly, the fact that the discussion at the party was different than those in the bars should not be taken to mean that the people were too...quite the contrary.

On Saturday I stopped for a drink after a show and on Sunday I went out to wish Big Red a happy anniversary. I met several of the people from that party again. Perhaps my third observation is critical...you see, until we come up with something different, our bars are going to be social centers for our community, and while we can't all publicly come out, we are out the moment we walk through the doors of a gay bar . . . so why aren't we being ourselves? Why aren't we being the opticians and publishers, draftsmen and veterinarians on Saturday nights? Why aren't we intellectualizing in the bars? You may not be able to open at work, but you can be open at play, and while you may not be able to change any straight minds, you can help develop gay minds. Until we individually change our media image. we will be stuck with bad press, homo-pyromaniacs and transsexual prostitutes ... rather than wasting our time talking about, let's do something to cure it, let's present our positive side, if not in public, at least in private.

Thank you to my host last Friday, and to the people I met in the kitchen-., here's to you each, and here's hoping I'll see you next Saturday driving the rats and deaf pigs from the bars.

GAY PEOPLE'S UNION —AN UPDATE

Your support is needed now for the GPU-Gay Community Center Building Fund (GPU-GCC Fund). We may soon lose our lease on the Farwell Center and be forced to relocate these facilities. Even at the current level of service this will require a large-scale effort and large amounts of money.

While the GPU Board of Directors considers alternate sites for our Gay Community Center and works toward establishing a coordinated fundraising program, there are some things you can do to help.

Your support of various events now being scheduled and planned throughout the community to benefit the GPU/GCC fund is vital. You don't have to attend a benefit in order to make a donation. Your membership dues (\$12 includes subscription to our newsletter, Milwaukee Update) defray the costs of day-to-day operations. Other donations can be mailed to GPU, Inc., P.O. Box 208, Milwaukee, WI 53201, All donations are tax deductible.

Representatives of about 35 Milwaukee area community groups, neighborhood associations, and social service agencies heard Gay People's Union President Paul De-Marco tell of countless incidents of assault and violence directed at the gay community. At the February meeting of the Citizens Coalition, DeMarco said that someone on the Milwaukee Police Dept. should change their law enforcement priorities.

"If all the effort now used by police to harass and repress gay men and women were directed into protection for taxpaying citizens in areas of high crime, Milwaukee would be a better and safer place for all of its residents."

Other members of the Citizens Coalition expressed similar concerns in their own neighborhoods and business areas and general consensus was that police services were deteriorating.

The Crime and Safety Committee of the Citizens Coalition is mobilizing to formulate a plan of action and will present a report at the March meeting of the Citizens Coalition.

GPU DIRECTORS, OFFICERS ELECTED

Gay People's Union begins the new year with a newly elected Board of Directors and officers.

In elections held Jan. 5, Alyn Hess, Tim McCoy, and Chuck Poulson were elected to join presently seated board members Miriam ben Shalom and Bruce Davies. Re-elected as GPU President was Paul DeMarco. Si Smits was re-elected Treasurer. Bill Meunier was elected Vice President and Karla LaWatsch was chosen to serve as Secretary.

Top priorities for the new Board is to rally the community behind the new Gay Community Center Building Fund (GCC). The building currently housing the Farwell Center is up for sale and is not really suited to the growing needs of our gay and lesbian community.

Several alternate locations have been inspected and others are yet to be seen. As the organization which has operated and maintained the gay community center. We will soon be distributing a survey throughout the community which with your assistance will help us determine the community needs.

MILWAUKEE WOMEN ACTIVE IN SPORTS

It seems like just about every sports article written these days is about male athletics. But more and more females are becoming involved in sports. There are women in professional sports such as basketball, golf, and tennis. Major colleges and universities are now being required to provide funds for women's sports teams. In Milwaukee, women are and have been involved in gay sports activities for some time.

Milwaukee is unique in having women actively competing with men. Practically nowhere else do gay men and women compete in sports on the same level. People from other cities who come to Milwaukee for softball and bowling tournaments are amazed

that gay men and women not only talk to one another, but are actually part of the same teams. Milwaukee was the first city to have a woman compete in the Gay Softball World Series. In 1978, three women went to New York to play in the world series softball tournament. Last year, two teams of mostly women participated in the Saturday Softball Beer League. The three gay bowling leagues all have women bowlers. And it was a woman who won the Ozabooboo golf tournament in 1980.

Two of the most active women in the Milwaukee gay sports scene are Shirley and Joannie.

Shirley bowls in and is an officer of two of the gay bowling leagues, but her main sports interest is softball. She presently is a coach for the Beer Garden softball team in the Saturday Softball Beer League.

She previously managed the M&M team to league championships in 1978 and 1979. The commissioner of New York's gay softball league has invited her to come to New York to coach slow-pitch softball to their pitchers.

Joannie also bowls in two of the gay leagues. Her M&M Mustang team finished in first place during the first half of the Friday night league. She also is a playing-manager for the M&M softball team. She also is involved in coaching a volleyball team.

In addition to the players, there also are a number of women involved in sports taking a behind-the-scenes role, such as Martha or Barb nursing an injured softball player or Patsy playing the gracious hostess by serving coffee and donuts at the bowling tournament.

Although Milwaukee has made

inroads in getting gay men and women together in sports, there certainly is room for more gay women to get involved.

One of the most touching and memorable moments last year was watching about 300 gay men and women holding each other's hands at the Milwaukee Wreck Room Classic tournament awards ceremonies in the street behind the Wreck Room, singing There's a Place For Us from West Side Story. It didn't matter whether you were holding a man or woman's hand; what did matter was that gay people were together, united in a cause in which they all believe—gay pride.
