Someone, or some group, left a note with one of the bombs stating: "North Central Gay Task Force Against Public Oppression." La Crosse police are led to believe the incident was a "set-up", according to the GPU spokesman.

Teen Sentenced In Shooting

A judge in Waukegan, IL sentenced a high school senior to 30 years in prison for fatally shooting her former lesbian lover's new boyfriend. Kimberly Branham, 17, of Long Grove was convicted of murder on April 14 in the January 2 shooting of Kirk Barlow, 19, of Wildwood. According to testimony, Barlow was standing at a window in the Lincolnshire home of Betsy Lou, 18, when he was struck by a bullet fired from a high-powered deer rifle outside the house.

D'Ann Prior has been called the unsung heroine of the women's movement in Wisconsin.

Prior, 47, who lives on Milwaukee's East Side, was honored as Wisconsin NOW's "Feminist of the Year" by the group she has served so faithfully for the past 10 years.

"She's been the Milwaukee NOW coordinator; the Midwest regional NOW conference coordinator; from 1977 to 1979, the state president," said Susan Jones, state NOW publicist, Madison.

Prior also was a founding member of the Wisconsin Women's Network, a Madison-based group that links nearly all major women's organizations in Wisconsin.

Identifies Issues

The Wisconsin National Organization for Women has identified nine areas of concern for women and established task forces in those areas to advise local NOW chapters.

The issues are: electing feminists to all levels of government; domestic violence; homemakers' rights; employed womens' rights; increased feminist television program production by NOW chapters; and, an end to racism and sexism in organized religion.

About 150 men and women attended the three-day state NOW conference at the Marriott Inn in Brookfield.

UWM To Review ROTC Discrimination Rule

Because of the military's discrimination against gays, a task force will be appointed to investigate the University of Wisconsin — Milwaukee's relationship with the ROTC.

Lawrence Baldassaro, chairman of UWM's University Committee and a faculty spokesman, said the investigation could lead to UWM's ending its contract with the local unit of the ROTC.

Baldassare said the Faculty Senate told the ROTC that UWM, like other state agencies, did not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, sex or sexual preference, and asked that a non-discrimination clause along those lines be added to the contract between UWM and the ROTC.

The Army rejected the request, saying that the Army does not commission known homosexuals, Baldassaro said. UWM must decide whether to accept this or end its contract with ROTC.

Court Rules 2 Men Can't Marry Or Divorce

A Pennsylvania appeals courts, acting on a case involving two men seeking a divorce, ruled that people of the same sex cannot contract a common law marriage, and thus are not eligible to divorce. The state Superior Court said the issue has never been legally addressed in the U.S.A.

Two Men Can Dance At Disneyland — Well, Sort Of . . .

An Orange County, California judge has struck down Disneyland's ban on same-sex dancing, at least as it applies to two young men who were evicted from the popular amusement park in 1980.

The order by Judge James R. Ross means Andrew R. Exler and Shawn Elliott, both of Los Angeles, can go dancing on any one of the amusement park's three dance floors.

Exler, 23, said after the decision that he had no immediate plans to test the order.

William Bitting, Disneyland's trial lawyer, said: "We'll abide by the order, but it doesn't apply to others. If two (other) men show up tomorrow night to dance, Disneyland won't let them on the dance floor."

Judges Rule Gays Have Rights In Resturants

The California Supreme Court has ruled that gay couples cannot be barred from private restaurant booths reserved for romantic evenings for straight couples.

The ruling was in favor of lesbians Deborah Johnson and Zandra Rolon, who sued the Papa Choux retaurant in Los Angleles for preventing them from using a private booth reserved for "romantic" couples. They left after they were offered a table in the main dining room.

Rolon and Johnson filed suit, claiming illegal discrimination under the state's Unruh Civil Rights Act.

7-9 p.m. by appointment. The first visit involves testing for Hepatitis B (HBV) and also includes testing for other sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) such as gonorrhea, syphilis, NGUs (urethral infections), Herpes I and II. If the person has not had a prior exposure to HBV, a series of three shots are administered over a six month period to provide immunity to HBV. Unlike the general BEST clinic, which is supported by donations, there is a cost for the Hepatitis Program.

There are several reasons why sexually active gay men should strongly consider receiving the HBV vaccine. First and foremest is that HBV is a STD and gay men are a high risk group for contracting HBV. Present statistics indicate that sexually active gay men have a 60% chance of contracting HBV during their life time. Like any other illness, HBV presents itself in many different ways. In most cases, the person will recover, but in some cases long-term complications will develop and some cases of HBV can be fatal.

The fatality rate for HBV at present is low but unfortunatly that may soon change. Recently, a disturbing phenomena has ocurred with HBV. Another virus, referred to as the Delta agent, has "teamed up" with HBV increasing the severity and the fatality rate from HBV to about 25-30% for those infected with HBV and the Delta agent.

Some men have voiced fear of contracting AIDS from the HBV vaccine. As to the issue of possible transmission of AIDS via the HBV vaccine, the manufacturing process for the HBV vaccine includes several procedures that inactivate representative viruses of all known types. Both microbiologic and research data provide no support for the suggestion that HBV vaccine might carry an eitologic risk for AIDS.

Many other men have procrastinated in receiving the vaccine. Although there is a Continued on page 10

cost for the program, financial arrangements can be made to meet the needs of persons with limited/fixed incomes. Those people with health insurance can submit insurance claim forms which will be filled out by clinic personnel.

Breier Retires; Criteria For New Chief Outlined

Commission Presented Gay/Lesbian Concerns

(Milwaukee) Miriam Ben-Shalom, Milwaukee gay activist, presented a statement to the Fire and Police Commission representing some of the concerns voiced by organizations serving the gay/lesbian community, the metro Milwaukee area, as well as some concerns voiced by individuals. The statement was drawn up at a meeting called by the Gay People's Union (GPU) at the Brady East STD Clinic at a meeting held on May 6th. Members of Black and White Men Together (BWMT), Brady East STD Clinic (BEST) and the Governor's Council on Gay/Lesbian Issues provided input into the contents of the statement, which did not attempt to represent the gay/lesbian community perse, but rather, our thoughts. The Commission is setting criteria for the selection of Milwaukee's new Police Chief, who will replace Harold Breier upon his June 30th retirement date. The statement presented to the Commission by Ben-Shalom stated:

"It is not that the more than seventy thousand active lesbians and gays are asking that the tradition of safety and law enforcement in Milwaukee be terminated. Rather, we ask that, in the choice of a new police chief, care be taken to remember the past and think for the future. We ask that care be taken to not choose an individual for whom the words "Law and Order" constitute a continuing policy of oppression and discrimination against the Gay and Lesbian Community of the greater Milwaukee area.

- 1. The Gay and Lesbian Community of Milwaukee urges the Fire and Police Commussion to search for, and appoint a person, as Police Chief who can begin a process whereby our community can begin again to trust the police department. We see the need for an individual who will not tolerate the misplacing of files, witness statements, and information regarding crimes committed against gays and lesbians. Most certainly, an individual chosen should not be one who will allow the continued selective enforcement of laws, entrapments, raids, harrassment (both verbal and physical), surveillance, and maintainence of records concerning not only individuals in our community, but also records of organizations. The new police chief should be willing to look at the potential waste of police resources, the diversion of police staff from serious work on crimes of violence and property, and the waste of taxpayers' money on misdirected efforts persuing crimes which even the District Attorney says will not be prosecuted.
- 2. We urge the appointment of a candidate who will be sensitive to the needs of police officers to have private lives free from departmental invasion of privacy; a candidate sensitive to personal needs of the police staff; a candidate who understands that "Law Enforcement" does not mean using police time to impose his/her morality on the people of Milwaukee.
- 3. We urge the appointment of a candidate who will be willing to open a dialogue with our community, begin sensitivity training on the gay and lesbian life style at the police academy and as in-service sessions for police officers. We feel that there is need for such sessions: As evidence, let the study done by the Governor's Council on Gay and Lesbian Issues speak. In the study, 29% of the respondents from Milwaukee express complaints about harrassment, verbal and physical abuse, and attacks by members of the Milwaukee Police Department. 68% expressed fear of one sort or another of the police.
- 4. We urge the appointment of a candidate who will adhere to the state gay civil rights law barring discrimination in employment on the basis of sexual orientation. Even such conservative cities like Houston, Texas and Minneapolis, Minnesota now have gay and lesbian officers and sensitivity training programs. It would seem that Milwaukee could only benefit from a new Chief who takes both city and state law seriously.
- 5. We urge the appointment of a candidate willing to work with our community should and when the need arise. We want the Commission to know that we as a community are willing to provide help and assistance: We want to work with the new Chief and with the Police Department. But, participation must come from both parties.
- 6. We urge the appointment of a candidate who will see to it that gay and lesblan citizens are extended the same rights and protection under the law as other citizens. Historically, the Milwaukee Police Department has responded in less than a speedy manner when gays and lesblans have been victimized. We want to see a candidate appointed who will remedy this with good administration, clean record keeping, and an eye towards establishing a future track record of fairness and integrity.

We hope the Fire and Police Commission will search nationally for a candidate who will bring progress and honor to the office of Police Chief. As citizens of Milwaukee, we want to know that Milwaukee has the very best Chief possible: A person with not only administrative experience, but also profound community relations and public relations experience. Because there have been no signs in the past of present upper level police administration personnel acquiring such skills and knowledge in dealing with the lesbian and gay community (as well as other minority communites in the greater Milwaukee area), it must be seen an an imparative that a nationwide search be conducted for an able person to head our police department.

Although the gay and lesbian community has been excluded in the past from participating in many decision making processes, by coming here today, it is our hope that the goodwill with which we speak will be felt and heard. The gay and lesbian community would like the Fire and Police Commission to know that we stand read to work with a qualified candidate who is willing to work with us."

Oh no...not another Michael Jackson LP...wrong. Michael Jackson's Farewell My Summer Love 1984 (Motown LP) are unreleased Jackson solo tracks originally produced by four separate teams during 1973, updated with overdubs and mixing, although vocal quality and material still attest to the vintage. Highlights include the title song, midtempo teeen pop, covers as the Miracle's You've Really Got A Hold On Me and Al Greene's Here I Am (Come And Take

Me). Speaking of the Jacksons, look for their new LP at your favorite record store in June entitled Victory.

Feels So Real (Elektra 12") by Patrice Rushen is one hot song to keep your ears open for. Patrice's past successes have been in the higher energy department, but here she settles into a nice springtime groove. All the techniques she used in Haven't You Heard and Forget Me Nots to grab your attention still comes through and she sells it!

"Hot" Paris Latino (Sire 12") by Bandelero is another proud moment for "Jellybean". There couldn't be a producer/mix engineer on the scene that's hotter than John "Jellybean" Benitez. He seems to show up on everybody's hit record. In fact, one could say he's the hottest D.J. turned producer since Tom Moulton. This Latin funk piece is one of his latest and most vibrant productions. Trus, this song does have trademarks all over it, but the whole thing is very much at ease. The Latin flavor isn't a cheap imitation, it's real enough to taste!

Beat Street, the Atlantic soundtrack for the film, set for June release, will probably be the most important dance album this year. 
A few nights later, the Factory II's downstairs bar was crowded for the showing of Caligula while upstairs Jackle "Oh" celebrated Spring with champagne.

Prior to Milwaukee, he presented and directed well over three hundred productions of both musicals and plays at his own theatre. Mr. Little also served as the Producer at the Sombrero Playhouse in Phoenix and the Piccolo Playhouse near Chicago while involved with his own theatre. He was Production Stage Manager at the Coconut Grove Playhouse in Miami and has presented theatrical tours in Colorado, Michigan, New York, Ohio and Connecticut.

The generous offer of his time and talents have benefited both the Holiday Invitational Tournament and the Cream City Association Foundation.

WIS: You've recently had quite a philosphical shift in casting soap opera stars. Why?

WIS: What other things have happened to stars you've contracted here in Milwaukee?

GSL: Doug Sheenhan, who starred in Pirates of Penzance, is now on Knots Landing. Irene Cara had just completed Fame when she came here to appear in The Wiz. She won both a Grammy and an Oscar this year.

WIS: You began as a performer?

GSL: Well, yes and no. At the age of 7 I had a marionette theatre and at 10, was producing Hansel and Gretel in my backyard. My professional debut was when I was 16 in New Hampshire. have four people in the room: Fritz Holt, Barry Brown and the two producers. I knew them all. I had rehearsed the scene forever. Arthur Lawrence had the final say, so I did it five times. I went in and wore a cravat, which is asexual - it wasn't a shirt or it wasn't a blouse. I went in and read for George first (the Gene Barry part). I was working the St. Regis in New York at the time . . . I hit a high note that tall dogs would form my ass was puckering. Hair was growing under the wig! I do sing well, and on key. Then I tried for Albin (the George Hearn part). I went outside and at the count of four I went out and put on an apron and had a pot in my hand - like washing dishes - pulled my hair off and came back in as Albin. Well, they were just screaming. I wanted to show them a different look for Albin, as opposed to Rip doing it. Five call backs and they still gave it to Gene Barry! You think I'm not mad? - you bet your ass I'm mad. I would be sensational. I want that part so bad I can taste it. I've seen the show five times praying he would break a leg.

WIS: That scene with Cheech and Chong in drag in that restaurant with you . . .

R.T.: I wasn't the one in drag, I was the matre'd. That was *Things Are Tough All Over* — it's about your paper. These are good questions, Ronnie.

WIS: What was one of the better unairable "bleeps" of Jaye P. Morgan on the Gong Show?

R.T.: Oh, well, she opened her blouse and flashed. I looked at her and said "Please not now, people are eating." We screamed! She constantly kept flashing.

WIS: Is Jaye P. as crazed off stage?

R.T.: Yes she is. There's a definate trip to the home every other week. I may go next — I left my robe open too long yesterday. I joined a sperm bank and made ten deposits and petered out — I'm just so exhausted.

WIS: Tell us about what you're doing here in Milwaukee.

R.T.: A friend of Phyllis Diller, a doctor she used to know and goes with, is having a birthday party. He's paying me a lot

History books and The Encyclopedia Britannica have long relegated to oblivion the accomplishments of many gays. There is a long list of little-known gays who changed the course of history. So, in an attempt to bring to light these forgotten people and their accomplishments, I present this brief compendium:

Ray "Butts" Difflebacher (1865-1939): As a youth attending a strict prep school in Brooklyn, he invented and perfected the Hit-and-Run-Moon. Using a fast horse and carriage, Ray pulled down his pants and stuck his ass out an open window, with his bare butt aimed at the startled head master, Franklin Hooper. After a close inspection, Hooper was able to identify Difflebacher as the culprit by a mole on his left cheek.

Leonard Quigly (1915-1956): While tripping on acid one night, he invented the first scratch-and-sniff inflatable sex doll.

George McFadden (1823-1898): A lonely and under-sexed fisherman from Bangor, Maine, McFadden was overwhelmed by his desires and became romantically involved with several crustaceans and developed the first reported case of crabs.

Pierre Louis Chalet (1603-?): In 1634 he invented the closet, which he wallpapered with back issues of Gentlemen's Quarterly and then moved into permanently. His body was discovered by a cleaning lady in 1745.

Pornorysporus (13 B.C.-A.D. 42): A scientist and philosopher in Rome, he invented the VCR and made several movies including: Blazing Zippers, The Leather Nun, and Cell Block 69. The term "pornography" comes from him, although his other accomplishments have been largely ignored.

Jean Marie Dublous (1912-1969): Long dissatisfied with conventional electric and battery operated vibrators, and want-

ing something more powerful to fulfill her desires, she invented the deisel vibrator in 1954.

Rosco Splitz (1857-1951): An all-around athlete, Splitz invented the modern jock-strap, which leaves the rear exposed. He is also credited with inventing the current method of hiking the football, with the center bent over and the quarterback receiving the ball through the center's legs.

Lester Dingleberry (1919-1975): Held the first Crisco party in 1940. He was also the first person to hold a Slip and Slide party. Dingleberry was sent to prison in 1943 on a morals charge and coined the phrase "bend over and pick up the soap."

Leslie Pleasance (1834-1911): Driven by his desire for a more masculine appearance, he perfected the first chest hair toupee in 1876.

Zippo Blintz (1845-1922): Although credited to Alexander Bell, the telephone was actually invented by Bell's houseboy Zeppo Blintz, which he used to give the first obscene phone call in 1877.

Dr. Fred Lumpster (1901-1978): As a Marine Corps doctor, he invented hernias so that he could examine young soldiers for them. The fact that hernias do not exist did not come out until 1951, after a handsome young private complained to his superiors that Dr. Lumpster had examined him for hernias 235 times in the last year. He also coined the phrase "turn your head and cough."

Of course there were many other gays who made significant contributions to society. We can only hope that those who write history books will not ignore their achievements — that the likes of Boy George, Richard Simmons, or Bobby Rivers will be treated with the respect they deserve.

In Step Interview

America's funny man chats with In Step's Roy Contacts

with In Step's Ron Geiman and Kevin Michael.

Before In Step had a chance to ask any questions, Mr. Taylor took off . . .

R.T.: A month ago I did a benefit for AIDS in Cleveland and raised an awful lot of money. Before that I did other benefits for AIDS at the Hollywood Bowl with Debbie Reynolds and about 50 or 60 big name movie stars and raised a lot of money. The gay community screwed it up because they fought among themselves. The movie stars, hosts and the celebrities were the easiest to get. They always are - and the benefit didn't make much money because the people who ran it fought among themselves so much. I'm doing another one on the 3rd of June at Studio 54 in New York.

WIS: For the Gay Men's Health Crisis Center in New York?

R.T.: Don't ask me - it's to help AIDS. That's all I'm told, and that's all I want to know - I don't want to fight with these people. The mistake they made in Cleveland was that they put the advertisements only in gay bars and gay places. It's not a gay disease. I went on television and a woman said to me "Are you in town for the (quietly) 'gay' party?" I said, "Why did you whisper that word?" This was on TV and they wanted to stop the tape, but I told them not to. The little boy who was in the bubble - was never out of the bubble - he died from AIDS. Immune deficiency - he died. Was he an Ohio farmer? Was he gay? What? No, he was a little kid in a balloon all his life. So it isn't necessarily a gay disease. And don't make a mistake - when you have AIDS shows to help raise money, depend on the gay community because no one thinks they have it. They all know they're not going to get it. They're still going to be promiscuous - they can't help it, it's human nature. And it isn't just for gay people. That's the problem. Now we can be funny ...

WIS: Describe the ugliest woman who ever appeared in the \$1.98 Beauty Contest.

R.T.: Well, a lot of them had hair coming from every pore. You didn't see those scenes. The outtakes were absolutely hysterical. I mean gross people! They had two drag queens on and didn't tell me when they made their entrance. I said, "Hello, you need a shave." Finding out they were really men was hysterical. Good luck with your new paper, incidently. Tell the people that I asked you for this interview - you didn't ask me.

WIS: You did start out in theatre. right?

R.T.: No, I started out in night clubs. Strip joints. I was really wonderful at one club in Baltimore - they called it Balmer - the building was 27 strips and Rip. So I went from night clubs to TV to the theatre. Now I'm legitimate and my mother is so happy. I did Sugar Babies on Broadway when Micky Rooney got sick and took a vacation three times - and I was on Broadway with Ann Miller! I had such a wonderful experience. Then I did Peter Pan with Alan McMullen, who is sitting here with us. He was the stage manager then and now lives in Milwaukee. You should pick his brain because he's very bright in regards to the theatre. Exchange phone numbers with him!

WIS: The character that you perform is basically you, isn't it?

R.T.: Exactly . . . yeah, I get away with it ... I'm working all the time.

WIS: We brought some confetti along ... I was going to ...

R.T.: Don't, I'll have to sweep. I'll tell you, people throw it my food when I'm eating. I get so mad sometimes.

WIS: Did you ever get tired of the \$1.98 **Beauty Contest?**

R.T.: No, it was number five in the country when Chuck Barris took it off himself. He owned it and he took it off - it was his perogative.

WIS: Any reason why?

R.T.: Well, you'd have to ask him. He was just hurt. Someone told him it was

just a piece of schlock. Meanwhile we had The Dating Game, Newlywed Game, etc. - 19 hours of network television weekly. 19 hours is a lot of money. So, somebody was sitting home watching that "schlock." It hurt me because I wanted to be on daily . . . to become a household word like Fab or Dash or Re-

WIS: Do you like the transfer from television to the stage?

R.T.: I do. I didn't think I could do it because hardly anyone else thought I could do it either. They thought because of the character I play in night clubs that I'm like that all the time. I'm not like that really. I make myself laugh all the time . . , and I do laugh. I didn't deviate a sentence from any script. They were all quite surprised. Every interviewer kept saying "Are you going to throw confetti?" I would ask "Is it in the script?" They would say "No," and I'd say "Well then I guess I won't." But, they all came expecting me to get out of character and be Rip Taylor, not Captain Hook. I'm constantly battling a preconceived notion of what I'm going to do. I went into the theatre to

show producers in Hollywood that I could stick to a script and do a series. I was off the TV, and when you're off the TV they forget you're at home. That's the interim I'm into now. I'm in Vegas and Atlantic City working a lot, but in major gambling places to make some money not in the television because there's not much TV. The theatre is slow because the theatres are closing the plays because the materials have not been good. So, I like to do both. It's hard to take those blinders off those people in Hollywood saving "He just throws confetti."

WIS: Besides Captain Hook, what else would you like to do?

R.T.: I did Mr. Lutz for John Kenley in the Student Prince. I didn't change a line from that, either.

WIS: Would you do La Cage Aux Folles?

R.T.: I had five call backs for "La Cage" last January before it opened. The Director, Authur Lawrence, is a very dear friend of Gene Barry and that's how Gene got the job. They handed me the script a week before I went into read. They only
