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NGTF Files Suit Against Defense Department

The National Gay Task Force (NGTF) recently filed a class action lawsuit challenging the policy of the Department of Defense to issue less than Honorable Discharges to military personnel who are separated from the U.S. Armed Forces because of homosexualtiy. The action was filed on behalf of NGTF by American Civil Liberties Union attorney Bart Strichman. In the lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court in Washington, DC, NGTF charges that more than 5,000 veterans have had their military service characterized as less than honorable for conduct that did not affect performance of their military duties.

Commenting on the filing, Virginia Apuzzo, Executive Director of NGTF, said, "This action is one of a series of efforts by NGTF against remaining government sanctioned discrimination. The policy of granting less than honorable discharges on the basis of sexual orientation is especially abhorrent in light of the dedication and pride with which gay men and lesbians have served and are serving their country."

One of the named plaintiffs in the lawsuite, Lilli M. Vincenz, had her military service characterized as less than honorable because she engaged in homosexual conduct in a motel off of her military base while whe was off duty. The lawsuit seeks a court order requiring military departments to recharacterize to honorable the discharges of all the affected veterans unless the military can demonstrate that homosexual conduct directly and adversely affected performance of military duties.

In addition to Ms. Vincenz, seven other veterans and a veterans organization have joined NGTF as plaintiffs in the class action. The plaintiffs contend that a less than honorable discharge stigmatizes the veteran, making it difficult to obtain

employment in civilian society. NGTF asserts that many of its nearly 10,000 members are affected by the challenged military policy because they are currently members of the U.S. Armed Forces and, unbeknownst to their commanding officers, are gay or lesbian.

Pipe Bombing Suspect Indicted On 21 Counts

Earl Steven Karr, 24, who allegedly placed 21 pipe bombs in three states, was indicted by a federal grand jury in Minneapolis, MN, recently on 21 counts involving manufacturing, possessing and transporting explosive devices.

The most serious of the 21 counts charges Karr with interstate transportation of destructive devices from Minneapolis to Chicago and Milwaukee "with intent to intimindate, injure or kill, where injury actually resulted," said U.S. Assistant Attorney John Lee.

A City of Milwaukee employee was slightly injured when one bomb exploded May 31st near the Milwaukee County Courthouse.

The count carries a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison and a \$20,000 fine. The other 20 counts each carry a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Seven of the counts in the indictment charge Karr with the unregistered manufacturing of seven pipe bombs recovered in Stillwater and St. Cloud. Other counts charge him with unregistered possession of pipe bombs, component parts and a destructive device, and transportation of destructive devices.

Karr was previously charged in a felony warrant in La Crosse County with six counts of endangering safety and one count of possession of explosives for unlawful purposes.

Authorities in Stillwater, St. Cloud, Chicago and Milwaukee said they are still considering state charges against Karr.

Bail for Karr was set at \$300,000 last week during a hearing before a federal magistrate in Karr's hospital room in St. Paul, MN, "and that stands," Lee said.

MCC Endorses National March

Metropolitan Community Church (MCC) has endorsed the National March for Lesbian/Gay Rights and offered their help to make the National March as successful as possible. National March organizers will soon disseminate information through their mailing list of 5,000 supporters. MCC's endorsement is particularly significant in that with their support, the National March has now been endorsed by every major national gay/lesbian organization in the country. The list of national endorsers includes the National Gay Task Force, Gay Rights National Lobby, National Coalition of Black Gays, National Federation of Parents and Friends of Gays, National Association of Business Councils, and Black and White Men Together - International.

Additionally, the National March has been endorsed by the National Organization of Women, as well as the California and Iowa chapters of NOW.

Bobbi Campbell, a person with AIDS, has now been confirmed as the fourth speaker for the rally rollowing the National March, July 15th. Bobbi, through his efforts to raise funding for AIDS research, has become nationally known appearing recently on the cover of Newsweek magazine. He joins Ginny Apuzzo, Morris Knight and Bill Olwell in addressing the audience, estmated by National March organizers to reach over 100,000 people.

Democrats Urged To Address Gay/Lesbian Civil Rights

The National Gay Task Force (NGTF) called recently for the Democratic Party to write a platform that is explicit about gay/lesbian concerns for presentation to the National Convention in San Francisco this July.

Speaking on the second day of the party's platform committee hearings in the nation's capital, NGTF Executive Director Virginia Apuzzo said, "We are not embarrassed to ask this party to make specific and unequivocal commitments to fairness and justice."

Noting that the Democratic Party has traditionally supported minorities in their fight against discrimination, Apuzzo said that the Democrats' stance in 1984 must be just as committed to gay/lesbian civil rights. "We are not seeking commitments that will tie the hands of candidates running on this party's ticket or bind a future Administration to policies that might be difficult to implement," Apuzzo added. "But this platform must avoid vague rhetoric that is so broad as to be meaningless."

As a reader of this magazine — be hearby notified that you are a "Barfly" and that this publication is "of no interest... it's just for barflies." That's the opinion of two of the members of the Wisconsin Governor's Council on Gay and Lesbian Issues — Ms. Kathleen Nichols (Council Co-Chair) and Ms. Shelly Gaylord (Dane County Representative).

In Step distributes 8,000 copies — and according to one survey result, nearly 65% are read by two to five other people (with a surprisingly large "non-gay" readership). So, we can say our "readership" is in the neighborhood of 30,000 — that's a lot of barflies! (We bet the gay and lesbian bar owners are surprised to know that quick math shows that each bar in this state has nearly 1,000 regular customers.)

OUT! (the Madison-based monthly newspaper) lent us their distribution list early in In Step's existence. By the third issue of In Step we were delivering to 95% of the places OUT! distributes to. Both OUT! and In Step are distributed at most locations within the state.

Granted, OUT! is a newspaper; In Step is a lifestyle, social, and entertainment oriented magazine. We don't serve the same purposes, yet we somehow compliment each other. Add in the quarterly Cream City Special Edition with its business coverage, and the feminist Amazon and you'll agree that Wisconsin's gay and lesbian community has well-rounded coverage.

Realistic assessments of the size of the "activist/politically correct" gay and lesbian community are not very high. If members of all the state's gay and lesbian organizations were totalled up and all the duplicates (those belonging to more than one organization) were weeded out, the tally would bring embarrassing results.

Where do all those organizations go for their operating costs? Where are many benefits held? Where are the petitions signed? Where are the political candidates campaigning? Where are most

"harrassment" problems occurring? ON OUR FRONT LINE — the bars and other social settings.

In Step seems to appeal mostly to "non-activists," but we do try to educate and inform — on more than just bar activities. The survey also showed that the most popular sections within this magazine are the "Briefs," "Comment," "Consider This," "Group Notes," "The Calendar," and "Steppin' Out." The only sections dealing with the bars out of that list are "The Calendar" and "Steppin' Out." however both contain other "non-bar" information. Those other "favorite" sections don't sound like they'd be of interest to "barflies".

We'd certainly have more group notes and briefs if organizations in this state would get off their duffs and at least send us their meeting "minutes". If they (the organizations) want more community involvement — it's their job to get the information to the gay and lesbian publications (allowing sufficient time for deadlines). (It's too much to hope that they would actually send us press releases.)

This publication is a business. Advertisements almost cover the costs involved in putting out In Step - and we've turned down much needed advertising revenue because we did not particularly agree with an establishment's policies towards gays and lesbians (i.e. - having a "gay" night one or two nights a week, discriminatory actions, etc.) As editors we feel it is our commitment to our readers to assure everyone that any advertiser appearing within these pages will openly welcome our business. We are not a sleazy publication - and, for the record we don't show genitals. Occasionally something "borderline" may appear, but that is always weighed against the rest of what we publish.

It's too bad Ms. Nichols and Ms. Gaylord condemned In Step to "barfly"dom
— we wonder if they've ever actually read it . . . or just thumbed through and looked for "dirty" pictures.

Even In Our Own House?

The Governor's Council on Gav and Lesbian Issues met in Milwaukee on June 2nd at the War Memorial Center, What began as a solid working meeting ended with less than honor; indeed, it was ironic humor that a "war of words" ensued in so honorable a place as the Memorial.

Ron Geiman, one of the co-editors of In Step was in attendance at the meeting. During a lull at the meeting - while members were preparing a statement to the press concerning the pipe bombing incidents (which In Step never received) - verbal bruehaha of sorts erupted, with Mr. Geiman and In Step being targeted by some very nasty and uncomplimentary remarks by two female council members: Kathleen Nichols, co-chair of the council and Shelly Gaylord, a council member representing Madison. The gist of the remarks concerned the cover on issue #10 of In Step, In Step's readership, and the value of that readership, as well as an allusion to a not-vet passed Madison pornography law being engineered by Ms. Nichols.

Let me step in for one moment and talk about that issue's cover - the one with an unclad young man in what appears to be a position of bondage of sorts. Personally, I did not like the cover - for me there is more to being "gay" than just my sexual partner/orientation. I am aware, however, that men are more visual in their sexuality than women; that a cover which is "eye-catching" is a good aid in increasing circulation (several women's magazines have used sexual imagery to that end - most obviously Sinister Wisdom and that wonderful poster in grey and black, a solarized photo by Tee Corinne, of two women making love); and also that In Step has featured women on the covers of issues previous to that one. All things considered, I have few complaints with a magazine like In Step. since the regular inclusion of liberation news, a fairly non-sexist format, a very open minded editorial staff who have a very sincere mind with regards outreach to the lesbian/women's community more than offsets one cover I happened to personally dislike. I know the difference between my personal conscience and my public one - and liberation occurs when one can communicate rationally where disagreement happens. Both Editors (Ron and Dave) took my complaint about the cover well - and most importantly: they listen AND heard.

So what then, did Ms. Nichols and Ms. Gaylord accomplish with their nasty remarks? Was it in the best interest of gay liberation for these two women to absolutely categorize In Step as being "a bar rag?" And to further state that all Continued on page 8

readers of In Step are "barflies" with apparently little or no value to Ms. Nichols because they aren't involved? Was it in the best interest of gay liberation to say that In Step has nothing of interest for (I suppose) lesbians? According to several people who were present at the time of all this weighty bombasting, Ms. Nichols also leveled at Mr. Geiman what appears to be a veiled threat in that, "If (my) pornography law were passed, you (Mr. Geiman) couldn't even distribute In Step in Madison . . . It would be pornography . . . " Was that in the best interest of gay liberation?

I am saddened to see that the most prestigious gay organization in Wisconsin has at its helm and as members the kind of person displaying the kind of negative, discriminatory attitudes one might have thought only to associate with a Jerry Falwell. They are, of course, entitled to their personal opinion, but to throw out the baby (95% of the gay community who aren't involved with organizations or liberation work per se) with the bath water (gay publications which attempt outreach to you "barfly" readers) is an unconscionable position for one in a leadership role, like Ms. Nichols and Ms. Gaylord. Furthermore, to behave like such political roues with the press present make one wonder what faux pas they might make in a situation with the nongay media.

It would seem that the council needs to set it's house in order, as it were. How can the gay men and lesbians of Wisconsin have faith in a council where the leadership (or at least, part of the leadership) and some of its members display such obviously discriminatory attitudes towards the very people they ostensibly represent to the Governor and to other agencies and in outreach to the people of Wisconsin? How can we, as a community, think to achieve more in the area of civil rights when some of our leaders are threatening censorship of a publication on the basis of someone's personal idea of what pornography means and on the basis of a law not yet even drafted? The arrogance of such an attitude is abhorrent; the self-righteousness smacks of the far right and certainly not of liberation.

If the Governor's Council is to maintain the trust of gays and lesbians here in Wisconsin, it seems clear that stringent action must be taken. Although these can never be a grading in terms of the hurt caused by insensitivity, even Cabinet members and national politicians have been forced to resign their positions over lesser remarks. It must be seen that the only course of action must be for Ms. Nichols and Ms. Gaylord to immediately resign their positions with the council. We cannot have Governor Earl's magnificent gesture to our community sabotaged by ineffective and insensitive leadership. And if Ms. Nichols and Ms. Gaylord will not resign (and given their attitudes, I would doubt that happening), then the council must either require their resignation or begin to police itself and take some strong disciplinary measure. At the very least, both Ms. Nichols and Ms. Gaylord should be required to give both a written and public apology to Mr. Geiman and to all you "barfly" no-count valueless readers of In Step. And the council can take one more step in re-establishing good faith with the gays and lesbians of Milwaukee: for quite a while now, there has been a vacant position on the council which was allotted for a Milwaukee representative. The man who filled that position resigned. The Milwaukee community elected a full slate of individuals to fill the positions accorded us. Isn't it time that open position was filled by one of our elected representatives?

Governor Earl's council was set up to serve the gay and lesbian population of Wisconsin, as well as business, agencies, and the state. Population means YOU, whether you be activist or not. I would hope that you, the readers of In Step, are as upset about this whole salacious mess as are those of us who are political observers. You are, after all, the ones who take out ads so that gay publications can survive; you are the ones who put the dollars in the jars when benefits are held for gay organizations in the bars. You are special, unique - each one of you. And it is your right and your privilege to decide whether or not to be "involved" with political activism. And, while those of us who do political work would dearly love to see more of you joining and working with organizations, no matter the capacity, to know that you are there and at least supporting us by being gay and proud is much more preferable than heavy handed tactics, threats involving a law which reminds me of the infamous Neuremburg Laws against Jews in Ger-

W.I.S.: You very kindly helped us with the Muscular Dystrophy benefit, "Worley's Weekend" on your last visit. Your team on the show, Hot Potato, raised \$6,000 for Actors and Others for Animais. Can you tell us about this charity and your involvement with it?

J.A.W .: I do happen to be on the Board of Directors for Actors and Others. I started out as a worker person and happened to get more and more involved. Actors and Others tries to do what they can for animals, in many different areas. One of them being to help people who can't afford to have their animals have an operation, medication, or even find the right veterinarian, animal placement, animal legislation. Whenever there is a major need or catastrophe, for instance Three Mile Island, we helped take care of the animals. There was a big flood in Texas so we aided in taking care of the horses. Helping with the whales. We donate money to other charitable organizations who need it.

W.I.S.: Tell me please what is your husband, Roger Perry, doing these days?

J.A.W.: Roger, who usually does Herbie in "Gypsy" with me, and we do a lot of shows together as you know, is doing "Skylark" in Los Angeles. As a matter of fact, they opened the same night we opened in "Gypsy" as part of the Olympic Arts Festival. And he's kissing a woman every night who happens to, thank God, and I hope will continue to be my friend, and is married to the Director, so I think it's OK.

W.I.S.: What's it like to work with your husband?

J.A.W.: I love it. It's easy because you know each other so well. Part of the rehersal period is spent getting to know your fellow performers, being able to read their attitudes. So, when you know somebody as well as you know your husband, then its just that much easier, and he's an excellent actor. He's wonderful and a joy to work with. Also, speaking of the Olympics, my stepson, Chris Perry, is going to be playing in the Olympic Gala Opening and Closing.

W.I.S.: If I remember right, you were discovered by Gower Champion while he was casting for "Carnival".

J.A.W.: Yes, one of my discoverers. I think everybody's career is a series of being discovered many times. I audi-

tioned for the National Company. He came up on stage and said, "Jo Anne, you're absolutely perfect for the role but we don't know who we're going to cast opposite you yet. One is shorter than you, but if we cast the taller gentleman then we'd love to have you do it." Well, he cast the short one and I still did the part so that's good. He was very instrumental in my career. And also, he called me when the show closed in Chicago to be Carol Channing's standby for "Hello Dolly!" out of town in Washington, DC and for the first few months of the successful Broadway run.

W.I.S.: 1 love your philosophy. What is the difference between a standby and an understudy?

J.A.W.: About \$500 a week. Literally, the understudy is usually somebody in the show. The standby is somebody who's not in the show and doesn't have to be at the theatre every night, unless God forbid

W.I.S.: You've had a wonderful TV career and you've got a tremendous stage presence. Which does Jo Anne prefer doing?

J.A.W.: I like variety. Well, theatre is my first experience, I certainly have the equipment for theatre. However, I do enjoy the quickness of television. I just like to be able to do different things. As a matter of fact, I'm going to start some lecturing.

W.I.S.: Your combination of making breakfast and getting pretty on "Hour Magazine" was great fun. Any tips you'd like to share with us at this point?

J.A.W.: Yes, I did hear that watermelon seeds are very good for you. You should eat them. Better you eat the seeds and throw out the watermelon. They are better for you than sunflower seeds or anything. Or you can string them and wear them . . .

W.I.S.: If you could have a magic wand and could make anything in the world happen for Jo Anne right now, what would it be?

J.A.W.: Oh, I'd like to be doing the revival on Broadway of "Gypsy".

W.I.S.: Here's hoping we see it and you know I'll be there!

A Visit With Jo Anne Worley

Arts columnist Kevin Michael had the pleasure of interviewing a marvel, who for the fifth time, has returned to Milwaukee to fascinate as the star of Melody Top's Gypsy, Miss Jo Anne Worley. She has also starred in productions of Once Upon A Mattress, Anything Goes, Hello Dolly!, and Annie Get Your Gun at the Top. Now meet the charming comedienne, Miss Jo Anne Worley . . .

W.I.S.: Your back for your fifth show, how wonderful. What's your reaction to Milwaukee?

J.A.W.: The best part about coming back other than doing "Gypsy", which is a role that I really love and I adore doing it, is that there are so many good friends here that I enjoy seeing. I like when you grow up that you have a past, and in your past are friends. And one thing about show business is that you don't always have to say goodbye. You get to see people again and that's one of the good things about being back in Milwaukee.

W.I.S.: Recently you've come from Long Beach where you performed "Gypsy" with your husband, Roger Perry. You've received raves both there and here on the show. How does that make you feel?

J.A.W.: Very, very good. As a matter of fact, I don't really read reviews. When you first start out in show business, you of course read reviews. You're thrilled and delighted to see your name in print. Then after you've achieved a certain amount of success, sometimes reviewers are looking to shoot you down. What I do is an extension of me, Jo Anne. What I did on "Laugh In" was just an extension of me. So, for a while reviewers would say, "Oh, she's doing "Laugh In"." I wasn't doing "Laugh In", I was just doing me. So I stopped reading reviews because sometimes when you see things in print, it gives more validity whether or not it's true. All I know is when I do my work, I do the very best I can. So I read reviews after the show closes.

W.I.S.: There's a depth and intensity to Momma Rose. What's the secret?

J.A.W .: It's beautifully written. It is masterfully written. The book and the music.

Of course, Ethel Merman created it and she was a strong performer and I am a strong performer. And I have done this show many times since I was quite a bit vounger. I feel now that I'm growing into this role and I am pleased that there is a role of this caliber that I will be able to do, God willing for several years.

W.I.S.: You started out as a singing secretary like Miss Merman, didn't you?

J.A.W .: Well, only my boss didn't know it. I worked at an insurance company and they thought I was going to be Miss Wonderful Insurance. I was secretary to the President. But what I was doing was paying my rent and my music lessons and at night I was doing musicals for no mon-

W.I.S.: What's the real Jo Anne Worley really like? Is she very much like the stage persona?

J.A.W.: Kind of what you're seeing right now. I enjoy making people laugh. I enjoy entertaining people. I guess yes, pretty much what you see on stage depending on what the role demands. When I did "Annie Get Your Gun", it's certainly different from Momma Rose, but it all comes from the same source.

W.I.S.: The "Laugh In" stint was great, but did it ever impede you in anyway?

J.A.W.: What I aluded to before were reviewers saying, "Oh, she's doing "Laugh In" things." Because it was so terribly successful and so innovative, we're all so recognized and thank heaven for "Laugh In". Because of the kind of show it was, revue-quick things, in order to make an impact or to get the point across, you had to be very bizarre and do whatever it is to its furthest degree and quickly. And, a lot of people who are uninformed would think that that's all that you can do - just that certain style, but that's not the way it is.

W.I.S.: I have to ask you. Have you heard any good chicken jokes lately?

J.A.W.: I heard one here in Milwaukee but it's one I have heard before. Why did the chicken cross the road? To see Gregory . . . Peck! Booorrriiinnnggg!
