

We're looking forward to our second year, and hope you are, too.





# Wrap-Up Of Aids Advances, Outlooks

New York via GNIC — Rapid advances in the understanding of AIDS is raising hopes that the deadly disease will be soon conquered, researchers say.

Researchers at the National Cancer Institute and Massachusetts General Hospital announced that they had found an antibody that neutralized the retrovirus believed to cause AIDS. "There has been more progress with this virus than with any other retrovirus in a short period of time," said Dr. James Curran, director of AIDS activities at the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

Retroviruses, types of viruses which have been known for some time to cause cancer and other illnesses in animals, have only recently become known as important causes of disease in man. Last year, researchers at the National Cancer Institute and the Pasteur Institute in Paris reported independently that they had found retroviruses that appeared to cause AIDS.

Now, said Curran, "AIDS is reasonably well understood. The virus has been discovered, and progress in understanding the mechanism and the genetic code of the virus is proceeding very rapidly."

In recent weeks, these advances have been reported:

- A new drug, HPA 23, may block reproduction of the HTLV-3 virus. This drug is currently being tested on 34 people with AIDS.
- A chemical used in many spermicide creams and gels on the market can kill the AIDS virus in the laboratory.

Researchers have identified the exact spot where the AIDS virus latches on to certain white blood cells of the immune system.

4. At least two anti-viral drugs have been found to be effective against AIDS, again based on laboratory tests. Human tests with one of the drugs, suramin, have begun, and tests with a second, ribavirin, are scheduled to begin very soon.

 The entire complement of the AIDS virus's genes has been isolated and deciphered and can now be produced in large quantities for study.

# New Aids Drugs Seem To Be Effective

New York via GNIC — An experimental drug that blocks reproduction of the HTLV-3 virus is believed to have caused the virus to nearly disappear in the blood of a young male with AIDS, according to Pasteur Institute scientist Jean Claude Chermann.

The patient's treatment with the drug HPA 23 was discontinued a year ago. He is now well enough to return to school, said Chermann, who led the research. He said the drug is currently being given to 34 people with AIDS.

Luc Montagnier, also a scientist at the Paris institute, said at the same symposium that studies of the genetic material of AIDS viruses have shown that the AIDS virus isolated at the Pasteur Institute and that isolated about the same time at the U.S. National Cancer Institute are the same virus.

Montagnier said a third AIDS virus identified in San Francisco differs substantially from the previously identified Pasteur and National Cancer Institute viruses. In the genes that govern construction of the virus' outer coat, there is a 20 percent difference between the previously discovered viruses and the San Francisco virus, Montagnier said.

Vaccines are often designed to target substances on the outer coat of an infectious particle. When the outer coat varies from one virus strain to another, vaccination can be more difficult, Montagnier said.

Studies with the experimental French drug described by Chermann follow reports of at least two potential anti-AIDS agents identified in the United States.

In initial tests, suramin showed some ability to fight AIDS, and is now being given to AIDS patients at various hospitals according to officials at the National Institutes of Health.

ing the organization in mid-April to assume a position in New York State government.

In announcing Apuzzo's resignation, Board Co-Chaird Frances Hanckel and Paul Vandenberg said, "Ginny Apuzzo has worked tirelessly for two and a half years strengthening NGTF and representing the lesbian and gay community nationwide as NGTF's chief spokesperson. Her record of accomplishments is unparalleled. While we will miss her daily leadership, she leaves NGTF more effective than ever, with ongoing programs of proven success, administered by highly dedicated and professional people."

The Board will begin a nationwide search for a new Executive Director. To assure an orderly transition, **Jeffrey Levi**, NGTF's Washington Representative, will serve as Acting Executive Director after Apuzzo's departure, until a permanent successor is chosen.

New York Governor Mario Cuomo appointed Apuzzo to the states Consumer Protection Board, where she will serve as deputy director.

Apuzzo has assured NGTF that she fully intends to be an advocate for lesbian and gay concerns, and that she may run for a seat on NGTF's board.

Gov. Cuomo, a possible '88 contender for Democratic Presidential nomination, has been offering Apuzzo jobs since he took office in Jan. '83, according to his liason to the gay and lesbian community, **Peter Drago** "Virginia and the Governor has a long standing relationship which predates his run for governor," said Drago. "He had wanted her as part of his administration from the start, but she felt she had unfinished things at the Task Force."

Apuzzo said that personal family concerns had played a considerable role in her decision to except a position in Albany at this time. "I am convinced that the staff and programs in place at NGTF will assure that the organization remains the most articulate voice for gay and lesbian Americans," she asserted in a press release. "I pledge to find every opportunity to further the success of NGTF, and I ask my colleagues and friends throughout the country to do the same."

Editors Note-Ginny has spoken on several occasion in this area, including a rousing speech I heard her give at UW-Milwaukee in a forum co-sponsored by Gay/Lesbian

Coummunity at UW-M and the CCAF. We salute her acheivements, and will remember her best for her appearance there and on the Phil Donahue Show, where she represented our community in a dialogue with the Rev. Jerry Falwell. Thanks for your ardent efforts, and we're sure we'll hear from you again.

# Eyler Arrest Illegal?

Chicago — GayLife — The attorney who got mass-murder suspect Larry Eyler out of jail last February will once again try to get his client off on a technicality.

David Schippers told reporters last week he plans to argue that Eyler's arrest for the August murder and dismemberment of 16year-old Daniel Bridges in Chicago was illegal and that search warrants were defective.

Eyler, 31, a house painter, is the prime suspect in as many as 24 sex slayings of young men in four states, including Wisconsin. He is well-known in Chicago and Indianapolis gay bars.

Charges have been filed in only one of those other cases, the August 1983 murder of Ralph Calise. Lake County (Ill.) Cicuit Court Judge William Block last February threw out most of the evidence in that case and reduced Eyler's \$1 million bond to \$10,000 after ruling that police had illegally detained Eyler following a traffic stop.

Cook County Criminal Court Judge Joseph Urso set a Feb. 27 hearing date for Schippers' motion to suppress the evidence in the Bridges case.

The warrants in question were based on statements to police by two people who said they saw Eyler carry large, silver garbage bags to the dumpster behind his apartment — where Bridges body was found in large, silver garbage bags. Schippers' motion contends the warrants were based "for the most part on uncorraborated hearsay" resulting from "hearsay allegations, rumor, innuendo, irrelevant material, and plain guesswork."

Assistant state's attorney Mark Rakoczy said crime lab testing is still not completed on the "mountain" of evidence taken from Eyler's apartment and the dumpster behind it. That evidence reportedly includes Eyler's bloody fingerprints inside the silver garbage bags and results of a sophisticated test with the chemical luminol, which detected spattered blood throughout Eyler's apartment under a coat of fresh paint.

# U.S. Budget Reduces AIDS Funding

NGTF — The Reagan Administration's fiscal 1986 budget, presented to Congress on Feb. 4, includes a \$10 million cut in the Public Health Service's AIDS effforts as well as massive cuts in Medicaid and elimination of revenue sharing-all important components of the fight against AIDS.

Commenting on the budget figures, Virginia Apuzze, Executive Director of the National Gay Task Force, said, "It is incredible that an administration that considers AIDS to be its 'number one health priority' would reduce spending when we are still along way from a cure and while the costs associated with AIDS are skyrocketing."

"Once again," Apuzzo continued, "the administration is relying on the Congress to propose an adequate level of funding to deal with research, education and health care

associated with AIDS. NGTF will continue its full-scale lobbying effort, in cooperation with the FARO AIDS Action Council and other groups, to obtain sufficient funds in fiscal year 1986 and supplemental funds for 1985."

The Administration proposal calls for a total of \$85.5 million in AIDS-related Programs for the Public Health Service in FY1986, down from 96 million in 1985. The budget proposal does not reflect a federal program announced last week for alternative sites for the HTLV-III antibody test. It is not clear whether those funds will come out of existing programs or whether supplemental monies for FY85 will be requested. The 1986 budget calls for a general reduction in the number of research grants given by the

National Institutes for Health from 5,500 to 5,000. It is not known how many AIDS-related grants will be affected.

# Despondent Lover Loses \$1 Million Bet


Las Vegas-Journal- A Texas gambler who put down a losing \$1 million bet on a single roll of the dice because he was despondent over the loss of his male lover left a suicide note saying he wanted to be remembered as the "phantom gambler at the Horseshoe" casino.

The man, 33, was found dead apparently the result of a drug overdose. Vegas police said he swallowed the contents of various capsules. He had lost his bet Nov. 16th at the Horseshoe Hotel and Casino. It was the largest known single bet in Vegas history.

Casino manager Ted Binion, who had befriended Bergstrom after he won \$777,000 and \$538,000 at the Horseshoe with single rolls of the dice in the last four years, said he spoke with the gambler the day before his death. "He told me he bet a million dollars because he was despondent about the guy," Binion said.

Who uses GNIC? Almost all users are gays or lesbians. Currently, about 600 users are using the system — with more joining every day — located in every part of the country including Canada and Hawaii.

What will a subscription offer? You'll have full access to electronic mail services (just like having a post office box); message bulletin boards; current news; gay horoscope; gay dungeons and dragons; movie, book, theatre and video reviews; the ability to see who else is on line with you; the ability to talk directly with other on-line users (by ringing a "door bell" on their computer); and, the ability to link up with up to eight other users simultaneously. The system features a complete user directory and also allows you to search the directory for specific types of users (by age, sex, interests, etc.).

What does it cost? There is a one-time subscription fee of \$30 and then you pay \$5.25 for every hour of computer time you use. There are no additional charges each month besides your useage, however there is a three hour (\$15.75) per month minimum charge. And here's the best part:

NO LONG DISTANCE CHARGES! That's right — GNIC uses the Tymenet information system which offers users a local access number that will patch the call directly into the GNIC computer in New York. In Wisconsin, local access numbers are available in Appleton, Beloit, Brookfield, Eau Claire, Green Bay, La Crosse, Madison, Milwaukee, Neenah, Oshkosh, Racine and West Bend. (Local access numbers are available in just about every major city in the country.)

**Is it easy to use?** Certainly! The system was designed to be extremely user friendly — allowing even the computer novice to instantly access the system.

**Do I need any special equipment?** Almost any personal or business computer will work. The only special equipment you should need is a telephone modem. The system accepts both 300 and 1200 band communications speeds.

Are there any special hours of operation? GNIC remains on line 24 hours a day, seven days a week — access the system whenever you wish.

**How do I subscribe?** Easy. Fill out the coupon below, enclose a check or money order for \$45.75 made payable to **GNIC** and send to **Wisconsin In Step**. Your subscription will be immediately forwarded to GNIC and you will be sent complete information, along with your password, etc. in approximately 2-4 weeks.

# Gays in The Marketplace

What's a woman to do? Here it is Valentines Day, day of wine and roses, of lovers, of celebrating ties of the heart. So off I go on my trek in search of the appropriate card and gift. The gift itself isn't difficult. I'm fairly sure of her tastes and I've got a pretty good idea of what I'm after. But the card. . . well, that's another story.

I don't really want a humorous card. My feelings now are running toward something more. . . sensual. I pass over the genericlooking rack and finally come across the type

of imagery I'm looking for.

There she is, in the third column...a beautiful, long, dark-haired woman. Slender, curving body lines, soft-looking skin, and wonderfully photographed...with her arms around a brawny, hairy...man! Oh well... so much for the card. After several more equally disappointing attempts, I leave the card shop empty handed.

I decide to try the East Side shops, remembering their more well-rounded selections. Upon inspection of the current stock, however, the gay-oriented selections seem limited mostly to mens leather or drag queen scenes. The ones with the appropriate imagery are either masculine in message or have nothing to do with Valentine's Day. Even the once-proliferating gay card selection in an old standby gallery has dwindled to two racks of mostly male-oriented cards.

The clerks are busy, so I don't ask what happened. I leave and can only assume that the availability of these types of cards is in proportion to the amount being produced. So the question forms in my mind. . "where are all the greetings, postcards, and art ori-

ented toward gay women?"

I know that here in Milwaukee, there is an abundance of talent in all the fine arts among gay community members. I myself am very interested in producing (at some point in the not-too distant future) my own line of cards and art aimed at the lesbian culture. But that takes lots of time and money for things like market research start up capital, proper equipment, etc. At this point in time, time and money are two things I'm not exactly

overwhelmed with. However, knowing that a true need for this service exists would definitely boost my motivation to find some sooner.

I am wondering how many other women here would be interested in seeing this kind of greeting and art become available. Is there really a feasible market for this sort of thing in Milwaukee and other main consumer markets?

It has been proven time and again that the gay community represents a fairly substantial amount of affluence as far as we are concerned as a consumer group. This is not to say that we all are wealthy. But we are members of the buying public, and it's about time we made our presence known.

Like any other product, these types of items would be stocked if a real demand were proven. And once again, our apathy and passivity, as a whole, in making our needs known, has left us with the short end of the deal. There are some cards like this avialable from Paper Moon Graphics and a few ohter California based firms, but their themes are rather ambiguous-not specifically gay. Certainly, that's a nice, safe way to market, but it doesn't fill the needs of gays directly. The other lesbian-oriented cards that are available are only marketed at feminist operated bookstores that obviously, due to location, can't serve everyones needs. . . besides. Milwaukee's has closed.

I, for one, feel that if a line of cards, tshirts, calendars, and other paper products
specifically targeted at the gay buying sector
were made available, I would patronize their
manufacturers and marketers. This is especially true if these companies are gayowned/operated. I will always make a buying decision to patronize gay establishments
(provided I'm informed of this situation) before I'll support a straight-owned business if
at all possible. After all. . . If we don't support each other, who will?

This decision would be made provided that the porduct or service offered must be up to par with "straight" companies. . . there is no excuse for poor service or shoddy workmanship in any worthwhile enterprise.

# "Torch Song Trilogy"

Harvey Fierstein's "Torch Song Trilogy" comes to Milwaukee's Riverside Theatre from Feb. 26th through the 3rd of March. This poignant work is a must for all gay people to see: This work is a must for all persons to see!

The play consists of three one-act plays which trace a six year period in the life of our gay hero — Arnold Beckhoff. The first, "International Stud," explores the quest for love-not just an experience common to gay life. "Fugue in a Nursery" is the second which explores marriage and the depth of relational committment. The final play "Widows and Children First," looks at the need for family and bonding.

So though the plays have a gay life-focus, Arnold's wants, needs, hopes, dreams, loves and pains are those of every person. We who are gay can readily identify with his struggles and concerns but the play itself speaks to all of life not only gay life.

In the introduction to the play itself, "The Miracle of Modern Sex," James Leverett has this to say: "Fiersteins central theme—the homosexual's struggle to reach beyond alienated self involvement and find recognition respect and love in some wier sphere of human contact turns out to be the human struggle itself, regardless of the boundaries of sexual preference. . He expands the ways in which we may exist with one another by taking apart the basic units of all intimate human relationships."

So in the course of our six year journey through Arnold's life we see him through his occupation as a drag, cruise through a meatrack-bar backroom, involve himself with a bisexual lover (whom he loses to a woman), lose his second lover in death to a gang of fag bashers, decide to adopt a gay teenager, face his Jewish mother with his gayness, and in the end come to begin to love and accept himself as he is. In Fiersteins own words:

What's nice about Arnold is that he's struggling to be truthful. Not many people do. At the beginning we meet him in full drag and at the end he's naked, so to speak. I've written a play in which homosexual's dont commit suicide at the end or repent their evil

ways. The basic theme is self respect. . . Gays grow up listening to heterosexual songs and watching heterosexual movies. It's good for them to see one of their own struggling to be himself."

His point cannot be better made. It is vital that the American culture understand that like other minorities, we have arrived! This is no small fete and yet a very real and pressing undertaking. Much sensitivity and real communication will help us be seen as persons not sexual stereotypes. "Torch Song Trilogy" and the recently televised "Consenting Adults" will help this awareness building within straight society.

It is no minor point that Harvey Fierstein is the first person to have ever won simultaneously the Tony Award of 1983 (Broadway's Oscar) for writing and starring in "Torch Song Trilogy." His acceptance speech for "Torch Song" and as well the Tony he received for "La Cage Aux Folles" were marvelous where he specifically thanked his lover Scott, on national television no less. To quote from Jerry Herman's lyric, it's clear that "we are who we are and what we are needs no excuses."

P.J. Benjamin who plays Arnold in this company says of one review of his performance, "Apparently, he must have a personal identity with this character, and that was the best thing they could have said about me... the fact that they would think I was gay."

Thelma Lee, Golde to even different Tevye's in "Fiddler on the Roof" and a wide variety of other Broadway roles, speaks of her role as Arnold's mother in this fashion "It takes understanding. I wanted to do this play because out of my mouth come all the words that mothers of gays must feel. . . A 92 year old woman whose son is gay came up to me once and said, "It doesn't make him any less in my heart. . . it just takes alot of understanding."

Also in this company is the talented and vivacious Louisa Flaningam. Ms. Flaningham has been featured here at the Melody Top as Velma Kelly in "Chicago," one of the few women ever to play the emcee in "Cabaret" and as Young Belle in "Little Mel"



Says he: "Like an old familiar half heard song playing on a jukebox you might catch a line that reaches out and touches something going on inside of you. And for that instant you are relieved of the isolation. That is the work of a Torch Song. That is the goal of these plays."

# The Fourth Man

The 4th Man is the story of Gerard, a gay writer who allows himself to be seduced by the bewitching Christine in order to get closer to her handsome and sexy young boyfriend, Herman. At first delighted with his own ingenuity, Gerard slowly realizes that it is actually Christine who is pulling the strings of this bizarre triangle. Haunted by premonitions of death, Gerard investigates the elusive Past of this mysterious and calculating woman and discovers that she is three times a widow, each of her husbands having died from grisly and untimely deaths. Gerard becomes convinced that he and Herman are caught in her web and that one of them is doomed to become the 4th man.

Dutch director Paul Verhoeven has created an audacious thriller that blends eerie mysticism, raunchy eroticism, wicked black humor and baroque horror. With two Academy Award nominations under his belt, Turkish Delight and Soldier of Orange, Verhoven also directed the highly successful Spetters and has just completed Flesh and Blood for Orion. The 4th Man has won numerous prizes the world over, including the Special Jury Prize at the Avoriaz Film Festival and the International Critics Prize at the Toronto Film Festival.

The film is from the novel by Gerard Reve, a highly controversial, openly gay Dutch writer. It is startling to note that the 4th Man was loosely based on a true story. In addition to the fascinating characters and story, the film is stunning for its macabre atmosphere. The opulent art direction mixes sleek, contemporary elegance with dark,

gothic trappings, and the cinematography by Jan de Bont (Cujo, All the Right Moves) is nothing less than breathtaking.







# **Tampa Bay**

The "Sun Coast" of western Florida may not have the glamorous reputation of the state's fabled "Gold Coast," but it can be every bit as rewarding. The major cities surrounding Tampa Bay, a large natural harbor on the Gulf of Mexico, are Tampa, St. Petersburg and Clearwater. Fast-growing, heterogenous Tampa has long contrasted with it's more sedate sister cities across the bay.

Tampa with a population of 300,000 is a composite of a picturesque vacationland and a booming industrial center.

Florida's "Treasure City" has more than fifteen gay bars, most of which are open until 3:00 a.m. Baxter's at 714 South Dale Ma-


bry features good piano entertainment, and is nearly always packed with good looking young business types. The big men's disco is the Old Plantation at 1725 West Kennedy. Besides the typically plastic dance floor in front, the "0. P." has a "quiet" Key Westlike cruise bar in back. On a recent Sunday night, Rene's Disco at 2605 West Kennedy, was really hurting, however they have bounced back before.

B. J.'s at 4427 West Kennedy is the favorite disco for Tampa's foxy young women. El Goya, in Ybor City is a show bar, most popular on Sunday afternoons and Tuesday nights. The Club 2606 at 2606 North Armenia is the best leather bar in the area. Some levi and leather guys also frequent the Officers Club, a small disco at 1204 North Franklin. The Carousel at 1806 West Platt is hustler heaven. The C.B.C.'s Club Tampa at 215 North 11th St. is not only the best, but the only bath around. The Bridge at 5519 North Hillsborough is an after hours club.

Two bridges separate Tampa from St. Petersburg. After Tampa, St. Pete is the fourth largest city in Florida with a population of 250,000. It has a reputation for being one of America's largest retirement communities, and the city where the sun always shines does provide many special facilities for its senior citizens. The bar scene is lively enough, with The Club at 1113 Central being the busiest disco. The Lighted Tree at 109 Eighth Ave. in Pass-a-Grille Beach is a fun beach bar, with an adjoining guest house. The Engine Room at 1020 South 4th St. has been around a long time, and attracts both men and women.

Clearwater is an all year beach resort of 75,000 inhabitants, reached by the Courtney Campbell Causeway. The only gay bar currently is **Pro Shop** — not worth a special trip. But **Dallape's Lounge** in nearby Dunedin is picking up nicely. For more info on book stores, gay business groups, churches, cruisy areas, etc., write for a copy of the new 86 Address Book, available in late April. **The Weekly News** (TWN) is Florida's best gay newspaper and available in most local bars.

2. Develop Lots of Disgusting Habits. This route can cover a wide range of territory, so I will just mention a few of my personal favorites. Remember it is more important to develop more than one disgusting habit. The more revolting you can be the better. Let your personal hygiene slide — don't bathe, let your toenails grow really long and scratch his legs with them in bed, eat lots of adult foods and don't brush or gargle, or don't change your underwear. As one set of underpants wear out just put another pair on top. Eventually you'll end up with one complete set and lots of elastic bands around your waist.

3. Develop Bizarre Behavior Patterns. This technique requires more planning and forethought than developing disgusting habits. The idea is to start with acting really weird without letting on it is all really an act.
