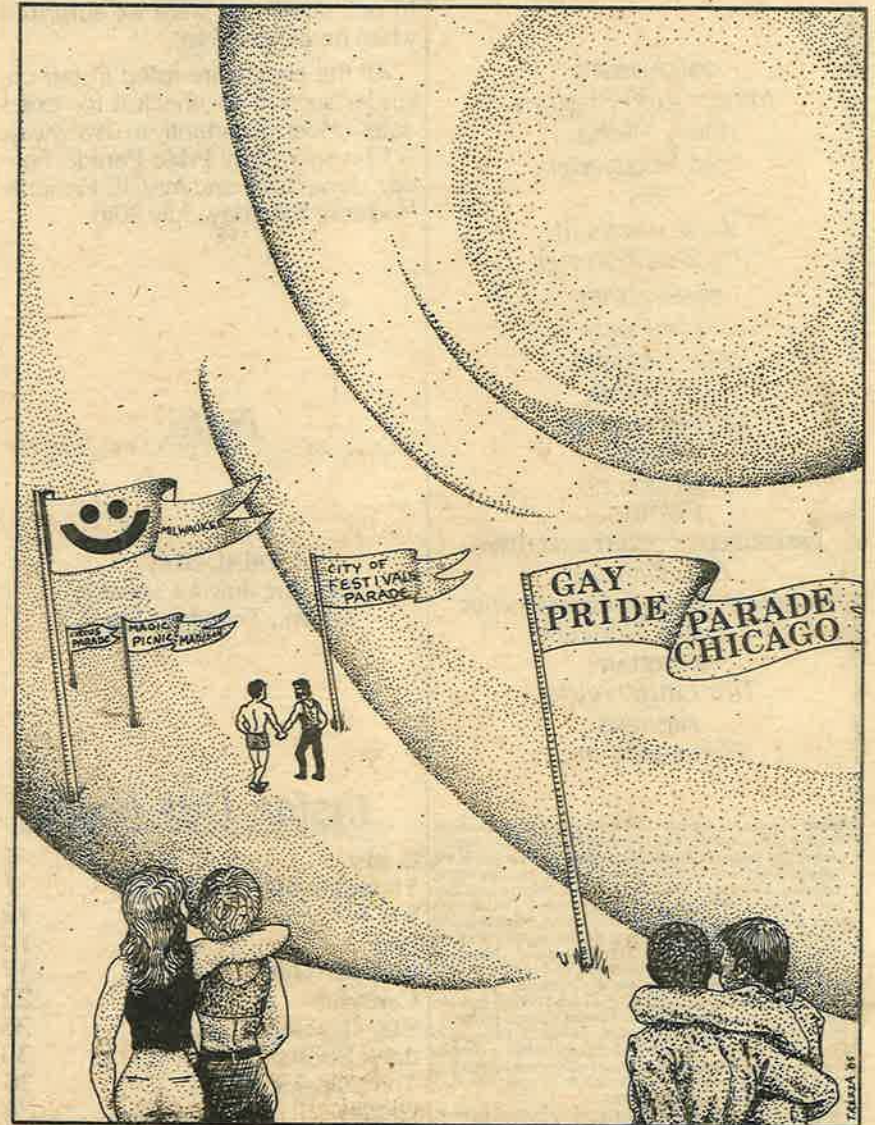

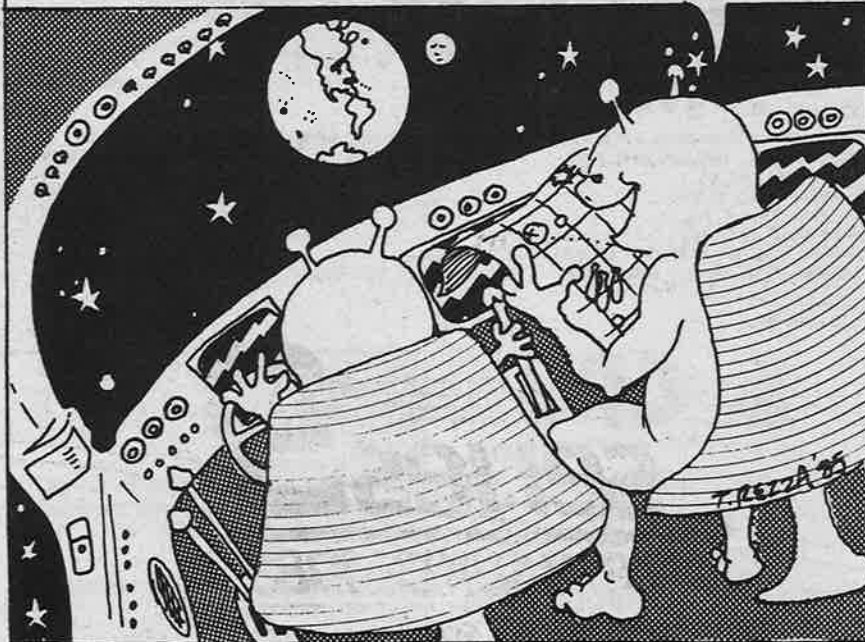

DELTA VIRUS MAY BE WORSE THAN AIDS

LOS ANGELES (GNIC) — A new virulent form of hepatitis more severe and disabling than common strains could 'spread like wildfire' among gays and may become more of a threat than AIDS, researchers say.

The new form of hepatitis, caused by the 'delta virus,' either kills its victims quickly in a super-acute first phase, or forces them to linger in a chronic phase and die of cirrhosis of the liver.

Dr. Allan Redeker, a professor at the University of Southern California School of Medicine and chief of the liver unit at Rancho Los Amigos Hospital in Downey, said Tuesday the incidence of delta virus hepatitis is on the rise among homosexual men in Los Angeles and has the potential to sweep through homosexual populations as AIDS already has.

'What worries us,' Redeker said in a telephone interview, 'is that once it (the delta virus) gets through the homosexual community it could spread like wildfire.'

About 150 cases of the potentially fatal hepatitis strain have been identified among all segments of the Los Angeles population over the past three years, with the sharpest increase among homosexual men, Redeker said.

In a New England Journal of Medicine editorial last week, a researcher at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston said cases of hepatitis caused by the delta virus are rising on both the East and West coasts.

The editorial accompanied a study by Italian researchers on delta virus hepatitis worldwide.

Redeker's studies of the delta virus at USC are being conducted as researchers in Massachusetts continue exploring an outbreak of 200 confirmed cases in the city of Worcester since 1983.

Just a few years ago, delta virus hepatitis

occurred mostly in intravenous drug users, who are still the highest risk group, but the time for the widespread dissemination of delta virus into the homosexual community 'is already here,' Redeker said.

The researcher points out that the delta strain is a variation on hepatitis that can only be contracted by someone who has already been infected by the agent that causes hepatitis-B, one of the two major forms of hepatitis.

Hepatitis-B can be spread by use of contaminated needles and blood products or sexual contact. Figures compiled by the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta show that in 1983, the most recent year for which numbers are available, 24,300 people nationwide contracted hepatitis-B.

Hepatitis-B can be prevented by vaccination, but the recently developed three-shot series is comparatively expensive and the total cost about \$100 and immunization campaigns have met with little success, Redeker said.

GAY GAMES SUE TO USE NEW NAME

SAN FRANCISCO (GNIC) — Lawyers representing the 1986 Gay Games II say they have just as much right as the U.S. Olympic Committee to use a '3,700-year-old generic word' and asked a federal appeals court let them use the term 'Gay Olympics.'

'Congress didn't give the U.S. Olympic Committee unlimited use of the word for all purposes and all time,' attorney Mary C. Dunlap said Tuesday in asking a three-justice panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals to reverse an action by U.S. District Judge J.P. Vukasin.

Vukasin awarded the U.S. Olympic Committee \$97,000 in attorney's fees, to be paid by promoters of the gay sporting event, on

the grounds that there had been 'a deliberate and willful' trademark infringement.

Dunlap complained Vukasin had decided the issue 'without a trial or proper hearing.'

The issue first hit the courts three years ago, when Dr. Tom Waddell, a decathlon participant at the 1968 Olympics at Mexico City, sought to hold 'Gay Olympic Games' in San Francisco. He was forced by the U.S. Olympic Committee to drop the word 'Olympic' from his Kezar Stadium event.

That event was subsequently dubbed 'Gay Games' and organizers of the Gay Games II scheduled for August 1986 at Kezar and other sites want to be able to call it 'Gay Olympics II.'

Dunlap pointed out that Waddell had offered the committee a compromise where every advertisement, letterhead and T-shirt connected with the Gay Games would have a disclaimer stating there was no connection with the established games.

Vaugh R. Walker, representing the U.S. Olympic Committee, countered with a law passed by Congress in 1978 giving exclusive use of the word in question to the U.S. and International Olympic Committees.

'There was deliberate and willful infringement of the trademark' by Gay Games organizers, Walker added.

Chicago Gay Pride Parade Sunday June 30

The annual Chicago pride parade occurs this weekend, with the largest Wisconsin-registered entries ever. Besides *InStep*, Milwaukee's Black and White Men Together (BWMT), and Christian Gay OK (CGOK), Milwaukee's La Cage, and Rod's and The New Bar from Madison, are also entering the parade. Milwaukee's Mixed Festival Chorus, the city's new gay chorus, will also participate.

The parade steps off from the corner of Halsted and Addison and continues down Broadway to the new festival site in Lake Park. Step-off time is 2pm. Any Wisconsinites are welcome to join in with any of the groups. Efforts will be made to 'clump' all

the Wisconsin entries in once segment of the parade.

ALTERNATIVE WOMEN'S CLINIC TO OPEN IN JULY

The Brady East STD Clinic, Inc., a sexually transmitted disease clinic serving Milwaukee's gay population, is expanding its services to include an **Alternative Women's Clinic**. The women's clinic will be offered once a week, beginning July 25th, from 6:30 pm to 9:00 pm, at the BESTD Clinic facilities at 1240 East Brady Street in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Women's health services, including pap smears, breast exams, referrals, treatment of vaginitis, urinary tract infection, vaginal warts and other problems will be provided. There will also be a strong focus of self-help and prevention education.

'We believe there is a need in Milwaukee for a women's health care service that is run by women for women, without the focus on reproduction and birth control', stated Nova Clite, President of the Brady East STD Clinic Board of Directors. 'Although our primary outreach will be to gay women, our services will be available to any woman who needs them', she said. A brief survey on Lesbian health needs and concerns is being distributed by the committee organizing the Alternative Women's Clinic in order to get community feedback on what services should be offered.

An Open House for the Alternative Women's Clinic will be held on Friday, July 19th, from 5:30 pm to 8:00 pm. The public is invited to come and meet the women health care professionals who will be running the program and to find out more about the program. Women who are interested in volunteering to work in the Alternative Women's Clinic should come to the Open House. An orientation session for volunteers will be held July 20th from 10:00 am to 12:00 noon at 1240 East Brady Street.

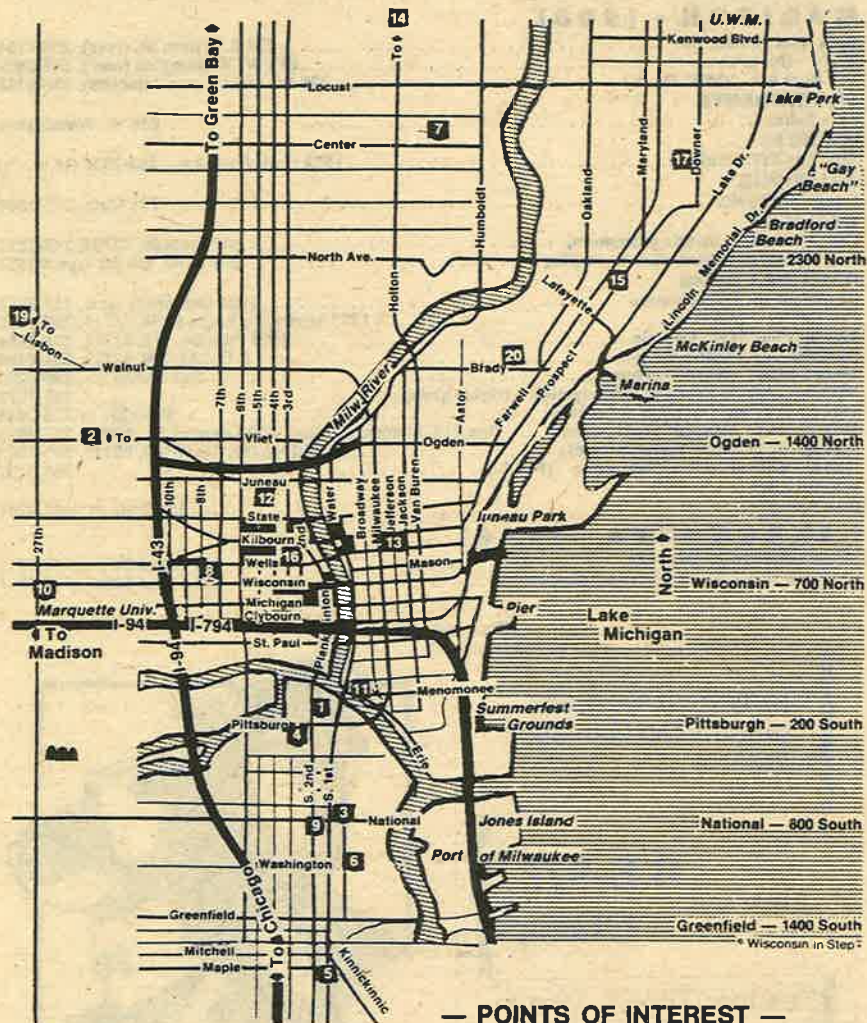

Travel**MINNEAPOLIS & ST. PAUL** by Bob Damron

Much more than just the Mississippi River separates the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul — and the difference is ideological. Minneapolis is a liberal, farsighted, cosmopolitan city humming with business, people and pleasure. St. Paul, the capital of Minnesota is more staid and conservative. I don't quite understand the correlation between the Twin Cities that aren't, but the fact is women prefer St. Paul, while the boys get it on in Minneapolis.

Weather in the Twin Cities can be miserable during winter, but very pleasant the rest of the year. For this reason, Minneapolis has an elaborate skyway system linking more than 25 downtown blocks with interconnected, elevated walkways — air conditioned in the summer and mercifully heated in the winter. These pedestrian bridges, one story above the bustling street traffic below, link hotels, restaurants, banks, retail shops and parking garages. While the ever more impressive skyline, with innovative architectural developments soars skyward, the main thoroughfare, Hennepin Avenue, remains unchanged. It is as busy, garish, and exciting as 42nd Street or Hollywood Boulevard.

Most of the gay bars are on or just off Hennepin between 4th and 9th Streets, which makes Minneapolis one of the few cities in America where you don't need a car to get around in. The Gay Nineties Happy Hour at 408 Hennepin is a super complex with cruise bar and disco dancing downstairs, a 'quiet' bar, entertainment lounge, Hide House leather shop and pseudo bike bar upstairs. The latter two are difficult to find, so ask one of the employees for direc-

tions. The Brass Rail is in the same block at 422 Hennepin. For 17 years it has been presided over by the charming and indefatigable Marquerite, and features piano entertainment and a mature clientele.

'Y'all Come Back, known as 'The Saloon,' at 830 Hennepin is a very popular disco attracting some hunky young studs. Genial Jimmy Tiggas has just opened a new disco-cruise bar across the street at 9th and Hennepin that should do well. Eastrax at 111 N. 6th St. has video, disco and a diversified younger crowd. The Jockey Club and Nineteen Bar are friendly neighborhood establishments. The only bath in the Twin Cities is the 315 Club at 315 1st Ave. North, but I am told the Vapors Steam Baths in nearby Anoka can be fun days. For books, magazines and things, go to the Adult Book Store at 416 Hennepin or A Brothers Touch at 1931 Nicollet.

In St. Paul, a longtime favorite bar and disco is the Town House at 1415 University Avenue. It is predominately for women, but features mens nights on Wednesdays and Sundays. New and novel, is the Castle Royal, a popular lesbian bar at 215 So. Wabasha. The unique feature here is that it is in several caverns built into the side of a hill. Don't forget to go out a little earlier in the Twin Cities, as all Minnesota bars close at 1:00 a.m.

For mixed/gay dining try the City Center Cafe, Gem Cafe, Laverne's Diner, Professor Munchie's or good burgers at the Saloon Kitchen. If you want to live it up, my favorite restaurants in Minneapolis are Camelot, Jax

Cafe, Marquis, Murray's, Nankin Cafe and the Rosewood Room or Wine Cellar at the Northstar Hotel. The Orion Room on the 50th floor of the IDS Tower offers a magnificent view, but indifferent food and service. In St. Paul, try the Blue Horse, Gannon's, Lexington or the Venetian Inn. For a real gourmet treat, take the time to drive to the four-star Matterhorn Room at the Lowell Inn in nearby Stillwater.

I stay at the Northstar, a very good Omni Hotel which has two advantages. You can easily walk to all the downtown bars in Minneapolis, or if you're driving, you can park in the garage below and zip up to your room without going through the lobby. The Marquette and Hyatt are equally convenient and expensive. For more moderate rates try the Guest House or Best Western Motels.

First time visitors may want to visit old Fort Snelling, St. Anthony's Falls, Minnehaha Falls (immortalized in Longfellow's poem Hiawatha), University of Minnesota, Zoological Gardens, Institute of Arts, Walker Art Center, or cruisy Nicollet Mall and Loring Park. The Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome is home to

the Vikings and Twins - major league football and baseball teams. The Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra is right decent too, if not quite so lustrous as the days when it was conducted by our brother, Dmitri Metropolis.

St. Paul was originally named 'Pig's Eye' after a wild French-Canadian trader whose last name was Parrant. Now it is much more sedate and stately, 'Minneapolis' as it is sometimes known locally is a far cry from the Big Apple, but is by far the best thing going between Washington State and Wisconsin.

The Arts

by Kevin Michael

Most often my column as it is titled deals with 'The Arts.' However, at this writing, I'd like to speak to just one. That is the art of being gay. I do believe that it is an art and one that takes time and effort to be acquired, developed, and perfected.

Last weekend, I had the opportunity to speak with a young man who because of his relational experiences didn't want to be gay anymore. He felt that 'they're all screwed up' and 'you can't trust 'em.' The individuals with whom he'd come into contact were almost totally oblivious, from his description, to the art of being gay as I see it. Gay pride is certainly necessary from without, but what of it within?

First off, comes the necessity of acceptance. We have demanded our place within society as a whole and have made ourselves most clear on non-discrimination. That is important and is definitely our right as persons and members of society. However, what of acceptance of self and others within our own community?

I can't give you ten dollars if I don't have it. By the same token, I can't give you love and respect and acceptance if I can't love and respect and accept myself. As I am. As a gay person. I think it's easy to deal with the grand notion of societal acceptance and cultural awareness because it can cloud the issue of self acceptance which is the real basis for relationship.

I can't help but believe that my young friend wasn't right to some degree. From his perspective, he'd run up against some real relational losers. People he felt who couldn't and wouldn't accept him. Might it be posed, is this a result of the fact that they really couldn't deal with themselves?

Why do so many lovers part? Is it merely the sociological factor that we can't naturally have children to bond and bind? Or as in the case of Massachusetts even the right to be a foster parent that has been taken away? Must the measure of value come from without? What of shared vision, values and faith?

Look at another focus of our gay community which takes its root from 'straight'

societal value. We as a nation are strongly material. I feel that this view is even more permanent among us. We instinctively buy a society that tells us from all sides that we are important and have value not because of who we are but because of what we have.

How do we evaluate and value people? Are our clothes and our look 'in' enough? Do I travel in the right circle or crowd? Am I 'known' at the bars? Can I measure up? Am I desirable? Could anyone possible be interested in me or what's beyond my appearance? And most importantly, am I both young and pretty? 'God Knows, there's nothing after forty!'

My friend also dealt with the frustration he finds in trying to locate another person with whom he can relate as a real person. He finds too many people afraid to be honest and open. True, I told him that being secretive and elusive were part of an inherent paranoia from a former culture that wouldn't allow for a great deal of honesty in the 'straight' world. I thought that the closets had been opened and yet was reminded of a possible relational situation of only two years ago. The fellow had given me a false name and address which remained such only until the day I surprised him with a visit and found not only that he didn't live there and no one had ever heard of him.

How about our ability to relate even in the sexual vein? The AIDS crisis has had one positive aspect in that it's challenged us to examine ourselves and the frequency of our sexual behavior if only for our own survival. But did we and do we deal with persons or are we merely 'making' bodies? Do we deal with real people or 'tops,' 'bottoms,' 'drags,' those into 'leather,' 'uniforms,' or 'S & M.'? Do you 'give' or 'get'?

We have an interesting culture which has started relationally with the sexual and then worked backwards toward developing a relationship to underscore it. Maybe the art form is coming back.

I don't have any easy answers nor simple solutions. I do not wish to make any value judgments on individuals or the way they choose to conduct themselves or their lives.

FINAL PLAY OF MRT SEASON SELECTED

WHO PAYS WHEN YOU CAN'T???

When you are sick or hurt and can't work, who will pay to insure that you don't lose your home, car, etc., not to mention feed you?

While many think that their employers have a program in their benefits package to handle such matters, sadly, this is NOT usually the case. While many employers do have a 'short term' disability program (meaning about 90 days of coverage), most do not provide long term coverage of consequence.

Why Disability Insurance?

Simply stated, if your earnings depend on the amount of money that you raise (meaning you are not independently wealthy), then you should be protecting that source of income.

In this time of AIDS (and there is no way to know for sure if we will be diagnosed today or next year), every person should have their disability insurance (as well as health and life) carefully evaluated by a financial planner/insurance broker who is clearly supportive of the lesbian/gay community.

When it comes to disability programs, the definitions used in determining types of coverage, etc. are at the heart of the success of the program. Normally, if you choose a mainline company you will probably have a sound program. Disability coverage insures that 'x' \$s come into your house tax free each month, something very important to those of us who go from check to check. Furthermore, it will allow you to be independent of welfare and social security.

If you own your own business, not only should you have your own program of disability, but you should also be carrying 'overhead disability' to make sure that you can keep the business open even when you are down.

Three key elements of any fundamental

Rofes lost his sixth grade teaching job in the suburbs of Boston after coming out as a gay activist. He was later hired by an innovative private school where, with his students, he produced the bestselling *The Kids' Book of Divorce*. He tells about his years as a closeted gay schoolteacher in *Socrates, Plato & Guys Like Me: Confessions of a gay schoolteacher*.

NEW PRO-GAY PRESBYTERIAN MODERATOR

INDIANAPOLIS (GNIC) — The newly elected moderator of the Presbyterian Church USA says church members must be open to changes in the organization's stance on homosexuality and abortion.

William H. Wilson, a church elder from McAllen, Texas, was elected Wednesday on a rare first-ballot victory to the one-year post during the church's 197th General Assembly.

Wilson said he supports the church's refusal to ordain avowed homosexuals, but said gays and lesbians should not be ignored by members.

'I will not close the door at this point,' he said. 'I don't think the church should close the door. Homosexuals and lesbians in this church are trying in the context of this church to be heard. It is incumbent on the church to listen to what they have to say.'

Church officials have said homosexuals may be members of the church but cannot serve in office.

successful TV movies about missing children and battered women.

NBC Entertainment president Brandon Tartikoff says the two-hour *An Early Frost* will be about a young man who discovers he has AIDS.

'The film,' says Tartikoff, 'will be in the tradition of *Adam* and *The Burning Bed*.' Scheduled for late fall or early winter, the film will be told from the point of view of the AIDS victim's family.

GAY PASTOR REAFFIRMED BY CHURCH

Denver (*USA TODAY*) — The Rev. Julian Rush, a self-avowed homosexual, has been reappointed as associate pastor of Denver's St. Paul's United Methodist Church.

The announcement was made earlier this month by Bishop Roy Sano. Sano refused to discuss his decision.

Church rules call for reappointment every

two years of any minister who is in good standing with his congregation.

Rush, 48, is the only openly gay practicing Methodist minister in the USA. He was in the center of a 1984 national church debate resulting in a referendum barring homosexuals from ordination or appointment to church positions.

Rush, who is divorced, has been at St. Paul's since 1981. His congregation of 100 is predominantly gay.

Last week, two Denver Methodist ministers filed a grievance against Rush, which could prompt further church review of his qualifications

Also director of the Colorado AIDS project, Rush says he is not seeking controversy, but vows to fight being ousted.

'The work we are doing here is important and a valid ministry,' he says. 'Somebody's got to do it.'

HEALTHY PORN

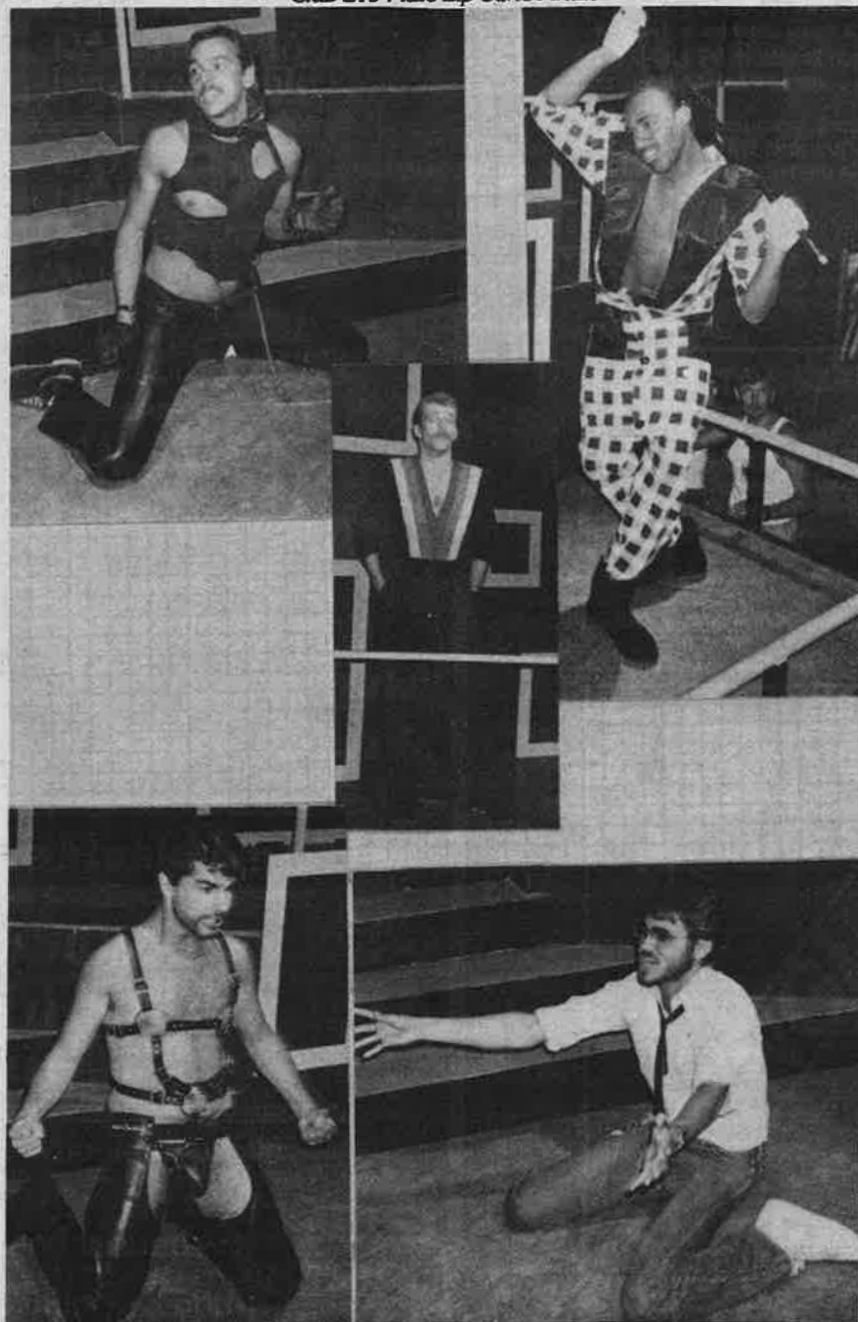
Boston — Can pornography be productive? Some of the best gay writers in the U.S. think so. They've joined together to combat AIDS by writing stories that eroticize what is coming to be known in the gay community as 'safe sex.'

The stories are being collected by writer John Preston for an anthology entitled *Hot Living: Erotic Stories about Safer Sex*, to be issued this summer by Alyson Publications. Each of the sixteen stories portrays only those sexual acts that researchers believe involve little or no risk of transmitting AIDS. Royalties from the book will be donated to Gay Men's Health Crisis, Inc., an AIDS educational and counseling group based in New York.

'Like the musicians of Band-Aid, or USA for Africa, these artists are using their craft to combat a crisis; our crisis,' says Preston. 'We feel that we are making a vital contribution both through the funds we raise, and the sexual role models that we present.'

The contributors include such prominent gay writers as Samuel M. Steward, Toby Johnson, George Whitmore, and Eric Rofes.

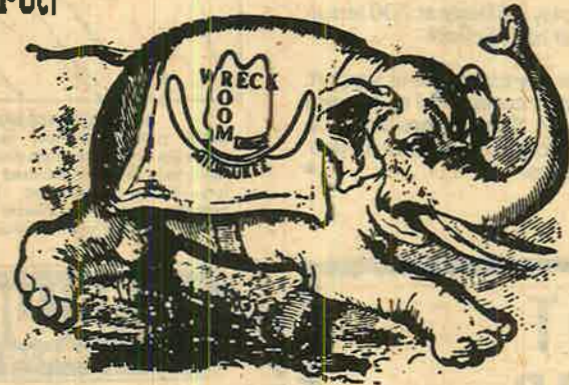

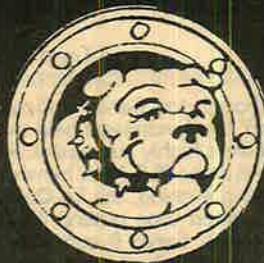
