

Accuracy Of HTLV-III Tests Challenged Again

According to Scientific American, Myron Essex of the Harvard School of Public Health recently analyzed 107,000 blood samples that had been screened with the widely used ELISA test for HTLV-III antibodies, the agent believed to cause AIDS. On the first run, 719 samples registered positive meaning that they carried antibodies to the AIDS virus. When the test was repeated twice more, only 218 specimens were found to be positive by all three tests. Western blotting (a "back-up" testing method) yielded only 35 positives out of the 218.

Essex concludes that the tests are simply not accurate and that the "99.8 percent accurate" rating attributed to the tests by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration is in error. The doctors propose that a new blood test which detects the viral particles themselves (on the order of the hepatitis-B test) is needed. Until then, the experts say many false negatives may still be donating to U.S. blood banks.

The scientists attribute the presistent inaccuracy of the tests to the fact that the tests are done "with a crude fraction of the virus" and it is conceivable that the most antigenic parts of the virus were not incorporated. It is also possible that some of the persons tested are "in transition," the scientists say. This posits that they have been infected but have not started producing antibodies yet.

State's AIDS Death Toll Rises By 11 In 4th Quarter

Eleven more people died of AIDS in Wisconsin during the last three months of 1985, the state division of Health has reported.

Holly Dowling, a division spokeswoman, said the total number of confirmed cases of acquired immune deficiency syndrome increased from 51 at the end of September to 62 at the end of 1985.

The total number of deaths rose from 30 to 41 during the same period, she said.

At the end of 1984, 26 confirmed cases of the disease had been reported to the state and 17 of those people had died.

Dowling said AIDS in Wisconsin has afflicted people aged 22 to 61.

She aid the state's 1985 figures closely followed national trends.

"The age group and rate of the disease seemed to be the same as the national" indicators, Dowling said.

As of Dec. 23, the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta had reported 15,775 confirmed cases of the disease nationwide. It said 7,986 of those people had died.

Thirty-eight of the 62 confirmed cases in Wisconsin involved state residents, Dowling said, and 22 of those 38 residents have died.

The remaining 24 confirmed cases involved out-of-state residents and have resulted in 19 deaths, she said.

Residents are classified as individuals who developed symptoms of the disease before moving into the state.

Antibody-Test Fee Rejected In Green Bay

Green Bay (Press Gazette) — With just a small amount of discussion January 7th, the Brown County Protection Committee unanimously rejected a proposal that a fee be assessed to out-of-county residents screened at a Green Bay clinic for exposure to the AIDS virus.

The proposal had been referred to the committee by the Green Bay Protection and Welfare Committee.

A clinic for AIDS screening was established in Green Bay three months ago through the joint efforts of Center Project Inc., and the Brown County and Green Bay health departments.

Although they weren't called upon to speak — because the committee acted to swiftly — Green Bay Health Commissioner Peter LeMere, Brown County Community Nursing Director Judy Pinkstaff and Michael Belinski from Center Project, Inc. were prepared Tuesday night to express

"Pretty petty," was the summation from chairman James Demeny.

Demeny said he was in complete agreement with eight points of opposition offered to the committee in a memorandum from Pinkstaff:

- Local government contributions to the program are small compared to those already offered by private sources and the state government.
- Other clinics offered by Brown County health officials that are directed toward communicable diseases are available regardless of residence. AIDS should be treated the same as other communicable diseases.
- The procedure of asking for a participant's residence challenges the confidential reputation of the clinic, and encourages misrepresentation to avoid a fee.

Since the local clinic opened, about 150 people have been screened for the presence of antibodies that indicate exposure to the AIDS virus, Pinkstaff said. Approximately 10 percent of those who were screened tested positive for exposure to the virus.

Pinkstaff said 30 percent of the people tested were from other counties.

15 Years In Prison For Gay Bashing Murder

San Francisco (GNIC) — Three men accused of attacking people they believed to be gay have been sentenced to prison for the death of a gay activist.

Timothy White 23, and David Rogers and Donnie Clanton, both 21, each were sent-enced Thursday to 15 years to life in prison on a murder conviction in the death of John Dennis O'Connell, who hit his head on a curb after being struck by two of them.

Superior Court Judge Edward Stern also ordered concurrent sentences of seven years on assault charges.

The three men and Doug Barr, 21, pleaded guilty to assault charges in three other attacks the same night.

Barr, who was acquitted of murder by the same jury that convicted his three friends, also was sentenced to seven years.

Barr will be eligible for parole after five years; the other three after nine years.

O'Connell, 40, died of a concussion 10 days after the July 1984 assault. Testimony indicated O'Connell fell to the curb after he was struck on the head by White and Rogers.

Assistant District Attorney William Fazio said the incident occurred after the four drove 40 miles to San Francisco from their homes in Vallejo.

"I don't think they intended to kill John O'Connell, but they really didn't care what happened to him," he said. "What they did intend to do was to come to San Francisco and injure people who they thought were gay."

Christopher Isherwood Dead At 81

Santa Monica (GNIC) — Christopher Isherwood, whose tales of pre-World War II Berlin were the basis of the Academy Award-winning film "Cabaret," has died at 81 of cancer.

"He holds the key to the English novel in his hands," W. Somerset Maugham once said of Isherwood, and Virginia Woolf called him "the great hope of English letters."

No services were planned because "he didn't want any," Bachardy said.

Isherwood, once a medical student at the University of London, willed his body to the UCLA Medical Center for research, Bachardy said.

Openly gay, Isherwood told People magazine in 1984: "Homosexuality suited me, and I have always felt at home with it. I don't doubt that I have a certain streak of heterosexuality in my nature, but it hasn't been my particular wish to pursue that."

He met W.H. Auden, with whom he coauthored several plays, at St. Edmund's School and spent two years at Cambridge before being expelled in 1925 for writing scurrilous verse answers in his exams.

By the age of 24, he had published "All the Conspirators," the first of his 25 books.

He visited Auden in Berlin in 1929, where Continued on page 6 they took part in the city's avant garde nightlife and watched the rise of Nazism. He taught English in Berlin from 1930-33.

The experience led to his 1935 collection, "The Berlin Stories," a semi-autobiographical work. The stories became the basis for the 1952 John Van Druten play, "I Am a Camera," and later the musical "Cabaret," which won the 1966-67 New York Drama Critics Circle Award. A 1972 film version with Liza Minelli and Michael York won eight Oscars.

"He made you see how lovely it could be to be 80," said longtime friend, Armistead Maupin, a San Francisco journalist and author of "Baby Cakes" and "Tales of the City". "He was always enormously accessible to writers. His house was a kind of salon for young writers and artists.

The Sisterhood Of Steel

New York (GNIC) — The Marvel Comics series "The Sisterhood of Steel," set on an island with a female-only political and military power base, has been introducing lesbian characters over the past year.

The Works reports that the nongay leading character, Boronwe, and her friend Dindra went to a series of bars, one a gay bar patronized by the Sisterhood, in a recent installment.

Although the lesbian characters have all been minor so far, the attitude has been favorable and natural.

In the first issue, some of the characters discuss the relationship between Boronwe and Kalki, her former roommate who is now fleeing the Sisterhood with her male lover. One of the commanders asks bluntly, "Are they lovers?"

Old Guard Expels Four

Washington, D.C. (GNIC) — The Old Guard, an elite ceremonial unit which performs at the White House and Arlington National Cemetary, has expelled four members for being gay, Philadelphia Gay News reports.

The expulsions followed a four-month investigation of the unit after a member complained of an incident involving a gay serviceman.

Pvt. Todd Casper, one of the four men removed from the unit, said that he has seen members of the Old Guard at gay bars, and estimates that the percentage of gay men in the unit is about the same as in the general population.

Casper said, "Gays in the Army are doing themselves a disservice. Gays are treated like a piece of dirt. They don't want us here."

An Army spokesperson agreed that gay men are not welcome, saying that homosexuality "impairs accomplishment of the military mission," and that military service and homosexuality are "just incompatible, period."

Lesbian/Gay News Bureau Publishes First Report

Speak Its Name, Wisconsin's Investigative News Service, announces the publication of its first reports.

Speak Its Name (S.I.N.) is a not-for-profit news bureau that investigates issues of concern to lesbians and gay men in Wisconsin. Subjects for investigation include — but are not limited to — alternative families' rights and the disease AIDS.

S.I.N. publishes journalistic reports on subjects that major media sources may not be able to extensively cover due to inaccessibility to the lesbian/gay community.

S.I.N. provides information from accurate sources on controversial issues. According to investigative reporter Sue Burke, "Speak Its Name will fill a void in news coverage in Wisconsin. For instance, in terms of the present AIDS crisis, hard facts are exactly what's needed to take a rational look at this disease. We not only need to curtail the spread of the disease, but also we need to watch for the accompanying affects of AIDS hysteria."



Gay Chorus Sues For Right To Use Name

San Jose (GNIC) — The Gay Men's Chorus of Los Angeles on Tuesday asked a judge for a preliminary injunction so that the group can perform at a February convention in San Jose using its full name.

The choral group was told in September that it cannot perform at the Western Division Convention of the American Choral Directors Association unless it omitted the word "gay" from its name. The chorus won the chance to compete at the convention against several other choruses.

Jerry Carlson, the Gay Men's Chorus director, has said the group will not change its name. Instead, the group wants the choral directors association to change its policy requiring groups to avoid names that relate to politics and sexual or religious preferences.

A hearing on the preliminary injunction is set for Jan. 17 in Santa Clara County Superior Court. The three-day Western Division Convention opens Feb. 13.

According to the complaint, the Gay Men's Chorus claims it's a victim of discrimination. The group also claimed its chances for financial success will be damaged if it is not allowed to sing at the convention.

Bar Adopts "Dress" Code

Dallas (GNIC) — The Round-Up, a gay bar here, has adopted a door policy which requires that women wear dresses in order to gain admittance, prompting protests from the gay and lesbian community.

Kathy Jack, owner of another gay bar, said of the policy "Unless we do something, it will be like it was ten years ago when (lesbians and gay men) were totally separate, and that would be a big mistake," the Washington Blade reports.

Two women who have been customers of the Round-Up gathered 650 names of gay men and lesbians on a petition protesting the policy, and members of the gay community charge that the policy is an attempt to keep women out of the bar.

The owners of the Round-Up would say only that the policy had been reviewed by an attorney, and that it is legal.

It's good to be back from our vacation. I don't know about you, but I really did miss IN STEP; I guess absence really does make the heart grow fonder. I hope all of you had a great Holiday season, and that your 1986 is filled with much happiness, success and victories.

As far as victories go, some of the teams on the Friday and Monday Mixed Handicap Leagues go, will be getting some belated Christmas gifts. Presently these leagues have a rule stating that in no case can a bowler use an average of less than 120 for the purpose of handicap, (i.e. A bowler has a 90 average, his normal handicap would be 75% of the difference between his average and 200, which equals 82 pins; under the present rule the maximum handicap a bowler would receive is 60 pins. The Monday night league uses 180 as their basis for handicap, which means 45 pins would be the maximum handicap, and a 90 average bowler should be entitled to 67 pins, not the current 45 maximum.) The rule was challenged by a team on the Friday night league, and after checking with W.I.B.C. (Women's International Bowling Congress) it was found that the rule was in direct violation of their rule 102, Sect. 2, which states: "Handicap shall be figured on the actual average of each bowler and shall not be limited." The A.B.C. (American Bowling Congress) which governs the men's division, sets no restrictions. But, since our leagues are mixed, we must use whichever is the most stringent rules between the two organizations. This means that the Secretary's of each of those leagues must go back and recalculate the handicaps for each of the meets and base wins and losses on the new calculations. Virtually every team in the league will have it's win/loss record affected. Although this finding may hurt some of the teams currently at the top; the leagues should benefit: as it encourages new bowlers to join leagues by allowing them the opportunity to compete on a fairer basis with middle and high average bowlers.

Congratulations to Rick Englehart who has been away from the Gay leagues far too long. Rick returned to Gay bowling for the first time in two years on January 19th. On his first night back, Rick bowled a fabulous 279 game (sounds like one of my series). Rick is one of the founding members of the

Gay leagues here in Milwaukee, and has represented Milwaukee in many tournaments around the country. He has consistently maintained one of the highest averages in any of our leagues. It's great to have you back Rick! That fantastic game was still a bit of a dissappointment to him though, since he was not aware of the 7 Strike Jackpot started by Landmark Lanes about a year ago, and had not paid the \$1 fee to enter it. Had Rick known about it and entered he would have won well over \$300 for his eight strikes in a row. Knowing Rick though, he's probably just waiting until it builds up a little more.

Here's something to mark on your calendar; Madison will be holding it's first Gay bowling tournament ever on Saturday, April 19th. The tournament will be a 9 Pin-No Tap Tournament, and will also be a fund raiser for AIDS. Tentative plans include a buffet at Cheri's Back East after the bowling competition, and a party not to be missed at Rod's after that. Sounds like a fun-packed day, and a chance to help a very worthwhile cause. More details in future issues.

Last, but certainly not least, a committee is being formed to organize a bowling team to send to San Francisco for Gay Games II. August 9 - 17, 1986. Wisconsin was not represented at all in Gay Games I. All of the bowling competition is scratch, and athletes compete in an Olympic type format for Gold, Silver, and Bronze medals. There are no cash prizes. The organizing committee being formed will conduct a qualifying tournament for any bowlers wishing to be a part of the team repesenting Wisconsin. The organizing committee will also assist in fund raising efforts; selection of uniforms, and a banner for the opening ceremonies 'March of the Athletes.' It is the goal of this committee to see that Wisconsin is well represented not only in the execution of the sport; but that the members of the team will exemplify the high standards of Sportsmanship and Comraderie that exist here. The committee also hopes to raise sufficient funds to defrav the major portion of the costs of the athletes repesenting us. FIBER R/EVOLUTION

February 7 - March 30 Journal/Lubar Galleries — February and March will be "fiber" months in Milwaukee with a major exhibition called "Fiber R/Evolution" on view at the Milwaukee Art Museum and at the University Art Museum, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, as well as 25 satellite exhibitions taking place simultaneously throughout the city.

"Fiber R/Evolution" will be on view February 7 through March 30. The exhibition will be shown in two parts. 

Milwaukee Poet Antler Awarded Whitman Prize

The Walt Whitman Association of Camden, New Jersey has announced that Milwaukee poet Antler has been awarded its 1985 Walt Whitman Prize, which is awarded annually "to the author whose contribution best reveals the continuing presence of Walt Whitman in American poetry."

The Whitman Association publishes an annual journal, *The Mickle Street Review*, named after the street in Camden where Whitman last lived. The Association maintains Whitman's house as a national historic site.

In the just-released 1985 issue of Mickle Street Review, editor Jean Pearson writes: "We are happy to announce the award of this year's prize to Antler, whose poems of wilderness and freedom, as well as of factories, embody in a contemporary idiom Whitman's cosmic, egalitarian vision of humanity and nature. Beware: Discrimination Is Taking Place!

Regardless of attempts being made to keep the insurance industry honest, these efforts are leading to more and more headaches for gay men.

Some insurance companies are beginning to feel the pinch of major health and disability claims because of AIDS. To protect themselves, while still staying in the confines of the law, it appears that underwriters (those who decide are at risk and how much risk) are using some peculiar guidelines. Specifically, if you are a male, unmarried, between the ages of 18-50 — you belong in what I will call the "red flag" group.

Sirens and signals go off at the same time
— whistles blow and everybody reviews
your files very, very carefully, looking for any
signs of "any indiscretion". Simply, if you
have had any venereal disease in the past 5

years or you have had any problem with alcohol, you will more than likely NOT be written.

What does this mean? At a time when gay men need more disability and life coverage, unless their record is very clean, they will not be able to get the coverage.

Health claims have been averaging over \$150,000 as it relates to AIDS, Disability and Death claims are mounting. Lovers are being left broke and all efforts to build a dream that was already interrupted by AIDS, is now being wiped out for the remaining lover because of uninsurability.

Another part of the problem comes from a lack of any genuine AIDS test. Some companies are writing into policies that if the person is identified with AIDS within a 2-5 year period, the policy is null and void.

To come down with a serious illness and not be able to work is a very horrible reality when there is no significant income and social security is honoring only 20% of all its

to 30 people each day in Wisconsin become positive to the antibody test-meaning that they expose themselves to the virus through their behavior.

In Milwaukee, Doug Johnson, who coordinates the testing at the Brady East STD Clinic, said he has changed his mind about the usefulness of the test. He said initially he had been concerned that people would be taking the test for inappropriate reasons, and had thought that the money could be better spent for other educational efforts.

"The biggest piece of information that changed my mind," Johnson said, "is that people who are HTLV-III antibody are potentially-and I underline the word potentially-more infectious than a person with AIDS."

But Johnson added, "I think what would be much more beneficial would be a test for the antigen (virus) itself." If a person knew if he or she actually had the virus, it would be more useful to the person, he said.

The HTLV-III antibody test only shows that a person has been exposed to the virus and has created antibodies to the virus.

disability claims. Disability insurance coverage is especially important for lesbian and gay people. I urge you to contact a gay insurance person or gay financial planner immediately. Only s/he will work hard for you to get what you deserve.

Since there is small possibility of an AIDS cure in the near future, we must act responsibly for ourselves.



New York — The National Organization for Women (NOW) Media Reform Task Force has successfully blocked the marketing of "Rape," a proposed new perfume. According to off our backs, a company here had filed papers to register "Rape" as the name of a perfume already test-marketed in a few loca ions.

The company's vice president admitted that the papers were withdrawn due to public pressure.

Results Of HTLV-III Antibody Testing Revealed

Madison (Speak Its Name) — Although 14 percent of the 632 people tested in Wisconsin for the antibody to HTLV-III showed positive results, Holly Dowling of the state Division of Health said the results do not mean that 14 percent of the gay men in Wisconsin have been exposed to the virus believed to cause AIDS.

"I don't think the number was large enough" to support that kind of conclusion, she said. She said the results of the testing could not be used as a "tool" until more people have taken the test and trends might be identified.

She explained that the 632 people who had come to the state's 30 sites for free, anonymous testing may not represent a cross-section of any of the groups at high risk for AIDS.

The sites opened in June. Although only 34 people look the test in June, 354 took the test in October, according to state figures, and some of the sites are now booked for weeks in advance.

The sites were established in June by the Division of Health with a federal grant as part of a national program to discourage people from donating blood as a way to get

the antibody test. The original six-monthgrant for the program was extended in October for another six months, according to Dowling.

Of those taking the test through Oct. 31, 66 percent were homosexual or bisexual men, according to responses on confidential questionnaires filled out at the test sites. Two percent were intravenous drug users, 3 percent recipients of blood transfusions, 17 percent heterosexuals who had contact with someone in a high risk group, and 12 percent indicated no risk.

Of the 632 who took the test, 83 percent were male, 81 percent were between 20 and 39 years old, and 64 percent were residents; of Dane or Milwaukee Counties.

Three of the state's busiest sites are the ones run by the Blue Bus Clinic in Madison, the Brady East Sexually Transmitted Disease Clinic in Milwaukee, and the Center Project in Green Bay. The Green Bay site opened on Sept. 30.

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Ousted Gay Teacher Given New Teaching Post

Houston (GNIC) — A gay high school teacher who was transferred to a non-teaching position after he appeared in a Houston magazine with an article on AIDS was given another classroom assignment, officials said.

Patrick di Battista, a former English teacher at Kashmere High School, was given a new assignment Wednesday after his attorney met with Houston Independent School District officials. School officials, however, declined to give details about the new teaching position.

"It is what we hope is an appropriate teaching assignment for him, and he has accepted it," said HISD spokesperson Rosalind Young.

The 25-year-old teacher was transferred to a HISD research department in October.

The transfer came after local television consumer advocate Marvin Zindler criticized a photograph in *Houston City* magazine accompanying an article on AIDS.

Di Battista said he posed for the photograph to help send a mesage to and about Houston's gay community.

"I felt it would be a positive explanation about what's going on in the gay community," he said. "In addition, it would be a message to gay men: 'Promiscuity is out, romance is in.""
