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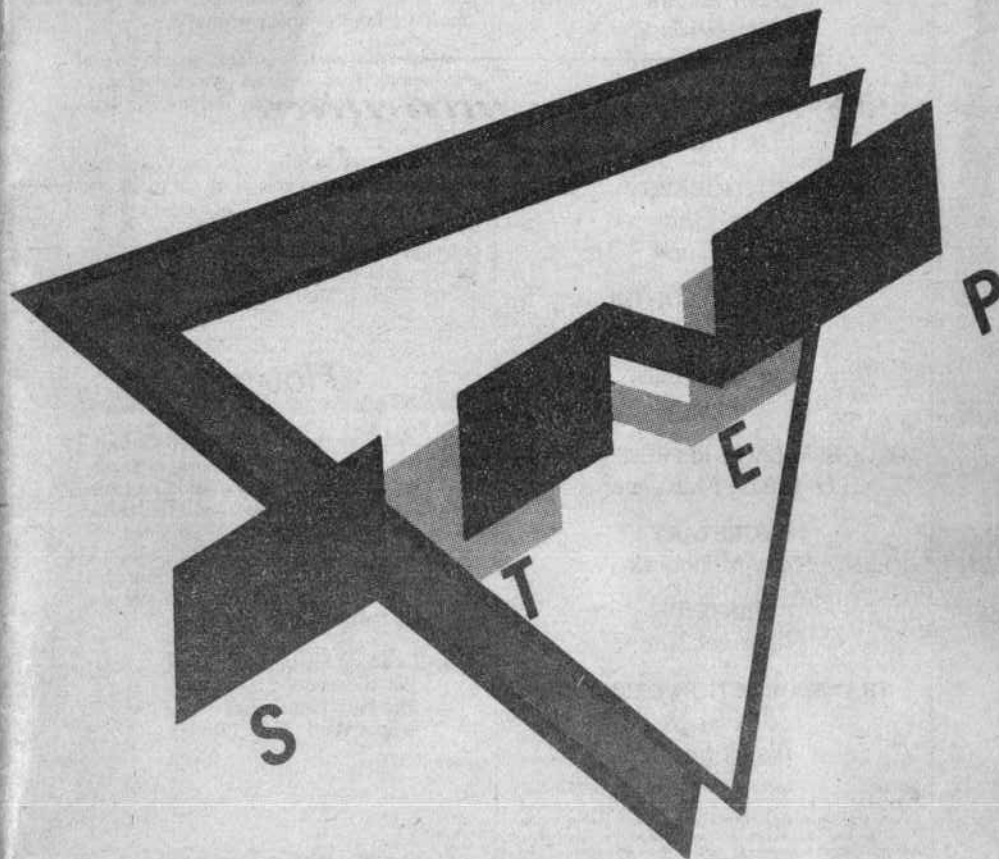

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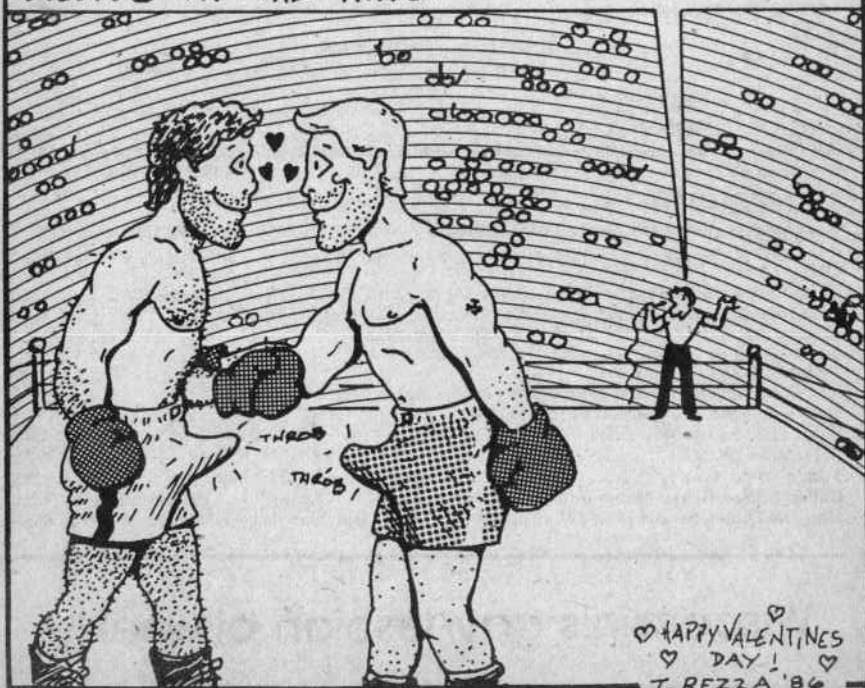

Ben-Shalom Wins Reinstatement

At presstime, former InStep columnist Miriam Ben-Shalom won a 10 year fight against the U.S. Army when Federal Judge Terrence T. Evans ordered her reinstatement by March 1st, 1986.

Ben-Shalom, 35, was discharged from the 84th Army Reserve Division, 4828 W. Silver Spring Drive, Milwaukee, 10 years ago after the Army found out she was gay. At the time, Miriam held the rank of sergeant.

Ben-Shalom said Federal Judge Evans ruled it was illegal for the military to discharge her on the basis of her sexual preference and ordered her reinstatement in a previous decision. The Army had still not reinstated her, and on Jan. 29th, he ruled that the military must reinstate her by March 1st, or be held in contempt of court. The Army has a month to appeal Evans decision.

Vice Squad May Test For AIDS

Milwaukee (Journal) — Jan. 15. The head of the Police Department's Vice Squad said that he would investigate the possibility of giving tests for AIDS and venereal diseases to people arrested for prostitution and sexual perversion.

Capt. Thomas A. Perlewitz said he would speak with Police Chief Robert Ziarnik and officials in the city attorney's office about the legalities and possibilities of AIDS testing.

His statement came after Vice Squad detectives arrested eight people overnight Tuesday on charges of prostitution and sexual perversion.

Last year in Milwaukee, Vice Squad officers arrested 1,433 women on prostitution charges and made an additional 36 arrests on charges of sexual perversion.

"We used to have every prostitute sent to our medical bureau to examine them for venereal disease," Perlewitz said.

That practice was ended several years ago, he said.

"I'm going to look into it to see where we stand legally about taking blood samples or having someone from the Health Department check for venereal diseases."

He said he was concerned about the safety of officers who have to pick up people with high risk of getting AIDS and of prisoners who might have to live in close quarters with AIDS carriers.

Task Force Opposes AIDS Tests

Madison (Milw. Journal) A state task force went on record Jan. 16 as opposing mandatory testing of Wisconsin prison inmates for the virus that causes AIDS, despite a warning that some inmates will die from getting the disease in prison.

"Despite the best efforts of the prison system, there are a finite number of people who will die," Norman Fost, of the University of Wisconsin Medical School, said after the vote.

Fost was the only member of the Public Health Task Force on AIDS to support mandatory testing of prison inmates for evidence of antibodies to the HTLV-III virus, considered a cause of AIDS.

The task force, appointed by Linda Reivitz, health and social services secretary, recommended that inmates exposed to the AIDS virus always be housed in single cells but otherwise be treated no differently from other inmates in their access to recreation, work, showers or visitation.

The exception would be when an infected inmate "poses a significant risk of transmitting HTLV-III to other inmates and staff," the recommendation said.

Corrections Division Administrator Walter Dickey said knowledge that a prisoner had been exposed to the virus would make a difference in the handling of the inmate, and he argued that prison administrators, not just health officials, should have access to test results.

But he argued against mandatory testing.

Gay Games Can't Be Called "Olympics"

San Francisco (GNIC) — For the second time, a federal appeals court Monday upheld the U.S. Olympic Committee's right to stop sponsors of an international athletic competition for gay men and lesbians from calling it the Gay Olympics.

A 1978 federal law gives the USOC the sole right to the commercial use of the word "olympics" to promote a product or athletic event, the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said.

The three-judge panel rejected arguments by San Francisco Arts & Athletics, sponsor of the event, that the USOC should have to prove that the name confused the public; that the USOC discriminated by allowing non-gay groups to use the word "olympics"; and that freedom of speech was violated.

The court reversed a \$96,000 award of attorney's fees to the USOC and returned the case to a federal judge to decide whether San Francisco Arts & Athletics' position was reasonable.

The USOC and its parent International Olympic Committee sued successfully in 1982 to prevent the San Francisco group from calling its competition the Gay Olympics. The event took place later that year as Gay Games; another competition is scheduled this year.

After the appeals court upheld a preliminary injunction against San Francisco Arts & Athletics, U.S. District Judge John Vukasin issued a permanent injunction and awarded attorney's fees to the USOC, finding a willful infringement of the Olympic Committee's trademark.

The 1978 federal law allows the USOC to sue for unauthorized commercial or athletic use of the words "olympic" or "olympiad," or "combination or simulation thereof tending to cause confusion ... or to falsely suggest a connection" with USOC or the Olympic Games.

The San Francisco group argued that there was no evidence its use of "olympics" confused the public into thinking its competition was connected with the USOC or the Olympic Games.

But the appeals court said the history of the federal law showed that no proof of confusion was required.

The opinion by Judge Alfred Goodwin also rejected arguments that the USOC unconstitutionally discriminated against lesbians and gay men by letting other athletic competitions advertise themselves as "olympics."

Lesbian Sues Lover For Child Support, Maintenance

Vancouver, B.C. (GNIC) — A 43-year-old British Columbia woman testified in a Supreme Court hearing that she worked long hours at the office to support her lesbian lover, but got only black eyes and broken ribs in return.

"She (Penny Anderson) told me if I kicked her out she would make sure my clients knew I was gay, which would destroy my business," Arlene Luoma said.

Ms. Anderson, 36, is suing Ms. Luoma for maintenance and child support for two daughters conceived through artificial insemination during their 10-year relationship.

She is also seeking a share in Ms. Luoma's Vancouver home, an apartment in Richmond and her vacation property north of Vancouver.

Ms. Anderson testified that she assumed the role of a traditional housewife while Ms. Luoma worked and paid the bills.

Ms. Luoma testified that she was never more than a friend to the contested children, Erin, 5, and Anna, 3.

"I never considered us a family unit," she said. "We did a lot of arguing about how she was going to support herself. I gave her three options: Get UIC, get a job or get out."

"After the birth of Anna she was hysterical, violent. She used to push me around, slap my face and spit at me."

Ms. Luoma said the two women were faithful to each other for eight years until she had an affair with her secretary in 1983, but said her relationship with Ms. Anderson had already deteriorated.

"I have a scar over my eye, a scar on my cheek when she heaved me out of bed," Ms. Luoma testified. "I never hit her back but I pulled her hair to control her. Once she pushed me down the stairs. She would just go off the deep end."

Washington Governor Issue Order Protecting Gays

(GayLife) Governor Booth Gardner of Washington has become the third governor in the country to sign an executive order protecting gays and lesbians from discrimination in state employment.

Gardner fulfilled a year old campaign promise on December 24 by signing the measure that bans discrimination in employment in state agencies and institutes of higher education. The order was signed after the governor met with a group of Washington gay activists. The Dorian Group, a Seattle based political organization, has been lobbying for the measure all year.

"The effort was an example of coordinated community work with representatives of the Lesbian and Gay Democrats of Greater Seattle, the Greater Seattle Business Association and the Dorian Group meeting together with the governor to request the order," said Dorian Group President Holm.

Gardner, in a statement released to the press, said "We only intend to discriminate against one group: those who are not competent to do the job. If a worker can do the job in a professional manner, state government has no right to intrude on his or her private life."

Gardner has received some negative feedback, however, from fundamentalist Christians in the state. "The governor and other gay-rights supporters want to take sodomites cuddle them like teddy bears and give them preferential treatment. This kind of thing jeopardized the physical and spiritual health of Washington residents by endorsing a dirty, decadent lifestyle," said Ken Steely of the Bill of Rights Legal Foundation, the political voice of Washington's evangelical churches.

God'll Get You For That

San Francisco (GNIC) — AIDS workers have challenged a Baptist leader's statements that the disease means God is against homosexuality, saying it is strictly a health issue that has nothing to do with morals.

"What's frightening is that people who say AIDS is God's wrath are using it to condone

hate and to keep gay men at a distance. ... AIDS has nothing to do with sexuality, politics or morality; AIDS has everything to do with biology. There's a nasty bug around," Jack Pantaleo, co-director of the AIDS Interfaith Network, said Friday.

The Rev. Charles Stanley, president of the 14.3 million-member Southern Baptist Convention, the nation's largest Protestant denomination, was reported by the San Francisco Examiner on Friday as saying that AIDS "is God indicating his displeasure and his attitude toward that form of lifestyle, which we in this country are about to accept."

"That type of remark is reflective of a lack of information or misinformation as far as what AIDS is and isn't," said Holly Smith, spokeswoman for the San Francisco AIDS Foundation.

"It's a virus ... it's a health issue. It is not a moral issue," she said.

Stanley, 52, a television evangelist and pastor of Atlanta's First Baptist Church, was in San Jose this week to attend a state evangelism meeting.

In an interview with the Examiner, he said homosexuality was "a sinful lifestyle, according to Scripture."

Implying that God is taking direct action against homosexuals, Stanley said it was "interesting" that AIDS has emerged as homosexuality "has become an acceptable lifestyle in the minds of many people. Why not AIDS 50 years ago, 100 years ago? Our acceptance of it (homosexuality) and our attitudes toward it are related."

In a reference to actor Rock Hudson, who died of AIDS last year, Stanley said, "It's almost as if he's become more heroic dying of AIDS with all the publicity he's gotten. It's like there was nothing bad about it."

To Brew Or Not To Brew?

Madison (GNIC) — The Jos. Huber Brewing Co. of Monroe is asking for a U.S. District Court ruling that it never had a contract with a California firm to produce "the nation's first gay beer."

The suit was filed following claims by Wilde's Beer Co. of Sacramento, Calif., that the Huber firm, fearing bad publicity, reneged on a verbal commitment to brew

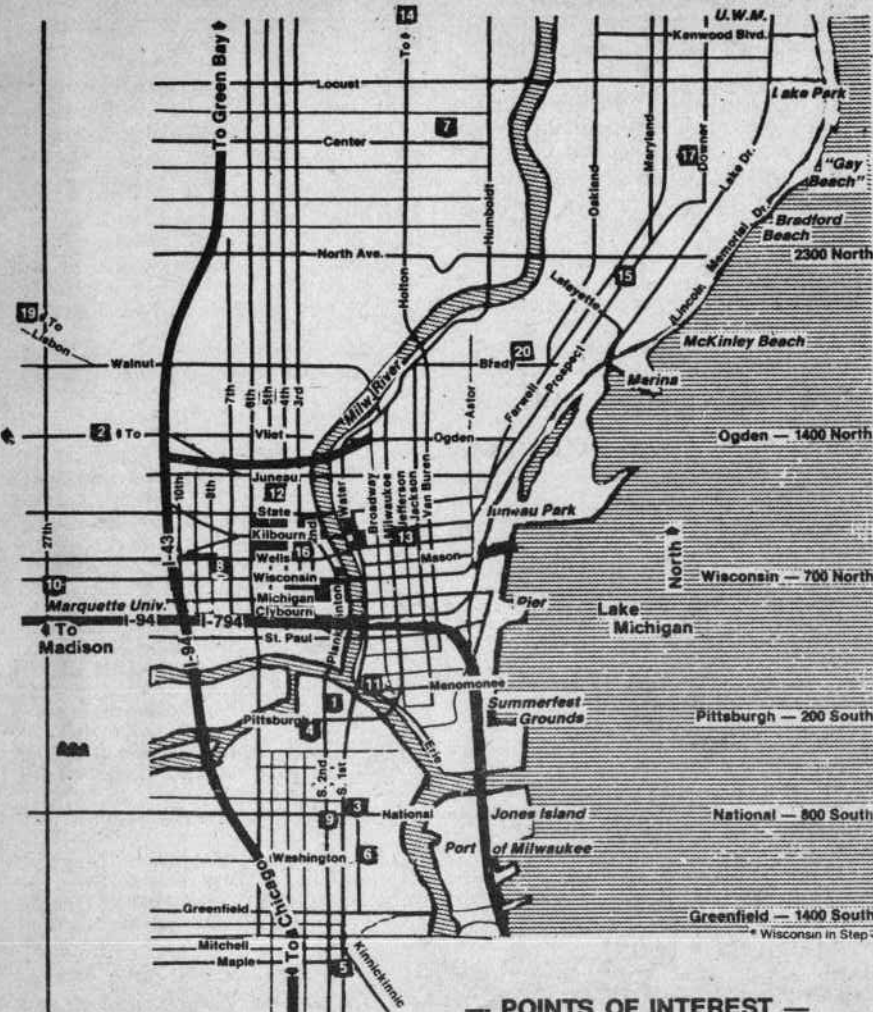

the beer.
John J. Culhane, an attorney for Huber, denied Friday that any contract ever existed.

"It's a shame (that the California firm) is trying to turn a business negotiation into a discrimination charge," he said.

Wilde attorneys have sent letters to Huber asking for \$218,000 in damages for allegedly renegeing on a verbal commitment to brew and bottle Wilde's Beer and Wilde's Light, which would be marketed primarily to gay men and lesbians.

Stephen L. Morgan, a Madison attorney representing Wilde here, has filed a motion seeking to dismiss Huber's suit on the ground that the Wisconsin court did not have jurisdiction since most of the negotiations occurred in California.

Lee Nicholas, an executive of Wilde's, said that the "gay beer" was developed in an effort to capture a part of the beer market.

"You can't sell everything to everybody," he said. "The name of the game is segmentation. You find a piece of the beer market and identify the product as closely as possible to

that segment so that they identify with it."

Nicholas said the beer had been test marketed in San Diego with the Pearl Brewing Co. of San Antonio as the brewer, but Pearl was unable to handle large-scale production of the product.

Navy recruits may have tried suicide

San Diego — Navy officials have denied that three recruits who have received positive AIDS antibody tests tried to take their lives, reports *Philadelphia Gay News*. However, the *San Diego Gazette* quotes a reliable source as saying the recruits "were definitely trying to do away with themselves." A Navy spokesperson said the counseling available to personnel with positive test results is being improved. Further, recruits who test positive on the ELISA test will be allowed to continue training until the results are confirmed by the more reliable Western Blot test.

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Group Notes

Governor's Council to Increase Outreach in '86

Madison (by Jay Jones): In an effort to reach more gay and straight citizens of Wisconsin, members of the Governor's council on Lesbian and Gay Issues last month decided to increase their outreach work to all sectors of the state during 1986.

Meeting January 18, 1986, at the State Capitol, the council approved an aggressive schedule of meetings which will take its members to several previously-unvisited cities. For the first time, community meetings have been scheduled in northwestern Wisconsin, on Saturday, April 26 in Rice Lake and Saturday, August 9 in Superior.

The Council also scheduled eight additional community meetings in Tomah (2/1), Kenosha (2/22), Monroe (4/12), Racine (6/14), Menomonie (6/28), Appleton/Fox Valley (8/23), Platteville (10/11), and Sheboygan (10/25).

Community meetings are held on Satur-

days, usually beginning at 10 a.m. and lasting two to three hours. They allow Council members to meet with local lesbians and gay men, as well as area leaders. Local law enforcement professionals, high school principals and guidance counselors, and public health nurses are among the officials formally invited to attend these meetings. Generally, an informal get-together in a local residence following the morning meeting allows Council members to interact with lesbians and gays who do not feel comfortable attending the public session.

During recent community meetings, much of the conversation has centered on the issue of AIDS and its ramifications on people and agencies in Wisconsin. Therefore, in an effort to keep people better informed, Council member Jean Daute of Eau Claire, Chair of the Council's Health Committee, said that a formal update on AIDS and other gay/lesbian-related health issues will be presented at each community meeting.

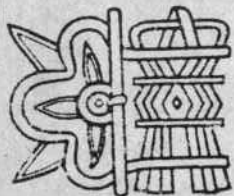

In addition to the community meetings, the council has five remaining business meetings this year. In a further effort to visit as many communities as possible, the Council voted to hold their business sessions in various cities around the state, instead of merely alternating between Madison and Milwaukee as in the past. The next business meeting is scheduled for March 15 in Milwaukee. The March meeting date may change as it conflicts with a national gay and lesbian health conference in Washington, D.C., which at least one of the Council members will attend.

Business meetings generally last all day and allow the fourteen members of the Council to review their past efforts and chart their future course. There is limited opportunity for input from the public, and anyone wishing to address the Council at a business meeting should contact Earl Bricker in Governor Earl's office to be placed on the agenda.

In a further attempt to inform the public of Wisconsin's laws protecting the rights of lesbians and gay men, and in an effort to establish more dialogue, Council members will extend their outreach work this year to several specific groups, including school officials and law enforcement authorities. The task begins on Thursday, February 27, when Council member Jim Thideman of Green Bay and Bricker present a workshop at the spring conference of the Wisconsin Association of School Councilors in Stevens Point. In addition to making the formal presentation, they plan to provide those attending with a list of recommended books on lesbian and gay issues and with a list of council members, who may be contacted as possible resources.

Later in the year, it is hoped that representatives of the Council and the broader lesbian and gay community can interact with law enforcement officers from across the state, perhaps at the state conventions of various police associations. Last year, police officials in Fond du Lac and Baraboo encouraged the Council to begin such efforts. It is hoped that such contacts will increase police awareness of the needs and rights of the lesbian and gay community and heighten their sensitivity.

Through its varied activities in coming months, the Governor's Council on Lesbian and Gay Issues hopes to reach an ever-

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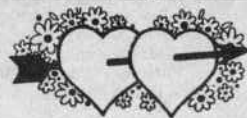

"Zombies From The Beyond" At The Skylight Theatre

"Zombies From The Beyond" presented by Colin Cabot is good fun. It is a satirical, witty, unique look at the 1950's science fiction films. It spoofs them well and has a unique sense of charm about it. Young James Valcq has developed an amusing presentation which certainly is an enjoyment.

The opening slide sequence sets the proper mood and the special effects used throughout are effective and create much of the same feeling.

This play which is a musical reminds me a great deal of "Dames at Sea" which spoofs the Ruby Keeler-Dick Powell movie musicals. In "Zombies" as well, the characters are all cartoons. Yet Valcq has created some who can become real for us and they do. They step beyond the facade and we can

relate to and feel for them. The acting ability of the fine cast contributes greatly and takes this production beyond mere satire or farce.

However, that is not to say that the show is still not in a workshop state. It bogs down in the second act and loses some of the momentum that has been built up to that point. Rewrite and polishing are needed especially in the show's conclusion.

The music overall is good. Just piano accompaniment though, leaves too empty a sound. At least some percussion or a trio of instruments might have been a better choice. The vocals are full and the harmonics created are quite admirable.

Plans are underway for the production to tour to Madison, Minneapolis, and Chicago. Much of the humor—set at the Jones Island Space Center or the George Webb delivery boy may not seem so funny beyond the Milwaukee area. The inclusion of and subsequent destruction of the Allen-Bradley Clock and the Wisconsin Gas Company Building leave me with the same consideration with regard to local color and we much less funny elsewhere.

The acting as mentioned previously fit the piece well. Russell Moore as Rick was good. Scott Freshly has a pleasant singing voice and Suzanne Graff as the man-hungry secretary was delightful in her comic timing. The hit of the evening was Susan Gottschalk as Zombina. Her vocal ability as an extension of her characterization was marvelous. She truly made the second act work.

Blocking or placement of the actors on stage at times became a problem for me because some were in my way. I couldn't see what was happening.

The play is good satire much like the early "Saturday Night Live" or "That Was The Week That Was" for those of you who go back as far as I do. Valcq and company are to be commended for the show. We will expect a great deal from this talented and gifted young man. He has much to offer. •

mentary to explore the implications and origins of this frightening and deadly disease. The hour-long program, hosted by Edward Asner and produced by WNET, received tremendous viewer response and widespread critical acclaim, as well as an Emmy nomination for "Best Background Analysis of a Single Current Story."

Since its initial broadcast, much has been written about this disease, particularly in light of Rock Hudson's recent death from AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome). Many stories have exacerbated fear and superstition, while others have shed new information on the subject. In keeping with the documentary's original three-fold objective: to educate and inform; to demystify the disease and place it in its historical perspective; and to humanize AIDS victims and raise the public consciousness to their plight through personal encounter, WNET is rebroadcasting an updated version of this program, premiering Feb. 22 at 9pm and Feb. 23 at 11pm. The one-hour program will be telecast on Milwaukee's Channel 36.

The documentary profiled the experiences of five patients—Christopher Shihar, a young homosexual from Los Angeles; David McKee, a hemophiliac from rural Kentucky; Kenneth Brown, an intravenous drug user from Chicago; Amar Hamilton, a six year-old born with the disease; and Haitian Gerald Baril. Three of the five—David McKee, Amar Hamilton, and Kenneth Brown—have died since the first telecast.

In the original program, Stella McKee was seen with her husband, David, and their two children, talking about her fear of losing her husband. In this updated version, Mrs. McKee shares with Jim Hartz the ostracism she and her children have encountered from the community. The documentary also features Christopher Shihar in candid reflection about his current condition.

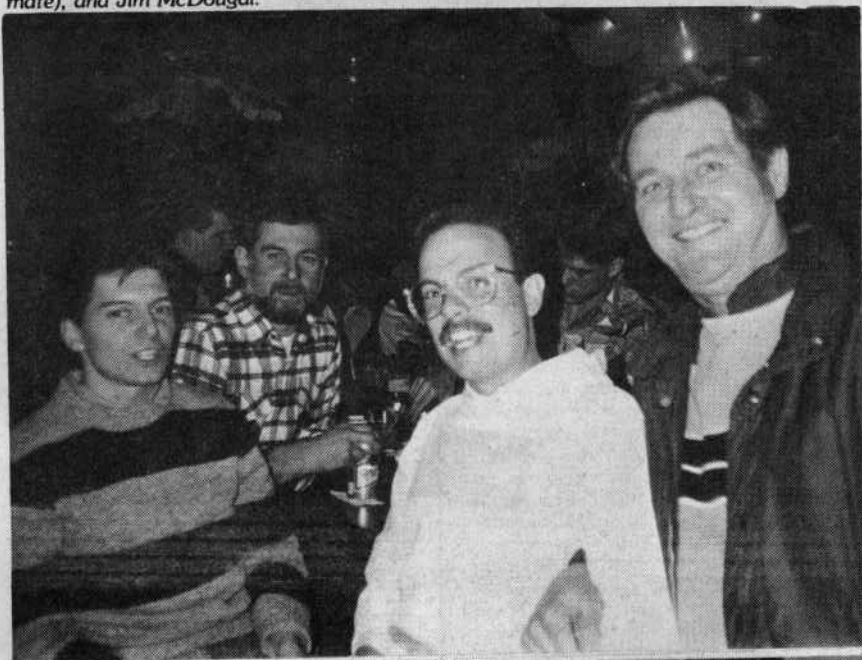

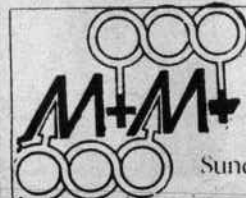

Houston printer Charles Lee, 31, wearing his Klan robes, made his announcement last Monday on the Capitol steps. He claimed no major party affiliation.

"I feel the leadership in both parties has gotten away from the white majority. They worry more about the interest of the minorities than they do whites," said Lee, who identified himself as a Klan "grand dragon."

Lee listed his major concerns as education, illegal aliens and the "large build-up of homosexuals" in Texas. He also claimed Texas public education is "worthless," largely because of integration.

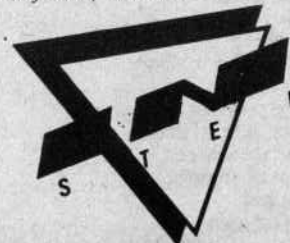
Gov. Mark White issued a statement later saying Lee's announcement was "particularly inappropriate on this special day honoring the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King ... The KKK announcement just confirms my suspicion that my real opponents in this race are going to be ignorance and superstition."

Harvard Removes Stall Doors

Cambridge, MA (GNIC) — In response to complaints about "lewd and lascivious behavior" in the Science Center "tea room," the administration of Harvard has removed the doors from toilet stalls.

The men's room "has been a meeting place for some time," but the administration said that it could do nothing until formal complaints were filed. The requisite complaints came from an undergraduate and a university employee, charging "indecent exposure" and "homosexual activity," *Gay Community News* reports.

Dean of Students Archie C. Epps III said that removal of the stall doors "is a standard solution" to what he considers a problem. "It probably means that people won't use the place anymore," he said.

Banker, said his company has instructed its agents last month to follow the guidelines of full disclosure.

Bolen, who supervises 275 agents, said a Dec. 17 memo issued by his company said knowledge that a homeowner suffered from AIDS was relevant in the sale of property.

"This fact, if known, must be disclosed to potential buyers," said Bolen, reading from the memo.

"The same rule would apply if there was a murder in the house," Bolen said. "If it could materially affect the value of the property, then we are legally required to inform a potential buyer."

Medical studies indicate that the AIDS virus cannot survive outside body fluids or water.

The fact that AIDS cannot be transmitted outside body fluids is irrelevant, according to the Coldwell Banker memo, "because from the point of view of the buyer this fact is clearly material."

Gay rights activists in Los Angeles said the state association's recommendation was discriminatory and would distort the public's attitudes about the disease.

"They are subtly stating something that isn't true. They seem to be stating that you could get the disease by living in the house," said Luis Maura, spokesperson for AIDS Project Los Angeles.

Morris Kight, a member of Los Angeles County's Human Relations Commission, said the association's advice is "an unnecessary witch-hunt against homosexuals. ...

"It's destructive, ill-thought out and against all common sense," Knight said Monday. "No one can ever prove that a building or any part of building can cause AIDS."

Klan Member Enters Race For Governor

Houston (GNIC) — A top Ku Klux Klan member, saying his announcement on the anniversary of civil rights leader Martin Luther King's birthday was coincidental, declared himself a write-in candidate for governor.

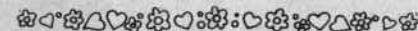

After McCarthy's endorsement, Kennedy said he backs gay rights legislation and disagrees with new state policy which puts gay people last on the list of those considered as foster parents.

Kennedy, son of the U.S. Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., said he considers the issue a matter of enough incentives to increase the number of foster homes in Massachusetts.

"It is not, in my mind, a gay or lesbian issue," he said. "I don't care who those people are. What I care about is that they are loving and caring people."

Will Hutchinson, chairman of the Boston Lesbian and Gay Political Alliance, said he was pleased with Kennedy's views on the foster care issue, but that the alliance may endorse others in the race.

McCarthy is the second unannounced candidate to drop plans to run. State Rep. Joseph K. Mackey, D-Somerville, bowed out last month.

Announced candidates so far include state Sen. George Bachrach, D-Watertown, and state Rep. Thomas J. Valley, D-Boston. Rep. Thomas M. Gallagher, D-Boston, and Melvin King, candidate for mayor of Boston in the last election, are among others who have said informally they plan to run.

Gay activists have made foster parenting an issue since last May when the state took two young boys from a gay Boston couple, Donald Babets and David Jean, and codified rules under which gay people have little chance to get foster children. •

Realtors Want AIDS Disclosure

Los Angeles (GNIC) — A state Realtors group has issued guidelines saying buyers should be told if a former homeowner is an AIDS patient, but a county official says such advice is a "witch-hunt against homosexuals."

"The reality is that agents are being sued and threatened with lawsuits if they do not disclose this," said Stephen Groome, an attorney for the California Association of Realtors.

"That's What Friends Are For" Hits Triple #1

New York (GNIC) — A new hit record that helps fund AIDS research has pulled off a rare triple play, rating No. 1 on Billboard's pop, black and adult contemporary singles charts during January.

"That's What Friends Are For," by Dionne Warwick, Elton John, Gladys Knight and Stevie Wonder, is the first million-selling single of the year. Royalties go to AIDS research.

"We're hoping it will bring in about \$500,000 for education and biomedical research," said Bill Misenhimer, executive director of the American Foundation for AIDS Research.

Recent pop songs that have addressed other causes of world hunger and apartheid include the Grammy-nominated "We Are The World," and the critically acclaimed "Sun City."

"We Are The World," 1985's only platinum-selling single with 3.9 million copies, brought in \$5.6 million for USA for

Africa. It also rose to No. 1 on Billboard's three charts. "Sun City," with sales topping 300,000, gave the first \$50,000 in artists' royalties to the Africa Fund. It peaked at No. 38 on the pop chart and No. 19 on the black chart and didn't make adult contemporary at all.

The Burt Bacharach-Carole Bayer Sager ballad "That's What Friends Are For," doesn't mention AIDS in the song. It was originally sung by Rod Stewart and was on the "Night Shift" sound track.

Kennedy Favors Gay Rights

Cambridge, Mass. (GNIC) — Attorney Vincent P. McCarthy, who drew support from gay rights activists, bailed out of the Democratic race for the 8th District U.S. Congress seat Wednesday and endorsed Joseph P. Kennedy II.

McCarthy, a lawyer at the Boston firm of Hale & Dorr, said he decided against running for the seat of retiring House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. because a poll indicated he would need to raise \$1 million for the race.

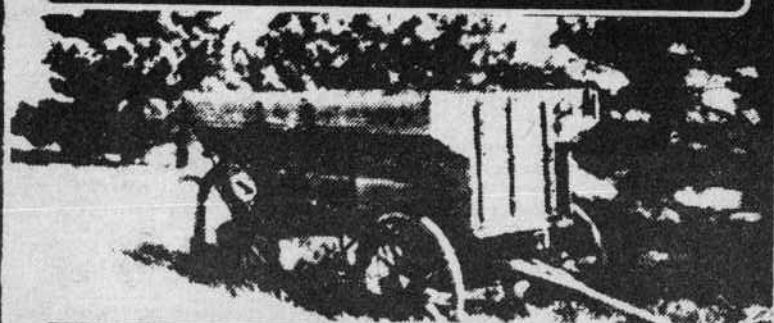

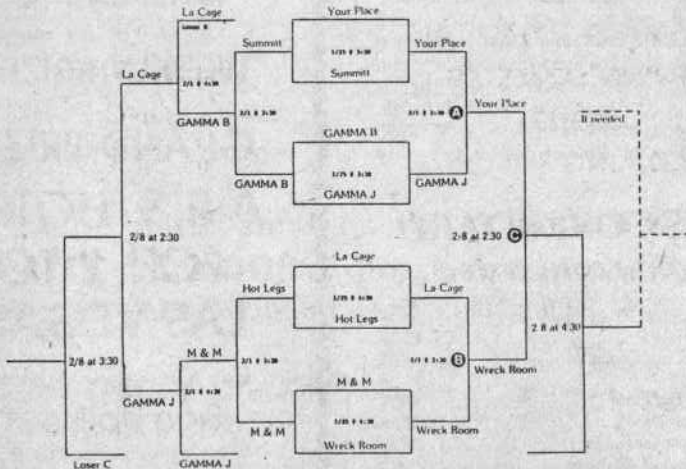

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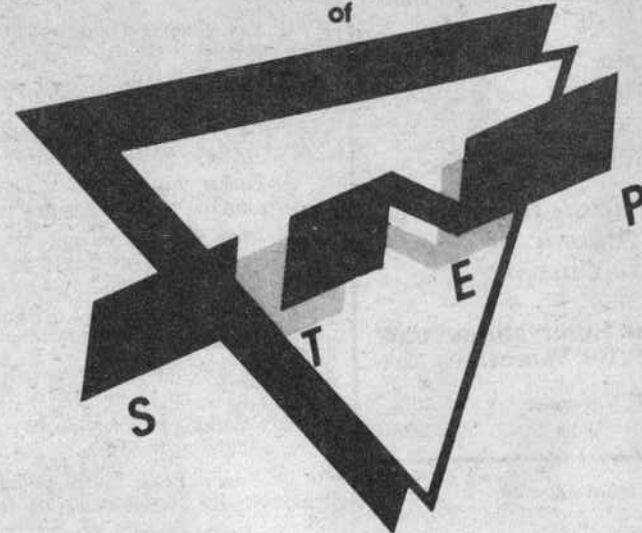
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
