




## Green Bay Lesbians Allege Rights Violation

Green Bay (Press Gazette) —Two Green Bay lesbians filed a discrimination complaint with a state agency Mar. 11th, saying Cerebral Palsy Inc. violated Wisconsin's civil liberties law.

Peggy and Tracey Vandeveer allege CP committed sexual discrimination by not broadcasting their \$10 challenge bid to other area homosexuals during the recent Cerebral Palsy Telethon. According to state statutes, the law says it is discrimination to give preferential treatment on the basis of sexual orientation.

Peggy Vandeveer said she and Tracey reluctantly filed separate complaints with the Equal Rights Division of the state Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations. The filing was confirmed and will be investigated, a DHILR spokesperson in Milwaukee said this morning.

Peggy Vandeveer said the pair do not seek monetary damages from Cerebral Palsy Inc.

"We only want an apology and the right to have a similar challenge pledge broadcast in the future," she said. "There was no doubt in our minds that we had to file this complaint to help stop oppression of homosexuals."

Peggy Vandeveer said she and Tracey are married but that the marriage is extra-legal, which means it is not regulated or sanctioned by law.

Peggy Vandeveer said she called in the pledge during the telethon and asked that her challenge be broadcast. She said she was told challenges were no longer being accepted. But she heard later challenges aired, she said.

Vandeveer said she made several more calls before speaking to Robert Goulet, the celebrity host, and asked that the challenge pledge be aired. He, too, turned her down, Vandeveer said.

She said the complaints were filed reluctantly "because we think Cerebral Palsy is a good cause and because Tracey's mom is receiving benefits" from the organization.

"We don't have anything against Cerebral

Palsy and I hope (the complaints) don't affect CP," she said.

John Pavek, Cerebral Palsy executive director, said today, "I have no commenbecause the fact of filing is brand new to me." He said, "I guess this (the complaint) is to be worked out at some time in the future."

## Green Bay Council Retains AIDS-Clinic Policy

Green Bay (Press Gazette) — The Green Bay City Council made short work of a brief agenda March 18th, including a third vote on staffing the AIDS screening clinic

By a 19.4 vote, the council reaffirmed postions taken in November and February that require employees to accept work assignments set by administrators. The earlier votes were 17-5 and 20-2.

The vote came on a substitute motion by Alderman Patricia McVay and sidetracked Alderman Guy Zima's third unsuccessful attempt to allow city nurses to refuse clinic assignments.

Zima's motion, recommended unanimously by the Protection and Welfare Committee, would have permitted any city employee to refuse to give sex counseling f his or her supervisor was notified in writing.

However, the only committee member to vote with Zima was Roger Vander Leest. He also was supported by Alderman Mike Miller and Anthony Theisen.

Alderman Michael Weber said Zima wastrying to force a "no" vote that could be misconstrued as support for homosexual activities. "It doesn't come to us with any chance of success," he said.

McVay said sexually explicit materials handed to AIDS clinic clients are "not a primer on homosexual activities and I resert that the community has been led to believe t is."

City Nursing Supervisor Ricky Krautkramer told the council staff nurses' roles were educational, not Imited to the screening clinic, and included response to questions any client might have on sexual practices. Continued on page 5 •

But, she said, "We do not give graphic details on how to engage in any type of sex activities."

After the meeting, Zima criticized vehemently the derailing of his effort.

## **Governor Signs Bill Allowing Vending** Sales Of Condoms

Madison, (Milw. Journal) - Gov. Earl signed legislation March 26, that allows the sale of condoms in vending machines.

The bill repeals Wisconsin's ban on the sale of condoms in coin machines. Under the old law, the contraceptives were available only through pharmacies.

"There are a good number of people who wouldn't want to go to a pharmacy counter for a contraceptive who may use a vending machine for the same purpose," Earl said.

The bill (S-285) had started through the Legislature as a relatively routine measure modernizing pharmacy regulation laws. The controversial vending machine provision was added by amendment after a separate bill to legalize the coin-machine sale of condoms had been defeated.

The bill prohibits placing vending machines in schools and bans obscene displays on the machines.

## 42 Charged In Sex Acts At Rest Stop

Lansing, Mich. (Milw, Sentinel) -Fortytwo men, including a Michigan State University administrator, were named 3/18 in felony and misdemeanor warrants charging them with illicit sexual activity at a highway rest stop.

They were charged with gross indecency, a felony carrying a five-year maximum sentence.

The arrests were aided by clandestine videotaping of activity inside the restrooms. Asst. Ingham County Prosecutor Kim Eddie said the tapping, with a search warrant, lasted from Feb. 26 to March 8.

One video camera was posted to observe the foyer of the men's restroom at the US Highway 127 rest stop near Holt, Eddie said. He said others were activated to see inside

the stalls.

"During the 10-day surveillance of the rest area, it was determined by the officers that 95% of the persons using the men's restroom area did so for a sexual purpose," Ingham County Prosecutoer Peter Houk said in a statement.

Eddie said most of the activity occurred between 4 p.m. and 2 a.m. each day, after maintenance workers left the area.

Many of those arrested were processed and fingerprinted at a Lansing armory and were to be arraigned later in Mason District Court.

The operation followed an investigation at the same rest stop last summer. In that operation, which involved the use of undercover officers, 23 people were arrested.

# **Questions & Answers**

Q. Can I become immune to AIDS?

A: Some people use this excuse for continuing the practice of Unsafe Sex: "I was exposed to AIDS a long time ago. Either I'm already going to get it or I'm immune. Why practice Safe Sex now?"

Can a person develop an immunity to AIDS so that Safe Sex isn't necessary? Here's what Dr. Robert Bolan, MD, President of the Board of the AIDS Foundation, has to say about exposure to the AIDS virus:

"We don't know how much of the virus is needed for AIDS to result. We don't know if multiple re-infections are necessary. Any infectious agent must get into the body in sufficient numbers to overcome the body's defenses. This is called a 'virus load'. We don't know if this load can be acquired at one time, or if many exposures are necessary.

"By continuing Unsafe Sex practices, you virtually assure that you will be repeatedly

## exposed. It's a dangerous risk."

Using the past as an excuse to take risks today is a dangerous gamble. There is no medical justification for the idea of an immunity to AIDS. And the virus may be mutating so that even if an immunity could be developed to one virus, it may not protect against a slightly different strain.

There's another equally important reason to stop having Unsafe Sex: you may infect your partner and continue the spread of this disease.

Your best protection is to avoid Unsafe Sex, take good care of your health, and get help and advice whenever you need it.

There is nothing you can do about your past. There's a lot you can do about your future.



## Health News **AIDS Line**

The AIDS Information Delivery Service Line (AIDS Line) began operating on March 26, 1986. The Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) has introduced this confidential, tollfree statewide number, 1-800-334-AIDS, in order to provide accurate information and referral regarding AIDS to people in Wisconsin.

Trained AIDS Line volunteers will be available to answer questions Monday thru Friday, 9am to 9pm. Individuals outside the Milwaukee area can call the toll free AIDS Line number, 1-800-334-AIDS. People in the Milwaukee area can continue to call the local number, 273-AIDS.

In February, the state granted \$13,685.00 to MAP to operate a toll-free hotline. The grant is to cover costs thru June, 1986. It is expected that the grant will be received for an additional year.

Ten AIDS Line volunteers have already been trained. In order to ensure adequate coverage, more volunteers are needed. If

## PHS Urges HTLVIII Testing Of High-Risk Groups

The Public Health Service has urged that all people in high-risk groups undergo periodic blood tests to check for infection by the AIDS virus.

Agency officials said research shows that virtually all people in high-risk groups who repeatedly test positive to the blood test can infect others. They said people with varified positive results can be counseled on how to avoid spreading the deadly disease to others.

The government's list of high-risk populations includes, homosexual and bisexual men-possibly 10% of the male population, according to some estimates. Others at risk are past or current intravenous drug abusers, male or female prostitutes and their partners, sex partners of high-risk individu-Continued on page 8 .

The health service recommendations do not expand reporting requirements for state and local health officials. A state or local decision top keep track of positive tests could jeopardize confidentiality, thus endangering the success of the testing program.

## National Lesbian/Gay Health Conference

On March 13-15, the 7th National Lesbian/Gay Health Conference was held at G. Washington University in Washington, D.C. Over 500 health professionals representing the U.S. and several foreign countries were in attendance.

Presenting at the conference were two of Milwaukee's health care providers who have been active in the gay community. Mark Behar, PA-C, along with Dr. David Ostrow, MD presented a session entitled "Safer Sex Guidelines: Education and Implementation." Doug Johnson, RN, was a panelist on AIDS Health Education. Also in attendance from Milwaukee were Steve Byers, AAL and Br. Ben Johnson.

Emphasis was placed on AIDS presentations and workshops, but other health issues with the Lesbian/Gay community were addressed. Most notable were sessions on minorities and AIDS and drug/alcohol abuse.

It has been recognized that "patients of AIDS" has been increasing. National representatives have stressed the importance for organizing on the local level to deal with AIDS issues.

## Opposition To Mass HTLV-III Testing

In response to the March 14th recommendation by the PHS for mass HTLV-III testing of high-risk groups, the 7th National Lesbian/Gay Health Conference has released the following statement:

We in the forefront of the fight against AIDS denounce any government or private sector attempt to mass test individuals at high risk for AIDS.

A decision to take the test for HTLV-III

antibodies must be individual, voluntary, anonymous and combined with counseling and risk reduction guidelines including safer sex practices.

Informed consent should be a fundamental feature of any public health effort or testing program. Anyone considering the HTLV-III antibody test must be warned of the medical and psychological implications. Because there are now no guarantees of anonymous testing, persons at risk of AIDS also risk losing their jobs, education, insurance and right to have or rear children.

The Centers for Disease Control acknowledges the need for anonymity in an HTLV-III testing program. Nevertheless, it fails to recognize no state in this nation is able to offer those tested for HTLV-III antibodies protection from legal release of their names. Since such protection cannot be granted, all testing must be done on an anonymous basis or not at all.

The March 14 Public Health Service (PHS) mass testing recommendation also fails to include universally accepted criteria associated with a screening program as most recently outlined in the President's Commission for the Sudy of Ethical Problems in Medicine in Biomedical and Behavioral Research. Additional research is needed to document the efficacy and interpretation of HTLV-III screening.

Finally, this test is not a diagnostic device — nor should it be used as one. There now is no medical treatment for those who test positive other than counseling to following risk reduction guidelines. High risk group members who test negative, however, should also follow those guides. There is no proven positive correlation between knowing antibody status and changing behavior. Therefore, we oppose diverting resources from basic education efforts and counseling programs already proven effective in changing at-risk individuals' behavior toward a mass testing program

In failing to address these critical concerns, the government continues to promote an atmosphere of distrust among those encouraged to submit voluntarily to testing. Sound public health policy requires the cooperation of individuals at risk—or any testing program will fail. To gain that cooperation, the government must take immediate and affirmative steps to regain the trust of those at risk for AIDS.

Therefore, we now oppose any participation in a mass HTLV-III testing program. InStep • April 3 - April 16, 1986 • Page 41

## Company Claims Virtual 100% Accuracy With New "AIDS" Antibody Test

Seattle (N.Y. Native) — Genetic Systems Corporation(GSC) began marketing a test February 20 for antibodies to the socalled "AIDS virus" which the company claims is virtually 100% accurate. Developed by GSC with the cooperation of the Pasteur Institute in Paris, the test is called the lymphadenopathy associated virus enzyme immuno-assay (LAVEIA). The test was approved for use February 19 by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

"The Genetic Systems test detected antibodies to the virus in 100% of [blood] samples with AIDS or AIDS Related Complex," GSC spokesperson Kathy Carr told the Native. She said that the company's test accuracy "claims are based on clinical trials of 14,000 blood samples" performed at 17 locations in the U.S. and Australia. The climical trials, according to Carr, produced only .2% false positives (test results that falsely indicate that a blood sample contains antibo

dies to LAV). Both Western Blot tests and radio immunoprecipitation test were used to confirm the results obtained in the LAVEIA clinical trials.

Carr said GSC expects to be a "major competitor" in the "AIDS virus" antibody test market, but she would not release estimates on how much money the Pasteur Institute and GSA will obtain from test sales. One LAVEIA test kit costs \$960 and can be used for administering 192 tests.

Lymphadenopathy associated virus (LAV) is the name the Pasteur Institute's Dr. Luc Montagnier gave the virus he isolated in 1983. Many scientists claim that LAV causes AIDS LAV is practically identical to the

human T-cell virus type III (HTLV-III) "discovered" by Dr. Robert Gallo of the National Cancer Institute in 1984.

Neither test detects the presence of the actual virus, only of antibodies to it.

## AmFAR Distributes Public Service AIDS Announcements

Los Angeles (N.Y. Native) — The American Foundation for AIDS research (AmFAR) began distributing 15 more public service announcements February 20 urging people to learn about AIDS and to support the organizations. In addition to the two previously distributed announcements featuring AmFAR National Chairman Elizabeth Taylor and TV celebrity Carol Burnett, sev eral new commercials were sent to television stations across the country. The newer announcements contain numerous celebrities, including Brooke Shields, Matthew Broderick, and Judd Hirsch.

In the announcement in which he appears, Hirsch states, "AIDS is a problem most people don't want to think about, but it's worth knowing the facts. There's no point in being afraid, and, if you're sexually active, there's no point in being stupid."

AmFAR supports AIDS research with money collected from private donors. The organization also works to disseminate medically accurate information about AIDS. "As concern and interest in getting facts about AIDS intensifies, our most important goal becomes one of education—letting people know that by joining together, we can overcome the epidemic of fear and anxiety which has spread as insidiously as the disease," Taylor said of AmFAR's work.





## Premiere Night Of Film Festival

Opening the Fourth Annual Milwaukee Gay/Lesbian Film Festival on April 7 are a trio of films that are sure to appeal to the entire gay and lesbian community.

The Lavender Commitment is especially pleased to be able to launch "Gay & Lesbian Awareness Days '86" with the Milwaukee premiere of **BEFORE STONEWALL**, the award winning documentary by Greta Schiller and Robert Rosenberg. The June, 1969 Stonewall Riots is generally recognized as the birth of the modern gay liberation. novement. What Ms. Schiller and Mr. Rosenberg have set out to do with **BEFORE STONEWALL** is to document the rich sociological, political, and cultural heritage of the gay and lesbian community.

BEFORE STONEWALL emerges as a thoroughly engrossing, occasionally shocking, often hilarious, and always enlightening portrait of the courageous gay men and lesbians who lived in a time when they were considered perverted, dangerous, and criminal if they were considered at all. Through present day interviews with such notable and articulate individuals as activists Barbara Gittings and Harry Hay, poet Allen Ginsberg, and dancer Mabel Hampton along with rare achival footage and clips from period Hollywood films, BEFORE STONEWALL reveals a gay life that existed covertly, often in isolation.

At a time when the gay and lesbian community celebrates "gay pride", it comes as guite a shock to learn that it wasn't all that long ago that the term "gay" as we popularly know it did not even exist. Speaking nostalgically of his coming out in 1930, the ponytailed Harry Hay recalls: "We didn't have the word "gay", we didn't have any words for ourselves at all ... the word for us was "tempermental", so we're "tempermental", we're "that way", this is about all they had for us. This is about all we had for ourselves ... You would look into a person's eyes and he would look into your eyes and all of a sudden, you'd know through the eyes ..."

Narrated by the outspoken lesbian novelist Rita Mae Brown, **BEFORE STONE-**WALL traces just over 75 years in a film of 90-odd minutes. The result is fast paced and resourceful. Especially effective are bits from Hollywood films, including un-named silent films. Using a clip of a drag number with then little-known Ronald Reagan from the film **THIS IS THE ARMY** to begin the film, **BEFORE STONEWALL** inventively inverts the intended meaning of the cliched portrayal of gay men and lesbians in any number of now forgotten and deservedly forgettable Hollywood films. Yet it is important to realize how the films served to create as well as reflect the social attitudes of the times, when the idea of a gay/lesbian film festival would have seemed rediculous.

**BEFORE STONEWALL** will be screened at 7:00pm April 7 at the UWM Union Cinema. Tickets are \$3.50, \$2.50 for UWM students.

Accompanying BEFORE STONE-WALL on April 7 are the classic lesbian comedy by Jan Oxenberg, A COMEDY IN SIX UNNATURAL ACTS and Marc Heustis's hilarious cult film WHATEVER HAPPENED TO SUSAN JANE.

## 2nd Night - April 14 Women's Night At Film Festival

A program of films particularly of interest of lesbians will take place on Monday, April 14, the second night of the Fourth Annual Milwaukee Gay/Lesbian Film Festival.

The evening will open with a screening of Diane Kurys's ENTRE NOUS. Starring Isabelle Huppert and Miou-Miou, ENTRE NOUS chronicals the relationship between two women in 1950's France. Beginning with the war, Lena's and Madeleine's divergent paths are traced until the two women meet in 1952 at the school in Lyons their children attend. Instantly finding a rapport, their relationship grows, finding in each other the fulfillment that is lacking in their marriages and their lives. Soon the two women begin to drift from their families and are forced to make decisions about their relationship and their lives.

some of your needs for love, caring, respect, that means leaving to seek a relationship where you can get those things that you have a right to as a person.

Many times people like you and me who feel love and responsibilities for others keep. a relationship going long after the point where we are getting any love, affection, caring because we feel it's our duty to help other people. It's not. It's each individual's responsibility to be what they can be. We can only help or should only help in a relationship if our needs are also being met.

The toughest part of loving sometimes is loving ourself enough to work as hard to find a situation where we can be loved as we often do to find situations where we are needed and can give love.

No one can be faulted for maintaining a relationship that they know the ups & downs, pros & cons of, even if it is not happy. None of us like the thought of going out into the "jungle" seeking a mate. We know how difficult it is to find something better. Many of us feel that an unhappy relationship is the best there can be. It's true that relationships go through bad times, unhappy times, tough times. For them to continue we have to know that there is some definite relief in site, that something can and probably will happen in a reasonable period of time to make things improve. In your situation that is not predictable or probable given the chemical dependence and his refusal to work on stopping it. 

### Dear Dee.

My lover & I have been together for over a vear. We have several problems. I work 2 jobs, he works one. My jobs are more standard situations with on boose, drugs or partying but in his partying, drugs, flirting, booze are O.K. Part of our problem is his use of drugs and being constantly worn out from partying. He does little to help keep the living quarters in shape. When I try to talk about the problems we end up fighting. The flirting & drugs are getting to me. I think he's destroying his life and that flirting could lead to the end of the relationship. I feel like he's a "diamond in the rough" and wish I could help him realize what he's doing to himself and the relationship. I really want it to last. Can you help? "Joe'

### Dear Joe,

The problems you mention seem to be common in a lot of relationships. First, your personalities are different. You're more of a worker, have more detailed goals, feel responsibility heavy on your shoulders. He finds it easier to forget or avoid responsibility with fun or escapes like booze, drugs, flirting, partying. Those things help him avoid the passage of time and the responsibilities always waiting for him.

Second, you're right that the booze &/or drugs could help him destroy his life. But, until he realizes that, there's little you can do. You can't make him stop, only he can. Any time you apply pressure by explaining responsibilities, trying to help, he uses it or can use it as a reason to continue.

AA and drug therapies recommend "tough love": sitting down and defining where you are, how you feel, what you will & will not do and encouraging him to do the same, sort of like a contract. You're then responsible for what you have stated, and have defined and he's responsible for his part. The tough love part comes in when you refuse to accept responsibility for his actions, his share of the work, his debts or mistakes or fines or any results of his actions. If part of the agreement is that you will leave him if doesn't shape up and meet




