



### Idaho Copies Oklahoma's Homophobic Law

Boise, ID (GCN) — The Idaho House of Representatives voted 54 to 26 in favor of legislation to bar public school teachers from advocating or condoning homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle.

Following the February vote, the measure received harsh criticism from the American Civil Liberties Union, the Idaho Education Association, several newspapers and gay and lesbian organizations. Activists are hopeful the Senate will reject the bill.

The Idaho Bill resembles a broader Oklahoma statute that was struck down by a federal court on First Amendment grounds. This decision was later upheld by the Supreme Court.

ACLU lawyers said, "The proposed law is vague and would force teachers to curtail discussions on important topics such as AIDS or on sexuality in general," according to off our backs.

### NGLTF Board Consolidates Organization In Washington

Washington, D.C. (NGLTF) — The Board of Directors of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), meeting in New York April 19-20th, voted to consolidate all NGLTF operations in Washington, D.C. by July 1, 1986. This decision completes the transition of Task Force headquarters to the nation's capital, and reflects the greater emphasis the Task Force is giving to civil rights advocacy and lobbying of the federal government.

The Board also voted to restructure the organization's staff management by recreating the position of Executive Director. This position had been abolished by the Board in March, 1985, in a move to create a dual management structure for the organization. While "an innovative experiment," accord-

ing to Board Co-Chair Peter Fowler of San Francisco, "the structural flaw placed unanticipated burdens on the staff to reconcile disagreements between themselves regarding their respective areas of responsibility." Other Board members conceded that the "team management approach" had been worthwhile but ultimately an unsatisfactory experiment for the organization.

Upon reconstituting the position of Executive Director, the Board named Jeff Levi to the position. Levi brings to the position of Executive Director an outstanding record over the last three years as NGLTF's representative in Washington, most recently as Director of Governmental and Political Affairs. As a highly visible representative and articulate spokesperson for the lesbian and gay community, Levi has been instrumental in establishing the credibility of NGLTF as an organization with which the federal government and national media must deal.

In other action, the Board reduced expenditures and cut back staff positions in a determined effort to eliminate an outstanding debt which has been a financial drain on the organization's efforts to expand.

### 3 Cities Pass Gay Ordinances

(GLC Voice) — In the wake of New York City's gay rights bill comes news that three other municipalities across the nation also enacted similar ordinances: Sacramento and Davis, California and Atlanta, Georgia.

The Atlanta law, passed by a 14-4 vote with little debate or opposition from the city's conservative element, amends the city charter to protect homosexual city employees from discrimination.

Despite its reputation as a conservative stronghold in California, the Sacramento City council approved a gay rights bill by a vote of 7-2. When the vote was announced—coming after two hours of public hearings—most of the 500 people crowding the council chamber stood up and applauded.

### Police In Washington, D.C. Suburb Arrest Gay Male Escort

(GLC Voice) — Undercover detectives with the Arlington County Police Department arrested a 32-year-old man in his apartment April 1 on a prostitution charge after one of the detectives obtained the man's telephone number from a classified advertisement in the Washington Blade for a gay male "escort."

The arrested man denied that he engaged in prostitution and said he simply removed his clothes at the request of Detective Michael Rudy, who posed as a private citizen answering the man's escort ad.

The arrested man said Rudy came to his apartment alone but was joined by two other detectives immediately after the man took off his clothes.

The man said Rudy ordered him to pose in the nude while one of the other detectives photographed him from the front and from behind

The man said he was taken to the police station, booked, and forced to spend the night in jail because he could not arrange for the \$500 bail until the next day.

Karinshak said Rudy would not have made the arrest unless the man acted in violation of the county's prostitution law. Karinshak said vice detectives routinely photograph persons arrested on prostitution charges.

The arrested man said he planned to plead not guilty to the charge at a court hearing scheduled for later this month. •

### Task Force Calls For **Expanded AIDS Effort**

Washington D.C. (NGTF) - National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Executive Director Jeffrey Levi called on House and Senate committees to provide "comprehensive and campassionate care" for all persons with AIDS, AIDS-related conditions and HTLV-III infection in testimony at two hearings last month. Both committees were urged to support an expand AIDS effort that included:

- Additional education programs to teach individuals in high-risks groups how to prevent transmission of the HTLV-III virus that has been associated with AIDS and to train health care professionals how to treat and counsel those affected by the disease.
- · Expand clinical trials of therapeutic drugs to assure that the entire range and combination of drugs are fully explored now and to assure greater access to these trials for persons with AIDS.
- · Research into the epidemiology and natural history of ARC (AIDS-related condition), which is essential to gain a better understanding of the cause of HTLV-III infection.

Levi told the Hatch committee that "the reponse of the gay community to this crsis has been a model of volunteerism and private sector initiative . . . To this day, (the gay community) provides the foundation for and majority of education efforts and nonhospital care for persons at risk to AIDS and with AIDS.

Levi warned, however, of the beginning of a "two-class system for persons with AIDS: the latest in treatments, access to clinical trials, and compassionate care and services are available primarily in high-incidence communities . . . The federal government must step in to assure that the person with AIDS in Phoenix or Des Moines has the same chance for receiving the best available treatment and care as the person with AIDS in San Francisco or New York."

### Last Homosexual To Die By Year 1997

Washington, D.C. (GCN) - Nearly fifty percent of the articles in the March 10 issue of the New England Spy, a supplement to the Lyndon LaRouche mouthpiece, New Solidarity, contain virulent attacks against lesbians, gay men and people with AIDS. In an article entitled "Last Homosexual to Die by Year 1997," the Spy reports Professor Lupan Raubritt's "findings" that the "virus which causes homosexuality in males," which he calls Type YY, has shown an "accelerating rate of mutation in the infected subjects," resulting in the deterioration of the central nervous system. Type YY, insists Raubritt, is transmitted to males by infected, asymptomatic mothers.

### **Questions & Answers**

Question: What about alcohol, drugs and

Answer: There is growing evidence of a significant connection between AIDS and alcohol and drug abuse. Substance abuse is an issue we can no longer afford to ignore.

Drugs and alcohol don't cause AIDS. AIDS is caused by a virus. But there are at least three ways in which alcohol and drugs can increase your chances of getting AIDS.

First, alcohol and drugs depress the

immune system and make you more susceptible to disease. Alcohol, marijuana, speed, cocaine, poppers, and other recreational chemicals lower your resistance to disease. In some research studies, poppers have been implicated in increasing the risk of KS. Drugs and alcohol weaken your health. They increase stress rather than relieve it and help the AIDS virus overcome your body's defenses.

Second, alcohol and drugs reduce your ability to stick to judgments about what's safe and what isn't. A huge majority of gay men in San Francisco have given up Unsafe



### Two Patients Have Antibodies But Not AIDS

(Milw. Sentinel) — Two patients who received blood contaminated with AIDS virus during open-heart operations at two Milwaukee hospitals have AIDS antibodies in their blood, but do not have the disease, officials said recently.

Published accounts had said the two patients got AIDS by receiving contaminated blood drawn before an antibody screening began 14 months ago.

"I don't have AIDS," said one of the patients, Wendell J. Glessner of Dixon, Ill.,

Milwaukee once again became the focus of national attention for gays when it hosted the EXPOSURE Workshop for gay media professionals on May 17. The previous night was the fifth anniversary of CCBA, marked by a gala black tie affair at the magnificent Grain Exchange Ballroom. Proclamations from the Mayor and Governor, songs from the Fest City Singers, national media awards and a special award for the Milwaukee Sentinel's AIDS reporting made the birthday party special. Ron McCrea of the Governor's office was MC, and served the following day as host of the media workshop, which was hailed as a milestone event for gay organizational cooperation.

in a telephone interview.

He said his blood was found to contain antibodies to the virus.

His blood was tested after his physician received a registered letter from Milwaukee County Medical Complex in Wauwatosa, saying he might have been exposed to the virus in a blood transfusion, he said.

Glessner said he had "to call and straighten out" an Illinois radio station that was reporting he had AIDS.

AIDS develops in about one-fourth of the people who have AIDS antibodies in their blood. The presence of antibodies means a person has been infected by the virus, but does not mean the person still has the virus or will develop AIDS.

Glessner filed a \$2.5 million claim against the Milwaukee County hospital this week, saying he had received blood contaminated by the AIDS virus.

In the second case, a woman who had heart surgery in March 1985 was found to have antibodies to the AIDS virus in her blood this March. The woman does not have AIDS.

A St. Luke's Hospital spokesman said the woman was one of three St. Luke's patients whose physicians were told their parents had been exposed to the virus in blood transfusions.

Two of the patients had cancer and have since died, but not from AIDS.

So far, the woman has not taken any legal action against St. Luke's, the spokesman said.

Jay Menitove, medical director for the blood center, said 23 blood component donations at the center, linked to seven donors, may be suspect for AIDS virus contamination.

The seven donors, found to have AIDS antibodies after testing began, all gave blood before testing began. Menitove said it was




not known if the donors had AIDS antibodies at the time of the earlier donations.

He said 9 of the 23 people who received the possible contaminated components had died for reasons other than AIDS.

No AIDS antibodies have been found in the other 12 cases.

### All But 1 Case Of AIDS Found In '82-'84 Die

Madison (Milw. Sentinel) — Thirty-three of 34 reported AIDS cases in Wisconsin diagnosed in 1982-'84 have ended in death, according to data released by the State Division of Health.

As of May 12, there had been 82 confirmed cases of AIDS among residents and non-residents who received medical care in Wisconsin, the statistics showed. Fortyeight (59%) of the 82 people have died.

Wisconsin's statistics on AIDS deaths appeared to mirror national figures that show that the odds are against long-term survival once the viral disease, which compromises the body's immune system, is diagnosed.

State Epidemiologist Jeffrey Davis said nationally the odds of survival three years after an AIDS diagnosis are 10% or less. Wisconsin's experience "is not much different." he said.


coming together with us. I also was touched by the number of straight folks I knew who also were present to lend their support.






