





## Police Crackdown On Male Prostitution

Milwaukee (Milw. Sentinel) — A public defender who once worked as a prosecutor was among five men arrested early June 4th ir. a crackdown on homosexual prostitution, police said.

The case against the public defender will be handled by Waukesha County Asst. Dist. Atty. Donald J. Hassin, who was named special prosecutor.

Police said the man was arrested about 3 a.m. and was released about 6 a.m. after a brief appearance in the district attorney's office.

### According to police:

The man pulled his car over to the curb in the 300 block of N. Water St., where an undercover officer was standing.

"The officer got into the car when it appeared that the man was interested in sex in exchange for money. As the men drove to the East Side, the man allegedly asked the cfficer if he was a police officer.

"The officer said he wasn't and asked the suspect if he was with the police department. The suspect reportedly touched the cfficer indecently and said, "An officer wouldn't do this" according to Captain Thomas Perlewitz of the Vice Control Division.

"The suspect then allegedly offered to pay the officer \$12 for a homosexual act. The officer arrested the man after the deal was made."

Police also arrested three other men who allegedly were willing to have sex with male officers for \$15 to \$20.

Another man who allegedly was "harassing" the undercover officer was arrested for disorderly conduct.



## NML Fights Two AIDS Death Claims

Milwaukee (Milw. Sentinel) — Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co. is fighting in court two of 33 claims made by survivors of victims of AIDS against the Milwaukee insurer in 1985, and NIML executive said May 28th.

The claims, which were made in New York State, are being contested on the grounds that the disease was present in the victims before the insurance policies were purchased.

"We have had several cases in litigation regarding the AIDS virus that at the time the insurance was applied for, the applicant knew he had AIDS," said Robert W. Ninneman, NML senior vice president for new business and claims. "We issued the insurance on false repesentation."

He added, however, that all death claims made within two years after issuance of a policy are investigated by the company. After two years, no death claims can be denied by NML, he said.

At an annual policyholders meeting Richard W. Wright, executive vice president of finance and administration, siad NML opposed efforts to deny to insurance companies information from tests for AIDS for underwriting purposes.

"Our own state of Wisconsin has created important roadblocks to such testing," said Wright. "AIDS is a serious social and economic problem, which all of us must make a contribution toward solving, but individual life insurance should not be one of the means of doing so."

Revised legislation was passed last fall that requires the state epidemiologist to determine whether an HTLV-III test could be used by insurance companies for underwriting purposes.

The test shows whether an individual may have been exposed to the virus believed to cause AIDS.

After the epidemiologist issues a decision, the Office of the Commissioner of Insurance will determine whether the test is valid for *Continued on page 5* •





"This is business as usual for us," said Robert Gleeson, associate medical director for NML. "We have other cases of misrepresentation so there is no attempt to single the AIDS cases out."

Ninneman said the company is continually monitoring the amount of AIDS claims made with the company. They grew from two death claims in 1982 to 31 in 1985. In the first four months of 1986, there were about 10 claims, he said.

## Gay Sailor Sentenced To Hard Labor

Denver (Outfront) - Navy Lieutenant Daniel Miller, who stands accused of having engaged in homosexual acts with two different seamen at separate times in his apart-

ment located off base, has been convicted of "behavior unbecoming an officer and a gentleman." He was subsequently courtmartialed, received a dishonorable discharge and was sentenced to a year of hard labor in a federal prison.

Miller is currently being kept in isolation. He is allowed only a Bible, a copy of Stars and Stripes (a military newspaper), and a copy of the rules and regulations of the brig.

## Gay Mayor Wins 4th Term

Bunceton, MO - Gerald Ulrich, 41, who has lived with his lover for 13 years, was elected to a fourth term as mayor of Bunceton, population 419, according to The Advocate. He says his being gay has never come up in campaigns, though "everybody knows it, Lord knows."

## Consensus Statement On HTLV-III Testing Issued By 57 Groups

Washington D.C. (NGLTF) - A consensus statement on HTLV-III Antibody Testing and Related Issues advocating mandatory reporting of test results and contact tracing was relased May 30th by a coalition of AIDS and gay/lesbian civil rights organizations. Signed by 57 national and local groups from across the United States. the statement urges:

- ready availability of the antibody test, with counseling on an anonymous basis;

-- all levels of government to reduce the disincentives for individuals to take the test by passing measures to prevent discrimination against those who are antibody positive in areas such as employment and insurance;

- against reporting test reults with identifiers to state authorities; such reporting is seen as unnecessary for epidemiologic purposes and a further disincetive for testing;

- voluntary notification of sexual contacts by individuals who test positive, rather

than contact tracing by health authorities, which is seen as ineffective and counterproductibe.

Commenting on release of the statement, Jeffrey Levi, Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force said, "This shows that there is a broad-based consensus on testing issues. This underscores the depth of our concern with misuse of this test. We are all committed to having this test play its proper role in the public health effort against AIDS. But until the serious negative implications of misuse of test results are addressed, that role will be necessarily more limited than some would like."

## New Zeland **Plans Gav Rights**

Wellington - Parliament rejected compromises on the age of consent of homosexual acts and voted to keep age 16 as the age of consent, Outrage reports. Opponents of the Homosexual Law Reform Bill assisted by voting against the compromise age of 20 or 18. Opponents want the most leberal law passed so they can attack it before the next election.

## Madison Park To Get Gay Sculpture

Madison (Milw. Sentinel) — A life-sized sculpture titled "Gay Liberation" and intended for display in New York City temporarliy will be set up in a Madison park, officials said.

Thomas Garve, director of the Madison Art Center where the statue by George Segal has been on exhibit since Jan. 1, said it would be placed in Orton Park for a least a year, beginning this summer.

The sculpture shows two women seated on a park bench and two men standing nearby.

Officials said the sculpture orginally had been intended for a site in New York, but financial and political oppositon have stalled the effort.

A second casting of the statue, intended for San Francisco, has been moved to Stanford University in Palo Alto, Calif., for similar reasons, the officals said.

The Madison Parks Commission approved the sculpture's display in a park at a meeting last month.

Garver said the display of the statute in a public park is not an endorsement of a homosexual lifestyle.

## Gay Monarch Will Be Commemorated

Toronto (Body Politic) — The West German province of Bavaria is preparing to commemorate the reign and mysterious death—100 years ago this June—of Ludwig II whose passion for men was only exceeded by his love of building palaces.

Ludwig, the benign ruler of Bavaria from 1864 to 1866, formed passionate—yet probably celibate—friendships with men ranging from Richard Wagner to actors and royal guardsmen. It was his friendship and finances that allowed Wagner to compose Tristan and Isolde, Parsifal and other operatic versions of romantic German myths. Those works, in turn, inspired Ludwig's greatest castle, Neuschwanstein.

Festivities in Bavaria will include special tours that follow in Ludwig's footsteps, an opera ball in August, and exhibitions in his Versailles-like palace of Herrenchiemsee. InStep • June 12 - June 25, 1986 • Page 7

## Legislature Defines Sodomy, But It's Not Illegal

Sioux Falls, S.D. — The South Dakota Legislature passed a bill defining sodomy, even though sodomy was removed from the criminal code several years ago, according to Equal Time. The legislature had to define the act to satisfy federal regulations pertaining to child abuse on Indian reservations, according to a representative of the Department of Social Services, but gays are most concerned about possible use of the definition against them in the future.

## Parents Petition Church To Oust MCC...

Knoxville, TN — Parents who do not want the Metropolitan Community Church using the same facility that provides day care for their children have petitioned the Church of the Savior congregation to oust the group, The Advocate reports. The demand came after AIDS Response Knoxville began receiving coverage in the local media. MCC Pastor Bob Galloway predicts the congregation will affirm both MCC and the daycare center.

## Graham Denies Anti-Gay Methods

Washington — Todd Martin, a spokesperson for the Billy Grahm Crusade, denied that the organization has backed Probe Ministries, which ministers to gays and lesbians in hopes of changing sexual preference, reports Bay Area Reporter "Billy Graham has not and will not condemn homosexuals." Martin said.

## South African Responds On Nkoli

Johannesburg - Ann Smith, International Secretary of the Gay Association of South Africa, has written in Exit that the organization has not spoken out against the imprisonment of black gay anti-apartheid activist Simon Nkoli because GASA is defined as nonpolitical in its constitution. "GASA walks the tight-rope balanced between the dictates of its members and those of general liberal position," she writes. "Were Simon to be in prison for a gay reason, this dilemma would not exist." Smith writes that having to follow GASA's constitution and stay out of politics, she finds herself "in terms of my own conscience, in an untenable position." She calls apartheid "a most invidious system of discrimination and one which must be abhorred by all thinking people."

## Priest Won't Change Views

Washington — The Rev. Charles Curran, professor of theology at Catholic University, has said he will not recant his views on such issues as birth control and homosexuality, according to Philidelphia Gay News. In a letter to Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger, head of the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, Curran asked what rules he had broken by his teaching, and said to remove him from his post would be "harmful to me and to the credibility of the church."

## Town Clerk Wins Unopposed

Lunenburg, Mass. — Town clerk, tax collector, and treasurer Robert Ebersole came out on Boston televison in 1983, won reelection unopposed, and is the only openly gay Republican elected official in the country, according to a report in *The Advocate*

While a resident of San Francisco, Robert won numerous "Cable Car Awards" for his artisty. Originally from Wind Lake, Wisconsin, Uwari grew up in Milwaukee. Over the





past 10 years, he's spent time between San Francisco and Milwaukee, most recently moving back to Milwaukee after living in Kentucky, with his lover Ron.

In Milwaukee, Robert's 'base' was Club 219, where he was the Interior designer. His artwork graces many of the city's more popular gay establishments and homes.

Uyvari is survived by: his lover, Ron; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Uyvari of Milwaukee; brothers Dick and Mike, Chicago; Christopher, Philidelphia; and Joe and sister Mary, Houston.

The body has been cremated, and as per his wishes an attempt will be made to "scatter my ashes over San Francisco Bay".





The GALA Choruses Festival II will take place July 3 · 6, 1986 at Orchestra Hall. More than 1,200 members of 17 gay, lesbian and mixed choruses from across the United States and Canada will participate in the festival.

The festival will include evening performances Thrusday, Friday and Saturday, July 3 -5, as well as a matinee performance on Saturday. A special performance by the women members of GALA Choruses will highlight the Saturday matinee. A performance by the Twin Cities Men's Chorus and a Grand Finale in which all 17 choruses will sing together will be features for the final concert on Sunday, July 6.

Plans are underway for the production of a documentary film of the GALA Choruses Festival II, to be dircted by Academy Awardwinner Richard Schiemchen ("The Times of Harvey Milk"). ## Planned Retirement Housing

The number of elderly lesbians and gay men is growing and will continue to do so well into the next century. A study investigating interest in planned retirement housng among older gay men and lesbians and their preferences for certain facility chracteristics has recently been completed. A nonrandom sample of 57 lesbians and 399 gav men with a mean age of 63.3 years completed an anonymous survey. A large majority (89%) indicated an interest in planned retirement housing specifically sesitive to the needs of gay men and lesbians, with support for a continuum of services. Many respondents expressed a willingness to relocate significant distances in order to live in such a community. Security and health services were the most preferred, while mandatory services were rejected. Lesbian/gay retirement housing deserves serious consideration and more detailed information must be collected locally by prospective sponsors. 

# Something New's Afoot At The Melody Top

If you've seen the new posters and advertisements for this season at the Melody Top, no doubt you've encountered a 'new look.' Along with this new look, a new philosophy and continuation of a creative direction which has evolved from a strong and vital history of good summer musical theatre. Mr Phillip Procter (PP), General Manager, Mr. Tom Marks (TM), Artistic Director, and Mr. Michael Wilson (MW), Producer, shared their observations, views, and challenges, as they seek to begin a new season as Melody Top looks at being alive and well for a quarter of a century of Milwaukee's cultural life.

Guy Little, your predecessor, fused both the roles of producer and general manager. Now there are three of you. How did that come about?

PP: That's right, now there's a trinity. All three of us were here last summer. When Guy decided to leave to take care of his parents, we had already in a sense been in place. The three positions really make alot of sense. And while we have a definite divison, there's also a lot of sharing.

A 'new look' and the philosophy of the theatre has changed too. The star approach with names on the marquee has shifted. Could you describe it please?

TM: When the theatre was first here in the midst of nothingness, it had this 'relief of city' feel to it. Now progess has brought us Chuck E. Cheese and K-Mart and lots of traffic. We still have and want to portray this rural atmosphere. How best can we do it? We want you to get the feeling that this is something special for this particualr time of the year. That has been vocalized by the graphic artist and you have seen the result of

PP: And by the way, that's one of the things we want to concentrate on with the grounds themselves. Bringing it back to the country feeling, in light of that, we're doing some plantings this year. We're thinking of much more extensive things for coming seasons.

Jay Joslyn describes you as one of the "nation's most successful summer musical theatres." Why gamble with the philosophy?

MW: A lot of it comes from partons wishes. We're at a point where the big stars were always there but now either they're dead or the ones that aren't shouldn't be entertaining. There are a lot of personalities out there which are wonderful and when they're right for the roles, we want to be there to hire them. We don't think we need their names to sell the shows. The patrons have written us and have said that 'we'd rather see first rate top notch talent than to see a 'name' on stage.

TM: We're not saying that a personality or a luminary will not be appearing here. Just for the sake of having such a person here, is not a wise way to go.

PP: Two things are happening at the Melody Top. The entire business is changing. What we're about is trying to make the changes at Melody Top that are really happening nationally. The other thing that's happening is Milwaukee is changing. The audiences are much more sophisticated. What you're seeing is a natural evolution not a dramatic change that's made without justification.

How do you know that your audience has matured and sophisticated here in Milwaukee?

TM: We're seeing a large number of new subscribers that are being generated by our new materials.

PP: I'm surprised by the number of letters that we get from people who say, 'We don't care about seeing stars. We just want talent.' That shows a level of sophistication in itself.

MW: Something else we see that's changing, last year's season was a wonderful mix. We've now talked about a split season of doing six shows. If people want to see new shows-they can see new. If they want oldthey can see old.

Let's talk about this season. It isn't new and it isn't old and it isn't traditional book. What is it?

TM: It's undiscovered.

It's undiscoverd but relatively obscure shows ...



TM: With very strong musical content. Very good showcases for talent. We believe that we've got the talent to back all this material up.

### Tell me more.

PP: One of the biggest motivations for the shows that were booked this season was the feeling that a lot of patrons are tired of seeing the same shows that were done two, or three, or four times. They wanted to see new shows. The danger when you do that is people say. 'I don't recognize that title.' That's because it hasn't been done that often. They're all good shows.

Audiences have responded well to Mary E-nster and you've included last year's stars Alene Robertson and Iris Liberman. Does prior performance response count in your selection to utilize talent?

TM: I think it would be silly not too.

MW: Someone in Mary Ernster's position who has been here for many years has her own following. Mary Ernster is one of those people whose name shortly should be above her title.

FP: On top of that, one of the reasons they've had such a marvelous response and that these people have such a high visibility s that they're talented. The talent in Chicago and Milwaukee is just amazing. I think ceople are beginning to be really aware of the abundance of talent here and are appreciating it.

Speak if you will, about this notion of regional theatre that you see?

PP: Something very exciting is going on in this country which is that Broadway is not supplying the new shows that people want to see and that theatre's need to keep going. The reason is simple. It's too expensive to produce new shows on Broadway. That leaves the regional theatres to become the new Broadway producers. In other words, we're going to be seeing theatres around the

country producing new shows that may or may not go on to New York. I think its very important for Melody Top to be right there. Quite frankly, we're even looking at a project like that for this winter. Not however, at this theatre. It'll be a little too cold out here.

As you look at this opening and a new season, what is the greatest challenge for each you and why?

MW: I think our biggest challenge is to really instill new excitement in the audience out here. We're excited about it and we've got some surprises and are going to try some new things. We're determined to make it work:

PP: We're going in new directions in order to excite and interest. We see this as not just a theatrical experience-the central thing that happens out here is the show--but it's an experience beyond that. So we're making several statements-shows, environment, attitude. We need and want to go in new directions for the theatre and we hope that the Milwaukee audience will come along with us.

TM: Gut level from the artistic director, I hope my cast comes in healthy, stays healthy, and leaves healthy. I want this company of people to know and be able to communicate to their viewing public that they are a unit. Lord, let thern be happy, Lord, let them do the work they're supposed to do and just do the business of show.






