

# U.S. Supreme Court OUR Privacy

Leaders of national gay rights groups lambasted the Supreme Court for it's June 30th ruling that upheld Georgia's anti-sodomy law. The ruling is a major defeat for gays and lesbians sexual equality on a federal level, and many of those national gay gorups will now fervently back efforts to pass laws on the state and city level.

The Supreme Court had not issued a detailed ruling on the rights of gays since 1967 when it declared aliens found to be homosexual may be deported as "people afflicted with a psychopathic personality".

The case was brought to the Supreme Court by Michael Hardwick, a gay man arrested by Atlanta police in 1982, on charges of committing the crime of sodomy with another man, in his home. (The police had gone to his home to issue a traffic citation, and a roommate allowed them inside. The police entered Hardwicks bedroom and witnessed two men with their mouths on each others penis. Georgia defines Sodomy as "any sexual act involving the sex organs of one person and the mouth or anus of another".)

The suit by Hardwick was thrown out of federal court, but was reinstated by a federal Court of Appeals, which ruled that the Georgia law infringed on fundamental constitutional rights.

The Supreme court ruling was limited only to "consenual homosexual sodomy", but nothing in its sweeping language cast doubt on the constitutionality of state laws that also make heterosexual sodomy a crime, even when performed by married couples.

The 5-4 ruling upheld Georgia's law which sets a jail term of up to 20 years for the offense. Georgia Attorney General Michael Bowers, whose office defended the sodomy law praised the decision as "tremendously far-reaching."

Justice Byron R. White wrote for the court that "the proposition that any kind of private sexual conduct between consenting adults is constitutionally insulated from state proscription is unsupportable". White was

joined by Chief Justice Warren E. Burgerm and Justice Lewis F. Powell, William H. Rehnquist and Sandra Day O'Connor.

Writing in dissent, Justice Harry Blackmun, joined by Justices William Brennan, Thurgood Marshall and John Paul Stevens said the-case was not about sodomy but about "the right to be left alone". Blackmun said the ruling was "revolting" and chided the court for its "almost obsessive focus on homosexual activity," considering the Georgia law also applies to heterosexual activity.

Ron Najman, of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force predicted the decision "will energize the gay rights movement in a way that will knock peoples socks off. We have just begun to fight!"

The decision will not effect Wiscosnin, which in 1983 legalized sexual acts between consenting adults in private. Rep. David Clarenbach of Madison, who led the long fight to pass Wisconsins' Consenting Adults' Bill, said he disagreed with the court's conclusion that the Constitution did not protect private sexual activities. "Private sexual activities are very much a part of one's life, a very intimate and private part of every persons life", he said.

Eric Rofes, executive director of the Gay and Lesbian Center in West Hollywood, said the ruling "is an outrageous violation of personal dignity. It says people don't have a right to do what they want in their own bedroom whether they are two men, a man and a woman, or two women.

Of the 24 states that maintain statutes against sodomy, Arkansas, Kansas, Montana, Nevada and Texas criminalize only homosexual acts. The rest: Alabama, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Kentucky, Louisina, Maryland, Mississippi, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Utah and Virginia criminalize both hetero and homosexual acts.

gram to search for drugs effective against

The program, which will be funded at \$20 million during the first year, will test as many as six drugs in 14 institutions. (None in Wisconsin).

That is the largest single amount of federal money ever devoted to clinical AIDS testing, US health officials said.

The program could enroll as many as 1,000 patients in the next six months—emlarging by one-third the number of people with acquired immune deficiency syndrome now participating in experimental programs. However, half of those in the program will receive placebos (sugar pills).

"We believe this new effort should greatly enhance our research capabilities and bring us closer to the answers we seek," said Anthony S. Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, which is sponsoring the five-year study.

# NGLTF Blasts Justice Department Ruling On AIDS Discrimination

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force denounced as "bad law and bad public health policy" the U.S. Justice Department's ruling that limits federal protection against discrimination based on AIDS.

In a highly controversial legal opinion released on June 23rd, the Justice Department declared that while AIDS is a disability, federal employment protections against discrimination based on disability could be waived if an employer was concerned about the spread of AIDS in the workplace. The U.S. Public Health Service has stated repeatedly that AIDS is not transmitted through casual contact, such as in the workplace. The decision affects challenges to AIDS discrimination under Section 504 of the 1973 Rehabilitation Act and covers federal employees and those working at institutions receiving federal funds.

Declared Jeffrey Levi, NGLTF Executive Director, "this ruling perpetuates false and irrational concerns about the casual contagion of AIDS—placing the views of unnamed non-experts above the scientifically based conclusions of the Public Health Service. The entire ruling is predicated on the notion

InStep • July 10 - July 23, 1986 • Page 5 that AIDS can be casually transmitted, and thus should be rejected out of hand."

Levi further warned that the Justice Department offered no protections at all to those who have ARC or HTLV-III infection. "The federal government is saying, in effect, that people who are in a risk group or are HTLV-III positive have no federal civil rights protections" even though numerous state laws forbidding discrimination based on disability or handicap have been interpreted to protect all those perceived to be disabled. "The Justice Department seems so frightened of extending protections because they might indirectly protect gays, that it has ignored both the letter and spirit of the law," Levi said.

"One of our worst fears associated with testing," Levi continued, "has come true: that an agency of government would say that employers have the right to fire someone based solely on a positive antibody test. This underscores that need for absolute confidentiality in any antibody testing program, and that means only anonymous testing until legal guarantees are clarified."

# Staying Hard Can Be A Medical Emergency?

(Works Magazine) — Chronic male impotency is being treated in a revoluntionary way, a New York University urologist reports. But in some cases he admits there have been some interesting side effects—like erections that last for literally days.

Adrian Zorgniotti says he has tested a combination of a muscle relaxing drug and a high blood pressure medicine on 300 men who had physical or psychological problems getting a hard on. The treatment increases blood flow to the penis making it erect. The participants in the study injected the medicine into the base of the penis themselves just before they wished to have sex.

Zorgniotti said that the practice of self injection did not trouble diabetics who injected themselves with insulin, but that other men required "some chutzpah" to stick a needle in their cocks.

He also said that in about five percent of the cases the resulting injections lasted for much longer than the normal three hours, in some cases for as long as several days. He said that while the patients are "overjoyed" at their long-lived arousal, "It's really a medical emergency."

# Judge Supports Use Of "Olympics"

San Francisco (Bay Area Reporter) -A conservative judge appointed by President Reagan to the 9th Circuit federal appeals court supports the Gay Games in their argument to be allowed to use the word "Olympics" in their title.

Judge Alex Kozinski called denying Gay Games the right to use the word an act "which threatens a potentially serious and widespread infringement of personal liberties."

Judge Kozinski said, "Accepting (Gay Games) allegation, as we must, it seems that the United States Olympic Committee (USOC) is using its control over the term "Olympic" to promote the very image of homosexuals that the Gay Games seeks to combat. Thus, handicapped, juniors, police, scouting groups, even dogs are allowed to carry the Olympic torch but homosexuals are not."

Gay Games organizers were encouraged by the judge's statement and have decided to appeal their case to the U.S. Supreme Court.

# Kiss And Pay In London

London (The Advocate) - Two men have been fined £100 (\$150) each for kissing goodbye at a bus stop in central London's Oxford Street at 2 a.m. One of two young men standing nearby with their fiances shouted, "How dare you do that in front of my girl!" and fetched the police. Both the police and the court agreed and convicted the two men with "shocking the public." .

# Amnesty International Seeks Information On Gay Abuse

Amsterdam (Windy City Times) -Amnesty International, the organization fighting for the rights of prisoners of conscience, has named George A.J. Siemensma as coordinator to collect information on gays who have been imprisoned because of their homosexuality. Anyone having pertinent information should contact Siemensma at P.O. # **Koch Vetoes Amendment To** 'Gay Bill'

New York (Windy City Times) - In a surprise move last month, Mayor Ed Koch vetoed an amendment that would have seriously weakened New York City's recently enacted gay rights law. The amendment exempted from the equal housing section of the law buildings in which "not more than three families in addition to the owner and the owner's family lived." Koch had previously stated that he would support an amendment exempting owner-occupied apartment buildings with four or less apartments. As worded, the amendment would have permitted expertion of five-unit apartment buildings, which constitute a significant portion of available housing in the city.


### Lesbian Charges ABC With Bias

Washington (Windy City Times) -Dorothy Green, a 37-year-old black lesbian, has filed a \$20 million suit against ABC-TV, charging that while she was employed in a first-level management position with the network she was repeatedly subjected to racial and sex discrimination harassment by subordinates which was allegedly sanctioned and encouraged by ABC management. Green is the third black employee of ABC's Washington news bureau to file a racial and sex discrimination suit against the network this year.

# **Town Threatens** Lesbian Camp

Bad Axe, Mich (Washington Blade) -"Whatyawanabe, -- a recently opened campground for lesbians near this small Michigan town 20 miles south of Lake Huron is facing increasing hostile attacks from local residents led by fundamentalists preacher James Willet and his wife Judy, who have called for its closure. Angry locals have shown their displeasure over the camp's presence by vandalizing the camp and its surroundings, and by calling in numerous bomb and death threats.

## Sloan vs. Fálwell -Round Two Sloan 2 - Falwell 0


In a two year ongoing legal battle, the Reverend Jerry Sloan won a solid victory over his former Baptist Bible College schoolmate, the Reverend Jerry Falwell.

A panel of three judges sitting as an appellate panel of the Sacramento Superior Court found Falwell's appeal of a Sacramento Municipal Court decision which in September, 1985 awarded \$5000 to Rev. Sloan to be "wholly frivilous and totally without merit."

Their decision upheld Sloan's judgement against Falwell and further awarded \$2875 as sanctions against Falwell for bringing a frivilous suit. This now brings the total owed by Falwell to Sloan to \$7875 plus 7% on the \$5000 from September, 1984.

This tale of two Jerrys started in July, 1984 when Falwell appeared on a Sacramento live TV talk show with Sloan in the audience in which Sloan asked Falwell about

a statement he made on the Old Time Gospel Hour about the predominatly gay Metropolitan Community Churches.

Falwell vehemetly denied he had called the M.C.C. "Brute beasts" and, "Thank God, this vile and satanic system will one day be utterly annhilated and there will be a celebration in heaven.

Sloan told Falwell he had the statements on tape. Falwell then offered Sloan \$5000 to produce the tape.

The tape was taken to KCRA-TV, reviewed, and played on two newscasts. All who listened to the tape agreed Falwell owed Sloan \$5000.

Falwell refused to pay when asked to do so by Sloan's attorney, Rosemary Metrailer.

A law suit was filed on 30 November 1984 and papers served on Falwell as he stepped from his private jet as it landed in Sacramento while on a fund raising tour.

At the trial, Sacramento Municipal Court Judge Michael Ullman ruled Sloan proved Falwell had indeed made the statements about M.C.C. and should pay the \$5000. The judge did not see that Sloan use of the

word rejoicing instead of celebration constituted a serious difference in the quotation as everything else was word for word.

Rev. Sloan is the president of the Lambda Community Fund, a nonprofit charitable corporation, which on August 1, 1986 will open, Sacramento's first gay and lesbian community services center. Any profit from the lawsuit will be donated to the center.

# Washington State Seeks Punishment Of Gay Supporters

Seattle (Phila. Gay News) — The Washington state supreme court has cleared the way for a ballot initiative that would overturn the governor's recent executive order barring anti-gay discrimination in the workplace. In addition to overriding Gov. Booth Gardner's executive order, the initiative seeks to punish gay supporters by making it a crime to employ homosexuals in jobs dealing with children, disabled people or senior citizens. The initiative would also impose penalties against state law-makers who vote for gay rights legislation.

# Where Does Your M.A.P. Money Go?

By Tom Boll

When I attend fundraising events or meet with people in our community I'm asked many questions about M.A.P. People want to know what we're doing with the money we receive from fundraising events and donations. They ask if we receive the proceeds from events that are held for us. Some want to know just how we're organized. Do any of our volunteer's or Board members get paid? Since we can't possibly talk to each one of you personally we felt that an article in InStep might help to answer some of your questions and concerns.

First of all I know there is some confusion about the connection between The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin (ARCW), and The Milwaukee AIDS Project. Simply—they are one and the same organization. When it became apparent that M.A.P. had outgrown it's affiliation with The BEST Clinic and needed to become a separate organization it was decided to incorporate under the name of The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin. The Milwaukee Aids Project is the service branch of The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin. We applied for and were granted tax exempt status, all donations are tax deductable.

The ARCW by-laws prohibit any member of The Board of Directors from being payed for any of their time or services, in addition no volunteers can receive any compensation for any of their work.

M.A.P. has a two pronged approach to the AIDS crisis. First, we provide services to persons with AIDS and their significant others. Everything from "Buddies" for emotional and social support to financial assistance, emergency housing, legal assistance, pastoral care, medical referrals and assistance, help applying for whatever assistance is available or simply being there to listen to their problems or concerns.

Our second attack is in the area of education. At this time education is the only way of stopping both the spread of Aids and the hysteria surrounding it. To stop the spread of the virus we have a safer sex campaign. Many of you have seen our posters in

the bars. Please read the posters and take the little tear offs, it's for your health and protection. We also have our sport campaign, volunteers will be hosting Home Based Educational Gatherings which are designed to teach us how Safer Play Reduces Transmission.

Some people have said to me that Aids isn't their problem. They don't know anyone who's had the disease and since they play safe they're not at risk. If you're a gay man or a lesbian AIDS is your concern. There are many people who are and will continue to try to use AIDS as an issue to try to deny us our rights. The only way to stop them from succeeding is to educate the general public about AIDS. It's not Gods punishment, you can't get it from casual contact, it's a Human Disease that causes pain and suffering and kills. That's why our education aimed at the general public is so very important. Our educator, Ben Johnson, gives in service lectures on AIDS to all kinds of groups, law enforcement officers, nurses, teachers, students, Continued on page 10 >

religious groups anywhere that he's asked to speak. We receive dozens of requests for information each month. Susan Dietz, our Executive Director is a member of the Wisconsin AIDS Task Force and speaks at many functions about both AIDS and M.A.P.

We have two other tools we use for educating people about AIDS. We operate a local and state-wide toll-free AIDS Information Lines staffed by trained volunteers. Also, we are in the process of opening an AIDS Library which will have printed, audio and video material about AIDS. The Library will be opened for use by anyone.

We have been very fortunate in that we have received some very generous grants. When government agencies, foundations or religious groups give grant monies they tell just how you must use those funds. We have a great need for funds that can be used for general purposes. Just to continue at our present levels we must raise \$20,000 by the end of the year and \$50,00 by the end of March. '87.

There is much more that needs to be done but right now we simply don't have the money. We would like to be able to provide free volunteer home health aids for our clients, but that would require money for training and for liability insurance. Our emergency housing facility is already too small. A group of very dedicated people is trying to develop a larger more permanent housing unit. We hope that will become a reality, but to run such a facility will take a great deal of money. There are many other things that we need that would help us provide better service to both our clients and the public.

We know that we ask for your help alot, but believe me if we didn't need your help we wouldn't be asking so often. Those donation jars you see in the bars are ours and we do receive the money in them. We are very grateful to all of you who have been holding fundraising events for M.A.P. Members of the M.A.P. Fundraising Committee will attend all fundraising events and are available for whatever assistance is needed. We feel that any business or organization that holds an event for M.A.P. deserves to be thanked publicly for their time, money and effort. From now on we will be submitting to InStep a monthly report on all events that have been held. We have included in this article a complete list of all events held for us from Jan. 1, 1986 thru June 30, 1986. If any of you have any questions about M.A.P., about fundraising or would like to see a copy of our financial statement please give the office a call and we'll answer any of your questions.

# AIDS Treatment Gives Hope

Paris, France (Milw. Journal) — An American patient who had "full-blown AIDS" has responded to treatment involving transfusions from his identical twin and after 10 months apparently is well, a researcher reported to the second International AIDS Congress.

"This is not a breakthrough," physician Anthony S. Fauci of the National Institutes of health in Betherda, Md., cautioned in a speech.

"But combined with what we have heard on the progress towards an AIDS vaccine, it is a small but important building block of knowledge" in the fight against the killer disease, he said.

### How Milwaukee Placed In I.G.B.O. 86 — Las Vegas

I received the final results this week from the Las Vegas hosts of this year's I.G.B.O. tournament. There were 30 bowlers from Milwaukee that vied in a field of 1,008 Gay bowlers from across the United States and Canada. The Las Vegas tournament paid out a total of \$25,926.99 in prize money (\$25 per bowler entry fee). Of that amount, the singles competition paid \$6,399.93 (\$6.32 of the \$25 per person), Team paid \$7,600 (\$7.53 of the \$25), Doubles Competition \$6,427 (\$6.35 of the \$25), All Event Team \$2,460 (\$2.44 of the \$25), All Events Singles \$2110.01 (\$2.08 of the \$25), and special scratch awards of \$300 total.

The singles event paid 99 places, and three Milwaukee bowlers were in the money; Jim R. placed 11th and won \$86.50, David Fre placed 25th for \$62.50, and Tom L. placed 81st for \$28.57.

In the Doubles Event which paved 51 places, five Milwaukeeans cashed; Rick Steiner and Pat Prudlow finished 15th for \$87.50, David Theiss bowling with a Vancouver bowler finished 37th for \$28, and Paul Hasse and Gordon Schuetz finished 43rd for \$52.

No Milwaukee team placed in the top 25 money winners. The closest was 'Less Filling - Tastes Great' that placed 30th. The team was comprised of Dick Krekowski, Tim McCall, Tom L. and Fred Stewart (a former Milwaukeean).

Singles All Events paid 49 places and only 1 Milwaukee bowler cashed; Tom L. finished 41st for \$12. In Team All Events, Milwaukee again missed the cut off, which was thirteen places; the 'Less Filling - Tastes Great' team was the closest Milwaukee contender, they finished 29th.

French workers presented similarly encouraging result of a bone marrow graft from a family member.

Fauci reported that the 34-year-old patient was one of three AIDS victims, each with a healthy, identical twin, on which treatment started 10 months ago. They received the drug Suramin, plus transfusion of healthy lumphocyte cells and bone marrow transplants from their twin. Fauci said Suramin was discovered to be ineffective.

Two of the patients did not respond, and their cases of Kaposi's sarcoma, a cancer typical of AIDS, worsened, he said.

But 10 months later, the third patient "appears completely healthy and is working full time," said Fauci.

His count of T-4 cells, which fight infection and are destroyed by AIDS, has increased and stayed high, and tests can no longer find AIDS virus in his body. Fauci said.

That does not mean it does not exist in a latent form, Fauci cautioned. The patient's Kaposi's sarcoma in his lymph nodes apparently has disappeared.

Fauci said he now planned to stop lymphocyte transfusions "and if after a year the patient is still healthy, we may be able to call that a success," he said.

He said he would not recommend that patients now seek bone marrow transplants, which appear the major factor in the treatment, because of the need for longer study of the first result.

His team believes that the "ideal strategy" of treatment will be to combine a drug that attacks the virus with therapy such as the marrow transplant to restore the body's own immune system.

Fauci said it was not known why the other patients had not responded, but that they might have had a heavier initial viral count, or "their immune response was too far sone to be reconstituted."

### Thoughts About My First Time

I was a little nervous, slightly apprehensive. I had never done it before, and I really didn't know what to expect. Would I know what to do, how to act? Would anyone be watching? If so, how would I feel about that?

With these thoughts in my head, I boarded the bus and was on my way to see, for the first time, the Gay Pride parade in Chicago.

It was already a little questionable as to what I could expect, seeing as I was one of only four lesbians on the bus sponsored by Black and White Men Together, which left from the Wreck Room late Sunday morning. I didn't know my way around Chi-Town, never having been there at all, and so a bus seemed to be the easiest route. We acquired tickets from two of our friends and were thus committed to this thing, a bit to my uneasiness. After all, I knew there was more to Chicago than the parade, namely Halsted Street and its many purveyors of spirits and distilled malt beverages. I was not entirely naive about several of the other passengers' intentions to watch the parade from a barstool.

These thoughts were reinforced immediately upon picking up our second load of passengers at C'est La Vie, as our group organizer informed us all that the bar owner had graciously provided free beer and soda for the ride. "Oh great," I thought. "What have I gotten myself into? I can just see it now... riding on a schoolbus with a bunch of drunken 'girls' screaming out the window. Oh, God..."I could tell, with a glance at my lover seated next to me, that similar notions had occurred to her. Oh, well. We were already here, why not sit back and enjoy it?

And enjoy it we did. The guys were all very good-natured and extremely friendly. I can't stress enough how welcome we were made to feel and the let-it-all-hang-out fun we had with people who, just hours earlier, were complete strangers. I urge other women to make an effort to mix more with the "other half" of our gay population if you don't already do so. It's a real break from some of the less-lighthearted things that go on when

lesbians get together, such as talk about politics and jobs. Every once in awhile, it sure is nice just to forget about all the seriousness one has to deal with every day, and just get crazy and laugh.

The parade itself was more than just another new experience for me. It made me wonder why it had taken me so long to get around to actually going to see it. Now I'm seriously thinking about participating in the one next year. There were many aspects of it that I found interesting.

First of all, I was struck by the sheer number of people turned out for the spectacle. Although I'm sure that at least half the spectators were gay, there were also traditional-type families, replete with baby stroller and lawn chairs, all along the route. I'm aware that for some people, the parade was more of a "freak show" type attraction, but I'd bet money that that wasn't the case for most of them.

Secondly, the diversity of the groups represented in the parade was quite revealing of our gay subculture. The appearance of a new group, Legacy (for gays and lesbians 55 years and older), was especially heartwarming. I've always wished that older gays were more visible to us younger ones. It would greatly help communication, I believe. Another group which made me very happy was the Parents and Friends of Gays.

As musicians, writers, any artist can testify, no matter how loyal one's own expected following is, acceptance from the mainstream of society is very important in helping to verify one's own self-image. Groups such as PFOG help to reinforce this acceptance, thereby helping us as gays to "Move Forward Together," this year's parade theme.

Another thing that stood out in my mind was the political support given the gay community by Chicago's mayor Harold Washington (whose speech at the afterparade rally was, for the most part, cheered heartily) his liason to the gay community, Kit Duffy, and mayoral candidate Jane Byrne. Although I'm sure there was no lack of political maneuvering going on within this structure (who could deny it - it's what they do?) I believe that, on the whole, the support was sincere and more than lip service. I believe





Also, I thought they were just so expensive. I was embarassed to go into a store and buy some. I didn't want people to think I was straight or something. And how awful to have to ask for a box of smalls. Luckily or unluckily, depending on how you look at it, my sex life has dwindled so, that I've now renamed my water bed the Dead Sea. I don't have to buy very many and use them now mostly for practice.

What about kissing? Now I never was one of those people who goes around and kisses every person they may vaguely remember in the bars. But, occassionally I would. that the current AIDS crisis has brought national attention to gays and lesbians as whole, feeling human beings who have lives that include joys, hopes, sorrows and everyday concerns, just like everyone else, and that was very much reflected in the political speeches and writings evidenced on Sunday.

Most of all, however, I must say that the impression that had the greatest overall impact on me was the intense feeling of community and pride as a culture that I saw in the actions and words of nearly all who participated in the parade, and especially at the rally.

As I stood near the stage/speaking platform at the rally, I looked around and was overwhelmed with the reality that, as far as I could see, there were people who were either gay or supportive of the cause of gay liberation. For once, I was part of the majority. I was safe. I was among friends. They were laughing at the same things I was laughing at, for the same reasons. They wanted to see the same legislative reforms I want to see. They were there to show their support for the same ideals in which I believe. It made me smile. And God, that felt good.

Sure, I heard some not-nice remarks from obviously homophobic people along the parade route. I didn't love everyone I met just because they were gay. Some people were obnoxious and a few got out of hand. The picture I paint is not without its lapses in composition. But, as a general rule, June 29, 1986, will stand out in my mind as a day I realized, in a very concrete way, that we are not alone in our quest for acceptance, understanding, love . . . nor are we wrong in wanting (and expecting) those things. Truly, there is power in numbers, and the stronger a voice is, the more likely it is to be heard.

We have a long way to go, but we've got to look back and realize what a tremendous amount of ground we have already covered. Success begets success, and thanks to the efforts of thousands of people who conceived the idea, organized the structure, and executed the reality, the Gay Pride parade continues to affirm that we are, indeed, everywhere.







# "La Cage" Celebrates "We Are What We Are" For The Milwaukee AIDS Project

As announced in a November issue of InStep, 'La Cage Aux Folles' will be presented by the Spotlight series at the PAC from Tuesday, July 15th through Sunday, July 20th. The show will run for eight performances.

The musical which won six 1984 Tony Awards (Broadway's Oscar), including that for Best Musical, is based on the play of the same name. The play by Jean Poiret became the longest running play to be produced in Paris. The film version made in 1979, is the largest grossing foreign film of all time. Not bad for a gay themed work, right?

A representative of the Spotlight Series tells me this is the largest production to have ever been brought by them to Milwaukee. The cast numbers 34, the orchestra 28, and with dressers and technicians—94 people are involved in each production.

Theoni V. Aldredge earned a Tony for her fabulous costumes which number 200 at a cost of \$750,000. (That's three-quarters of a million, guys and girls). The least expensive costume costs \$1,000. The most expensive runs \$7,500.

The plot for those unfamiliar with it centers on the gay couple, Georges and Albin, who run 'La Cage' a night club show lounge in St. Tropez. Georges' son, Jen-Michel, conceived in a one-night experiment with a chorus girl, is about to be married. Their son is dubious about bringing his very straight and super conservative in-laws home to meet the folks (both male of course—one of whom is a drag no less!) Their meeting proves to be hilarious and at the same time packs quite a message.

Harvey Fierstein who also wrote 'Torch Song Trilogy' and adapted 'La Cage' for the musical stage says, "What 'La Cage' comes down to is very simple. Honor thy father and mother." (no matter what the sexual orientation of your parents) The touching "Look

Over There" in the Jerry Herman musical score says this in a most remarkable fashion and is one os the most beautiful songs in the score. Of course, all will be familiar with the anthym "I Am What I Am" and the clear statement that gays have arrived.

To quote from the New York Post review of the show: Just 10 years ago Jean Poiret wrote the original . . . It portrayed homosexuality as a legitimate life-style. It was a play-and then a film-about love. That is part of the reason why 'La Cage' is so moving. Fierstein-has somewhat deepened the original Poiret, chiefly by making it a story about personal acceptance and human dignity ... For me, personally, I think what I love best was the tenderness of story combined with the brashness of its music. But you can, I am sure, find something for yourselves to love in it. If art is a mirror up to nature, then this is art, this is a mirror and this is nature.

So said, Clive Barnes, 'the' critic in New York!

Peter Marshall of "Hollywood Squares" fame stars as Georges. He has quite a background in musical theatre including appearances on Broadway. Keene Curtis portrays

# "PARTING GLANCES" A Witty, Intimate Look At Gay Life Now

"PARTING GLANCES" opens at the Oriental Theatre on July 31st for a three day run through August 2nd. It's a compassionate, witty, refreshing glimpse into the lives of three young gay Manhattanites, one of whom is dying of AIDS, (but it's not an AIDS film, per se). The film transends the usual tendency towards a tearful treatment focusing instead on their love trianlge.

According to Sid Smith of the Chicago Tribune, "Glances" is "probably the best film about gays since the original "La Cage Aux Folles" and is one of the best movies ever on the subject in English".

Writer/Director Bill Sherwood, a newcomer working on a shoestring budget set out to make a film that protrayed gays as real people with individual personalities and indiosyncracies. At the same time, he captures a certain zesty, subcultural bonhomie; one reason the movie plays with such an amiable mix believablity and exhiliration.

It relates in a 24-hour timespan a tale with an insider's feel for the "loft lifestyle" of gay Manhattan while delving inside three dimensional characters with affectional intimacy. It is tender, airy and charming—a contemporary comedy of manners that also is forcibly real—conversations in this film bristle with the instant wit and erratic flow they possess in real life.

Its refreshing to see a gay film which does not deal with coming out and which is not ultimately tragic or a fantasy of a perfect world. This film is about gay life now.

The film screens nightly at 5:45, 7:30, 9:15 with Saturday matinees at 2:15 and 4:00 . . . See it!
