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

Thousands Expected at Historic Gay March

[Windy City Times] - Participants in the National March on Washington for Gay and Lesbian Rights won't converge on Washington for another seven months, but organization for the event is already well underway. Steve Ault, one of three national co-chairs of the march, described the level of activity surrounding the Oct. 11 demonstration as "consistent with an event occuring in the Spring." Ault expects more than 100,000 people, which would make the even "the largest - or a rival to the largest demonstration" ever held in the nation's capitol.

Preparation in 11 regional districts established by the steering committee is ahead of that on the national level, with the exception of the Midwest, according to Ault.

The National Steering Committee represents 11 U.S. regions developed for outreach organizing. Twenty seats are filled by representatives of constitutency groups and national organizations working for lesbian and gay civil rights. The national Steering Committee and the 11 Regional Steering Committees are required to have 50 percent gender parity and to include at least 25 percent people of color to insure their participation on national and regional levels.

At a November, 1986 meeting in New York City, demands and goals of the march were finalized. Following are some of the demands to be made at the March on Washington:

 Legal recognition of lesbian and gay relationships.

 Repeal of all laws making sodomy between consenting adults a crime.

 Issurance of a Presidential order banning anti-discrimination by the Federal Government.

 Passage of the Congressional lesbian and Gay Rights Bill.

 An end to discrimination against People with AIDS or those percieved to have AIDS.

 A massive increase in funding for AIDS education, treatment, research, and patient care, and that these monies come from the defense budget.

 The right to reproductive freedom and an end to sexism; the right to practice our sexuality freely.

 "An end to racism in the U.S. and apartheid in South Africa.

Demonstrations designed to illustrate the legitimacy of these demands and the high level of support for them include a blockade of the Supreme Court, and a lesbian and Gay Congress which will attempt to form a national grass roots representative body. Events endorsed but not sponsored by the march committee include the making of an AIDS quilt, each square of which is embroidered with the name of someone lost to AIDS. performance of lesbian and gay bands and choirs, a conference of S&M organizations, and a national coming out day to be held in June in conjunction with lesbian and gay pride day celebrations around the country.

Wis. Alters AIDS Policy

Reveals names to local agencies

[Milw. Journal]- The State Division of Health decided that local public health agencies are better able to monitor AIDS cases than the state and is now releasing the names of people with AIDS to public health departments.

The decision reverses a 3-year-oldpolicy.

In a letter to the Milwaukee Health Department, Jeffrey Davis, state epidemiologist, listed 24 people in the city who have AIDS. Physicians are required to report the names of AIDS patients to the state.

"The increasing number of cases and the abilities and willingness of LPHA's (local public health agencies) to assist cases in securing services locally makes the LPHA better suited to provide case follow-up," Davis said in the letter to the Health Department here.

In October 1985, Constantine Panagis, commissioner of the Milwaukee Health Department, disclosed that the state was refusing to reveal the names of AIDS patients in the city.

"We have no knowledge of who has AIDS in Milwaukee and therefore we cannot do any contact work or epidemiology," Panagis said at the time. "That makes me angry."

The state had maintained that its policy of refusing to release the names was an effort to "maintain reasonable confidentiality."

Under the new system, local public health departments will be charged with trying to contact people with AIDS to offer them counseling and education and assess their financial, housing and medical needs.

UW Regent Favors Letting Gays Join ROTC

Madison- [Milw. Journal]- A member of the University of Wisconsin System's Board of Regents said he would ask the board to disapprove of discrimination against gays by ROTC.

Regent John Schenian also said he would seek congressional legislation to allow gays to enroll in ROTC.

Gays and Lesbians are barred from military service by federal regulations. Wisconsin law forbids such discrimination.

Patricia Hodulik, a UW attorney. said state law could not pre-empt the federal government on this issue. She cited a 1983 attorney general's opinion on the matter.

The chief of personnel for the Navy. Vice Adm. Dudley Carlson, said in an interview in Madison recently that the Defense Department had no intention of changing its policy.

In all, 1,557 UW System students were enrolled in ROTC during the first semester of 1985-86, and 1,252 during the second semester.

National Gay Groups Defeat Testing Proposal

In a unique demonstration of organizational cooperation and coalition, gay and lesbian groups and their allies united to defeat the repressive calls for mandatory HIV antibody testing proposed by the Centers For Disease Control (CDC) in early February and debated at a national conference in Atlanta on February 24th and 25th. The conference soundly rejected the use of mandatory testing programs, and strongly embraced the need for anonymity of test results and for the passage of anti-discrimination protections for people with AIDS and AIDS

Gay Men's Health Crisis and the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force played central roles in organizing the gay community's response to the CDC proposals, other organizations playing major roles were Lambda Legal Defense & Education Fund, National Gay Rights Advocates, the Gay/Lesbian Rights Project of the American Civil Liberties Union, the AIDS & Employment Project of the Employment Law Center, and the AIDS Action Council.

Major developments at the CDC conference included: the admission by CDC and public health officials that mandatory testing would not be in the best approach to launching a prevention program; general agreement on the need for a massive education and prevention program funded by the federal government; agreement that voluntary testing should be more widely available but that it should be coupled with counseling, and strict confidentiality; and broad support for the passage of legislation protecting individuals who are antibody positive or who have AIDS.

Gay activists celebrated the defeat of the proposals, but remain wary of the CDC's future actions. "We blocked this particular initiative, and won a remarkable endorsement of anti-discrimination protections," said Tim Sweeny, Deputy Director of Policy for Gay Men's Health Crisis, "But we must not let down our guard. The real challenge ahead is to translate the consensus of this conference into increased funding for research and treatment, safer sex education, and legislation protecting people with AIDS related conditions."

AIDS Quarantine Debated in California

San Francisco- [Milw. Journal]- A plan to quarantine AIDS patients who "knowingly and willingly infect others is being called a last resort by some health officials and criticized by others who said it would drive people away from treatment.

The Disease Control Committee of the Califronia Conference of Local Health Officers did not vote on the proposal, but agreed to consider modifications to it at a meeting March 19.

Gays and AIDS patients who were present said the measures would constitute civil rights violations, while other critics contended the quarantine plan would damage attempts to control the disease.

"Our emphasis must be on counseling to change their bahavior. Isolation would be a final step in the rare event of a recalcitrant patient," said Carl Smith of the Alameda County Health Department and one of the authors of the plan.

Thomas Peters, associate director of health in San Francisco, said the isolation plan appeared to "give out exactly the wrong message to the general public about AIDS and effective ways of controlling AIDS."

"The one decent thing you can say about the AIDS epidemic...is each of us has the power to avoid being infected," he said.

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GROUP NOTES

A Milwaukee Lesbian/ Gay Community Center?

[CCBA Newsletter]- Will we ever have a gay/lesbian community center in Milwaukee? This is a question that has been explored many times over the past years. Since the former GPU Farwell center, and an initial survey of the community some 5 years ago (which showed a definite interest in such a facility), nothing has been accomplished. It must be noted, however, that the Cream City Foundation (CCF) has remained committed to the concept.

CCBA member Mark Behar recently invited leaders of the lesbian/gay community to tour what used to be the Franklin Boys' Club (near Brady Street, on Franklin). In addition to a great gym, swimming pool, and innumerable meeting rooms, there is a kitchen facility and a theatre setting with room for 300. All those who attended the open house saw enormour possibilities to the facility. CCBA Membership Chair Sue Jurgens said, "This is a great place which our community could use right now to help us bring a more positively oriented life spirit to our community."

Many of the same leaders met on Feb. 18th to discuss the next steps. In addition to CCF opening a special account to handle gifts to insure a professionally prepared fasibility study, money will have to be raised to pay the mortgage holder rent (with an option to buy) for 3 to 6 months, in order to "protect" the property from other purchasers. CCBA member Pat Reddeman will be introducing the group to Bob Cook, from the State of Wisconsin, who will help the leaders determine the scope necessary for a valid study.

More and more groups and individuals are becoming public and private role models for people. Someday no disease label will be put on us as a group of people. We won't have to fight so hard for acceptance. It will be given to us just as it is given to people in the strait world whose relationships are called healthy and worthy of the approval of their fmaily and friends because they are loving relationships between two people.

For that to become reality we HAVE to work together: we HAVE to support one another and those people or groups who are helping us find better lives and acceptance; we HAVE to build a sense of peace within ourselves; we HAVE to accept our "normalcy," our wholeness, our strength as good people.

When we do that we won't be able to wonder whether we're sick or bad - and no one else will wonder either! We will know we're o.k. and will have people we can look up to as role models.


Society will be able to look at our organizations and see us working together, having fun, joining in causes we believe in, being proud people, building strong lasting relationships as proof that any doubts they had were unfounded and they will support and accept us.

Educating ourselves and them comes before acceptance. Too many of us think we're sick and bad when we aren't. Some of us may act stupid and sick and may not realize the harm we are causing to others.

We have to learn to support people who behave in ways that help us and ignore those who hurt us until they learn that we don't like or approve of their behavior.

That's the way change happens in the world. If we were sick or bad or diseased as a group of people we wouldn't be able to make those changes happen. We wouldn't learn from our mistakes like we are. We wouldn't be building a sense of community. cooperation and pride like we have been the past few years.

Being Gay a disease? Definitely not! Our pains and problems can make us stronger and better people than those whose life may be easier because they are more readily accepted and understood. Sometimes when a group of people work together for the benefit of the group, each person in the group becomes better.

I hear so often that being Gay is wrong, sick, bad, harmful and other such terms. Is it bad? Is it sick? Is it some kind of disease or sickness? I know sometimes I feel awiful that I'm not accepted as easily as my strait friends. I know my family wouldn't accept a lover of mine as well as they would my strait sister's lover. Is this a bad lifestyle? Are we sick people?

Scared Sick in Milwaukee

Dear Scared,

No. Being a gay man or woman is not a disease in any way. It is a normal way of life, a normal process of relationship building.

There are many diseases attached to it just as there are for the strait community and their lifestyles. But our lifestyle, our relationships, our sexual activities are not a disease.

The disease is the paranola so many of us feel about discovery.

The disease is the pain inside us that won't let us trust people or build the relationships we want.

The disease is our fear and mistrust of one another.

Those diseases have worked against us since the beginning of time.

The disease of our fear keeps us and our wholeness as people from being accepted and understood.

If all people see or hear about are the people in our lifestyle who are sick, their only real choice is to label this a sick lifestyle and us sick people in it.

We tend to follow patterns we see around us and believe whatever the majority tells us. If our only role models behave badly we tend to follow their example no matter how badly it may hurt us.

Abused children tend to become abusers. People with alcoholics in their family are more likely than others to become alcoholics. People who see poor relationships and habits around them are prone to develop those same poor relationships and habits. Society judges us — and we judge ourselves — based on what we see and hear.

Our lifestyle is not a disease and doesn't in and of itself cause our fears or the sick feeling we sometimes get when we contemplate our future and potential for relationships that last. Our relationships aren't what caused society's beliefs about us except that they saw or heard of the poorest of our relationships and the sicket people among us who behave badly.

If we had had more role models in the past who were strong people building good relationships this might not have happened. But the fears, the closet, the behind-closed-door good relationships and the public lifestyles of bars, promiscuity and porn preceded any one of us who is living this lifestyle today.

Now that more people are living openly and are learning to express the good parts of us as a group of people, society's views are changing and acceptance is coming.

Right now we're still in a middle ground between the pure hell of the past and the heaven of acceptance and understanding.

MAP DAY at Film Fest

The Education Committee of the Milwaukee AIDS Project is pleased to announce plans a large-scale educational and informational program to be held at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee Union on Tuesday, April 7, in conjunction with UWM's Lavender Commitment.

Being held as a part of the Gay Pride Week events at the UWM campus, the purpose of MAP DAY is to educate and inform the entire UWM campus community with the latest information concerning AIDS, the latest medical and diagnostic treatments, implications involving legal and insurance matters, and especially alternative, preventive measures to be taken by both the gay as well as heterosexual communities.

This video, which has aired on PBS, is a documentary of San Francisco's Theater Rhinoceros serio-comic production of "The AIDS Show...", which deals with AIDS on a non-medical level, stressing the personal effects of this disease on friends, lovers, family, etc.

From 11:30 a.m. until 2 p.m. in the 8th Note Coffeehouse adjacent to the Union concourse, Education Committee volunteers will present a series of educational workshops and a series of videos. Video presentations to include AIDS UPDATE: PROFILE OF AN EPIDEMIC narrated by Ed Asner and the MAP-produced, AIDS IN MILWAUKEE.

To conclude MAP DAY, the Education Committee has arranged screenings of Arthur Bressan's BUDDIES to open the Fifth Annual Milwaukee Gau/Lesbian Film Festival, Bressan's film tells the story of Robert, a 32-year-old AIDS patient in a New York Hospital, and David, Robert's 25-year-old volunteer "buddy." The first feature about the AIDS crisis. BUDDIES is an unflinching, no-holds barred confrontation of the emotional, sexual and political dimensions of its subject matter. In its own insightful way. Bressan manages to touch at the heart and soul of being gay, in an honest representation of the ordinary concerns and challenges of gay lives.

Milw. Ballet

The Milwaukee Ballet offered a recent sampling of three ballets; one of which included the world premiere of a new piece entitled VIRGIN FOREST, created by Margo Sappington. The other two, MAESTRO and THE RIVER, were included in their repertoire once again.

MAESTRO was an interesting work choreographed by Gerard Charles, a former featured dancer with the Milwaukee Ballet. The return of his wife, the gifted Catherine Yoshimura, to dance as a guest artist in both this and other pieces was a welcome plus-she danced superbly throughout!

Charle's work came to life in the finale, but the four dance segments which built to it lacked clear direction to stand on their own even with the distinct costuming and set changes to propel the piece. Thus, the sum of the pieces made a convincing whole but the individual dances came up short.

Alvin Ailey's remarkable piece THE RIVER, based on Duke Ellington's music was marvelous and for me the high point of the evening. With minimal costumes and dramatic lighting, combined with terrific dancing made for a very special ballet.

Lastly came the world premiere of the commissioned work VIRGIN FOREST choreographed by Ms. Sappington based on the paintings of Henri Rousseau. However, as THE RIVER brought clear dance to simplicity in set and costume, VIRGIN FOREST was the antithesis. If anything, VIRGIN FOREST was more a multi-visual spectacle taking one "into the jungle." With the set continually moving and animals appearing and disappearing, one clearly felt if one

had been propelled into a wild tropical environment. However, there seemed to be little if any clearly developed dance to measure up to so strong a visual picture.

A number of Rosseau paintings became motifs for specific dances and characters. However, a potpourri of Rousseau's jungle paintings, rich though they be, were hardly enough of a focus to hold tegether such a piece.

Sappington has created other works based on artists and their paintings. I couldn't help notice a similarity in creation to that of Seurat, the painter in Chicago this summer. Artists, their characters, and styles can provide a rich environment from which to spawn other pieces such as SUNDAY IN THE PARK..., but the VIRGIN FOREST was not one such successful piece.

Do not misunderstand me, I'm pleased that the Milwaukee Ballet attempts new works. I'b be sorely disappointed with entire seasons of the tried and true only. Keep trying and risking!

Ms. Oxenberg is presently in postproduction with her first full-length feature film, Thank You and Good Night. A new comedy short by Ms. Oxenberg, Louise's Tidy Tips will air on NBC's Saturday Night Live in a few weeks. The evening will also include selections from A Comedy In Six Unnatural Acts and Home Movie.

centuries, was now to become totally realistic. For our purposes, this is the most important change for it allows us to see what life at Akhetaten was like.

To Akhenaten, the new faith for which he was prophet, was important above all. The empire and the army could see to themselves and the angry priests thereby gained an ally — the military who had a vested interest in imperial expansion.

Akhenaten paid little heed. He gloried in the worship of his god, wrote hymns to him — one of which may have inspired the 104th Psalm— and fell in love with someonewho, for the first time in his life, returned it. As one modern historian, Donald Reford, comments, "the evidence shows that it was a homosexual relationship."

His name was Smenkhkare. He was said to have strongly resembled Tutankhamon and the carvings show that this was so. How beautiful, how lovely he must have been.

Even now we can see them. A relief in Berlin shows the two naked with Akhenaten, his arm lovingly about Smenkhkare's shoulder chucking him under the chin. The pleasure on the youth's face is obvious. Another shows Smenkhkare pouring Akenaten's wine and yet another shows them kissing.

Can't you almost feel it thousands of years later? Akhenaten, a man who people looked at and thought a freak, had now the love of a wonderfully handsome, beautiful young man for whom the Pharaoh's physical appearance didn't seem to matter at all. Within that ugly body, Smenkhkare somehow had seen that there was a man worth all the love and devotion his heart could give him.

In as many ways as he could, Akhenaten showed his love. He appointed Smenkhkare his co-regent and gave him the formal title of "Beloved of Akhenaten". To show that he stood in Nefertiti's place, he gave his beloved her reign name, "The Beautiful One is Come". Nefertiti herself was banished to a palace in the northern part of the city.

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Meanwhile the forces against the Pharaoh continued to build. One suspects that it was because of their preoccupation with the new faith then anything else. perhaps had they returned to Thebes, observed the conventions, respected the

power of the priesthood and tended to the needs of the empire, what they were to each other night have been ignored. They did not do any of this and things collapsed around them.

From bits and pieces we can speculate as to what happened. The priests and the army gathered their forces, planning to kill the Paraoh and his lover and place Tutankhamon on the throne. Smenkhkare realized what was happening and raced south to Thebes to try and retrieve the situation. He was too late. Both he and his royal lover were murdered. Modern analysis of their mummies indicates that they died almost simultaneously if hundreds of miles apart.

In the aftermath, "King Tut" was hustled back to the capital to assume the traditional role of Pharaoh while every effort was made to blot out the memories of Akhenaten, the heretic king and the beautiful Smenkhkare, his lover.

As with all such attempts, they were not successful. Many of the carvings remain, mute testimony of the love of these two gay men for each other. Perhaps the most touching piece of evidence was not uncovered until 1901 when Smenkhkare's coffin was found in the Valley of the Kings. On its lid were these words addressed to his beloved:

"May I breath the sweet breath that comes from thy mouth. May I see thy beauty daily. Mayest thou call my name for eternity."

The romantic in me believes his prayer was answered.

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celebration of the rich history of gay men and lesbians in the America prior to the Stonewall riots of 1969. Comprehensive and using generous doses of humor, the film utilizes interviews. archival footage, and clips from Hollywood films to trace gay culture from the closeted 1920's to the more liberal 1980's, Lesbian novelist Rita Mae Brown narrates. Before Stonewall will be screened at 7:00 p.m. and 9:15 p.m. Included at 8:40 p.m. is Lucy Winer's Silent Pioneers. Through profiles of eight gay men and lesbians, Silent Pioneers' portrays the quiet heroism of a generation that lived when homosexuality was a virtual underground subculture, not tolerated by maintream society.

The second week of the festival begins on Tuesday, April 14th with two widely divergent comedies. First, Bewildered Youth, a 1950's German anti-gay film which both unintentionally hilarious and at the same time frightening. A recently re-discovered film. Bewildered Youth presents a Reefer Madness-like hysteria which is strangely enough, not so unlike that which has emerged in full force of the New Right. Entertaining as camp, the film is important historically of how gay men and lesbians have been portrayed, most stereotypically, in the past. Bewildered Youth is fascinating in just how far we've come to be portraved on film. Dubbed in English. The delightful, Halloweenie, a humorous twelve minute documentary of comic Bob Lyss will be shown at 9:00 p.m. Screenings of Bewildered Youth are at 7:00 p.m. and 9:15.

Wednesday, April 15 and Thursday, April 16 conclude week two with Donna Deitch's breakthrough first feature film, Desert Hearts. Based on Jane Rule's 1961 novel, Desert of the Heart, Deitch's love story is a marvelous, affectionate, and sensual celebra-


tion of the lesbian lifestyle.

The third and final week of this year's festival opens on Tuesday. April 21 with two Milwaukee premieres. First, at 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m., Spanish director Eloy de la Iglesia's El Diputado [The Deputy]. This political thriller follows Robert Obrea, a married man who becomes involved with street hustlers. Running for Secretary General of the Socialist Party, Robert has his affairs discovered by the right-wing secret police. A powerful film, The Deputy offers insight into Spain's changing political, cultural and sexual mores. Laurie Lund's Together and Apart will be shown at 8:55.

Wrapping up this year's festival on Wednesday, April 22 and Thursday, April 23 is Bill Sherwood's heroic, funny, and romantic Parting Glances. The story concerns two lovers, Robert, who is about to leave for two years in Africa, and Michael, left behind and faced with caring for his friend Nick, a musician who has AIDS. Parting Glances is about caring, working at love affairs, friendships, and life. Shown at 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.

OUR STORY

Two men stood together on a balcony looking out over the multitudes of people below them. One was tall, perhaps in his late 20's or early 30's. The other beside him, a youth in his middle to late teens. We can be fairly sure it was a sunny day. It's almost always sunny in Egypt. We can also be sure that there was a large crowd in the courtyard below the balcony because the older man was the 18th Dynasty Pharaoh, Akhenaten, king of Upper and Lower Egypt, sovereign of the East, lord of the Two Lands.

The younger man whose name was Smenkhkara, was there because Pharaoh had made him co-ruler. Some historians think that he was Akhenaten's brother. Others, that he was a servant who had caught the king's eye. Whatever the case, modern scholars agree that he was Akhenaten's lover.

The story behind this pair, the first homosexuals who can be authenticated, is one of the strangest and yet most beautiful in Egypt's long history. The great Egyptologist, James Breasted, calls Akhenaten

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"The first individualist in history." Perhaps this quality came from the fact that he was, physically, so decidedly different. In a land where people admired slender, well-formed human bodies, Akhenaten was little short of grotesque. He had an elongated skull, huge fleshy lips, slanting eyes, narrow shoulders with large pot belly and enormous hips and thighs mounted on legs that would have done justice to a stork.

Was there any other difference? In his early years, we don't know. But we can be certain of the fact that there was no joy in Egypt or among the royal family at the thought of his succeeding to the throne of his mighty warrior father. Amenhotep III. Nowhere does his picture appear on his father's many monuments as it should have done. Nevertheless, when Pharaoh "went west" as they said in thos days, Akhenaten became ruler in his stead.

For the next seven years we hear nothing of the new Pharaoh except for the fact that he was married to Nefertiti. Her bust with its uncounted reproductions, makes her proud, yet chilly beauty, familiar to everyone today. At the time she was clearly the favorite of the people and the most powerful of the two. In sculptures she appears twice as often as her husband. There were four children, but there was doubt, then and now, if any of them were by him.

Then, with seeming suddenness, in 1370 B.C., the court left the capital, Thebes. The reason for the departure was that Akhenaton had conceived of a new religion; the first monotheistic faith upon the earth. As with the Roman Emperor Constantine centuries later, the new faith required a new capitol. It was located 200 miles from idol-ridden, priest-dominated Thebes and was called Akhetaten, Horizon of the Sundisk. There Akhenaten established himself leaving the priests and Amon-Ra and the other gods to kill their fleece the people as they had done for eons.

We can imagine the horror and consternation of the established clergy from their later reactions but there was even more for them to swollow. In a society that was as unchanged as the cliffs along the Nile, Akhenaten acted as a desert whirlwind, By his order, art, which had been stylized for

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BOOKS

by Matthew Brown

This is to be the first in a series of book reviews written for In-Step magazine. Before I can get you to trust my notions of what a good book is, it's only fair that I give you an idea of what those notions are.

Simply stated, my principles of review are that the people, and the story be believable, and the situations possible. The style of writing should be natural and without any artificial embellishments. That means that unless an author is Earnest Hemmingway, he or she, should not try to imitate Hemmingway. When I'm reading a gay novel, I don't want to find myself reading detailed descriptions of sexual encounters, I'll save those moments for Torso or InTouch magazine. In future columns, I'll give you some examples of novels that I

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find to be disappointing for the above reasons.

With this in mind, let's turn to the actual review.

The Lost Language of Cranes by David Leavitt (Knopf Publications, \$17.95) is the best and most recent example to come across my desk as to what "gay" literature should be. The story is clean, without unncessary embellishments standard in gay lit. No one in the story is exceedingly rich, handsome or hung. The characters are normal people in normal situations. Phillip is a young gay man who works as a copy editor for a romance publishing house in New York. His admission of his sexuality is the catalyst that brings his father out of the closet. The author has stated in previous reviews that to him the most horrifying experience would be if his father would have been gay. That idea served as the inspiration for Lost Language.

All the people that I have recommended this book to, except for one, have returned with an enthusiastic appraisal of the work. The only objecting voice thought that it was too depressing. Lost Language of Cranes is not a light, happy novel. It is however, a novel that closely mirrors our own existence. It has moments of warmth intermingled with moments of sadness. Each of the characters in the book I've met somewhere before; from Phillip's agonizing mother, to his best friend, a black lesbian named Jerene, to each of the minor characters that Phillip meets.

David Leavitt's writing style is clean and shows attention to detail that evades many older authors. (David is only 23). Even the New York Times, one of the nation's most homophobic

You can bitch about your lover, talk about your job, tell coming out stories or just camp with people who haven't heard your stories ten times already.



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The BEST Clinic is a volunteer-run, non-profit organization, supported primarily by your tax-deductible donations.

Gay bars are not ideal social environments for all of us. They can intimidate shy people, make the lonely even lonelier. Alcoholic personalities can be too easily seduced by the party. Nor do they fill all the social and cultural needs we have as individuals, and those of us who don't avail ourselves to other facets of our community are missing the richness of it. Interestingly enough, it is often those very same people who say, "I never go to gay bars," that never go anywhere else.

Never mind that the reason I'm talking to her is that we've seen each other often enough in this very same bar to say hi. Never mind that every customer that walks in knows her name. Never mind that the bartender not only knows her name, where she lives and works, the state of her current relationship, but will also cash personal checks without I.D. She never goes to gay bars - sure.

Wisconsin's gay community is lucky to have a wide variety of social, political, and cultural organizations

and businesses that support, protect and work hard for our right to be. Any of the organizations could not have been formed or continue to grow without the support of those bar owners and employees who volunteer their time, energy, creativity, and space to hold benefits to raise the money needed.


