



AIDS effort would keep names secret

Madison, WI [Journal]- Public health workers would be required to destroy the record of names of sexual partners of AIDS victims within 60 days under the searchout provisions of Gov. Thompson's program to slow the spread of the disease.

Thompson announced the \$495,300 proposal Wednesday, saving its enactment would combat "a potential threat to the entire population."

The seven-point program includes \$112,200 to locate the sexual partners of people who have contracted the disease and refer them to health agencies for testing and counseling.

The search would be voluntary and confidential, Thompson said. "It just doesn't work if it's mandatory," he said.

As outlined by Thompson and officials of the State Department of Health and Social Services, health officials would contact people known to be infected with AIDS and encourage them to find and notify past sexual partners. If the AIDS victim is will ing to name sexual partners but unwilling to track them down, the victim could give the names to the health officials. The officials then would attempt to find the partners and refer them for testing and counseling.

The names would remain confidential, said Timothy Cullen, secretary of the department. Only the staff person assigned to the case would know the names; there would be no central file, Cullen said. The staff person would be required to destroy the record of the names after 60 days.

State Rep. David Clarenbach (D-Madison), an advocate of gay rights legislation, praised Thompson's propsal as "an important first step." He said he was pleased that the program to track down sex partners of AIDS victims would be voluntary and confidential. "If it were mandatory, you would guarantee the failure of the program," Clarenbach said

At a news conference annoucing the proposal, Thompson said the program

would emphasize education and prevention, but would stop short of making condoms available in public schools.

Alternative Families In Madison

The Madison Institute for Social Legislation has announced its campaign to pass an Alternative Families Ordinance in Madison, Wisconsin. The announcement comes as a result of draft ordinance language released by the City Attorney's Office, according to MISL Board Vice President Linda Amsler, who indicated that the draft "satisfies the basic guidelines established by MISL in considering alternative families coverage." Extension of employee-sponsored health care benefits to family partners, equal housing opportunities, and family discount memberships are among the benefits that would be extended to couples in a "relationship of mutual support, caring and commitment" registered with the City Clerk.

The campaign will include a broad-based organizing effort, according to Amsler, as well as an intensive fundraising drive set to bring in \$5,000 in grass roots pledges to cover partial costs of the campaign.

AIDS & Murder

Mineola, N.Y. [Milw. Journal]- A murder defendant who said he went into a rage when a male lover told him he had AIDS has wound up pleading guilty to manslaughter. The prosecutor said he accepted the plea bargain because he feared the jury would feel sympathy toward the defendant and acquit him.

Lorenzo Owens' plea to first-degree manslaughter came after a prosecutor's revelation that Owen's girlfriend had told

him outside court that she had sex with Owens six hours after the April 20, 1986, killing. She said Owens never mentioned that he could have been exposed to the fatal

Owens, 20, had admitted using a kitchen knife to slit the throat of longtime friend Kenneth Grice, 24, in Grice's home shortly after the two had sex. He said he went into a rage when Grice told him he had AIDS.

Asst. Dist. Atty. William Dempsey, who prosecuted the case, said he thought permitting the plea was the right thing to do.

"I think the potential feeling for sympathy for this defendant was enormous," he said. "I don't think the defendant operated under emotional distress. But the jury might."

"He had sex with someone who had AIDS and he didn't know it, and he apparently turned around and did the same thing," said juror William Teeley.

When Owens is sentenced in April, he could be sentenced to as little as two to six years or as much as 25 years in jail.

Owen's girlfriend testified last week. But Dempsey said she did not tell him until later that she had had sex with Owens shortly after his own sexual encounter with Grice.

"I almost fell off the chair," Dempsey said.

Owens, who had been living on the streets of New York City until he turned himself in weeks after the killing, said that on that morning, Grice told him he "wanted to go to bed... Afterward, he said there's something he wanted to tell me... He had tested positively for AIDS.

"I told him I was involved with a young lady. I was getting very upset, We started tussling. I cut his throat," Owens testified.

Gays in Dutch Military

The Hague, Netherlands [Sun Times]-Gays are setting up their own organization in the Dutch armed forces and even the Defense Ministry thinks it is a good idea.

Two majors, an infantry captain and a noncommissioned officer are behind the plan to establish a foundation called Homosexuality and the Armed Forces to

promote the interests of gay and lesbian military personnel.

The founders want to ensure that homosexuals are not discriminated against when seeking promotion and seek to overcome any stigma attached to being a gay soldier.

They say they will also have to tackle criticism from an unlikely quarter — radical Dutch homosexuals who are anti-military and need convincing that gay soldiers, sailors and airmen want help, too.

Since 1974, the Dutch military has not rejected conscripts on the grounds of homosexuality as part of a drive to ensure that the 71,400-member armed forces reflect civilian society.

Surprisingly, news of the foundation came to light in the official ministry newspaper, "Defensiekrant," which published a detailed article about the group, printed a photograph of the gay majors and gave the names and addresses of key organizers.

Gretchen Rowe, 14, also told jurors that her father and brother often argued about her brother's drug use and "homosexual tendencies."

John S. Rowe, 19, is charged with murdering his mother, Theadora J. Rowe, and attempting to murder his father and sister on July 9, 1986.

Rowe has pleaded not guilty to the charges. He claims he was either intoxicated or insame at the time of the shootings. His sister and father have supported him, claiming he has used drugs for many years.

nabbed two Fort Worth-area men after private investigators acting on a tip spotted the goods on a contestant in a female impersonator contest.

Sgt. J.N. Oakerson said the furs and dresses had been stolen from three area stores. The private investigator attended two nights of performances in a pageant at Baby's nightclub.

"The dress was stunning, but he looked terrible in it," said an employee at Baby's.

The investigator alerted police who arrested a 19-year-old man wearing a black cocktail dress with metal mesh and rhinestones. The man was also wearing a blond wig. Another 20-year-old man was also arrested.

The men were later released on bond.

"The Wedding" in D.C.

Washington, D.C.- On March 1, the Coordinating Committee for the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights received a report outlining the basic plans for The Wedding for October 10. 1987. The Wedding is a national demonstration officially sponsored by the National March on Washington to emphasize the demand that lesbian and gay domestic partners in committed same-sex relationships be entitled to the same rights as married heterosexual couples. The demonstration will include a non-sectarian union ceremony to celebrate existing on-going relationships followed by a reception for the participants, guest, sponsors and media representatives.

The report was presented by Carey Junkin representing COUPLES, Inc. This Los Angeles based group is the National Organization for the Advancement of Lesbian and Gay Couples.

The goal of The Wedding is to have at least one thousand couples celebrate their existing on-going committed relationships in such a way to draw attention to the March demand for couples' rights. The Wedding is not intended to be a marriage ceremony for new couples, nor will the organizers restrict participation by defining couples or acceptable relationships.

Michael Lisowski and Bill Meunier are two people who have contributed in many ways over the years. Bill has not only been involved in gay sports, but served in many positions in the Gay People's Union. He has also led the community in involvement in political campaigns and politics in general, something many others in our community shirk. Mike not only remains the Chair of the GPU hotline, the only active remaining service of GPU, but is in charge of Gay Youth Milwaukee, and has been national co-chair of Black and White Men Together. Mike is also involved in the establishment of a gay/lesbian cable network for Milwaukee.

Rons Thate a/k/a Rona, is not only the manager of CCBA member business the M & M Club, but is a founding member of the Fest City Singers. The number of organizations that Ron has been a part of, the number of lesbian/gay benefits that he has performed for, are far too many to count.

Clarence Germershausen, known to almost all only as John Clayton, is owner and operator of C'est la Vie, one of the older Milwaukee gay bars. In addition to running several other business ventures, John has been a constant supporter. In addition, when people have gone to John for needs ranging from housing to being bailed out of jail, John was and is always there.

Bob Schmidt is owner and operator of CCBA member businesses the M & M Club and The Glass Menagerie. Bob has served (and continues to serve) on many organization Boards, including the Brady East STD Clinic. Bob has also been there for many people in need, whether of a job, a bail-out, or any other thing possible.

In addition to these five living major contributors to our community, this year we are also making posthumous enrollments in the Hall of Fame. CCBA only regrets that we were not able to present these awards to these individuals in person.

Edwin Schlessinger, known as Ed S. died in 1986 at the age of 65. Ed was a helping hand to numerous gay men and lesbians who had alcohol and drug problems. He was a founder and supporter of "gay" A.A. and N.A. groups, both locally and nationally. He was the founding director of the Calano Club.

Dale Sprang died in 1987 at the age of 41, due to inoperable colon cancer. An employee of Wisconsin Bell with his life partner Richard Dobranski, Dale fought for equal employment treatment well before it became fashionable. Dale was involved with many organization and groups, right up to the time of his death. In addition to serving on the first Governor's Council on Lesbian and Gay Issues in the State of Wisconsin, Dale was a founding member of Dignity Milwaukee, the lesbian/gay Catholic group.

Anti-Discrimination Major '87 Emphasis for Foundation

The Cream City Foundation raises funds and in turn grants the funds to area Gav organizations who need money to build a Quality Community for our area Gay men and women.

Lambda Rights Network

Wisconsin's newest gay/lesbian organization, the Lambda Rights Network, was organized in December in response to the election of Tommy Thompson (and the potential for loss of gains made under the previous Earl administration) and to fight the upcoming so-called "Rawhide Amendment" to Wisconsin's "Gay Rights Bill" as well as other erosions of our rights as gay and lesbian citizens of Wisconsin.

The Rawhide Boys Ranch of New London, refuses to hire unmarried, gay/ lesbian, or non-Christian individuals as house parents in its program to rehabilitate male juvenile offenders. They are spearheading a campaign that would exempt non-profit organizations from current state laws that ban discrimination on the basis of religion, sexual orientation and marital status, Last year alone, Rawhide received \$525,000 in state funding. If passed by the current or future legislature, the "Rawhide Amendment" would allow your tax dollars to be used to promote discrimination.

The Lambda Rights Network is working to stop this and other damaging legislation aimed at eroding our rights. They urge you to express your opposition to the "Rawhide Amendment" by calling your State Representative and Senator at 1-800-362-9696 on the Legislative hotline. They will tell you the name of your representative and senator if needed. Leave a message that you are opposed to any attempt to change Wisconsin's non-discrimination laws. at PO Box 8952, Madison, 53707. Lambda urges you to also involve friends and family in doing the same.

Milw. Gay/Lesbian Center Studied

[In Step]- A "Franklin Center" Ad Hoc Committee gathered last week to discuss the possibility of forming a Milwaukee Gay and Lesbian Community Services Center. This group is doing very preliminary planning and dicussion of the potential for such a site.

According to a group member, Ralph Navarro, the main question the group has looked at so far is "Can it pay for itself?" According to Ralph, those assembled talked about working possibilities that need to be studied. Early committee feelings believe it should be a "For Profit Concept" that would be a combination Social Services Center with business options, and have enough spaces for all G/L organizations that have meeting space needs

A governence model of a combination of stock holders, tenants, and "Friends of the community" elect the board of directors along with advisory groups, formed by many of our community organizations, was also discussed.

According to Ralph, this early planning committee must first decide what to study. and then hire someone to do a good feasibility study. Ralph estimates that would require contributions of about \$5 to \$10,000 for a thorough study.

Possible components of the Center could be athletic activities (there is already a fully equipped gym and pool available at the proposed site). There could be scuba lessons, volleyball, basketball, in-door tennis, workout rooms, etc. The facilities would probably best be run by a business that would lease that section of the building

and then be a tenant, and assume liability for its operation of these athletic facilities.

There is also a Theatre/Auditorim seating 300, that could be used for film showings, theatre/entertainment groups, the Fest City Singers, special speakers and events, etc. There is also a fully-equipped kitchen and cafeteria area that would be ideal to lease out to a small restaurant and catering service.

The proposed center could be used for businesses that would be resources for their tenants in the building (i.e. Answering service, secretarial service, printing, PO Boxes and mail forwarding). Other potential use is by the BEST Clinic, the GPU library, storage space rental, and a Bingo hall. Business could work with each other, as well as draw in outside business.

As Navarro says "These are all possibilities, nothing is settled yet, but first we have to decide if the whole concept is feasible, and we are wide open to other input and suggestions.

Chicago Gay Pride Parade Plans

Gay Pride Week in Chicago culminates with the 18th Annual Parade and Rally which is scheduled for Sunday, June 28th. The theme for the parade is "Proud, Strong, United!" This theme was selected at an annual national meeting of Pride Week Coordinators.

Last years 120 different registered parade units, representing over 140 different organizations, business and individuals participated in the parade and rally. For the third year in a row, the parade will be listed as an official city event in the "Neighborhood Festivals" brochure distributed widely in Chicago.

Annually, groups, businesses and individuals from Milwaukee, Madison, and the rest of Wisconsin make the trek to Chicago to participate in this exciting, exhilirating event. The vastness of the crowd gathered to participate in and watch is at times awesome.

Floats, decorated vehicles, cars, marching units and individual marchers are all welcome in the parade procession, provided parade guidelines are adhered to. Entry fees paid by participants (individuals need not pay a fee) help the parade committee obtain necessary street and park permits, for sound equipment and stages for the rally site.

This year the parade lines up at a new corner and has a new disbanding area and rally site then in past years. In order to give the line up area much needed room, the parade will begin lining up at the Halsted and Broadway intersection, two blocks north of the former Addison and Halsted site. At 2 pm the parade will step off and turn south onto Broadway to the Clark and Diversey intersection where it will officially end. Passengers on floats and other

marchers are then urged to proceed on foot east on Diversey to the new rally site in Lincoln Park.

Stop Rawhide

Dear Editor:

I am writing to let your readers know that there is a way to put a stop to the attempt by Rawhide Boys Ranch to change Wisconsin's Gay Rights statute.

Rawhide has publicly stated they are spending \$88,000 to change this state law. This sum is more than 10 percent of their entire yearly budget, and more than 30 percent of their tax deductible donations. What they have completely forgotten is the reason they are entitled to tax deductible donations, and the obligations that privilege entails.

All non-profit organizations, except those set up for political purposes, must include in their articles of incorporation or constitution a federal requirement for tax exemption which states: "No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of political propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation..."

Spending thirty percent of its donations to change a law is certainly a substantial activity. Further, this activity is not one of the purposes for which the organization was formed. Thus, Rawhide's activities and its use of its tax exempt status is a violation of federal law. Other non profit organizations have lost their tax exempt status for much less.

State Total— 161 AIDS Cases

Madison [Journal]- Eleven new cases of AIDS were reported in Wisconsin last month, according to figures released last week by the state Division of Health and Social Services.

The increase brings the reported number of people with AIDS in Wisconsin to 161. A year ago, there were only 73.

Of the 11 new cases, eight were in southeastern Wisconsin, including four in Milwaukee County. The county accounts for almost half of all AIDS cases in the state.

Jeff Satkin, a volunteer with Gay Men's Health Crisis, created the gel. "The question that kept on coming up at safe sex forums I attended was why can't condoms be flavored. The condom manufacturers don't care, so I decided to develop this product."

Drop in Kaposi's

San Francisco [The Works]- The incidence of Kaposi's Sarcoma (KS) in cases of AIDS has dropped from 34% in 1981 to 14% today, and researchers are speculating that the reason why is a decline in the use of amyl and butyl nitrites, or "poppers."

Gay health activists have linked nitrites with KS, since the drug has been widely used by urban gay men for the last decade, and since the incidence of KS in non-gays is less than 5%.

Dr. Harry Haverkos, an AIDS epidemiologist at the National Institutes of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, in 1984 wrote a research paper noting that prolonged nitrite use damaged the immune system. The CDC refused to publicly release the paper.

A San Francisco gay health advocate, Hank Wilson, criticized the CDC's inaction in researching the damaging effects of nitrites. "...it is a running battle with the CDC to convince them that they should at least give out a warning to the nation. While the CDC has indicated to me in correspondence that the use of poppers is a possible co-factor, it will not take a public position... If the CDC put out even a qualified warning, it would be in the daily newspapers..."

Task Force Urges Clinical Trials

A proposal by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to allow early release of untested drugs for terminally ill patients was criticized by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force as a "dangerous approach that offers false hope without addressing the fundamental problem of affordable access to experimental drugs for persons with AIDS and terminally ill patients."

The proposed deregulation, announced March 10 by the Reagan administration, would allow physicians to dispense any experimental drugs to terminally ill patients except when the FDA had found the drug to be unsafe. Currently, a drug must

be proven both safe and effective before it is licensed. In some cases, a drug can be given special status, which allows dispensing of the drug before licensing - at the expense of the drug company - to those who are seriously ill. This has been the method used to allow earlier distribution of AZT for persons with AIDS. Under the FDA plan, the patient would have to bear the cost of the experimental treatment.

NGLTF Executive Director Jeffrey Levi charged that "If the Reagan administration was serious about making experimental drugs available to those in need, it would support expanded clinical trials rather than weaken its safety standards."

The Task Force found the FDA approach flawed on three counts. First, according to Levi, "it allows the uncontrolled dispensing of drugs that have not been proven safe or effective. There are too many sad cases of drugs that, in early trials, appear to be safe and later prove to shorten, rather than prolong life."

The second concern was that this approach "imposes an even higher means test on individuals in need of an experimental treatment." The licensing of AZT, will cause those 3,000 persons with AIDS now receiving the drug free of charge to have to begin paying the \$10,000 a year the drug is expected to cost.

The third issue is the impact of such a procedure on research. "If experimental drugs are available generally, there will be little incentive to participate in controlled trials," Levi said. "This is our only method for determining the actual efficacy and appropriate dosage for a drug."




