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

National March on Washington Update

Washington- Over \$30,000 has been pledged to the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights by gay and non-gay groups. The March will be held on October 11, 1987 in Washington, D.C. To date, nearly one-half of the pledged amounts have been donated by over a dozen national gay, feminist and progressive organizations.

"The support shown for the March by lesbian and gay civil rights, religious and AIDS-service organizations has been critical to the National March effort," noted national staffperson, Lee Bush. "We were very excited when the first sizeable contribution of \$500 came in from Black and White Men Together. Then, when the National Organization for Women gave us an immediate \$2,000 followed by \$2,000 from National Gay Rights Advocates and pleges of \$2,000 from the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force and Human Rights Campaign Fund, we knew that diverse organizations were making a powerful statement about our need to march for lesbian and gay civil rights."

The budget for national March planning totals over \$300,000, and includes expenses such as outreach, staging, sound, printing, office rent and phones. Regional and local March organizing committees must also raise substantial amounts of money to subsidize travel and to help promote the March on local levels. The national office is not in debt and plans to hire its second full-time staff person.

Other organizations which have made pledges of or have already given \$2,000 include: Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches, National AIDS Network, Dignity, Lambda Legal Defense and Education Fund, and Gay Men's Health Crisis (NYC). Christopher Street West (LA) has given \$10,000 to the national March committee and several thousand to the Southern California region.

Organizations pledging smaller amounts or sponsoring fundraising events for the March include: Peoples Anti-War Mobilization, National Coalition of Black Lesbians and Gays, Unitarian Universalist Association, High-Tech Gays, and Lesbians Rising in Resistance.

Recently the Mobilization for Survival and the War Resisters League joined the March steering committee and pledged to contribute resources to organizing. "The support of non-gay groups for this March represents an Important step in our battle for freedom," observes Bush, "It is an acknowledgement that we are fighting for civil rights and that we are building the broad-based coalition we need to achieve those rights."

The March is entirely funded by donations from individuals, organizations and business sponsors. Cuomo Approves Gay Rights Measure

New York- "Discrimination based on sexual orientation is wrong; to encourage it or allow government itself to discriminate against any of us would threaten us all," declared Governor Mario Cuomo during a ceremony April 21 at New York's Lesbian and Gay Community Services Center (the Center).

While nearly 500 supporters looked on, Cuomo signed an amended version of an Executive Order 28 that will place the responsibility for lesbian and gay rights in the Division of Human Rights. The responsibility for enforcement was previously in the Office of Employee Relations.

"It must be made clear that discrimina-Continued on page 5

tion or violence directed at someone because he or she is gay is as despicable as if directed at someone for any of the absurd reasons that are traditionally recognized by our human rights laws," Cuomo added.

Cuomo also surprised the audience and press alike by announcing that "the New York State Superintendent of Insurance will be issuing regulations that will prohibit the use of the HIV test as a condition for health insurance. I urge you to watch for the hearings and participate in them." Cuomo, a strong proponent of banning the use of the test for health insurance purposes, was unable to gain legislative support for this position earlier this year.

Before signing the Executive order, Governor Cuomo spoke of the late Peter Vogel, formerly chairman of the State Gay Task Force and vice chairman of his AIDS Advisory Council.

Cuomo remembered Vogel, who died last year of AIDS, "as someone who taught you lessons in gentleness, love, understanding, and easiness. We will try to remember those lessons as long as we remember. This Center which Peter helped to create symbolizes his vision of the community. It will live on as an expression of love and service for the things that best characterize Peter, the things that enable us to call ourselves a family."

Richard Burns, newly appointed Executive Director of The Center, in his welcoming remarks to the Governor and the community, explained that "the Center now serves more than 150 groups who rent space on a temporary basis as well as having some 3,500 people pass through its doors every week. The Center also headquarters such groups as the Community Health Project, SAGE and the Anti-Violence Project." Burns explained that "it now costs nearly \$2,000 per day to keep the Center open. To continue to serve our community we need to increase our community's financial support."

Swedish Law Gives Gays Married Couple Rights

Stockholm, Sweden [Milw. Sentine]-Parliament approved a bill giving homosexual couples in Sweden the same rights as common-law marriages, but enacted another measure clamping down on saunas and video clubs frequented by gays.

The law, passed by acclamation by the 349-member Parliament after a six-year study of homosexuals and their lifestyles, will allow gays to sign housing leases as couples, regulate the division of property in the breakup of a live-in relationship, and grant partners the right to inherit property in the absense of a will.

The government proposed the bill closing sauna and video clubs to fight the spread of AIDS.

28% Avoid Gays

New York- Fear of AIDS has led 76 percent of single New Yorkers to change their sex lives, says a Gallup survey for "New York Newsday". Of 419 unmarried heterosexuals, more than half have fewer partners, 51 percent use condoms more often, 58 percent question possible partners more closely about their sexual histories. Of 1,015 adults overall, 28 percent avoid homosexuals, 40 percent avoid places where they think gays will be.

Lesbian Advances in Judicial Post

San Francisco, CA [Equal Times]- San Francisco's Municipal Court judges have elected their colleague, lesbian Judge Mary Morgan, to be the court's presiding judge, making her the first openly gay presiding judge in both the city and State of California.

Morgan was appointed to the bench in 1981 by former Governor Jerry Brown.

As presiding judge, Morgan will be responsible for dealing with a range of problems such as the court's large backload of cases, jail overcrowding, disagreements between judges over court assignments and complaints lodged against the court from the public.

Among the roles she sees herself playing is the "smashing of stereotypes."

Concerning her role as a lesbian judge, she said, "Visibility makes it important. I have an understanding of homophobia that one one else has."

Houston [Windy City Times]- Democratic presidential contender Richard Gephardt has accused the Rev. Jerry Falwell of practicing "sexual terrorism" in his attacks on homosexuals because of AIDS. Speaking before the Texas Medical Center in Houston earlier this month, the Missouri congressman criticized a recent Falwell fundraiser letter seeking money so the television preacher could tell the "untold" story about AIDS and how the gay rights movement has contributed to its spread. "Such fearmongering and near-hysteria only serve to promote division among people," Gephardt said. "His labeling AIDS as the 'gay plague' has no place in intelligent society. His message of sexual terrorism has no place in a compassionate society."

"Dildo Bill" Passes

[Windy City Times]- The Illinois House of Representatives has passed and sent to the Senate a bill to outlaw the sale of dildos and artificial vaginas.

The bill (H.B. 1367), sponsored by Rep. Linda Williamson (R-Franklin Park), bans the over-the-counter sale of "artifical" human sexual organs," but permits mailorder sale and sale in accord with a physician's prescription.

Williamson, whose district includes portions of the Mannheim Road "sin strip" of adult bookstores and inexpensive motels in an unincorporated area of suburban Cook County, emphasized that her bill attempts to address the problem of people buying appliances and then using them "instantaneously" - in their cars or in the parking lots of those adult bookstores - and then discarding them carelessly.

"I don't care what people do with these things in their own homes," Williamson said, but "I want this stuff off the streets."

I live just a block and a half from one of the stores," she continued, "and we find these things on our front lawns." She also cited an instance of two children who were discovered playing catch with one which they had found discarded after use.

[Milw. Sentinel]- Ron Reagan, President Reagan's son, stars in an AIDS documentary in which he appears before the camera, prophylactic in hand, and announces, "This is a condom."

Broadcast rights to the 30-minute show have not yet been sold, but it is so graphic that even the independent producers are concerned about seeing it on national TV.

Newsweek magazine reports that the show features model Beverly Johnson discussing oral sex and singer Ruben Blades dressed as a banana wearing a condom.

Reagan charges on the show that the right wing welcomes AIDS as punishment for homosexuality, and says that Education Secretary William J. Bennett's call for widespread testing panders to that notion.

He also suggests that people write to their congressman. Then with a smile, he adds, "or someone higher."

Protest of Beastie Boys Wins Donation from CBS Records

A "Naming Names" radio broadcast publicizing violently homophobic comments by the Beastie Boys has resulted in a \$2,000 donation by the rock group's record company, CBS Records, to the New York City Gay and Lesbian Anti-Violence Project.

The nationally syndicated broadcast, sponsored by the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation [GLAAD], reported an interview with two of the Beastie Boys in the magazine New Music Exchange. "I hate faggots," said lead singer Adam Horowitz. He went on to characterize homosexuals as child molesters and as psychologically sick. "Naming Names" invited listeners to contact CBS Records to let CBS know how they felt about the Beastie Boys' comments.

One caller got through directly to the vice president for press and public affairs, Robert Altshuler. When Altshuler asked Continued on page 9



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

how the caller wanted CBS to respond, the caller suggested a donation to the New York City Gay and Lesbian Anti-Violence Project. Within days, the Project received the \$2,000 donation. In his covering letter, Altshuler made no reference to the Beastie Boys incident.

According to Anti-Violence Project Assistant Director William Smith, the donation was the first the project has received from a corporation. Smith said that as a result of the CBS response, other corporate donations will be easier to obtain.

NGLTF Debt Paid Up

Washington [Windy City Times]- The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force paid off the entire balance of its debt last month, ending an era of indebtedness that exceeded \$100,000 three years ago. NGLTF executive director Jeff Levi and the group's development director Kimberly Webster said improved management controls and an aggressive fundraising program implemented by the group over the past two years are among the actions responsible for the elimination of the debt.

MAP's Library/ Resource Center and

Volunteer Committee By Mitch Walters, Committee Chair

This is the second in a series of articles on the committees and services of the Milwaukee AIDS Project.

The teacher designing an AIDS curriculum for a junior high class, the insurance professional writing a company policy concerning AIDS, the college student doing a term paper on AIDS, the friend of a person with AIDS reading up on medical developments, all need the latest and most comprehensive information. The Library/ Resource Center of the Milwaukee AIDS Project [MAP] provides this information, and conveniently brings together a wide variety of material in one place.

The Library/Resource Center began about one year ago as a place to keep the various books, magazines, and video tapes that the staff of MAP needed to carry out the job of educating the public about AIDS. It soon became clear that these materials could be used more efficiently if the public had direct access to them, so the Library/ Resource Center was opened to the public. Pat Paulow, the administrative assistant at MAP accepted the mission of making the library work.

That earliest collection had two video tapes, some donated magazines, and a few pamphlets and books. Under Pat's guidance and leadership the resources in the library have grown enormously. The current collection have over 30 videos, for all age levels, and approximately 25 magazine subscriptions, many of which are entirely

devoted to AIDS concerns. There are a number of legal and medical current awareness services dealing specifically with AIDS, and a variety of audio tapes, posters, and pamphlets (in both English and Spanish) for distribution to large groups. In order to keep abreast of information in the media, an extensive file of newspaper and magazine articles has been compiled and classified by subject for easy access. And for our first high-tech service, the library has become part of an online computerized AIDS information network.

As the collection itself has grown so has the public demand for material. The Library/Resource Center does a booming business in video tape rentals (the current tape rental fee is \$5.00), and educational pamphlet distribution (over 11,000 items in May alone). Because of limited staff time, public use of the library is by appointment only during regular business hours. Video tapes and slide sets may be borrowed from the library. All other materials must be used in the library.

When the volume of material coming into the library and the number of inquiries from people became too large for one person to handle, the Library/Resource Committee of MAP was formed. The members of the committee perform some of the clerical tasks in the library as well as reading and classifying articles on AIDS, searching for new materials for the library collection, and filling some of the 150 information requests received monthly from across the state.

By generously contributing their time to the Library/Resource Center the volunteers have made it possible for the library not only to contain the most current information available on AIDS but also to make it available to everyone in a variety of educational forms.

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

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promise from a national far-right foundation to underwrite all legal costs experienced by Rawhide in attacking the civil rights legislation. There are presently believed to be two to four different "missionary" groups which have come into Wisconsin from other parts of the country, traveling from one small church to another, preaching the Gospel of Rawhide and collecting funds. Meanwhile, the estimated funds available for all groups fighting the Rawhide Bill total less than \$3,100.

What would the effect of the Rawhide Amendment be? Simply put, to allow all 501(c)3 organizations (charitable, educational, etc.) to discriminate in hiring because of sexual orientation or marital status (and possibly on other grounds as well), even if there is no religious basis for such discrimination. It is understood that this is to be but the first step to the total elimination of Wisconsin's law (the first in the nation). Such an effort, if successful, could lead not only to the total eradication of basic civil rights for lesbians, gay males, and those suspected of being such, but also a possible reimplementation of "sodomy" laws, using the AIDS hysteria.

[Integrity/Dignity]- "It is contrary to the Gospel for people in the churches to decide who does and who does not belong," said Bishop Roger White, speaking June 6th to a congregration composed largely of gay people. "The call is issued to all people who respond to the Gospel — including those regarded as outcasts — no matter who they are."

Bishop White, who heads the Episcopal Diocese of Milwaukee, spoke at a Pentecost Mass celebrating the tenth anniversary of Integrity/Dignity of Madison. I/D is a gay ministry group composed of Episcopalians, Catholics and other Christians. Assisting at the Mass were Father Thomas Woodward, rector of Saint Francis House, and Luke Dundzila, I/D convener. While carrying to gay people the message of their inclusion in the church, Bishop White also commented that the purpose of church was not to make people "feel good." Rather, it was to make people "servants to proclaim hope, peace, and reconciliation."

Bishop White commended the gay community for its courage in the face of the AIDS crisis. He mentioned that he had met with Wisconsin Governor Tommy Thompson to encourage him to put more money into the state budget for the fight against AIDS.

James Bussen, national president of Dignity, spoke after the Mass and encouraged I/D members to be a businesslike and goal-oriented group but to always remember to support each other as "family."

In a talk given afterwards at a reception, former I/D convener Henry Dudek continued these themes. After giving some impressions of the group's activities and accomplishments in its ten years, Dudek described the functions of such groups as I/D in the churches.

Dudek pointed out that gay religious groups provide space where gay people can worship in an accepting atmosphere.

Dudek also pointed out that such groups have helped to turn the debate in the churches from "what gay people do in private to what church and society do to gay people in public." He listed a number of issues which gay people have challenged churches to address: the need for gay ministry, a compassionate response to the AIDS crisis, recognition of gay relationships, support for gay rights, and full church membership, including ordination of gay people.

Among Integrity/Dignity's accomplishments, Dudek mentioned outreach efforts to the community, including lobbying for successful passage by the Madison Catholice Priests Senate of a statement en-Continued on page 18


Last years tournament was held in Las Vegas and attracted nearly 1,100 bowlers. Next year's tournament will be in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C.

Boston [Chi. Outlines] -- Researchers at Havard Medical School have reported that testing on animals showed that a combination of the drugs Retrovir (AZT) and alpha-interferon proved move effective than either agent alone in combating a virus similar to the one that causes AIDS. Dr. Ruth Ruprecht, the researcher who led the study, said that her group was able to use interferon and a dose of AZT 100 times less than normally required to get virtually complete suppression of a deadly virus in mice, according to a Reuters report. She said that at the lower dosage level of AZT used in the combined therapy, the animals did not get bone marrow damage - a side effect of AZT. Alpha interferon, a naturally occurring compound made in large quantities through biotechnology, has been shown in studies to suppress the AIDS virus in some patients, boost the immune system, and treat Kaposi's sarcoma.

Milw. Co. Supervisors Push for AIDS Money

[Journal]- The county should search for \$69,200 to pay for two additional staff members and for public education materials for the Milwaukee AIDS Project, supervisors on a county committee said June 11th.

The County Board's Finance Committee declined to recommend giving \$69,200 from a contingency fund to the project. Use of money in the fund requires approval by a two-thirds majority of the 25-member County Board.

Supervisor Anthony Czaja and six other supervisors signed a resolution requesting money for the AIDS Project. More than a dozen religious leaders joined Cjaza in his request.

Supervisors on the committee voted 7-0 to seek money elsewhere in the county budget and to research the county's role in preventing the deadly acquired immune deficiency syndrome. Most AIDS patients now seek medical help at the Milwaukee County Medical Complex, which is financed by county taxpayers.

Meese Orders Immigrants Tested


[USA Today]- Immigrants who test positive for AIDS will be denied legal residency in the USa, Attorney General Edwin Meese said recently.

Testing will be required for all immigrants, including those applying under the immigration amnesty program. Results will remain confidential; a positive test will wipe out chances for legal status but will not trigger deportation, Meese said.

Immigrants with AIDS could be deported later for lack of legal residency.

Warren Leiden of the American Immigration Lawyers Association said he saw no "cause for alarm" because people with contagious diseases are barred.

Federal prison inmates also will be tested. Meese said, and the results could affect their parole status.

Prick Up Your Ears

Prick Up Your Ears is being hailed as "the" gay film of the year. The film chronciles the life and times of English playwright, Joe Orton and his lover, Kenneth Halliwell. It is largely based on the biography of John Lahr (son of actor Bert Lahr). Since a great deal of story line information was included in our last issue, I will keep my comments to more of a review or a critique tormat.

I was actually intrigued by the title. In the course of the film, we learn of an unproduced screenplay which Joe wrote for the Beatles. Many of his titles were actually created by Halliwell, such as the title of his hit play, Loot. So too did **Prick Up Your Ears** come from Halliwell but this time for the Beatle's project. Thus, It is appropriate that it should be used here. Said Orton in his diary, "I think it's a wonderful title, but it's far too good to waste on a rubbishy film." A rubbishy film this is not.

Both Gary Oldman as Orton and Alfred Molina as Halliwell turn in convincing performances. However, it is Oldman who creates the magic and spark which drive the story. Vanessa Redgrave too is quite good in her featured role as Orton's agent, Peggy Ramsay.

It is director Stephen Frears, who also directed **My Beautiful Laundrette**, that has put together a moving and convincing film. I find it most interesting to note that Mr. Frears is straight but brings to this film a wonderful sensitivity to gay life and the gay world. Says he, "Maybe gays are especially good metaphors for misplaced people. Misplaced people, people out of place, reconciling their insides with their outsides. But as you say, gays have been making films about straights for years."

And the gay world of twenty years ago is portrayed accurately down to "cottaging." The British form for tea rooms. Orton once introduced to gay life by Halliwell becomes quite the active one. Remember in England of the 60's, sex between consenting males, even in private, was Illegal. Yet, Joe relishes in public sex in many places and times. This aspect of his life is handled honestly and frankly without throwing the film out of balance. Oldman believes that this segment of Joe's life is vital to the story, "I don't see how you could make a film about him and not have it. I read the coroner's report, and it said he had terrible kinds of anal ulcers and all sorts of things wrong with him purely through his promiscuity – I think had he lived, he would've been a really early AIDS victim."

Yet, Joe needs the security of a relationship of sorts as he has with Ken but the freedom to do as he pleases. Ken wants just Joe. This leads to their relationship which is the mirror through which we view the other "straight" relationships in the film: Joe's parents, Lahr, the writer and his wife, and Joe's sister and her husband. None in this group seem any more successful in the relational sphere.

However it is Joe's success and growth beyond Ken, including the sexual escapades, coupled with Halliwell's depression and growing despondency that cause the ultimate destruction.

Halliwell much more educated and experienced than Joe brings him "out" in many ways. He educates him, cultures him, brings him to his world of writing. But unlike **Pygmalion or My Fair Lady** where a compromise is reached between student and mentor, Halliwell creates in his later twisted view a Frankenstein who he ultimately destroys and then takes his own life. This is not a love story though there are tender moments. Rather, it is a mutual need fulfillment which satisfies for a time and then ultimately destroys both.

Orton wrote in the production notes for the American company of Loot. "I don't want there to be anything queer or camp or odd about the relationship of Hal and Dennis. Americans see homosexuality in terms of fag and drag. This isn't my vision of the universal brotherhood. They must be perfectly normal boys who happen to be fucking each other. Nothing could be more normal."

Too bad his vision was not his reality.

incurred the revolutionary ire. There she was murdered. They cut off her head, sliced her genitals from between her thighs and stuffed them into her mouth. The head was jammed on a pole, carried by a man who wore her public hair as a mustache.

Through the streets of Paris they marched crying obscenities until they reached the place where the queen was held prisoner. They howled for her to look, gaze from her window at the grotesque head of the one who had loved her most of all.

She would not. But then the jailers came and held her, pressed her face against the bars, made her look at Lamballe who she had never really seen. She screamed an unearthly cry for perhaps it had suddently torn across her brain and soul that she had loved wrongly at the expense of one who had loved her beyond measure and unto death itself.

Two years later, in 1794, Marie Antoinette went to the guillotine. She who had been the queen of taste, was now the queen of sorrows. One of those sorrows may have been that she recognized finally that the truest love sometimes comes in the most unsought for packages. She had gone with her desires to the beautiful Polignac but love, true love which might have saved her, had been in plain Lamballe.

Now, the government was funneling money to the Americans who were in revolt against Great Britian. That was costing even more. The people were suffering. Heavily over-taxed, the wretched poor of Paris were unable to buy food. Many were starving.

But to Lamballe's entreaties, the queen paid no heed. Marie Antoinette loved Polignac blindly and therefore, did not see the growing bitterness directed toward her that would eventually bring hatred with a thousand eyes glowing red before the windows of Versailles.

Meanwhile, in the streets of Paris, pamphlets appeared pilloring the queen and Polignac as Lesbians and some going so far as to accuse Marie Antoinette of having sex with all the whores of the capital. Other broadsides called her "Madame Deficit" who sucked at the treasury as Polignac sucked at her.

The stage was set for revolution.

In 1789, the storm broke. The rage of death engulfed the king and queen, the former too weak and the latter, too hated to be able to do anything about it. As the Paris mob marched the 12 miles to Versailles, they shouted their determination to have Polignac. But they were too late. The Duchesse had already fled to Basle in Switzerland from where she watched all in perfect safety.

Lamballe watched too - but from Versailles and when the mob forced the



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royal family to return to Paris and imprisonment, she followed at a distance, determined to offer to her beloved what help she could.

The Revolutionary authorities, unable to put their hands on Polignac, siezed the poor, long-suffering Lamballe and flung her into La Force, a miserable, catch-all prison for aristocrats and others who had Continued on page 45

Marie Antoinette

As the story goes, when Queen Marie Antoinette of France was told that the people had no bread, she replied, "Well, let them eat cake." Regardless of the fact that she never said it, the tale was generally believed, showing a little of what the French thought of her.

Part of the problem was that she wasn't French. She was from Austria which for centuries had been France's most serious continental rival. Finally, in 1748, diplomats decided that enough was enough. Centuries of enmity must be put aside. Austria, for her own reasons, agreed and in 1756 the two countries became allies in what was understandably called, "The Diplomatic Revolution." As a seal and symbol of all this, it was decided that Marie Antoinette, daughter of the Hapsburg Empress Maria Theresa, should marry Louis, the Bourbon heir to the French throne.

Governments may settle their differences but age-long animosity had built up a strong reservoir of hatred in French hearts for their Hapsburg neighbors and all of it focused on the Austrian princess who, as the pawn in the game, was to be their future queen.

Had she been beautiful or even pretty, the French might have had a change of heart. But she was merely attractive with silky, fair hair, blue eyes and an oval face which seemed to be dominated by her full, protruding lower lip which, it was said, showed her disdain for France and all things French.

If it showed anything, it was fear which at least at first, seemed well founded. The reigning king was Louis XV, the heir's grandfather. The old lecher met her carriage at the border, climbed in, and soon had his hands all over her. She fought him off.

The exact opposite was in store for her when she met her husband, the future Louis XVI. He was tall, fat, and none too swift in the sex department. In fact, he was an absolute zero. The reason was that his foreskin was so tight that he couldn't have an erection. A simple operation would have

solved the problem but it was not until late in the marriage that he would submit to the knife.

Under the circumstances, the princess could have had her pick of male lovers. The French had always believed that marriage was never meant to interfere with love. But she showed no great interest in men. Instead, it was to women whom she turned for love.


Her first affaire de coeur was with the Princess de Lamballe. Lamballe was a plain sort of person, the kind who, if people call to mind colors, would be characterized as brown. Still, she loved Marie Antoinette with a tranquil and unobtrusive devotion. Further, while the royal princess was a lot brighter than poor Lamballe, Lamballe was practical and down to earth, qualities that Marie Antoinette lacked.

In 1775, a year after she became queen, Marie Antoinette met the Duchesse de Polignac. The Duchesse was a beautiful, violet-eyed woman with a face that looked as if it had been made up in a dream. Add to this, a delicate girlish figure and perhaps you can understand the queen's reaction which was, as one historian puts it, "a clap of thunder, a sort of superheated falling in love."

From the first moment they met, the queen and Polignac were never out of each other's company day or night. The French court of Versailles might have viewed all things with a certain degree of equanimity except for one thing. The Duchesse and all her Polignac clan were far poorer than they thought that they should be. To a queen gone in love, money was a small matter. She loaded her lover and her relatives down with as much as they wanted until the Duchesse and her herd were costing the state more in a year than Louis XV's mistress, Madama de Pompadour had cost France in a decade.

Desperately Lamballe tried to do something. She told the queen — and it was the truth — that the treasury was near to bankruptcy. Despite Austria's help, the French had lost their last war with England. That altercation had cost plenty. Continued on page 43

In The Life is an exciting new anthology featuring poems, essays, short stories, and other work by and about black Gay men (Alyson, \$7.95). "At times I cried just remembering how it is to be both black and Gay during these truly difficult times," says singer Sylvester in his foreword to the book, "(but) here we are, still proud and living, with a culture all our own." In his introductory essay, "Leaving the Shadows Behind," Joesph Beam, who edited In the Life and brought together material from over two dozen contributors, amplifies Sylvester's remarks:

"Together we are making history. As Black gay men we have always existed in the African-American community. We have been ministers, hairdressers, entertainers, sales clerks, civil rights activists, teachers, playwrights, trash collectors, dancers, government officials, choir masters, and dishwashers. You name it: we've done it most often with scant recognition. We have mediated family disputes, cared for and reared our siblings, and housed our sick. We have performed many and varied important roles within our community. Together we are creating and naming a new community while extending a hand to the one from which we've come. We are bringing into the light the lives which we have led in the shadows."

The six topical sections that house the material, "Steppin Out;" "Cut Off From Among Their People;" "Creating Community;" "Brother/Father/Lover/Son;" "Speaking for Ourselves;" and "Stepping Into Tomorrow....;" are introduced with visual art work and have a variety of vantage points.

In the Life also contains important historical documents, such as the editor's interview with sci-fi writer Samuel R. Delaney; the last scene from Assotto Saint's "Risn' to the Love We Need;" and insightful interviews with the singer Blackberri and the Harlem Renaissance "celebutant," Bruce Nuget, whose father gave him the best advice: "Never do anything you'd

be ashamed of and never be ashamed of anything you do."

The black Gay men who contribute to this ground-breaking collection do not ignore women. A quote from Audre Lorde's Cancer Journals sets the tone for the books opening; Donald Woods' poem "Sister Lesbos" reveals: "I call you sister distinctly, loudly/We are family of a real kind " and Beam's interview with Samuel Delany includes a reference to Judy Grahm's view of lesbiansa and gavs as "society's visionaries and seers." The range of this text is powerful; from an essay on parenting by A. Billy S. Jones, also of D.C., to Gil Gerald's struggle (with support from his mother) to gain his U.S. citizenship as an openly gay person. The interrelated range of In the Life includes "Better Days," a poem by Essex Hemphill in which he declares "I want impractical relationships;" as well as "Weekend Plans," a smooth short story by Craig Harris, which explores the jagged (and often "impractical") interactions of two affluent lovers in a Manhattan co-op.

Beam's interview with a rural gav man (from Russell County, Alabama) will make you admire the diversity of Gay experlences; Sydney Brinkley's "Passion" piece describes a mystery man who must be the sexual equivalent of the Lotto jackpot; and one wonders if Sulvester was referring to "Cut Off from Among Their People," a frightening glimpse of rejection and religious hatred by Craig Harris, when the singer said parts of the anthology brought him to tears. Not all the selections "resolve" issues. For example, "On Not Being White," by Reginald Shepherd, ends almost on a wish that he will stop idolizing things white.

In the Life measures up to its editor's goal that:

"... We are coming home with our heads held up high."

Here is a promise kept. This is a book many readers will call a "best bet." In short, **In the Life** is on the money!


