





## GAY SIDE V

Reagan seemingly buckled-under to intense pressure from both gays and many in the medical profession, to name a gay man to the panel.

Lilly is chairman of the genetics department of the Albert Einstein Medical Center in New York, and was a board member of New York's Gay Men's Health Crisis Center.

Lilly's appointment stirred up controversy from both gays and non-gays. Larry Kramer, co-founder of the Gay Men's Health Crisis Center, said "I don't know if Lilly is prepared to battle with his buddies at the National Institute of Health... I worry he's more one of them than one of us." However, Crisis Center spokesperson Lori Behrman said "I have confidence Lilly will represent the needs of the homosexual community. He wasn't chosen simply because he is gay. He's a very qualified candidate."

Republican Sen. Gordon Humphrey said Lilly's appointment sent the wrong message to young people because "homosexuality is immoral", and "it seems the president has knuckled under to the homosexual rights lobby."

Lilly has doctorates in organic chemistry and biology, and is recognized for his research in the hereditary factors that cause leukemia and other cancers. After being named to the commission, Lilly said "I hope to forcefully represent the gay community as well as the bio-medical community as a member of this commission." In a statement released with his resume, he also said, "I am well aware that my homosexuality must have been a factor of considerable weight in my selection for this honor." He said he believed he was among the few openly gay people to have been appointed to "A significant position

in any U.S. administration" and described the appointment as "Richly deserved recognition of the gay community."

Reagan, who has long been silent about AIDS, appointed the commission July 23, then went to the National Institute of Health in nearby Bethesda, Maryland, to meet with four children with AIDS. Reagan mourned the disease's toll on friends and former associates and challenged his newly created commission to help "beat this disease." He then visited the laboratory of Samuel Broder, where the first work was done on the use of the drug AZT to fight the AIDS virus.

Besides Lilly, the following were also appointed to serve under previously named chairman William Mayberry, chairman of the board of governors of the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.; New York Cardinal John O'Commor, an outspoken anti-gay Roman Catholic traditionalist: retired Admiral James Watkins, who was instrumental in the Defense Dept.'s decision to begin HIV testing of military recruits; Colleen Conway-Welch, director of a San Diego Clinic which treats sexual dysfunction; Richard De Vos, president of Amway Corp.; Burton James Lee, a physician who specializes in treatment of lymphomas; Woodrow Myers Jr., health commissioner of Indiana; Penny Pullen, an Illinois legislator who has sponsored AIDS-related legislation; Corv Servass, publisher of the Saturday Evening Post and president of the Foundation for Preventative Medicine; and William Walsh, president of Health Opportunity for People Everywhere (HOPE).

### Rabbis Make Plea

Washington, D.C. [Equal Times]- The World Congress of Gay and Lesbian Jewish Organizations is sending a newly-prepared educational brochure on lesbian and gay Jews to 10,000 rabbis and Jewish community leaders in the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom, an official with the Congress said.

Barret Brick, a member of the Congress' board of directors and former president of Bet Mishpachah, Washington's Gay synagogue, said the brochure received a promotional boost in April when two prominent rabbis agreed to write a cover letter to accompany the mailing of the brochure.

Rabbi Balfour Brickner of New York City and Rabbi Hershel J. Matt of New Jersey state in the cover letter that they are troubled by wide-spread discrimination against gays.

The two rabbis call on Jewish leaders to work to eliminate "hostility, prejudice, and discrimination against gay men and lesbians within both the Jewish and general communities."

The brochure compares anti-gay hostility to anti-Semitism and states that it has caused widespread suffering of gays.

## Louisiana Awards Estate to Gay Lover

New Orleans [Equal Times]- The Louisiana State Supreme Court recently awarded most of a resident's estate to his lover.

Samuel Wilds Bacot died in 1984 and left his entire estate to his lover, Danny Washington. A civil district court had ruled that most of the over \$400,000 estate should go to Elmo Orgeron, Bacot's adopted son. The state Circuit Court of Appeals reversed that ruling in favor of Washington.

The case is considered a possible landmark ruling in favor of the principle that "two men can live together and hold themselves to be like man and wife, and be legally recognized as such.

## Two Red Cross donors get fake test result Letters

Washington, D.C. [Equal Times]- Two Washington-area blood donors recently received fake letters on what appeared to be American Red Cross stationary saying their blood had tested positive to the AIDS antibody.

A Red Cross official, who declined to identify the two people who received the letters, said one of the recipients was ready to kill himself until he found out the letter was fake.

"It was just devastating," said Dr. Fred Darr, medical director of Red Cross blood services for the Washington region. "He had made plans on how he was going to do it (kill himself)."

Red Cross officials said donors who test positive for AIDS antibody are always told in person — never by mail or over the telephone.

Darr said Red Cross personnel were able to calm the two donors who had received the letters only after both contacted the Red Cross about the letters, were retested, and given the negative results.

In a telephone interview, Red Cross Public Relations Specialist Carbery Morrow said the organization still had no leads as to who might have sent the letters.

## Insurance Company Won't Pay for AIDS

San Francisco [Equal Times]- National Gay Rights Advocates has announced it is filing unfair practices complaints with fourteen state insurance departments against the American Service Life Insurance Company (ASLIC).

In its complaint, NGRA charges the Texas-based health insurer with refusing to pay for AIDS-related medical expenses. NGRA cited as evidence ASLIC's promotional materials, which declare in small print that the company will not pay for expenses, arising out of "any disease which was sexually transmitted."

Benjamin Schatz, Director of NGRA's AIDS Civil Rights Project, declared: "Insurance companies cover medical expenses for cancer, heart disease and other life-threatening illnesses. They must not be allowed to carve out a special exception for AIDS. For insurance Companies to shirk their responsibility to pay for AIDS-related medical expenses is to undercut the very purpose of health insurance."

## Man Charged with Extortion

Waukesha [Milw. Journal]- A 24-yearold Milwaukee man was charged July 22 with extorting about \$10,000 in hush money from his former lover, who did not want the affiar to be known.

Kenneth J. Brierton of Milwaukee appeared in Circuit Court and was released on a \$5,000 signature bond. He was ordered to return to court Aug. 17.

A 51-year-old Waukesha man has told police he paid Brierton amounts of \$500. \$750 and \$1,000 every three to six months to keep him quiet. The payments began in 1983 or 1984, a criminal complaint says.

The victim told police he had homosexual relations with Brierton 20 to 25 times from 1978 to 1981, the complaint says.

## Anti Gay Legislation Introduced

On June 23, of this year, Senator Joseph Leean (Rep.-Waupaca) made good on his promise to re-introduce the "Rawhide Bill." The Rawhide Bill was narrowly defeated in the 1985-86 Session of the Wisconsin State Legislature.

Last Session the bill was stopped in an Assembly committee and passed by a Senate committee, but did so too late to be placed on the Senate's agenda for floor debate and a vote. Once this occured the leaders of the repeal effort found another way to push for their anti-gay initiative. They found an innocent bill that had passed committee in both houses of the legislature and deliberately tried to amend the bill on the floor to contain a provision allowing all 501 (c) (3) tax exempt organizations the right to fire gay people. This anti-gay amendment passed the Senate 21-12 and was narrowly defeated in the Assembly by a vote of 53-47. Tony Earl, our former

Governor, would have vetoed that bill. Governor Tommy Thompson has publically stated that he will sign the measure.

This year's Rawhide Bill is entitled (SB 301). It has 11 sponsors in the Senate and 26 sponsors in the Assembly. Eight of the Senate sponsors and 25 of the Assembly sponsors are Republicans. SB 301 has been referred to the Judiciary and Consumer Affairs Committee in the Senate.

Representative Wayne Wood (Dem-Janesville) is expected to introduce a companion bill in the Assembly. Rep. Wood lead the fight against AB 70, our human rights bill, in the 1981-82 Legislative Session when it was up for approval. Rep. Wood is a member of the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church and often holds prayer vigils in his state capitol office.

One very major hypocrisy that I find with both Senator Leean and Rep. Wood is that they both oppose public funding for abortions because they feel that taxpayers that disagree with abortion rights should not have to pay for them. However, they both insist that taxpayers that support gay rights should still be forced to contribute their tax dollars to an organization that demands the right to fire gay people. The Rawhide Boys Ranch receives over \$500,000 in taxpayer's money, including gay taxpayer's money, to run its organization every year.


## Milw. March on Washington Committee Sets August 8th Meeting

## CINEMA 84 Charing Cross Road

A thoughly charming film for viewing this summer is "84 Charing Cross Road" which at this writing is playing at one Milwaukee theater on the Northwest side Yes, that's right, one.

This simple film chronicles the relationship between American scriptwriter, Helen Hanff, and a clerk at the London booksellers found at the above address. In Hanff's search for rare books, she and the clerk correspond only through the mail but the friendship and relationship which develops over many years is touching and poignant.

Anne Bancroft is a marvelous actress who has a delightful time with this role. She is especially credible as a New Yorker and portrays the proper mix of heart covered by enough tough crustiness to make her believable as an inhabitant of the Big Apple. Also, she clearly communicates that she enjoys this role, and we too; enjoy her having a good time.

Her co-star as the English bookseller is Anthony Hopkins. He gives us a good portrayal. However, his acting is typically British as are the members of his family and co-workers and one experience the English as themselves - on their terms -

to understand fully. The scene involving the coronation ceremony of Queen Elizabeth II (see also in "Prick Up Your Ears") shows this quite clearly. If you have visited England or have any British acquaintances. you know exactly of what I speak.

One fine example of international cinematic cooperation is the fact that two film companies - one American, the other English, compiled this film. It makes for a remarkable blend of two distinct vet complimentary filmatic styles and gives the movie a terrific flavor and feel in the presentation of both main characters and their respective milieux.

It is personally discouraging to me that so fine a film is relegated to one Milwaukee theater while there is a multitude of summer movie bilge getting maximum exposure and marketing and making megabucks. On which type of summer film will you spend your movie money? "84 Charing Cross Road" is a must from my perspective but then again you could settle for bilge.


