





Like It Or Not, Testing Inevitable, Says CDC

San Francisco (B.A.R.)- Widespread, routine testing of people for AIDS and contact tracing to find the sexual partners of people who are HIV infectable are soon to be established, according to Dr. Don Francis, a Centers for Disease Control specialist affiliated with the California Department of Health Services. "You're going to lose the testing issue in California," Francis warned a group of gay and lesbian activists, "if no this year, then next year. Ultimately we're going to be using this on a routine basis." He said that ideally testing should be coupled with counseling and confidentiality measures in order to be effective.

Francis gave his candid remarks at a luncheon panel sponsored by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force which was in San Francisco for a meeting of its board of directors.

Francis said he views testing and contact tracing as essential parts of a campaign to keep uninfected people healthy and to change behaviors that help spread the disease. "I would like to have every infected person identified," he said. He emphasized that "for my program to succeed I need antidiscrimination" measures adopted also.

Francis also chided the gay community for opposing contact tracing.

The presentation drew sharp retorts from NGLTF board members and staff. Dr. Frances Hanckel, a board co-chair and Philadelphia resident, raised the threat of quarantine as a possible outcome of massive testing and contact tracing. But Francis dismissed the concern saying, "Quarantine is an issue only in the mind of the gay community, not in the general public."

Hanckel and NGLTF executive director Jeff Levi both pointed to last year's ballot initiative on quarantines to give legitimacy to their concerns.

On widespread testing and contact

tracing, Levi said, "I think there are methods that are not only bad policy but in some respects are also counterproductive. It is dangerous to break the link between testing and counseling, confidentiality and antidiscrimination."

NGLTF Condemns AIDS Measures

In testimony August 6 before the House of Representatives Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Health and the Environment, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force called on Congress to support major funding for voluntary counseling and testing programs to control AIDS and to reject coercive control measures proposed by New Right Congressman William Dannemeyer (R-CA).

Jeffrey Levi, NGLTF's executive director, told the subcommittee that "the gay community knows more than any other the pain and suffering associated with this disease... (we) could have no greater goal than to see that the suffering of AIDS be prevented for the overwhelming majority of us — gay and nongay alike — who are not infected with HIV and to assure that no other community should experience the level of tragedy we have." To achieve that goal, Levi said, would require a major education and counseling program, not the mandatory testing, mandatory reporting, and mandatory contact tracing programs offered by Dannemeyer.

The Task Force argued that a successful prevention program will focus on changing behavior — with education and counseling as the centerpiece and antibody testing as an adjunct where appropriate.

In commenting on the coercive measures supported by Dannemeyer, Levi pointed out that "we have heard often that since AIDS is a sexually transmitted disease, it should be treated as such — and we should not hesitate to use the methods of control that have been applied to more common STDs..."

But AIDS is a new disease that poses special problems." In fact, Levi pointed out the epidemic of STD's among heterosexuals — while STD rates continue to decline among gay and bisexual men — suggests that "traditional methods of control aren't working and millions of heterosexuals are engaging in unsafe activities that could spread HIV infection... while gay men — without benefit of mandatory testing, tracing or reporting — have altered their behavior through education and counseling."

The Task Force endorsed Congressman Waxman's Federal AIDS Policy Act that provides for \$400 million in counseling and testing along with federal guarantees of confidentiality and bans on discrimination against those who are antibody positive.

"A Time To Shine"

The March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights and the National Association of People with AIDS (NAPWA) are proud to announce co-sponsorship of "A Time to Shine," a project designed to bring People with AIDS (PWAs) to the March scheduled for October 11, 1987. Community leaders in the fight against AIDS have joined with March and NAPWA organizers to ask supporters from coast to coast to participate in giving house parties to raise funds for this cause.

"A Time to Shine" was proposed by the Los Angeles AIDS-activist Matt Redman who believes it is critical that PWAs attend the March in large numbers. Redman maintains that "It is essential that the government know that PWAs will not simply quietly die while the government's response to this epidemic remains totally inadequate due to fear and bigotry directed toward gay men." Redman will serve as Fundraising Coordinator and will raise money to fund a national lottery which will be used for PWA transportation, housing and meals. The lottery is structured to ensure that PWAs will come to the March from everywhere across the country and will include people of color and women. PWAs will form the lead contingent of the March.

David Almand, a PWA on the Executive Committee for the March and a member of NAPWA is the Project Administrator for "A Time to Shine" and will be based in D.C. He is working on coordinating logistics for the event which includes arrangements for housing, transportation, a buddy system and medical care for participants.

Party plans are already underway in Southern California, San Francisco, Baltimore, New York and elsewhere. A commitment from Shawnee Mission, Kansas is an indication of the broad geographic support for the project.

Anonymity Upheld

New York (Outlines)- Recent court decisions in both New York and Florida have upheld the right of blood donors to remain anonymous, including in cases where the patients receiving the blood later die of AIDS.

In New York, a woman contended that her husband, who died from AIDS in 1985, had contracted the disease from blood transfused at New York Hospital and supplied by New York Blood Center in 1984. In suing the hospital and the center, the woman tried to obtain the identities of 21 donors whose blood had been used, in order to determine who had contributed the allegedly infected blood.

Justice Joseph S. Levine ruled in Brooklyn State Supreme Court that "the donor's right to privacy, together with society's interest in maintaining the free flow of volunteer blood, far outweigh the plaintiff's right to disclosure of all evidence material and necessary to the prosecution of her case." This decision is similar to an order of the Florida state appeals court last January.

Lesbian Denied Custody

Atlanta [Equal Times]- Leigh Vanderels, a lesbian mother, was denied custody of her child in January by a judge citing Georgia's sodomy law. Ruling against the mother, Judge William Ison stated, "The court finds that the sexual preference of the mother has changed from a normal heterosexual act to an act of lesbianism and that the change in sexual preference and the manner of exercising her homosexuality is a substantial change in circumstances."


During the course of the trial, Ison questioned the mother's ex-lover. He read her the criminal definition of sodomy and asked her if lesbian sex could be included in the definition. When she responded affirmatively, he asked her if she would consider these acts a crime against nature. "It is often easy for us to believe that we are relatively safe within our own structured space," stated Vanderels. "What we need to remember is that each time one of us is discriminated against and we don't

take a stand, all of us lose." Appeal motions have been denied, and now the ACLU is defending Vanderels.

FCC Drops Charges

Los Angeles [Windy City Times]- The U.S. Justice Department has decided not to prosecute radio station KPFK-FM for broadcasting a play that contained explicit portrayals of gay sex, according to the **Bay Area Reporter**. On Aug. 31, 1986, after 10 p.m., the station broadcast excerpts from Robert Chesley's play *Jerker*, which is in part an educational guide to safe sex and which contains graphic descriptions of sexual acts. Soon afterwards, the Federal Communications Commission recommended that the U.S. Justice Department prosecute the station's owner, Pacifica Foundation, on obscenity charges. But in a July 14 letter, an official of the department's National Obscenity Enforcement Unit noted that the FCC policy in effect at the time of the broadcast placed restrictions on materials broadcast before 10 p.m., thus precluding a successful prosecution.

MILWAUKEE AREA MAP





Washington [Outlines]- A new report says women in the U.S. have a long way to go before they achieve equality, according to the Newhouse News Service. "The American Woman 1987-88," published by the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues, chronicles the considerable progress women have made in some fields, prompting Rep. Lindy Boggs (D-La.) to call the report "a dream come true." The 352-page report also details so much persistent discrimination that Rep. Barbara B. Kennelly (D-Conn.) called it a "nightmare documented. I can't remember anything that depressed me more than reading this." Kennelly described as "chilling" the report's finding that female college graduates who work full time, year round earn roughly the same income as employed male high school dropouts. Kennelly said the report ought to be required reading for every girl in high school "so she would know what she was in for." The report shows that working women have been closing the wage gap in recent years — from 61 cents for every \$1 a man makes to 68 cents for every \$1. Kennelly said the improvement has less to do with women being paid more than with men earning less as manufacturing jobs are replaced by lower-paying service jobs.

Judge Bars Confession From Murder Trial

Eau Claire, WI [Milw. Journal]- An Eau Claire County Circuit Court judge threw out August 3 a murder confession by Alvin Taylor, a traveling night club singer, saying that police had engaged in improper questioning.

Circuit Judge Gregory Peterson ruled that prosecutors could not use the confession in Taylor's trial, which is to begin Sept. 14. Taylor is charged with first-degree murder in the beating and stabbing death of James Severson, 42, of Eau Claire.

Peterson who described his decision as one of the "heavy burdens" of judgeship, said Taylor could have been invoking his constitutional right against self-incrimination when he expressed reluctance to

discuss Severson's death with Menomonee Police Department investigators on April 4.

Taylor, 40, also is charged with first-degree murder in the deaths of Timothy Hayden, 27, of Menomonee; Robert Williams, 38, of Eau Claire; and Daniel Lundgren, 33, of West Bend.

The tape recording of the interrogation in the Severson case showed that Taylor told investigators, "I guess I would like to let it rest," when they asked him about the Severson case, Peterson said.

Peterson said that Taylor could have been invoking his right to remain silent when he told police, "I guess I don't want to get into the details (of Severson's death)." Investigators continued to question Taylor after the statement and Taylor subsequently confessed, according to police.

Police Get AIDS Guidelines

Washington [Windy City Times]- Police departments should require their officers to wear gloves and take a wide range of

precautions when coming into contact with those suspected of "being infected with AIDS," according to a Justice Department statement issued recently. The department's research agency acknowledged that there have been no documented cases of police officers, paramedics or firefighters getting AIDS in performing their duties, but it recommended that police adopt clear-cut policies to prevent transmission of the disease, including the use of masks or other protective devices for cardiopulmonary resuscitation and wearing gloves when searching people suspected of having AIDS. The statement follows by two months controversy over District of Columbia police officers' decision to wear gloves when arresting persons with AIDS demonstrating in front of the White House.

Charges Not Seen

[Milw. Sentinel]- A woman with acquired immune deficiency syndrome who scratched a store clerk during a dispute will not be charged with endangering the clerk's life, an official said last week.

Gay Games III Set

San Francisco [Windy City Times]- Barry McDell, chairman of the Gay Games III, is seeking to raise \$1 million for the event, set for August 1990 in Vancouver, Canada. The woman, who also rubbed an open sore on her arm on a police officer investigating the dispute, will be charged with misdemeanors because it was doubtful she could have infected either person with AIDS, the district attorney's office concluded.


The 31-year-old woman will be charged with battery in the scratching incident and disorderly conduct in the other, Deputy Dist. Atty. Michael Malmstadt said. Both incidents occurred July 10.

"We've checked with various medical people and considering what she did, it's highly unlikely that she could have transmitted the disease," Malmstadt said. "They didn't rule it out entirely, but they've never heard of it being transmitted like that."

'Liberty Report': 'Curing' Gays/Lesbians

Minneapolis [Outlines]- An article in Jerry Falwell's *Liberty Report* asserts that Exodus, a group which counsels gays and

lesbians to resist the "temptation" of members of their own sex, is contributing to the fight against AIDS. "While the Centers for Disease Control and other research organizations try to discover a cure for AIDS and while Surgeon General C. Everett Koop promotes the use of condoms for 'safe sex,'" reads the article, "a little-known international group (Exodus) is working to stop the spread of AIDS by turning homosexuals into heterosexuals." According to one of the group's counselors, Bob Davies, "the universal opinion of all the modern Bible translations is that homosexuality is sin. And I think that the burden of proof is on them (the homosexuals)." Exodus admits that "Most homosexuals who turn away from their sins and homosexual lifestyle and make Jesus the Lord of their life remain single." However, Davies notes that "each year, when the various Exodus ministries gather for their annual conference, more and more of us are going as married people."

Sunday In The Park

A recent Chicago outing found me at the Goodman Theater to view a production of the 1984 Pulitzer prize winning, **Sunday In The Park With George**. Some of you may have seen the television presentation or video of the Broadway company starring Mandy Patinkin and the wonderful, Bernadette Peters.

The Goodman Theater is located right behind the Art Institute and was most certainly heightened by the fact that the famous Seurat masterpiece, "Sunday Afternoon on the Island of la Grande Jatte", is housed there. So, the experience was truly memorable by a visit to view this famous pointillistic work earlier in the day. Pointillism or chromo-luminarism is created by adding tiny dots of brilliant color so that the eye in transferring the image creates the proper mix of color. Fine examples of this today are print media such as newspapers or magazines and the process of creating photographs through construction of small dots or television and video which also use the same premise.

The play is divided into two acts each with its own focus and point of reference but which together create a unique connectedness. The first which is the much stronger of the two chronicles the life and artistic passion of George Seurat. The second takes place one-hundred years later and focuses on the person of his great-grandson, George, also an artist. (In point of fact, the child born to Seurat and his mistress, Madeleine, died one week after the artist. This son was unfortunately exposed to his father's meningitis.)

In this first act, we meet George obsessed with his painting, and his mistress, aptly named, Dot. Also, we meet a few other characters who become part of the painting's composition when completed. The culmination of this act is very powerful in the beautiful "Sunday" when the characters are assembled by George into a live composition and the picture comes to "life."

Act two finds George's great-grandson, a

contemporary artist, working in the area of laser multi-media. The Chicago director's focus was more specifically linked to video rather than laser art which directly relates to the pointillism of Seurat. Unlike his great-grandfather who never sold a painting and died at the age of 32 with little notoriety because his works were breaking new ground and defying acceptabilities of the time, George of today feels pressured to be trendy and avant-garde. "Putting It Together" is his cryptic hymn to his position and yet it clearly reflects the same crucial decision faced by his great-grandfather.

This particular production, which was mounted at a cost of \$400,000 is visually bright and exciting and gives the proper three-dimensional affect. The intimate setting of the Goodman provides a wonderful environment for this piece. The orchestra is full and yet not overpowering. Former Milwaukeean, Steven Baltes (Bates) did a commendable job as conductor. He formerly was at the Skylight and Melody Top theaters here as well as conductor for a national tour of **42nd Street**.

John Herrera, as George, has a terrific set of credentials — Evita's che, and a leading role as an original cast member of Broadway's successful **Drood**. However, here I felt strongly that he was "holding back" and never really pushed until the finale. Knowing the demands of this script and lyrics and having had the experience of a stage beard in Evita, he should have known how to project properly. Instead, he was often too soft and hard to understand. As the main character in the show, he just didn't have the strength to carry the important first act and was overwhelmed by Dot. In the second act as the great-grandson, George, he improved somewhat but it is a less-demanding role.

The star of the show was Paula Scrofano's, Dot. She has a lovely strong voice and used it much to her favor. She is a strong actress and her winning presence was excellent in the first act. She was also good in the second as Marie, the daughter of George and Dot. Her performance will undoubtedly bring her a Joseph Jefferson (Chicago's Tonys) nomination.

The show combined with the Institute



"Steven," he said, his voice quiet, halting.


"Peter. Listen to Don. Listen. Time stops here. It stops for you on Brewer's Hill and it'll begin for us. Peter. For us because we love each other."




