


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

Oregon Governor Signs Pro-gay Executive Order

Salem, Ore. [Windy City Times]- Gov. Neil Goldschmidt has signed an executive order forbidding most state agencies from discriminating against lesbians, gay men, and bisexuals, reports Gay Community News. The order, which went into effect Oct. 15, is not as far-reaching as a draft proposal sent to the governor by the Oregon American Civil Liberties Union. However, pro-gay activists view it as a boost in their efforts to pass lesbian and gay civil rights measures in the Oregon legislature. Right-wing groups have reacted to the executive order with plans to put the measure to the test by statewide referendum and are also working to put a Portland city ordinance banning discrimination against municipal employees on the basis of sexual orientation on the ballot. Anti-gay forces would need 63,578 signatures to gain a referendum to "prevent any individual elected official from setting policy on gay rights." Observers strongly question the likelihood of that happening.

AIDS Report

Washington, D.C. [Sentinel]- President Reagan's AIDS commission will meet its Dec. 7 deadline for a preliminary report to the White House, but the document will be little more than a "road map" of where the panel has been and where it is headed, says the group's chairman.

Retired Adm. James D. Watkins last week ruled out the possibility of the initial report containing recommendations on such matters as the level of federal financing that should be thrown into the fight against AIDS or on controversial issues such as proposed widespread testing for the deadly virus.

Wisconsin AIDS Update

According to James M. Vergeront, State Division of Health, there have been 223 reported cases of AIDS and 147 reported AIDS-related deaths in Wisconsin as of Nov. 2.

March on Washington Nets Big Bucks

[Equal Time]- In the wake of one of this country's largest-ever civil rights marches, the March on Washington Organization is now faced with the pleasant task of deciding how to allocate a \$70,000 budget surplus.

March staffperson Kay Ostberg told Boston's Gay Community News that an audited report will be made public as soon as all financial information is compiled. Bills are still coming in, but march organizers will be meeting later this month to discuss how and where the budget surplus should be distributed.

Suggestions for disbursement of the funds have included:

- · Disbursement to local march organizers to retire debts incurred at the grassroots level.
- · Dividing the money into thirds, with two portions going to the National Coalition of Black Lesbians and Gavs and the newly-formed National Latino Lesbian and Gay Activist Coalition; the remaining third would be given to local political projects.
- · Allocating the money to organizations or projects related to the official march demands.

"We feel that this time the strength of the movement is in the grassroots," said Boston organizer Nancy Wechsler, adding that new groups forming nationwide as a result of the march and already existing local activist organizations need money and encouragement.

March on Washington Video Released

GVI, the official video crew for the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights, announced the release of "Part of the USA!". This half hour video is the only commemoration of the March officially endorsed by the Executive Committee. The documentary tells the story of

Who's That Girl?

Washington, D.C. [New Works News]-Those following the story of the civil disobedience action held at the Supreme Court two days after the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights will be interested to know that some of the the over 600 gays who got busted got off easier than others. It seems that when the judges and commissioners were handing out the sentences to those who pleaded quilty, they weren't particular about the names and addresses people gave. Many demonstrators gave fictitious names and addresses in hopes of keeping their records clean. Since many people who pleaded guilty were given 30 days to pay the \$50 fine, those who gave fake names were under no obligation to come up with the

One such lucky demonstrator was Connie Lingus (say it out loud). She caused much

comic relief as she and other intrepid protestors were shuffled through a myriad of holding cells. Each time her name was called by an official, giggles broke out among the jailed. The story goes that Connie made it all the way to her arraignment without being questioned about her name. In fact, the commissioner presiding over her hearing even said her name out loud and looked confused when those present in the courtroom tittered. The commissioner sentenced Connie like the rest of her comrades, and it wasn't until several minutes later that she (the commissioner) finally "got it" and cracked up laughing.

Rumor also has it that a guy named Phil Atio was sentenced.

Republican Alderman Comes Out in Madison

Madison- Jim McFarland, elected last year to Madison's city council representing the 8th District, has become the second Madison alderman - and the second Republican officerholder nationwide - to publicly acknowledge that he is gay. In an interview with the Capital Times, McFarland opined that it's sometimes harder being a Republican in the strongly liberal Wisconsin capital than being gay, McFarland, a senior in international relations and economics at the University of Wisconsin says he has received a "few" negative comments from fellow students who've known he is gav. but asserts he's "had even more harassment for being a Republican. I've been called a Nazi and a fascist pig." McFarland says he believes the GOP loses numerous votes because of its "antigayness." Says McFarland, "I want to show the Republicans that ... if they really wanted limited government they should support limited government in all areas of people's lives including their private lives "

NGLTF Urges Approval For Gay Adoptions

[NGLTF]- In a paper submitted to the Presidential Task Force on Adoption, the Lesbian Rights Project (LRP) and the Continued on page 6

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National Gay & Lesbain Task Force (NGLTF) urged the Reagan Administration to remove obstacles to adoption by lesbians and gay men.

The Interagency Task Force on Adoption was created August 24th by President Reagan, and was scheduled to report to the White House Domestice Policy Council on November 22nd. The Task Force is charged with making specific recommendations on how adoptions can be encouraged, through federal legislation, regulatory change, and state and local action.

"Our ideas about whose family is legitimate tend to be based less on clear perceptions of the many ways in which families are now constituted, and more on what our families were like when we were growing up," noted LRP's Roberta Achtenberg. "Lesbians and gay men have not been viewed by society at large as people with families, or as people interested in creating families or as people who value family life."

The LRP and NGLTF comments cite recent social science research to debunk some of the most commonly held myths about lesbian and gay parenting.

"In submitting this papaer to the Presidential Task Force, we wanted to challenge stereotypes with the reality of social experience," said NGLTF Executive Director Jeffrey Levi. "Lesbians and gay men do have stable, healthy, loving relationships and families. And many of us do have the desire and commitment to be excellent parents."

Since 1977, the San Francisco-based Lesbian Rights Project has worked through the courts, the legal system, and community-based efforts to promote the rights of lesbians and gay men to legal equality and justice.

The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force was founded in 1973 to advocate, educate and organize politically for the achievement of lesbian and gay civil rights.

Top AIDS Expert May Launch Lab

Washington, D.C. [USA Today]- The USA's most prominent AIDS researcher.

Robert Gallo, may leave the National Cancer Institute to start a center for AIDS research at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore. The Washington Post reported last week, Gallo, whose lab has been a magnet for many talented AIDS and cancer researchers, said he has interested at least two big investors in his new venture. Also interested: several leading cancer scientists. A Johns Hopkins spokesman said: "Nothing has been offered or accepted." Gallo will meet next week with virus expert Luc Montagnier of France's Pasteur Institute. The two in March settled a feud over credit for discovery of the AIDS virus.

Aids Action Council Distributes Packages to Presidential Candidates

Washington, D.C. [AAC]- All 12 presidential contenders received on November 12th a 71-page campaign briefing package from the AIDS Action Council, the D.C .based public policy and lobbying organization representing over 300 groups nationwide, and the only national group representing service providers, it was announced by AAC Executive Director Ann E. McFarren.

The packages consist of comprehensive basic information on the AIDS Crisis from the education, social, medical, healthcare, political and legislative points of view, nationally and internationally. The Council offers five comprehensive recommendations for additional initiatives to be taken by the next administration. All recommendations details the most effective new ways for the government to seize control of the spread of the epidemic, while still maintaining all efforts presently in force.

The AIDS Action Council recomendations are: expanded support of biomedical research programs, an information/education/risk reduction campaign, legislated confidentiality and anti-discrimination in the use of the HIV antibody test, access to and remimbursement for clinical services. and a full-scale federally sponsored antidrug and treatment campaign. For each recommendation the Council provides a detailed background report. Fact sheets Continued on page 7

summarizing the illness in demographic terms are also provided.

"No presidential candidate should be elected unless he or she has a well-formulated, scientifically-based, responsible and compassionate strategy for dealing with what is potentially the largest epidemic of modern times," said Ann McFarren.

The AIDS Action Council is a national public policy and lobbying organization comprising more than 300 groups which provide AIDS services and education.

Late Father's Male Lover Gets Custody of Youth

San Diego, Calif. [Milw. Journal]- A judge recently awarded custody of a 16-year-old boy to his late father's gay lover, saying the youth would then have the "stable and wholesome environment" his fundamentalist Christian mother couldn't provide.

Betty Lou Batey and her lawyer walked out of the hearing before guardianship of her son Brian was awarded, refusing to participate and charging that Superior Court Judge Judith McConnell was biased.

Under the ruling, Brian will continue to live in Palm Springs with Craig Corbett, who sought custody after Brian's father. Frank, died of an AIDS-related illness in June.

Frank and Betty Lou Batey had fought a bitter and protracted battle over Brian, with Mrs. Batey at one point snatching the boy, then age 11, and going into hiding for more than 1½ years.

I'm glad it's over," Corbett said Thursday, wiping away tears.

Asked how he and Brian could put the dispute behind them, he replied: "You don't. It's been a part of our life for five years. And it won't stop."

Attorneys for Batey had sought to disqualify McConnell, contending among other things that the judge couldn't be fair because she was a feminist.

In her ruling, McConnell said an "Extraordinarily thorough" investigation conducted into Brian's life by the county Probation Department concluded that he should remain with Corbett.

"Despite all this, the boy has turned out remarkably well. And I'm proud of Brian," the judge said, smiling at the youth. "You're a good employee, you're a good friend, you were a good son to your father."

She added, "You are fortunate to have in the person of Craig Corbett a man who will provide you with a stable and wholesome environment."

The Foundation is still seeking donors for a computer, art works, plants and other items to make a center everyone will be proud of.


The carpeting will be laid the week of December 1st and the desks, etc. will be in. The center will open on a part time basis in mid-December, and will be dedicated in January.



attractions are contemplated. The organizers want to explore all the possibilities with all the other community organizations at the meeting and involve as many as possible to assure a truly representative and important event for Milwaukee's Gay/Lesbian community.

Secondly, the elections of 1988 offer the first chance in 28 years for this community to develop "Clout". Changes in the Mayor, Senator and County Executive loom strongly. This year will be unique and once elected, these officials may serve for anywhere from 10-30 years in those positions. Recognizing that fact, the Forum will discuss a campaign which has had

tremendous success in 9 major cities across the country.

Operation Visibility produces at minimal cost — posters, banners, printable artwork, etc. for Gay/Lesbian "get-out-the-vote" campaigns. Coupling this with a registration campaign, we can elect "our" people to many offices.

Voters drawn to the polls by a major polical race, also tend to vote for lesser offices which increases our chart. No particular candidate nor party will be discussed at the meeting nor will any endorsements be given. Simply getting Gay voters to the polls will show politicians that we have the members that can make or break their campaigns. Continued on page 12

While some comments from the studio are clearly hostile, there are many that are surprisingly supportive of same-sex couples and gays and lesbians as parents.

Chris Cash and Leigh VanderEls, a lesbian couple from Atlanta, discuss relationships and Leigh's on-going fight of three years for custody of her eight year old son, Chase.

J. Carey Junkin and Walter Wheeler, a gay couple from West Hollywood, California, discuss the positive aspects of samesex couples and the need and desire for recognition of these relationships.

The show was prompted by interest in The Wedding held in Washington, D.C. on October 10, 1987. The Wedding was an officially sponsored event of The March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights.

Wheeler is the President and Junkin is the Executive Director of Couples, Inc.

After taping the show Wheeler said, "We hope to continue to raise this issue of inequality and to show society that lesbian and gay couples already live in committed on-going relationships. Perhaps we will soon see a time when our relationships are recognized and our families are treated fairly and equal to non-gay families."



Skylight Scores

Skylight Comic Opera hit the bullseye with their recent production of Working. This musical is based on the Studs Terkel book and includes a score by such diverse composers as Stephen Schwartz, Micki Grant, and James Taylor. The show is a compostion of short sequences and song about how employed persons and one retired spend their working or leisure hours. It criss-crosses a wide variety of occupations and careers.

The eight actors who made up the company played from one to six different characters each. Obviously a multi-talented company is demanded for such an undertaking and overall each performer delivered to his/her ability to make for a solid show in presentation.

The largest demand was on Milwaukee veteran, Norman Moses, who was called upon to pay six characters in the course of the evening. I found him to have hit a depth of character in his acting which I had not seen prior in his previous stage presentations. However, at the same time in some roles when he felt uncomfortable or not quite right; he resorted to much of his all too familiar "cutsey" carrying on. If he were to leave this amateurish acting behavior once and for all; he might well become all the actor of which he is certainly capable.

Milwaukee's other familiar face in the cast, Bill Leach, certainly was more than able to handle the personification of a varied range of characters from the youngest, the newsboy, to the eldest, the retiree. Mr. Moses might do well to do some continued study from among his own cast!

Not only strong acting ability but an extremely talented vocal ensemble (from among the best gathering in recent local production memory) was clearly in evidence. Familiar Ellie Quint, Moses, combined with recent newcomers, White Eagle, Barbara Roberts, and Bryon Jones, clearly stand out.

The characterizations of Susan E. Hofflander were strong and well developed.

Staging by director, Victoria Bussert, was simplistic yet extremely effective. Her use of slides and the lighting of Danil Brovarney added convincingly to the piece. With this type of production approach, even the simplistic orchestral accompaniment was sufficient.

This production continues the high caliber of "Irma La Douce" and "Sweeney Todd" of recent vintage. At this rate, the remainder of the season should be a treat!

It was all so perfect and yet----










Too often people will sign up to work for a volunteer organization just to have their name on the program. There is no room for individuals like this in a volunteer organization.

The H.I.T. board is made up from committee heads (Publicity/Graphics, Housing/Transportation, Hospitality, Scorekeeping, Scheduling, Fund Raising, Banquet, Statistics, and Prizes and Awards), a director, secretary, and treasurer. Each committee and officer is directed to select an assistant to aid them in the performance of their duties.

However, some board members elected not to appoint an assistant. This is ridiculous! No matter how experienced and capable you are, shit happens! An emergency at your job requires you to leave during the tournament, and there is no one there to fill your shoes. Perhaps you get in an accident or are ill - who takes over then? You have weak links that affect the work that has been done all year long. I urge the directors of next year's tournament to make sure all committees have assistants that are functional... that can step in and take over should the need arise. We owe it to the community that does such a fine job of supporting this event and makes it possible.

Where To Invest Now?

As Monday, Oct. 19, 1987 passes into infamy, many wonder what to do now. Here are a few points about present investments and a few thoughts on other opportunities.

•If you avoided the normal mistake of selling your stocks and stock based mutual funds after the major "run down" of the market, remember that you are only experiencing "paper loses" at the present time. If you move the funds into what you consider safer turf, you will experience real loses.

You say that you don't want to even lose more? Well, you evidently don't understand the market.

RULES:

Never buy into the Stock Market if you are going to need access to your monies in less than a five year period of time, preferably 10 years.

Never buy into the Market with anything but "risk money", this means that you have significant monies in varied savings vehicles and/or have been smart enough to get into a high powered contemporary life insurance program which provide total investment flexibility and tax deferred growth on your gains, thus avoiding current capital gains (which is the reality of the new tax law).

Diversify your portfolio in the investments, making sure that not all of it is in stock based funds. This is also a good reason to mutual funds with a large family of funds.

Once the "Bear" has scared off all the "Bulls" on the Market, hold onto your investments until the trend has swung to the point that you have made at least your investment and a reasonable interest rate back. Then you may consider downsizing your investment in stock based funds if too much of your portfolio is there.

The Market will come back only when "we the people" have:

 a) forced our political leaders to make tough choices and reduce the horrible deficit (which unfortunately the Reagan Administration has created) which will require the wisdom of Solomon in balancing military and human needs. Sadly the ghost of McCarthy still stirs blood in Washington, D.C. about the "commies", not remembering that a strong will people determine the success or failure of potential adversaries, not hardware.

b) forced ourselves to begin to save more and spend less. That will provide the financial institutions with economic muscle to invest in our future — much as we have seen the Japanses doing during the past many years.

c) Buy American and demand quality from American products to slow this runaway trade imbalance. This isn't funny folks!

d) Do business with small business owners, especially locally owned small business. Here I am not only suggesting that you do business with gay/lesbian business owners that support our community — I AM — however, if a gay/lesbian person doesn't provide a service you need, check with C.C.B.A. or myself to see if there are non-gay vendors who can do you a good service. Small businesses drive our economy.

e) Ever considered starting your own business? This is the time to get serious about it. Give me a call to see if there are some serious possibilities of you getting off the ground at this time. We'll have more on this idea in future columns.

I know I sound like a broken record, but it is a fact that most gay/lesbian people do not support their own (other than bars, restaurants, hair salons, and florists). It is time to learn that we have highly competent people in our community. When we build up and properly utilize our economic clout, we will gain real power.



A WOMAN'S VIEW by Linda Hendersen

When The Honeymoon Is Over

Imagine this: the lights are soft and low, candlelight flickers on the wall. In the background Meg Christians "Sweet Darling Woman" is playing You raise your wine glass in celebrtion of your newfound love. Sitting across the table is the most beautiful, interesting, sexy, bright woman you have ever met. You stare deep into her liquid, loving eyes, lean forward, take her warm, soft hand in yours and ask "How will we know when this relationship is over?"

The Lesbian Relationship Handbook, written by Phyllis J. Athey and Mary Jo Osterman, suggests you ask this question and many, many others of each other before you become deeply involved in any relationship.

Mary Jo and Phyllis leave love and romance to our poets and singers. They address the "nuts and bolts" of lesbian relationships. How two individuals with separate values, wants, needs, and goals can come together to form a healthy, productive, successful relationship.

The Lesbian Relationship Handbook is full of very practical advice for those who want to share their lives with another. In addition to questions about money, sex, goals and values, they suggest a frank discussion of "the end" of a relationship. How it will end, whether you'll seek counseling, whether you could change the relationship in the face of trouble and still sustain it. They feel these questions will actually help the relationship stay healthier longer by clarifying individual ideas and feelings and coming to an agreement about the structure of the relationship.

Honesty and clarity often are the cornerstones to building a healthy relationship according to Mary Jo and Phyllis.

"Our values are part of our sense of our own identity: who we are, what we want, where we are going. The more clarity we have personally, the more clarity our relationships can have and the healthier both we and our relationship will be."

Their chapters on Communication; Addiction and Rituals are particulary interesting.

In the chapter on Communication, they discuss fighting as a tool for communication. You'll recognize their descriptions of unfair fighting, if you have ever gone through an ugly, hateful breakup. "Gunnysacking" (stuffing all your irritation in a sack and exploding over some minor issue) and "Kitchen-Sink" (holding it all in but bringing it all out at one time, thus making problem-resolution impossible) are two of the most common unfair fighting techniques among lesbians. "Below-the-Belt (bringing up past lovers' mistakes) is the most hurtful. Their outline for fair fighting techniques stresses that both partners should begin the fight assuming a "winwin" resolution.

In the chapter on Addiction, they offer ten questions to ask yourself that will help determine whether your attraction to another is a healthy one - whether your


