#### Supreme Court Protects Georgetown U. Gavs

The U.S. Supreme Court rejected a bid by Georgetown University to delay enforcement of a court order requiring the school to let gay rights groups to meet on campus and obtain other benefits accorded to student organizations.

Gay groups accused the school of violating the District of Columbia Human Rights Act. The University had appealed the District Court of Columbia's decision which had also supported the inclusion of gay groups. The District Court ruled that the nation's oldest Roman Catholic university provide the same "tangible benefits" to lesbian and gay groups as it grants to other student groups. The Appeals Court upheld the District Court's decision.

"This country has a long and unfortunate history of discrimination based on sexual orientation," Judge Carter Mack wrote in the opinion of the District Court.

According to Gay Community News. Attorney Ronald Bogard, who filed the original lawsuit, said the seven year legal battle resulted in a decision of broad significance. He said, "it establishes that if you have (anti discrimination) ordinances and they don't apply to religious folk, they don't mean anything."

#### **Stoughton Pupils Defend** Gav Ads reduction fundamental

Stoughton, WI [Journal]- High school students lectured school board members on the need for tolerance in placing advertisements of gay support groups in the school newspaper, Jan. 4th.

About 20 speakers, including former school newspaper staff members home for the holidays, told nine board members during a well-attended public hearing that refusing the ads in the school's newspaper. the Norse Star, would mean denving that

#### homosexuality existed.

Board member Larry Roberts has made an informal proposal that the board cut \$1,800 in annual support to the newspaper if students continue to carry such ads.

Six advertisements from The Madison Community United and the Ten% Society, two Madison support groups for gays, have been published in the Norse Star during the past three years, Gerber said at the hearing.

New advertisers Jane and Bob Hill, owners of the Buggy Scrub car wash, complained to the newspaper's staff this fall about the ads. The Hills have threatened to lead an advertising boycott.

Stoughton junior Matthew Schultz had harsh words for Roberts' proposal.

"It's ridiculous," he said. "This town must be full of rednecks."

Schultz said he didn't think Madison was trying to push its social agenda on nearby communities.

"Part of me says it's freedom of the press," Schultz said. "The other part says that gays are getting pushed around again."

#### Extra Fines/Time Urged for Hate Crimes

Madison, WI [Journal]- All society is the vitim of crimes of bigotry, and therefore the penalties should be more severe, proponents of a so-called hate crims bill said at a State Senate committee hearing.

They urged passage of the bill, which would stiffen penalties for crimes motivated by intolerance based on race, religion, color, creed, disability, sexual orientation or ancestry.

The state has an obligation to protect minorities from harassment, whether the harassment stems from "racial hatred, religious intolerance or gay-bashing." State Rep. David Clarenbach (D-Madison) told members of the Senate Judiciary and Consumer Affairs Committee.

Penalties for crimes of bigotry should be

more severe because the victims of these crimes are whole categories of people.

"These crimes are directed, not only against an individual, but against an entire community, an entire class," Clarenbach said.

The bill (S-442) would allow judges to add as much as five years to the regular sentence for a felony if the crime was motivated by some form of bias.

Also, the fine could be increased by \$5,000. If the underlying crime ordinarily were a misdemeanor, it could be upgraded to a felony with a maximum penalty of two years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

#### Youth, 17, Charged as Adult in Slaving

[Milw. Journal]- A 17-year-old boy was charged as an adult last week in the slaving of his 37-year-old former roommate during a quarrel.

Samuel Dashner, of 1435 W. Cleveland Ave., was charged with second-degree murder.

The victim, Michael C. Koudelka, was found dead Dec. 1 in his apartment at 802 E. State St.

An autopsy showed Koudelka died from blunt force injuries to the head and chest. He also suffered crushing injuries to the neck and chemical burns.

The youth told police he and Koudelka had a gay relationship, Det. Irvin Kraus testified at a hearing. Police said infidelity appeared to underlie the motive.

Kessler noted that the youth would be 18 on Feb. 4. Although he could be kept in juvenile custody until he turned 19, Kessler pointed out that a psychiatric evaluation said the youth would need 10 years of treatment to overcome the effects of a difficult childhood, which included living with an alcoholic mother.

He told police that he and Koudelka quarreled for several hours after he became angry about Koudelka's drinking. The youth said he got so angry he began to hit Koudelka and pour liquids - ranging from drain cleaners to soda - over him. When

Koudelka began yelling that some of the liquid was buring his eyes, he pulled him into the shower to help wash the material off, the youth said.

The youth claimed that he left the apartment with Koudelka still alive, but bleeding from the nose and mouth.

#### **Gay Family Rights** Opposed

Madison, WI [Journal]- Mayor Joseph Sensenbrenner said he opposes a plan that would give gay and lesbian couples and others in non-traditional family relationships some of the same rights as traditional families.

The proposal is backed by seven members of the Madison City Council.

But Sensenbrenner said, "I haven't seen any drafts (of the plan) I could support."

The proposal calls for the city to provide family-type health insurance benefits for people who are in non-traditional relationships.

Sensenbrenner estimated that the insurance feature would cost the city an estimated \$40,000 a year.

#### **Expansion of AIDS Tests** Proposed

Madison, WI [Journal]- AIDS test provisions that now apply only to individual insurance policies would be expanded to policies written for small groups under Gov. Thompson's budget proposal.

If approved during the Legislature's coming budget debates, the proposal would allow an insurance company to require an AIDS virus tests, or required access to results from previous tests, for individuals getting insurance through certain small groups.

State Deputy Insurance Commissioner Robert Elconin said the new regulation would be limited to businesses with fewer than 25 employees and possibly those with fewer than 15 individuals covered by a group policy.

#### Anti-Gay Helms Language Diluted

[Windy City Times]- Modifications of the "Helms Amendment" to legislation appropriating funds for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services were termed a "modest victory" by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force.

The Helms Amendment, sponsored by conservative U.S. Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.), originally prohibited the use of federal funds for AIDS education and material which "promotes or encourages. directly or indirectly, homosexual sexual activity." The amendment was attached to the Labor and Health and Human Services Appropriations Bill for fiscal year 1988; it passed the U.S. Senate by a vote of 94-2 (with four abstentions) on Oct. 14, 1987 the first working day after the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights - and was seen as a direct slap in the face of the gay community. On Oct. 20, on a motion by right-wing U.S. Rep. William Dannemeyer (R-Calif.), the amendment was overwhelmingly endorsed by the House of Representatives.

But when the appropriations bills went before a joint House-Senate Conference Committee in December, changes were made to limit the broad scope of the amendment's original language. The word "indirectly" was deleted, thus weakening the amendment's application to gavsupportive AIDS educational material. Also, the Conference Report specifically states that the amendment shall not be construed "to prohibit descriptions of methods to reduce the risk of (Human Immunodeficiency Virus) transmission" or "to limit the eligibility for federal funds of a grantee or potential grantee because of its non-federally funded activities." Thus, a gay-run organization that promotes safe gay sex in a privately funded program can apply for federal funds to support other efforts.

The motion to weaken the amendment's language was made by Rep. Steny Hoyer (D-Md.).

The clarifying language also notes that the amendment cannot "limit counseling or referrals to agencies that are not federally funded." However, original language in the Helms Amendment requiring that all AIDS education materials encourage monogamy and abstinence from sex outside marriage was left unmodified.

#### Taylor Found Guilty in Eau Claire Killing

Eau Claire [Sentinel]- A traveling entertainer charged in four killings in the state was found guilty of first-degree murder in one of them Jan. 8th after changing his plea.

Alvin Taylor, 40, withdrew a not-guilty plea in the May 1986 death of James Severson, of Eau Claire. That leaves only a plea of not guilty by reason of mental disease or defect before the court.

Eau Claire County Circuit Judge Gregory Peterson found Taylor guilty and scheduled a trial for Feb. 15 to determine Taylor's sanity at the time of Severson's death.

Taylor has been charged in three other deaths, including a first-degree murder charge in the November 1986 gunshot slaying of Daniel Lundgren, 33, of West Bend. Two other murder charges are pending in Dane County.

#### Virginia Gay Group Runs Newspaper Ads

Alexandria, VA- The Alexandira Gay Community Assocation placed the first of a series of bold quarter-page ads in the Washington Post in mid-December to promote acceptance and understanding of gay and lesbian Americans.

"We believe our ads encourage people to examine their prejudices, discard attitudes based on ignorance, and begin treating Gay men and Lesbians with the same respect they extend to other minority group members," said Jay Clark, AGCA's president.

The first ad addressed the difficulties facing Gay adolsecents and asks parents who are ignorant about homosexuality, "Are you abusing your child without knowing it?". A future ad will address the

injustice of state laws which criminalize love between persons of the same gender, and another ad speculates on discrimination poet Walt Whitman would face if he were alive today and his homosexuality were known.

The ads were created by AGCA members and will appear monthly on the **Post's** Federal Page.

Funding for the campaign comes from ' gifts from AGCA members and supporters, and grants from the Chicago Resource Center, Brother Help Thyself, and the Gay and Lesbian Education Fund of Washington, D.C.

#### Hoover Asked about Gays in Press Corps

Washington, D.C. [Journal]- In November 1970, President Richard Nixon's chief of staff, H.R. Haldeman, asked then-FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover to pass on any information the agency had collected about homosexuals "known and suspected in the Washington press corps," according to a newly discovered memo that Hoover made at the time.

Hoover, who addressed the memo to his five assistants, said Haldeman had called and "stated the president wanted him to ask, and he would imagine I would have it pretty much at hand so there would be no specific investigation, for a rundown on the homosexuals known and suspected in the Washington press corps."

The memo went on to say, "I thought we have some of that material. Mr. Haldeman mentioned (name or names deleted) and some of the others rumored generally to be and also whether we had any other stuff: that he, the president, has an interest in what, if anything else, we know."

Charles D. Brennan, one of the assistant FBI directors to whom the memo was addressed, said he had no recollection of the memo.

"It's well known Hoover was obsessed by the issue of homosexuals. Many people think it was because he was not certain about his own sexual identity," said Sanford Ungar, dean of the school of


"But in many ways this memo tells more about Haldeman than it does about Hoover," Ungar added.

#### Slaying May Be Tied to Blackmail

Frenso, CA [Milw. Journal]- A teenage male prostitute whose body was dismembered with a chain saw and buried in two counties may have been murdered because he tried to blackmail customers, a newspaper reported earlier this month.

Authorities have no firm evidence, however, that Tracy Leroy Nute, 18, was blacking the man charged with killing him, Max B. Franc, formerly of De Pere, Wis. according to an article in the Fresno Bee.

Franc's attorney, Mark Kaiserman, said the death penalty should be ruled out if the motive was blackmail. Franc has been charged with murder for robbery, which *Continued on page 43*





#### YOUR HEALTH 10 More AIDS Cases in State

#### Madison, WI- Ten new confirmed cases of AIDS were reported in Wisconsin in December, boosting the state's total to 253, the state Division of Health reported earlier this month.

Seven more deaths were blamed on acquired immune deficiency syndrome, said Timothy Cullen, secretary of health and social services. That boosted to 159 the number of AIDS deaths in Wisconsin since 1982, Cullen said.

#### Definition of AIDS Too Narrow, Experts Say

Washington, D.C. [Journal]- So many kinds of illnesses have been traced to the AIDS virus that leading researchers have concluded that the term AIDS no longer adequately describes the nature or magnitude of the epidemic.

They now regard acquired immune deficiency syndrome as only the most dramatic and visible form of a complicated disease and think that AIDS has become a misnomer based on symptoms rather than infection. Instead, many argue that the epidemic should be renamed after the virus that causes it: the human immunodeficiency virus.

The Public Health Service estimates that as many as 1.5 million people have been infected with HIV, almost 30 times the number of those who have been diagnosed with AIDS. A growing body of scientific evidence suggests that most – perhaps all – of those infected will get sick. And recent research shows that the virus often causes serious damage even to those who seem healthy.

"It has been clear for some time that the real epidemic starts when you become infected with HIV," said William Haseltine of the Harvard University School of Public health.

AIDS-related complex, for example, has made tens of thousands of Americans gravely ill and has killed many others. But because the Centers for Disease Control has established a specific definition of AIDS, those who die from ARC are not normally included in the weekly count of AIDS cases.

As for the narrowly defined version of AIDS, the disease struck more than 20,000 people in the United States in 1987, and tht total number of cases reported nationwide passed the 50,000 mark as 1988 opened, federal health officials said last week.

But as they learn the many ways HIV can assault the body, physicians have begun to disregard the official definition of AIDS, saying they find it of little use in treating patients.

The CDC system relies heavily on specific symptoms and illnesses associated with HIV infection for its definition of AIDS. It has been modified several times in the past five years.

Army doctors have developed a system that evaluates subtle changes HIV causes in the blood of infected people that harm key parts of the immune system. Specialists, including those at CDC, say it does a better job of measuring the effects of the disease among individuals.

Under the CDC system, 20% to 30% of those infected with HIV will develop AIDS within three to five years of infection. But the staging system developed by the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research tells a far more alarming story.

"Walter Reed doesn't look at symptoms as much as it looks right at what HIV has done to the immune system," said physician Anthony S. Fauci, director of AIDS activities for the National Institutes of health. "It shows that the vast majority (of those infected) have some deleterious effect of the virus within five years."

The CDC's revision of its AIDS definition last year raised the number of AIDS cases by nearly 15% and enabled thousands of people to qualify for Social Scurity disability payments and other benefits reserved for AIDS patients.

But for thousands of others the revisions did nothing. Federal health officials estimate that there are as many as 10 people with ARC for every one with AIDS.



#### Faster Test Can Also Help in AIDS Fight

Washington, D.C. [USA Today]- A fast, new test for the AIDS virus has been developed by National Cancer Institute scientists.

Dr. George Paviakis, physician and molecular biologist, says the new test has two important applications.

•It can be used immediately to test how well experimental AIDS drugs kill the virus.

•If trials are successful over the next year, if could be used to screen for the AIDS virus much faster and more accurately than today's methods.

In a study reported in January's Science journal, the test was used to prove that a new drug - dideoxycytidine (ddC) - is 50 times more effective at killing the virus in the laboratory than AZT, the first drug approved for AIDS treatment.

#### Transmission of AIDS During Lesbian Sex

Washington, D.C. [Journal]- Two reports of possible female-female transmission of the AIDS virus have shaken the American lesbian community. The reports in medical journals about apparent woman-to-woman transmission through contact with infected blood are being widely quoted in the gay press as evidence of a potential danger to lesbians.

In one case, reported in the Annals of Internal Medicine, a New York woman apparently caught the virus that causes acquired immune deficiency syndrome from her infected female lover during sexual activities.

In the other case, reported in Lancet, a 24-year-old dancer from the Philippines tested positive for the AIDS virus after several years of travel in which she said she had sexual contact with women of many nationalities.

The dancer "denied all heterosexual contact and intravenous drug abuse, and she had no history of blood transfusion," according to the report.



would say that female-to-female transmission appears possible but at this time is still a very rare occurrence," said Stanley Weiss, one of the physicians reporting on the possible transmissions.

"What I believe about safe sex is that lesbians have to pull their heads out of the sand (and stop thinking) that it doesn't happen to them and that we're some kind of pure race that it won't affect," said Susie Bright, editor of On Our Backs, a San Francisco-based magazine for lesbians.




#### In Step:

They're excited about our parade next week. The city is coming to change a street lamp. We took a vote and I decided it was a perfect occasion.

Don't think I've forgotten my weapons' training. In the spirit of time-efficiency, I practice offensive and defensive maneuvers in my sleep. I'm still trying to convince my roommate that black and blue are becoming colors for her. I'm teaching my cats Russian to heighten my motivation. I was having a difficult time convincing my landlord that a foxhole in the backyard could only increase property values but the claymore mine exploding in his toilet seemed to do the trick.

I'm sure you recall that it took three drill sergeants and two PFC's to drag me on the bus home. I'll never forgive Sgt. Parker for forcing those tickets on me. Friday, the 13th of July was truly a sad day in my life. It seems amid the confusion of sawing through the lock and chain to force me out of the wall locker, I have become separated from my boots and one pair of fatigues. 

Please excuse any typing errors you may find in this letter. I'm just learning how to type with calloused hands. I wanted to call you but my doctor said it would irritate the scar tissue in my throat. How I miss singing those heart-rendering marching songs. Remember the one about the little yellow bird on the window sill — and stomping his head in?

How are the new trainees doing? I remember watching them arrive the night before we left. So excited, curious, well rested, unscarred, so much energy – a lot of spirit to be broken. I could see the excitement in your eyes as you planned their future with Foxtrot Company.

My friends were impressed with the souvenirs of my stay with you – bronchitis, vaginitis, red ant bites, blisters, and poison ivy. They think it's very patriotic that my medical bills are spurring our wanning economy. I have you to thank for all the things that happened to me and, believe me, I'll never forget you or your tattoo.

Things are going well here, although I haven't been able to eat much since I returned. After the mess hall, food
