





Faculty Senate to Prod ROTC To End Gay Ban

Madison, Wis. [Journal]- University faculty senators defeated an attempt Feb. 1st to cut the Reserve Officer Training Corps program from campus if it continues to discriminate against gays.

Instead, the University of Wisconsin -Madison Faculty Senate recommended that ROTC program statistics be reviewed annually to determine whether discrimination exists based on sexual orientation.

The recommendation to Chancellor Donna Shalala accompanies another recommendation that encourages the Faculty Senate to pursue changes in Department of Defense regulations that currently prohibit homoseuxals from entering the armed forces.

The recommendations were adopted on a voice vote of about 200 faculty members who attended the meeting.

The combined Army, Navy and Air Force ROTC currently enrolls about 370 UW-Madison student, an Army spokesman said

At odds are the university's requirement as a condition of its land grant status to provide military science training, which is fulfilled through the ROTC program, and state and university policy that prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation.

A committee that studied the issue for a year could find no rational reason for the continued refusal of the Defense Department to admit homosexuals, said Norman Fost, committee member and professor of pediatrics and medical ethics.

Common reasons given for the Pentagon's homosexual policy were that it could prevent the spread of AIDS or help maintain security, Fost said. But he noted that the homosexual policy was in effect before fear of AIDS had grown to current proportions.

Despite the faculty's vote, Fost said he was not dissatisfied.

Prof. urges student legal action

"The whole point is to stimulate others in positions of power to change the policies, and to possibly stimulate others to take

legal action," such as gay students claiming discrimination, Fost said.

Army Capt. James Adams, who said he knew of homosexual servicemen, agreed with Fost that lawmakers and the courts should change existing laws.

"The law says we will not commission homosexuals, regardless of what I think philosophically," Adams said.

Worldwide... A Year To Remember

•Ireland elected an openly gay man, David Morris, to the Irish senate.

. The government of Norway funded a gav newspaper as a tool in the fight against AIDS.

 Sweden granted gay couples the same considerable rights extended common law marriages, parliament passed the gay rights bill by acclamation.

· Israel saw the publication of its first lesbian/gay newspaper, Maga'im (meaning 'contracts').

 Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands named Ilse Kokula to a tenured professorship in lesbian studies at the University of Utrecht.

· Cuernavaca, Mexico hosted the first lesbian feminist conference of Latin America and the Caribbean, drawing 260 participants.

 The 10th International Conference of Gay and Lesbian Jews met in Amsterdam, with 250 delegates from 13 countries participating.

· Two extreme danger zones continue to exist for gays: Colombia has seen a large number of gay men assissinated during the past few years, and in Turkey police raids and brutality are frequent.

Meanwhile, the International Lesbian and Gay Association ushered out 1987 with a gathering of more than 200 academics in Amsterdam Dec. 10-12 for the Conference "Homosexuality Beyond Disease."

NGLTF Presidential Candidate Profiles

The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) has prepared profiles detailing the positions of all Democratic and Republican candidates on issues of concern to the gay/lesbian community. The profiles are based on a synthesis of candidate responses to an NGLTF survey, upon candidate speeches and statements and upon press reports of candidate positions.

"These profiles offer useful insights into the committment different candidates have to gay/lesbian issues," said Peri Jude Radecic, who heads up NGLTF's 1988 Voter Education Drive. "Our goal is an informed gay and lesbian electorate at the primary level and in November."

AIDS Victim, Sons Win \$750,000 Suit

Boston, Mass. [Journal]- A jury Jan. 19th awarded an AIDS victim and her sons \$750,000 in what was described as the first medical malpractice verdict involving the disease.

A Superior Court jury ruled that physician Kenneth Bernstein of Cambridge was negligent in his diagnosis and treatment of Elizabeth Ramos' illness. She said she was originally diagnosed as having asthma when she was suffering from a type of pneumonia linked to AIDS.

Activist Bradley Dies

[Equal Times]- Dan Bradley, one of the gay rights movement's most courageous and determined fighters, died of AIDS on Friday, January 9.

Bradley became a symbol of pride for the gay community when, in 1982, as president of the Legal Services Corp. under the Carter Administration, he publicly declared his homosexuality. From that time on, while maintaining a private law practice in Florida, he was an outspoken gay rights activist.

Bradley continued his activism after being diagnosed with AIDS, and spent his last months publicly fighting for civil rights for gays and lesbians and people with AIDS.

He was among 61 people arrested in June, 1987 at the White House demonstrating for more AIDS funding and research.

At the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights on October 11, Bradley gave a powerful and moving speech to the 500,000 people who gathered on the Capitol grounds.

"He fought to the very last with hope, and inspiration for our community," said National Gay Rights Advocates Director Jean O'Leary. "As we continute that fight, we will gain strength from his hope, and we will never forget his commitment and courage."

Diocese Accepts Non-Traditional Pairs

Newark, NJ [Journal]- The Episcopal Diocese of Newark's decision to accept relationships of homosexual and unmarried couples reflects the view of a small but growing minority in the church, the diocesean leader says.

Representatives of northern New Jersey's 125 Episcopal parishes voted to give their blessing to relationships tranditionally not recognized by the church.

Under a resolution passed by clergy and lay people at their annual convention, the diocese upheld "those pastors and congregations who minister and seek to include persons living out alternate patterns of sexuality and family life."

Women's Agenda Conf. **Excludes** Lesbian Issues

The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) strongly challenged the failure of a national feminist conference to address lesbian rights issues. A national Women's Agenda Conference held in Des Moines on January 22-24, 1988, and endorsed by most major feminist groups failed entirely to address lesbian and gay issues. During the Conference, NGLTF staff lobbvist Peri Jude Radecic repeatedly questioned the exclusion of lesbian/gay concerns and pressed for their recognition.

"It was clear that lesbians were not a welcome agenda issue," said NGLTF lobbyist Radecic. "The word 'lesbian' was never voluntarily spoken or written by workshop moderators, panelists or conference speakers during the entire weekend."

The Women's Agenda Conference was sponsored by 43 feminist and women's organizations including the National Women's Political Caucus, the Older Women's League, National Council of Negro Women, Business and Professional Women/U.S.A., Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, and the NOW Legal Defense and Education Fund. The Women's Agenda Conference was an attempt to shape public policy priorities for the 1988 elections.

NGLTF Board Positions

The Board of Directors of the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) invites interested persons to consider serving on the 24-member Board. The NGLTF Board is elected by all Task Force members during elections held in August and Sept. of each year. Any member of the Task Force is eligible to serve on the Board. Approximately eight seats will be open for election this year.

As set forth in NGLTF's by-laws, the Board is committed to gender parity, racial diversity and geographic representation. All NGLTF board members make a committment to raise \$2,500 a year for the organization. In addition, members are expected to attend quarterly board meetings held around the country, and to serve

on Board committees.

The National Gay & Lesbian Task Force was founded in 1973 to advocate and organize for equal rights for lesbians and gay men in all aspects of society. Today, the Task Force serves as the gay community's lobby at the federal level, and houses several organizing projects on anti-gay violence, the reform of laws criminalizing gay/lesbian sexuality, gay and lesbian family issues, coverage of gay issues and perspectives in the mainstream media, and combatting AIDS-related discrimination at the federal and local levels. The Task Force also serves as a resource center for local and state gay organizations.

The NGLTF Board oversees the financial management of the Task Force and is actively involved in setting policy directions for the organization. Gav Cuban Immigrants

[Paz Y Liberacion]- U.S. House of Representatives member Barney Frank (Democrat, Massachusetts), the first member of Congress to come out voluntarily as a gay person, is requesting that anyone with Information about Gay Cuban Marielitos, who remain incarcerated soley because they are gay, to please contact him.

Rep. Frank, who is a sponsor of a bill which would repeal the anti-gay provision of the Amrican Immigration Law, has been working for several years to assist the gay men included in the Mariel Boat Lift. It has been estimated that approximately 50 percent of the Cuban prisoners who were rioting at the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary and the Federal Alien Detention Center in Louisiana were gays, jailed for up to eight years primarily or solely because of their homosexuality and without any judicial process whatsoever. It is feared that the governmental agreements with the rioters will not benefit the gay Cubans as the U.S. Government does not recognize that the gay Cubans have any rights.





Violence Survey

For the third consecutive year, the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) is compiling an annual report on anti-gay/lesbian incidents. Utilizing statistics and anecdotal accounts, this report will describe the nature and extent of anti-gay violence nationally in 1987. Last year's report received extensive media attention. and led to several groundbreaking federal initiatives, including a Justice Department report which concluded that gay and lesbian people "are probably the most frequent victims" of hate violence in America today. Data from last year's report also helped persuade the House Judiciary Committee to approve the "Hate Crime Statistics Act," a bill that would require the federal collection of data on crimes based on racial, religious, and anti-gay bigotry. (This bill now awaits a vote on the floor of the House)

Milwaukee's Black & White Men Together [BWMT] is requesting data on local anti-gay/lesbian incidents, to forward to NGLTF. To make a report of an incident call Alan at 449-2454, please do so as soon as possible, the report should be in to NGLTF by the end of this month.

With your help, this report will provide us with up-to-date statistics and enable us to dramatize the pervasiveness of anti-gay/ lesbian violence.

OUR HEALTH WI. AIDS Summary

New Legislation **Regarding HIV Testing**

In response to recommendations by the Wisconsin Public Health Task Force on AIDS, a new Wisconsin law provides for involuntary testing for the presence of HIV or antibody to HIV, and disclosure of test results without patient consent in certain limited circumstances. The new law, 1987 Wisconsin Act 70 which amends the 1985 Wisconsin Act 73, also enhances confidentiality of medical records for students and medical portions of ambulance reports, and clarified terms of access to test results through court orders. Governor Thompson signed the law November 13, 1987. The student record provision of the law is not effective until Sept. 1, 1989; the remainder of the law which went into effect on November 24, 1987, responds to concerns expressed by health care workers, correctional officers and coroners who are at some risk for exposure to HIV through their occupations.

Access to the results of a previously obtained test for the presence of HIV or antibody to HIV is now extended, without patient consent, to the following persons if they have had a "significant exposure" to blood or other body fluid and have obtained a physician certification of the exposure: emergency caregivers including physiclans, nurses, paramedics, cardiopulmonary resuscitators, firefighters giving first ald, and good Samaritans; coroners; persons performing autopsies; funeral directors; and medical examiners.

Sheriffs and keepers of jails and prisons may also have access to HIV antigen or antibody test results for the purpose of cell assignment.

1987 Wisconsin Act 70 authorizes the involuntary testing of deceased persons in situations in which an individual providing emergency or post mortem care sustains a significant exposure. In addition, involuntary testing is authorized in situations in which a resident of a Department-operated mental health or developmentally disabled center poses a threat of exposure to other residents. 

The Wisconsin Division of Health has received limited funds for the payment for azidothymidine (AZT) for persons with AIDS or AIDS-Related Complex (ARC) who qualify under the federal program guidelines. In order to be eligible for this program the applicant must be a resident of Wisconsin, meet the medical criteria for receipt of AZT, have no third party payment means, have applied for medical assistance and earn less than the income standard (150% of federal low income standard, plus \$10,000 - the estimated per patient cost of AZT for one year).

Persons meeting the residency, financial and medical criteria who have received AZT under investigational drug treatment programs will be given priority. Others will be approved on a first-come, first-served basis determined by the postmark date on which the entire completed application was received at the Reimbursement Program.

Milwaukee Rep which formed the basis for my last column. In it, I did comment about my own perception of their treatment of the gay community. Also, the catalyst for my own reactions and feelings came about through their own production of "The Diary of Anne Frank".

Let me say first off that the Milwaukee Rep is far from homophobic and has dealt with a plethora of social justice issues not only in the themes of the plays but their own racial casting philosophy for roles as well. For this, I certainly commend them in being among the leaders in regional theaters in this regard.

In my previous article, I did also mention that I had hoped that this entire unfortunate episode had in fact been a misunderstanding or communication breakdown. I am happy to report that is exactly what did develop.

After several telephone calls with members of the Rep's staff, I came to understand that their previous preview policy had changed. Formerly I had been invited to performances with others which are now sold to the viewing public prior to the opening of a show, as is the case in New York. Now should I wish to attend, I must telephone and request tickets.

I have no quarrel with this procedural change instituted with "The Matchmaker" which did open this season. However, no prior information came to me from the Rep to make me aware of the change. I had to telephone to get the information, have my name placed on the news release listing, and ask for this procedural explanation myself.

Believe me, I do realize that I must work to complete this column and all major theater companies such as the Rep are not responsible for my writing or column copy. I do also realize that no special treatment should be awarded to us soley on the basis of our being gay. However, in an organization of the Rep's size, one would think the publicity and media departments would do all they could to promote and aide those of us who carry through their public relations.

We were initially overlooked. I can accept that. But it took three conversations

to get an explanation which made sense. The first two explanations dealt with the hectic pace of opening a new show and a new season in a new theater and office space. Also included herein was the description of the aforementioned change in preview and review policy, as a reason. In my telephone conversation today, I received the third explanation which makes the most sense. Today I learned that we were afforded the same treatment as other publications with small circulations. It's not because you're gay.

Had that been the explanation or even we just forgot about you, I could have accepted either. Not getting a straightforward answer, I had to try to construct one or to ask the Rep to clarify. Thus, my reasons for writing the column in the first place.

In my last conversation with a Rep employee, I was questioned as regards my inclusion of the "Anne Frank" comments with the above. I still am convinced that I should raise questions of the arts institutions on behalf of the gay community or ask for clarification when it seems that one is needed. I do believe that this was such a case. I would personally rather err on the side of raising an uncomfortable issue for resolution than just remaining silent.

I do believe that is why "The Diary of Anne Frank" still speaks eloquently to the human condition and probably is among the very reasons why the Rep chose to present it. If the arts and theater can place a mirror up to our experience for clarification, evaluation, and enlightenment, should we not be able to demand the same of the theater and other arts institutions?

Herein lies one of the values of not only the arts but the barking dog!

than art itself, then the creative impulse in all of us is squashed.

But that all sounds so pompous and analytical, the way critics talk.

I've Heard the Mermaids Singing, directed by Canadian Patricia Rozema, is not a heavy film. It is joyful, silly, whimiscal and certain to fill you with delight.

Polly is an offbeat, naive, woman in her early thirties, "innocent beyond her years." She works as a temporary secretary. She's also a photographer — her apartment is lined with the black and white prints she developed in her tiny bathroom — although she calls it simply her "hobby." She'll tell you herself that she is not the finest temporary secretary. In fact, she admits to being "organizationally impaired."


Polly admits to a lot, through a quirky, vulnerable confession she videotapes so that we understand her side of the wonderful and horrible events that have befallen her.

It all began when the temp agency sent her out on a job in an art gallery, where Polly met Gabrielle, a glamorous, brilliant curator with traces of a French accent. Until Polly met the curator she didn't know there was an "art world." She just took pictures of things because she "liked the way they looked."

Polly comes to love Gabrielle. "I know love is a pretty strong word when you're talking about a woman who's not your mother," she says. Nevertheless, she loves her. "I don't think I wanted kissing," she goes on to explain. She simply loves Gabrielle's presence, and the way she talks about art, using terms like "acute awareness," and, Polly's favorite, "half lives, half lived."

She discovers that Gabrielle has a woman lover with the accepting wonderment that she discovers the world of art criticism. Gabrielle becomes god-like to her. The power she gives Gabrielle ends up devastating her creative spirit, but she recovers from that devastation and is, in the end, able to trust in what gives her joy.



A gay census taken in 1987 reported that the ratio of "fag hags" to gay men was 1 fruit fly to every 7.3 fruits.

Wisconsin's gay residents stated in 1984 that the third most important consideration when choosing a significant other was whether the prospective lover has enough hair on his chest to keep his partner warm during the winter months which is an aid in reducing high winter heating bills.

Hugh G. Rection denied his lover, Jack Hoff, sex for the month of October in 1986 because of a delicate new hair-do.

Since March of 1984, less than 1% of gay homes were decorated with large bowls of wax fruit, paintings of matadors on black velvet and lava lamps.

The press promo package outlines Claire and Dori's relationship as an "open" (but untested) one, yet there was no indication why then Dori was so anxious about Claire's decision nor why Claire was so torn. Did they in fact agree to an "ideal" and find that their value systems were in fact the norm?

It is a credit to **Images** that I want to know more about these women and their relationships.

The music in **Images** was written and performed by Phiannon and folk musican Cyntia Smith. It is an effective addition to the film, particularly during the second half. There are some problems with sound in the beginning — the dialogue sounds "tinny" and the music if often too loud in the background.


There are some technical flaws, as well. The long erotic scene begins with a blue light or filter. It is obviously a fantasy. Halfway through the scene it changes to color which confused me. I assumed it was no longer a fantasy which was not the case.

Janet Liss, director and co-writer of Images summed it up well when she said, "it is not perfect, but for our first project, it is something of which I am very proud." I agree.

I took forward to future productions of Tri-Image and hope that handsome Vada Foster will continue to star in those productions.

Images, A Lesbian Love Story is the first project released by Tri-image Productions. This 54-minute lesbian-made erotic video attempts, in the words of the producer and co-writer, Gwen Tucker, to present "Connectedness, a relationship between the lesbians sexually involved."

Images follows the lives of three lesbians during a one period week — a week during which Claire, played by Vada Foster, developes a sexual attraction to Alyx, played by Christine Parker, to the dismay of Claire's lover of 6 years, Dori, played by Charlene Worthley.

Claire's decision, whether to act on her sexual interest in Alyx and, to somewhat lesser degree, Dori's reaction to Claire's attraction, are the central focus of the plot of **Images**.

The love scenes in **Images** are gentle, sensual, and realistic. None of the women in the film are physically perfect (although

Claire's body, clothed or not, did appeal to my prurient interests) and that works well for this film.

Images is a very ambitious film. It presents eroticism in the context of these three women's lives as they struggle with complex decisions about sex, love and lesbian relationships.

All three women are presented as strong, emotionally independent and self-defined. Although Dori's character is defined primarily through her tension and anxiety in respect to Claire's impending decision.

I find myself, in retrospect, wishing the video had been longer. Claire's dilemma in **Images** is one many of us have faced although it's not a common theme of our discussions. Consequently, we often struggle with our moral decisions alone, as Claire did. I would have liked to hear some dialogue between Claire and Dori about their relationship. We know Claire loves Dori - we don't know why, after 6 years, she's suddenly smitten by Alvx.


