



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

## We Lost On Rawhide, What's Next?

On a voice vote only, no hearings, both branches of the Wisconsin Legislature voted a change in our employment laws.

In essence any not-for-profit group may determine that it has a "creed" (system of religious beliefs, including moral or ethical beliefs about right and wrong, that are sincerely held with the strength of traditional religious views). They must be willing to claim some type of "religious association" (meaning any organization, whether or not organized under Chapter 187, which operates under a creed).

According to John Gillespie, Executive Director of The Rawhide Boys School in New London, WI., "The legislature, directed by God, gave us far more than we could have ever hoped for with this new law!"

Setting off the sequence of events, Rawhide sent out in January a 410,000 piece mailing to voters in Wisconsin. Part of the mailing was a simple survey which. according to Lambda Rights Network Chair, Ralph F. Navarro, "totally misrepresented the issues to the public."

Gillespie reported that their response rate was over 10% and that 92% of those responding supported their views. He went on to say, "this will put legislators on notice to not pass such liberal legislation and will protect people concerned with family."

Information obtained from legislative sources indicated that a flood of calls and mail began with the survey and that former supporters notified Rep. David Clarenbach that he would have one week to work out some compromise.

According to legislators who wish to remain unnamed, they voted for the alleged "compromise" because David Clarenbach introduced it. No one voted against it on the voice vote.

An Editorial from the Saturday, Feb. 13, 1988 Milwaukee Sentinel began: "How could the entire State Assembly have bought the ridiculous argument that any non-profit organization with a system of religious beliefs - such as Rawhide Boys Ranch - deserves exemption from Wisconsin's fair hiring law? Applying that logic, virtually any group would be free to discriminate so long as it claimed to hold some fundamental religious tenets, whatever those tenets might be."

The Editorial concluded: "In voting unanimously to amend the statute so that Rawhide and similar organizations could discriminate in hiring, the Assembly equated such groups with churches, which qualify for exemption on religious freedom grounds. Yet Rawhide is no more a church than is the American legion. The Assembly may have tolerated this end run around the fair hiring law, but the Senate shouldn't."

Unfortunately, the Senate did, and on the same day. The Bill was hand carried to the Senate and the same thing happened. It will be signed by Governor Tommy Thompson by the time In Step is published. Gov. Thompson has continually supported the original "Rawhide Amendment" and had promised to sign it. Furthermore, Gov. Thompson has, according to Gillespie, decided to have a ceremonial signing of the bill at the New London facility in April.

Cream City Business Association's March 13, 1988 brunch at the downtown Howard Johnson's is hosting a panel discussion entitled: "Now That We Lost Rawhide, What Is Next?" The brunch begins at 12 noon with the panel beginning at 1:00 p.m. Members of the panel will include Earl Bricker of the American Civil Liberties Union, Ralph F. Navarro of Lambda Rights Network and Ruth Bukowiecki of Project Equality.

Navarro indicates that the minimum cost of Rawhide's "survey" was over \$100,000. He further reports that Lambda Rights

Network had received less than \$500 in donations to fight to protect the rights of lesbians, gay men, bisexuals and all non-married people.

A further proof of a major offensive of the "religious right" is the recent attack on Archbishop Rembert Weakland in all the media. Navarro further believes that "their attack has just begun. They are on the run and have won bigger than they expected on Rawhide. They will not stop until our 6 yearold rights are totally removed and the reversal of the Consenting Adults legislation, which permits sex between consenting adults. They'lluse the AIDS scare as the issue to destroy this basic right."

"Most people," Navarro continued, 
"didn't believe we would lose on Rawhide, 
but we did! There are many issues in the 
legislative hopper now and we have no 
money and few people to fight for our basic 
rights."

# Anti-Gay Bashing Wins Assembly Approval

Wisconsin's State Assembly has approved increased penalties for gay bashing and other crimes motivated by bigotry. The vote was 97-0, and that margin surprised even the sponsors of the bill.

State Representative David Clarenbach (D-Madison), who introduced Assembly Bill 599 with over twenty legislative co-authors, declared during debate on February 24th, "This sends the message that, in Wisconsin, we consider "hate crimes" to be especially offensive."

"The state has an interest and a duty to protect minorities from harassment," Clarenbach said. "Despite the gains in civil rights during the past few decades, violence still rears its ugly head in the form of race hatred, religious intolerance and gay bashing," said Clarenbach.

AB 599 establishes penalty enhancements for violence that is motivated against any group or individual due to their minority group status. Fines would be increased by up to \$10,000 and prison sentences may increase by five years.

The bill still requires approval by the

State Senate prior to adjournment on March 24th. Senator Lynn Adelman, Chair of the Senate Judiciary Committee, opposes AB 599 and can kill the bill by refusing to allow a vote in his committee.

# Ruling Gives Military Gays Equal Rights

[USA Today]- The Justice Department likely will challenge a federal court ruling that the U.S. armed forces' ban on gays is unconstitutional.

The ruling last month was the first by a federal appeals court to grant gays in the military strict constitutional protections.

"If what we hear is accurate, we would seriously consider a Supreme Court review or a rehearing," says Amy Brown of the Justice Department.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco ruled it unconstitutional for the Army to discharge Sgt. Perry Watkins, 39, an openly gay soldier with an exemplary record.

"Laws that limit the acceptable focus of one's sexual desires to members of the opposite sex... cannot withstand constitutional scrutiny," wrote Judge William Norris.

Nearly 1,400 military gays were discharged last year.

Defense officials won't say if the ruling immediately changes regulations.

Activists applaud the ruling.

- "It's about time the courts recognized gay people have been denied rights," says gay rights activist Leonard Graf.
- "The Constitution has always been only as generous as the judges who interpret it," says lawyer Mary Dunlap,

# NGLTF Terms AIDS Budget "Still Deficient"

[NGLTF]- Calling the Reagan administration's fiscal year 1989 AIDS budget proposals "a step forward but still deficient," the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) called on the Congress to appropriate a minimum of \$2 billion for AIDS research and prevention at the Public Health Service. The President's fiscal 1989 request allocates \$1.3 billion to the PHS for AIDS research and prevention activities, as compared to \$950 million in the current fiscal year. While the President's budget message announces \$2 billion in AIDS spending, the administration's figures incorporate the programs of all government agencies, including Medicaid. Only \$1.3 billion would go toward the PHS's efforts.

"As the crisis continues to escalate," commented NGLTF Executive Director Jeffrey Levi, "we must move to reach the \$2 billion target set by the National Academy of Sciences." Levi argued that the President's budget is particularly deficient in the areas of prevention and care, and said NGLTF would be working with a broad-based coalition of gay/lesbian, AIDS, and health oriented organizations to justify a minimum of \$2 billion in funds next year.

"The toll keeps mounting, the virus keeps spreading, and still this administration has failed to pull together a major national prevention campaign," Levi said. "What prevention money is available is strapped in its ability to deliver an effective message by restrictions imposed by Jesse Helms, the New Right, and the White House," Levi continued.

### March in Britain

[Equal Times]- A January 9 demonstration protesting anti-gay legislation drew 12,000 people in London, the largest lesbian and gay rights demonstration in Britain's history. Gay Community News reports that the legislation would forbid local governments from spending funds on anything that "promotes homosexuality."

Clause 28, regarded as yet another attack on Britain's historically progressive local governments, also forbids teaching the "acceptability of homosexuality as a pretended family relationship."

During the demonstration, marchers broke ranks at the residence of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and surrounded the building. Arrests occurred there and elsewhere later in the day. Two women were arrested for kissing in public, according to Tony Munyard, a gay solicitor active in opposing Clause 28.

Opposition to the proposed legislation is vocal and organized, but Clause 28 is expected to be passed. According to Munyard, the tabloid press has published "lurid" accounts of gay-positive books being forced on innocent school children.

Many gay and lesbian organizations rely on local authorities for funding, office space, resources and services. Passage of the measure could put many groups out of business. If passed, Clause 28 would go into effect in June of this year.


# Warwick to Launch New AIDS Foundation

Washington [Windy City Times]- Pop singer Dionne Warwick announced Feb. 10 that she is going to form a foundation to raise money for treatment and education concerning AIDS. While carefully avoiding any criticism of the American Foundation for AIDS Research (AmFAR), Warwick said, "It is my view that research is getting the overwhelming majority of funds available for AIDS," according to an Associated Press report. "As a result, from today forward my emphasis will be on education and health-care services." To launch the foundation, she said, she will host a gala in Washington, D.C. during the weekend of June 10-12, featuring a concert at the Kennedy Center and a celebrity golf and tennis tournament headed by Bob Hope and Sammy Davis, Jr. Warwick has contributed more than \$1.5 million to AmFAR in profits from her hit record "That's What Friends Are For."

# Court Steps In to Protect Hospitalized Lesbian

St. Cloud, Minn. [Equal Times]- After years of court delays. Sharon Kowalski finally will be tested for competency.

"We're not yet sure how and where." lesbian activist Karen Thompson told an audience at Gay Lesbian Awareness Day on Feb. 10 at St. Cloud State University.

In a Feb. 5 ruling, a District Court judge in Hibbing ordered that Kowalski, Thompson's severely injured lover, be tested and attorneys were asked to submit requested parameters for the testing.

Thompson said the ruling, though she has concerns about how it will be implemented, is "the first time we've seen positive movement" in the case for a long

Although Jack Fena, attorney representing Kowalski's parents, raised objections in the hearing, the judge said the testing wouldn't cost the family anything because she's on medical assistance. The judge also said the testing could only help the related personal injury lawsuit if she's found to be in need of additional treatment.

Thompson said she's pleased that the court finally is concerned about Sharon's physical needs, though she is concerned about how Sharon's emotional health relates to her troubling physical condition.

# MAP Receives Grants

The General Electric Foundation has granted \$28,170 to the Milwaukee AIDS Project to study volunteerism and Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome. A model program design will be published based on the feedback of the 500 volunteers currently working the Milwaukee AIDS Project. The Volunteer Center of Milwaukee will assist in gathering information from the volunteers. The program is due to be completed and ready for distribution by August of 1988. The completed program will be distributed, free of charge, through the National AIDS Network (a membership organization of approximately 400 AIDS service groups) and volunteer centers across the country.



The Milwaukee Foundation has also awarded \$20,000 to the Milwaukee AIDS Project in a companion program to utilizing volunteers in the delivery of AIDS prevention education to the community. The Milwaukee AIDS Project will coordinate the efforts of their volunteer force to increase material distribtuion and community education presentations in the Milwaukee area.

black lesbian/gay America, more than 400 strong, converging from points across the continent — Portland, Seattle, San Francisco, Chicago, Detroit, DC, Durham, Milwaukee, New Haven, New York. The meeting place was Los Angeles, the forum the first-ever National Black Gay and Lesbian Conference, the focus: leadership.

"This is not a feel-good or a coming-out celebration," explained conference chair Phil Wilson. "We've already done that. We're here to define the priorities of black lesbian and gay Americans, to set our agenda and plot strategies for seeing that agenda through. We're here to position ourselves so that we have an effective voice in shaping the social policies that affect our lives."


Throughout the two-day conference, speaker after speaker amplified this theme. "Black lesbians and gay men have always been there when the community fought off the ravages of racism," said activist Angela Davis in a keynote address. "Black lesbians and gay men ask that the commitment be mutual to fend off the ravages of homophobia."

"You make that difference," said Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley in a welcoming speech. "You who have been courageous enough to come out of the closet to say 'I am who I am, and I will not be denied my basic, fundamental constitutional rights."

"At ten years old, when they sent dogs to chase me in Birmingham," declared Rev. Carl Bean, executive director of the Minority AIDS Project, "when they spit in my face and turned on a fire hose that shot me down the street from the pressure of the water, I did all this to bring you — the black community — from the back of the bus. You cannot put me back there now."

A live phone-in speech by presidential candidate Jesse Jackson heightened emotions even more. Repeatedly the crowd rose to its feet in affirmation, refuled in their commitment to fight for social change and homosexual rights. But as speaker Debra Johnson pointedly reminded the conferees: "We have to do more than talk the talk. We have to walk the walk!"

According to its principal architect



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Wilson, the conference was designed, above all, to spur organized action, to wed the politics of discontent with the pragmatics of social reform. "The conference was born," Wilson expalined, "out of my experience as a presenter at a Centers for Disease Control (CDC) workshop on 'AIDS in the Minority Community' last August." The great majority of the workshop participants, Wilson realized, were heterosexual blacks, whose priorities did not include the needs of black gay men.

"When you talk about AIDS in a black context, the reality is you're talking about black gay men," said Wilson. "46.7% of black persons with AIDS are gay men. You

# A Wisconsin Connection for The Fairness Fund?

The Fairness Fund, founded nationally in 1986, is a non-partisan grass-roots political network which has been highly effective in applying congressional constituent pressure on issues such as gay and lesbian civil rights and AIDS funding. In addition the Fairness Fund has scored recent success in preventing 'AIDS Hysteria Issues' from passage in the Senate, despite savvy legislative maneuvering from right-wing legislators.

The Fairness Fund is now trying to set up state-wide Fairness Funds to work in the same manner on regional legislation. Illinois just recently established an Illinois Fairness Fund, and Lee Bush, of the national group was in Wisconsin to try and establish one here. However, due to short notice of the meeting, there was a poor turnout, and the meeting has been rescheduled for Sunday, March 27th from 2-4pm at The Foundation Community Center. All interested persons are encouraged to attend.

The Fairness Fund's grassroots mobilization program depends on the active participation of concerned individuals all across the country. Their Public Opinion Mailgram [POM] strategy ensures advocates for fairness will be heard.

How the National Mailgram Campaign works:

Step 1: Individual signs Fund Public Opinion Mailgram (POM) authorization to send mailgrams, or Fairness/AIDS messages in his/her name on health and fairness issues.

Step 2. A key vote on a bill/amendment comes up... the Fairness Fund just activates pre-authorized messages to key legislators. The next day these Congresspersons receive many message from their pro-fairness constituents.

Step 3. The Fairness Fund sends a follow-up letter (within a week) to each Mailgram Network participant, letting

them know that we've used one of their authorizations, what was said on his/her behalf, and that a \$4.50 charge will appear on their next monthly phone bill. The "Fairness/AIDS messages" can be charged either to your Visa or Mastercard or you can pay by check (again, just a \$4.50 charge).

Step 4. The \$4.50 charge for each message appears on your next monthly phone bill (or charge card, depending on which option you choose).

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

# Board of Managers for Community Center

[CCF]- John Cowles and Julia Kleppen have been appointed Co-Chairs of the Board of Managers for the Foundation Community Center at 225 S. 2nd Street. Three additional persons have been asked to serve to complete the board.

The Board chairs will be participants on the Board of Directors of the Cream City Foundation [CCF] and will have the total responsibilities for operating the center.

Financing the center is of first importance they agreed, although with the wide acceptance and value all Community organizations have expressed in having the center, they felt that sufficient major donors could be found to maintain and expand the meeting capacity.

Operating responsibilities will include setting rules and regulations, setting fees, coordinating insurance, utility and staff coverage.

Plans call for redecorating the large meeting room, adding heating and furniture to the room so that it can be opened for meetings in late spring. A second floor for meetings and desks for community organizations are part of the long range plans that have been decided upon.

CCF opened the center in November for use by the community. Several hundred persons meet there regularly representing as many as 20 organizations in some months. Present capacity makes meetings of 35 comfortable, but the potential space would allow as many as 300 persons to be accomodated in the 3 meeting rooms with desk space available in separate areas for any of the organized groups in the metro area.

"Ideally, the foundation would like to see the second floor offices filled with space for each community organization, the other 2 meeting rooms furnished and a secretarial pool organized — with a computer to provide services to, and increase the efficiency of, all our community agencies," said Don Schwamb, Foundation President.

## GLC at UWM Changes Its Name

The Gay & Lesbian Community at UWM has changed its name to the 10% Society at UWM. This change was made for several reasons. First, it is the intention of the organization that this new name will promote increased unity among gay men and lesbians by excluding those words from the name. Secondly, it is hoped that a name without the words "gay" and "lesbian" will make programming easier and increase attendance at on-campus events. A third reason for this name change is that it will allow the organization to program events that will attract both gay and straight audiences. This is very important since the constitution of the organization states that part of the purpose for the group's existence is "to break down the barriers of discrimination in the heterosexual society."

The 10% Society will hold an off-campus open-rap session on Friday, March 4, 1988 from 7-10 pm at the Foundation Community Center at 225 So. 2nd Street. This meeting has been scheduled for those people in the community who find it difficult to attend the society's regular meetings on campus. 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

## "South Pacific"

A superb touring production of the Broadway classic, South Pacific was brought to the Riverside Theater by the Edgewood Agency.

In the lead as Emile de Becque, Robert Goulet was in fine vocal form. His rendition of "Some Enchanted Evening" was pure magic and his early operatic training was clearly in evidence. His acting was on the mark, his character credible and his performance remained fresh even on closing night. From his Broadway training as the newcomer in the original cast of "Camelot" with both Julie Andrews and Richard Burton, Goulet has learned his craft well. It showed.

Rebecca Andrew as Nellie Forbush brought to life again the role originated by Mary Martin in the original production. Ms. Andrew was the actress who could sing rather than a singer who could also act as was Miss Martin. Ms. Andrew's singing though pleasant seemed to come primarily from her throat with little diaphram support which caused her to sound somewhat hoarse at the close of the run. Her musical phrasing seemed to be extremely close to that of Miss Martin's which caused one to make constant comparisons because the performance seemed at times to be not completely her own.

Scott Waara, as Lieutenant Cable, had a fine tenor voice which also was more full because of an opera background. He performed one of the best renditions of the "Younger Than Springtime" and "You Got to be Carefully Taught" numbers that I have heard. Amy Jo Phillips, as Bloody Mary, was entertaining, and offered a most enjoyable characterization.

This cast worked very well as a unit. The

chorus was as much an important segment of this production as the principals and thus it was a company piece rather than simply a star vehicle for Mr. Goulet. All worked hard and were full of both life and energy for a road company that has been touring for quite a spell.

South Pacific though seen by some as dated is a classic that still works! This particular cast made sure that it could and did.

over and left out. The district, roughly bounded by Capitol Dr., 20th St., North Ave. and 8th St., would comprise approximately 8400 students and would include a middle school and North Division High School. The district is already 99 percent black. So the argument that the district would be racist and segregationist is absurd.

Ms. Williams also pointed out that of the 432 districts within Wisconsin, Milwaukee is the largest with 93,000 students, but there is a school district that has only 55 students. An average \$3400 minimum is spent on each student for education. However, Nicolet district spends almost \$7,000 per child.

Already there is a 52 percent Black student majority in the Milwaukee Public School system. 20,000 black students are bussed daily while only 2,000 white students ride the bus. Therefore, the onus of integration falls on black households, and not altogether voluntarily. Since the school system is failing to properly educate its students, it is worse in educating its

minority students.

The main argument for the school district is for blacks to take control of educating their children in their schools within their community, to empower their lives. The proposal will ask for a 12 year pilot program so that the students within the district can be traced throughout their schooling and evaluated accordingly. The community would control and empower the school board in the district to make the decisions. The Milwaukee system would have no authority to supervise or sabatoge the district.

One of the questions raised regarded the issue as to whether the district would implement policies regarding non-discrimination toward students based on sexual preference. Ms. Williams responded that, although the issue has not been discussed, all students would have equal access to education and school services. The district school board would further examine the various cultural stereotypes that have so long pervaded Milwaukee and its school system.

can't deal with AIDS in a black context without dealing with the issue of homosexuality or the issue of homophobia."

Frustrated by the CDC workshop, Wilson set about organizing the conference and enlisted the support of the National Coalition of Black Lesbians and Gays, which together with the Los Angeles Chapter of Black and White Men Together, co-sponsored the event. Only a week before the conference, organizers hoped, at best, for a turnout of 200 or so. All were shocked when more than double that number came.

Although AIDS topped the agenda, the conference offered a "full plate of issues" to discuss and act upon, said Wilson. Of 38 workshops, only 7 dealt with AIDS. The rest targeted specialized areas of community organizing, the subject of leadership, while placing equal emphasis on leadership within the black gay and lesbian community as well as within the black community at large. Political lobbying, church reform, overcoming drug and alcohol abuse, man-

aging a business, fighting homophobia: these and other workshops drew spirited crowds eager to hear and to tell of their experiences in marshalling both individual and community resources to shape public policy.

Although the conference was a resounding success, much more is still needed to be accomplished, according to Renes McCoy, executive director of the National Coalition of Black Lesbians and Gays. "We need to plan on how to encourage more concrete suggestions, practical suggestions for what can be done. We still need to define better our strategies so that everyone knows what they are. This is the source of our empowerment, the way of nurturing and sustaining black lesbian and gay leadership. This weekend," McCoy smiled, "was just the beginning."


# Black Empowerment Key to Inner City School District

Black parents taking control of the education of their children and, ultimately, of their own lives is a key issue that is at the core of the proposed legislation to create a new school district within the inner city of Milwaukee, according to State Rep. Annette (Polly) Williams (D), a co-sponsor of the plan.

Ms. Williams recently spoke at the Black and White Men Together-Milwaukee membership meeting on February 20th, at the Foundation Community Center to a supportive audience of about 35 people, many of whom who were from the non-gay community. Dr. Howard Fuller, Dean of General Education at MATC and Spencer Coggs (D-Milw.) are also co-sponsors of the proposal. Dr. Fuller also had been invited to speak but had to cancel due to illness.

According to Ms. Williams, the school district proposal was iniated last year due to the fact that there were black children who were not participating in any of the special education programs offered within the Milwaukee Public School system—neither bussing nor magnet or specialty schools. There were children that were left Continued on page 51

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
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# Catch 22: Guess WHO Loses?

One of the great facts of life is that few people give much concern to insurance until they need it.

Although many of us worked hard to prevent the Wisconsin State Insurance Commissioner's office from watering down the laws protecting us from HIV testing and sharing of information, we lost. No matter the facts that we all presented, they seemed irrelevant to the Commissioner who was in his last weeks of office.

Statements made at the time by the Insurance interests were that they only wanted an exemption regarding the issuance of individual health, life and disability policies. They point, with some legitimacy, to potentially horrifing numbers, which, said they, could ruin most insurance companies. The spokespersons said clearly that they were not trying to get exemptions for so-called "group" insurance programs.

Recently, however, the tune is changed again. Now the Insurance Industry is trying to get another exemption to protect them from very small groups, 2-25 people, to be able to exclude coverage. What small business people don't know is that even if one person tests positive to HIV, the entire group will not be able to written! Guess who loses?

There are many ways to approach this problem. Obviously the first way is to try to organize to block the Insurance Commissioners probable new exemption (This observer of the political scene believes that not much will be gained in this direction... facts seem irrelevant.) Perhaps the smartest approach is to contact your opening gay/lesbian agent or Registered Representative to help you honestly evaluate your program. My experience continues to show that most non-gay agents don't work nearly as hard for you.

A third approach is to urge every Gay/lesbian person to individually sit down with a gay/lesbian agent/rep/broker to

very carefully do a full analysis of her/his program, including alleged company benefits. Most of us are poorly protected, protection is becoming more and more difficult. Most insurance companies are not issuing any amounts of insurance without an HIV test already. Once you test positive, there is NO HOPE of getting any coverage.

Lately I have had several people turned down by several of the companies I have placed them in. It is too bad some of us wait so long. In all of these circumstances to date, I have been able to finally get some company to underwrite them. However, there is a cost that you will have to pay. But, some coverage is much better than no coverage.

Some in our community say that I am just trying to scare people. I only wish it were partly true. Even as recently as one year ago I was able to get health, life and disability issued with very little problem... today, not so!

Two months ago, one of our major businesses offered to help pay for 1/2 the cost of his employees health insurance, plus the opportunity to sit down with a financial planner to help each do some serious strategy for their own futures. There were NO takers. And the average cost of health insurance for each person, her/his half, would have been \$15 per month.

Even if AIDS were not a central concern in each of our lives, health, life and disability coverage is important to guarantee that your security in your life and the choice of only doctors you want to take care of you. Today, the Insurance Industry is working hard to close down even the possibility of both Individuals and small groups from getting coverage. Can you afford that decision being made by executives who don't care about you?



I began receiving inquires from these companies back in November seeking rate information and sample copies of In Step. I knew then "they" were coming to Wisconsin and decided then & there to set up guidelines for acceptance of the ads.

Gay publications in other states have had these ads for quite some time. When they first appear, there is often an uproar from the women's community. Therefore, I decided I would accept the ads, but with strict control. In Step will allow no full nudity in any ads, & they must be "in good taste." All such ads will appear in the rear section of the magazine, & will not appear

on the rear cover, or in the front part of our publication. I hope these guidelines will appease those of our community who look upon such ads with distaste.

One thing that can be said for such ads is that they do promote safer sex. Obviously, you can't get much safer than phone sex.

And of course — there is the issue of money. Apparently, as of March 1st, these lines were approved in our state. The ad that appears was the only one that got to us in time for deadline. In future issues, we project anywhere from 4 to 7 full pages of such services advertising with us. Such an increase in income can only help In Step pay its bills, and to expand the magazine. We'll stay in the same "fit-in-your-pocket" format, but hopefully you will never again Continued on page 28
