PWA's Get A Milwaukee Home

Milwaukee [ARCW & Milw. Journal]- The growing number of AIDS cases in Wisconsin has brought with it a growing need for housing alternatives to accommodate those living with AIDS. In attempts to meet this need, the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin has purchased a home on the north side of Milwaukee to be used as an independent living center.

Although planners will not make the address public, they are already contacting neighbors about the home.

"We are working with neighbors to get their cooperation," said Susan Dietz, director of the Milwaukee AIDS Project. "We have had positive response," from neighbors, said Dietz. Asked if there had been any negative response, she said, "There is no negative response that I can describe to you." Dietz said the AIDS Resource Center would act only as a landlord for the duplex, providing no medical or support services in the home.

Currently, in Wisconsin, if a person has AIDS and can no longer live on their own or needs a place to stay for a short time, their only option is a hospital or hospice facility; both of which are extremely expensive and very impersonal.

"The two-story home, designed to accommodate those who, with a little support, can be fairly independent, offers all the niceties of a peaceful, dignified, beautiful home at a minimal price," according to Dr. Karen Lamb, co-chairperson of the board of community advisors of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin.

"If we can help keep people in their own homes for as long as possible or in settings such as this independent living center, we can greatly decrease medical costs while improving their quality of life," said Marc Hauptert, president of the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin.

Purchase of the house was made possible

by funding from Milwaukee corporations and labor organizations.

Although the house is scheduled to receive its first clients in May, the AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin is still in need of many things before the independent living center can open its doors. Besides monetary, their needs include furniture, large and small appliances, carpeting and food.

The AIDS Resource Center of Wisconsin operates the Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) and will soon open a project in the Racine-Kenosha area.

Quarantine Proposal Comes Under Attack

Miami [USA Today]- Florida Gov. Bob Martinez asked the Legislature to permit quarantine of recalcitrant AIDS sufferers, likening them to "criminals armed with a dangerous weapon." He said AIDS carriers who behave in ways likely to spread the deadly disease threaten society and should be locked up.

Martinez wants \$1.1 million to quarantine a projected six youths and 22 adults.

The proposal was attacked as a threat to victim's civil rights. "It sounds a lot like what Hitler was saying about the Jews," says Marguerite Rowe, who works with AIDS victims in Fort Lauderdale.

"The quarantine is... similar to the banishment of lepers that existed 2,000 years ago," says college administrator Toni Caicedo, 55, of Miami.

State officials say about 30 Floridians would qualify. They "should no more be allowed to roam free than criminals armed with a deadly weapon," Martinez says.

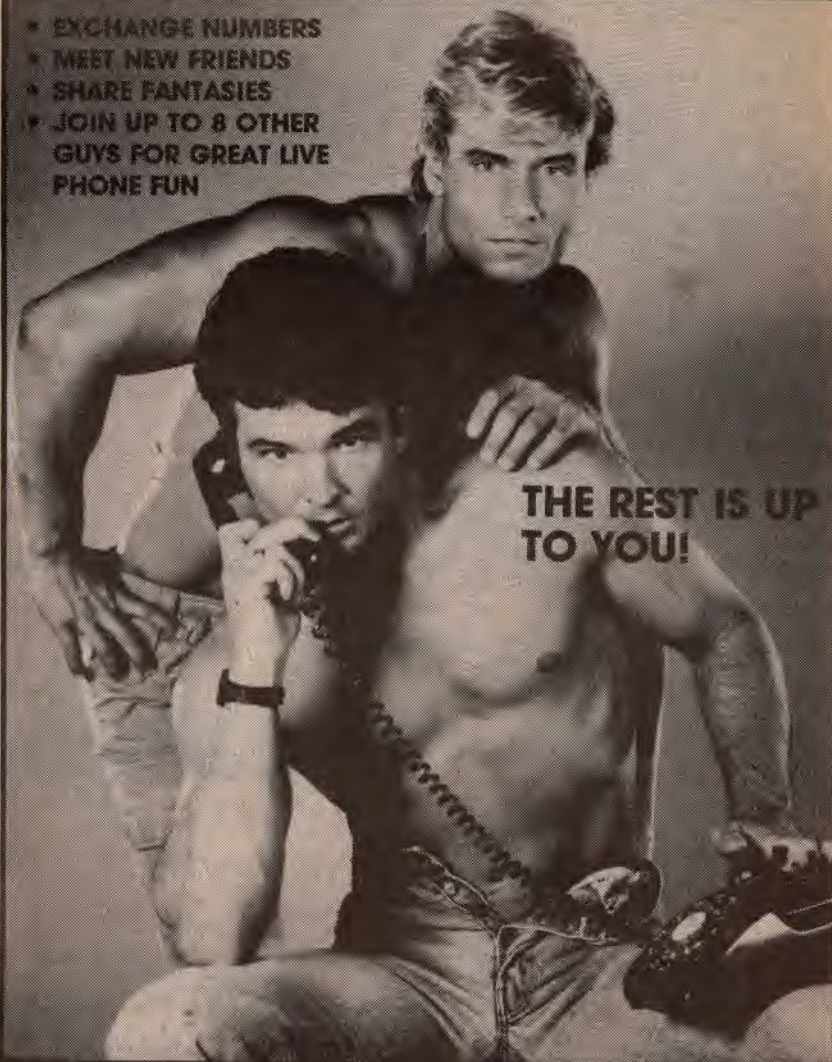

Florida modified its quarantine law to cover AIDS victims.

Nine other states have also enacted laws or modified existing quarantine laws. They include Colorado, Minnesota, North Carolina, Alabama, Illinois, Indiana, Oregon, Texas and Washington.

South Carolina officials disclosed their first AIDS quarantine: a Charleston prostitute who refused to quit. ▽

U.S. Anti-Lesbian and Gay Violence Bill

Washington, D.C. [H.R.C.F.]— The Human Rights Campaign Fund heralds legislation submitted by Senator John Kerry (D-MA) mandating criminal penalties against those who violate the civil rights of gay men and lesbians through violence.

The Civil Rights Protection Act of 1988, S.2109, adds affectional or sexual orientation to the list of protected categories under laws which provide criminal penalties for violence due to bigotry.

Senator Alan Cranston (D-CA), joined by Senator Kerry and others, has already introduced the Hate Crimes Statistics Act, S.2000, which directs the U.S. Attorney General to collect and publish data on crimes that manifest prejudice based on race, religion, ethnicity or affectional or sexual orientation. The new bill would give teeth to efforts to halt hate crimes.

"In 1988 it is very important that we address the problems of violence against gay Americans," said Senator Kerry in introducing the bill. "Due to the AIDS epidemic, violence against gays and lesbians has now reached unprecedented proportions. This bill addresses the problems on the federal level by setting jail terms for hate crimes."

Last year, Senators Cranston and Kerry, along with several of their colleagues, introduced the Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights Bill, to protect gay men and lesbians from discrimination in housing, employment and federal programs. The bill has been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee. ▽

AIDS Panel's Home Stretch Holds Hurdles

USA Today— With its final report due in less than three months, the presidential advisory commission on AIDS still is facing some of the toughest issues.

The commission last week looked at poverty, unemployment, drug abuse and other social problems linked to AIDS at hearings in Washington.

The 13-member panel surprised critics with sweeping policy recommendations in its interim report in February. Now, critics are anxious to see how commissioners handle the pros and cons of more controversial issues:

- Requiring tests and ensuring confidentiality.
- Contacting sexual partners of AIDS victims.
- Banning discrimination.
- Mapping AIDS education — who gets it, how and when.
- Financing health care.

"They have some very vocal people on this commission who look at (these issues) a lot differently from other commission members, and it may make it harder to reach some consensus," says Lori Behrmen of the Gay Men's Health Crisis.

Examples: Penny Pullen supports tracing sexual partners; Dr. Theresa Crenshaw favors banning AIDS-infected children from school.

The commission may break ground with recommendations for financing health care, says Jeff Levi of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "We have not as yet in our country come up with a way of dealing with catastrophic care costs."

Commission Chairman James Watkins admits some issues will be sticky, but he's confident the panel can reach a consensus in its June 24 report.

"The sense of the commission is voluntary testing to the maximum extent possible," Watkins says. "We are interested in ensuring — to the extent that we can — the protection of confidentiality." ▽

Georgetown Alumni Praise Settlement

Washington, D.C.- "After more than eight years of arduous and sometimes acrimonious litigation over the rights of gay and lesbian students, Georgetown University at last has something to celebrate," the leaders of the Gay and Lesbian Alumni of Georgetown University said March 29th. "We applaud today's announcement that the two gay students' groups will be given equal treatment without regard to sexual orientation."

Richard Sincere, a spokesman for the alumni organization, noted that "in mid-February we sent a letter to Father Timothy Healy, Georgetown's president, urging him to recommend that the University not appeal the case to the Supreme Court and to end its willful violation of the District of Columbia Human Rights Law. Georgetown University has done precisely that. From now on, members of the Georgetown University community — whether students, alumni, faculty or staff — can expect to be treated with equal dignity and respect

whether they are heterosexual or homosexual."

In its letter, the alumni group noted that discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation "violates the charitable principles of the Judeo-Christian heritage upon which Georgetown University was founded, and undercuts the spiritual and intellectual principles of the Ignatian heritage that should motivate the University today."

Quoting President John F. Kennedy, the alumni reminded President Healy that "tolerance implies no lack of commitment to one's own beliefs. Rather it condemns the oppression or persecution of others."

Leathernecks Get the Boot

[Equal Times]- Three women have been suspended at the Marine Corps' Parris Island boot camp because of charges that they are lesbians, and at least 10 others are under investigation, three of the women said recently.

Associated Press reported that the three women denied being lesbians, and are upset about the Marines' refusal to believe them. They noted that four of the women under investigation are married and one is a mother.

"They've made up their minds," one of the women said. "Now they just need proof, and doesn't that throw all our rights out the window?"

The women said they believe the investigation stems from a report issued by the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Service (DACOWITS), which cited a "problem" of homosexuality among female Marines.

Gay Community News of Boston reported meanwhile that some military observers suspect that the Pentagon is instigating an anti-gay crackdown across the country following an appeals court decision in California which denied the Army's claim that homosexuality is incompatible with military service.

Military rights activists consider the Parris Island action the latest anti-gay witchhunt.

According to their own records, all branches of the U.S. military spend over \$22,000,000 every year to search out and identify lesbian and gay military members.

Over \$375,000 is spent annual to process discharges of otherwise honorably serving members of the U.S. military. ▽

Helms Defeated on AIDS Amendment

Washington, D.C. [HRCF]- The Human Rights Campaign Fund celebrates the shunning of Senator Jesse Helms (R-NC) by his colleagues on March 25, when an AIDS-related amendment he offered to a labor bill was voted down. The occasion was consideration of S.79 (the High-Risk Notification Act) requiring employees to be notified if they are at high risk for occupational disease.

Last year, the House of Representatives passed this legislation, including language that pre-designated all health care workers as at risk for HIV infection.

The Senate voted 45-33 to table similar language when it was offered by Sen. Helms. This is the first time the Senate has tabled a Helms amendment on AIDS since rejection of marriage license testing in May, 1987.

"We applaud Congress for keeping faith with sound public health policy on AIDS," said Carlton Lee, Campaign Fund Congressional Liaison. "We are making progress in raising the consciousness level of Congress on AIDS issues. Members should draw on the same wisdom when they consider S. 1220, the AIDS Research, Education and Care Act, expected in April." ▽

Milwaukee to March in Dubuque, Iowa April 30

A little over 150 miles to the west/Southwest of Milwaukee is an old Mississippi River community called Dubuque. This 60,000+ significantly blue collar city is holding its 2nd Annual Lesbian/Gay Pride March on April 30.

Ginny Lynns, march organizer and member of N.O.W. relates that the 1987 gathering was greeted with eggs. She relates, "not only would Mayor James Brady not declare gay/lesbian pride week, but he went on to state, 'the only gay people he had ever known were child molesters and that he wouldn't want to live next door to one.' "

Police Chief John Mauss refused to consider sensitivity training for his officers, even though he admitted that one officer had harassed a gay man at the march. In reference to the egg throwing incidents, Mauss said, "we don't like egg throwing but no one was hurt."

In addition to housing at local motels, alternative housing is being offered. Lambda Rights Network is organizing a Milwaukee contingent which will leave on the 29th. Join us, "where your presence will really make a difference. For further information contact LRN at 445-5552.

Setting Milwaukee's G/L Agenda

Local elections are over and the winners promise to be inordinately accessible. The transition teams of both Mayor John Norquist and David Schulz are filled with people who are concerned about the entire Milwaukee area community, including lesbian and gay people.

Lambda Rights Network is in the process of laying out to our elected officials, a type of lesbian/gay "Agenda for Action," according to its Chair, Ralph F. Navarro.

Navarro states, "in order to truly reflect the broadest needs and concerns of our entire lesbian/gay male/bi-sexual com-

munity, we need input quickly. Within the first few months of the new administrations we must show that we are prepared for the arduous task of not merely making "demands," but also of fully participating in the process — of being totally involved."

To do this, Navarro continued, "we must lay out our entire menu of expectations and then work with not only the Mayor & County Executive, but also with the legislators."

Presently, issues such as stronger anti-discrimination statutes in the city, which presently has a very weak ordinance; similar legislation in the County, which presently has nothing, are very important, as is the issue of "spousal benefits" for government workers.

In addition to these concerns, LRN is working to ensure that lesbians and gay men are equally appointed to City and County Boards and Commissions. To do this, Navarro says, "we need to get current resumes from as many qualified people as possible, so that we can make sure that our 'family' is considered equally." For those of you who don't have Warner Cable, you can now see the programs in several locations and at varied times throughout the month. They are: every Tuesday and Thursday at 9:30 p.m., at La Cage; the first and third Thursday of every month at 7:00 p.m. at the Ball Game; and by request any time during open hours at the Brady East STD Clinic and the Galano Club. Tapes of past programs will be available at the Foundation Community Center for a loan (with a small security deposit) to watch in your own home or to show to a group.

Reduced registration fees will be available for low income persons. Special rates have been arranged at the Holiday Inn Metrodome, conference headquarters, and community housing will also be available.

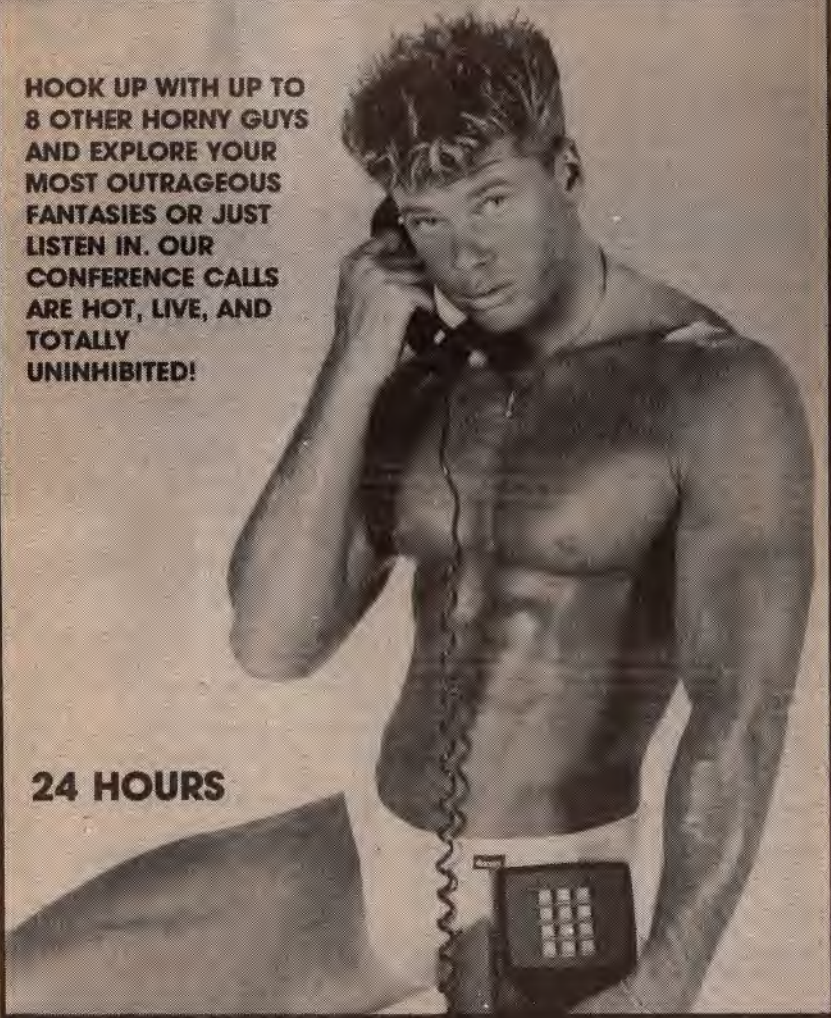

Shame on You Milwaukee!

On Saturday the 26th of March, we were treated to one of the finest presentations of gay entertainment that I have attended in my thirteen years as a resident of Milwaukee. This significant cultural event was the visit by the Chicago Gay Men's Chorus. I am told that over 400 tickets for this event were sold but the attendance in the concert hall found about as many in the audience as the membership of the of the Chicago Gay Men's Chorus which is about 100 strong.

I am also aware that this was the same day that members of the Cream City Chorus were in Madison to sing for the AIDS Memorial Service at the Capitol. This too was a significant contribution and should not be overlooked nor underrated.

However, it is not to members of either choral group that I write at this particular point. Members of Milwaukee's gay and lesbian community where were you? I sheepishly spoke with two personable members of the Chicago group about my own personal enjoyment of the concert but didn't know how to respond when asked forth rightly "Where was everyone?"

It was truly Chicago's evening. Their "The Wizard of Oz" opening medley was entertaining and set the pace for the evening which didn't let up. The clever rethinking of such Sondheim numbers of "Barcelona" from "Company" and "You Must Meet My Wife" from "A Little Night Music" were extremely inventive and showed some clear thought toward a gay audience and presentation. As well, a five person male rendition of the "Quintet" from Sondheim and Bernstein's "West Side Story" was simply beautiful.

The second act was not a disappointment either. The "South Pacific" medley

was fun and campy but the rendition of "Some Enchanted Evening" with proper male oriented pronouns about "you may see a stranger across a crowded room. And somehow, you'll know. You'll know even then. That somewhere you'll see HIM again and again," was truly musical magic. Everything here was not serious only. A group of young male stripper types had fun with "Don't Tell Mama" from "Cabaret" along with the use of a set of white bath towels. Two cowboys had a good time with the love ballad "People Will Say We're In Love" from "Oklahoma!"

Their final Broadway show medley was from "The Sound of Music." Imagine if you will on the curtain opening, a full stage of 100 men in nun's habits from the waist up singing perfect Gregorian chant. Two notable enjoyable moments were a cute set of Von Trapp children with Maria in pink rompers doing "Do Re Mi" and a group of mature "nuns" doing "How Do You Solve A Problem Like Maria?" A truly touching musical moment was the male solo and choral presentation of "Climb Every Mountain."

Yes, many in Milwaukee missed a marvelous evening of excellent entertainment. We need to continue to support one another for if we don't, dare we criticize those from without who won't? ▽

Election night came. He did his last minute stumping, and then sweated, with his aids, through the returns. And when they were in, he was numb. It was the worst, the most dreadful defeat of all. He could never, never win his party's nomination now, and his church, his television station, and his followers had all bankrupted themselves, to no avail. It was all over. All was lost!

"Billy Bob"

God had told Billy Bob Buckman to run for the Presidency of the United States of America.

The born-again believer saw his beloved country sliding rapidly down the road to ruin. Women were working outside the home; in fact, they were not being merely as comfortably accessible to men as they had been. People no longer depended on certainty, on having one set of indisputably right answers. Now, they thrived on new and varied ideas, disturbing ideas, Billy Bob thought. The Bible was not being followed by all as the one absolute authority, as Billy Bob thought it should be. It existed as a choice, among other choices, which shocked him. And new lifestyles were emerging, and being accepted, which made Billy Bob feel uncomfortable, threatened. Oh, the devil had America firmly in his teeth, all right, and he Billy Bob Buckman, had God's own mandate to yank it right back out. It thrilled him.

He cleaned up in local debate after debate, in primary after primary, and — to his delight, and the nation's astonishment — he took the Iowa Caucus.
