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



### N.G.L.T.F. Update

London- British lesbian and gay activists face the most serious threat to their community in twenty years if, as expected, the House of Commons approves on third reading a law which prohibits local governments from funding materials and programs which "promote homosexuality." The law, known in legislative language as Clause 28, will likely go into effect in June 1988.

In a move echoing the Helms Amendment in this country, British Parliament seeks to squash any neutral or positive presentation of lesbian and gay life by restricting the power and autonomy of local governments. Because local governments have such broad powers under British law, Clause 28 creates a virtual gag order on publicly-funded and authorized lesbian and gay activity and culture.

"We regard Clause 28 as a savage attack on our rights of access to information and freedom of association," stated a press release by Stop Clause 28. "Many supporters of Clause 28 intend to use it as the first step toward recriminalization of male homosexual and, for the first time criminalization of lesbian sexuality. Clause 28 is already fueling anti-gay and anti-lesbian violence, with the firebombing of the offices of the newspaper Capital Gay."

"Clause 28's institutionalizing of homophobia in Britian and the Helms Amendment in this country are landmarks of the backlash against our movement's growing strength," said Jeff Levi, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "Particularly because of the close ties between the Reagan administration and the Thatcher government, I urge U.S. activists to make the leap across the Atlantic and support the British movement's fight against Clause 28."

### HATE CRIMES

In detailed testimony before Congress on April 12, the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) urged Congress to make violence motivated by bigotry a fiscal priority in 1988. Testifying before the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Commerce, Justice and State, NGLTF Antiviolence Project Director Kevin Berrill called for funds to be earmarked for the National Institute of Justice (NIJ) — the research arm of the Justice Department — to initiate a major effort to improve the criminal justice system's response to crimes of bias.

### Federal Ranking Confirms Growth

The Human Rights Campaign Fund is now the ninth largest independent political Action Committee (PAC) in the United States, and the 24th largest PAC overall, according to new rankings just released for 1987 by the Federal Elections Commission.

"These impressive rankings prove that lesbian and gay political influence continues to surge," said Vic Basile, the Campaign Fund's executive director.

With close to a dozen bills now before Congress dealing with AIDS funding; care, treatment and civil rights of people with AIDS and HIV infection; the immigration status of gay men and lesbians; the right of gay men and women to serve in the military; and basic civil rights for gay men and lesbians, the ranking "will not go unnoticed on Capitol Hill," said Basile.

### National AIDS Bill Needs Support

The first comprehensive, national AIDS policy legislation is prepared for consideration by the U.S. Senate, and has the full support of the Human Rights Campaign Fund. Yet this carefully written bill is threatened by ill-considered amendments that must be crushed as they are presented.

The Federal AIDS Research, Information and Care Act, S. 1220, sets a comprehensive, coherent national policy for AIDS treatment, research, public education, and health care.



Amendments to the bill will only prolong the crisis and threaten thousands more lives. Contact your representatives in Washington, D.C. and urge them to support S. 1220 without any amendments.

### Activists Charge Kellogg Co.

Chicago [Gay Chicago]- The Chicagobased gay media watchdog group, Coalition Against Media/Marketing Prejudice (CAMMP), has charged a Kellogg cereal company commercial "tacitly condones and even encourages anti-gay/lesbian violence" and has called for the commercial's immediate withdrawal from broadcast.

In a March 24 letter to W.E. LeMothe, Kellogg's chief executive officer, CAMMP expressed its "grave concern" over an advertising campaign for Kellogg's Nut 'N Honey cereal. The commercial shows an old Western cook, responding to a cowboy's inquiry concerning what's for breakfast by saving, "Nuttin' honey," and subsequently being threatened with death by gunfire because the cowboys apparently think the cook is calling them "honey."

CAMMP representatives asserted that "these commercials are not merely offensive, they send a serious and dangerous message: that gays and lesbians or anyone perceived as sexually or behaviorally different, are easy and acceptable targets for trivialization and/or direct violence." The group further charges that the "problem of violence and intimidation directed at people who are or are perceived to be gay and lesbian is a pressing one."

Joe Stewart, Kellogg's vice president for public affairs, in a telephone conversation with CAMMP steering committee member, Athur Johnston, assured the organization that there was no intention on the part of Kellogg Co. to promote violence against the lesbian and gay community or any other group. Johnston countered that "regardless of the lack of intention on the part violence against gays or any other group, we remained convinced that the Nut 'N Honey commercial in which gun-toting cowboys threaten to kill a cook who they think has called them 'honey' implicitly promotes a dangerous message endorsing

violent intimidation of gays and lesbians."
He further asserted that "there is a real problem here that must be remedied.

### Gay Lutheran's Ready to Minister

Berkeley- Three openly-gay Lutheran seminarians have been "certified for call and ordination," the first step to becoming ordained Lutheran ministers, according to Lutherans Concerned, a Christian ministry for lesbian and gay understanding.

Last December, Joel Workin, Jeff Johnson and James Lancaster became the first openly-gay seminary students to be commended for ordination in the new Lutheran church. (On Jan. 1, 1988, the Lutheran Church in America and the American Lutheran Church merged to form the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America.)

"The Church expects its ministers to be morally circumspect across the board," Lancaster was told by his examining committee. Johnson's committee reminded him of church policy denying ordination to "practicing" gay men and lesbians. But none of the three was requested to make any pledges of behavior other than that required of all candidates for ordination.

"The real difficulty," observed Lancaster, "will be locating parishes willing to accept openly-gay ministers."

### Yearning for an Urning

Hungary [W.C.T.]- A recently discovered document indicates that a gay political organization may have existed as early as 1865, much earlier than has been previously believed.

"Bylaws for the Urning Union," written in German by Karl Heinrich Ulrichs, called for an organization to "bring Urnings out of their previous isolation and unite them in a compact mass bound together in solidarity."

"Urning" is the term for "homosexual" used by Ulrichs and his contemporaries. The document was discovered by the gay scholar Manfred Herzer in the Hungarian National Library among the papers of Karl Kertbeny, a correspondent of Ulrichs'.

Kertbeny had apparently attempted to destroy evidence of his homosexuality, but the document survived.

### Barfing Up the Wrong Tree

Fort Lauderdale [Windy City Times]-Mayor Robert Cox expressed his reluctance for the city to be associated with gay tourism to a reporter for the Fort Lauderdale News/Sun Sentinel, after learning of the gay business association's plans to advertise the city as a fun, warm, and exciting year-round vacation spot for lesbians and gay men.

"I don't think we want to have the image of the gay resort any more than we want to have the image of a vomiting college student resort," stated Cox. Later Cox told The Weekly News that his comment was made in reference to being told that the gay community "wanted to make Fort Lauderdale the gay capital of the world."

Cox referred to the controversy as "so much flap over this unflappable business," adding, "I simply stated that I didn't want the city of Fort Lauderdale to be made the capital of anything."

### Foundation Community Grants Revised

[CCF]- A new dramatic departure in making Grants to gay/lesbian organizations in order to strengthen and build our community was adopted at the Cream City Foundation board meeting on March 14th. This was done to:

- · Increase awareness of the Grants Program to the community and organizations.
- · Better allocate funds toward building community.
- · Increase the quality of grant applications received by the Foundation.
- · Present more effective Grants targeted to maximize funds towards community growth.

Starting immediately, the Foundation

will give its grants on a Quarterly basis. Each quarter, grant requests will be solicited by the Foundation from all 30 community organizations - a deadline for submittal will be announced as well as a date two months hence which the actual grants will be made.

Applications will be studied for grant requests submitted and organizations will be contacted for additional information. Grant determinations will be made on a priority rating system based on quality. need, effectiveness and will be awarded in four categories to which specific amounts of money will have been allocated by the Board of Directors.

Actual grants will depend on the funds available in the category for which the grants application was submitted. Where funds are not available, yet, the application strikes a glaring need in the community and it is feasible - the Foundation will go to the community on a special campaign basis to attempt to raise those funds.

Aims of the study period will be to try to help the organization focus its efforts and to maximize the effectiveness of each dollar

### AIDS 'burns out' System New Theory Says

[Milw. Sentinel]- The virus that causes AIDS does not suppress the immune system, as scientists have thought for years, a California researcher said earlier this month.

Rather, the AIDS virus stimulates the immune system until it dies, said Michael S. Ascher, deputy chief of the Viral and Rickettsial Disease Laboratory in Berkely, Calif. The lab is part of the California Department of Health Services.

Ascher said he was the first scientist to come up with this theory, which is to be published this summer in an English scientific journal.

Scientists trying to treat and cure AIDS are approaching the disease from the wrong angle, Ascher told health professionals in Convention Hall. The all-day AIDS education seminar was sponsored by the State Medical Society.

Current medical thinking — to fight AIDS by stimulating the immune system is "like throwing fuel on a fire," Archer said.

He said the conventional view of AIDS was that the virus infected the body and after a period of years killed most of the T-cells, the main weapons in the body's fight against invading infections and disease.

That approach didn't make sense to him, because the AIDS virus is found in only one in 10,000 T-cells in the blood of AIDS patients.

Also, a virus like AIDS, a so-called retrovirus, never has been known to directly kill cells, he said.

Ascher said it always was thought that HIV — the virus causing AIDS — directly attacked, invaded and killed T-cells, but what actually happened was that the T-cells became overstimulated by the virus and died.

### Wisconsin AIDS Update

The number of AIDS cases in the state of Wisconsin has almost doubled from the same time one year ago. As of April 1 there were 281 reported cases and 175 deaths, one year ago there were 161 cases and 99 deaths.

White homosexual/bisexual males accounted for the majority of AIDS cases in the state, 79 percent were from this category.

Milwaukee County reported 128 cases of AIDS and 73 deaths, accounting for 46 percent of the state's total cases. The Wisconsin AIDS Update predicted that by 1991 there will be 1,790 cases of AIDS and 895 deaths from the disease in the state of Wisconsin.

### 12% of US-made Condoms Fail Test

Atlanta, GA [Milw. Journal]- Twelve percent of condoms made in the United States and 21% of foreign-made condoms failed recent tests, federal researchers say.

As of February, the Centers for Disease Control has reported, the Food and Drug Administration had tested samples of 430 batches of condoms: 165 batches manufactured in the US and 265 manufactured abroad.

The FDA had reported previously that as many as 1 in 5 batches of latex condoms tested failed to meet federal standards.

The FDA rejects a batch of condoms if more than 4 condoms per 1,000 fail in water-leakage tests. If two or more batches from a foreign manufacturer fail, future shipments from that manufacturer are stopped at the port of entry.

# review "LOOT"

The second offering on the Stiemke Theater stage at the Milwaukee Repertory Theater is Joe Orton's "Loot." You may remember Stephen Frears film "Prick Up Your Ears" which chronicled the life and career of Orton and his lover, Kenneth Halliwell. The film was reviewed in this column last year and both it and a film version of another Orton work, "Entertaining Mr. Sloane" were also recently part of the 6th Annual Milwaukee Gay/Lesbian Film Festival at UWM.

In point of fact, following this play and other Orton works a new adjective was coined for an outrageous macbre play — Ortonesque. Said Orton of "Loot," "I have a lot of vices but false modesty is not one of them. The best thing about 'Loot' is the quality of the writing." And, he was right. It's clear to see why the play was voted the Best Play of 1966 by the London critics (his award acceptance for "Loot" is included within "Prick Up Your Ears").

However, the play had a very uneven birthing process. The original script numbered some 89 pages but before the end of the first six week production period 133 pages of new and revised material were added or deleted. In this production "on the road" very little seemed to go right and it was even questionable as to whether the work would survive. And yet, for the London company little seemed to go wrong.

The critics and the audiences "on the road" found the piece unacceptable and negative. In London, the critics seemed to enjoy the new focus of the work and it became a success.

I shall not delve into the plot here save to

say that imagine a comedy developed from the following as givens: a corpse in a casket, a grieving husband, a twisted female nurse, two male lovers, the stash from a recent bank robbery, and a crazed police inspector. Scramble the above in a delightfully unbelievable outrageous fashion and throw a barb in at an institution or two and you've got the crazed humor of Orton, I might also add that Orton first called the play "Funeral Games" and his lover. Halliwell suggested instead that he call it "Loot." It is not surprising that the disturbed Halliwell bludgeoned Orton to death with the statuette award for Best Play presented him for "Loot." A macbre true finish for the playwright who dared to poke fun at and laugh in the face of death itself.

The Rep production works for the most part. The production is ably directed by Mary B. Robinson in the sense that Orton intended.

For the greater part of the evening, the cast too does Orton justice. Catherine Lynn Davis as the nurse, Fay, is strong and most amusing in her characterization. Steven J. Gefroh as Dennis could clearly be Orton, reincarnated as he handles his role ever so well.

Matthew Lewis as McLeavy, the widower, is far too weak and loses credibility as the sole character of any moral sense within. Lastly, James Pickering, as Truscott, the inspector, also is given a cardboard character to flesh out. However, as the others in the cast try to portray some sense of the real in their characters, Pickering leaves us with the cardboard only. I find that he destroys what the remainder of the cast has worked so hard to convincingly assemble in his feeble attempt to reincarnate Inspector Clouseau. I find that I'm bored with him or he's reached the end of his ability to portray believable characters here. Might not some new blood along with a new facility help the Rep? Davis and Gefroh are certainly welcome new blood.

become a mother. This will permit greater access for medical intervention to save or enhance the lives of the unborn. Coupled with new social attitudes/economic options allowing women to say "no", it should also make abortion a thing of the past, no longer

I want stiffer sentences for abusers and rapists, as well as mandatory psychological counseling and sensitivity training.

I advocate redefinition of the family as it is now known, to a point beyond the present, biological limits. I certainly sympathize with the desire to have children. However, children are the future of the country, too valuable a resource to be





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permitted to just "happen", unwanted, due to carelessness. Therefore, I advocate mandatory counseling for those who would be parents, and socialization of the idea that parenting is a responsibility, and a difficult task, not just the "normal" thing to do. I recognize artificial insemination as entirely suitable and consider as parenting prospects homo- or hetero-centrally bonded couples or groupings, provided that they show a serious commitment to the child's needs, and the work of parenting.

I want every American child, whether in daycare, in preschool, or in the first grade, to be inculcated with the idea that s/he is a person of worth, capable and precious, and worthy of being loved by her/himself, base





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

Aren't you the lucky one?!! Soon you'll be sharing you life, bed and styling gel with the man of your dreams and now a 'bridal shower' is going to be held in your honor! How wonderful and thoughtful of friends to plan a shower just for you!! What a ridiculously easy way to get a pile of free gifts.!!!

Gay bridal showers can present a myriad of special difficulties, so good planning is essential in making your bridal shower the social event of the season and to insure the



receipt of loads of free gifts.
