
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
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

AIDS Commission Report Suggests Major Policy Changes

Washington, D.C. [The Weekly News]-New federal laws to protect persons with AIDS or HIV infection from discrimination headed the list of suggestions in the 269 page draft final report prepared by the Chairman of the Presidential AIDS Commission, and released early this month.

"Discrimination is the most significant obstacle to progress," said Retired Navy Admiral James Watkins, chairman of the 13 member commission.

Watkins made anti-discrimination the centerpiece of his sweeping list of 579 recommendations based on 43 days of commission hearings in which more than 500 witnesses testified.

If the government takes the commission's advice, there will be a massive expansion of drug treatment facilities costing \$2.9 billion to \$3.1 billion annually by 1990.

The federal government would pay about \$2 billion a year, Watkins said; state and local governments would pay about \$1 billion.

The final report of the full commission was due on the President's desk on June 24. Watkins said that there will be controversy among the members of the commission over his stand on discrimnation, but predicted that most members would support his report. His prediction proved correct, when as In Step was going to press, a majority of the commission members voted to accept the anti-discrimination recommendations. The other recommendations of the report were approved without difficulty.

Gay rights groups and medical organizations, which lambasted the commission last year as a political pacifier, praised Watkin's report.

"We think it's an excellent report overall

and that the report's recommendations are well-reasoned and balanced," said Urvashi Vaid, National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Public Information Director. "They do not call for mandatory testing, and we're very pleased" about that.

Dr. Robin Weiss, director of AIDS activities at the Institute of Medicine, a part of the National Academy of Sciences in Washington agreed.

"We are very impressed by Admiral Watkin's ability to turn around the commission from a shambles to an effective leadership body," Weiss said.

Watkins said the key to halting the AIDS epidemic was to encourage people to seek voluntary testing for HIV antibodies. To encourage testing, Watkins said that strict confidentianlity rules should be put in place to protect test results.

Other major recommendations call for creating a health curriculum in schools by 1990 to discuss such issues as AIDS, drugs and teen-age pregnancy; and requiring sex offenders to undergo HIV antibody tests so their victims can be informed if they have been exposed to the disease.

The White House refused to offer any comment on the chairman's recommendations until the commission's final report is received. In the past, the Reagan administration has said that any anti-discrimination laws should be enacted at the state level.

Army Wins A Rehearing On Gays

San Francisco [Chi. Tribune]- A federal appeals court agreed June 9 to reconsider its landmark ruling that struck down the Army's ban on homosexual soldiers.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals granted the Regan administration's re-

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
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quest to refer the case to an 11-member panel for a hearing.

The action nullifies the Feb. 10 ruling in which a three-judge panel of the court ruled 2-1 that 1981 Army regulations providing for discharge on grounds of homoseuxal orientation were unconstitutional.

In the process, the court said homosexuals, as victims of historic mistreatment, were entitled to the same constitutional protection against government discrimination as racial minorities. No other appellate court had ever reached that conclusion.

The 25-judge appeals court did not state a reason for referring the case to the 11-member panel or give details of its vote. No date was set for a hearing.

The armed services' right to base discharges on 'homosexual' conduct has been upheld by the courts. But the appeals court, in a case involving a discharged soldier from the Seattle area, said the Army's regulations went further into the

realm of personal privacy by applying to sexual orientation, regardless of conduct.

The government contended the ruling failed to defer to the Army's judgement in matters of discipline and morale and also was inconsistent with the Supreme Court's 1986 ruling upholding a Georgia law against sodomy.

"The initial decision was cause for celebration," said Leonard Graff, legal director of National Gay Rights Advocates in San Francisco. "The struggle for equal rights for lesbians and gay men is a long-term struggle. Realistically, we have to expect some setbacks. That doesn't mean we give up."

The case involves Perry Watkins, 39, who enlisted in the Army in 1967 at age 19 and said he had homosexual tendencies. His lawyer James Lobsenz, said he was disappointed but not surprised by the decision, and expects the case to wind up in the Supreme Court if he wins the next round.

U.S. Commission on Civil Rights Blasted

[NGLTF]- At a contentious opening session on May 16 to three-days of hearings on civil rights issues raised by the AIDS health crisis, the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights was sharply criticized by the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), ACT UP (AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power), and OUT (Oppression Under Target, a D.C. gay/lesbian action group). The Commission's hearing have drawn fire from gay rights and AIDS activists for being biased, wasteful and irrelevant to the very real discrimination faced by people with AIDS and HIV-related conditions.

In testimony delivered at the opening panel to the U.S. Commission hearings, NGLTF Director Jeffrey Levi criticized the Commission's opposition to gay and lesbian rights issues and challenged the premise of the hearings themselves.

Levi noted the concurrence between the public health and gay/lesbian community on issues such as the need for anti-discrimination protections for HIV positive people and people with AIDS.

Seventy protestors from ACT UP, OUT and NGLTF held a loud lunchtime demon-

stration in front of the federal building where the hearings were held. As the afternoon session began, protestors entered the hearing room and sat silently wearing colorful clown masks while the Commission heard testimony. When outrageous statements were made by witnesses, protestors began to shout out questions and to challenge the Commission. The disruption, which lasted over an hour ended with protestors leaving the hearing en masse chanting "Shame".

AIDS Quilt in Chicago; Madison Adds Names

Madison- When the Names Project/ National AIDS Quilt is displayed at Navy Pier in Chicago, July 9-11, it will contain the names of at least two Madisonians.

Volunteers from Rod's and the Washington Hotel as well as others began construction May 31 of 3'x6' quilt panels for Larry Baumann, Doug Wells and Eddie Dugan. All three died of AIDS in 1987.

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Baumann was a bartender at Rod's and after his diagnosis spoke publicly to various groups about AIDS. Wells has been a DJ at the Back East. Dugan was owner of Dugan's Bistro in Chicago and had many friends in Madison.

"We couldn't be too serious. There was a sense of humor involved," said Ben Doran, one of the volunteers who worked on the quilt. "We tried to get as close to Larry and the others as we could."

While some of the quilt panels feature only a starkly etched name, others include photos and many boast personal memorabilia, ranging from leather, handkerchiefs and jockstraps to jewelry, high heels and teddy bears. More than just names, many panels tell the story of lives.

The quilt was the brainchild of Cleve Jones, a San Francisco gay activist with Harvey Milk. Jones later worked as a legislative aide before founding the San Francisco AIDS Foundation. He began the project in October, 1986 as a memorial to the lives of AIDS victims.

First publicly displayed at the National March on Washington for Gay and Lesbian Rights in October, 1987, the quilt then contained some 1,900 panels and occupied a site the size of two football fields. For many who attended, it constituted the most moving event of the weekend.

The quilt is now on a nationwide tour and has recently been seen in Cleveland and St. Louis. Before its exhibit in Chicago, it will be in Detroit. From Chicago it will move to Minneapolis later that week. The quilt will then go to Seattle and Portland, completing a twenty-city tour that began in April in San Francisco, where an estimated 100,000 people viewed it.

As the quilt grows with the addition of panels made at quilting bees around the country, it now approaches four football fields in size and has over 3,200 rectangles. The number represents only a fraction of those who have died of AIDS-related complications.

Hours for viewing the quilt at its Chicago display are Saturday, July 9, 3:00 to 8:00 p.m.; Sunday, July 10, 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.; and Monday, July 11, 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The Navy Pier is located along

the waterfornt at the east end of Grand

The exhibition is free and open to the public, although donations are accepted. Numerous benefits have been held around the country to help offset the expenses of the quilt's transportation and assembly.

Madison Bus Trip

The Madison's AIDS Support Network has chartered a bus to view the quilt on Saturday, July 9. Reservations must be made by June 25. Cost of round-trip bus fare is \$15. For more information and specific departure times, call MASN at (608) 255)1711.

For those unable to see the quilt or those who have, a recent book has been published. The Quilt, Stories from the NAMES Project is available from Pocket Books for \$22.95.


Top Ten Gay/Lesbian Issues

[Equal Times]- A recent survey by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force revealed the top ten issues among gays and lesbians nationwide.

The ranking is based on a detailed analysis of 1,236 of the 2,347 completed surveys:

- 1) Federal gay/lesbian rights legislation.
- 2) Funding for AIDS research
- 3) Gay/lesbian family benefits
- 4) Federal health insurance for PWA's
- 5) \$\$ for AIDS education
- 6) More gay/lesbian government appointments
- 7) Anti-gay/lesbian violence
- 8) Discrimination legislation
- 9) Executive order banning discrimination

10) Ending immigration exclusion of gays and lesbains.



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AIDS Activists Storm The Country

[Equal Times]- AIDS activists in Massachusetts, California, New York, New Jersey, and Chicago recently completed a spring offensive with mass demonstrations, sit-ins, "die-ins," and arrests.

In Boston, about 50 activists began nine days of protests with a rally at Dukakis campaign headquarters challenging the candidate about inadequate attention given to AIDS issues. Two days later, the demonstrators staged a "sleep-in" at the governor's home, where they set up a mock hospital to dramatize the lack of care facilities for PWA's in Massachusetts.

At the same time, the New York and New Jersey chapters of ACT UP (AIDS coalition to Unleash Power) jointly demonstrated on April 30 at University Hospital in Newark to demand that clinical trials of promising experimental drugs be made available to people with AIDS in New ersey.

In California, thousands of gay men, lesbians and their supporters from around the state gathered in Sacramento to protest the inadequate funding for AIDS education, to oppose a quarantine initiative, and to hear presidential candidate Jesse Jackson. Estimates ranged from 5,000 to 20,000 people.

In addition to the Sacramento march, demonstrators held a "die-in," where the names of several thousand AIDS dead were read aloud over three microphones while hundreds of people fell to the ground and waited to have their bodies outlined in vellow and white chalk.

A sit-in took place the following day in the governor's office, where demonstrators were arrested and charged with disrupting an office building and refusing to disperse.

Finally, eight activists were arrested in Chicago as a result of a 90-minute protest by members of C-Far, or Chicago for AIDS Rights. As part of the protest, C-Far members released helium-filled condoms into the air and changed, "Condoms, condoms, not condemnation; we want gay liberation."

Only Undetected PWAs May Cross Border

Vancouver, B.C. [Windy City Times]-While the border between the U.S. and Canada is officially closed to Persons With AIDS, anyone with the disease may be able to cross if border and immigration officials are unaware of the condition.

The Canada Press reports that immigration officials from both countries agree that having AIDS is sufficient reason to exclude persons from crossing the border either as visitors or immigrants.

However, if a person shows no obvious signs of the disease or keeps mum on the subject, that person can cross undetected.

Robert Greensslade of the Canadian Department of Immirgation said it is his country's policy to bar persons with serious diseases, but that the large volume of crossings makes it impossible to question every visitor's medical status.

A Calgary man recently was turned back while trying to enter the U.S. because he told a U.S. border official he was on his way to San Francisco to receive treatment for AIDS.

Border officials only have to suspect a person has a serious disease to invoke the no entry rule, the report said.

Reagan Panel Nixes Adoptions by Gays

Washington, D.C.- [Windy City Times]-Lesbians and gay men are not recommended as adoptive parents, a 13-member panel appointed by President Reagan decided recently.

The President appointed the panel last August to study adoption programs. In its 54-page report only one sentence was devoted to gays and lesbians: "The task force does not support adoption by homossexuals."

Mary Shelia Gall, head of the panel and counselor to the Office of Personnel Management, told a press conference, "We feel that the American public is not ready to give, and we are not ready to give support for homosexual adoption."





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Lawyers Fight Over Witness for State Man

Los Angeles, Calif. [Journal]- A furious legal dispute in the murder trial of a former Wisconsin man delayed testimony last week by a man the defense says may be the killer of a teenage male prostitute.

The prospective witness, Peter Krizek, 29, has been tried four times in a double homicide involving chain saw dismemberments. Krizek's lawyer, Charles Mathews, has threatened to have him invoke Fifth Amendment protection against testifying in the case of Max Bernard Franc, a former Fresno State University professor.

The prosecutor, Deputy Dist. Atty. Sterling Norris, proposed having Krizek testify after two witnesses identified his picture as resembling a man Franc has called Terry Adams.

Franc has said that Adams, who has not been found, murdered 18-year-old Tracy Nute, cut up his body with a chain saw and scattered the parts across 200 miles of California.

Norris says Franc is the killer and contends that Adams does not exist.

Norris sought to dismiss any suspicions about Krizek by having him testify that he was the person in the identification picture, that he was not Adams and that he didn't kill Nute.

But Franc's lawyer, Deputy Public Defender Mark Kaiserman, said he wanted to cross-examine Krizek about the similarities between the Nute slayings and the slayings of two men in which Krizek was charged.

Krizek, a carpenter, was 22 when he was charged in the July 1980 murders of a gay couple.

"We will present evidence to show that Peter Krizek might have been Terry Adams," Kaiserman said. "We think we can establish enough evidence for the jury to have a reasonable doubt" about Franc's quilt.

Kaiserman says there are numerous similarities between the double slaying and the killing of Nute, a homeless runaway from Kansas City, Mo. Franc, 58, a native of De Pere, Wis. maintained an apartment in West Hollywood, where the killing occurred. He has admited renting the chain saw used to dismember Nute, but says he rented it for Terry Adams.

Harvey Milk Mural Catches 'Free Spirit'

San Francisco [Windy City Times]- The free spirit and sardonic humor of Harvey Milk is captured in a two-thousand-square-foot mural that beams down on visitors to the Harvey Milk Center for Recreation Arts in San Francisco's Duboce Park.

The memorial to San Francisco's first openly gay supervisor was unveiled on what would have been Mr. Milk's 58th birthday.

Ten years ago, in 1978, Milk took office and in November of that year he was murdered in his City Hall office by former fellow supervisor Dan White.

The mural was designed and painted by Johanna Poethig, a former Chicagoan who studied at the American Academy of Art before moving to California in 1975. "I wanted to reflect in the mural the joyousness that he was openly gay and he won," Ms. Poethig said, "the happiness of that and the free spirit of his personality."

The mural, on the outside of the arts center, depicts Mr. Milk astride the shoulders of a clown, amid the petals of a giant dahlia. The mural also includes Ms. Poethig beside Rick Terry, who originated the idea of the mural, both holding candles as did 40,000 San Franciscans on the night Mr. Milk died. Mr. Terry was to have helped with the mural, but was stricken with AIDS.

Baltimore Gets New Gay Rights Law

Baltimore, Md.- Despite opposition from the Roman Catholic archbishop and a group of Orthodox rabbis, the Baltimore City Council recently passed a gay rights bill by a 12-7 vote.

The Council members who voted against the measure were all Catholic men representing heavily ethnic sections of the city,





Gay Community Forum

[MAP]- The Milwaukee AIDS Project is sponsoring an educational forum focusing on the issues of AIDS in the Gay and Lesbian communities. The Forum will be held on Friday, June 24, 1988 at the War Memorial Building at 750 N. Lincoln Memorial Drive. Admission is free.

MAP has been fortunate enough to secure the services of Mr. Bill Sweeney, a representative of New York City's Gay Men's Health Crisis. He will share with the audience how New York's gay community has dealt with the issues and continues to deal with epidemic proportions of AIDS in New York City.

Mr. Sweeney comes to us from a city where the incidence of AIDS is far greater than that of Milwaukee. Currently, there have been over 10,000 reported cases of AIDS in New York City. We realize that these figures dwarf Wisconsin's statistics (June figures indicate a total of 309 reported cases of AIDS in Wisconsin), but the sharing of experiences between our communities will be beneficial for all.

Also featured at the forum will be Mr. Marc Haupert, President of the AIDS Resource Center of WI, Inc. and Mr. Tom Martin, a prominent Milwaukee attorney. As members of the community at large, Messrs. Haupert and Martin will bring their thoughts and ideas on the need for continuing community education and involvement.

Following the forum will be a question and answer period for Mr. Sweeney, so bring your questions and concerns. A small reception featuring refreshments will end the evening. Members of the newly formed Gay and Lesbian Community Education Council will be in attendance and will be happy to speak with you regarding the Council and its future plans.

Your input and support at this event will provide an invaluable resource for MAP and the Council concerning future plans

AIDS 'Safety' May Apply to Beauty Shops

[Milw. Journal]- Reacting to concern over transmission of the AIDS virus or hepatitis, the state's Cosmetology Examing Board will consider more stringent sanitation rules to protect cosmetologists and customers from exposure to infectious diseases.

The rules would require stricter procedures for sterilization of equipment, procedures for treatment of customers who are accidentally injured during treatment, and tighter anti-infection techniques. The rules would pertain to beauticians, cosmetologists and those who perform electrolysis, a process used to remove body hair.

"I don't want the public to be scared," said Marlene Cummings, secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Regulation and Licensing. "We just want to do a good job regulating and make sure the public is safe."

The rules, first suggested in February 1987, will be presented in final form when the nine-member cosmetology board meets June 27 in Madison.

New AIDS Virus Strains Found

Washington [Chi. Tribune]- A California research team has isolated from an African blood sample a strain of virus that can cause a fatal AIDS-like disease by infecting, but not killing, cells in the human body.



Califronia at San Francisco team that made the discovery, said June 9th that the newly isolated strain may be an important tool in the development of an effective drug against the AIDS virus.

A University of Alabama-Birmingham team isolated still another new strain from the family that causes AIDS-like disease in Africa. George Shaw, leader of that team, said it appears to be less virulent than virus strains identified earlier.

Both studies of the new virus strains were reported in the journal Science.

The new strains found by the researchers are both strains of human immunodeficiency virus two, or HIV-2. This virus is a sub-type of the HIV-1 that is blamed for the AIDS epidemic in the United States.

HIV-1 and HIV-2 have been found in AIDS patients in Africa, but only one patient has been found in the United States to be infected with HIV-2. That patient, who died in this country, is believed to have been infected in Africa.

Is Catapano's Vaccine the Answer?

[P.A.N.]- In a major AIDS story, the New York Native reported May 23rd that a Long Island researcher is having extraordinary success treating persons with AIDS. Using typhoid vaccine in carefully measured amounts, inventor Salvatore J. Catapano and his associates are reporting dramatic remissions in AIDS condition in some 200 patients since treatment began in October, 1986. When typhoid vaccine, a proven immune enhancer, "reaches the lymphatic system, its unusual surface causes it to stimulate lymphocytes" which then produce lymphokines which in turn activate macrophages to go after foreign agents in the body.

Following years of private research, Mr. Catapano was granted a patent for this protocol last December (#4,711,876). The patent was approved in just one year, and had been reviewed by four medical examiners. AZT and Thymopentin are the only other patented treatments for AIDS,



and unlike Catapano's regimen, are being heavily promoted by their owners/manufacturers. Typhoid vaccine, an FDA-approved substance, is a generic product and hence cannot by 'owned' by any one manufacturer. So word of Catapano's success has come through grass roots support, one patient sharing the story with another.

Women, AIDS: Is Death Rate Low?

[USA Today]- The number of women dying from AIDS may be grossly underestimated because of the way public health officials count cases, says a report out last week in Ms. magazine.

Chris Norwood, head of National Women's Health Network AIDS committee, claims:

 Overall death rates of women 15-45 have jumped dramatically since 1981.

 The rise is largely due to AIDS-related diseases — pneumonia, tuberculosis, kidney diseases, parasitic infections.

 Since deaths from these diseases alone aren't recorded as AIDS deaths, even in HIV-inected patients, public health officials fail to recognize how many women are infected.

"Denial of the extent of the epidemic begins with the failure to count cases," says Norwood, author of Advice for Life, A Woman's Guide to AIDS Risks and Preventions.

The Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta count only cases that meet a list of criteria based on symptoms found primarily in gay men.

Gynecologic symptoms such as severe pelvic inflammatory disease — which may be the earliest sign of AIDS in women — aren't included in the CDC's definition. And once women are infected, they may die sooner than men, says Norwood, who examinaed mortality data from four states and the District of Columbia.

Kim Richardson, R.Ph., Vice President of Family Pharmaceuticals, announced the expansion as the result of requests from physicians and people who enrolled during the first six months of the program.

"After discussions with people with AIDS and many of the individuals who work with people with AIDS, it was apparent that not only was a price a problem, so were confidentiality and availability. We designed our program around these three factors." Richardson added, "We are pleased to be able to expand the program to include all medications commonly used for treatment of AIDS and ARC related problems."

"Our prices are among the lowest in the country: Retrovir- \$169.75/100; Pentamidine-\$114/vial; Pyrimethamine- \$19/100; Cleocin-\$83/100; Bactrim DS-\$56/100

(generic-\$14/100); Lomotil-\$25/100 (generic-\$4/100). Though the prices charged by the manufacturer may go up or down, Family is committed to keeping its prices as low as possible."

"Confidentiality is assured because we never reveal the names of any of our patients and all orders are shipped in unmarked packages. There is not even a hint on the outside as to the contents of the packages."

"THE MODERNS"

A marvelous film which examines both art and life, beautifully I might add, was recently presented at the Oriental. The film is entitled, "The Moderns." If I'd been able to choose the era of my own birth in recent time, I'd have chosen to be among the expatriots in Paris during the 20's. You'd then have found me numbered with the likes of Hemingway, Stein, and Fitzgerald and others. So, if like me, you like Paris and art, you'd definitely like "The Moderns."

The film examines this transplanted group in Paris and their interrelationships, thoughts, and perspectives through their dealings with an aspiring artist who unfortumately must earn his keep as a cartoonist for an American paper.

An exceptional screenplay gives one the actual "feel" of the writing of this period. The story is told via the right language and character found in the writing of that time. The dialogue could have easily been found in any one of the novels of the period. In fact, when Hemingway speaks, you can easily believe that it Is him speaking. Is this not the object of good drama-that fliction does believably become reality? Much is said and revealed here by what is not said, another important quality of literature of that time.

Jon Bradshaw, the co-author of the piece, has the film dedicated to his memory. Would that such a fine piece of art be one's tribute and legacy.

Interestingly, this examination is both romantic and realistic at the same time. Thus, the views are two: a romantic view of the period as well as a realistic comment upon it as well. A similar example in presentation was the experience of "Cabaret" which gave the same sort of feel to pre-World War II Germany and the subsequent rise of Hitler. Both perspec-

tives were contained there also.

This group in Paris, the lost generation, is in fact lost. They have left the U.S. and they clearly know what they're not but are not sure exactly what they are. Thus, we have another reason for the quest to Paristo find the answer. This bittersweet examination then packs a double punch in being romantic and realistic. The use of color in the film, mixed with brown tone and black and white also clearly underscores this thrust. A most interesting moment of introspection finds one character remarking, "There are not problems—only opportunities."

The casting is right on target. Keith Carradine, as the cartoonist, is the main character who is at the center of the action and through whom we meet the others. His character here is much like that of Cliff Bradshaw of "Cabaret" who narrates that tale. Carradine is strong and credible and works very well with Linda Fiorentio, as a woman who lusts for any and all life experience to try to give her, her fill. Her husband, John Lone, as a crazed businessman trying to "buy" his way into Paris cafe society is convincing. Geraldine Chaplin appears as a slightly batty society feme fatale and Genevieve Bujold is an interesting gallery owner. Lastly, Wallace Shawn's newspaperman is amusing and his attempt at drag is good fun!

The film beautifully shows how art can in fact replicate life. Says another leading character, "Art is only impression. Art is an infection. Some people get it. Some people don't. Art is only a rumor."

I urge you strongly to see this one. It is one of the finest films to have been made in years. It is beyond question a fine piece of art!

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

1101 West in Appleton closed June 2nd. Many good memories for lots of people went with it...





according to the Philadelphia Gay News. Catholic Archbishop William Borders, who had earlier taken a stance of neutrality, announced opposition to the bill shortly before the vote. All black and women members of the Council voted for the measure.

Supporters succeeded in stopping lastminute amendments that would have excluded teachers, food handlers, and children under 18 from the bill.

Gay and lesbian activists observed that behind-the-scenes lobbying by Baltimore Mayor Kurt Schmoke and City Council President Mary Pat Clarke were instrumental in getting the bill passed. Mayor Schmoke's support contrasts the stance taken by his predecessor William Schaefer, now governor of Maryland. Gov. Schaefer took no official stand on gay rights, but was perceived to be opposed to it privately.

Contacting Program Raises Questions

Minneapolis, Minn. [Equal Times]- Efforts in tracing exposed partners of HIV-infected persons, a program that prompted widespread controversy two years ago, have been stepped up in the past six months by state health officials who say workers are getting increased cooperation and acceptance.

Meanwhile, critics say some individuals are being harassed by health department workers who have made repeated phone calls to workplaces urging individuals to be tested.

The original Partner Outreach program which focused on self notification of exposed sexual partners, was discontinued about six months ago and a new program was initiated. Four health department staff members are working on HIV contact notification now and two more will start in July.

Partner Outreach, which was handled by psychologist John Gonsiorek under a contract with the state, was designed to assist newly found HIV-infected persons contact their previous partners themselves.

Some critics say the state discontinued the program because it was failing to

produce enough names.

Mike Moen, director of disease prevention at the health department, said the new program is a "hybrid" of Partner Outreach. State workers will either contact identified partners or will assist the individual, Moen said.

He said many individuals want to have partners notified of possible exposure to the AIDS-causing HIV but prefer to remain unidentified. The state program allows that, he said.

Moen said the program focuses first on assuring that a newly found HIV-positive person has had appropriate counseling. Workers ask about information provided to them and answer any questions about where to go for services, he said.

The second discussion, according to Moen, inquires about possible contacts who have been exposed. If names are given, those persons are contacted and urged to be tested."

A February 1987 outline of HIV counseling procedure by the department states that the purpose of the counseling is to assist the patient in protecting his/her health and the health of others.

Gays Go To Prom; Press Says, 'So What'

Bloomington, Minn. [Windy City Times]-Student Damon Laudahl and his boyfriend got all decked out in tuxedos, drove up to the John F. Kennedy Senior High School in a white limousine and attended the spring prom — and school officials said they didn't mind at all.

Mr. Laudahl notified several newspapers and television stations in the Twin Cities area about his intentions, but the media refused to cover it because "there was no controversy," Mr. Laudahl said. The reason he called the media was becuase he figured it might get a rise out of them and he wanted to "pave the way" for other gays who will be coming along.

Mr. Laudahl checked with JFK's vice principal and the student council and encountered no objections. He said that most of his fellow students were supportive except one male student who hit him on the head and called him "some nasty names."

The student later applogized.

Biking Network Moves Into High Gear



women, non-compliance has been the big taboo, both in manner and in dress. The women who dressed non-compliantly in pants and shirts, and wore their hair short, before and after this was permitted to women by the factory-work of the Second World War, took the accusation and wore it as a part of their attire, along with their short black leather jackets and boots, their military posture and their eagerness to tackle non-traditional jobs, in order to give to women a new set of "traditional" jobs.

They danced in their clubs, or sat in their bars, and kept the places on the dance floor, and the worn leather stools, warm for us. They wore their visibility, and collected scars. They did what they knew to do at the time, for their relationships. Today, role playing has passed out of fashion, and much of their style is laughed at by a few as dated. But, let us not forget: we could not have done better. Their presence, their visibility, made us possible.

The drag queens have, if possible, been the targets of even more righteous wrath, because, while a patriarchal society may feel disturbed by women to "mobilize upward" to the things of men, it definitely resents bitterly those men who "mobilize downward" to the things of women. And so the beaded gowns, the sweeping trains and headpieces, the presentations of the glamourous Heterosexual female stars, have been attacked by the Heterosxual and even the Homosexual communities, who have used the image to castigate all Gay men. We need to affirm the stubbornness which turned upsidedown and inside out expectations of "proper" male and female behavior then, and which do so now, and enable us to do so. These men, with their undaunted insistence on glamor, paved the way for new possibilities of being, and showed us genuine manhood, personhood, in the form of stubborn refusal to conform, to be any less than the vision which they saw in themselves. They showed us courage.

It often happens, as a minority group is making a bid for acceptance, for legitimization, by the mainstream community, that it succumbs to the temptation, imposed on it by that community, to disown its more visibly deviant members, as being "overly visible"; too loud, too strident, too ex-

treme, unreasonable, holding the group back. It has already been suggested in some quarters that Homoseuxal people, who are working to gain civil and social acceptance by the Heterosexual mainstream, do so by leaving behind their more extreme brothers and sisters. This is a temptation which has been faced, in turn, by the Black and Jewish communities, as they assimilate. Given the emphasis of the mainstream on Gayness as a behavior, it will be faced even more so by the Gay community. Let us show our society that we do not disavow our own.

The early patrons of that Greenwich Village bar were representative of their time, as we are of ours. They articulated, as we articulate, needed expressions of personal freedom.

Let us affirm the expressions of freedom and being which make us such a splendidly diverse membership. As members of a statistically deviant subculture, we function as agents of societal refreshment and change. We keep society from becoming behaviorally and emotionally rigid; we keep it honest. And those of us who manage to keep in touch with their own needs to be uniquely themselves, in deeper ways, by so doing also give us permission to do so, and make that more possible. Being visible, they keep us from unwittingly closing ourselves off in set emotional habits; they keep us honest. By keeping visible new possibilities, they are part of affirming life and change, alternatives, which are what being Gay is all about.

So, let us pause, and affirm whatever powers of being that we individually may acknowledge, that these people, who spent their live in, and before, the Stonewall bar did not lose their nerve. By facing a brutal society, they helped it to become maybe a little less brutal. By being visibly different, they helped to keep the door open for individual human difference, for us, for the people of their time, and for those yet to come. Let us pause, and affirm, and claim proudly these, and all of us who celebrate the essence of what we are: possibilities. And on Gay Pride Day, let us raise our glasses to those who, with their courageous lives, offered us a trust. With their uncompromising forthrightness, they provided the dry timber of Gay Liberation for which Stonewall was the spark.


Wet Behind the Ears

"A Beginner's Guide To The 1-900 Phone Lines"

The explosion of the 1-900 phone services has opened the door on new territory, eager to be explored. Yet there are those among us who are still unfamiliar and afraid to venture into this seemingly untamed region of gay society. And like the early explorers, those who are not well prepared for their journey into this new wilderness are destined for disappointment and disaster. So, after exhaustive research and an enormous phone bill, I am proud to be able to present the following beginner's guide to the 1-900 phone lines.

Setting Up

Proper preparation is an essential ingredient for a successful session on the phone lines. It is vital to have your equipment set-up correctly and positioned prior to dialing the number. Here is a short checklist.

- 1. Choose a location. Pre-select a location in your home from which you plan to call, most often a bed, couch or big comfortable chair. Your phone should be near-by and be sure to have a table with-in arm's reach on which you can place any items or accessories needed for your adventure into the sex phone zone. 


