


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



Convention Boasted Largest-Ever Number of Openly G/L Delegates


[G/L Voice]- In numbers that testify to the continued activism of lesbians and gay men within the Democratic Party, nearly 100 gay and lesbian delegates were expected to participate in the 1988 Democratic Convention in Atlanta held July 18-21, according to Gay & Lesbian Democrats of America (GLDA), a national organization of clubs and activists who work within the Democratic Party. The 1988 Convention marked the first time the number of openly gay delegates has been this high. In 1984, approximately 70 openly gay delegates participated in the Convention and in 1980 76 participated.

Openly gay delegates attending the convention were to convene a Gay and Lesbian Caucus; which was to meet daily and hold briefings, press conferences and sponsor visibility actions aimed at ensuring the incorporation of gay and lesbian rights issues and AIDS issues into the Party's platform and campaign.

"The level of participation at the Democratic Convention by openly gay and lesbian delegates was significant for two reasons," observed Christine Riddiough, Executive Director of GLDA. "First, it reflected the growing electoral activism and involvement of gay men and lesbians across the country – delegates came pledged to virtually every campaign and from at least 20 states. Second, this high degree of participation is important because it shows the Democratic Party that by embracing gay and lesbian rights, it is bringing a large, highly motivated community into the fold."

Immigration Bill Passes Committee

[The Weekly News]- The bill allowing lesbians and gay men to immigrate to our



shores has moved another step closer to becoming law, despite a failed attempt by. Rep. William Dannemeyer (R-Calif.) to retain the ban on gay immigrants.

Sponsored by openly gay Rep. Barney Frank (D-Mass.), the bill was voted out of the House Judiciary Committee on June 29th by a 21-14 vote that followed party lines.

"I am very pleased to win by such a big vote," said Frank. "Every single Democrat voted with me and two Republicans."

The bill now goes to the House floor where Frank is predicting victory, although he said it is too soon to say when that may occur. No action is yet slated in the Senate.

Among the immigrant restrictions that the bill lifts are bans on "psychopathic personality" or "sexual deviation." The courts have interpreted those terms to include gay men and lesbians. Presidential directors have curbed enforcement of the gay ban, but gay leaders say it still must be killed.

The Dannemeyer amendment, which would have restored sexual deviation, failed by a 23-10 vote that followed party lines. Joining Dannemeyer were a number of Republican Representatives.

The bill is considered the second of three steps leading to the passage of the gay rights bill. The first was Hate Crimes — the first bill to pass the House to include sexual orientation as a protected class. The third will be action on the gay rights bill itself.

Senate: OK to Discriminate

Washington, D.C. [Milw. Journal]- The Senate approved on a voice vote last week legislation that authorizes Catholic universities in the city to deny equal treatment to gay/lesbian student organizations. The measure was sponsored by Sen. William Armstrong (R-Colo.) and passed as an amendment to the District of Columbia's \$3.2 billion budget bill.

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Armstrong argued that church institutions, as a matter of religious liberty, had the right to exclude gay groups from student organizations accorded campus resources. Armstrong denied that his proposal was anti-homosexual and said it was designed to correct a problem that arose for Georgetown University when a D.C. appellate court ruled that the school had violated the city's Human Rights Code by denving equal treatment to gay organizations.

In the wake of that ruling, Georgetown agreed in March to provide meeting space, a mailbox and the right to apply for student government funding to two gay student groups. But the school was not required, under the settlement, to officially recognize the student groups.

Houston provokes controversy

[Equal Times]-A self-proclaimed racist gay bar in Houston has drawn the ire of activists for its "wetback costume" contest which advertised "free swimming and English lessons" and "green cards" as door prizes.

Gay Community News reports that several Houston activists point to the contest as just the latest incident of widespread racism and sexism in the gay and lesbian community. Last year, the same bar, Mary's, held a "Juneteenth" Party, inviting patrons to dress up for an "Aunt Jemmia look-alike contest." The traditional Juneteenth day celebrates the emancipation of slaves.

A coalition of groups, including gays and lesbians, protested the advertisement of the contest, and called for a public apology from the bar. But Mary's Assistant Manager Mark Casselberry said that "the whole thing was a big joke. Doesn't anyone have a sense of humor anymore? The only people who complained were eight or nine women and they are always complaining about something."

Casselberry also said that Mary's is supported by "many members of the Hispanic community," and that a Hispanic manager of the bar had written the ad.

Nevertheless, activists have organized a boycott of Mary's, even though some leaders have criticized the boycott as "dividing the community." The bar has been instrumental in fighting AIDS and supporting people with AIDS.

NEA: Get Gay Teens Counseling

New Orleans [USA Today]- Every USA high school should provide counseling for its gay and lesbian students, the nation's largest teachers' union urged recently.

More than 8,200 delegates to the National Education Association convention here adopted - by a 2-1 vote - a policy that calls for "counseling for students who are struggling with sexual/gender orientation."

"There is no excuse for blind discrimination," said Roxanne Bradshaw, NEA secretary-treasurer.

She told of sitting in a hospital room 14 years ago with a student who tried suicide because of "social oppression" resulting from homosexuality.

"I vowed I would never again be silent on this issue," Bradshaw told the convention.

Said Harry Hillegas, seventh-grade teacher at Brown Middle School, Ravenna, Ohio: "We must work with thse students so they will have happy endings to their problems."

Opponenets argued the policy could be used in many states to thwart other NEA goals.

Episcopalian Action on Gays is Confusing

Detroit, Mich. [Milw. Journal]- A legislative body of the Episcopal Church passed a proposal July 10 on the ordination of homosexuals that left both proponents and opponents saying they had prevailed.

The House of Deputies - one of the church's two governing bodies - passed an amendment during the church's 69th General Convention that states "no one shall be denied access to the selection process for ordination except provided by canons of this church."

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In order to become part of the church's canon law, the deputies' amendment would have to be adopted by the House of Bishops, the church's other governing body, before the convention ends.

Currently, official church canon law contains no provisions barring homosexuals from being ordained, but a 1979 resolution opposes ordination.

Opponents to the ordination of practicing homosexual priests say the deputies' amendment reaffirms a 1979 church resolution that said "we believe it is not appropriate for this church to ordain a practicing homosexual."

But proponents of homosexuals becoming eligible for ordination say the amendment contradicts the 1979 resolution because it refers to canon law, not a mere resolution.

Minister Dissolves Parliament


Bangkok, Thailand- The Prime Minister of Thailand was recently accused of being gay and, in response, dissolved the nation's Parliament and called for new elections, report Paz Y Liberacion reprinted in The Weekly News. Opposition party leader Chalerm Yubamrung made speculations about Prime Minister Prem Tinsulanond's sexuality when he accused the nation's leader of "peculiar behavior" last May and called for a vote of no-confidence against the leader. Yubamrung added that he could produce young army officers to back up his claim. The Prime Minister's penchant for young, attractive officers has long been the source of broad rumor in the Southeast Asian country where he is known as "Aunti Prem" by gay nationals. This marks the first time Tinsulanond's opposition has ever brought up the leader's suspected gayness. In retaliation, Tinsulanond has dissolved the nation's Parliament and called for new elections.

Stanford Dumps Student Homophobe

Palo Alto, Calif. [Windy City Times]-Anti-gay epithets got a Stanford University freshman evicted from his dorm for "conduct in violation of the Residence Agreement."


Freshman Kenneth Ehrman was accused of making anti-gay slurs against openly gay Residence Assistant Jeff Sloan, non-gay Resident Fellow Dennis Mattheis, and other students. Ehrman's verbal abuse of these people involved "a number of incidents," according to the Bay Area Reporter.

University officials criticized a group of students who held a candlelight vigil for Ehrman. Seven masked students paraded on May 24 in what was described as a Ku Klux Klan-style rally. The demonstration created anger in both the black and gay student communities.

Resume's Sought

Hundreds of Boards and Commissions exist in Milwaukee (city and county). Each has its own term of appointment and includes areas as diverse as historical buildings, health, arts, engineering, human rights and many, many others.

Both Mayor Norquist and County Executive Schulz (with assistance from their respective staffs) fill these interesting, yet powerful bodies. Mayor Norquist's office (and we believe soon to follow, the County Exec's office) are working hard to ensure that all citizens have an opportunity to serve.

Lambda Rights Network [LRN] is coordinating this project. Send in only one resume/vitae. LRN will copy and get them into the proper hands. Send it to: LRN, P.O. Box 93252, Milwaukee, WI 53203. Make sure to include a listing of volunteer organizations that you have worked with, listed approximate dates and any Board of Officer positions held.

May to Meet with Leaders

As a result of a meeting held between Mayor John Norquist and LRN, the Mayor has agreed to meet quarterly with lesbian/ gay leaders. LRN will coordinate this regular 30 minute meeting to ensure active and effective communication with all parts of city government.

The 8-10 member panel will be made up of a core group that will provide consistency, leaders from varied groups serving our community will rotate participation, and the two members at large from the community. Organizational leaders will be contacted by LRN.

Milw. Rights Law to Change

Current laws protecting people from discrimination due to sexual orientation are exceptionally weak in the City of Milwaukee and do no exist in Milwaukee County, according to L.R.N. chair, Ralph F. Navarro.

Navarro pointed out that the current city

ordinance has no teeth, in other words, no enforcement strength, as does the law in the State of Wisconsin. Milwaukee was the second unit of government to pass any type of protective legislation in the State of Wisconsin after Dane County and before the 5½ year old State Statute, engineered by former Milwaukeean Leon Rouse and friendly members of the State House and Senate.

"The reason we are going after this law change," says Navarro, "is to insure that if anything happens to our State Law on nondiscrimination, which is quite possible if either or both houses of the legislature becomes Republican, we will be protected within the City of Milwaukee."

"Even after all these years," Navarro said, "Common Council members are not fully comfortable dealing with the topic. That says several things to me, 1) members of the gay and lesbian community have not publically identified themselves to their elected officials; 2) Our community has not become involved enough in politics and giving money to make a real difference; 3) Council members are more concerned about the back lash of the minority fundamentalist religious folks than lesbians and gays."

Since Mayor Norquist stated that he would fully support legislation for Milwaukee that is the same as that which currently exists in the State of Wisconsin, passage should occur by 1989. For information on how individuals can help in this matter, contact LRN at 445-5552.


Sensitivity Training for City Leaders?



[Madison]- The New Harvest Foundation has awarded \$7,576 to local nonprofit organizations to provide services benefitting the gay and lesbian community. Co-chairs Barbara Constans and Henry Dudek annouced July 11 that the Foundation is giving five grants to agencies for public information, health services, and social activities.

The Madison Community United will receive a grant of \$4,800 for the first stage of a project to produce a history of the last twenty years of gay/lesbian activism in Madison. Writer and editor of the manuscript for Glad City is Ron McCrea, a nationally-known journalist who served as Wisconsin Governor Anthony Earl's communications director and who has extensive first-hand knowledge of the early development of area gay/lesbian organizations. Plans are to make Glad City available next summer to mark the twentieth anniversary of the Stonewall riots, which sparked increased gay/lesbian activism and group formation in Madison and elsewhere in the country.

Other New Harvest grants for public information include \$1,020 to the Madison Gay/Lesbian Resource Center for development of "coming out" information resources and of \$210 to the television show "Nothing to Hide" for archival videotapes of gay/lesbian-oriented programs.

In the area of health and social services, the Foundation is awarding \$1,000 to the Madison AIDS Support Network to help expand its programs for training support volunteers for persons with AIDS. To encourage a variety of social activities within the gay/lesbian community, New Harvest also is awarding \$546 to the Madison Community Art and Athletics Organization.

With these grants, New Harvest Foundation has now distributed over \$50,000 to Madison-area groups for gay/lesbian community services since its first awards made in July, 1985. The Foundation has so far received \$36,000 in pledges towards its \$50,000 goal for its second three-year fundraising campaign to support the continued funding of such grants.



What is "AL-721?"


(Note: This article is presented to you through In Step by the Brady East Antibody Positive Support Group. This group was started about two and a half years ago for HIV exposed people. Please contact BEST or MAP for meeting times and locations if you are HIV Positive and would like to attend. Although this group was started through the efforts of BEST volunteers, it is not part of BEST Clinic, and the article below does not necessarily reflect the opinions of BEST Clinic Staff.)

In the last edition of In Step, a list of common-sense "do" and "don't" items were printed: these were guidelines for HIV-positive individuals to follow to maintain their health. One of the recommendations is to take AL-721.

In the early 1980's, the Weitzmann Institute located in Israel, began testing a lechithin compound called AL-721. (Lecithin is a common egg or soy based food supplement found at any pharmacy or health food store.) The Weitzmann Institute medical staff provided symptomatic PWA's (Persons With AIDS) approximately 10 grams of AL-721 twice per day for a month, and then once per day thereafter indefinitely. As of this writing, the Weitzmann Institute is still testing AL-721.

Preliminary results of the test indicate that AL-721 is effective in postponing the onset of AIDS-related symptoms in some individuals. Symptomatic PWA's have experienced improvement of their condition in some cases. No side effects were indicated in the study, which would seem reasonable since AL-721 is basically food and not a drug.

Keeping in mind that the study results in Communed on page 14

preliminary, members of our support group began taking AL-721 about a year ago. Typically, those participating members take 10 grams on an empty stomach first thing in the morning, then don't eat anything containing fat for another halfhour. It has been suggested that once a person begins taking AL-721 that he/she do not stop because Weitzmann's studies would suggest that some who have started. then stopped taking AL-721 developed AIDS-related symptoms after stopping their daily dose of AL-721.

There is a home-recipe for AL-721 (available through our support group(but the home-recipe formula is not as pure) and presumably effective) as the formula that can be obtained commercially. One AL-721 distributor is Jarrow Formulas of Gardena, California. Our support group has developed a "Buyer's Club" and receives a slight discount from Jarrow, but otherwise it costs \$130.00 for 100 doses, or \$1.30 per dose.

It is important to remember that taking AL-721 is only one of many things our support group is doing to maintain our health. As stated in the last issue, our emphasis is on eating well, exercising, resting well, and avoiding stress (among other things but you'll either have to find the last issue or join to group to find out the details). Taking AL-721 is a small part of the program. We don't claim to have found the magic potion in AL-721, but something that may help to keep us healthy unti lthe time a cure is found.

Dextran Sulfate to be Tested by Feds... Finally

A promising experimental AIDS drug, long used by 'guerrilla' clinics throughout the country, was finally accepted for testing in a federally sponsored trial, officials announced July 8th, according to the Milwaukee Journal.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) officials approved a six month trial of oral Dextran Sulfate, a drug that in laboratory tests has been found to prevent

the AIDS virus from infecting and killing immune system cells.

Trials, which will involve 60 patients, are to begin later this month at medical centers in San Francisco and Boston, according to FDA officials. The clinical trials will determine the dose ranges within which to test the drug in subsequent expanded trials of its effectiveness.

Dextran Sulfate, which is available without prescription in Japan as an anticoagulant to treat blood clots, has attracted many American persons with AIDS (PWA's), largely because earlier test tube studies have found it effective against the virus.

AIDS activists have been pushing for approval of the drug, claiming it could be very effective, especially if used in conjunction with the already approved AZT. According to In Step sources, many west coast PWA's have been using Dextran Sulfate for well over a year, obtaining it from Japan through various channels. One of those channels has been airline person-

nel who would purchase the drug over-thecoutner in Japan, bring it back to the US, and resell it at a profitable rate. Recently, the US asked Japan to stop selling the drug to Americans, making it increasingly difficult to obtain the drug.

Dextran Sulfate has been on the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases list of priority drugs for testing against AIDS since last November. Institute officials have said that shortages of federal manpower have delayed testing of it and other promising drugs. Anthony S. Fauci, director of the institute testified at congressional hearings in April that trials have been delayed due to difficulties in purchasing and studying the drugs.

D.S. will now become one of more than a dozen AIDS drugs being tested in clinical trials programs.

Birth Related HIV to be Studied by niaid

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Information/Reservations: 7641 Egg Harbor Drive Egg Harbor, WI 54209 (414) 868-2098 \$29.4 million in a major collaborative effort to determine what factors influence transmission of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), the cause of AIDS, during pregnancy and birth.

As of June 27, 1988, 1049 children less than age 13 have been diagnosed with AIDS, and many more are believed to be seropositive for the virus. Approximately 80 percent of these children acquired the infection from their mothers. Transmission from an infected mother to her newborn occurs 20 to 60 percent of the time. The exact mechanisms of transmission during pregnancy and birth are unknown.

"This collaborative study reflects a deep concern of NIAID – namely how to stop the spread of AIDS from women to their babies," said NIAID Directory Dr. Anthony S. Fauci. "Recently we have seen a sharp rise in the numbers of AIDS-infected babies, especially among those born to black or Hispanic women who are drug abusers or whose sexual partners are infected. These studies will clarify the risks for pregnant women who are already infected and will provide an opportunity to educate the study participants about how to avoid infection in themselves, their sexual partners, and their infants."

Each center will recruit a cohort of at least 500 women from area hospitals and clinics. Women entered into the study will be those who are seropositive for HIV or are at increased risk of HIV infection and who are pregnant or have a high probability of becoming pregnant within two years. These women will be compared with control groups of seronegative women who are pregnant or at risk of becoming pregnant. Children born to these seronegative and seropositive groups of women will also be studied. Special efforts will be made to include women from minority populations, in which the prevalence of AIDS is known to be higher than in the general population.

Data collected in this study will be used to design improved prevention, diagnostic, and treatment programs for women at risk of HIV infection and their children.

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

'Cotton Patch Gospel'

Recently the Acacia Theatre Company presented a production of the musical "Cotton Patch Gospel" at the Eastbrook Center Theatre on Oakland Avenue. It was a delightful experience to return to what once was the Fred Miller Theater and the early home of the Milwaukee Repertory Theater.

"Cotton Patch Gospel" is a muscial based on the life and teachings of Jesus Christ. It was written with words and music by Harry Chapin originally as a concert piece. Later, it was developed and put into a musical play format and is based upon the Gospels of Matthew and John.

Unlike "Jesus Christ Superstar" which was a literal telling of the historical life of Christ, "Cotton Patch Gospel" is more closely related to the earlier musical. "Godspell" which is based soley on the Gospel of Matthew. However rather than the particularly urban focus of "Godspell", "Cotton Patch Gospel" has a distinct "country" flavor and is much more "folksy" in orientation.

The star of this particulart production was Dick Gustin who portrayed Matthew. It was clearly evident to me early on that he was the professional in the cast who I learned later had received permission from Actor's Equity (the actor's union) to appear in this show. His ability to present a multiplicity of characters in a credible fashion clearly showed the breadth and scope of his dramatic capabilities. His sinigng voice though not particularly stunning was adequate to the task at hand but his dramatic persona more than made up for any shortcoming on this score.

The supporting cast which numbered four - three women and one man made a fine contribution to the show. Their musical harmonies were quite good throughout.

The entire cast seemed to project fairly well in the rather large performing space even without the use of an amplified sound system.

It was Gustin whose training was evident in his ability to make himself heard throughout the performance from all points in the theatre space. However, the supporting cast did not have his experience or preparation and at times had difficulty in so doing.

The blocking was pivoted and thereby the action of the show was spread through the theatre. However not all the playing space was sufficiently lit in a proper fashion in order to totally view the show from all seats.

Chapin's music was pleasant though not particularly memorable. The simple accompaniment worked but a more full instrumentation would have better filled the space.

The play runs through July 23rd.

After completing his education he spent a short time living in Atlanta. Upon



The First Date

A Joining Ceremony

Dearly beloved, we are gathered here together to affirm and to celebrate the joining together in special friendship of the two people standing before us.

They wish to declare, and to affirm, before their Maker and before this assembly, their caring for each other, and their solumn intent, each to be especial strength, solace, support, and succor, for the other.

They wish to articulate in human flesh and intimacy with which the Creator Spirit knows all creation. They wish to procliam a particular commitment that will enable each to promote especially the health, wellbeing, and growth of the other. They wish to unite, as caring partners and help mates, that they may especially honor the Godhead, the joy of their being, in each other, in love.

And what is that love? It is only that which we are all, as human beings, called upon to render each other, but which they pledge to articulate deeply and lastingly, primarily. It is that love without which, the apostle Paul tells us, though we may have all faith and knowledge, we have nothing.

It is that love which suffers long and is kind, enview not, does not vaunt itself, does not behave itself unseemly, but rejoices in the truth, bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things, and never ends. This is the love which these two people wish to affirm today.

It is not without Scriptural precedent, this love which is not primarily biologically procreative.

In the Book of Ruth, in the Old Testament, we find the beautiful friendship of Ruth and Naomi, wherein Ruth pleads of her friend,

"Entreat me not to leave thee, or to return from following after thee; for whither thou goest, I will go, and where thou lodgest, I will lodge. Thy people shall be my people, and thy god my god. Where thou diest I will die, and there will I be bureled; the Lord do so to me and more also, if ought but death part thee and me."

In the Old Testament Book of First Samuel, we have the story of David and Jonathan, of whom it is written:

"... the soul of Jonathan was knit with the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul. Then Jonathan and David made a covenant, because he loved him as his own soul. And Jonathan caused him to his own soul. And when Jonathan died in battle David mourned him, saying thy love battle David mourned him, saying thy love to me was wonderful, passing the love of women."

We also have verses from the Old Testament Book of Proverbs, addressing a married man, concerning his wife of middle-age (probably past child-bearing):

"Let your fountain, the wife of your youth, be blessed, Rejoice in her, a lovely doe, a graceful hind. Let her be your companion, and you will at all times be bathed in her love, and her love will continaully wrap you around."

(This poetry is from Proverbs, chapter 5, verses 18 and 19).

These loving examples, coupled with the portrait painted by the apostle Paul (First Letter to the Corinthians, Chapter 13), suggest strongly that God does not frown on non-biologically procreative loving relationships.

However, in recent times, such relationships have been misunderstood and ridiculed. Human affection and sexuality have become culturally reduced to but one particular aspect, the producing of children only. We here today wish to affirm a broader, no less holy, purpose. But before we bless, let us pause to remember those who have been wounded by this reduced, narrowed view. We pray: O Loving Source of everything that we are, we bow before You and declare to You in sorrow that we

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have permitted to be abused Your Gift of human love, by negating all but one of its aspects. The Quilt: A Woman's Perspective

Over the weekend, I went to Chicago to experience the NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt, on display at Navy Pier in Chicago. Over 1,000 volunteers, working in cooperation with the AIDS Foundation of Chicago, The Chicago Sun-Times and WPWR-TV, presented the most compelling display of love from the gay and lesbian community. With almost 4,000 panels, the display is an incredible reminder that names are people, and all these names are people who have died.

As a woman, my visit to Chicago was looked on by some friends as unnecessary because "the Project is just for men, and specifically gay men." This view reflects a common attitude in the lesbian community that we are "safe" from AIDS. Many women, even those who are promiscuous, do not think they are at risk.

The NAMES Project reminds us that we are all at risk. The Quilt is a slice of life, so to speak. It includes people from all segments of society, including gay and straight men, lesbian and straight women, innocent children, former drug abusers, hemophiliacs, movie stars, and political animals. Everybody is at risk.

For me, the political statement surrounding the quilt was the most compelling reason to actually view the Quilt. The most memorable quilt conveyed the frustration with the political process. A child, in memory of her father, wrote "My dad died because the government didn't care."

The NAMES Project, inspired by the American folk art tradition of quilting, operates with three main objectives:

1. To provide a positive and creative means of expression for those whose lives have been touched by the epidemic.

2. To illustrate the impact of the AIDS epidemic by showing the humanity behind the statistics.

3. To raise vital funds and encourage support for people with AIDS and their loved ones.

The Quilt met these goals successfully,

both in Chicago and throughout the country.

The positive and creative aspects of the Quilt are incredible. Most panels are different, but some share a common theme. Many groups and organizations have large panels dedicated to their members who have died. Black and White Men Together, the Chicago Gay Men's Chorus, the Western Star Dancers, and others share their grief and frustration on group panels. The BWMT panels, with thier black and white material, recognized group members from throughout the country. It was a reminder that the midwest is not immune to the disease.

The first few panels in Chicago included some of our most famous people with AIDS, including Rock Hudson, Gay Olympic organizer Dr. Tom Waddell, Liberace and others. The use of famous people early on is effective, in that it reminds us that everybody is a familiar name to someone. After those panels, each name is important, because they are as real as those few "stars."

There is power in remembering and recognizing the impact of the numbers. When we walked into Navy Pier, we were given two program books to guide us through the project. In the books, the director of names provided a key for those who came to find friends, family and lovers. Then, we knew they weren't just names but they were people.

Like the Vietnam War Memorial, the NAMES Project is the result of a war. NAMES Project Executive Director Cleve Jones calls AIDS the "tragedy of our generation, profoundly affecting every aspect of our lives. As a nation, we have struggled not only against a disease, but also against the equally destructive enemies of ignorance, hysteria and bigotry." As a war memorial, the NAMES Project is very effective because it gets people beyond the numbers and into the actual people who have died.



Raising money is something we in the lesbian/gay community are becoming verygood at, mostly a result of the AIDS epidemic. Unfortunately, we can not solve the problems by soley digging deeper into our own pockets. The viewing of the actual Quilt was "free" but volunteers asked for contributions as we entered the exhibit, and as we left Navy Pier. Volunteers also sold T-shirts, posters, a hard-cover book about the NAMES Project, and buttons. In addition, the NAMES Project/Chicago Chapter did an incredible job of raising money and obtaining sponsors for for the Chicago display.

Sponsors of the Quilt included the City of Chicago, the University of Illinois, many local gay and lesblan organizations, and local political and civic leaders. Corporate support was also obtained in the form of advertising and direct contributions.

The Quilt has been on tour, visiting cities


