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

As In Step went to press it was learned that Miriam Ben Shalom was to be reenlisted by the U.S. Army on Monday, September 12, at the Army Reserve headquarters on Silver Spring Drive in Milwaukee.

Ben Shalom, who has fought a 12 year battle with the military over her sexual preference, was unavailable for comment. In a continuing series of court battles, Federal Judge Myron L. Gordon ordered the Army to reenlist her, or to be held in contempt. The Army was to enlist Ben Shalom on the date the Court had ordered the Army to begin paying a contempt fine of \$500 per day.

Phone Lines Disconnecting

Also at deadline time, In Step had a profusion of ad cancellations by the Gay Phone Lines. From what little information we were able to ascertain before we went to press, supposedly Wisconsin Bell notified many of the companies they will no longer do billing for the phone lines, effectively putting them out of business for the time being.

Reportedly, Wisconsin Bell had notified a 'switching' operation in Chicago it had investigated many of the lines because of complaints of 'sexually explicit talk' on the lines and a lack of monitors to stop such sexually explicit verbage.

Only the 900 lines are affected and apparently, not all of them use this same switching service. We also were not able to find out if the straight phone lines were being 'cut off' in the same manner.

More on this as information becomes available. Meanwhile, you'll probably be seeing smaller versions of In Step due to the drop in advertising revenue. We were around 4 years without their advertising dollars, and will continue without them... we just won't be 80 pages in length that has become our norm.

Koreans Demand AIDS Tests

Seoul, South Korea [Milw. Journal]-Women's groups and other organizations are demanding compulsory AIDS tests for the thousands of foreigners who will visit South Korea for the Olympics.

The groups contend that the influx of visitors could spread acquired immune deficiency syndrome in their country, which has reported only a few AIDS cases and enacted tough laws to curb the spread of the disease.

"It must be compulsory for all foreign visitors during the Olympic period to show medical certificates confirming they are free from the disease," said So Mi-yong of the Women's Hot Line.

The government, worried about offending foreigners, has said there will be no mandatory AIDS Tests. Health officials say it would be impossible to test the 200,000 expected visitors, anyway.

Olympic authorities and government officials are adopting a number of measures to try to ensure that the Games do not expose the nation to AIDS any more than is necessary.

Seoul residents have been receiving handbills headlined "AIDS" that warn people that they must take every precaution to avoid the disease.

City health officials said the warning was being distributed on the eve of the Olympics to raise public awareness before the visitors arrived. Leaflets are being sent to all households in the city, which has a population of 10 million.

Free condoms will be distributed at the Olympic Athletes Village, which will house 13,000 athletes and officials, officials said. Officials did not know if condoms would be provided to the 6,000 journalists in the Press Village.

Nationwide Survey Examines G/L Vote

Results have been announced on what is believed to be a first-ever attempt to survey gay and lesbian voters nationwide.

Known as Survey 88, the study was a project of the National Visibility Campaign For The Gay & Lesbian Vote. Distribution of the survey began last October at the National March on Washington for Gay & Lesbian Rights and continued throughout the primary election season until July 4th. More than 50 organizations and businesses, representing a wide spectrum of the gay and lesbian community, assisted in its distribution.

In all, 1,015 self-identified gay and lesbian voters participated in the survey. They represented 43 states and D.C. Participants were questioned on their choice for president and their comfort with public identity as a gay or lesbian voter.

In response to their presidential choice, Jesse Jackson was a clear first choice. Jackson was favored by 56% of those responding, giving him a 41 percentage point leave over second place Michael

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Dukakis who was the choice of 15%. Third choice was a tie between Paul Simon and "undecided" each representing 10% of the total response. No other candidate garnered more than 2% of the national response.

Democratic candidates were the choice of 87% of respondents. Republican candidates were chosen by 2% and third-party candidates by 1%. As indicated above, 10% were undecided. Even if a number of the "undecided" were to eventually favor Republican or third-party candidates, it would not challenge the overwhelming lead by Democrats in this survey.

Complete survy results, distributed by the National Visibility Campaign, also featured a regional breakdow as well as individual results from the top ten participating states. Regional results showed Jackson maintaining his strong lead in every part of the country. Michael Dukakis' second place showing was strongest in the south where he received 25% of the response. In the midwest Dukakis slipped to thrid placed, replaced in second by Paul Simon who received a 20% response.

Another survey question considered the matter of public identity for gay and lesbian voters. It focused on "internalized homophobia" as a barrier to such identity rather than external factors such as fear of dis crimination or attack. In response to the statement, "Wearing a gay or lesbian vote" button would cause me to feel ashamed or embarrassed," the following responses were received nationwide: "never" (33%), "sometimes" (51%), "frequently" (14%), "always" (2%). Interestingly, a regional breakdown on this question revealed no significant variation.

The National Visibility Campaign has greater visibility for gay and lesbian voters as one of its goals. The response to this question was deemed encouraging in that it revealed a "sometimes" which leans more in the direction of "never" than "frequently." Eddie Marriott, the Visibility Campaign's director, pointed out, "recognition of uncomfortable feelings does not necessarily imply acquiescence to them. In many cases, it can be an important first step in overcoming them."

In its report on the survey, the National

Visibility Cmpaign sited the difficulties that exist in obtaining information on gay and lesbian voters. It cautioned against drawing general conclusions too quickly and pointed out the need for much more research in the future.

Eddied Marriott reported that the National Visibility Campaign was encouraged by the results of this inaugural effort. He hoped that the success of Survey 88 would attract funding for future research. Offers of professional consulation and assistance have been received.

British Judge Sends Gay Bashers to Jail

[Equal Times]- Two gaybashers in London were convicted by a unanimous jury decision at a trial in which the victim of the violence described the judge as giving three "gay rights speeches."

London's Capital Gay reports that the judge reminded the jury that "In this country today, it is not illegal for two men to walk the streets hand in hand, or to kiss.

The judge also warned the jury that "what's on trial is not someone's sexual preference," and that whatever they felt about homosexuality, they "must see this as a case of an innocent man going about his business."

The victim of the violence, James Maw, was brutally beaten over the head in April 1987 after three youths spotted him kissing a young man whom Maw had just met at a Manchester bar.

Maw expressed surprise not only at the judge's remarks, but at the attitude of the police was well, who, he said, were very helpful.

"The police were very keen for the crimes to be recognized as a gay bashing," said James. "This was really an encouraging experience for me. There must be lots of us who are caught by queerbashers in the street with our hands down, someone's trousers, and would never go to the police. But this made me think twice."

Historic National G/L Conference

[Equal Times]— The nation's largest gathering of legal professionals interested in lesbian and gay legal issues is expected to take place in an historic conference this fall in San Francisco.

Lavender Law: The National Conference on Lesbian and Gay Legal Issues will convene Saturday and Sunday, November 12 and 13, 1988, at Golden Gate Law School in San Francisco. A separate legal conference on AIDS will take place on Friday, November 11, at the San Francisco War Memorial Building.

Attorneys will lead seminars and workshops on a broad variety of substantive issues, including family law, estate planning, employment discrimination, sodomy law reform, civil disobedience, military and immigration policy and, of course, AIDS.

Registration fee for the weekend session will be charged on a sliding scale based on income and will range from \$30-\$90 (higher at the door). The Friday conference on AIDS, sponsored by the Bay Area Lawyers for Individual Freedom (BALIF) AIDS Legal Referral Panel will cost an additional \$50 (\$60 at the door).

Openly Gay Teacher Wins Challenger Award

[Equal Times]- An openly gay teacher last month won the first fellowship awarded in memory of the seven crew members of the space shuttle Challenger who died two years ago when the craft exploded shortly after takeoff.

Jerry Mallon, who is active in the Philadelphia chapters of Black and White Men Together and Dignity, received the \$5,000 grant at a ceremony in Houston on July 11. The grant will fund the creation of an educational program about space exploration in Montgomery County, Pa.

Mallon's proposal, "Project E.T. (Ex-

ploring Together): Adventures in Culture and Space," was one of over 100 proposals submitted to the Challenger Center, a foundation set up by the families of the crew members. Mallon said he thinks his proposal was chosen because the astronauts were from a variety of ethnic backgrounds and his proposal had a "multicultural approach."

In his acceptance speech, Mallon mentioned that students need to learn about people from "all races, ethnic groups, and sexual orientations."

Gay 'Cure' Didn't Work; Men Want Money Back

Reading, Pennsylvania [Windy City Times]- Six men, who said a church-run program to rid them of their homosexual urges failed to work, are suing for \$20,000 in damages each as well as restitution of the fees and expenses they paid in the program.

The men, three of them under the name "John Doe," have filed suit in Berks County Court of Common Pleas against the General Conference of the Seventh Day Adventist Church and Colin Cook, former executive director of the church's Quest Learning Center.

The men claimed that not only did Cook fail to provide them with a "cure" for their homosexual urges, but that he gave expression to some of his own "urges" on them. They said Cook sexually molested them, forced them into nude massage sessions in order to "desensitize" them, and one main said that Cook asked him to masturbate in front of him.

Gay Sues Minnesota Mutual For \$5 Mil.

San Francisco [Windy City Times]- A California man has filed a \$5 million suit for alleged breach of contract and bad faith against Minnesota Mutual Life Insurance Co. after his lover died of AIDS and the company refused to pay a mortgage insurance policy.

three-bedroom home he shared with his lover Stephen LaLiberte, which he insisted should have been protected under the insurance policy LaLiberte had with Minnesota Mutual.

LaLiberte had bought the home in Hercules, California in 1985 to live with Rehm.

Early in 1986, LaLiberte had purchased mortgage insurance in which the policy called for payment of the outstanding balance on the mortgage in event of the insured's death. The policy was approved and became effective on February 4, 1986.

LaLiberte affirmed that he was in good health at the time. There were no questions on the application concerning AIDS or AIDS-related conditions.

Six month after the policy was approved, LaLiberte was diagnosed as having AIDS. After a short illness of six weeks he developed an AIDS-related nervous disorder and died of a brain tumor.

As beneficiary of the estate, Rehm expected Minnesota Mutual to pay the mortgage insurance. After a one-year "investigation" of the claim, the insurance company refused to make good on the \$125,000 policy, because, it insisted, La-Liberte had a pre-existing case of AIDS. Rehm lost the home through foreclosure and now is living in San Francisco.

His attorney has filed the \$5 million claim against the insurance company for attempting to unilaterally rescind the contract "through a process of post-claim underwriting whereby the application was not evaluated fully until after the claim was filed."

Court Orders Taylor Mental Commitment

Eau Claire [Milw. Sentinel]- Alvin Taylor, a traveling entertainer charged in four slayings statewide, was found not guilty by reason of mental disease or defect in the stabbing death of an Eau Claire man, but a psychiatrist said it was unlikely he will ever be released from mental treatment.

"Given the tools we have in psychiatry today, there is virtually no possibility that

Mr. Taylor could be safely released," John Greist, a Madison psychiatrist who examined Taylor three times, testified.

Eau Claire Circuit Judge Gregory Peterson ordered Taylor, 41, committed to the State Department of Health and Social Services for treatment at Mendota Mental Health Institute in Madison until he is judged to be no longer dangerous.

The hearing was the culmination of 16 months of delays, postponements and competency hearings centering on Taylor's ability to stand trial after his arrest in April 1987 for the May 1986 slaying of James Severson, 42.

Eau Claire County Dist. Atty. Ruth Bachman previously agreed not to challenge Taylor's mental-disease defense in exchange for Taylor pleading guilty to one charge of attempted first-degree murder for attacking a West Bend man with a screwdriver.

Peterson sentenced Taylor to 20 years in prison for stabbing Paul Zwick several times in a West Bend hotel room.

The 20-year sentence will be concurrent with Taylor's commitment at Mendota, but that Taylor will have to serve time in prison if released (from mental treatment) before the prison sentence is up, Bachman said.

Washington County also agreed not to challenge Taylor's mental-disease defense on a charge of first-degree murder in connection with the 1986 shotgun slaying of Daniel Lundgren, 33.

With the Eau Claire case closed, Taylor is now scheduled to appear in Dunn County, where he has entered pleas of not guilty and not guilty by reason of mental disease or defect in the 1987 slayings of Timothy Hayden, 27, of Menomonie, and Robert Williams, 38, of Eau Claire.



A-Choice Helps Keep Gays In Touch

[CCF]- Through a seat on the Board of Directors of A-Choice, the Cream City Foundation (CCF) works with activists of 12 other agencies to agitate for change and the acceptance of gays in the wider community.

Because of A-Choice, every United Way Drive, and all federal, city, county offices receive a booklet that openly lists CCF as a Gay organization, "despite this, we have had no negative feedback from any source since joining A-Choice 3 years ago," said Julia Kleppin A-Choice Board Member and CCF Rep.

What is A-Choice? It's a Federation or umbrella group of 13 widely varying agencies with only one purpose in common, to make changes happen. They range from the ACLU to Women Office Workers Alliance to environmental organizations to a new Latino organization. Each, as CCF, has a well defined mission.

How are funds raised? A-Choice was forced to organize in order to qualify for the Combined Federal Campaign held each fall in which only umbrella organizations can participate.

With this experience A-Choice approached the State of Wisconsin since many organizations are state wide. Then the city schools, City and County of Milwaukee and MATC got included in joint side-by-side campaigns with the United Way.

Most recently A-Choice adopted a \$100,000 campaign goal and has been approaching hospitals, the Bus Drivers' Union, other cities, banks and law firms for permission to have a side-by-side campaign with the United Way. Many have agreed and new campaigns will be undertaken his fall.

Members have savvy and clout. All the agenices, except CCF have paid staff members. Each works or lobbies government agencies daily on behalf of their clients, so we are tuned in to all levels of

government.

A-Choice too has a paid staff, a full time employee and one part timer. They work out of the Jobs With Peace offices and use JWP's computer.

Monthly board meetings guide the organization and a separate campaign organization, under top area business executives run the annual campaigns at job sites with payroll deductions.

CCF received nearly \$9,000 through A-Choice last year and is the second largest agency in A-Choice as determined by the total dollars designated to particular participating agencies.

"Through our participation we receive not only dollars, but make invaluable contacts with government officials, business executives and trained lobbyists on behalf of the Gay/Lesbian community," Kleppin said, "This is speeding our acceptance all over the Metro area, and we learn how to go about fighting for our rights from the real Pro's who are in the thick of things every single day."

CCF has been a member of A-Choice for 3 years and uses the funds raised for the gay/lesbian community, the Community Center and the Gay/Lesbian Television programs.

CCF Poll Reflects Wide Opinions

[CCF]- While Mike Dukakis, Tony Earl and Jim Moody won the CCF straw poll, several others showed surprising strengths and the poll showed the wide diversity within the community.

Some surprising results: Herb Kohl lost to Earl 2 to 1, with 38 against Earl's 87. Susan Engeleiter got almost as many votes as Kohl with 31 showing the makings of a close campaign in the fall. Helen Barnhill received 27 votes for the 5th district, well behind both Flynn (45) and Moody (74) but still a strong showing. Steve King was way behind Engeleiter with only 4 votes with 31 for her. Moody and Flynn were closer

Wisconsin Gay Republican Group

Madison- Coming on the heels of the formation of the first national gay Republican organization, a Madison elected official has announced that he plans to start a gay Republican group in Wisconsin. Jim McFarland, an openly gay Alderman who is also Republican, is coordinating the effort to set up the first GOP organization for gays and lesbians in Wisconsin.

The general goals of the new group, tentatively named Wisconsin Republicans for Equality and Privacy (WREP), would be the same as that of the newly formed national group: to promote the concerns of gays and lesbians within the Republican party and to promote the conerns of the Republican party among lesbians and gays. Also like the national group, the organization's members would be encouraged to participate in the campaigns of Republican candidates with similar viewpoints on privacy and equality issues.

There has been a tendency for Republican legislators to ingore gay/lesbian voters and instead cater to the interests of the religious fundamentalist wing of the party, that all lesbians and gays are Democrats and live in somebody else's district. "When candidates for both parties are vying for gay/lesbian support, then the gay community will finally be able to say it has some real clout," McFarland said.

McFarland adds, lesbians and gyas who consider themselves Republican needs a niche. "For too long, Republican gays and lesbians have been ignored by both their party and their community," according McFarland. 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

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"More than Names"

San Francisco- "More Than Names", a new play based on the experience of The NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt, will have its world premiere on Thursday, September 29, 1988 at New Playwrights' Theatre in Washington, D.C.. Written and directed by David Lemos, former Producing and Artistic Director of the San Jose Repertory Company, "More Than Names" is a poignant yet often humorous portrayal of the a community in the midst of crisis.

One of many events sponsored by the San Francisco based NAMES Project in conjunction with the Quilt's return to the Capitol Mall on October 8 & 9, the play chronicles the creation of the Quilt, culminating in its emotional and dramatic anaugural display in October 1987. Like the Quilt itself, "More Than Names" seeks to give a human face to AIDS, and thereby raise consciousness, compassion and contributions in the ongoing battle against the disease which to date has killed more than 39.000 Americans.

"The lay is a pastiche — in a way a quilt itself," says Lemos. "The source material is the thousands of letters written by people who have made panels for the Quilt, the conversations and stories told by staff members, volunteers, panelmakers and people who have viewed the Quilt. But first and last, the main inspiration is the Quilt itself."

In workshop for over five months prior to its Washington opening, "More Than Names" comprises a cast of 12, all volunteering their time for this project. All proceeds from the production will go to support The NAMES Project. The play's opening night, September 29, will be a fund raiser to help offset production costs. Tickets for the special opening night are \$50 and include a pre-show reception and post-show cabaret.

There is passion, of course, but also companionship. I remember spending a cold winter night with my lover-curled up in front of a fire talking about our dreams and ambitions for the future.







By taking advantage of the services offered, we can stop the spread of AIDS in the lesbian community.

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another point of view...

On Labor Day, Milwaukee's gay and lesbian community came together to celebrate health and support our friends with AIDS. MAP Fest, sponsored by the Milwaukee AIDS Project, provides an opportunity for both education and fun.

This year, MAP Fest offered women an opportunity to become informed about AIDS in the lesbian community. Thanks to the tireless work of the Women's Alternative Clinc and its volunteers, lesbians in Milwaukee are becoming better informed about the dangers of AIDS amongst lesbians.

Back in the early days of AIDS, we women thought we were safe. Of course, we've all heard the jokes about lesbians being the chosen ones, etc. because lesbians weren't coming down with AIDS. Jerry Falwell and the radical right didn't buy our argument, and of course, neither did AIDS.

Again, I'm going to shock you guys (and some women) out there who think all women are virtuous. The truth must be know. Some lesbians actually sleep around, and a few haven't been too particular. Previous relationships with men and drugs can put women in high risk categories. Prostitution with men may be a means of support for some lesbians.

The good news is that we can do things to prevent the transmission of AIDS in the lesbian community. How about shrink-wrapping? But seriously, we have options, if we choose to exercise them.

While we don't have condoms, we do have dental dams. Volunteers at MAP Fest distributed dental dams, along with instructions for safer sex for women. Dental dams are the latest rage in lesbian sex. They are made of latex, and offer women some protection from potentially infected vaginal fluids. But dental dams are not perfect, so don't be fooled into thinking they are totally safe.

Of course, the best place to start is to find out the history of your sexual partners. These days, "who have you slept with" can

actually be rather well received. As a matter of fact, some potential partners may be relieved when the question is asked. In fact, depending on how small the commnity, this can be a very interesting conversation, and you may find that you are no longer interested.

Lately, it seems as though I hear more and more about lesbians doing intravenous (IV) drugs. Of course, I.V. drug users are a high risk group for AIDS. Just say no! If it works for Nancy Reagan, it'll work for us. But seriously, when your date passes the needle, pass on her. If she is using coke or pot, you may want to inquire about her past drug history.

The safest way to be sexually active is to participate in monogamous, long term relationships. What's long term? Write to the editor if you know the answer. Obviously, longer than 15 minutes. In other words, bed hopping is out of the question. Since this is not an immediate answer to the question of sex and the single woman, go on.

JoAnn Loulan, author of Lesbian Sex and Lesbian Passion (both available at People's Bookstore), presents a number of options that not only enhance the sexual experience, but also contribute to a safer sex experience. Loulan will be appearing in Milwaukee October 1st and 2nd, courtesy of Hurricane Productions, The Counseling Center of Milwaukee and the Women's Crisis Line.

Ms. Loulan, a certified sex educator and psychotherapist, has been called "The Dr. Ruth of Dykedom." Her performance entitled "What's So Funny About Lesbian Sex", validates and affirms lesbian sex in a warm and knowledgeable way using humor, facts and in-person demonstrations. The performance will be presented October 1st, 8:00 p.m., at the Kenwood Methodist Church. (\$12 at the door). Part of Loulan's program includes a discussion of AIDS and safer sex for lesbians.
