





H.R.C.F. Localizes Efforts

The Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF), the largest National Gay and Lesbian and AIDS Political Organization, is in the process of setting up 15 Field Committees in different areas of the country, including Milwaukee. The Field Committees will do outreach into local communities on behalf of HRCF and will concentrate on three areas: Building support for HRCF's Speak Out Campaign; set-up meetings with local national politicians; and organize on national political issues.

HRCF has long felt there needs to be more communication on local levels about national issues, especially in areas that aren't on either coast. Elements of HRCF's ongoing grassroots mobilization initiatives include:

• Expansion of Speak Out, HRCF's one-day Western Union constituent mail program, ensuring timely grassroots mail pressure on members of Congress from "The folks back home."

HRCF is looking to hire well- organized, enthusiastic and assertive individuals to become "Area Canvass Supervisors" to locally develop the Speak Out program. Supervisors will identify local community events and other opportunities for enrolling Speak Out participants. Besides canvassing crowds themselves, they will also recruit, train and supervise other canvassers at events. • Development of a concrete 'infrastructure' of locally-based organizers and organizing committees. For many years national organizations have depended on local groups to generate grassroots pressure needed to win on the federal level. While these groups do extraordinary work on limited resources, their focus in primarily local. Therefore, HRCF will use the local committees approach to work cooperatively with local groups. These committees will work with Regional Field Managers. In our case, that will be Laurie Dittman, the Midwest Regional Field Manager (312) 278-3352.

• The House- Meeting Program, which uses the community's natural social orientation, should allow HRCF to reach countless individuals who might not otherwise become involved. This initiative will produce short and long term constituent pressure, and will also identify volunteers and train new leadership.

 Advertising and outreach to promote HRCF programs and help show people across the country how their individual efforts can make a profound difference on Capitol Hill.


In Step & Light to "Get the Word Out"

TX Prisons Censor W.W. Wells Column

A humor feature by In Step writer and internationally syndicated columnist, W. W. Wells III was censored by the Texas Department of Corrections saying the article, published in This Week In Texas, was too graphic and promoted homoseuxal behavior.

Cited was a humorous article entitled "A Halloween Date," (published in October by In Step). The determination was by the prison's Mail System Co-ordinators Panel.

The Panel said the article "contains graphic depictions of men engaging in homosexual activity" and "is detrimental to prisoners' rehabilitation because it would encourage deviate criminal sexual behavior." Thus, inmates at Texas Department of Corrections' facilities found the article clipped from the issue. The censored article dealt with Gay dating in a humorous manner and included references tohaving sex with a man who "secretly laced the Vaseline with Crack," and having sex with "the warm body curled up next to you in bed and learning later that yoou inadvertently brought his at to orgasm."

The **This Week In Texas** subscription department said that there are quite a few inmates in Texas prisons who subscribe to **TWT** on a regular basis.

W. W. Wells' syndicated humor/satire column, Juciy Bits is published by Gay and Lesbian publications across the country and takes a tongue in cheek look at the times and the Gay lifestyle. Mr. Wells began writing "Juciy Bits" in 1984 for In Step, and began syndicating it in 1988.

Romanian Gays Repressed, Tortured

In the wake of Romania's people's revolution, which saw the ousting of the Communist Party and the execution of dictator Nicolae Ceausescu, gay activists in neighboring Hungary say they now feel free to share information on Ceausescu's repression and torture of gay men.

Laszlo Rusvai and Sandor Borsos, members of the international committee of Hungary's HOMEROS Lambda and publishers of Hungary's new gay newspaper, "Mas," confirmed in late December that Romanian Gays faced horror to rival that of history's most violent regimes.

"For example, there was a big crackdown in the western part of the country two years ago and more than 100 were arrested and tortured. Some of them committed suicide by jumping out of prison windows," Borsos said.

The 1986 crackdown centered around the city of Arad, according to Borsos and Rusvai. The captured Gays were forced to give out names and addresses of other homosexuals, who were then arrested in their apartments, the Hungarians said.

"First they (police) went to public

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cruising places, a beach and a swimming pool, and they rounded them up," Borsos said.

"Then in jail," Rusvai continued, "the police would tie two of the gays together around a large stick, then place the stick on two desktops not very far apart, adn then rotate it like a barbecue, all the time beating them. They called it "the grill."

"Besides the beating and torture, they were made to have sex with ech other in the presence of guards who took photographs," Rusvai said.

Given Risks, Gay Still Cruised

When Borsos last visited the Romanian capital of Bucharest in 1987, he said he found "people not as intimidated as they were supposed to be. They were quite open and it was easy to make acquaintances," he said.

"Gays met each other at a facility (toliet) in the main post office and also at a sunbathing area and one particular steam bath," he said.

But the men Borsos met never talked about their lives as gay people. "They were only concerned with teh general aspects of life," he said. "Everyone was complaining about the living conditions. The men I met in public were only looking for sex."


"Ex-Gays" Non-existent

Church organizations who claim to be able to change homosexually oriented men and women, so called "Ex-Gay Ministries," are not effective and can actually do more harm than good, according to an article in "The Second Stone," a national newspaper dealing with Gay and Lesbian issues in the church and society.

Alarmed by higher visibility of Gays and Lesbians, church leaders began forming ex-gay ministries soon after Anita Bryant's campaign against Gay rights in Miami. Though science tends more and more to show that sexuality is formed by causes lying beyond an individual's choice, "change" ministires are now more popular than ever. But Rev. Sylvia Pennington, author of Ex-Gaus: There Are None, told "The Second Stone" that the change ministries do not ultimately offer Gay men and Lesbians the desired result. Pennington was raised in the Assembly of God and worked in a change ministry before forming her present belief that sexuality is not a matter of choice that Gays can be beloved of God as much as anyone, and that people who think they can change their sexuality are doomed to disappointment.

Still, about 25 perent of the Gay Christian population at any one time is so

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vexed by what has become for them a painful seuxal dilemma that they seek help from a change ministry.

Change ministries usually teach Gay men and Lesbians that they will still have a physical and affectual attraction to members of the same sex, but they should seek marriage and family life. The potential for disaster is great, however. In more cases than not, the Gay partner in the marriage eventually bails out, leaving their spouse and children confused, hurt and angry.

400 Gay Danes Marry in 20 Days **By Rex Wockner**

As Danish Gay and Lesbian activists anxiously await the release of official statistics on the first four months of Denmark's first- in-the-world legal Gay marriages, the newspaper Berlingske Tidende did an informal survey and found that 400 couples were married in the 20 days after the law took effect Oct. 1.

Activists had been surprised when only 11 couples turned up for an Oct. 11 mass wedding at the Copenhagen Town Hall and only later realized that the anticipated contd. on page 8

MAP Seeks Volunteers

(Milwaukee)- The Milwaukee AIDS Project (MAP) has issued a special appeal for 200 new volunteers to help deliver life care services to its rapidly growing clientele of people with AIDS and HIV infection. MAP Executive Director Doug Nelson called the appeal "absolutely essential" and asked for support from Milwaukee's Gay and Lesbian community.

"We are experiencing a surge in new client intake that goes beyond the projected rate of increase that we expected', Nelson explained. "We have recently been averaging 10 to 15 new clients per week which requires that we speed up and increase volunteer recruitment. Although we are not alarmed by these changes, it is absolutely essential that we secure the volunteer help that is so important for our clients."

Nelson said there is an immediate need for 50 new emotional support volunteers or buddies, and 70 new practical support volunteers to help clients with transportation, housekeeping, meal

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presence of hundreds of news reporters and scores of camera crews scared off most couple who were ready to tie the knot.

Since then, anticipation has built steadily in wait for the nation's triannual statistical report.

Berlingske Tidende, meanwhile, compiled its count of 400 about three weeks after the first weddings by phoning the town halls in major cities, according to Else Slange, president of the Danish National Association for Gays and Lesbians (LBL).

In the meantime, LBL continues to fight twodeficiences in the Gay marriage law that ban Gay adoption and allows the state Lutheran church to refuse to offer Gay weddings.

The issue is being hotly debated within the church and Slange says LBL has preparation, grocery shopping, and laundry. By the end of 1990 he said MAP would need another 50 buddies and at least 30 more practical support volunteers.

"Our greatest need is for people who can dedicate daytime hours to help our clients, even if its just an hour or two on a regular basis', Nelson said. "Any time commitment, however, will be a tremendous help to our clients."

Nelson said that volunteer training requirements have been reduced for practical support volunteers so that new volunteers can quickly be trained and can deliver needed services as rapidly as possible. He urged all who are willing to help to call the MAP office (273-2437) and ask to be scheduled for a general orientation training session which are held bi-weekly.

"Milwaukee's Gay and Lesbian community has historically been MAP's strongest source of support," Nelson stated. "Once again we must ask the contd. on page 10

opted, for the moment, to let theologians and pastors argue the matter out among themselves before making its next move.

A recent national opinion poll of 1,200 Danes found that 64% support the Gay marriage law. Among those under age 50, the figure rises to 73-80% in various age brackets. Slange called those figures "really good."

Elsewhere in Scandanavia, a Gay marriage bill is set for introduction int he Norweigan parliament in February and should see some action by June, according to the national gay group DNF-48.

And in Sweden, Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson and other officials have publicly stated their support for Gay marriage and legislation will be introduced Jan. 25. The Swedish parliament, however, will likely not address the matter for several months, according to RFSL, the Swedish Federation for Gay & Lesbian Rights.

Where To From Here, Part II

Rights, Violence and Cooperation Top Survey Results

Over 100 Lesbians and Gay men were randomly surveyed during December 1989 to determine what they felt were the top two issues and concerns for the 1990's. Doug Garfield and Chris Baster were the pollsters for Lambda Rights Network (LRN).

75% of all respondents identified expansion of Gay/Lesbian rights as the most import issue of the '90s. People surveyed were not given any choices, people were simply asked to choose from two areas that they felt were of most concern.

When asked to explain the need for the expansion of rights for the new decade, individual comments were:

"We must get beyond the theory of rights, especially in the work place. We must make sure that employers KNOW that it is illegal to discriminate."

"Shouldn't we have the same rights as other people? It doesn't seem like many people really understand that."

"Our top agenda items for this decade should be passing Domestic Partner's legislation and getting people out of the closet!"

"We must encourage our spokes-people to become even more assertive, and we must ACTIVELY support them."

40% of the people expressed major fear about the rising violence (verbal, physical and psychological) taking place towards Gays and Lesbians. SOme noted the LRN Hates/Violence Crime project and expressed hope that it would continue to document the reality of violence to our own people. Some of these people also noted the need for a better relationship with the police.

35% stated strongly that there was a

need for better cooperation between Lesbians/Gay men and people of color so that "we can show that we are truly a united community."

33% believe that one of the greatest problems that we have as a community is the level of fear and closetedness so many maintain.

Other issues of importance included: learning more about our own spirituality and ways to confront the hypocrisy in most mainstream religions; dealing with the media; and the role of a serious education program honestly dealing with Gay/Lesbian issues at every level of society.



15 Years of Dignity By Kevin-Richard Quader

On February 17, Dignity will celebrate fifteen years of existence in Milwaukee, making it one of the longest continuous-running Gay/Lesbian organizations in the community. This is a milestone not to be taken lightly, as those involved in organizations may testify. We seem to survive and even flourish in a sometimes unfavorable environment. Perhaps this is a testament to the strength of our faith or maybe our unwillingness to accept our role as stepchildren of the church, if not society. Our grip is strong.

Dignity Milwaukee started its somewhat nomadic existence in the apartment of the Late Brother Grant-Michael. We gained strength with such strong community leaders as the late Dale Sprang. Outgrowing our facilities, we progressed to the Newman Center at UWM. That is where I first became aware of Dignity's existence. Having been brought up in a traditional Catholic family and not having entered a church for a number (quite a few) years, the concept of participating in a Gay Catholic service surprised me. This was a contradiction in terms. Gay and Catholic - that was me, that was Dignity.

In stayed and prayed until chemical abuse forces overtook both me and my faith. Dignity withstood without me, being evicted from the Newman Center and on to St. John's Cathedral. That liaison also ended in expulsion. On we went to St. Pius X, our present location.

This is where I came back in. Now a resident of the northwest side, I had heard of Dignity's existence in the Wauwatosa parish. The spiritual need I experienced in the past was surfacing again "clean and sober." A straight friend encouraged me to return. It's sometimes hard to come home. But I did, definitely older, may be wiser, certainly with unmet spiritual needs.

There they were, there we were the same Dignity sharing and worshipping together. Some of the faces were familiar – they too had come and gone and returned, like me. We traveled different journeys, withstood time, coming to bond with each other again.

How can we BE? We may always have problems with the church's stand on homosexuality, and as with society we may always tread a fine line between tolerance and damnation. There may always be a "wall" to scale. Maybe that is why I am writing about 15 years. What I know is each week we gather together on Sunday at 6:00 p.m. We worship, we hug, we share our heavens and our hells and --we love each other.



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

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WIS: You've played for both straights and gays. What's the difference?

F.E.: Straight people want to have fun. They want to get involved and they want to sing along. You find on the whole, and I know this sounds general, but I know, I've been doing this for years. The straight voices are usually a lot worse. Most of the straights want to hear all the old stuff, all the time but if that's all someone's willing to hear... but at straight clubs they get real defiant and real demanding.

WIS: And, Gays?

F.E.: The gays are more into theatre. They're doing it. They're not the types who keep asking for "Oklahoma" over and over again. They want to hear the new stuff that's on Broadway. Gay people challenge me as a performer. They're the most critical if I don't do something right. But, they're the most fun if they're having a good time and I'm communicating well. So, its been a real challenge and I've grown a lot because they're very selective about who they listen to and who they come back to spend their money to see. I'm happy to say they continue to come back and see me!

WIS: Would you switch back to a straight audience?

I'll have to. Until I become nationally known, I'll have to play for anybody.

WIS: Is there a difference between Gentry and M&M?

F.E.: The crowds aren't that different. It's the atmosphere in the room.

WIS: Please go on.

F.E.: M&M is such a big place. The ceilings are very high which affects the sound. It could affect my ability to communicate but I usually don't have a problem cutting through it. The only time I ever had trouble communicating with people was when several individuals were very distracting. They were really upstaging everything I was doing and it was then difficult to establish a rapport with my audience.

WIS: I'm really sorry. But, it sounds like it was only a one time occurrence, thank God. Do you compose?

F.E.: Yes, I do. I don't write lyrics but I do compose music. And, I occasionally play of few of my own pieces but not now. That's for the future. I'm looking to establish myself as an entertainer right now.

WIS: If you were designing your own future and anything you wanted to have happen would, what would happen?

F.E.: First, I'd do the Algonquin in New York and then I'd be invited on Carson. And then, I'd more or less follow along the lines of Michael Feinstein but I'd be alittle more fun to watch. That's egotistical I know, but I bounce around a little more than he does. I'd love to do a Broadway show. It wouldn't have to be a musical. That's what I'd like to have happen.

WIS: Let's hope so, Faron. I'd love to see you on Broadway. Break a leg! May your dream come true.



devotion to his music paid off with an introduction to Ira Gershwin, an idol since childhood. Until Ira's death in 1983, Michael catalogued Gershwin's records, music and memorabilia, acting as Gershwin's surrogate in matters relating to the publication and or performance of Gershwin's work. He became, in effect, the son Ira never had. Those six years provided Michael with a goal of proliferating and perpetuating the classic popular song.

In 1983, Michael took his talents to the world of cabaret, where he was successful almost at once, first in L.A., then San Francisco. In '86 New York's Algonquin Hotel booked him for what turned into a four month sellout engagement.

In short order, Feinstein appeared on a mini-series, "The Two Mrs. Greenvilles", then in "thirtysomething", and recorded albums. Then it was a heady tour of the USA with S.R.O. engagements before heading off to tour Europe with Liza Minelli, one of his biggest fans.

Juneau Áve., Milwaukee, Saturday, January 20, 1990 at 6 p.m. A telephone/audio link will tie Milwaukee to the ceremony in San Francisco. A pot-luck supper at 5:00 p.m. will precede the service.

St. Paulus Lutheran Church of San Francisco will host the ordination and installation of Pastors Ruth Frost and Phyllis Zillhart for St. Francis Lutheran Church and of Pastor Jeff Johnson for First United Lutheran Church. "Village" will follow a similar service and tune into the homily and actual ordination rite. The homilist will be The Rev. Carter Heyward, an openly Lesbian-identified Episcopal priest. It's been a hell of a ten years. Who would have thought that the changes we've seen would have been so dramatic. The Gay liberation movement, started by those bold women and men at the Stonewall bar, was continued, and grew into a the sophisticated political movement we have today.

In Wisconsin, we became the first state to adopt civil rights legislation that protects Gays and Lesbians from discrimination on the basis of employment, housing and public accommodations. This legislation, signed in 1982 by Republican Governor Lee Dreyfus, set the standard nationwide for Gay and Lesbian rights.

Shortly after the signature of the Gay rights legislation, the Wisconsin State Legislature repealed legislation prohibiting sexual contact between consenting adults. Yes, in 1982 it was legal to be Gay, but until 1983, it was illegal to have sexual contact. In fact, heterosexuals who were single could not have sex legally, and legally married people could only have sex in the standard 'missionary' position.

Former Wisconsin Governor Anthony Earl went out on a limb, one that eventually broke, to appoint the first Wisconsin Governor's Council on Lesbian and Gay Issues. As a founding member, I helped usher in a 'new attitude'' in Wisconsin towards Gays and Lesbians. That new attitude helped escort Gov. Earl back to the legal profession.

Disease became the rally ground for the Gay and Lesbian community, and drew thousands out of the closet. AIDS, the acronym that needn't be spelled out anymore, changed the Gay community in ways that legislation, court cases, and civil activism never could.

We've all heard the fancy voiced, 'if only all Gays and Lesbians had a lambda on their cheeks.'' AIDS is our physical mark that prevents us from hiding in the closet. Rock Hudson, Liberace, and others could no longer hide because they joined the thousands struck by the AIDS virus.

At the same time, we've learned the truth of the depth of the hatred against the Gay community when we explore the history of the AIDS virus in the United States. "They" let us die, committing the greatest crime committed against any group of people. The did nothing!

Today, we see the results of their inaction. Babies, the children of drug addicted mothers, are the latest casualty of the "War Against the Poor." The United States continues to carry out national policy designed to kill children, people of color and Gays and Lesbians. It's unfortunate that the Reagan/Bush administration hadn't been negligent in rebuilding the war forces of the military.

The 80's will be remembered as the period in time when the government devoted significant debt dollars to war games while innocent people died without hope, help or attempts to solve the mystery of this new disease.

Just to list the new concepts of the 1990's that were just dreams in the 1980, we can include desk-top publishing, home computers, fax machines, car phones, video cassette recorders in every home, and cam-corders at every family party.

In the Gay community we learned sexual orientation, condoms, dental dams, equal rights (at least in Wisconsin), AIDS, and AZT. First we learned about safe sex, and then we learned that it was only safer sex. The quilt became THE QUILT, and we all learned to sew again.

Most importantly, we learned to age as a community because we learned the immortality of the 1970's came to a screeching halt in the 1980's. We learned to express love, and to accept death. Let the 90's lead us to the solutions needed for a healthy and happy nation, built on the foundations of a caring community.
