





Two Pennsylvania men legally married

Two Pennsylvania Gay men have managed to get legally married by outsmarting the system.

Joey Carney, 33, and Devin Michaels, 23, of East Washington, 25 miles southwest of Pittsburgh, are commonlaw spouses.

In April, the couple filed for a marriage license at the Washington County Register of Wills office.

The clerk said she thought it was illegal for two men to marry and referred Carney and Michaels to State Solicitor Bob Weinert in Allentown.

Weinert told the couple there is no Pennsylvania law barring Gay marriage but that when another Gay couple sued for the right to marry several years ago, they lost in court anyway. Weinert suggested a 'back-door' approach. He urged Carney and Michaels to draw up a statement of marriage, have it notarized before two witnesses, and file it with the Register of Wills.

Weinert said this would make them married under the common-law marriage statute, granting all spousal rights and responsibilities, including the need for a legal divorce to un-marry.

The Pennsylvania common-law marriage statute requires only that a couple ''prove cohabitation and reputation' and present themselves as married to the public. A statement need not be filed but common-law couples must nonetheless follow legal procedures in the event of divorce.

Could it happen here?

Several attorneys contacted by In Step called the common law marriage of two Gay men in Pennsylvania "unprecedented." but said that Wisconsin statutes would prohibit such a union.

Attorney Deb Procknow said that common law marriage was not recognized in Wisconsin and that the state marriage statutes also appear to be sex-specific, referring to "him" and "her" and "husband and wife."

Chapter 765.05 of the Wisconsin Statutes states: "No person may be joined in marriage within this state until a marriage license has been obtained for that purpose from the City Clerk of the county in which one of the parties has resided for at least 30 days."


Chapter 765.001(2) further states: "Under the laws of this state, marriage is a legal relationship between 2 equal persons, a husband and wife..." It goes

on to make repeated references to "him" and "her."

On Valentine's Day in 1991, Christopher Lubus and Tim Grair, a Gay couple, attempted to apply for a marriage license at the Milwaukee County Clerk's office. County Clerk Rod Lanser denied their request, citing the sex-specific language of the state law.

Procknow cautioned that the validity of the Pennsylvania marriage might not be fully secured until it was tested and sustained in court. This could happen, for instance, if the men applied for and were denied insurance benefits available to spouses. If they appealed to the courts, the decision would either affirm or reject their union.

The City of Madison offers 'Domestic Partnership Registration' for same sex couples or family units. However, the ususal tax & other benefits associated with legal marriages do not apply.

Vatican homophobia called 'un-Christian'

Milwaukee [In Step] - "Appalling, really un-Christian."

That was the reaction of Kevin Quader, chairman of Dignity/Milwaukee, to the recent Vatican statement which supports anti-Gay bias.

The Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, the policy arm of the Vatican, issued a statement to American bishops in late June, saying: "There are areas in which it is not unjust discrimination to take sexual orientation into account, for example, in the consignment of children to adoption or foster care, in employment of teachers or coaches and in military recruitment."

The Vatican reiterated its belief that homosexuality is "an objective disorder" and said: "The Church has the responsibility to promote the public morality of the entire civil society on the basis of fundamental moral values."

"To say any group of people are deserving of prejudice is just beyond me," Quader told In Step. "You'd expect this out of the KKK, but not out of a religious organization."

Quader speculated that the Vatican's statement may have been issued in the wake of a survey of American Catholics which indicated that the majority supported equal rights in jobs and

statement, paid \$10 and became husbands.

He said he and Michaels were treated politely by county officials and have received a friendly reception from neighbors and institutions. The local Mellon Bank recognized the marriage for purposes of a loan application, and the two have filed for college financial aid as spouses.

Denmark is the only place in the world where Gay marriage is explicitly legal by statute. France, the Netherlands, Norway or Sweden is expected to be next.

(Please see sidebar article "Could It Happen Here?") housing for Gays and Lesbians. Gay rights have made much progress in recent years on the state and local levels in the U.S. and the Catholic Church may be trying to squelch further reforms, said Quader.

Quader also noted that in times of adversity, when the Church has previously attacked Gays, Gay and Lesbian Catholics have come together for support, actually strengthening their resolve. He expects this latest statement may boost attendance at Sunday services in Milwaukee.

Dignity/Milwaukee holds its weekly mass and prayer service on Sundays at 6p.m. at Pius X Church at 76th and Wright Streets. Use the Tower entrance. Quader said the Pius X congregation has "made a real commitment from the parish council on down" to support Gays and Lesbians, so the Vatican statement is unlikely to have any immediate effect.

Roommate bias OK

Madison — Madison's Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC) has dismissed a complaint filed by a Lesbian who was rejected as a roommate by two straight women.

Caryl Sprague filed a complaint with the EOC, saying that the two women violated a city law barring discrimination based on sexual orientation. A hearing examiner initially found in Sprague's favor and ordered the women to pay Sprague \$3,300 in damages. But the women appealed, and on June 25, the full commission dismissed the complaint.

The EOC ruled that the Madison City Council had not intended the anti-bias law to cover roommate selection. The Council has since changed the law to exempt people seeking roommates.

83 arrested in UW-M's restrooms

Milwaukee [In Step] - Eighty-three men have been arrested in a crackdown on sex- related activities in restrooms on the UW-Milwaukee campus, leading Queer Nation/Milwaukee to accuse the police of entrapment and University officials to deny they are engaging in an anti-Gay campaign.

Most of those arrested were cited for disorderly conduct and issued \$93 fines. At least one man was arrested for lewd and lascivious behavior. Two men were arrested more than once. The UWM Police report that 90-95% of those arrested were neither students nor staff members at UWM.

Queer Nation accused the UWM Police of using tactics of entrapment to arrest the men. QN says it has received reports that undercover officers have been seen masturbating in bathroom stalls, luring other men. (In Step has been unable to confirm these allegations.)

"SECURITY ISSUE, NOT GAY ISSUE"

UWM Chancellor John Schroeder told the press: "We are dealing with a security issue here, not a Gay issue." The UWM Police were called in to address the problem after students and staff members complained of harassment in the restrooms. Men were reportedly crawling under stall doors, peeking through holes bored in the walls of the stalls and openly propositioning others and engaging in masturbation.

ON has called for an end to the use of undercover officers in the restrooms and an investigation into the entrapment tactics. It has also called on UWM to work with the Gay and Lesbian Community (GLC), a student group, to develop alternative methods of deterring sexual behavior in the restrooms.

GLC RESPONDS

Shane Reister, co-president of the GLC, told In Step his group was drafting a set of proposals to the University which would encourage them to "handle the situation better." Said Reister: "We don't condone the bathroom activities, but we don't agree with the police methods

either."

On the entrapment issue, Reister said that most of the accounts received had been from third parties and that none of the men arrested was willing to "go public" with their charges, making proof and redress very difficult. He said that formal charges against the police can be filed with the Office of Affirmative Action and Equal Opportunities if only someone will come forward. Dr. Eleanor Miller, who administers that office, has pledged to aggressively investigate any such complaints.

"We need some first person accounts and people who are willing to follow through." said Reister of the alleged police misconduct. Victims can call the GLC office at (414) 229-6555.

Reister also expressed concern that the underlying problem of why men pursue anonymous sex in the bathrooms was not being addressed by the arrests. While not all of those arrested may be homosexual, some who are may be closeted men ashamed of their own sexuality or unaware of more conventional places to meet sexual contacts.

"PRECINCT ROULETTE"

Noting that the Milwaukee Police have recently conducted similar arrests at restrooms in area malls & parks, Reister said the authorities were engaging in "precinct roulette, shuffling the problem around from one area of the city to another."

Reister said that instead of punishing those arrested, authorities should seek "alternative sentences" like counseling. "This is a very complicated issue," said Reister, "and the police are not dealing with it in a very realistic way."

A spokesman for the UWM Police said the undercover operation was likely to continue "until it is no longer necessary" and reiterated the department's "obligation to respond to complaints filed by faculty, staff and students." Signs indicating that the restrooms are being patrolled will be posted as a warning.

The GLC has also suggested that dividers between urinals and walls to stalls that would meet the floor be installed. Repairing the peepholes and removing suggestive graffiti might also help, said Reister. He hopes for increased communication with the police and the UWM administration to resolve the problem.

DENYING OUR HISTORY?

While the University has downplayed the Gay angle to the arrests, Dan Fons of Queer Nation told In Step that entrapment was indeed a Gay issue and that Gays and Lesbians should not distance themselves from the controversy.

Fons noted that one of the primary issues the Mattachine Society, the early Gay rights group, worked on in the 1950's was police entrapment. He said that to deny the issue was to deny our history and to ignore the victims of anti- Gay oppression.

Massive pro-Choice turnout needed Aug. 8


Milwaukee [In Step] - The Milwaukee Clinic Protection Coalition is calling for a massive show of support August 8 to counter a huge onslaught by the Missionaries to the Preborn, who have vowed to bring 10,000 anti-abortion protesters out to the clinics that day.

The Missionaries have rented the MECCA Arena, which seats up to 10,000. for a 'pro-life' rally on August 7. Pro-choice forces anticipate a huge turnout at the clinics the following day.

Hundreds of anti-abortionists have been arrested at Milwaukee clinics in the past six weeks, but none of the clinics has been closed. The August 8 protest is seen as a last major attempt to rally their forces and gain publicity.

The Clinic Protection Coalition urges pro-choice supporters to mark August 8 on their calendars and to call the Coalition's hotline, (414) 283-1100, the

Boycott of bookstore planned

Madison [In Step] — The Ten Percent Society of UW-Madison is initiating a boycott of University Bookstore, 711 State Street, in response to new allegations of anti-Gay bias on the part of store management against employees.

Lois Corcoran, an employee of almost five years' standing, has filed a complaint with the city's Equal Opportunities Commission (EOC), claiming that bias based on age and sexual orientation led to her firing from the bookstore May 29.

Corcoran worked as Executive Secretary to the store's General Manager, John Epple. Epple fired Corcoran just months before she became eligible for pension benefits. Corcoran says Epple declined to specify reasons for her firing except to say that the bookstore wanted "a new image."

In an article in the June 19-25 Isthmus, Corcoran said that Epple was "uncomfortable with having a Lesbian as an assistant." She also charged that University Bookstore has "a whole history of firing people for being homosexuals."

Corcoran said she was the one who typed the letters of dismissal and readied the final checks for others who had been fired: "It's an awful feeling in your conscience when you see this happening to someone else and you stick your head in the sand. And then it happens to you..."

night before to see which clinics are most in need of "protectors." Clinic support has been dwindling as the anti-abortion campaign has dragged on, but leaders say that support on August 8 is especially important.



Others interviewed by Isthmus testified to the anti-Gay and anti-woman bias exhibited by some of the store's managers. Several other complaints against University Bookstore have been filed previously. One was settled with a monetary award to the plaintiff; others were withdrawn before they could be fully investigated.

Charles Squires, Acting President of the Ten Percent Society, told In Step the boycott would draw attention to the store's discriminatory practices and demand enforcement of state laws which ban such bias.

Squires said his group would encourage UW faculty members to make their textbooks available at other stores in the city. They also hope to influence the appointment of more sympathetic members of the bookstore's Board of Directors. University Bookstore is privately owned but operates as a trust of the University of Wisconsin.

Squires also said it was likely the store would be picketed during the first weeks of the fall semester. ACT UP/Madison, Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, Madison NOW and the Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Campus Center are a few of the groups that are joining the Ten Percent Society's efforts.



New York — Democratic presidential nominee Bill Clinton departed from the text of his acceptance speech July 16 and made reference to Gays.

"It is time to heal America," Clinton said.

"And so we must say to every American: Look beyond the stereotypes that blind us. We need each other. All of us, we need each other. We don't have a person to waste. And yet for too long, politicians told the most of us that are doing all right that what's really wrong with America is the rest of us: them. Them the minorities. Them the liberals. Them the poor. Them the homeless. Them the people with disabilities. Them the Gays. We got to where we really them'ed

In the script released to the media, Clinton's only examples of 'them' were 'minorities' and 'liberals.'

10,000 AIDS ACTIVISTS MARCH

In other convention news, 10,000 AIDS activists marched from Columbus Circle to Times Square July 14, demanding the Bush administration step up its fight against the disease.

Representing a 300-group coalition called United for AIDS Action, the protesters demanded more leadership from the White House, universal health care, improved research and education efforts, and an end to discrimination against HIV positives and people with AIDS.

Clinton previously has endorsed all the demands except that for universal health care. Instead, he "will deliver affordable health care to every American through a national health-care plan that... expands choices and guarantees coverage."

Actress Jessica Lange, the Rev. Jesse Jackson and New York Mayor David Dinkins addressed the Times Square rally. Some ACT UP members booed Dinkins, saying he hasn't done enough about AIDS.

Police made five arrests. In separate incidents, ACT UP members were charged with disorderly conduct, resisting arrest, harassment, second-degree assault on a police officer and possession of a weapon, a barricade. Police said ACT UP's Walter Armstrong struck an officer with the barricade.



GAY PWA ADDRESSES DELEGATES

Meanwhile, a Gay man with AIDS addressed the Democratic delegates and prime time TV viewers July 14. Bob Hattoy, an environmental adviser to the Clinton campaign, said the Bush administration's AIDS efforts are inadequate and discriminatory.

"AIDS doesn't discriminate but the George Bush White House does," he said. "We need a president who will take on the drug companies that drive AIDS patients into poverty. We need a president who isn't afraid of the word 'condom."

"President Bush, we are a million points of light but you are just too blind to see us" Hattoy charged. "We are part of the American family and, Mr. President, your family has AIDS and we are dying."

Hattoy urged delegates to "vote as if our lives depended on it. Mine does, yours could, and we all have so much to live for," he said.

In his acceptance speech, Clinton promised "an America in which health care is a right, not a privilege; in which we tell all our people: "Your government will have the courage, finally, to take on the health- care profiteers and make health care affordable for every family."

trip, Ms. Blakk responded to questions regarding Perot's announced decision to "wimp out" of the presidential race with the terse comment: "Good-bye, and good riddance!"

When pressed further, Blakk related an anecdote from her trip and also declared her intention of claiming the support of all those delegates to the Democratic National Convention who cast their vote as 'other' during polling. "I mean really, there I was sooo thrilled, I just knew that they meant me! I looked all around the convention floor and I was clearly the most 'other' Ms. Thang out there. It was one of the most exciting times of my life."

As she departed, Blakk was asked if she would soon quit the race. She responded, "I don't have billions of dollars to throw around, but when I threw my wig into this race, I meant to play for keeps!"

"The Victory Fund was started to help openly Lesbian and Gay candidates gain crucial financial support. Reaching this milestone so early in our history guarantees that our candidates are major players in the election process, Waybourn said. He also said that the Victory Fund is nearing 1,000 members.

The Victory Fund has had three impressive victories: including Sherry Harris' election to the Seattle City Council, Glen Maxey's primary win for a

Exhibitions on our history set Summer '94

New York - Mayor David N. Dinkins announced July 7 the creation of the Stonewall History Project, a collaborative effort of four New York City cultural institutions to develop exhibitions and other educational activities in 1994 to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the Stonewall riots and the start of the Lesbian and Gay rights movement. Comprised of the Brooklyn Historical Society, the Museum of the City of New York, The New-York Historical Society, and The New York Public Library, the Stonewall History Project is working in partnership with the Center for Lesbian and Gav Studies (CLAGS), based at the City University of New York Graduate Center.

seat in the Texas Legislature; and Gail Shibley's stunning primary for the Oregon Legislation, where she beat two challengers with 87 percent of the vote. The only loss thus far is California Congressional candidate Tom Nolan's defeat in June.

The Victory Fund qualifies candidates as viable and then recommends endorsed campaigns to its membership. Individuals join the Victory Fund for \$100 or more, then agree to contribute \$100 or more to at least two recommended candidates. Checks are written directly to the candidates' committees, but sent to the Victory Fund in Washington. These donations are combined with checks from other members and are then sent to the campaigns for a massive show of community support.

Current recommended candidates in addition to Maxey and Shibley, include Congressman Gerry Studds of Massachusetts; Tammy Baldwin, who is seeking David Clarenbach's seat in the Wisconsin State Assembly; Cleve Jones who is running for election to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors; and two Republicans, Jerry Keene, who is running for the Oregon Legislature, and Jerry Neal, who is running for a seat in the Ohio House of Representatives.

The Stonewall History Project, a collaborative undertaking, is the first major exhibition and programming initiative in the United States on Gay and Lesbian history. European museums in Amsterdam, Basel, and Berlin organized important exhibitions in the 1980s. This project is a direct expression of the four participating institutions' long-standing commitment to documenting and interpreting the history of New York City's diverse people and cultures.

Working in tandem with curators and staff from the four institutions will be teams of Lesbian and Gay scholars, as well as representatives of the Lesbian and Gay community. The coalition will work with these groups and with CLAGS to identify objects. photographs. manuscripts, and other materials that will best document the history of Lesbians and Gavs. To supplement existing institutional holdings, donations and loans of historically important artifacts will be solicited directly from members of New York's Lesbian and Gay community. Those who have photographs, letters and diaries, banners held aloft during demonstrations, and anything else that traces the history of Lesbians and Gays in New York will be asked to step forward with their materials. This collecting process will be a key aspect of the planning phase of the Stonewall History Project. The City will cooperate in this effort by identifying materials in its archives that are suitable for the Project's exhibitions and then make them available to the Project. Network Q survey

It's not unusual to get 5% or 10% response with a mailed survey. If you're real lucky, you might get 20%. At Network Q the numbers have been a little higher.

"We're at 90% and counting," said Dave Surber, President of the Alternative News and Entertainment Network. "And that's only in three weeks."

What's the source of all this interest? It's in response to a programming questionnaire mailed to charter subscribers of Network Q, the first nationwide Lesbian and Gay programming service.

With distribution scheduled to begin at the end of August, subscribers will receive two hours of programming each month on VHS videotape. "I'm just astounded by the response we've received," said Surber. "It's great to see this level of interest in the programming."

Surber went on to explain that he and his partner, Tom Puckett, suspected there was a pent-up demand for all-Gay programming before they began test marketing the idea in April.

"You definitely won't see any of this on regular TV," said Puckett. "Network Q is a step in breaking barriers and stereotypes. It presents an honest perspective on the Lesbian and Gay lifestyles."

In the survey, charter members were asked to rate 28 subject areas according to importance and to give suggestions on specific issues of importance to them. Clear favorites were news, documentaries, comedy, personality interviews and travel.

Most felt that the major issues facing the Gay community are acceptance, equal rights, violence against Gays, homophobia, religion and AIDS.

The first installment of Network Q is currently in production and will be available in September. Charter memberships are still available for \$39.95. To order Network Q, phone 1-800-368-0638.

Whose Family Values?

When Rep. Neil Abercrombie (D-Hawaii) took to the House floor early in July to denounce President Bush and Vice President Quayle for their disparaging remarks about Gay and Lesbian parents, there was a profound ring to his comments.

There, as he criticized Bush for statements calling same-sex couples raising children not "normal," the lawmaker told the story of a young child who had recently died of AIDS complications and how for one year this child was given a home by a loving couple when no one else would take him in.

Striking to the heart of the President's remarks, he chastised the commander-inchief, pointing out that this loving family happened to consist of two Gay men and their foster child.

"If you want to talk about family values, if you want to talk about being a Christian, if you want to talk about compassion in this country, do not require that lifestyle be the criterion upon which you judge another person," said Abercrombie. "If you genuinely believe in family values, Mr. President, take a look at the people who are raising the children in illness, take a look at the children who need love and compassion and are being given it — not by someone who has a particular lifestyle — but someone whose heart is filled with love."

Shortly afterwards, this reporter became aware that the family in question was not just some anonymous Gay couple found in a local headline; it involved a person much more familiar.

In this case, it was the family of Eric Rosenthal, political director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund; his lover of over seven years, Jeffrey Menzer; and their late foster child, Joshua.

"I was really moved by (the

congressman's floor statement)," said Rosenthal. "It's hard to open up the newspapers without seeing Bush and Quayle bashing Gay parents. And it feels so positive what Jeffrey and Joshua and I mean to each other that I really appreciated the fact that Neil was willing to stand up."

For the past three years, Rosenthal has volunteered his time at the Children's Hospital in Washington, D.C., working with HIV infected infants. There he met Joshua.

Barely a newborn, the child was born to an HIV infected mother who was soon hospitalized due to the advanced state of her condition.

At about this time, Rosenthal and Menzer had been considering becoming foster parents, though not necessarily of an HIV infected child. That's when the hospital told the men about little Joshua's situation: His mother had become so ill that she would no longer be able to take care of him.

"By the time his mother had gotten so ill that we had to decide one way or the other, we were already so much in love with him that there was really no decision left to be made," said Rosenthal, "So we just kept him."

Finally, in October of last year, the child's mother succumbed to her illness and they became Joshua's only real family.

For the year that they had him, the men were the only parents Joshua would know as they coped with the joys and inevitable heartbreaks that come with raising a child who will most likely never see adulthood.

Coincidentally, the family also happened to live around the corner from Rep. Abercrombie and his wife, Nancy. Having known the lawmaker since his first short stint in the House six years ago, the couple on occasion brought their child to the congressman's home and to campaign functions.







ill. Finally in June, at the age of only three years and three months, he died.

At the memorial service for the child, Abercrombie approached Rosenthal and his lover to offer his condolences.

The congressman also expressed anger at recent comments coming from the Bush/Quayle re-election team. The two had been widely quoted making disparaging comments about same-sex couples in efforts to bolster their image on 'family values' issues.

"He (Abercrombie) said something to me at the memorial service," said Rosenthal. "He said that he was really upset because of all the anti-Gay statements that Quayle and Bush had been saying, that Gays shouldn't be parents, that they weren't normal and stuff like that.

"He just wanted to do something about it, but he wasn't really sure then what he wanted to do."

A few weeks later, according to the lawmaker's staffers, the congressman was reading yet another newspaper account of Quayle criticizing same-sex couples as being a symbol of the nation's declining "family values." Taking this as his cue, he took to the House floor to offer an impromptu speech during a period for open debate.

"No one would take this child," said Abercrombie, "no one would love this child, no one would help raise this child for the life it had before it, and this child died before the age of four, but brought great love and affection by the foster care of a Gay couple."

It wasn't until several days later at the Democratic National Convention that Rosenthal would even know about the lawmaker's comments.


"It was enormously difficult to do what Jeffrey and I did," commented

It was really upsetting to have the president bashing us. We were able to give Joshua a life which he wouldn't have had otherwise though a great deal of hard work and, frankly, sacrifice on our part. And it's painful to hear what some people say about that."

Which is not to say that they for one moment regret their decision to become foster parents.

"I think that... he gave us even more than we were able to give him," he concluded. "But it was still a tremendous effort and required more commitment than anything else we had ever done, certainly much more commitment than caring for a healthy child. Much more commitment than anyone could imagine."

And maybe that's what family values are really all about.







Surviving are his father; his sister Judith Olson; and his nephew Bryan Olson. He was preceded in death by his mother.


Visitation was held at Molthen-Bell & Sons in South Milwaukee on July 13, and internment was held at Caledonia Memorial Cemetery on July 14.

Fest City Singers "glowing"

None of Fest City's female members were able to go to the convention, but that didn't interfere with FCS's popular repertoire. The audience went wild when a singer announced that lacking women, they'd have to perform the next song in "Milwaukee drag," then put on a babushka!

One FCS member said that chorus members were most impressed when many people who had seen their performance stopped them two or three days later and told them how much they'd liked what they saw. Many asked about the origin of some of the FCS songs. Particularly popular with the audience were those written by Chicago writer/composer Kristin Lems. A number of

Despite the many hours spent in rehearsal prior to their performances, Fest City members had plenty of time to explore Denver. And chorus members have nothing but praise for the residents and city that hosted them for that wonderful week.

Some chorus members attended the Gay Rodeo which was also held in Denver that week. Most sampled the cuisine and the nightlife, especially the cowboy bars. But they were awed by the performances of other choruses from around the nation—even choruses from Vancouver, Candada, and London, England.

At the end of the convention, all 70 choruses sang together three commissioned numbers for which they'd rehearsed all week long. All agreed that this experience was especially moving.

The Fest City Singers will perform their new show, Movin' On, at the Stackner Cabaret of the Milwaukee Repertory Theatre, 108 E. Wells, on Friday, August 28: Saturday, August 29; and Sunday, August 30. All performances will begin at 8pm. Tickets are \$10 and can be reserved by calling the Festline at 263-SING.

One hundred percent of the \$10 door charge will be donated to MAP, thanks to Siros and La Cage's generosity.


